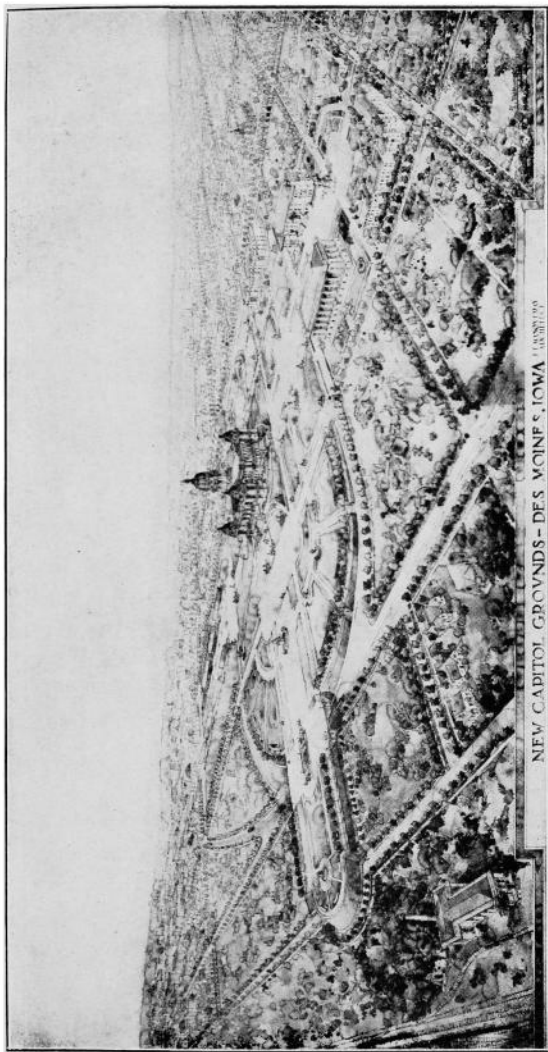
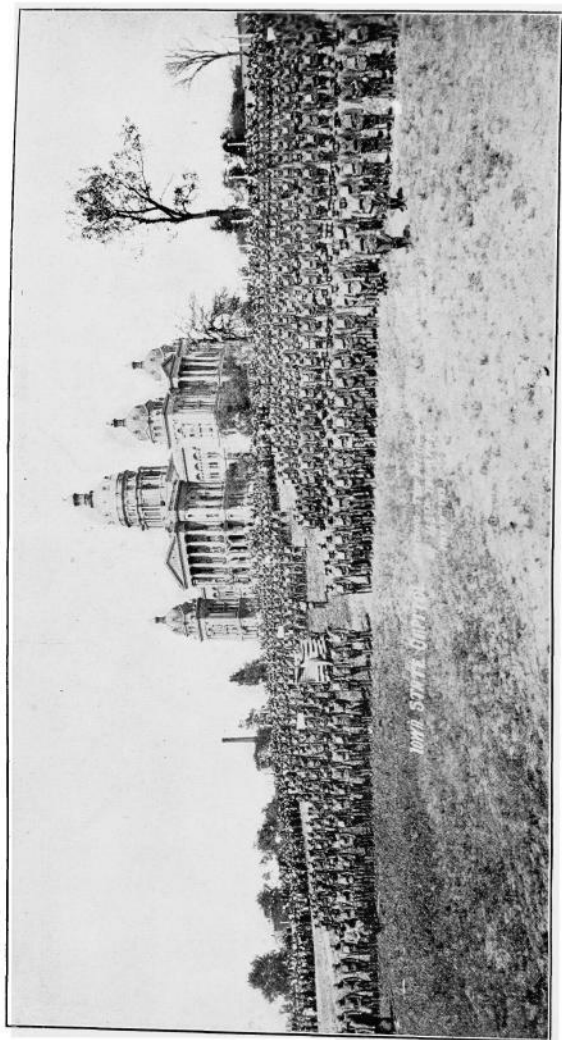

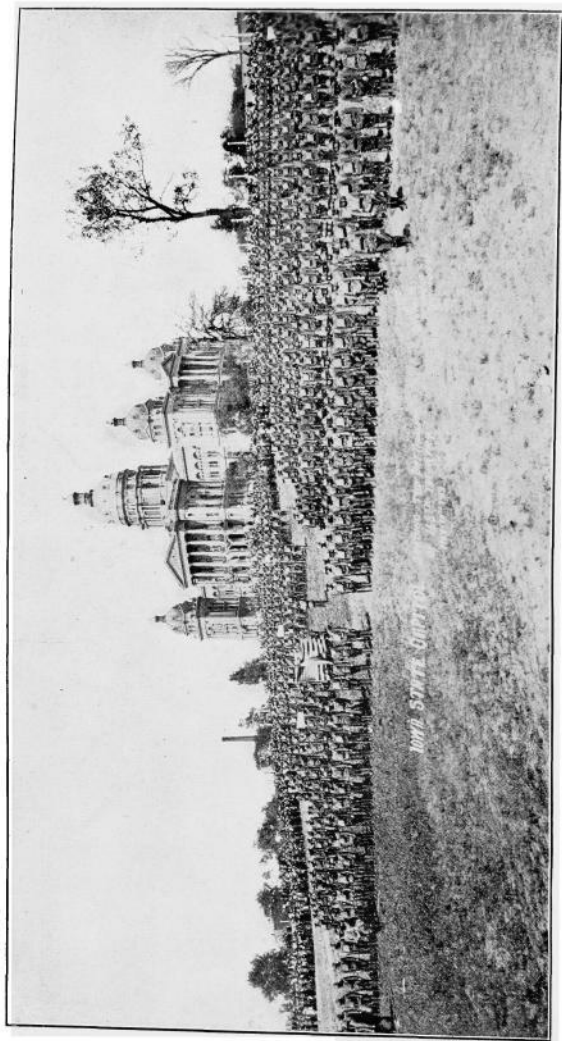
Group Plan of Iowa State Capitol Grounds

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IOWA IN THE WORLD WAR.

Under the direction of Governor William L. Harding, Commander in Chief, Iowa sent into the Federal Service during the war with the Central powers, 1917-19, about 98,000 soldiers, 10,000 sailors and 600 Marines, all of whom accredited themselves honorably, reflecting luster upon the state.

The 98,000 soldiers comprised 9,719 National Guardsmen, 68,512 selected service men, and the remainder enlistments in the Guard, after federal draft August 6, 1917, the Regular Army, and officers commissioned from civil life.

When this is written May 17, 1919, it is estimated that the total losses, killed in action, died of wounds, accidentally killed and died from disease, are about 3,300 or 3 per cent, nearly the same as the per cent of losses in the Spanish American war, as against a percentage of losses in the Civil war of 17 per cent.

The general supervision of securing these men and sending them into Federal Service devolved upon Adjutant General Guy E. Logan until July 1918, when General Logan entered the Federal Service. After this date the work was completed by Adjutant General Louis G. Lasher.

On April 1, 1917 when it appeared certain that a state of war would be declared by the Congress against the Central Powers the military strength of Iowa consisted of 2242 Iowa National Guardsmen, partially disorganized because of recent service on the Mexican Border. The ranks of the three regiments of Infantry, one squadron of Cavalry, three batteries of Field Artillery and auxiliary troops were thinned because of the refusal of men to take a new Federal oath.

With the declaration of a state of war, the ranks of the Guard were quickly filled and new units organized. They were called into service by Governor Harding on July 15, 1917, mustered into service during July and drafted as organizations into Federal service August 5, 1917.

The Iowa National Guard organizations, with their federal designations were as follows:

Headquarters First Iowa Brigade, reorganized into the 67th. Brigade Headquarters, 34th Division, arrived at Camp Cody, New Mexico, August 25, 1917, arrived in Camp Dix, N. J. September 1, 1918, arrived at St. Medard, La Brede Area, near Bordeaux, France, October 12, 1918. Skeletonized at Le Mans, France, November 2, 1918, Headquarters returned to United States and mustered out of the service at Camp Grant, Illinois, February 12, 1919.

First Iowa Infantry, reorganized into the 133rd Infantry arrived at Camp Cody, New Mexico October 1st and 2nd, arrived at Camp Dix, New Jersey, September 1, 1918, arrived at St. Selve, France, October 8, 1918, Skeletonized at Le Mans and St. Aignan, France November 1st and November 12th, 1918. Headquarters returned to United States and discharged from the service at Camp Grant, Illinois, February 12, 1919.

Second Iowa Infantry reorganized into the 125th, and 126th Machine Gun Battalion and 133rd Infantry arrived in Camp Cody, New Mexico, August 30, 1917 arrived at Camp Dix, New Jersey, August 27th to 31st 1918, arrived in La Crede Area, France, October 10th and 12th. Machine Gun Battalions skeletonized at Le Mans, France, November 10 to November 15th, 1918. Headquarters returned to United States and discharged from the service at Camp Grant, Illinois, February 12, 1919.

Third Iowa Infantry, reorganized into the 168th United States Infantry, 42nd or Rainbow Division, arrived at Camp Mills, Long Island, September 13, 1917, arrived Liverpool, December 1, 1917. Arrived Rimaucourt, France December 12th, 1917. Entered the line on February 23, 1918. Participated in battles at Badonviller, Lorraine, Champagne, Chateau Thierry, Sergy, St. Mihiel and Argonne. Returned to United States, April 25, 1919. Mustered out at Camp Dodge, Iowa, May 16th and 17th, 1919.

First Iowa Cavalry, reorganized into the Headquarters Troop, 34th Division, 125th Machine Gun Battalion, 133rd Infantry and 109th Ammunition Train, 34th Division arrived Camp Cody, New Mexico, September 29, 1918, arrived Camp Dix, New Jersey, August 29th to September 2, 1918, arrived in France, October 6th to October 20th. Returned to United States and mustered out January 18th and February 12th at Camps Dodge and Grant.

First Regiment Field Artillery arrived Camp Cody, October 2, 1917, assigned to 34th Division, arrived Camp Doniphan, Oklahoma, July 4th, 1918, arrived Camp Upton, Long Island, September 7, 1918, arrived at De Souge, France, October 25, 1918, returned to United States and mustered out at Camp Dodge, Iowa, January 15th to January 30th, 1919.

First Separate Battalion Engineers reorganized into 109th Engineers, 34th Division, arrived Camp Cody August 26th, September 28 and October 11, 1917, arrived Camp Dix, New Jersey, September 1, 1918, arrived France, October 2, 1918. Still in service May 17, 1919, at Mesves, France.

Company C. Signal Corps, reorganized into the 109th, Field Signal Battalion, 34th Division, arrived Camp Cody, October 2, 1917, arrived Camp Dix, September 2, 1918, arrived Beautiran, France, October 29, 1918, still in service May 17, 1919, Chitenay, France.

Ammunition Train, Motor section, organized into the 109th Ammunition Train, 34th Division, arrived at Camp Cody, September 28, 1917, arrived Camp Dix, New Jersey, August 31, 1918, arrived De Souge, France, October 28, 1918. Still in service May 17, 1919, at Bassens Dock, France.

Ammunition Train, Horse section, reorganized into the 109th Ammunition Train, 34th Division, arrived at Camp Cody, New Mexico, September 29, 1917, arrived Camp Dix, New Jersey, August 31, 1919. Arrived at De Souge, France, October 28, 1918, returned home to United States and mustered out at Camp Dodge, Iowa, January 18, 1919. Train Headquarters and Headquarters detachment returned to Iowa May 6, 1919, for muster out.

Field Hospitals 1 and 2 and Ambulance Companies 1 and 2 assigned to 109th Sanitary Train, 34th Division, arrived at Camp Cody, October 4, 1917, arrived Camp Dix, August 29, 1918, arrived France, November 1, 1918, skeletonized at Le Mans, France, November 20, 1918.

Work upon the Selective Service law commenced in May, 1917 and the first registration took place June 5, 1917, the second registration on June 5, 1918, the third on August 24, 1918 and the fourth on September 12, 1918. The total registrations were as follows:

Of this number of Class 1 men the 112 Local Boards in Iowa inducted and sent to Camp 68,512 men, leaving 49,696 men ready to go when the Armistice was signed.

During the administration of the draft extending from May 18, 1917 to May 13, 1919, when the State Draft Headquarters were closed, about 11,666 Iowa men and women assisted in the administration of the work:

The final financial report of Major Roy W. Snell, U. S. A. Disbursing Officer and Agent for Iowa added to previous expenditures shows a total expenditure of \$423,045.52, an average cost per registrant in Iowa of 80 cents and an average cost per inducted man of \$6.17. The Second Annual report of the Provost Marshall General shows the nation average per man inducted as \$7.90.

In addition to Individual inductions, enlistments in the Army, Navy and Marine Corps, of which no accurate record is available at this time, Iowa sent inducted men to camps as follows:

When the Armistice was signed on November 11, 1918 the following men were entraining for the camps named:

Camp Greenleaf, Georgia	2,500
Fort McArthur, California	1,400

Of this number about 600 actually entered the service for a day or two and were discharged from the Army before reaching camp, the day the armistice was signed, November 11.

Camp Commanders assigned these selected men to organizations and the Adjutant General of Iowa has been unable to secure the names of the organizations in which they served, Camp Commanders uniformly asserting that they can not give this data. It is known that several thousand selected men sent to Camp Dodge served in France with the 88th Division but thousands of Iowa men were transferred from camp to camp and from organization to organization until it is impossible for the Adjutant General of Iowa to say at this time where they served a majority of their time in the Army. This record will be secured later from the Adjutant General of the Army for compilation by the Iowa War Roster Commission, which under the provisions of H. F. 362 by Williams, is at work gathering the individual record of each soldier, sailor and marine from Iowa.

A compilation of data secured from the 112 Local Selective Service Boards in Iowa in August 1918, while these boards were sending men to camp gives an incomplete record of the effect upon the farming industry. At that time it showed:

Farmers and farm laborers inducted	32,799
Men in other occupations inducted	30,461

This shows that of the men inducted 51.87 percent were farmers or farm laborers, but it does not take into account the National Guardsmen, nearly 10,000, practically all of whom were from the cities and towns.

