## SHANGHAI TRADE REPORT.

---

1<sup>o</sup>. LOCAL.—During 1911 many events occurred which under ordinary conditions would have been deemed of sufficient importance to demand extended notice in this report, but the relative importance of each and all of these was so completely overshadowed by the outbreak of the revolution, which is still pursuing its course, that only a brief record can be made of their occurrence. In fact, this report can only be considered to deal with Shanghai trade under normal conditions for the first nine months of the year. The exceptional conditions ruling subsequently cannot be adequately treated at present, and are entirely left to be dealt with in the report for 1912, save in a few special cases in which the modifications introduced into local trade by the revolution materially altered the normal conditions, but in a purely temporary manner only. Such cases will be referred to separately under the individual headings affected.—The prevailing feature at the beginning of the year was the want of confidence brought about by the financial crisis so fully dealt with in the last report. It is by no means an unfair criterion to compare the prices quoted on the Shanghai Stock Exchange for high-class stocks in each category in a particular year with those ruling for the same stocks under similar conditions in the year under review. For the year 1911, as compared with 1910, a very serious reduction in prices of all classes of securities would be shown. The reduction must not, for the most part, be taken to imply that the soundness of such business undertakings is impaired; but it is a recognition of the fact that while money is property, yet property is not money, and is only the equivalent of such money as it can command in the market. In some instances the fall in values was merely a reaction from the inflated values which had been proved to be not warranted by the dividend-earning powers of the companies. In other cases, such as wharf shares, the comparatively high values are due to the peculiar conditions now prevailing. While trade was brisk and cargo readily passed into circulation, many of the storage godowns at such wharves were practically empty, and could scarcely have proved remunerative investments. During the closing months of the year, however, little cargo was actually delivered, and storage capacity is still being taxed to its utmost limits. Numerous godowns have been utilised for bonded goods only; and while at the end of 1910 nine godowns were ample for the storage of goods in bond, no less than 23 had been licensed for bonding at the end of the year under review, and even this number has been found inadequate and is being increased so as to meet the requirements of the present emergency. The general want of confidence, both amongst foreigners and natives, was strikingly evidenced at Shanghai during the year by the numerous lawsuits which occupied the law courts in connexion with the fundamentally important question of the status of native bank orders, viz., whether such are identical with bank-notes and subject to no reservations, not stated on face of orders, in their negotiability, or the reverse. The contingency that such question should arise had not been previously considered, while its actual occurrence was productive of dire consequences to native credit. Until this point is decided beyond all dispute, frequent recurrences of panic and a great diminution in the confidence between foreign and native traders are inevitable. The unsatisfactory returns from many of the rubber estates, and the proved irregularities connected with both the flotation and the administration of several public companies here, also served to weaken the market. The strict enforcement of the provisions of the new Companies Ordinance, enacted in Hongkong

in December 1911, to which all the limited liability companies here which are registered under the Hongkong Ordinances will be subject, should go far to restore confidence in such forms of investment and to obviate the recurrence of the irregularities alluded to.—During the year some aviation exhibitions were conducted at the new Chinese racecourse at Kiangwan. The fatal accident to the aviator extinguished all hope of a successful financial result to a pioneer venture which at first seemed to promise well, in spite of very numerous obstacles both financial and material. Since then other aeroplanes have been imported; but it is curious that, while China is the home of kite-flying experts, no attempt has yet been recorded to copy and utilise in this country the man-carrying kites which have been found so useful for reconnoitring in Western armies. Stiff breezes are very frequent even in the height of summer; and in non-hilly districts such kites render services for military purposes almost as valuable as those obtainable by aeroplanes.—The festivities in honour of the coronation of H.B.M. King GEORGE V were celebrated on the 22nd June, by the whole community, with great enthusiasm. The decorations, and the illuminations in particular, were on a most elaborate scale, hitherto unparalleled here, and attracted visitors from all parts. The crowds in the streets on that occasion constitute a record for Shanghai.—Among engineering works completed during the year may be mentioned the Chapei Waterworks and Electricity Installation, which was opened officially on the 29th October. The chemical analysis of the water shows that a very high standard of filtration has been attained, and the result is highly gratifying to all concerned. Among the architectural works completed during the year must be recorded the new Shanghai Club, a very outstanding stone-faced building, upon the site of the old club. Another noble monumental addition is seen in the new offices of the China Mutual Life Insurance Company, which, for ornate style and elaborate embellishment, both internal and external, may be considered one of the most magnificent buildings in the Far East. The Austrian and Japanese Consulates General were established in new and more commodious buildings, and the Standard Oil Company of New York also. Finally, a striking feature to the beauties of the town was added by the opening of the new Astor House Hotel, facing the Public Gardens.—Long prior to the outbreak of the revolution a strong movement was evidenced here in favour of the removal of the queue, which appendage is now almost universally conspicuous by its absence. The fashion of the headgear to be adopted to replace the original skull-cap is at present subject only to the caprice of the individual wearer; but it is a humorous comment on the situation to record that one of the largest sewing machine companies was compelled to supplement its stock of sewing machines merely to supply the demand for machines to make the cloth tourist caps, hitherto the type most in general use.—In connexion with the educational movement which has done so much to produce improved methods of communication of all kinds, it may not be out of place to record here that during the year two large schools were opened at Shanghai—the new French Municipal School and the German Kaiser Wilhelm Schule. The success attending the establishment of the International Correspondence School branch at Shanghai, and also the science lectures at the Y.M.C.A. with experiments demonstrating the subjects dealt with, which have proved most attractive and are well attended, serve alike to prove the receptivity of the native mind under present conditions. Electrical sky-signs are being adopted in numerous instances. The sanitary condition of the native city is improving rapidly: streets are being widened, and a plan is approved for the demolition of the city wall and the substitution of a wide boulevard which will facilitate access to Kiangnan Arsenal and Lunghwa. Similar improvements in the communications with Woosung are also under consideration.—The foreboding expressed in the report for 1910, that the famine in East-Central China would prove one of the most calamitous on record, was unfortunately more than confirmed during the year.

The attendant misery was terribly accentuated by the unprecedented floods which ruined the crops over vast areas. The restraining dams were overwhelmed in numerous places, and to repair them adequately will entail vast expenditure. While the ultimate remedy for these oft-recurring afflictions must be sought for in expert afforestation schemes of great magnitude distributed over a wide area, under Government supervision, yet, as a minor remedy, it has been suggested that it might be worthy of trial to plant all the dams, wherever existing, with the well-known jerusalem artichoke, and leave the same to spread itself, forbidding any interference whatever with its *subsoil* crops. The advantages claimed are that it is a most prolific plant and would serve to bind the surface of the dams most firmly, and that the enormous amount of foliage it produces would, to a certain extent, modify the climate and affect the rainfall in the same manner as afforestation does. The stalks of the crops could be used for repairing the dams themselves, whilst in case of dire need there would be an almost inexhaustible supply of food obtainable by digging only about a foot deep in the dam itself—a mere trifle when the thickness of these dams is considered, and in no way calculated to impair their efficiency. The same plant would be most useful on all railway embankments.

2°. REVENUE.—The total revenue for the year shows an increase of over 1½ million Haikwan taels as compared with that for 1910. In these figures, however, are included the duty and likin on 8,433.50 piculs of opium remaining undelivered at the end of the year, amounting to *Hk. Rs.* 927,685, which amount was paid in advance owing to the special conditions fully detailed in paragraph “9°. Opium,” and cannot legitimately be considered as forming part of the revenue for the year under review. The remaining balance of the increase is mainly under the heading of import duties, and these would have been far more important had it proved practicable to take delivery of the enormous stocks now being retained in the bonded godowns pending more settled conditions.

3°. FOREIGN GOODS.—(a.) *Imports, Direct and Coastwise.*—In spite of the untoward conditions, the total gross value of the direct imports shows an increase of about 21 million Haikwan taels. This comparison of values alone cannot be taken as proving an actual increase in the volume of trade, since the appreciation in value of opium alone would almost supply the necessary explanation. It must, however, be remembered that until the goods are taken out of bond this office has no cognizance of the actual values and particulars of the enormous stocks now crowding the bonded godowns—in fact, much of this cargo is applied for as “packages” only, and no attempt is made to describe the contents. The general particulars of piece goods are usually supplied voluntarily by merchants when applying to bond such cargo, although not in as exact detail as would be required before duty could be assessed for delivery; and doubtless such goods have been already included by the Chamber of Commerce as part of the stocks in Shanghai, but all such are necessarily excluded from Customs returns of imports until actually delivered from bond. In spite of these circumstances, the recorded figures for cotton piece goods show an increase in value of about 23 million Haikwan taels: viz., shirtings, over 4½ million pieces, value 18 million Haikwan taels; and drills, jeans, T-cloths, and italians, about 1 million pieces, value 5 million Haikwan taels. On the other hand, heavy decreases are shown in the importations of cotton yarn, which fell by over 300,000 piculs, valued at 8 million Haikwan taels, and raw cotton decreased by 200,000 piculs, valued at 4 million Haikwan taels. Woollens call for no special mention. Numerous varieties of woollen and cotton mixtures are coming forward, and a considerable increase in the importation of shoddy cloths is anticipated in order to meet the demand for foreign clothing for Chinese wear. Until Chinese houses are fitted with some permanent means of heating, it seems improbable that the fashion of wearing foreign clothes

