SUBJECT: Export of Cotton Products

1. In reference to your inquiries (a) File No. 1000, January 27, 1947, subject: Wiping Bags, and (b) File No. 1410, January 26, 1947, subject: Cotton Corduroy and Velveteens, the following information is submitted.
2. Production of cotton corduroy and velveteens for export is not planned as a suitable grade and staple of raw cotton is not available to Japan at this time. Present raw cotton stocks necessitate the production of coarse yarns which are being utilized in the manufacture of standard fabrics.
3. Present domestic requirements of textiles is so critical that it is necessary to reuse all available scrap and rags by remanufacturing into fabrics.