The State census of 1915 shows the urban population to be 54.1 percent, a trifle more than half of the total population of the state. It therefore appears that the rural and urban districts of the states, each with about half the population furnished almost an equal number of men for the army.

LAWS OF THE THIRTY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF IOWA.

THE HOUSING LAW.

Senate File No. 475, Chapter 123, Acts of the 38th G. A., known as the Housing Law of Iowa, approved March 31, 1919, and effective on and after July 4, 1919, aims to promote the health, safety, and welfare of the people by requiring certain minimum standards as regards space, light, ventilation, sanitation, fire protection, and other features of dwellings.

This act is mandatory for every city of 15,000 or more population, and for every city as its population reaches 15,000. All cities and incorporated towns having a population less than 15,000 are empowered to adopt ordinances covering similar matters.

Enforcement is in the hands of the health officer or Board of Health of each city. The State Board of Health is authorized to examine into the enforcement in any city, to take steps necessary to secure enforcement, and to apply provisions of the act to mining camps.

The housing law, two enabling acts, and a concurrent resolution providing for the printing of the law, were passed by the 38th G. A. without a dissenting vote.

MEMORIAL BUILDINGS.

The people are given very wide latitude in the matter of purchase or erection of public buildings under a new law which provides that counties, cities and towns may purchase or condemn ground for and erect and equip buildings to be known as memorial buildings and such buildings may include military headquarters, memorial rooms, library, assembly hall, gymnasium, natatorium and

club rooms or offices for cities and counties or, in fact, for almost any public purpose. Provision is made for a vote on the subject upon a demand for a certain number of voters after which bonds may be issued to finance the transaction and taxes be levied to pay the indebtedness and the support. There is also provision that gifts to cities, towns and counties are authorized and to be applied to such buildings or memorials. The general terms of the law are such that buildings for almost any public purpose can be erected at public expense under this law and be maintained.

There is no reason why any community, feeling the need for a public building, should not avail itself of this law to supply its needs and in future years it will undoubtedly be utilized as the means of securing a great many public buildings.

NEW HIGHWAY LAW.

BY DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE.

The 38th General Assembly took a long hoped for step toward making it possible for counties to make permanent road improvements by the enacting of the New Highway Law known as chapter 237. By this law the good faith of the state was pledged to meet with an equal sum the amount appropriated for road use in this state by the federal government. In order to meet such appropriation the legislature set aside the funds received from motor vehicle licenses.

The new law makes the following provision with reference to the improving of what is called the primary roads:

Each county, acting through its board of supervisors, shall have three options in the expenditures of its allotments from the primary road fund:

First, it may elect to complete the grading and drainage of any part or all of the primary roads within the county before laying any hard surfacing; or

Second, it may hard surface in any one year, such portion of the roads in the

primary system in its county as may be met by its allotted portion of the primary road fund for said year, plus any balance remaining to its credit from previous allotments, plus the special assessments on abutting and adjacent real estate as hereinafter provided; or it may proceed in any one year with draining and grading on one or more divisions of the primary system and with hard surfacing on other divisions of said system.

Third, it may proceed with said hard surfacing in a more rapid manner when authorized to do so by the voters of the county as hereinafter set forth, provided no hard surfacing shall be constructed on any division of the primary roads until the drainage and grading of said division shall have been fully completed.

It is hereby made the duty of the board of supervisors to proceed in the improvement of primary roads under this act as fast as the primary road fund is available, until the improvement of the primary system is completed; provided, however, that any county, after draining and grading its primary system, or any division thereof, shall have the right to surface same with gravel or oil or both if by resolution of the board of supervisors it elects so to do. Such graveling or oiling shall not be considered hard surfacing within the meaning of this act. * * *

The board of supervisors shall not proceed with hard surfacing of roads until such work shall be authorized by a majority vote of the electors of such county at a general election, or a special election, called for that purpose. * * *

In addition to what is known as the primary roads we have secondary roads, which are also under the control of the board of supervisors. The law does not contemplate the hard surfacings of such roads until the primary systems have been improved.

THE NEW SCHOOL LAWS.

The 38th General Assembly passed a large number of the most progressive school laws that have ever been placed upon the statute books of Iowa. These laws are the result of much study and investigation relative to the school problem in the State. They are based upon a substantial educational foundation, and will have a far reaching influence upon the future of education in the Hawkeye State.

A new progressive and up-to-date law which will make consolidation easier, and will put it upon a more substantial basis, was enacted.

A new minimum wage law was enacted, which bases the teacher's salary upon scholastic attainments. Already this is having marked effect upon the number of applications for teachers' certificates.

In the past the one-room rural school has been neglected, but the 38th General Assembly enacted the Evans-Smith Bill, which provides for the standard one-room school and appropriated one hundred thousand dollars to carry out the provisions of the Act.

A Teachers' Employment Bureau was created and made a department in the office of Public Instruction. It was not the intention of the bill that the department of public instruction be responsible for the teachers, but simply to make the office a clearing house so that the teachers and school boards could get together.

A new County Board of Education was created for the purpose of hearing appeal cases and to be of especial assistance to the County Superintendents of schools.

Vocational Education was provided for very generously, both for the present year, and the future development. In connection with this work educational provision was made for those students who have to go to work before they are sixteen years of age.

A bill was enacted which provides for the closing of small one-room schools where the attendance was not five or more.

All school legislation enacted by the last General Assembly was progressive, and will be far-reaching and beneficial in its influence.

TUBERCULOSIS ERADICATION.

The 38th General Assembly of the State of Iowa enacted a law which now appears as Chapter 287 of the Session Laws of the 38th General Assembly.

This law which has made a liberal provision for reimbursement for tubercular cattle and the control of contagious and infectious diseases among live stock in the State of Iowa will stand out as one of the most important steps ever taken by the General Assembly of the state of Iowa, for the control and eradication of live stock diseases, and which will mean a universal benefit to the live stock industry.

Provision is made for the cooperation of the Commission of Animal Health with the United States Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Animal Industry, in the establishment of what is known as tuberculosis-free accredited herds. This cooperation is being carried on by a number of states and present indications are that it is meeting with general favor among the live stock men, both in the grade and purebred cattle business.

The reimbursement provided for under the Section covering State and accredited herd tests serves both as a stimulus for the stockman to eradicate tuberculosis from his herd and to maintain a healthy herd and brings about a feeling of cooperation rather than oppression, when it is found necessary to apply a test to cattle suspected of being tubercular. While it is probable that it will be necessary to materially increase the appropriation for the eradication of tuberculosis within the next few years to cover the necessary indemnities this disease can be so controlled that the condemnations will be fewer and therefore, consume less money by way of indemnities, and the money so expended can then be turned to the purpose of maintaining healthy herds and the prevention of other diseases.

The State of Iowa has in the neighborhood of 4,500,000,000 head of cattle and there are more than 10,000 herds in the state containing purebred cattle. It is estimated that 8% of the cattle in the state of Iowa are tubercular as shown by averaging the tests made on several hundred herds. While this may not appear to be a large percent it entails very severe loss when taking into consideration the infection transmitted to hogs following tubercular cattle. Iowa alone feeds millions of dollars worth of pork each year that is found to be tubercular, more or less of which is condemned as unfit for food.

Any one desiring to have their herd accredited with a view of eradicating tuberculosis may apply to the Commission of Animal Health at Des Moines and arrangements will be made for either a Federal accredited herd test or a State test. In the former the Government also provides for reimbursement. There are certain restrictions however, imposed by the Bureau of Animal Industry before a test of this kind will be granted. In applying a State test indemnity is paid only by the State and the detail requirements of the Government accredited herd plan are not imperative.

UNIFORM SALES ACT.

BY DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE.

The 38th General Assembly, by the enacting of Chapter 396, adopted what is known as the uniform sales act. This act was framed by the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws and was enforced by the American Bar Association several years ago. It has been in force in some states for ever ten years. Among the first states to adopt it were Connecticut and New Jersey. Shortly after, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Ohio, Maryland, New York, Wisconsin, Michigan, Arizona, Pennsylvania, Illinois and Nevada adopted the same law. It was introduced in the legislatures of a number of other states during the last few years and has met with approval in many of them.

The purpose of this law was to provide a uniform law governing the sale of goods and merchandise. The law provides what is necessary to constitute a contract for the sale of goods. It states what shall constitute price, conditions and warranties, sale by sample, transfer of properties between the seller and the

buyer, when the title to the property shall be deemed to have been transferred, the performance of the contract, stoppage in transit, rescission by the seller, actions for breach of contract, and many other elements that enter into contracts for the sale of goods.

The reasons which prompted the enacting of the uniform negotiable instrument law and of the uniform bill of lading act, apply with equal force to the uniform sales act.

SYNOPSIS OF THE NEW MOTOR VEHICLE LAW.

The Thirty-eighth General Assembly enacted a motor vehicle law which revolutionizes the method of motor vehicle registration in the State of Iowa. Under this law the manner of computing the fee for the registration of automobiles is entirely changed; the fee now being based on the manufacturer's list price and the weight of the car. The fee is one per cent of the list price, fixed at the next even one hundred dollars above the list price, and forty cents per one hundred pounds of weight, fixed at the next even one hundred pounds of weight of the vehicle fully equipped. The fee for motor cycles is fixed at five dollars per year. After an automobile or motor cycle has been registered five times the fee is reduced one-half on the list price only.

The fee for trucks is based on the loading capacity and ranges from \$15.00 for a truck of one ton or less capacity to \$175.00 for one having a capacity of six tons. The fee for each ton of load capacity above six tons is \$50.00 in addition to the six ton rate. No license is issued for a truck having a capacity of over six tons without permission of the municipal authorities if operated within the limits of a city or town or from the State Highway Commission if operated on the public highways of the State. The fee for trailers is also based on the load capacity and ranges in fees from \$3.00 to \$60.00 per year. New number plates are to be issued annually and all registrations, except dealers and chauffeurs, are to be made through the office of the County Treasurers of the several counties. The fee for Chauffeur's license is \$2.00 per year and that of dealers \$25.00 per year. Extra dealers plates are furnished at \$15.00 per pair.

Reports of licenses issued are made to the Secretary of State each day and reports of fees collected are made monthly. The Secretary of State will maintain both a numerical and alphabetical index of all registrations made in the State. The County Treasurers will also maintain a numerical and alphabetical index but for his county only. Lists showing assignment of license numbers to the different counties will be published for the information of peace officers and the general public.

THE ENGINEERS LICENSE LAW.

Senate File 188-35th G. A., which provides for the examination and registration of professional engineers and land surveyors and defines professional engineering and professional land surveying, places the profession of engineering upon the same plane as the professions of law and medicine. It is expected that the enforcement of the provisions of the act will result in standardizing the work of the several branches of engineering, economize in the execution of engineering projects, and will safeguard the public against the employment of incompetent and inexperienced engineers. The economic loss to the state of Iowa in years past, by reason of incompetent engineering is hard to estimate, but to engineers competent to estimate such loss, it appears that the cost of errors will total many millions of dollars. This fact has finally become sufficiently impressed upon the minds of the people to demand that the engineers, upon whom rests the responsibility of designing and supervising public improvements, shall be fully equipped for their duties and that state certification of such competency is a necessary safeguard in the execution of public work.

THE NEW PLUMBERS LICENSE LAW.

Senate File 214-38th G. A., which amends the present plumbing laws and empowers the State Board of Health to establish a code of rules governing the installation of plumbing in the State of Iowa, is a forward step in the direction of the enactment of a state building code.

The effect of the new law, if properly enforced, will be to prevent the practice of cheap and imperfect plumbing. The provisions of the law are such that any municipality in the state or any property owner in the state, will be protected against imperfect workmanship and inadequate installations, for the reason that the plumbing code to be adopted under this act must define both the workmanship and materials necessary in sanitary plumbing and also provides for a state certification of licensed plumbers. The demand for a state building code has been insistent for the past six years. Plumbing regulations will necessarily constitute a considerable part of such building code and when such building code is provided for by the statute it will include the plumbing code provided for in this act.

HISTORICAL REVIEW OF LEGISLATION.

Relating to the Temple of Justice to be Erected Upon the Capitol Extension.

Owing to congestion of the State House, the imperative need of another building has been apparent for some years. Two types have been under consideration, one an office building for general office purposes, and the other a judiciary building or temple of justice to house the judicial departments of state government and the State Law Library, now housed in the Capitol.

In 1913 a bill was introduced by Senator Thomas J. B. Robinson, of Franklin County, (Senate File 63), and a companion bill in the House by Representative John W. Jacobs, of Calhoun County, (House File 140), providing for a commission and the purchase of a site near the Capitol, and the erection of an office building. This was defeated but during the same session a bill was passed providing for the extension and improvement of the State Capitol grounds and the adoption of landscape plans prepared by E. L. Masqueray of St. Paul, (House File 669), by the Committee on Appropriations, Ch. 14, laws of 1913. Among other things, this bill provided for the purchase of additional grounds near the Capitol and the location of buildings, monuments, etc. No further attempt was made to erect a building during this session.

In 1915 Senator Clem F. Kimball, of Pottawattamie County, introduced Senate File 114 and Representative Neff, also of Pottawattamie County, introduced a companion bill, House File 83, providing for the creation of a building commission and making an appropriation of \$10,000 for plans and specifications for the erection of a fireproof building to be known as the "Temple of Justice." These bills were defeated. In the same session Representative Neff introduced House File 281, providing for the erection of a temple of justice, the cost not to exceed \$750,000 to be paid out of the Extension Fund. This bill also was defeated.

In 1917 the Senate Committee on Public Buildings introduced Senate File 491, championed by Senator Kimball, providing for a Commission and for the erection of a judiciary building on the Capitol grounds to be paid for out of the Extension Fund. The bill as amended provided that the cost should not exceed \$500,000. This bill passed the Senate but failed in the House.