will be acceptable beyond the limits of treaty ports. A fair trade in metals was done in the earlier portion of the year, but later all business was at a standstill. There seems to be no doubt that if the present disturbances are settled trade will very rapidly revive; the native dealers are quite prepared to resume business, and are ready to give orders so soon as confidence is restored. The importations of tinned plates show an increase of about 90,000 piculs. Nail-rod iron remained at about the same figures as in the previous year, in spite of the curious circumstance that no nail rods whatever were imported during the September quarter; large stocks already existed locally, and Chinese dealers preferred to buy cobble wire, as that is considerably cheaper and they can produce from it equally good nails. The Hanyang Iron and Steel Works are now, under normal conditions, in a position to supply nails far more cheaply than any other native makers. The northern ports, Tientsin in particular, but Tsingtao also to a minor extent, are increasingly drawing their supplies direct from abroad. The trade in kerosene oil continued its steady expansion. The imports of American kerosene show an increase of about 21½ million gallons, valued at 3½ million Haikwan taels, while Borneo and Sumatra oil also increased about 5 million gallons, valued at *Hk.Ts.* 750,000. The trade in petroleum and its products is daily acquiring more importance and being extended by experiments conducted at the local installations of the great companies concerned. Efforts attended with considerable success are being made to produce a mineral oil suitable as a base for paint, so as to replace the expensive linseed and other paint bases now in use. Liquid indigo shows an increase of 70,000 piculs, valued at 2½ million Haikwan taels. Flour also increased by about 570,000 piculs, valued at 2 million Haikwan taels. Owing to the failure of the European beet crop, the Java sugar market strengthened very rapidly in July, and the price of refined sugars, which for this market are principally manufactured from Java raw sugar, rose in proportion, until a record price was reached for best qualities. The outbreak of the revolution, in October, upset all calculation, and the imports are about as in the previous year. The general situation of the market for foreign machinery was worse than it had been for years. Owing to the financial condition, no Chinese capital was available for new industrial undertakings. A new industry for the production of oxygen for the oxy-acetylene welding process has been recently installed here by the Asiatic Petroleum Company, at the old Langkat Wharf, which will be no longer utilised for berthing steamers. The company proposes to apply this process principally to the welding of their oil drums; but the apparatus will be also employed for repairs *in situ* to vessels in port, thus economising docking expenses. A minor industry also being introduced by the same company is the production of air gas from gasoline, which is claimed to provide all the advantages of lighting, heating, and power which are ordinarily obtainable only where large central installations exist, whereas this system can be employed for single houses only, in a very small and compact form, giving results which for efficiency and economy are claimed to compare favourably with those from either gas or electricity.

(b.) *Re-exports.*—i. *Abroad.*—These show a decrease in value of about 2½ million Haikwan taels. This is, however, mainly accounted for by the decreased re-export of opium, amounting to about 1½ million Haikwan taels. No other headings fell off to any important extent. The re-exports of 1st quality Korean ginseng exceeded the imports by over *Hk.Ts.* 125,000; this was due to the enhanced value of ginseng in Korea, which rendered it remunerative to ship off to Hongkong and the Straits most of the stocks remaining in Shanghai.

ii. *Coastwise.*—These also show a decrease in value of 4½ million Haikwan taels. Cotton yarn declined by no less than 375,000 piculs, value 9½ million Haikwan taels; American sheetings, by some 260,000 pieces, value 1 million Haikwan taels; and cigarettes, by about

460,000 mille, value *Hk.Ts.* 800,000. Amongst increases must be noted kerosene oil, by 9½ million gallons, valued at 1½ million Haikwan taels; English white shirtings, by about 170,000 pieces, value 1½ million Haikwan taels; and artificial liquid indigo, by about 38,000 piculs, value 1½ million Haikwan taels.

4°. NATIVE GOODS.—(a.) *Exports, Abroad and Coastwise (including Re-exports).*—As might be expected, these show a decrease in value amounting to about 9 million Haikwan taels; but of this amount 3 million taels are accounted for by the decrease of 3,500 piculs of native opium. Raw cotton shows a decrease of over 456,000 piculs, valued at 1 million Haikwan taels. The cotton crop, although damaged in some districts to the extent of even 50 per cent. by the heavy rains and severe floods, proved, on the whole, fairly satisfactory. Prices toward the end of the season (August and September) ruled exceedingly high, owing to the shortage in India in 1910 and the late arrival of the 1911-12 local crop from up country and the unfavourable reports current concerning it. Unfortunately, in spite of the high prices, malpractices in the way of adulteration were carried on during the season to an extent never before approached, and the Cotton Anti-Adulteration Association was formed, which received the support of the high authorities in Peking. Much valuable work towards checking malpractices has been effected by this association since its inception; but the result depends mainly upon the loyal co-operation of the mills, both foreign and Chinese, failing which it will be almost impossible to maintain and enforce the regulations so necessary to the welfare of the trade in this important staple, the possibilities of which had not been realised until this year. While exportations of raw cotton show a decrease of 456,000 piculs as mentioned above, those of Shanghai-made cotton yarn, on the other hand, show an increase of about 81,000 piculs, valued at 4½ million Haikwan taels, while locally-made sheetings also increased by about 215,000 pieces, valued at *Hk.Ts.* 750,000. The prices for raw silk, both white and yellow, ruled high, and exports have decreased by about 2,500 piculs, valued at 2½ million Haikwan taels. After the outbreak of the revolution a steady decline set in, which still continues. Steam filatures have had a ruinous season, and it is expected that many filatures will not reopen in 1912. It is computed that the losses by speculators in cocoons and by filature owners amount to over 1½ million Haikwan taels. The prospects in the near future are not reassuring: there is no doubt that the enormous increase in Japanese production has put silk in the position of being in greater supply than the demand warrants. The exports of silk piece goods show a decrease of about 3,000 piculs, valued at 2 million Haikwan taels. The total exportation of tea shows an increase in value of about 1½ million Haikwan taels, although the quantity is less than for 1910 by over 45,000 piculs. The market here is principally in green tea. In February the United States authorities notified officially that all green tea for importation into the United States must be free from added colouring matter and "facing" of any sort. Much controversy ensued, owing to conflicting analyses by various chemical experts upon identical teas, and a practical deadlock ensued between native dealers and local buyers for the United States market. Efforts to obtain the appointment of a local expert whose certificate would guarantee the admittance of the tea concerned into the United States have, so far, not been successful. The advance in low-priced teas was probably due to the short supply of low grades from India and Ceylon: it would appear as if the world's demand for low-grade tea has overtaken the supply. The advance in prices occurred prior to the revolution. The newly developed trade to Batoum and places other than the United States seems to continue its favourable promise. The export of candles and toilet soap (locally made) is growing rapidly. The export of locally-made cigarettes increased by 11,000 piculs, value 1 million Haikwan taels, whereas the import of foreign-made cigarettes decreased by about similar figures. In this connexion, it is perhaps

worth noting that the local population, owing, perhaps, to the disapproval of cigarette smoking expressed by persons high in authority, have widely adopted the short foreign pipe. Considerable quantities of native tobacco prepared in foreign style, but scented, are being sold to meet this new requirement.

(b.) *Imports.*—The total gross value shows a decrease of over 3 million Haikwan taels. The decrease in the importations of native opium alone of 12,000 piculs, valued at 12 million Haikwan taels, is noticed in paragraph 9°. Cow and buffalo hides also show a shortage of 83,000 piculs, of a value of 2 million Haikwan taels; and sesamum seed, of some 350,000 piculs, value about 1 million Haikwan taels. The importations of cereals (rice, wheat, and kaoliang) increased by about 1 $\frac{1}{2}$  million piculs, value 4 million Haikwan taels. Circumstances rendered it desirable for owners to realise on their holdings, and the price of rice has declined locally since the outbreak of the revolution. Sheep's wool also shows an increase of 62,000 piculs, value 1 million Haikwan taels.

#### 5°. INLAND TRANSIT.—No remarks.

6°. SHIPPING.—The principal feature of interest is the discontinuance of the French line of Yangtze and Ningpo steamers; the vessels have been taken over by the two British lines. Freights have not been satisfactory as a whole. It is probable that the only vessels which really benefited during the year were the Yangtze steamers, owing to the enormous number of passengers who fled to Shanghai from the disturbed regions. It is questionable, however, whether a large percentage of the huge sums paid by refugees as passage money ever reached the coffers of the steamer company concerned. A slight change has been made in the system of recording the tonnage of native vessels towed by steam-launches on Soo-Hang traffic: the number of vessels towed is no longer recorded separately, but their aggregate tonnage is added to that of the towing launch. This change accounts for the apparently large diminution in the number of vessels entered and cleared as appearing in the Shipping table.

7°. PASSENGER TRAFFIC.—The competition of the railways is increasingly successful. The returns from the Shanghai-Nanking Railway show an increase over those for 1910.

8°. TREASURE.—Exchange has fluctuated but slightly. The local rates between dollars and taels rose to unprecedented heights, owing to the dearth of silver dollars locally. These had been shipped, by speculators in many cases, to the river ports, and the local banks were consequently in great straits to meet their notes. The situation was somewhat relieved by the importation of about 2 million native dollars, which were sent down by train from the Nanking Mint; but the stringency still continues to a certain extent. The copper coinage has slightly recovered. Whereas, in January, 1,780 10-cash pieces equalled Sh.Ts. 10, the rate fell to 1,500 in October, and now stands at about 1,650. The heaviest sufferer by this depreciated currency is the Shanghai Tramway Company, which loses thereby about 25 per cent. of its face earnings, when the loss on the subsidiary silver coinage is also taken into account.

9°. OPIUM.—(a.) *Foreign.*—The record of the opium trade during the year is of peculiar interest. At the beginning of January the value of Malwa was about Hk.Ts. 1,850, and Bengal Hk.Ts. 1,930, per chest, with a market slightly rising. In March rumours began to circulate that a new Agreement was to come into force by which the then Customs charges would be materially increased. The stocks held had been considerably added to in the interim, and the price fell. As an exceptional concession to the owners, and owing to the special circum-

stances, an arrangement was allowed by the Customs permitting any owner desirous of so doing to pay at once duty and likin at the rate of *Hk. Rs. 110* then in force and to retain such opium in the bonded godowns for "subsequent delivery," without insisting on its being immediately labelled and removed elsewhere for storage. All such opium was carefully identified, without opening, and the chests were then wired and a special "ticket" attached. Such opium could be delivered and labelled upon receipt of formal application at any subsequent date. This arrangement was availed of to the fullest extent by the opium merchants; and by the 8th May, when the new Opium Agreement was published, no fewer than  $12,663\frac{1}{2}$  chests had paid duty. Of these,  $5,522\frac{1}{2}$  chests have since been formally imported and labelled, while  $7,141\frac{1}{2}$  chests are still stored in the bonded godowns. Various complications occurred on the question of certification. The Indian Government had been issuing certificates for opium authorised to be exported to China from the beginning of the year; but such certificates had been kept by the importers, even if forwarded, and much of the opium had already been delivered. Consequently, it was only possible to attempt to discover how much of the stocks on hand on 8th May could be classed as certificated. In many cases the merchants themselves were unable to produce any proof whatever in support of either view. The original shippers might not have forwarded the certificates, or the opium might have been reshipped from Hongkong or Singapore and the certificates retained there. The summary of the situation as it was finally accepted to stand on 8th May may be gathered from the following table with its explanatory note:—

"All chests are counted as non-certificated which arrived at Shanghai before the 23rd January 1911 (date of arrival of first steamer bringing certificated opium), or which, though arriving after the 23rd January, bear no marks of certification."

Another slight drop took place in the market during May; but to this succeeded a rush in wild speculations which bade fair to rival the rubber boom of 1910. It was caused by a rumour that the Indian Government had arranged to suppress completely all importation of opium into China by the end of 1913. This rumour has, of course, been proved to be baseless. While it still was being generally credited, prices rose, on paper, to extraordinary heights. Opium "to arrive" was bought and sold in the most excited manner. Opium owners admit having recorded larger profits in the three or four months while the rumour prevailed than during the whole of the last 10 years; but they have not necessarily been able to realise such profits, since comparatively few transactions were on a cash basis. The question of the storage and insurance

of the immense stocks had also to be considered. Much of the opium was held by the foreign banks as security for advances, and the fluctuations in prices caused no little anxiety. The fire insurance companies were disinclined to accept extreme risks on single godowns, and it became desirable to distribute the stocks among more godowns. As a concession to this requirement the opium godown owners were allowed to bond supplementary godowns. At the beginning of the year four bonded godowns, which have replaced the old opium hulks, sufficed for the stock in hand, but at the end of 1911 no fewer than 10 had been applied for and authorised among the same owners as before. Of these, seven are fully bonded, while three are reserved for the storage of "ticketed" opium, duty and likin paid for subsequent delivery, as above referred to—and no other. In such cases no additional bonds were called for. In the event of the re-exportation of such "ticketed" opium to a treaty port, it is in all cases duly labelled with Shanghai labels prior to shipment, but is covered by an exemption certificate which enables the port of destination to grant transit certificates there, none being issuable at Shanghai. No case has occurred of such opium being reshipped abroad, and when the exceptional procedure was authorised a special reservation was made to the effect that under no conditions could any claim be entertained for the refund of duty and likin thus paid at the old rate on opium "for subsequent delivery." Latterly, a considerable number of chests of duly labelled opium were imported into Shanghai from other ports. In no case was such labelled opium allowed entry into the bonded opium godowns, even when being landed from the importing steamers. The subsequent movements of such opium are consequently assimilated to those of general cargo re-exports, examination and identification of the opium being in all cases insisted upon whenever re-exportation of entire chests is applied for. In very rare instances, certificates are issued by the Indian Government for "touch" opium, commonly called "prepared," and the half-chest of "boiled" opium now in bond is an instance in point. Shanghai is too far north of Hongkong and the Straits for merchants to risk the shipment of such valuable cargo by junk, and hitherto no attempt has been detected to land any chest of foreign opium clandestinely within this district. Fabulous prices are said to have been offered for labelled opium to be at seller's risk until safely received by buyer; but little business has actually resulted, and in many cases where labelled opium was sent to Yangtze ports under exemption certificate recently, such opium has been returned to seller in Shanghai. The highest prices for cash during the burst of speculation were, for Malwa about *Hk. Rs.* 3,200, and for Bengal *Hk. Rs.* 3,250, per chest, both non-duty paid, but for opium "to arrive" (*ki-tao*) prices reached about *Hk. Rs.* 3,750. As high as *Hk. Rs.* 7,000 has been mentioned as offered for opium duly labelled and safely delivered far up the Yangtze; but no authentic case is on record of the payment of such prices. At present the local trade is almost at a standstill, and the non-negotiability or repudiation of native bank orders in many cases has caused almost a panic on the market in this connexion. Upon this subject, it has to be recorded, with the utmost satisfaction, that the continuity of the policy of the ultimate suppression of the opium traffic seems to have been in no way affected by the revolution. Both parties profess to be entirely in accord upon this all-important question; and there is no reason to anticipate any relaxation of the repressive measures, which are well calculated to attain the object ultimately aimed at, viz., to restrict the use of the drug to medical purposes only. The gross amount of foreign opium actually imported into Shanghai from abroad shows a decrease of about 2,900 piculs, and, under present conditions, it seems probable that considerably over a year will have elapsed before the present stock of duty and likin paid opium still stored in bonded godowns awaiting delivery can possibly be exhausted. Its existence was duly taken into consideration by the Indian Government when the reductions for the authorised importations into China for the years 1913-16 were being arranged.

As compared with the preceding year, the gross importations for 1911 show the phenomenal decrease of about 12,000 piculs, with a value of about 12 million Haikwan taels. The values of such classes of native opium as were imported appreciated considerably, as shown by the following table, giving values per picul of the various kinds\* of native opium for the last five years:—

## APPENDIX No. 1.

## COAST INSPECTOR'S NOTES.

IN September 1911 the old channel across the Tsungming Banks was discontinued for navigation, and a new channel, reference to the formation of which was made in the Notes of the two preceding years, was buoyed and opened.

In October the lower end of the Confucius Channel was re-sounded. This examination showed a further extension of the South-east Spit.

In December the Langshan Crossing was re-sounded. As a result, it was found necessary to readjust the positions of several aids to navigation marking the crossing, owing to an extension at its upper end of the Johnston Flats and to a narrowing of the lower end of the channel.

In June a fog siren was established at Steep Island Light-station.

## APPENDIX No. 2.

SUMMARY OF THE PRINCIPAL EVENTS IN CONNEXION WITH HARBOUR AND  
RIVER WORK AT SHANGHAI DURING 1911.

*Bunding, Wharves, and Jetties.*—The jetties and pontoons at the Old Ningpo Wharf and at the China Merchants Lower Wharf have been extended to the Conservancy normal line, in accordance with permission granted to the companies concerned on the 2nd September 1910 and the 6th March 1911 respectively.

On the 20th March permission was granted to the Director of the Kiangnan Arsenal to extend the Arsenal Wharf 68 feet toward the Conservancy normal line. This work has been completed.

On the 18th September permission was granted to the South Manchuria Railway Company to construct a sheet pile bunding, 983 feet in length, at the premises known as the Whangpoo Wharf and Godown Company's, situate on the Shanghai side of the 9th Section of the harbour. This work is now nearing completion.

On the 26th September permission was granted to the Shanghai Municipal Council to construct a concrete bunding at the Riverside Electricity Power Station, situate on the Shanghai side, upper end of the Lower Section of the harbour.

*Buoys and their Moorings.*—On the 6th March permission was granted to Messrs. Melchers & Co., agents for the Norddeutscher Lloyd, to lay down suitable head and stern moorings, in the 11th Section of the harbour, between the Cosmopolitan and International Docks, for the accommodation of the Imperial German mail steamers. The laying of these moorings was completed on the 8th August; they have proved very satisfactory.

During the year all moorings and their buoys in the harbour have been kept in an efficient state of repair.

*Astrea Channel.*—On the 13th October, owing to the extension of the mudbank on the left side of the channel towards the fairway between Nos. 2 and 3 Buoys, it was found necessary to shift them both, with a view not only to the marking of such extension, but at the same time to maintain the depth of water then indicated at the signal stations, i.e., a depth of 17 feet at lowest low water of spring tides, which depth has been maintained throughout the year. There are, however, indications of a further extension of this mudbank towards the fairway, which cannot, with safety to navigation, be further narrowed by shifting of buoys; it therefore appears that in the near future a reduction in the depth of water as indicated at the signal stations must follow, until the mudbank as above described has been dredged away.

The following table shows the average depth of the Astraea Channel at high and low water, etc., for each month during the year under review, which depth has been more than sufficient for all steamers coming to Shanghai:—

During the year there was considerable extension of both banks of the river towards the fairway between No. 5 Buoy, at the upper entrance to the Astraea Channel, and Black Point, narrowing the channel between these points to such an extent that on the 1st December it was found necessary to issue Harbour Notification No. 13, warning steamers against anchoring in that part of the river.

*Vessels registered for Inland Navigation.*—During the year 42 steam and motor vessels were registered for inland navigation, as against 48 during 1910. There were 359 such vessels on the Shanghai register at the end of 1911, as against 381 at the end of the preceding year.

*Vessels transferred from Foreign to Chinese Flag.*—The Norwegian s.s. *Prominent* has been acquired by the China Merchants Steam Navigation Company and the vessel's name changed to *Tunghua*.

*Pilotage.*—The Pilotage Service continues working in an efficient and satisfactory manner.