In 1919 Representative W. F. Moore, of Guthrie County, introduced House File 157 providing for the erection of a fireproof building upon the Capitol grounds to be, both a memorial to soldiers and sailors, housing relics, mementos and trophies of the late German-European war, and also a judiciary building to house the Supreme Court, State Law Library and other judicial departments of the State. The building was to cost approximately \$1,500,000. This bill was defeated in the House.

XIV LAWS OF THE THIRTY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY

During the same session Senator Kimball introduced a similar bill, being Senate File 73, in which he provided for a soldiers' and sailors' memorial building to house, among other things, trophies, etc., of the European war and also the judicial departments of the state, including the State Law Library. The bill was amended by striking out the memorial feature and giving it the title of the "Temple of Justice" to include the State Library, the Supreme Court, the Clerk of the Supreme Court, the Court Reporter, Attorney General, Railroad Commission, Commerce Council and the Board of Parole. This bill as amended became a law. (See Laws 1919, Ch. 349.) It provided, among other things, for a joint committee consisting of two members from each the House and the Senate, the Executive Council, the members of the Supreme Court with the present Chief Justice as chairman, which shall prepare plans and erect on the Capitol grounds a Temple of Justice, the cost not to exceed \$1,000,000, part to be taken from the Extension Fund, the balance from the War Emergency Fund as provided for in Ch. 207, Laws of 1917.

The Speaker of the House appointed Representatives W. F. Moore, of Guthrie County, and A. O. Hauge, of Polk County; the President of the Senate appointed Senators Clem F. Kimball, of Pottawattamie County, and W. G. Haskell, of Linn County, to serve permanently as members of the committee with the Executive Council and Supreme Court. Chief Justice Scott M. Ladd is Chairman of the Committee and Secretary of State W. C. Ramsey is Secretary. The Committee has selected five firms of architects, namely: Temple and Burrows, Davenport; Proudfoot, Bird and Rawson, Des Moines; Boyd and Moore, Des Moines; William L. Steel, Sioux City; and William J. Brown, Cedar Rapids.

It is contemplated that work of construction shall begin early in the spring of 1920.

THE NEW VENEREAL DISEASE LAW.

The Thirty-eighth General Assembly enacted Chapter 299, relating to Venereal Diseases. All cities and communities should read this law and work in harmony for the enforcement.

All truly medical men know the cause of venereal diseases; they know that human carriers afford their chief mode of dissemination; they know that in prevalence and injury to the people they are not outranked by any others of the communicable disease group; and they know that theoretically all persons should proceed to apply these facts exactly as all intelligent persons apply similar facts concerning other preventable diseases.

When all is simplified, we would say that this means the adoption and enforcement of (1) measures for the discovery, treatment, and control of individuals already infected; (2) measures for the elimination of conditions of environment favoring the dissemination of the infection; (3) measures for the protection of individuals not yet infected.

It should be impressed upon all the people that, in practice, the application of such measures is exceedingly difficult, and cannot proceed more rapidly than the formation of public opinion upon the importance of eradicating these diseases. It seems that the people of Iowa are aroused to the point that strong measures must and shall be adopted and enforced to eradicate those awful diseases from our state.

The Surgeon General of the United States Army and the Attorney General of the United States have ordered that in states where cantonments have been located, all restrictive measures with reference to venereal diseases must be rigidly enforced in order that the soldiers of the cantonments may be protected. The officers who are attempting to enforce these laws are simply doing their patriotic duty, and it is the duty of every patriotic citizen to render every assistance within his power to see that all rules and regulations relating to venereal diseases are rigidly enforced.

IOWA STATE PARKS.

The 37th G. A. created the Iowa Board of Conservation whose duty it should be to advise with the Executive Council upon the areas suitable to reserve for State Parks. Funds were to be derived by dividing the gun licenses fund in two and using half thereof.

The 38th G. A. amended the law by affording the Board certain positive authority and placing at its disposal a hundred thousand dollars a year. The Board was appointed by the Executive Council and consists of Dr. L. H. Pammel of Ames, President; Edgar R. Harlan, Des Moines, Secretary; John F. Ford, Fort Dodge and Joseph Kelso, Bellevue.

Areas suited for reservation are those where lakes, rivers, forests, springs and other conditions fit them for recreation; where the rocks, soils, trees, plants, birds, animals and other things make them suitable for the scientist; where there have occurred the events of importance in prehistoric times or while the Indians and white men mingled, or more recently, which may be said to be historic, or where from the altitudes or other conditions there is peculiar scenic interest. Some areas have one, some all these values.

It is intended to select such areas as are unproductive of agriculture, and to handle other areas so as not to interfere with industry. It is expected that present conditions which do not allow of any recreation or scientific research except by trespass or private consent, shall be changed so that each person in the state shall be within easy driving distance of a spot where he can rest or study undisturbed for a day or week.

REVISION OF THE IOWA CODE

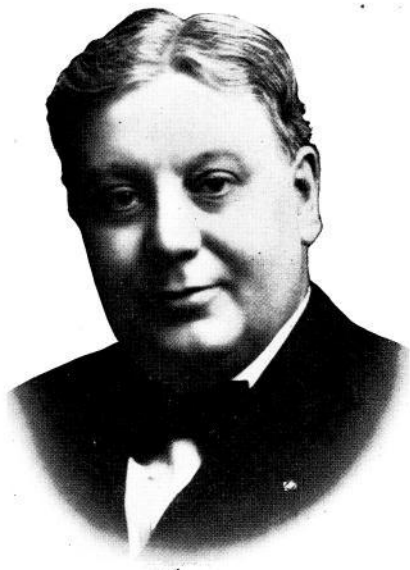
The Thirty-Eighth General Assembly made plans to hold a special session for the exclusive purpose of revising the Code of Iowa and this will probably be held commencing in January, 1920, upon call of the governor. By authority of Chapter 50 a commission to prepare the preliminary work needed before revision can be made was appointed and is at work, consisting of J. H. Trewin, Cedar Rapids; J. C. Mabry, Albia; and U. G. Whitney, Des Moines. Mr. Trawin, the chairman, was a member of the Code commission which prepared the Code of 1897. Mr. Whitney is reporter of the supreme court.

The commission is engaged in publishing a complete edition of the law of Iowa, as it now exists, eliminating all repealed sections and grouping the portions in force now so they will appear in their proper relation, and this Compiled Code will form the basis for the work of revision by the legislature. The commission will also publish an exhaustive report upon the changes suggested or improvements that are recommended, and also a series of bills pointing the way to proper revision of the various chapters of the Code. When the Thirty-eighth general assembly meets to formally act upon the revision and to complete the work thus commenced, it is expected that the bills submitted will be used and by reference to the report and comparison with the Compiled Code, a new complete Code will be made in a few months.

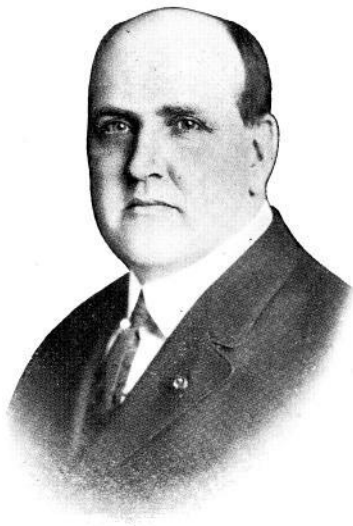
The last new Code was prepared in 1897 and supplements were issued in 1903, 1907, 1913 and 1915, since which time two new volumes of Session laws have been added. It is planned that the new Code will be in one volume with annotations in a separate volume of almost equal size.

THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

PROCLAIMED BY THE CONTINENTAL CONGRESS JULY 4, 1776.

When in the course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident: that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness; that, to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that, whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such forms, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and, accordingly, all experience hath shown that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security. Such has been the patient sufferance of these colonies, and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former systems of government. The history of the present king of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these states. To prove this, let facts be submitted to a candid world:

He has refused his assent to laws the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has forbidden his governors to pass laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his assent should be obtained, and, when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of representation in the legislature—a right inestimable to them, and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the repository of their public records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved representative houses repeatedly for opposing, with manly firmness, his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused, for a long time after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the legislative powers, incapable of annihilation, have returned to the people at large for their exercise; the state remaining, in the meantime, exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these states; for that purpose obstructing the laws of naturalization of foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the conditions of new appropriations of lands.

He has obstructed the administration of justice by refusing his assent to laws for establishing judiciary powers.

He has made judges dependent on his will alone for the tenure of their offices and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of new offices, and sent hither swarms of officers to harass our people and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, standing armies, without the consent of our legislatures.

He has affected to render military independent of, and superior to, the civil power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution and unacknowledged by our laws, giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation—

For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us;

For protecting them, by a mock trial, from punishment for any murders which they should commit on the inhabitants of the states;

For cutting off our trade with all parts of the world;

For imposing taxes on us without our consent;

For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury;

For transporting us beyond seas, to be tried for pretended offenses;

For abolishing the free system of English laws in a neighboring province; establishing therein an arbitrary government, and enlarging its boundaries, so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these colonies;

For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our governments;

For suspending our own legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated government here by declaring us out of his protection and waging war against us.

He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

He is, at this time, transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation and tyranny, already begun, with circumstances of cruelty and perfidy scarcely parallel in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow-citizens, taken captive on the high seas, to bear arms against their country, to become the executioners of their friends and brethren, or to fall themselves by their hands.

He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers the merciless Indian savages, whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions.

In every stage of these oppressions we have petitioned for redress, in the most humble terms; our repeated petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a tyrant is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have we been wanting in attentions to our British brethren. We have warned them, from time to time, of attempts, by their legislature, to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity; and we have conjured them, by the ties of our common kindred, to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They, too, have been deaf to the voice of justice and consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, enemies in war, in peace friends.

We, therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in general congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name and by the authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, that

these united colonies are, and of right out to be, free and independent states; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British crown, and that all political connection between them and the state of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that, as free and independent states, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and do all other acts and things which independent states may of right do. And for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor.

We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this constitution for the United States of America.

ARTICLE I.

Section 1. All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a congress of the United States, which shall consist of a senate and house of representatives.

Sec. 2. (1)* The house of representatives shall be composed of members chosen every second year by the people of the several states; and the electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislature.

(2) No person shall be a representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five years, and been seven years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state in which he shall be chosen.

(3) [Representatives and direct taxes shall be apportioned among the several states which may be included within this union according to their respective numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole number of free persons, including those bound to service for a term of years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other persons.]** The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such manner as they shall by law direct. The number of representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty thousand, but each state shall have at least one representative, and, until such enumeration shall be made, the state of New Hampshire shall be entitled to choose three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five, and Georgia three.

(4) When vacancies happen in the representation from any state, the executive authority thereof shall issue writs of election, to fill such vacancies.

(5) The house of representatives shall choose their speaker and other officers and shall have the sole power of impeachment.

Sec. 3. (1) The senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, chosen by the legislature thereof for six years; and each senator shall have one vote.

(2) Immediately after they shall be assembled in consequence of the first election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three classes. The seats of the senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year, of the second class at the expiration of the fourth year, and of the third class at the expiration of the sixth year, so that one-third may be chosen every second year; and if vacancies happen, by resignation or otherwise, during the recess of the legislature of any state, the executive thereof may make temporary appointments until the next meeting of the legislature, which shall then fill such vacancies.

(3) No person shall be a senator who shall not have attained to the age of thirty years, and been nine years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state for which he shall be chosen.

(4) The vice-president of the United States shall be president of the senate, but shall have no vote, unless they be equally divided.

*The figures in brackets are inserted for convenience of reference; they are not in the original.

**The foregoing clause included in brackets is amended by Sec. 2 of the 14th amendment, *post*.

(5) The senate shall choose their other officers, and also a president pro tempore, in the absence of the vice-president, or when he shall exercise the office of president of the United States.

(6) The senate shall have the sole power to try all impeachments. When sitting for that purpose they shall be on oath or affirmation. When the president of the United States is tried, the chief justice shall preside; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

(7) Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit under the United States; but the party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment and punishment, according to law.

Sec. 4. (1) The times, places and manner of holding elections for senators and representatives shall be prescribed in each state by the legislature thereof, but the congress may at any time by law make or alter such regulations, except as to the places of choosing senators.

(2) The congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

Sec. 5. (1) Each house shall be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members, and a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to do business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

(2) Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member.

(3) Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such parts as may in their judgment require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house on any question shall, at the desire of one-fifth of those present, be entered on the journal.

(4) Neither house, during the session of congress, shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be sitting.

Sec. 6. (1) The senators and representatives shall receive a compensation for their services, to be ascertained by law, and paid out of the treasury of the United States. They shall in all cases, except treason, felony and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during their attendance at the sessions of their respective houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place.

(2) No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil office under the authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the emoluments whereof shall have been increased, during such time; and no person holding any office under the United States shall be a member of either house during his continuance in office.

Sec. 7. (1) All bills for raising revenue shall originate in the house of representatives, but the senate may propose or concur with amendments, as on other bills.

(2) Every bill which shall have passed the house of representatives and the senate, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the president of the United States; if he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such reconsideration two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and, if approved by two-thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But

in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house, respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the president within ten days (Sunday excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law, in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the congress by their adjournment prevent its return, in which case it shall not be a law.

(3) Every order, resolution or vote to which the concurrence of the senate and house of representatives may be necessary (except on a question of adjournment) shall be presented to the president of the United States, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or, being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the senate and house of representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

Sec. 8. The congress shall have power:—

(1) To lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts and excises, to pay the debts and provide for the common defense and general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform throughout the United States.