*River Police.*—The work of the River Police was very satisfactory during the year. On account of the prevalence of pneumonic plague in the northern ports during the months of February, March, and April, 110 vessels were disinfected under the supervision of the River Police at Shanghai, resulting in the destruction of 1,229 rats.

*Fire-float "Huning."*—The fire-float *Huning* was called out to only two fires during the year.

On the 13th August, at 11.55 P.M., a fire broke out in the passenger cabin compartment of the Chinese s.s. *Toosui*, lying in the Shanghai Dock and Engineering Company's Old Dock. The *Huning* arrived promptly, and her pumps were kept working from 12.40 A.M. until 3 A.M.; by 4.30 A.M. the fire was completely out, and the *Huning* then returned to her station.

On the 25th August, at about 10 A.M., a fire broke out on board the German s.s. *Meishun* moored at the Old Dock Wharf outside the British s.s. *Wosang*. The *Huning* commenced pumping at 10.30 A.M., and continued at intervals until 3.30 P.M., by which time the fire was practically out; the *Huning* stood by until the following morning, when she returned to her station. The *Meishun* was completely burnt out, leaving only the shell of the hull, and two of the crew lost their lives. At this fire the *Huning* sustained damage amounting in cost of repairs to Tta 80, and this bill was paid on the 11th September by the Yangtsze Insurance Association, Limited.

On account of the cold weather and of the disturbed conditions obtaining in the Shanghai district, the *Huning* was kept under banked fires from the 4th November, with the exception of three days while lying in the Yangtzepoo Dock having her hull cleaned up to the water-line and two coats of bitumastic solution applied.

*Ashes.*—During the year ashes amounting to 2,329 tons were taken delivery of from 3,902 steam-launches, as against 2,586 tons, from 4,468 steam-launches, in 1910.

*Customs Property.*—The dwelling-house, signal stations, and steam-launch at Woosung, the signal station at Kajow, the Malukiao and Tungkow Explosive Magazines, the Pootung Signal Station, the River Police hulk, and the Department's steam-launches and fire-float were all kept in good order and condition.

The 7 vessels from non-infected ports were presented for inspection either as having small-pox (2) or deaths during the voyage (4), or in error (1). No vessels were specially inspected out of hours. Of the 230 vessels inspected, 27 were placed in quarantine.

The particulars of the last four vessels referred to in the foregoing table are as follows:—

1°. The s.s. *Wingsang* left Hongkong on the 22nd February, and arrived here on the 26th, with a crew of 79 and 17 native passengers. The master reported two sudden deaths on the voyage, viz., that of a firemen's cook, at 3 A.M. on the 25th, who had been suffering from "dropsy," and that of a Chinese female passenger, at 9 A.M. on the 26th, said to have been suffering from dysentery. Examination of the corpses showed no sign of plague or other infectious disease. The vessel was placed in quarantine, to allow of the disinfection of the forecastle and forward tween-decks, and arrangements were made to begin on the following morning (it being then after 6 P.M.) and to remove the two corpses. On 27th February the disinfection was started at 9.30 A.M., and the ports were opened up at 5.30 P.M. The corpses were removed to the station and a constable was left on board to remove the sulphur pots. Pratique was granted at 6 P.M.

2°. The s.s. *Lokseang* left Dairen on the 1st March at 2.50 P.M., and arrived here on the 5th, with a crew of 59 and three native passengers. The master reported one of the native crew as sick. On examination he was found showing signs somewhat suspicious of bubonic plague, was removed to the station for observation and treatment, and a specimen was obtained and sent to the Municipal Health Officer for examination and report. As, in addition to this, the three native passengers had no certificate of five days medical surveillance, the vessel was placed in quarantine so as to complete seven days out from Dairen. On 8th March this vessel, having completed seven days out from Dairen and all left on board remaining in good health, was granted pratique at 2.50 P.M. The report on the specimen sent was negative as regards plague.

3°. The s.s. *Hsinchi* left Tientsin on the 9th March, and arrived here on the 13th, with a crew of 104 and 24 native passengers. All on board were examined and found free of signs of plague. Destruction of rats and medical surveillance certificates were seen. 29 packages of mails on board were notified, disinfected, and removed. As no restriction was placed on the going ashore at Tientsin of the officers and crew, and many went on shore, this vessel was placed in quarantine to complete seven days out from Tientsin. On 16th March this vessel, having completed seven days out from Tientsin and all on board remaining in good health, was granted pratique at 8 A.M.

4°. The s.s. *Kingsing* left Tientsin on the 12th March at 6 A.M., and arrived here on the 15th, with a crew of 101 and two foreign and 55 native passengers. All on board were examined and found free of signs of plague. Destruction of rats and medical surveillance certificates were seen. As no special restriction was placed on the going ashore at Tientsin of the officers and crew, and several went on shore, this vessel was placed in quarantine to complete seven days out from Tientsin. On 19th March this vessel, having completed seven days out from Tientsin and all on board remaining in good health, was granted pratique at 7.15 A.M.

All these vessels were granted immediate pratique on the certificate of the medical officer or captain, as there were no cases of suspicious illness on board.

Of the 26,026 persons examined, 12 were removed to the station—eight as patients, and three native passengers with faulty medical surveillance certificates and one as a contact. One case of small-pox (a foreigner) was sent to the Shanghai Isolation Hospital.

*Junk Inspection.*—A continuous watch was kept at the Woosung Lighthouse throughout the year. 967 junks were examined, of which 17 were quarantined—two for passing at night without waiting for inspection, and 15 for having been less than seven days out from Shantung.

Two foreign junk watchers and two native boatmen were temporarily engaged from 6th March to 22nd April.

*General.*—With the outbreak of pneumonic plague in the North, strict precautions were taken to safeguard the health of the ports.

From the 19th January until the 1st May nearly all the more important northern ports were declared infected and routine quarantine imposed. Provision was made against the escape of rats from vessels coming from infected ports and for their destruction on board every voyage.

Except for two cases of phthisis, the health of the staff was good.

On the 21st July Dr. ROBERT H. COX, Port Health Officer, was granted 12 months leave of absence and the undersigned appointed Acting Port Health Officer.

## APPENDIX No. 4.

## NOTE ON WHANGPOO RIVER CONSERVANCY WORK DURING 1911.

DURING the year 1911 only a small amount of actual Conservancy work was achieved, in spite of the unquestioned necessity of following up and preserving the great improvements gained in preceding years.

The staff, which in December 1910 had to be almost entirely dissolved, was gradually reorganised on a smaller scale during the first few months of the year under review.

Plans were submitted in January to complete the parallel dam with its cross-cribs on the right bank below Pheasant Point, as being an urgently pressing work. This group of training-works was left in a half-finished state in November 1910, when all work had to be abandoned, and thereafter lay exposed for some months to exceptionally strong cross-currents. Work could not be started afresh until April, and was then much complicated by the many gaps and breaks which had been made in the foundation during its prolonged exposure. In August the fascine mattress work was finished, and in December nearly all of the subsequent stone ballasting and stone-wall construction was completed.

The type of training-wall used is chosen as the lightest and cheapest that consideration for the exposed situation of the works could possibly permit.

The object of this group of regulating dams is to assist the long jetty on the concave Woosung shore, to which it forms a counterpart on the Pootung bank, in training the ebb and flow over the Outer Bar. This bar is now reduced so as to give to the fairway a depth of 24 feet at lowest low water in the middle, and a width of 600 feet at 22 feet depth and of over 1,000 feet at 18 feet depth. When the regulation of the river is carried on to completion and the scouring forces of the river are increased, further improvement in these results may be expected, but until then some deterioration is liable to appear. As often happens in the mouth of a river, there are indications of a tendency to form a new bar outside the old one, below the training-works; but an efficient checking of this inclination is effected, at least at present, by the powerful Yangtze current which here sweeps close to the end of the two-mouth-jetties.

No other improvement work could be started during the year, but the most urgent repairs of training dams and plant were duly attended to.

With the exception of the Outer Bar, where the results attained are fairly well secured by the two jetties, the *régime* of the river and the present half-finished state of the regulation are unsatisfactory, as is proved at every new survey by the ever-growing convexes and banks which continue to narrow and obstruct the channel, chiefly at Pheasant Point and in the upper part of Astræa Channel.

The work—especially the dredging work—that is indispensable, if the port of Shanghai is to be enabled to offer to shipping an unobstructed 24-foot channel at all tides and to hold its own as the chief shipping and distributing centre of the Far East, increases in extent and cost with every silting season that is allowed to pass without systematic work on the training of the Whangpoo.

During the year a "Project for the continued Whangpoo Regulation," with complete details and estimates, was prepared by the engineer-in-chief and forwarded to the authorities concerned.

The total expenditure for the year amounted to *Hk.Tls.* 817,965.66, of which *Hk.Tls.* 241,528.28 was for interest on the loan. The total expenditure from the beginning of Conservancy work to the end of 1911 was *Hk.Tls.* 6,943,349.87.

## SOOCHOW TRADE REPORT.

---

1°. LOCAL.—The epoch-marking year of 1911 will for ever go down to Chinese posterity as being one of the greatest upheavals known in this country; but this is not considered to be the place to discuss the causes, methods, and probable results of political movements. For long past a tone of general unrest was felt, and when the outbreak on the Yangtze took place, in October, the feeling was one of great nervousness and tension on the part of the people here—70 per cent. of whom considered it wiser to move their families away to Shanghai or into the country,—so that it was somewhat of a relief to be told, on the 4th November, definitely, that the city would become revolutionist at any moment. This took place before dawn on the following day, when nearly all the troops marched into the city. Excellent order was maintained, and all possible precaution was taken that Europeans, who were treated with the greatest politeness, should be protected. In consequence of the difficulties in the way of collecting the revenue in this office, and of the very disorganised state of the money market here, it was arranged that duties should be made payable in Shanghai, so that there was a mere trifle to remit to the Inspector General of Customs account in Shanghai for November and December. Despite this fact, the year was a record one as regards revenue, and the value of the trade amounted to *Hk.Tts* 6,879,822, against *Hk.Tts* 5,239,606 in 1910. Had business during these last two months been anything like normal, the year's results would have been beyond all expectations. Up to the middle of October trade was good, and there was every sign of recovery from the financial troubles of the previous year; but, of course, as soon as the revolution began, business was paralysed. However, after about six weeks imports began to come along in fair quantities; but, save raw silk, exports showed little or no signs of recovery. One of the first acts of the Revolutionary Government was to wipe away all taxes, with the exception of those on wine, sugar, and tobacco; but late in December a levy on goods, under the name of huowushui (貨物稅), was inaugurated in the place of likin. The idea was that goods should pay, as a single inclusive levy, either a production tax (*chantishui* (產地稅)) or a consumption tax (*hsiaochangshui* (銷場稅)), according as to whether the goods are produced in this province or arrive from other provinces, the levy in either case amounting to about 80 per cent. of the former old likin tariff rates. The likin barriers are said to be done away with, so that cargo is not subjected to charges, or extortion, on the road. Land tax, too, was again brought into force at somewhat lower rates; but this arrangement did not please the farmers, who argued that complete exemption for three years should be made when a dynasty changes! With the exception of the Governor—who was immediately elected *Tutu* (都督), or Military Commandant,—the Customs Superintendent, and the Prefect, all the higher officials immediately resigned and left the place, and after a few days these gentlemen also followed suit. One of the effects of the revolution was, for some time, to disorganise completely the money market, drafts of any sort being absolutely unobtainable, and the price of dollars went as high as *Tts* 86, and then were obtainable only in very small quantities. The *Yü Soo* Official Bank (裕蘇官銀號) closed its doors in November, but all the commercial banks managed to keep going. Depositors who were anxious to withdraw all they could were allowed by the local authorities to draw only small amounts, sufficient for their monthly expenses, and this no doubt saved many smaller establishments from disaster. Early in December the *Kiangsu* Bank (江蘇銀行), with a

capital of \$1,000,000, was opened, with branches at Shanghai, Wusih (無錫), Changchow (常州), and Chinkiang. By the end of the year it was the exception to see such a thing as a queue, and all sorts and conditions of foreign hats and caps were the fashion. Meanwhile, owing to the stoppage of trades, like silk weaving—of which there are some 7,000 looms in this city,—jadestone working, etc., many thousands were thrown out of work, and it was to be expected that trouble might occur; but matters were so well arranged that pretty well everything, save business, went on as usual. Of course, there was great poverty amongst the working classes, and perhaps more so, if the truth were known, amongst the small shopkeepers and better class; and it speaks a very great deal for the authorities as to the way they dealt with the situation, and all trouble was avoided. The greater part of the property of SHÉNG HsÜAN-HUAI (盛宣懷), including the well-known Liu Yüan (留園) Gardens, was confiscated by the revolutionary party; but exception appears to have been made to some pawnshops, etc., in the city. The year was an abnormally wet one, the highest watermark—5 feet 10 inches—ever known being reached, with consequent damage to the crops, and at one time it was feared they would be a total loss; but the harvest eventually turned out to be about a five-tenths one. Rice was very dear during the summer, the price being as high as \$9.40 per picul, with the result of riots at Kunshan (崑山) and Changshu (常熟), in September; but as soon as the revolutionary party came into power, the price gradually fell to about \$6 by the end of the year. Owing to cool weather and a shortage of mulberry leaves, the cocoon production was about 40 per cent. short; but the silk business was generally satisfactory, with prices at about *Hk.Ts.* 700 per picul for filature reeled. The demand for tea was well up to the average; but the unusually wet weather damaged the flower crop with which this tea—produced in the southern part of Anhwei (安徽), but sent from Hangchow—is scented, so that the price was higher than usual. The teamen complained of exceptionally heavy losses, owing to the great difficulties, during the last part of the year, of remitting money from the North, where all this tea finds a market: it is stated that as much as 40 per cent. commission was paid for a draft. Again, owing to excessive rains, the rape crop was particularly bad; the export through this office showed a falling off of some 39,000 piculs. It is interesting to note that the value of the import cargo brought here by rail advanced to *Hk.Ts.* 1,557,744, although practically nothing, save kerosene oil, was carried during the last two and a half months of the year. This means that the railway brought 58 per cent. of our foreign goods; and, taken together with the value of the parcel post trade, 41 per cent. of the total trade fell to it.

2°. REVENUE.—The collection, *Hk.Ts.* 138,364, was the largest ever known at this port; and considering trade was almost at a standstill for some time, and the duty after the 5th November was collected in Shanghai, it may be considered remarkably good. All headings, with the exception of a small amount in tonnage dues, showed a marked advance, especially in exports and transit dues.

3°. FOREIGN GOODS.—(a.) *Imports, Direct and Coastwise.*—The direct trade was, naturally, very small; but arrivals coastwise—nearly all from Shanghai—show a healthy advance, of over half a million taels in the value. Cotton piece goods did not do so well, but this was, of course, due to the general slump in business during the last quarter; and, indeed, this was not at all a fair year to make any comparisons. The Anti-Cigarette League was very active in its crusade, and for a time the cigarette seemed to be quite tabooed and its place taken by a pipe; but towards the end of the year a reaction set in, and the cigarette was to the fore again, with the result that our figures showed the importation to be 274,460 boxes, against 238,084 boxes for 1910. The enormous advance in American kerosene oil—4,760,880 gallons, against 1,873,933 gallons in

1910—is particularly worthy of note, and indicates that the electric light now in general use in and outside the city has in no way interfered with the oil trade. About 40 per cent. of this oil was brought here by the railway. Both the Sumatra and Borneo production show a falling off. Sugar of all kinds, as well as umbrellas, indicate a great improvement.

(b.) *Re-exports.*—No remarks.

4°. NATIVE GOODS.—(a.) *Exports, Abroad and Coastwise (including Re-exports).*—The advance in the value of this trade—Hk.Tls. 3,330,077, against Hk.Tls. 2,413,228—is due to the very much larger shipments of raw silk. Previous to 1911 silk had been sent from Nanzin (南浔) direct to the Shanghai market; but so many cases of robbery on the way made the merchants seek another route. They eventually found it was better to bring it here and pay duty in the ordinary way, although it cost them somewhat more by the time it was landed in Shanghai. Unclassed silk products and jadestoneware did better, and, in spite of the troublous time, the falling away of silk piece goods was very slight.

(b.) *Imports.*—These figures show a highly satisfactory trade, especially in sugar and tobacco.

5°. INLAND TRANSIT.—(a.) *Inwards.*—Again these passes have been taken out, principally for kerosene oil, in much larger numbers, and the value of the trade advanced from Hk.Tls. 109,803 in 1910 to Hk.Tls. 399,801.

(b.) *Outwards.*—No outward transit passes have been applied for.

6°. SHIPPING.—The tonnage employed under General Regulations, i.e., from treaty ports to treaty ports, was somewhat less than in previous years, the railway now taking its share of the carriage of goods and passengers; but the figures for boats running inland were a little larger.

7°. PASSENGER TRAFFIC.—In spite of the fact that the fare by water between here and Shanghai is much cheaper and includes food, the railway continues to detract from the launch traffic, and a decrease in the number of passengers carried is shown.

8°. TREASURE.—The export of dollars was prohibited by the local authorities in October.

9°. OPIUM.—An extra tax of 40 cash per tael on prepared opium was imposed in March; but this was so much resented that all the prepared drug shops closed their doors for two days, and eventually the authorities withdrew the tax. The consumption of opium, it is said by those in the trade, was 25 per cent. less than it was in 1910.

10°. MISCELLANEOUS.—A water police force was organised in February, consisting of 60 men and 20 boats, and the canal is patrolled both night and day.—In November the electric light system was extended, and all the streets in the city, as well as the main road as far as these offices, were well lit.—The general state of health was normal, and there was no epidemic; but there was a malignant kind of malarial fever amongst the natives, which in many cases ended fatally.

## HANGCHOW TRADE REPORT.

1°. LOCAL.—The trade at Hangchow and Kashung, under very adverse circumstances, has suffered a decrease of only 3 million taels in the total value as compared with 1910. In fact, but for the stagnation of trade caused by the revolution during the last quarter, the year under review would probably have been a record one, in spite of the welcome disappearance from our returns of foreign opium, which accounted for nearly *Hk. Tls.* 600,000 in 1910. The demand for foreign goods was well maintained; the value of native produce imported was practically the same as in 1910; and the decrease of 2 million taels in the value of exports is not surprising in a year of continual unrest. The critical financial conditions mentioned in the last Hangchow Trade Report were only temporarily improved by a Government loan to the tottering banks. During 1911 the situation became gradually worse. In March the I Shan Yüan (義善源) Bank failed, with liabilities computed at over 20 million taels. In May a serious disturbance broke out in the city, owing to the high price of rice, during which 47 rice shops were looted. To ease the situation, the Governor, Tsêng Yün (增鑑), asked Imperial sanction to retain 50,000 *shih* of tribute rice to be retailed at a cheap rate. But this measure only had a temporary effect. On the 10th August a severe typhoon damaged a part of the rice crop. Immediately afterwards the Grand Canal began to rise and, gradually attaining an abnormal height, flooded a great part of the country, including the crops spared by the typhoon. In some parts, however, the rice was prematurely reaped in boats before it was completely submerged. On the 2nd September the launch traffic with Shanghai and Soochow had to be suspended, by order of the Governor, lest the wash of the steam-launches should demolish the flimsy mud walls erected at the eleventh hour on the canal banks by the country-people to save some of their fields, and was not resumed till the 26th of the same month. The railway benefited to a certain extent by this stoppage of traffic on the canal, but the staple exports were held over until they could be shipped off by cargo-boats. It was therefore expected that the loss in the shipping trade would be partly made up in October. But rumours of impending disturbances were rife, and the panic engendered by the reports of revolutionary successes on the Yangtze caused a precipitate flight from the city of nearly half of the population. An inward movement of refugees, mostly from Shanghai, set in at the same time, and long before the actual revolution broke out many families were hurrying away with their belongings. The Settlement was considered a secure refuge, and its hotels and lodging-houses were filled with Chinese and Manchus. The increased passenger traffic added to the profits of the railway company and partly recuperated the steam-launch companies for their losses during the previous month; but trade ceased almost entirely, and the money market was completely disorganised by the withdrawal of coins from circulation and the depreciation of all paper securities. The provincial treasury itself was in dire financial difficulties. The rapid spreading of the revolutionary movement down the Yangtze, and the action of the local press, had prepared the native population, many of whom kept white flags in readiness to welcome the new régime. On the night of the 4th November the people were warned to remain inside their houses, and,