(2) To borrow money on the credit of the United States;

(3) To regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several states, and with the Indian tribes;

(4) To establish a uniform rule of naturalization, and uniform laws on the subject of bankruptcies throughout the United States;

(5) To coin money, regulate the value thereof and of foreign coin, and fix the standard of weights and measures;

(6) To provide for the punishment of counterfeiting the securities and current coin of the United States;

(7) To establish post offices and post roads;

(8) To promote the progress of science and useful arts, by securing for limited times to authors and inventors the exclusive right to their respective writings and discoveries;

(9) To constitute tribunals inferior to the supreme court;

(10) To define and punish piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and offenses against the law of nations;

(11) To declare war, grant letters of marque and reprisal, and make rules concerning captures on land and water;

(12) To raise and support armies; but no appropriation of money to that use shall be for a longer term than two years;

(13) To provide and maintain a navy;

(14) To make rules for the government and regulation of the land and naval forces;

(15) To provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the union, suppress insurrections and repel invasions;

(16) To provide for organizing, arming and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the service of the United States; reserving to the states, respectively, the appointment of the officers and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by congress;

(17) To exercise exclusive legislation, in all cases whatsoever, over such district (not exceeding ten miles square) as may, by cession of particular states and the acceptance of congress, become the seat of the government of the United States, and to exercise like authority over all places purchased by the consent of the legislature of the state in which the same shall be, for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dock yards and other needful buildings; and—

(18) To make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this constitution in the government of the United States, or in any department or officer thereof.

Sec. 9. (1) The migration or importation of such persons as any of the states now existing shall think proper to admit shall not be pro-

hibited by the congress prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a tax or duty may be imposed on such importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each person.

(2) The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, unless when, in cases of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.

(3) No bill of attainder or ex post facto law shall be passed.

(4) No capitation or other direct tax shall be laid, unless in proportion to the census or enumeration hereinbefore directed to be taken.

(5) No tax or duty shall be laid on articles exported from any state.

(6) No preference shall be given by any regulation of commerce or revenue to the ports of one state over those of another; nor shall vessels bound to or from one state be obliged to enter, clear or pay duties in another.

(7) No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law, and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published from time to time.

(8) No title of nobility shall be granted by the United States; and no person holding any office of profit or trust under them shall, without the consent of the congress, accept of any present, emolument, office or title, of any kind whatever, from any king, prince or foreign state.

Sec. 10. (1) No state shall enter into any treaty, alliance or confederation; grant letters of marque or reprisal; coin money; emit bills of credit; make anything but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts; pass any bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, or grant any title of nobility.

(2) No state shall, without the consent of congress, lay any imposts or duties on imports or exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection laws; and the net produce of all duties and imposts, laid by any state on imports or exports, shall be for the use of the treasury of the United States; and all such laws shall be subject to the revision and control of the congress.

(3) No state shall, without the consent of congress, lay any duty of tonnage, keep troops or ships of war in time of peace, enter into any agreement or compact with another state, or with a foreign power, or engage in war, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent danger as will not admit of delay.

ARTICLE II.

Section 1. (1) The executive power shall be vested in a president of the United States of America. He shall hold his office during the term of four years, and, together with the vice-president chosen for the same term, be elected as follows:

(2) Each state shall appoint, in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors, equal to the whole number of senators and representatives to which the state may be entitled in the congress; but no senator or representative, or person holding an office of trust or profit under the United States, shall be appointed an elector.

The electors shall meet in their respective states and vote by ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves. And they shall make a list of all the persons voted for, and of the number of votes for each; which list they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate. The president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be the president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such majority, and have an equal number of votes, then the house of representatives shall immediately choose, by ballot, one of them for president; and if no person have a

majority, then, from the five highest on the list, the said house shall, in like manner, choose the president. But in choosing the president the votes shall be taken by states, the representation for each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. In every case, after the choice of the president, the person having the greatest number of votes of the electors shall be the vice-president. But if there should remain two or more who have equal votes, the senate shall choose from them, by ballot, the vice-president.

[The foregoing clause has been superseded and annulled by the twelfth amendment, post.]

(3) The congress may determine the time of choosing the electors, and the day on which they shall give their votes; which day shall be the same throughout the United States.

(4) No person except a natural born citizen, or a citizen of the United States at the time of the adoption of this constitution, shall be eligible to the office of president; neither shall any person be eligible to that office who shall not have attained to the age of thirty-five years, and been fourteen years a resident within the United States.

(5) In case of the removal of the president from office, or of his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the vice-president, and the congress may by law provide for the case of removal, death, resignation or inability, both of the president and vice-president, declaring what officer shall then act as president, and such officer shall act accordingly until the disability be removed or a president shall be elected.

(6) The president shall, at stated times, receive for his services a compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that period any other emolument from the United States or any of them.

(7) Before he enter on the execution of his office, he shall take the following oath or affirmation:

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of president of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect, and defend the constitution of the United States."

Sec. 2. (1) The president shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy of the United States, and of the militia of the several states when called into the actual service of the United States; he may require the opinion in writing of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.

(2) He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, to make treaties, provided two-thirds of the senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the senate shall appoint, ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, judges of the supreme court, and all other officers of the United States, whose appointments are not herein otherwise provided for and which shall be established by law. But the congress, may by law, vest the appointment of such inferior officers as they think proper in the president alone, in the courts of law, or in the heads of departments.

(3) The president shall have power to fill up all vacancies that may happen during the recess of the senate, by granting commissions, which shall expire at the end of their next session.

Sec. 3. He shall from time to time give to the congress information of the state of the Union, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene both houses, or either of them; and, in case of disagreement between them with respect to the time of adjournment, he may adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper. He shall re-

ceive ambassadors and other public ministers. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, and shall commission all the officers of the United States.

Sec. 4. The president, vice-president, and all civil officers of the United States, shall be removed from office on impeachment for, and conviction of treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The judicial power of the United States shall be vested in one supreme court, and in such inferior courts as the congress may, from time to time, ordain and establish. The judges, both of the supreme and inferior courts, shall hold their offices during good behavior; and shall, at stated times, receive for their services a compensation, which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office.

Sec. 2. (1) The judicial power shall extend to all cases in law and equity arising under this constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties made, or which shall be made, under their authority; to all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls; to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction to controversies to which the United States shall be a party; to controversies between two or more states, between a state and citizens of another state, between citizens of different states, between citizens of the same state claiming lands under grants of different states, and between a state, or the citizens thereof, and foreign states, citizens or subjects.

(2) In all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, and those in which a state shall be a party, the supreme court shall have original jurisdiction. In all the other cases, before mentioned, the supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction, both as to law and fact, with such exceptions and under such regulations as the congress shall make.

(3) The trial of all crimes, except in cases of impeachment, shall be by jury; and such trial shall be held in the state where the said crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any state, the trial shall be at such place or places as the congress may by law have directed.

Sec. 3. (1) Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

(2) The congress shall have power to declare the punishment of treason, but no attainder of treason shall work corruption of blood, or forfeiture, except during the life of the person attainted.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. Full faith and credit shall be given in each state to the public acts, records and judicial proceedings of every other state. And the congress may, by general laws, prescribe the manner in which such acts, records and proceedings shall be proved, and the effect thereof.

Sec. 2. (1) The citizens of each state shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens in the several states.

(2) A person charged in any state with treason, felony or other crime, who shall flee from justice and be found in another state, shall, on demand of the executive authority of the state from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the state having jurisdiction of the crime.

(3) No person held to service or labor in one state, under the laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in consequence of any law or regulation therein, be discharged from such service or labor, but shall be delivered up on claim of the party to whom such service or labor may be due.

Sec. 3. (1) New states may be admitted by the congress into this Union; but no new state shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction

of any other state, nor any state be formed by the junction of two or more states, or parts of states, without the consent of the legislatures of the states concerned as well as of the congress.

(2) The congress shall have power to dispose of, and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory or other property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this constitution shall be so construed as to prejudice any claims of the United States or of any particular state.

Sec. 4. The United States shall guarantee to every state in this Union a republican form of government, and shall protect each of them against invasion; and, on application of the legislature, or the executive (when the legislature cannot be convened), against domestic violence.

ARTICLE V.

The congress, whenever two-thirds of both houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to this constitution, or, on the application of the legislature of two-thirds of the several states, shall call a convention for proposing amendments, which, in either case, shall be valid to all intents and purposes, as part of this constitution, when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the congress; provided that no amendment which may be made prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any manner affect the first and fourth clauses in the ninth section of the first article; and that no state, without its consent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the senate.

ARTICLE VI.

(1) All debts contracted and engagements entered into before the adoption of this constitution shall be as valid against the United States under this constitution as under the confederation.

(2) This constitution, and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof, and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land; and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby, anything in the constitution or laws of any state to the contrary notwithstanding.

(3) The senators and representatives before mentioned and the members of the several state legislatures, and all executive and judicial officers, both of the United States and of the several states, shall be bound by oath or affirmation to support this constitution; but no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States.

ARTICLE VII.

The ratification of the conventions of nine states shall be sufficient for the establishment of this constitution between the states so ratifying the same.

Done in convention, by the unanimous consent of the states present, the seventeenth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-seven, and of the independence of the United States of America the twelfth. In witness whereof, we have hereunto subscribed our names.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech or of the press; or of the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

ARTICLE II.

A well regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.

ARTICLE III.

No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner; nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

ARTICLE IV.

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated; and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

ARTICLE V.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject, for the same offense, to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case, to be a witness against himself; nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

ARTICLE VI.

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor; and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

ARTICLE VII.

In suits at common law where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved; and no fact, tried by a jury, shall be otherwise re-examined in any court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

ARTICLE VIII.

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted.

ARTICLE IX.

The enumeration in the constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

ARTICLE X.

The powers not delegated to the United States by the constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states respectively, or to the people.

ARTICLE XI.

The judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by citizens of another state, or by citizens or subjects of any foreign state.

ARTICLE XII.

Section 1. The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for president and vice-president, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as president, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as vice-president; and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as president, and of all persons voted for as vice-president, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate; the president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted; the person having the greatest number of votes for president shall be the president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers, not exceeding three, on the list of those voted for as president, the house of representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the president. But in choosing the president, the votes shall be taken, by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the house of representatives shall not choose a president, whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the vice-president, shall act as president, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the president.

Sec. 2. The person having the greatest number of votes as vice-president shall be the vice-president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the senate shall choose the vice-president; a quorum for that purpose, shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice.

Sec. 3. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of president shall be eligible to that of vice-president of the United States.

ARTICLE XIII.

Section 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

Sec. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

ARTICLE XIV.

Section 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States, and of the state wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States, nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

Sec. 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several states according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each state, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for president and vice-president of the United States, representatives in congress, the executive and judicial officers of a state, or the members of the legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such state, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such state.

Sec. 3. No person shall be a senator or representative in congress, or elector of president and vice-president, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any state, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any state legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any state, to support the constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in an insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But congress may, by a vote of two-thirds of each house, remove such disability.

Sec. 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any state shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

Sec. 5. The congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

ARTICLE XV.

Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

Sec. 2. The congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

ARTICLE XVI.

The congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several states, and without regard to any census or enumeration.

ARTICLE XVII.

Section 1. The senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each senator shall have one vote. The electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislatures.

Sec. 2. When vacancies happen in the representation of any state in the senate, the executive authority of such state shall issue writs of

election to fill such vacancies; provided, that the legislature of any state may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointment until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

Sec. 3. This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the constitution.

(Recommended by the convention of the states to congress Sept. 11, 1787, and by it submitted to the states for ratification, which by the concurrence of nine states, was consummated and proclaimed Sept. 13, 1788.)

LAW AS TO PRESIDENTIAL SUCCESSION.*

The presidential succession is fixed by chapter 4 of the acts of the Forty-ninth congress, first session. In case of the removal, death, resignation or inability of both the president and vice-president, then the secretary of state shall act as president until the disability of the president or vice-president is removed or a president is elected. If there be no secretary of state, then the secretary of the treasury will act; and the remainder of the order of succession is as follows: The secretary of war, attorney-general, postmaster-general, secretary of the navy, and secretary of the interior. The acting president must, upon taking office, convene congress, if not at the time in session, in extraordinary session, giving twenty days' notice. This act applies only to such cabinet officers as shall have been appointed by the advice and consent of the senate, and are eligible under the constitution to the presidency.

CONSTITUTION OF IOWA

Preamble. We, the People of the State of Iowa, grateful to the Supreme Being for the blessings hitherto enjoyed, and feeling our dependence on Him for a continuation of those blessings, do ordain and establish a free and independent government, by the name of the State of Iowa, the boundaries whereof shall be as follows:

Boundaries. Beginning in the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river, at a point due east of the middle of the mouth of the main channel of the Des Moines river; thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines river, to a point on said river where the northern boundary line of the state of Missouri—as established by the constitution of that state, adopted June 12, 1820—crosses the said middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines river; thence westwardly along the said northern boundary line of the state of Missouri, as established at the time aforesaid, until an extension of said line intersects the middle of the main channel of the Missouri river; thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Missouri river to a point opposite the middle of the main channel of the said Missouri river at a point opposite the middle of the main channel of the Big Sioux river, according to Nicollet's map; thence up the main channel of the said Big Sioux river, according to the said map, until it is intersected by the parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes, north latitude; thence east along said parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes, until said parallel intersects the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river; thence down the middle of the main channel of the said Mississippi river to the place of beginning.

ARTICLE I.—BILL OF RIGHTS.

Rights of persons. Section 1. All men are, by nature, free and equal, and have certain inalienable rights, among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing, and protecting property, and pursuing and obtaining safety and happiness.

Political power. Sec. 2. All political power is inherent in the people. Government is instituted for the protection, security, and benefit of the people, and they have the right, at all times, to alter or reform the same, whenever the public good may require it.

Religion. Sec. 3. The general assembly shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; nor shall any person be compelled to attend any place of worship, pay tithes, taxes, or other rates, for building or repairing places of worship, or the maintenance of any minister or ministry.

Religious test. Sec. 4. No religious test shall be required as a qualification for any office of public trust, and no person shall be deprived of any of his rights, privileges, or capacities, or disqualified from the performance of any of his public or private duties, or rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law or equity, in consequence of his opinions on the subject of religion; and any party to any judicial proceeding shall have the right to use, as a witness, or take the testimony

of, any other person, not disqualified on account of interest, who may be cognizant of any fact material to the case; and parties to suits may be witnesses, as provided by law.

Duelling. Sec. 5. Any citizen of this state who may hereafter be engaged, either directly or indirectly, in a duel, either as principal or accessory before the fact, shall forever be disqualified from holding any office under the constitution and laws of this state.

Laws uniform. Sec. 6. All laws of a general nature shall have a uniform operation; the general assembly shall not grant to any citizen or class of citizens, privileges or immunities, which upon the same terms shall not equally belong to all citizens.

Liberty of speech and the press. Sec. 7. Every person may speak, write and publish his sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of that right. No law shall be passed to restrain or abridge the liberty of speech, or of the press. In all prosecutions or indictments for libel, the truth may be given in evidence to the jury, and if it appear to the jury that the matter charged as libelous was true, and was published with good motives and for justifiable ends, the party shall be acquitted.

Personal security. Sec. 8. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable seizures and searches, shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but on probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons and things to be seized.

Trial by jury; due process of law. Sec. 9. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate; but the general assembly may authorize trial by a jury of a less number than twelve men in inferior courts; but no person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law.

Rights of persons accused. Sec. 10. In all criminal prosecutions, and in cases involving the life or liberty of an individual, the accused shall have a right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury; to be informed of the accusation against him; to have a copy of the same when demanded; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for his witnesses; and to have the assistance of counsel.

When indictment necessary. Sec. 11. All offenses less than felony, and in which the punishment does not exceed a fine of one hundred dollars, or imprisonment for thirty days, shall be tried summarily before a justice of the peace, or other officer authorized by law, on information under oath, without indictment, or the intervention of a grand jury, saving to the defendant the right of appeal; and no person shall be held to answer for any higher criminal offense, unless on presentment or indictment by a grand jury, except in cases arising in the army or navy, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger.

Twice tried; bail. Sec. 12. No person shall, after acquittal, be tried for the same offense. All persons shall, before conviction, be bailable by sufficient sureties, except for capital offenses, where the proof is evident, or the presumption great.

Habeas corpus. Sec. 13. The writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended or refused when application is made as required by law, unless, in case of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.

Military. Sec. 14. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power. No standing army shall be kept up by the state in time of peace; and in time of war no appropriation for a standing army shall be for a longer time than two years.

Quartering soldiers. Sec. 15. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war except in the manner prescribed by law.

Treason. Sec. 16. Treason against the state shall consist only in levying war against it, adhering to its enemies, or giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the evidence of two witnesses to the same overt act, or confession in open court.

Bail; punishments. Sec. 17. Excessive bail shall not be required; excessive fines shall not be imposed, and cruel and unusual punishment shall not be inflicted.

Eminent domain. Sec. 18. Private property shall not be taken for public use without just compensation first being made, or secured to be made, to the owner thereof, as soon as the damages shall be assessed by a jury, who shall not take into consideration any advantages that may result to said owner on account of the improvement for which it is taken.

[Amendment.] The general assembly, however, may pass laws permitting the owners of lands to construct drains, ditches, and levees for agricultural, sanitary or mining purposes across the lands of others, and provide for the organization of drainage districts, vest the proper authorities with power to construct and maintain levees, drains, and ditches and to keep in repair all drains, ditches and levees heretofore constructed under the laws of the state, by special assessments upon the property benefited thereby. The general assembly may provide by law for the condemnation of such real estate as shall be necessary for the construction and maintenance of such drains, ditches and levees, and prescribe the method of making such condemnation.

Imprisonment for debt. Sec. 19. No person shall be imprisoned for debt in any civil action, on mense or final process, unless in case of fraud; and no person shall be imprisoned for a military fine in time of peace.

Petition. Sec. 20. The people have the right freely to assemble together to counsel for the common good; to make known their opinions to their representatives; and to petition for a redress of grievances.

Attainder; ex post facto law; obligation of contract. Sec. 21. No bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, shall ever be passed.

Resident aliens. Sec. 22. Foreigners who are, or may hereafter become residents of this state, shall enjoy the same rights in respect to the possession, enjoyment, and descent of property, as native-born citizens.

Slavery. Sec. 23. There shall be no slavery in this state; nor shall there be involuntary servitude, unless for the punishment of crime.

Reservation of rents. Sec. 24. No lease or grant of agricultural lands, reserving any rent or service of any kind, shall be valid for a longer period than twenty years.

Rights retained. Sec. 25. This enumeration of rights shall not be construed to impair or deny others, retained by the people.

ARTICLE II.—RIGHT OF SUFFRAGE.

Electors. Section 1. Every male citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of this state six months next preceding the election, and of the county in which he claims his vote, sixty days, shall be entitled to vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

Privileged from arrest. Sec. 2. Electors shall, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest on the days of election, during their attendance at such elections, going to and returning therefrom.

From military duty. Sec. 3. No elector shall be obliged to perform military duty on the day of election, except in time of war or public danger.

Persons in military service. Sec. 4. No person in the military, naval or marine service of the United States shall be considered a resident of this state by being stationed in any garrison, barrack, or military or naval place or station within this state.

Insane. Sec. 5. No idiot or insane person, or person convicted of any infamous crime, shall be entitled to the privilege of an elector.

Ballot. Sec. 6. All elections by the people shall be by ballot.

General election. Sec. 7. The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors, or of president and vice-president of the United States; and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the general assembly may by law provide.

ARTICLE III.—OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF POWERS.

Departments of government. Section 1. The powers of the government of Iowa shall be divided into three separate departments: The legislative, the executive and the judicial; and no person charged with the exercise of powers properly belonging to one of these departments shall exercise any function appertaining to either of the others, except in cases hereinafter expressly directed or permitted.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

General assembly. Section 1. The legislative authority of this state shall be vested in a general assembly, which shall consist of a senate and a house of representatives; and the style of every law shall be—"Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa."

Sessions. Sec. 2. The sessions of the general assembly shall be biennial and shall commence on the second Monday in January next ensuing the election of its members; unless the governor of the state, shall, in the meantime, convene the general assembly by proclamation.

Representatives. Sec. 3. The members of the house of representatives shall be chosen every second year, by the qualified electors of their respective districts, on the second Tuesday in October, except the years of the presidential election, when the election shall be on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November, and their term of office shall commence on the first day of January next after their election, and continue two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Eligibility. Sec. 4. No person shall be member of the house of representatives who shall not have attained the age of twenty-one years; be a male citizen of the United States, and shall have been an inhabitant of this state one year next preceding his election, and at the time of his election shall have had an actual residence of sixty days in the county or district he may have been chosen to represent.

Senators. Sec. 5. Senators shall be chosen for the term of four years, at the same time and place as representatives; they shall be twenty-five years of age, and possess the qualifications of representatives as to residence and citizenship.

Number and classification. Sec. 6. The number of senators shall not be less than one-third nor more than one-half the representative body; and shall be so classified by lot that one class, being as nearly one-half as possible, shall be elected every two years. When the number of senators is increased, they shall be annexed by lot to one or the other of the two classes, so as to keep them as nearly equal in numbers as practicable.

Elections determined. Sec. 7. Each house shall choose its own officers, and judge of the qualification, election, and return of its own members. A contested election shall be determined in such manner as shall be directed by law.

Quorum. Sec. 8. A majority of each house shall constitute a quorum to transact business; but a small number may adjourn from day to day, and may compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

Authority of the house. Sec. 9. Each house shall sit upon its own adjournments, keep a journal of its proceedings, and publish the same; determine its rules of proceedings, punish members for disorderly behavior, and with the consent of two-thirds, expel a member, but not a second time for the same offense, and shall have all other powers necessary for a branch of the general assembly of a free and independent state.

Protest. Sec. 10. Every member of the general assembly shall have the liberty to dissent from or protest against any act or resolution which he may think injurious to the public or an individual, and have the reasons for his dissent entered on the journals; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house, on any question, shall, at the desire of any two members present, be entered on the journals.

Privilege. Sec. 11. Senators and representatives, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, shall be privileged from arrest during the session of the general assembly, and in going to or returning from the same.

Vacancies. Sec. 12. When vacancies occur in either house, the governor, or the person exercising the functions of governor, shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

Doors open. Sec. 13. The doors of each house shall be open, except on such occasions as, in the opinion of the house, may require secrecy.

Adjournments. Sec. 14. Neither house shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which they may be sitting.

Bills. Sec. 15. Bills may originate in either house, and may be amended, altered, or rejected by the other; and every bill having passed both houses, shall be signed by the speaker and president of their respective houses.

Approval. Sec. 16. Every bill which shall have passed the general assembly, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor. If he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the house in which it originated, which shall enter the same upon their journal, and proceed to reconsider it; if, after such reconsideration, it again pass both houses, by yeas and nays, by a majority of two-thirds of the members of each house, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the governor's objections. If any bill shall not be returned within three days after it shall have been presented to him, Sunday excepted, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the general assembly, by adjournment, prevent such return. Any bill submitted to the governor for his approval during the last three days of a session of the general assembly, shall be deposited by him in

the office of the secretary of state within thirty days after the adjournment, with his approval, if approved by him, and with his objections, if he disapproves thereof.

Majority vote. Sec. 17. No bill shall be passed unless by the assent of a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the general assembly, and the question upon the final passage shall be taken immediately upon its last reading, and the yeas and nays entered on the journal.

Receipts and expenditures. Sec. 18. An accurate statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public money shall be attached to and published with the laws at every regular session of the general assembly.

Impeachment. Sec. 19. The house of representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment, and all impeachments shall be tried by the senate. When sitting for that purpose, the senators shall be upon oaths or affirmation; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Who liable to judgment. Sec. 20. The governor, judges of the supreme and district courts, and other state officers, shall be liable to impeachment for any misdemeanor or malfeasance in office, but judgment in such cases shall extend only to removal from office, and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust, or profit under this state; but the party convicted or acquitted shall nevertheless be liable to indictment, trial, and punishment according to law. All other civil officers shall be tried for misdemeanors and malfeasance in office, in such manner as the general assembly may provide.

Members not appointed to office. Sec. 21. No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he shall have been elected, be appointed to any civil office of profit under this state, which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which shall have been increased during such term, except such offices as may be filled by elections by the people.

Disqualification. Sec. 22. No person holding any lucrative office under the United States, or this state, or any other power, shall be eligible to hold a seat in the general assembly. But offices in the militia, to which there is attached no annual salary, or the office of justice of the peace, or postmaster, whose compensation does not exceed one hundred dollars per annum, or notary public, shall not be deemed lucrative.

Failure to account. Sec. 23. No person who may hereafter by a collector or holder of public moneys, shall have a seat in either house of the general assembly, or be eligible to hold any office of trust or profit in this state, until he shall have accounted for and paid into the treasury all sums for which he may be liable.

Money drawn. Sec. 24. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law.

Compensation of members. Sec. 25. Each member of the first general assembly under this constitution shall receive three dollars per diem while in session; and the further sum of three dollars for every twenty miles traveled in going to and returning from the place where such session is held, by the nearest traveled route; after which they shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by law; but no general assembly shall have the power to increase the compensation of its members. And when convened in extra session they shall receive the same mileage and per diem compensation as fixed by law for the regular session, and none other.

Laws, when to take effect; publication. Sec. 26. No law of the general assembly, passed at a regular session, of a public nature, shall take effect until the fourth day of July next, after the passage thereof. Laws passed at a special session shall take effect ninety days after the adjournment

of the general assembly by which they were passed. If the general assembly shall deem any law of immediate importance, they may provide that the same shall take effect by publication in newspapers in the state.

Divorce. Sec. 27. No divorce shall be granted by the general assembly.

Lotteries. Sec. 28. No lottery shall be authorized by this state; nor shall the sale of lottery tickets be allowed.

Acts; one subject; expressed in title. Sec. 29. Every act shall embrace but one subject, and matters properly connected therewith; which subject shall be expressed in the title. But if any subject shall be embraced in an act which shall not be expressed in the title, such act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be expressed in the title.

Local or special laws. Sec. 30. The general assembly shall not pass local or special laws in the following cases:

For the assessment and collection of taxes for state, county, or road purposes:

For laying out, opening, and working roads or highways;

For changing the names of persons;

For the incorporation of cities and towns;

For vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys, or public squares;

For locating or changing county seats.

Laws general and uniform; boundaries of counties. In all the cases above enumerated, and in all other cases where a general law can be made applicable, all laws shall be general, and of uniform operation throughout the state; and no law changing the boundary lines of any county shall have effect until upon being submitted to the people of the counties affected by the change, at a general election, it shall be approved by a majority of the votes in each county, cast for and against it.

Extra compensation. Sec. 31. No extra compensation shall be made to any officer, public agent, or contractor, after the service shall have been rendered, or the contract entered into; nor shall any money be paid on any claim, the subject-matter of which shall not have been provided for by pre-existing laws, and no public money or property shall be appropriated for local or private purposes, unless such appropriation, compensation, or claim be allowed by two-thirds of the members elected to each branch of the general assembly.

Oath of members. Sec. 32. Members of the general assembly shall, before they enter upon the duties of their respective offices, take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm, as the case may be,) that I will support the constitution of the United States, and the constitution of the state of Iowa, and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of senator (or representative, as the case may be,) according to the best of my ability." And members of the general assembly are hereby empowered to administer to each other the said oath or affirmation.

Census. Sec. 33. The general assembly shall, in the years one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, and every ten years thereafter, cause an enumeration to be made of all the inhabitants of the state.

Senators; number; apportionment. Sec. 34. The senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts, established by law and at the next session of the general assembly held following the taking of the state and national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to population as shown by the last preceding census.