meanwhile, two Republican regiments entered the city. The Governor was arrested, after a short resistance, and his yamén was subsequently burned to the ground. The next morning white flags were floating on all the houses, and the army and police, whose officers had previously agreed to join the revolutionary movement, all wore white badges in token of their allegiance. Proclamations were posted in the name of T'ANG SHOU-CH'IEN (湯壽潛), the popular ex-manager of the Chekiang Railway, who took the title of Military Governor of Chekiang. The Manchu garrison in the Tartar city was induced to capitulate after 24 hours. Kashing also went fairly quietly over to the revolutionaries on the 7th November, and within a few days the whole province had notified its allegiance to the Military Government. Constructive work was immediately started, and reorganisation on the new lines is now progressing. One of the first acts of the authorities was to abolish likin, with the exception of farmed taxes; but the financial problem soon became more pressing even than before the revolution, and a new administration is now in course of formation which will soon replace likin, under the name of tungchüan (統捐). Meanwhile, an issue of war-notes amounting to \$500,000 has been made by the Military Government, and a public loan of \$5,000,000, the prospectus of which has already been published, is in contemplation. Trade naturally remained stagnant from October to the end of the year, but signs are not wanting that when confidence has been restored it will revive easily. It is confidently expected that a thorough reorganisation of the monetary and taxation systems, combined with the abolition of abuses, will enable the new Government, as soon as peace has been concluded, to place the provincial finances on a sound basis, thus removing the present causes of uncertainty and uneasiness.

2°. REVENUE.—Although the total collection, *Hk.Ts.* 553,984, is *Hk.Ts.* 41,998 less than that of 1910, the figure is not such an unsatisfactory one, considering that it includes no opium duties, and that *Hk.Ts.* 12,000 were collected by Shanghai on behalf of this port, by non-issue of drawbacks, etc., during the last two months of the year. The collection here for these two months following the revolution averaged only about 20 per cent. of the normal.

3°. FOREIGN Goods.—(a.) *Imports, Direct and Coastwise.*—The value of the foreign import trade decreased by over a million taels, principally owing to railway competition. Cotton piece goods have now practically disappeared from the returns, although there is no reason to believe that the consumption has diminished. The display of foreign clothing, piece goods, hardware, toys, and sundries in the local shops increases steadily, while the Customs figures for these items are insignificant; hence, presumably the local market has been supplied, in spite of the likin drawback, through channels outside Customs jurisdiction. The only striking increase is shown in American kerosene oil, from 2,181,988 to 4,209,815 gallons, besides over 1,000,000 gallons imported by rail during the September floods. Stocks of oil in hand are slightly larger than at the end of the preceding year, but about 90 per cent. of the increase went into consumption.

(b.) *Re-exports.*—No remarks.

4°. NATIVE Goods.—(a.) *Exports, Abroad and Coastwise (including Re-exports).*—The increase in the export of raw silk, from 1,491 to 2,321 piculs, is partly accounted for by merchants hurrying shipments from the interior during the last two months of the year in order to take advantage of the temporary abolition of likin, but is also due to a smaller local consumption of the raw product owing to the closing of the weaving establishments which formerly supplied the tribute silk piece goods for the Imperial Palace. The silk crop was an average one in quantity, but of indifferent quality. With mulberry leaf as cheap as 60 cents per picul,

a heavier crop might have been expected; but it is alleged that the losses sustained in 1910 (when, owing to the prohibitive price of leaf, large quantities of worms were destroyed) disgusted many of the silk growers, who during 1911 turned their attention to other enterprises. In this connexion, it may be noted that the culture of wild silk has received considerable attention from the provincial authorities during the year, particularly at Yenchow (嚴州), where there are large plantations of oak trees. The experiment of using oak leaves as feed is said to have proved a success, as, although the cocoons were yellow, they greatly exceeded the normal size. The export of tea—161,130 piculs—is the heaviest recorded since the opening of the port, and it is principally owing to the increased receipts from this article that the revenue has not shown a more serious falling off. The crop was an abundant one and of excellent quality. It is stated, however, that large stocks of Hangchow teas are now glutting the Shanghai market, as the very high prices prevailing at the close of last season led Chekiang dealers to over-estimate the probable demand for green tea from America and Russia, and prices, which at the beginning of the season were as high as  $\text{Ts. } 90$  per picul, are now down to  $\text{Ts. } 60$ . The question of adulteration of shipments for American markets affected Pingsuey tea only, of which comparatively little is exported from Hangchow. The export of raw cotton has dropped from 19,236 to 943 piculs. The crop in this district was very small and of poor quality, having suffered severely from the typhoon in August, and the production was nearly all absorbed by the local mill. Cabbage cake has increased from 254,534 to 297,811 piculs, all of which was exported from Kashing, principally to supply the Japanese market.

(b.) *Imports.*—Beancake has increased from 402,458 to 709,410 piculs. This commodity is now in general use in the province as a fertiliser, its employment being widely advocated by the various newly-formed agricultural societies. It is all imported at Kashing. Beans and bean oil also show a considerable advance.

5°. INLAND TRANSIT.—(a.) *Inwards.*—The suspension of likin has still further reduced the figures under this head.

(b.) *Outwards.*—Nil.

6°. SHIPPING.—(a.) *Under General Regulations.*—There is a slight decrease in the number of entries and clearances of steam-launches with tows, due to the suspension of traffic during the September floods, and a large increase in the number of sailing vessels, for which registered junks engaged in the growing beancake trade between Shanghai and Kashing are responsible.

(b.) *Under Inland Steam Navigation Rules.*—This traffic fails to show much development, owing to official discouragement of the opening of new routes and the granting of monopolies of those already opened. The Huchow route still remains the only line in operation from Hangchow, and at Kashing three routes are worked in connexion with the railway. A scheme to run a launch between Hangchow and Sankiaopu (三橋埠), to deal with the Mokanshan summer traffic, was vetoed by the authorities under various pretexts.

7°. PASSENGER TRAFFIC.—The railway still grows in popularity, and the number of passengers carried by water to and from Shanghai continues to dwindle. Undeterred by the failure of the Teh Hsin Company, a new venture styled the Ning Shao Company was started on the Huchow run, and waged a sanguinary rate-cutting war against the two old-established companies who have hitherto enjoyed a practical monopoly of the traffic on this route.

8°. TREASURE.—The import of dollars decreased by *Hk.Tls* 2,400,530. An embargo on the export of dollars, to offset the resulting stringency, has been in force during the greater part of the year.

9°. OPIUM.—(a.) *Foreign*.—Only 48 catties of foreign opium were imported under the cognizance of the Maritime Customs, but the import to the district through other channels is said to have been about 500 piculs.

(b.) *Native*.—Import through the Customs was *nil*, but about 900 piculs of Yunnan and Szechwan opium are stated to have arrived in the district. The cultivation of opium in this district is said to have ceased, both officially and actually. The number of smoking licenses issued during the year has decreased.

10°. MISCELLANEOUS.—The opening ceremony of the High Court of Justice took place on the 15th January. The Law Court was opened on the same day—also two preliminary courts, one for the Tsientang (錢塘) and one for the Jenho (仁和) districts. All these courts were, however, closed by the revolution, since when justice has been administered by the new-style Prefect. The District Magistracies of Jenho and Tsientang were abolished in September, and these districts were put under the direct control of the Hangchow Prefect. A similar change was effected at Kashung, where the Prefect took direct control of the Kashung (嘉興) and Siushui (秀水) districts. The Chekiang Military Government (浙軍政府), which has functioned since the revolution of 4th November, is composed as follows: at the head of the province is the Military Governor (軍政府都督), and under him are the Senior Military Officer (總司令官), who is in charge of all military affairs, the Civil Commissioner (政事部長), the Financial Commissioner (財政部長), who also deals with Customs matters, the Director of Foreign Affairs (外交科長), the Police Commissioner (警察廳), and the Director of Communications (交通科長). The province is divided into districts, each controlled by a Min-shih-chang (民事長). A Provisional Assembly, composed of representatives from the various districts, was convened in December, to draw up various local measures. Pending the formation of a new constitution, it was decided temporarily to adopt some of the laws and regulations of the previous régime.—The Shanghai-Hangchow Railway has been running regularly throughout the year, with three passenger trains and one freight train daily in each direction between the two termini, the express train now covering the distance in four and a half hours. The construction of the projected bridge across the Tsientang River is still in abeyance. Local improvements are due to the railway company, in the shape of roads and bridges leading to the railway stations. At Kashung a new and imposing station was recently opened.—During the September floods the Customs tidepole at Hangchow marked a maximum level in the Grand Canal of 14 feet 9 inches, which has only been exceeded once by a few inches. When it is considered that with the water at 13 feet the canal embankments in this district are nearly everywhere above water, it may be concluded that by raising the embankments an average of 2 feet this part of the country would become immune from floods. The necessary elevation of banks would be even less in the Kashung district, as at the highest time the Kashung tidepole only marked 1 foot more than the average yearly maximum, against which it must be assumed local farmers are protected. It has been suggested to the local authorities that as the shallowness of the canal is becoming a hindrance to navigation—especially in the Shihmen (石門) district, where also the embankments are the lowest,—the dredging of the canal should be taken in hand, and with the mud taken from its bed the embankments might be raised; but so far this suggestion has not been acted upon.—An electric light company was formed at

Hangchow and started working in the city in the spring. Adverse conditions of trade during the year prevented its expansion, and the number of lamps supplied has decreased from 2,500 to 2,000 since the revolution. The cost is, at present, \$1.20 a month per lamp of 32 candle-power from 6 P.M. to 1 A.M. An electric light company was also started at Kashing in June, but is meeting with little support. Beyond 1,000 street lamps subscribed for by the tradespeople, there is very little demand for this more expensive illuminant.—The Ta Ching and Chekiang Banks were closed at the time of the revolution.