Representatives; number; apportionment; districts. Sec. 25. The house of representatives shall consist of not more than one hundred and eight members. The ratio of representation shall be determined by dividing the whole number of the population of the state as shown by the last preceding state or national census, by the whole number of counties then existing or organized, but each county shall constitute one representative district and be entitled to one representative, but each county having a population in excess of the ratio number, as herein provided of three-fifths or more of such ratio number shall be entitled to one additional representative, but said addition shall extend only to the nine counties having the greatest population.

Ratio and apportionment. Sec. 26. The general assembly shall, at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of such census, fix the ratio of representations, and apportion the additional representatives, as hereinbefore required.

Districts. Sec. 27. When a congressional, senatorial, or representative district shall be composed of two or more counties, it shall not be entirely separated by any county belonging to another district; and no county shall be divided in forming a congressional, senatorial, or representative district.

Elections by general assembly. Sec. 28. In all elections by the general assembly, the members thereof shall vote viva voce, and the votes shall be entered on the journal.

ARTICLE IV.—EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

Governor. Section 1. The supreme executive power of this state shall be vested in a chief magistrate, who shall be styled the governor of the state of Iowa.

Election and term. Sec. 2. The governor shall be elected by the qualified electors at the time and place of voting for members of the general assembly, and shall hold his office two years from the time of his installation, and until his successor is elected and qualified.

Lieutenant-governor; returns of elections. Sec. 3. There shall be a lieutenant-governor, who shall hold his office two years, and be elected at the same time as the governor. In voting for governor and lieutenant-governor, the electors shall designate for whom they vote as governor, and for whom as lieutenant-governor. The returns of every election for governor and lieutenant-governor, shall be sealed up and transmitted to the seat of government of the state, directed to the speaker of the house of representatives, who shall open and publish them in the presence of both houses of the general assembly.

Election by general assembly. Sec. 4. The persons respectively having the highest number of votes, for governor and lieutenant-governor, shall be declared duly elected; but in case two or more persons shall have an equal, and the highest number of votes for either office, the general assembly shall, by joint vote, forthwith proceed to elect one of said persons governor, or lieutenant-governor, as the case may be.

Contested elections. Sec. 5. Contested elections for governor, or lieutenant-governor, shall be determined by the general assembly in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

Eligibility. Sec. 6. No person shall be eligible to the office of governor, or lieutenant-governor, who shall not have been a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the state two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election,

Commander-in-chief. Sec. 7. The governor shall be commander-in-chief of the militia, the army, and navy of this state.

Duties. Sec. 8. He shall transact all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

Execution of laws. Sec. 9. He shall take care that the laws are faithfully executed.

Vacancies. Sec. 10. When any office shall, from any cause, become vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor shall have power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which shall expire at the end of the next session of the general assembly, or at the next election by the people.

Convening assembly. Sec. 11. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the general assembly by proclamation, and shall state to both houses, when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have been convened.

Message. Sec. 12. He shall communicate, by message, to the general assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and recommend such matters as he shall deem expedient.

Adjournment. Sec. 13. In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the governor shall have power to adjourn the general assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next general assembly.

Disqualification. Sec. 14. No person shall, while holding any office under the authority of the United States, or this state, execute the office of governor, or lieutenant-governor, except as hereinafter expressly provided.

Term; compensation of lieutenant-governor. Sec. 15. The official term of governor and lieutenant-governor, shall commence on the second Monday of January next after their election, and continue for two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The lieutenant-governor, while acting as governor, shall receive the same pay as provided for governor; and while presiding in the senate, shall receive as compensation therefor, the same mileage and double the per diem pay provided for a senator, and none other.

Pardons. Sec. 16. The governor shall have power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he shall have power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the general assembly at its next meeting, when the general assembly shall either grant a pardon, commute the sentence, direct the execution of the sentence, or grant a further reprieve. He shall have power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the general assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation or pardon granted, and the reasons therefor; and also all persons in whose favor remission of fines and forfeitures shall have been made, and the several amounts remitted.

Lieutenant-governor to act as governor. Sec. 17. In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the governor, the powers and duties of the office for the residue of the term, or until he shall be acquitted, or the disability removed, shall devolve upon the lieutenant-governor.

President of senate. Sec. 18. The lieutenant-governor shall be president of the senate, but shall only vote when the senate is equally divided, and in case of his absence, or impeachment, or when he shall exercise the office of governor, the senate shall choose a president pro tempore.

Vacancies. Sec. 19. If the lieutenant-governor, while acting as governor, shall be impeached, displaced, resign, or, die, or otherwise become incapable of performing the duties of the office, the president pro tempore of the senate shall act as governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the president of the senate, for any of the above causes, shall be rendered incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of governor, the same shall devolve upon the speaker of the house of representatives.

Seal of state. Sec. 20. There shall be a seal of this state, which shall be kept by the governor, and used by him officially, and shall be called the great seal of the state of Iowa.

Grants and commissions. Sec. 21. All grants and commissions shall be in the name and by the authority of the people of the state of Iowa, sealed with the great seal of the state, signed by the governor, and countersigned by the secretary of state.

Secretary, auditor and treasurer. Sec. 22. A secretary of state, auditor of state, and treasurer of state, shall be elected by the qualified electors, who shall continue in office two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified; and perform such duties as may be required by law.

ARTICLE V.—JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

Courts. Section 1. The judicial power shall be vested in a supreme court, district court, and such other courts, inferior to the supreme court, as the general assembly may, from time to time, establish.

Supreme court. Sec. 2. The supreme court shall consist of three judges, two of whom shall constitute a quorum to hold court.

Judges elected. Sec. 3. The judges of the supreme court shall be elected by the qualified electors of the state, and shall hold their court at such time and place as the general assembly may prescribe. The judges of the supreme court so elected, shall be classified so that one judge shall go out of office every two years; and the judge holding the shortest term of office under such classification, shall be chief justice of the court during his term, and so on in rotation. After the expiration of their terms of office, under such classification, the term of each judge of the supreme court shall be six years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. The judges of the supreme courts shall be ineligible to any other office in the state, during the term for which they shall have been elected.

Jurisdiction. Sec. 4. The supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery, and shall constitute a court for the correction of errors at law, under such restrictions as the general assembly may by law prescribe; and shall have power to issue all writs and process necessary to secure justice to parties, and exercise a supervisory control over all inferior judicial tribunals throughout the state.

District court and judge. Sec. 5. The district court shall consist of a single judge, who shall be elected by the qualified electors of the district in which he resides. The judge of the district court shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified; and shall be ineligible to any other office, except that of judge of the supreme court, during the term for which he was elected.

Jurisdiction. Sec. 6. The district court shall be a court of law and equity, which shall be distinct and separate jurisdictions, and have jurisdiction in civil and criminal matters arising in their respective districts, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

Conservators of the peace. Sec. 7. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be conservators of the peace throughout the state.

Style of process. Sec. 8. The style of all process shall be "The State of Iowa," and all prosecutions shall be conducted in the name and by the authority of the same.

Salaries. Sec. 9. The salary of each judge of the supreme court shall be two thousand dollars per annum; and that of each district judge one thousand six hundred dollars per annum, until the year eighteen hundred and sixty; after which time they shall severally receive such compensation as the general assembly may, by law, prescribe; which compensation shall not be increased or diminished during the term for which they shall have been elected.

Judicial districts. Sec. 10. The state shall be divided into eleven judicial districts; and after the year eighteen hundred and sixty, the general assembly may reorganize the judicial districts, and increase or diminish the number of districts, or the number of judges of the said court, and may increase the number of judges of the supreme court; but such increase or diminution shall not be more than one district, or one judge of either court, at any one session; and no reorganization of the districts, or diminution of the judges, shall have the effect of removing a judge from office. Such reorganization of the districts, or any change in the boundaries thereof, or any increase or diminution of the number of judges, shall take place every four years thereafter, if necessary, and at no other time.

[Amendment.] At any regular session of the general assembly, the state may be divided into the necessary judicial districts for district court purposes, or the said districts may be reorganized, and the number of the districts and the judges of said courts increased or diminished; but no reorganization of the districts or diminution of the judges shall have the effect of removing a judge from office.

When chosen. Sec. 11. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be chosen at the general election; and the term of office of each judge shall commence on the first day of January next after his election.

Attorney-general. Sec. 12. The general assembly shall provide, by law, for the election of an attorney-general by the people, whose term of office shall be two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

County attorney. Sec. 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-six, and every two years thereafter elect a county attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

Carrying into effect. Sec. 14. It shall be the duty of the general assembly to provide for the carrying into effect of this article, and to provide for a general system of practice in all the courts of this state.

The grand jury. Sec. 15. The grand jury may consist of any number of members not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the general assembly may by law provide, or the general assembly may provide for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of the grand jury.

ARTICLE VI.—MILITIA.

Who constitute. Section 1. The militia of this state shall be composed of all able-bodied male citizens, between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, except such as are or may hereafter be exempt by the laws of the United States, or of this state; and shall be armed, equipped, and trained, as the general assembly may provide by law.

Exemption. Sec. 2. No person or persons, conscientiously scrupulous of bearing arms shall be compelled to do military duty in time of peace; provided that such person or persons shall pay an equivalent for such exemption in the same manner as other citizens.

Officers. Sec. 3. All commissioned officers of the militia (staff officers excepted) shall be elected by the persons liable to perform military duty, and shall be commissioned by the governor.

ARTICLE VII.—STATE DEBTS.

Credit not to be loaned. Section 1. The credit of the state shall not, in any manner, be given or loaned to, or in aid of, any individual, association, or corporation; and the state shall never assume, or become responsible for the debts or liabilities of any individual, association, or corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the state.

Limitation. Sec. 2. The state may contract debts to supply casual deficits or failures in revenue; or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts, direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; and the money arising from the creation of such debts shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

Losses to school funds. Sec. 3. All losses to the permanent school, or university fund of this state, which shall have been occasioned by the defalcation, mismanagement, or fraud of the agents or officers controlling and managing the same, shall be audited by the proper authorities of the state. The amount so audited shall be a permanent funded debt against the state, in favor of the respective fund sustaining the loss, upon which not less than six per cent annual interest shall be paid. The amount of liability so created shall not be counted as a part of the indebtedness authorized by the second section of this article.

War debts. Sec. 4. In addition to the above limited power to contract debts, the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or defend the state in war; but the money arising from the debts so contracted shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

Question of incurring debt submitted. Sec. 5. Except the debts hereinbefore specified in this article, no debt shall be hereafter contracted by, or on behalf of this state, unless such debt shall be authorized by some law for some single work or object, to be distinctly specified therein; and such law shall impose and provide for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay the interest on such debt, as it falls due, and also to pay and discharge the principal of such debt, within twenty years from the time of the contracting thereof; but no such law shall take effect until at a general election it shall have been submitted to the people, and have received a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at such election; and all money raised by authority of such law, shall be applied only to the specific object therein stated, or to the payment of the debt created thereby; and such law shall be published in at least one newspaper in each county, if one is published therein, throughout the state, for three months preceding the election at which it is submitted to the people.

Legislature may repeal. Sec. 6. The legislature may, at any time, after the approval of such law by the people, if no debt shall have been contracted in pursuance thereof, repeal the same; and may at any time forbid the contracting of any further debt, or liability, under such law; but the tax imposed by such law, in proportion to the debt or liability which may have been contracted in pursuance thereof, shall remain in force and be irrepealable; and be annually collected, until the principal and interest are fully paid.

Tax imposed distinctly stated. Sec. 7. Every law which imposes, continues, or receives a tax, shall distinctly state the tax, and the object to which it is to be applied; and it shall not be sufficient to refer to any other law to fix such tax or object.

ARTICLE VIII.—CORPORATIONS.

How created. Section 1. No corporation shall be created by special laws; but the general assembly shall provide by general laws, for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, except as hereinafter provided.

Property taxable. Sec. 2. The property of all corporations for pecuniary profit shall be subject to taxation the same as that of individuals.

State not to be a stockholder. Sec. 3. The state shall not become a stockholder in any corporation, nor shall it assume or pay the debt or liability of any corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the state.

Municipal corporations. Sec. 4. No political or municipal corporation shall become a stockholder in any banking corporation, directly or indirectly.

Act creating banking associations. Sec. 5. No act of the general assembly, authorizing or creating corporations or associations with banking powers, nor amendments thereto, shall take effect, or in any manner be in force, until the same shall have been submitted, separately, to the people, at a general or special election, as provided by law, to be held not less than three months after the passage of the act, and shall have been approved by a majority of all the electors voting for and against it at such election.

State bank. Sec. 6. Subject to the provisions of the foregoing section, the general assembly may also provide for the establishment of a state bank with branches.

Specie basis. Sec. 7. If a state bank be established, it shall be founded on an actual specie basis, and the branches shall be mutually responsible for each other's liabilities upon all notes, bills and other issues intended for circulation as money.

General banking law. Sec. 8. If a general banking law shall be enacted, it shall provide for the registry and countersigning, by an officer of state, of all bills, or paper credit designed to circulate as money, and require security to the full amount thereof, to be deposited with the state treasurer, in United States stocks, or in interest-paying stocks of states in good credit and standing, to be rated at ten per cent below their average value in the city of New York, for the thirty days next preceding their deposit; and in case of a depreciation of any portion of such stock, to the amount of ten per cent on the dollar, the bank or banks owning said stock shall be required to make up said deficiency by depositing additional stocks; and said law shall also provide for the recording of the names of all stockholders in such corporations, the amount of stock held by each, the time of any transfer, and to whom.

Stockholders responsible. Sec. 9. Every stockholder in a banking corporation or institution shall be individually responsible and liable to its creditors, over and above the amount of stock by him or her held, to an amount equal to his or her respective shares so held, for all its liabilities accruing while he or she remains such stockholder.

Bill-holders preferred. Sec. 10. In case of the insolvency of any banking institution, the bill-holders shall have a preference over its other creditors.

Suspension of specie payments. Sec. 11. The suspension of specie payments by banking institutions shall never be permitted or sanctioned.

Amendment or repeal of charters; exclusive privileges. Sec. 12. Subject to the provisions of this article, the general assembly shall have power to amend or repeal all laws for the organization or creation of corporations, or granting of special or exclusive privileges or immunities, by a vote of two-thirds of each branch of the general assembly; and no exclusive privileges, except as in this article provided, shall ever be granted.

ARTICLE IX.—EDUCATION AND SCHOOL LANDS.

I.—EDUCATION.

Board of education. Section 1. The educational interest of the state, including common schools and other educational institutions, shall be under the management of a board of education, which shall consist of the lieutenant-governor, who shall be the presiding officer of the board, and have the casting vote in case of a tie, and one member to be elected from each judicial district in the state.

Who eligible. Sec. 2. No person shall be eligible as a member of said board who shall not have attained the age of twenty-five years, and shall have been one year a citizen of the state.

How elected. Sec. 3. One member of said board shall be chosen by the qualified electors of each district, and shall hold the office for the term of four years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. After the first election under this constitution, the board shall be divided, as nearly as practicable, into two equal classes, and the seats of the first class shall be vacated after the expiration of two years; and one-half of the board shall be chosen every two years thereafter.

First session. Sec. 4. The first session of the board of education shall be held at the seat of government, on the first Monday of December, after their election; after which the general assembly may fix the time and place of meeting.

Limited. Sec. 5. The session of the board shall be limited to twenty days, and but one session shall be held in any one year, except upon extraordinary occasions, when, upon the recommendation of two-thirds of the board, the governor may order a special session.

Secretary. Sec. 6. The board of education shall appoint a secretary, who shall be the executive officer of the board, and perform such duties as may be imposed upon him by the board, and the laws of the state. They shall keep a journal of their proceedings, which shall be published and distributed in the same manner as the journals of the general assembly.

Rules and regulations. Sec. 7. All rules and regulations made by the board shall be published and distributed to the several counties, townships, and school districts, as may be provided for by the board, and when so made, published, and distributed, they shall have the force and effect of law.

Power to make. Sec. 8. The board of education shall have full power and authority to legislate and make all needful rules and regulations in relation to common schools, and other educational institutions, that are instituted, to receive aid from the school or university fund of this state; but all acts, rules and regulations of said board may be altered, amended, or repealed by the general assembly; and when so altered, amended, or repealed, they shall not be reenacted by the board of education.

Governor ex-officio a member. Sec. 9. The governor of the state shall be, ex-officio, a member of said board

Expenses. Sec. 10. The board shall have no power to levy taxes, or make appropriations of money. Their contingent expenses shall be provided for by the general assembly.

State university. Sec. 11. The state university shall be established at one place without branches at any other place, and the university fund shall be applied to that institution, and no other.

Common schools. Sec. 12. The board of education shall provide for the education of all the youths of the state, through a system of common schools, and such schools shall be organized and kept in each school district at least three months in each year. Any district failing, for two consecutive years, to organize and keep up a school, as aforesaid, may be deprived of their portion of the school fund.

Compensation. Sec. 13. The members of the board of education shall each receive the same per diem during the term of their session, and mileage going to and returning therefrom, as members of the general assembly.

Quorum; style of acts. Sec. 14. A majority of the board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; but no rule, regulation, or law, for the government of common schools or other educational institutions shall pass without the concurrence of a majority of all the members of the board, which shall be expressed by the yeas and nays on the final passage. The style of all acts of the board shall be, "Be it enacted by the board of education of the state of Iowa."

Board may be abolished. Sec. 15. At any time after the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, the general assembly shall have power to abolish or reorganize said board of education, and provide for the educational interest of the state in any other manner that to them shall seem best and proper.

2.—SCHOOL FUNDS AND SCHOOL LANDS.

Under control of the general assembly. Section 1. The educational and school fund and lands, shall be under the control and management of the general assembly of this state.

Permanent fund. Sec. 2. The university lands, and the proceeds thereof, and all moneys belonging to said fund shall be a permanent fund for the sole use of the state university. The interest arising from the same shall be annually appropriated for the support and benefit of said university.

Lands appropriated. Sec. 3. The general assembly shall encourage, by all suitable means, the promotion of intellectual, scientific, moral, and agricultural improvement. The proceeds of all lands that have been, or hereafter may be, granted by the United States to this state, for the support of schools, which may have been or shall hereafter be sold, or disposed of, and the five hundred thousand acres of land granted to the new states, under an act of congress, distributing the proceeds of the public lands among the several states of the Union, approved in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, and all estates of deceased

persons who may have died without leaving a will or heir, and also such per cent. as has been or may hereafter be granted by congress, on the sale of lands in this state, shall be, and remain a perpetual fund, the interest of which, together with all rents of the unsold lands, and such other means as the general assembly may provide, shall be inviolably appropriated to the support of common schools throughout the state.

Fines, etc., how appropriated. Sec. 4. The money which may have been or shall be paid by persons as an equivalent from exemption from military duty, and the clear proceeds of all fines collected in the several counties for any breach of the penal laws, shall be exclusively applied in the several counties in which such money is paid, or fine collected, among the several school districts of said counties, in proportion to the number of youths subject to enumeration in such districts, to the support of common schools or the establishment of libraries, as the board of education shall from time to time provide.

Proceeds of lands. Sec. 5. The general assembly shall take measures for the protection, improvement, or other disposition of such lands as have been, or may hereafter be reserved, or granted by the United States, or any person or persons to this state, for the use of the university, and the funds accruing from the rents or sale of such lands, or from any other source for the purpose aforesaid, shall be, and remain, a permanent fund, the interest of which shall be applied to the support of said university, for the promotion of literature, the arts and sciences, as may be authorized by the terms of such grant. And it shall be the duty of the general assembly, as soon as may be, to provide effectual means for the improvement and permanent security of the funds of said university.

Agents of school funds. Sec. 6. The financial agents of the school funds shall be the same that, by law, receive and control the state and county revenue, for other civil purposes, under such regulations as may be provided by law.

Distribution. Sec. 7. The money subject to the support and maintenance of common schools shall be distributed to the districts in proportion to the number of youths, between the ages of five and twenty-one years, in such manner as may be provided by the general assembly.

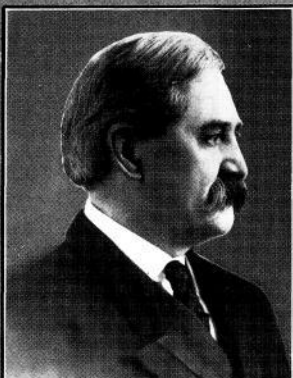
ARTICLE X.—AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

How proposed; submission. Section 1. Any amendment or amendments to this constitution may be proposed in either house of the general assembly; and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, such proposed amendment shall be entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election, and shall be published, as provided by law, for three months previous to the time of making such choice; and if, in the general assembly so next chosen as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be agreed to by a majority of all the members elected to each house, then it shall be the duty of the general assembly to submit such proposed amendment or amendments to the people in such manner, and at such time as the general assembly shall provide; and if the people shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the general assembly, voting thereon, such amendment or amendments shall become a part of the constitution of this state.

More than one. Sec. 2. If two or more amendments shall be submitted at the same time, they shall be submitted in such manner that the electors shall vote for or against each of such amendments separately.

Conventions. Sec. 3. At the general election to be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and in each tenth year there-

after, and also at such times as the general assembly may, by law, provide, the question, "Shall there be a convention to revise the constitution, and amend the same?" shall be decided by the electors qualified to vote for members of the general assembly; and in case a majority of the electors so qualified, voting at such election for and against such proposition, shall decide in favor of a convention for such purpose, the general assembly, at its next session, shall provide by law for the election of delegates to such convention.

ARTICLE XI.—MISCELLANEOUS.

Jurisdiction of justice of the peace. Section 1. The jurisdiction of justices of the peace shall extend to all civil cases (except cases in chancery, and cases where the question of title to real estate may arise), where the amount in controversy does not exceed one hundred dollars, and by the consent of parties may be extended to any amount not exceeding three hundred dollars.

Counties. Sec. 2. No new county shall be hereafter created containing less than four hundred and thirty-two square miles; nor shall the territory of any organized county be reduced below that area; except the county of Worth, and the counties west of it along the northern boundary of this state, may be organized without additional territory.

Indebtedness of political or municipal corporations. Sec. 3. No county, or other political or municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property within such county or corporation—to be ascertained by the last state and county tax lists, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

Boundaries. Sec. 4. The boundaries of the state may be enlarged, with the consent of congress and the general assembly.

Oath of office. Sec. 5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, shall, before entering upon the duties thereof, take an oath or affirmation to support the constitution of the United States, and of this state, and also an oath of office.

How vacancies filled. Sec. 6. In all cases of elections to fill vacancies in office occurring before the expiration of a full term, the person so elected shall hold for the residue of the unexpired term; and all persons appointed to fill vacancies in office, shall hold until the next general election, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Land grants located. Sec. 7. The general assembly shall not locate any of the public lands which have been, or may be granted by congress to this state, and the location of which may be given to the general assembly, upon lands actually settled, without the consent of the occupant. The extent of the claim of such occupant so exempted, shall not exceed three hundred and twenty acres.

Seat of government; state university. Sec. 8. The seat of government is hereby permanently established, as now fixed by law, at the city of Des Moines, in the county of Polk; and the state university at Iowa City, in the county of Johnson.

ARTICLE XII.—SCHEDULE.

Supreme law. Section 1. This constitution shall be the supreme law of the state, and any law inconsistent therewith, shall be void. The general assembly shall pass all laws necessary to carry this constitution into effect.

Laws in force. Sec. 2. All laws now in force, and not inconsistent with this constitution, shall remain in force until they shall expire or be repealed.

Proceedings not affected. Sec. 3. All indictments, prosecutions, suits, pleas, complaints, process, and other proceedings pending in any of the courts, shall be prosecuted to final judgment and execution; and all appeals, writs of error, certiorari, and injunctions, shall be carried on in the several courts, in the same manner as now provided by law, and all offenses, misdemeanors, and crimes that may have been committed before the taking effect of this constitution, shall be subject to indictment, trial, and punishment, in the same manner as they would have been had not this constitution been made.

Fines inure to the state. Sec. 4. All fines, penalties, or forfeitures due, or to become due, or accruing to the state, or to any county therein, or to the school fund, shall inure to the state, county, or school fund, in the manner prescribed by law.

Bonds in force. Sec. 5. All bonds executed to the state, or to any officer in his official capacity, shall remain in force and inure to the use of those concerned.

First election for governor and lieutenant-governor. Sec. 6. The first election under this constitution shall be held on the second Tuesday in October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, at which time the electors of the state shall elect the governor and lieutenant-governor. There shall also be elected at such election, the successors of such state senators as were elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and members of the house of representatives, who shall be elected in accordance with the act of apportionment, enacted at the session of the general assembly which commenced on the first Monday of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

For secretary, auditor, etc. Sec. 7. The first election for secretary, auditor, and treasurer of state, attorney-general, district judges, members of the board of education, district attorneys, members of congress, and such state officers as shall be elected at the April election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven (except the superintendent of public instruction), and such county officers as were elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, except prosecuting attorneys, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight; provided that the time for which any district judge or other state or county officer elected at the April election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight shall not extend beyond the time fixed for filling like offices at the October election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.

For judges of supreme court. Sec. 8. The first election for judges of the supreme court, and such county officers as shall be elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

First session of general assembly. Sec. 9. The first regular session of the general assembly shall be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, commencing on the second Monday of January of said year.

Senators. Sec. 10. Senators elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, shall continue in office until the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, at which time their successors shall be elected as may be prescribed by law.

Offices not vacated. Sec. 11. Every person elected by popular vote, by a vote of the general assembly, or who may hold office by executive appointment, which office is continued by this constitution, and every person who shall be so elected or appointed to any such office, before the

taking effect of this constitution (except as in this constitution otherwise provided), shall continue in office until the term for which such person has been or may be elected or appointed shall expire; but no such person shall continue in office after the taking effect of this constitution, for a longer period than the term of such office, in this constitution prescribed.

Judicial districts. Sec. 12. The general assembly, at the first session under this constitution, shall district the state into eleven judicial districts, for district court purposes; and shall also provide for the apportionment of the members of the general assembly in accordance with the provisions of this constitution.

Submission of constitution. Sec. 13. This constitution shall be submitted to the electors of the state at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the several election districts in this state. The ballots at such election shall be written or printed as follows: Those in favor of the constitution, "new constitution—yes." Those against the constitution, "new constitution—no." The elections shall be conducted in the same manner as the general elections of this state, and the poll-books shall be returned and canvassed as provided in the twenty-fifth chapter of the code, and abstracts shall be forwarded to the secretary of state, which abstracts shall be canvassed in the manner provided for the canvass of state officers. And if it shall appear that a majority of all the votes cast at such election for and against this constitution are in favor of the same, the governor shall immediately issue his proclamation stating that fact, and such constitution shall be the constitution of the state of Iowa, and shall take effect from and after the publication of said proclamation.

Proposition to strike out the word "white." Sec. 14. At the same election that this constitution is submitted to the people for its adoption or rejection, a proposition to amend the same by striking out the word "white," from the article on the "right of suffrage," shall be separately submitted to the electors of this state for adoption or rejection, in the manner following, viz.: A separate ballot may be given by every person having a right to vote at said election, to be deposited in a separate box. And those given for the adoption of such proposition shall have the words, "shall the word 'white' be stricken out of the article on the 'right of suffrage?' yes." And those given against the proposition shall have the words, "shall the word 'white' be stricken out of the article on the 'right of suffrage?' no." And if at said election the number of ballots cast in favor of said proposition, shall be equal to a majority of those cast for and against this constitution, then said word "white" shall be stricken from said article and be no part thereof.

Mills county. Sec. 15. Until otherwise directed by law, the county of Mills shall be in and a part of the sixth judicial district of this state.