## NINGPO TRADE REPORT.

---

1°. LOCAL.—From a Customs standpoint 1911 cannot be considered as a satisfactory year. Until September nothing occurred either to stimulate or retard the usual course of commerce, but the latter part of the year witnessed a total dislocation of the trade, and at the time of writing signs of a revival seem still to be very remote. Rainy weather prevailed during the greater part of the summer, and on the 10th August the port was visited by a typhoon of unusual violence, which, coinciding with one of the highest tides of the year, caused considerable damage here as well as in the neighbourhood. The cotton crop was almost totally destroyed. About two months later rumours of the arrival of the *ko-min-chün* became rife and a financial panic ensued. According to local custom, a premium is charged for cash, as opposed to transactions which involve only bank transfers. As soon as the alarm spread, large numbers of people sought to obtain immediately from the native banks the moneys they had on deposit and also endeavoured to convert into cash every security they possessed. In their own defence the banks raised the rate of the premium, which at one time reached 30 per cent. In spite of these exorbitant rates, the public would not be denied; they wanted cash and were prepared to pay any price to get it, their sole idea being to hoard it until the political horizon should be clearer. The inevitable crash ensued. Eight important native banks suspended payment; two of these are irretrievably bankrupt, while the remaining six are not expected to find themselves solvent at the end of the Chinese year. When it was too late, the public realised that there was no danger to be apprehended and that order under the new administration was being well maintained. The net total value of the trade of the port was *Hk.Tts.* 22,220,552, as against *Hk.Tts.* 23,591,065 in 1910, or a decrease of 1½ million taels. The value of the Native Customs trade amounted to *Hk.Tts.* 11,716,447, and shows a decline of 345,000 taels.

2°. REVENUE.—The year's collection, *Hk.Tts.* 452,080, shows a decline of *Hk.Tts.* 93,000, or, say, 17 per cent. less than in the previous year. It is the lowest collection chronicled since 1870. With the exception of "Transit," all headings show important declines. *Hk.Tts.* 104,733 were collected at the Native Customs, as against *Hk.Tts.* 98,993 during the corresponding period of 1910.

3°. FOREIGN GOODS.—(a.) *Imports, Direct and Coastwise.*—There are indications that our "direct" import trade is on the decline. The bulk of Hongkong and Japanese goods now comes "coastwise" via Shanghai, this being apparently the result of the keen competition between the various steamer companies by which the Shanghai-Ningpo freights have been reduced to a minimum. The value of the direct import trade amounted to *Hk.Tts.* 1,709,312, or 20 per cent. less than in 1910. To this decrease, tin in slabs chiefly contributed; its importation fell from 17,503 to 7,054 piculs. This tin is mostly used here for the making of joss paper. Hitherto it has been shipped from Hongkong to Ningpo, and thence sent overland to the Shaohingfu district, the centre of the joss paper industry in the province; it now uses the Shanghai-Hangchow route, which has the advantage of being four days shorter. The value of foreign goods imported coastwise aggregated *Hk.Tts.* 6,470,000, as against *Hk.Tts.* 7,154,000 in the preceding year. The most important shortages appear under white shirtings (30 per cent.),

American drills (58 per cent.), plain and figured cotton lastings (77 per cent.), Japanese cotton yarn (50 per cent.), cigarettes (30 per cent.), and Sumatra kerosene oil (25 per cent.). On the other hand, there was a considerable gain under American kerosene oil, the total importation of 2,038,330 gallons—a record one—being half a million gallons larger than in the preceding year. Sugar remains one of our chief staples of import. The net importation of refined sugar—65 per cent. of which comes direct from Hongkong—reached a total of 177,000 piculs, as against 145,000 piculs in 1910. Prices improved enormously during the latter part of the year and attained the highest level known for the last five years. Japanese sugar had a particularly active market during the earlier part of the year, and the sales amounted to 66,000 piculs. The arrivals of Ilo-Ilo sugar amounted to 40,000 piculs.

(b.) *Re-exports.*—No remarks.

4°. NATIVE GOODS.—(a.) *Exports, Abroad and Coastwise (including Re-exports).*—The value of the export trade of Ningpo was 7.8 million taels, as against 10.3 millions in 1910. This large decline is all accounted for under raw cotton, which fell from 173,992 to 40,528 piculs, or a decrease of over 75 per cent. The cotton crop was a very poor one, and it is estimated that about 70 per cent. of it was ruined by the typhoon which visited this port early in August. The districts of Anchang (安昌) and Yüyao (餘姚) suffered to the extent of 80 to 85 per cent., and those of Siaoshan (蕭山) and Shanyin (山陰) to the extent of 50 per cent. Following the lead given by the Shanghai Chamber of Commerce, the Ningpo Cotton Guild has taken in hand the question of "watered cotton" and published a set of rules with which cotton dealers will have in future to comply. 80 per cent. of the cotton produced in this district is shipped to Japan via Shanghai, and most of it, it would appear, is submitted to the watering process. The Ningpo Cotton Guild seems to have realised the gravity of the situation, and the new rules, if enforced, should do away with, or at least greatly reduce, the long-existing abuse. The export of Pingsuey teas shows an increase of 4,848 piculs as compared with that of the preceding year, and is the largest of the decade. The first gathering was satisfactory and of better quality than the second, which suffered from continuous wet weather and proved less successful. All the Ningpo tea goes to Shanghai, whence the greater part of it is reshipped to America, and the local dealers merely act as middlemen and forwarding agents for the Shanghai tea firms. Shipments began on the 2nd June, and, on their arrival at Shanghai, experienced some difficulties owing to the enforcement of the new stipulations of the American Pure Food Act. It is said that the bulk of the Ningpo tea was eventually shipped to Russia and Great Britain. The trade in rush hats was very active, and there was an advance of some 7,000 piculs in the exportation of Ningpo cotton yarn.

(b.) *Imports.*—Native imports show an increase of over 2 million taels, entirely due to the increased importation of Shanghai and Lower Yangtze rice, which amounted to 470,000 piculs, or more than double the quantity imported during the previous year. The greater portion of it arrived in the early part of the year, the dealers being anxious to lay in large stocks in provision of a shortage in the July crop, which at one time, and owing to protracted rains, threatened to be a disastrous one, but which eventually turned out to be only slightly under the average. The importation of Hupeh grey shirtings was well maintained, but there was a drop of some 11,000 pieces (20 per cent.) in Shanghai sheetings.

5°. INLAND TRANSIT.—(a.) *Inwards.*—This trade was fairly active, and its value was Hk.Ts 1,464,000, against Hk.Ts 1,380,000 in 1910; there is, however, a noticeable decrease in the number of transit passes taken out—19,488, against 22,210. Early in November, and

soon after the secession of Ningpo, it was given out that likin dues would be no longer collected in the province. Some minor likin stations were actually closed. These stations were reopened after a short while. The local merchants take out transit passes as before, and it would seem that, for the present at least, the idea of altogether abolishing likin has been abandoned.

(b.) *Outwards.*—No pass was taken out during the year.

6°. **SHIPPING.**—Entries and clearances under General Regulations represent 1,690 vessels and 1,900,373 tons, or a decrease of 260 vessels and 413,900 tons. The greater part of this decrease appears under the French flag. The French s.s. *Lita*, of the Compagnie Asiatische de Navigation, made her last trip between Shanghai and Ningpo on the 8th May, and this service, inaugurated in September 1906, has ceased to be in existence. Under Inland Steam Navigation Rules there was an increase of 278 vessels and 21,432 tons. On the 5th September the s.s. *Toosui* (圖瑞), of 891 tons, started running between this port and Amoy via Wenchow, Sinhwa (興化), and Chuanchow (泉州), in opposition to the regular liner *Tuckyue* (德裕). The trade apparently proved unremunerative, and on the 11th November she was withdrawn from the run. The bulk of goods and the number of passengers carried by vessels plying under Inland Steam Navigation Rules are steadily increasing every year, and there are indications of further development in this trade, which is chiefly carried on between Ningpo and places on the coast and in the Chusan Islands.

7°. **PASSENGER TRAFFIC.**—It is difficult to obtain an accurate return of the number of native passengers travelling by the daily steamers plying between this port and Shanghai. From available figures, the number of passengers leaving Ningpo for Shanghai during the year was 460,268, and the number of passengers arriving was 422,875. Owing to competition between the different companies the rates remained exceptionally low.

8°. **TREASURE.**—1,134,562 Mexican dollars were imported during the year, and 2,568,800 dollars exported. Practically all dollars exported went to Shanghai. The unusually high rates prevailing there attracted the Ningpo bankers, and large shipments took place during the September quarter. Early in October the stringency of money in the Ningpo market became so severe that the local authorities had to prohibit the export of coin, except in cases involving *bond fide* mercantile transactions.

9°. **OPIUM.**—(a.) *Foreign.*—A further decline is to be recorded under this heading: the figures are 393 piculs of Malwa and 19 piculs of Patna, as against 449 piculs of Malwa and 56 piculs of Patna in the previous year. The news that an increase of duty was imminent reached the Chinese dealers early in April, and during the latter part of that month they imported no less than 80 chests, which, it is estimated, is a three months supply. Since May the importations have averaged 21 chests a month, which is considerably below the average of former years.

(b.) *Native.*—Native opium is gradually disappearing from our statistical tables. Its importation, never a large one, was this year reduced to 31 piculs, or a decrease of 60 per cent.

10°. **MISCELLANEOUS.**—Ningpo seceded on the 5th November. The new Government is styled the “Ningpo Local Military Government” (甯波軍政分府). On the 30th May the Postal Service and Customs ceased to be under joint control. From a financial point of view the local cotton mills fared badly. The advance in the price of the raw material proved most detrimental, and the two cotton mills stopped working in August and November respectively. During the latter part of the year the work on the Ningpo-Hangchow Railway was suspended,

owing, it is said, to lack of funds. In the second division, which extends from Ningpo to Pokwan (百官)—a distance of about 50 miles,—all the earthwork banking is completed, with the exception of some station sites which are not fully filled up. Cuttings are practically completed. Culverts and bridges to the extent of 50 per cent. have been built, but girders are not yet laid. Only a few sleepers and rails have been delivered so far, and, consequently, no track has been laid, except a few sidings at the Paisha (白沙) dépôt. West of Pokwan and between that town and Shaohingfu very little work has been done.

## WENCHOW TRADE REPORT.

1°. LOCAL.—The expectations raised by the preceding year's satisfactory trade of an equally good, if not better, result during 1911 were rudely shattered by events occurring during the summer and autumn of the year. Scarcity of rice and its high price, caused, it is reported, by clandestine shipments of large quantities to the Fukien province, culminated in a rice riot at the end of May, when merchants, to show their dissatisfaction, closed their shops during three days. The Taotai issued proclamations to calm popular agitation, whilst rice was hurriedly brought in from Shanghai, but, being of a very inferior quality, was only accepted at a reduced price by the commoner classes of the populace. Further supplies were bought by the Taotai from outlying districts, where, happily, the first rice crop was being garnered; by this means a more serious state of affairs was averted and the difficulty overcome. During the riot the populace showed itself abnormally self-restrained, contenting itself with offering an equitable price. If not accepted, the rice was carried away from the wealthier dealers, who had cornered the visible supply. Some of the officials came in for severe handling by the mob, who closed the city gates until tangible promises were forthcoming of lower prices. October opened with the inauguration of a provisional Republican Government and the withdrawal of the officials designated by the Manchu authorities. The change was quietly effected, the former Taotai being offered the post of Taotai under the new *régime*, which he failed to accept. His official funds were escheated to the new local administration. For a month at least an interregnum intervened, with a certain amount of disorder, incendiaryism being rife, with looting. Consequent on the arrival of an official to control local affairs, the aspect at once changed and peace reigned again. The banditti, who infest this region to the north, constantly threatened a raid on Wenchow; had it not been for the admirable control maintained by the Tung-ling, his soldiers, and volunteers, a sorrier condition would have lamentably to be recorded. Three successive typhoons visited the immediate proximity of the port within 10 days of each other, causing embankments, weirs, dikes, and such-like protections to be destroyed, rendering the canals alternately overflooded and shallow. The weirs not being repaired in time, the canal water escaped into the river, rendering paddy fields dry and canal navigation impossible. Efforts are being made to restore the damage caused; but little effective result so far has to be noted. The canal to Juian has not enough water to allow of the two ordinary steam-launches plying; whilst fear is entertained that the rice crop in 1912 will be of diminished quantity, unless copious rain comes meanwhile to the rescue. Trade during the last three months of the year has been stagnant; and until a wholesomer condition of the political atmosphere becomes apparent, little amelioration is to be expected. On the 23rd April the Pacific mail s.s. *Asia* stranded during a fog on Finger Rock, subsequently becoming a total wreck. Finger Rock is situated on Haechu, one of the Taichow group of islands, distant about 85 miles north-east of Wenchow. Though no lives were lost, silk to the value of £10,000 was looted by pirates, but little of which was subsequently recovered.

2°. REVENUE.—The total collection of dues and duties reached *Hk.Tls.* 54,466, a falling off of some *Hk.Tls.* 14,500 as compared with the previous year's total. Less opium duties, amounting to *Hk.Tls.* 8,000, account for a proportion of this decrease, whilst direct import duties, of *Hk.Tls.* 3,000, on oil from a steamer direct from Sumatra, swelled the year's total.

3°. FOREIGN GOODS.—(a.) *Imports, Direct and Coastwise*.—Most of the headings under this category record decreases, with the exception of mangrove bark and aniline dyes, which continue to show progress in importation. Needles, Japanese umbrellas, as well as all kinds of sugar, are imported in advancing quantities.

(b.) *Re-exports*.—No remarks.

4°. NATIVE GOODS.—(a.) *Exports, Abroad and Coastwise (including Re-exports)*.—The crop of tea for the year was very moderate, causing the price to be higher, by \$1 to \$2 a picul, than during the preceding year, whilst the tea was of slightly better quality. The total cost came to \$27 per picul at the opening of the market. First shipments, conducted cautiously, proved remunerative; but second and third pickings were coarse in quality and of little worth, the export of which proved disastrous to exporters, inasmuch as on their arrival at Shanghai the market was flooded by a better quality of tea from other ports. 13 factories exported tea, of which five only secured profits, whilst the remainder, with but a few exceptions, failed to cover their outlay, or lost money. As an average, Tls. 500 is reckoned to be the loss sustained by each factory. Congou was shipped in lesser quantity, and even then did not bring in a satisfactory return. Owing to the overflow of the Ou River, recorded under "1°. Local," the roots of many of the orange trees were badly contaminated by salt water, rendering the crop inferior, bringing thus but slight profit to orange merchants. The close of 1910 saw the introduction of a new Wenchow industry, that of the export of lard. The shipments have hitherto been made in too large quantities and in too rapid succession to prove lucrative. Many merchants in this line of business have failed, and trade in this article is at a standstill. A good demand in the North for local kittysols met with a ready response from Wenchow, causing large numbers to be shipped. This trade, if prudently carried on, would prove a valuable asset in the trade of the port; but export exceeds demand, causing profits from this source of industry to be scant. Wenchow soft-wood planks, in favour at Shanghai, find there not such a ready sale as heretofore, and now seek a mart at Chinkiang and Tungchow, in the Kiangsu province. A saw-mill was erected at the end of the year by a foreigner; but as only 100 *chang* are daily turned out, the experiment is reported not to have covered expenses. The mill is expected to cease working. Trade in soapstone ornaments continues to forge ahead, without any improvement in novelty or design. Certain other local products, such as furniture and pewterware, have not secured for themselves much demand out of Wenchow.

(b.) *Imports*.—Cotton yarn and drills were largely brought in as well as nankeens. A local scarcity was relieved by the importation of rice; whilst much brown sugar passed inwards, mostly through the Native Customs.

5°. INLAND TRANSIT.—(a.) *Inwards*.—This shows a falling off during the year, though kerosene oil and old iron show increasing quantities. The abolition of likin, a measure adopted by the Republican Government, helped to decrease the deficiency already sustained prior to its inauguration.

(b.) *Outwards*.—A good crop of leaf tobacco in Formosa, to which island most of the Wenchow tobacco is forwarded, restricted shipment, added to which the institution of a grower's tax at Sungyang, the place of growth, rendered the price prohibitive. It is doubtful whether the Japanese will in future avail themselves of the outward transit pass system.

6°. SHIPPING.—Shipping under General Regulations shows practically the same figures as in the previous year, whilst under Inland Steam Navigation Rules there is a falling off. The latter is caused partly by the return to a six-day trip, instead of a five-day trip, of the

Wai Hai Shang Lun San Kung-ssü boat. The large steam-launch *Kaning*, mentioned in the 1910 report, was taken off the run, not proving sufficiently paying; whilst during the year the s.s. *Toosui* (late s.s. *Tsintau*) started a competition under the Chinese flag with the s.s. *Tuckyue*, but after a few visits removed its activity elsewhere.

7°. PASSENGER TRAFFIC.—A large falling off is again to be remarked, without any assignable cause.

8°. TREASURE.—The interport movement of silver decreased to a very large extent, showing, in imports, some 55 per cent., and in exports, 200 per cent.

9°. OPIUM.—(a) *Foreign*.—A decrease of 62 chests is to be remarked in the year's figures, or a decrease of one-third. High prices ruling at Shanghai are said to have been the cause of the small import.

(b.) *Native*.—Half the quantity was imported during the year under record, whilst local cultivation, so prevalent in former years, practically ceased.

10°. MISCELLANEOUS.—Schools, which made a forward stride during the greater part of the year, lacked attendance when the unrest occurred during the end of the year. The populace, anxious as to the outcome of events, removed to outlying villages, taking their children with them; and the influx of a number of students from Hangchow and Japan had a disquieting effect. The Republic is endeavouring to relieve the situation by compulsory education; but teachers are locally scarce, such at least as are competent to impart knowledge on the new lines.