Biennial elections. Sec. 16. The first general election after the adoption of this amendment shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year nineteen hundred and six, and general elections shall be held biennially thereafter. In the year nineteen hundred and six there shall be elected a governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, attorney general, two judges of the supreme court, the successors of the judges of the district court whose terms of office expire on December thirty-first, nineteen hundred and six, state senators who would otherwise be chosen in the year nineteen hundred and five and members of the house of representatives. The terms of office of the judges of the supreme court which would otherwise expire on December thirty-first, in odd-numbered years, and all other elective state, county and township officers, whose terms of office would otherwise expire in January in the year nineteen hundred and six, and members of the general assembly whose successors would otherwise be chosen at the general election in the year nine-

teen hundred and five, are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The terms of office of senators whose successors would otherwise be chosen in the year nineteen hundred and seven are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The general assembly shall make such changes in the law governing the time of election and terms of office of all other elective officers as shall be necessary to make the time of their election and terms of office conform to this amendment, and shall provide which of the judges of the supreme court shall serve as chief justice. The general assembly shall meet in regular session on the second Monday in January, in the year nineteen hundred and six and also on the second Monday in January in the year nineteen hundred and seven, and biennially thereafter.

Originally adopted in convention at Iowa City, the fifth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

This constitution was presented to congress in December, 1846, and on the 28th of the same month an act was passed for the admission of Iowa into the Union. The first election for state officers was held on the 26th day of October, 1846, pursuant to proclamation of Gov. James Clarke, when Ansel Briggs was elected governor; Elisha Cutler, Jr., secretary of state; Joseph T. Fales, auditor, and Morgan Reno, treasurer.

Section 18, Article IV of the constitution provides that the Lieutenant Governor shall perform the duties of the President of the Senate.

The supreme executive power of the state is vested in the governor, whose term of office is two years. He receives an annual salary of \$5,000 and an allowance of \$800 for house rent, and \$1,200 for services as member of the executive council.

No person shall be eligible who shall not have been a citizen of the United States and a resident of this state two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

He is commander-in-chief of the military forces of the state.

He transacts all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

When any office, from any cause, becomes vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor has power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which expires at the end of the next session of the general assembly, or at the next election by the people.

He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the general assembly by proclamation, and shall state to both houses, when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have convened.

He is required to communicate, by message, to the general assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and may make such recommendations to the body as he shall judge expedient.

In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the governor has power to adjourn the general assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next general assembly.

All bills must be submitted to him for approval, and a two-thirds vote of both branches of the legislature is required to pass a bill over his veto.

The governor has power to grant reprieves, commutation and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he has power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the general assembly at its next meeting. He has power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law: and shall report to the general assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation, or pardon granted, and the reason therefor.

He appoints all principal officers of the state not elected by the people, and certain officers connected with the state government, by and with the consent of the senate.

He signs patents for state lands, and appoints and commissions notaries public and commissioners in other states to take acknowledgments of deeds for this state.

He may demand fugitives from justice from the executives of other states, and may issue warrants, upon the requests of other governors, for fugitives found in this state.

LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR.

Term of incumbent ends January, 1921.

ERNEST R. MOORE, Cedar Rapids, Linn County, Born in Iowa.

The lieutenant-governor is elected for a term of two years and is required to have the same qualifications, as to age and residence, as the governor. He does not give bond.

In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the governor, the powers and duties of that office devolve upon the lieutenant-governor, for the residue of the term, or until the governor shall be acquitted, or the disability removed.

The lieutenant-governor is president of the senate, but can only vote when the senate is equally divided. In case of his death or other disability incapacitating him from discharging the duties of his office, the same devolve upon the president pro tempore of the senate.

He receives the same mileage and double the per diem of a senator. He maintains an office at the capitol building during the meetings of the general assembly.

The secretary of state is the head of the department of state. He is elected by the people for a term of two years, and receives a salary of \$4,000 a year. He is ex officio a member of the executive council. He is also ex officio a member of the board of trustees of the state library and the historical department of Iowa and of the state board of health.

The secretary of state countersigns all commissions and proclamations issued by the governor, and keeps a record thereof in the executive register.

The enrolled copies of the constitution and the laws of the state, the authenticated copies of the journals of the senate and house of the general assemblies, and many other legislative and state papers are filed in his office. He prepares for publication certain laws and resolutions passed by the general assembly, and is charged with the work of distributing the codes, code supplements and session laws.

Certificates of nomination and all papers and records pertaining to the nomination, election and qualification of state and district officers are filed in his office.

All papers relative to the incorporation of cities and towns, the annexation or severance of territory, and the consolidation or abandonment of municipal corporations are transmitted to him and preserved as a part of the permanent records of his office.

Articles of incorporation of both domestic and foreign corporations, as well as all amendments thereto, are filed and recorded in his office, and certificates of authority to transact business within the state of Iowa are issued by him. Applications for the registration of trade-marks, labels and forms of advertising are made to him and certificates issued thereon.

He edits, publishes and distributes the Iowa Official Register, and is required by law to place therein historical, political and other statistics and facts of general value, but nothing of a partisan character.

The records, files, field notes and plats of survey, and other papers and documents of the state land office are in his custody. Patents for school, university, agricultural college, railroad, swamp and other lands, are prepared in the land office, and, when signed by the governor, are countersigned by the secretary of state and recorded in the patent record books in the land department. He makes a biennial report to the governor of the transactions of this department.

Iowa corporations organized for pecuniary profit, and all foreign corporations authorized to do business in this state, are required to report annually, in July, to the secretary of state and pay him an annual fee of one dollar each. The secretary of state is required to send, during May and June of each year, to each corporation of record in his office, a notice, advising as to the provisions of the law, and a blank for use of the corporation in making report. On receipt of annual report and fee, the secretary of state is required to issue to the corporation an annual permit.

The registration in the office of the secretary of state is required to be made of all charitable organizations soliciting public aid in the state and a permit must first be procured from his department before any such organization, its agents or representatives may lawfully solicit public donations in any county, city, or township in Iowa except within the county or adjoining counties in which such association or institution is located.

An important branch of the work in the office of the secretary of state is that relating to the administration of the so-called Blue Sky Law, the same being an act passed by the thirty-sixth general assembly to prevent fraud in the sale and disposition of stocks, bonds and other securities.

A record of the registration of motor vehicles is also kept by him.

The auditor of state keeps the accounts between the state and the United States, or any state, public official or person; makes settlement of accounts with county treasurers and receivers of state revenues; keeps accounts of all revenues, funds and income of the state and of all disbursements; settles accounts with public debtors for debts due the state; settles claims against the state treasury; superintends and enforces payment of moneys payable into the state treasury; superintends the fiscal affairs of the state and furnishes forms for reports to be made by county officials to the state; issues all warrants on the state treasurer of money directed by law to be paid out of the treasury; has custody of all books, securities, bonds, etc., pertaining to the fiscal affairs of the state, where such are not required to be kept in some other office; reports to the governor biennially as to the revenues, funds, income, taxable property, also as to expenditures and estimates expenditures for the biennial period following; makes apportionments of interest on the permanent school fund among the counties and directs the payment of the proceeds of escheats estates to the school fund.

The auditor of state also has charge of the municipal finance department, the county accounting department, as well as having supervision of loan and trust companies and building and loan associations; he appoints the building and loan examiners, the county examiners, and the examiners of municipal accounts. All reports by any of the companies or associations above named are made to him, all fees, except fees for incorporation, are paid to him, and all deposits required by law of any such companies or associations to be

made with the state are deposited in the auditor's office. None of the companies or associations named can transact business in the state until they have received a certificate of authority from the auditor.

In addition to the above he is a member of the executive council of the state, which body constitutes the board of assessment and review and also has general supervision of the state's business, and is also a member of the state geological board and ex-officio member of the state board of health. He is also chairman of the state board of audit.

The public revenues of the state are received and disbursed by the treasury department; books are kept in which are recorded the names of all persons from whom money for any purpose is received, the time received, the purpose for which the money was remitted, and the amount thereof. Receipts in duplicate are issued for each item received, and the duplicate is filed with the state auditor. When remittance of state dues is made by bank draft, check or certificate of deposit, such draft, check or certificate must be deposited for collection in some bank in the city of Des Moines which has been previously designated as a depository for state funds, and no receipt for any sum remitted by check or draft is issued by the treasury department until the depository receiving the deposit notifies the department of the collection thereof. All county treasurers, auditors and superintendents of schools and all state officers, boards or commissions are required to remit to the state treasury, on or before the 15th of each month, all moneys received by them during the preceding calendar month. The treasurer of state, with the consent of the executive council, may designate banks in the city of Des Moines as depositories of state funds. Each bank so designated shall give bonds to be approved by the executive council, and shall pay interest on daily balances at such rate and at such times as may be agreed by the banks and the treasurer of state, with the approval of the executive council. At this time such depositories pay interest monthly at the rate of two per cent per annum.

Disbursements from the state treasury are made only upon warrants issued by the state auditor and a record is kept of each warrant paid, showing date of issue, date of payment, to whom payable, to whom paid and upon what account drawn. All accounts of each state institution under the board of control are paid

by checks issued by this department in favor of the person to whom the account is payable. These accounts are not paid until after they have been audited by the board of control and an abstract of the total amount due on account of each institution and the names and postoffice addresses of the persons to whom each of the several accounts are payable has been forwarded to this department by the board of control, together with a warrant or warrants of the auditor of state to cover the total amount to be paid. The state treasurer is the custodian of the permanent endowment fund of the State Agricultural College. This fund amounts to about \$680,000 and is loaned at not less than five per cent, secured by first mortgages upon real estate in Iowa. Only the interest may be used by the college. This interest is payable to the state treasurer and is by him paid to the treasurer of the college.

The treasurer of state is entrusted with the collection of the Collateral Inheritance Tax. The revenue from this source for the biennial period ending June 30th, 1918, amounted to \$873,394.28 and as the thirty-eighth general assembly authorized examiners to examine the county records for unreported estates, subject to this tax, a large increase of the revenue from this department is expected.

The accounts of the department are examined by some one appointed from the governor's office and one from the auditor's office, once in every three months, and may be examined by the governor at any time.

The total receipts of the State of Iowa, from all sources, as shown by the books of this department, for the fiscal period ending June 30, 1918, were \$19,933,082.45.

Among the duties placed upon the executive council by the laws of Iowa, are the following:

To purchase all stores, supplies and furniture for state departments and officers, including the state printer.

The execution of contracts for fuel, lights, repairs, blank books, etc.

The approval of articles of incorporation and by-laws of building and loan associations, and plan for liquidation of said associations.

The custody of paper and supplies for state officers and commissions.

The assessment of railway, express, sleeping and equipment car, telegraph and telephone properties.

The classification of railways.

The making of tax levies for state purposes and the certification of the same to the several county auditors.

The certification of tax valuations, fixed by the executive council, to the several county auditors.

The adjustment of property valuations between counties.

The canvass of votes cast for state and district officers.

The compilation of a state census once in ten years (next 1920).

The declaration of changes in classification of cities.

The compilation and publication of annual reports of (a) railway, express, sleeping and equipment car assessments, (b) telegraph and telephone assessments and (c) of the biennial report of expenses of all state departments.

The determination of the territory outside of Iowa in which Iowa life insurance companies may loan money.

The making of annual settlement with all state officers, under section 161-a of the supplement to the code, 1913.

The assignment of office rooms to state officers in capitol building.

The appointment of the board of examiners of mine inspectors.

The approval of bonds by depositories of state funds.

The fixing of reserve lists of state documents and publications and the approval of requisitions for documents and publications within said reserve list.

To dispose of state documents which the state librarian, curator of historical department and curator of law department may certify are not required for state uses.

To approve rules for uniformity of assessments in counties.

To approve claims for the expenses of collection of inheritance taxes and for the repayment of such taxes when wrongfully paid.

The approval of plans of doing business by certain investment companies.

The approval of plans for buildings at the state educational institutions, under certain conditions.

To determine the value at which property may be taken by Iowa corporations and the amount of stock which may be issued on account thereof.

The development of the capitol grounds extension.

The commissioner of insurance is the executive head of the insurance department of Iowa and has general control, supervision and direction of all insurance business transacted in the state and is charged with the execution of the laws relating to insurance. All powers vested in, and all duties imposed upon the auditor of this state, relating in any way to insurance matters prior to July 1, 1914, were on that date vested in and made incumbent upon the commissioner of insurance.

The commissioner is authorized to conduct examinations of insurance organizations transacting business in the state, covering in detail their financial condition, evidence of solvency and methods and practices of their officers and agents. Domestic companies, associations and societies are required to be so examined at least biennially. The actuary and chief examiner are in charge of the examination work which is continuous. The companies are visited and the audits made in their offices. A written report of the findings of the examiners is filed with the department as a permanent record.

All deposits required by law to be made with the state by any such company, association or society, are directly in charge of the commissioner and a careful record is kept thereof, showing each item. A daily and monthly balance is maintained, showing the amount of securities on deposit to the credit of each company. Each security deposited is carefully examined and, before acceptance, must comply with the statutes governing investment of insurance funds. The companies and associations are required to keep their deposit up to the amount prescribed by law. No company or association is permitted to withdraw securities sufficient to bring the amount below the reserve required to be maintained on deposit. The amount of approved securities representing capital stock and the legal reserve value of policies of Iowa life companies and associations on deposit in this department on January 1, 1919, was \$99,454,890.01.

All fees due the state from insurance companies and associations are paid to the commissioner of insurance.

The commissioner passes upon the articles of incorporation of new insurance organizations, and amendments thereto must also have his approval. No policies can be sold in the state until the policy forms have been approved by him, and all agents appointed by the companies and associations to represent them in the state must be licensed by the insurance department.

The attorney general is elected for a period of two years.

It is the duty of the attorney general to appear for the state, prosecute or defend all actions and proceedings, civil and criminal, in which the state shall be a party or interested, when requested to do so by the governor, executive council or general assembly or he may so appear on his own motion; and shall prosecute or defend for the state all causes in the supreme court in which the state is a party or interested.

The attorney general is given supervisory power over county attorneys and in a general way looks after the enforcement of the law over the entire state.

He shall also, when requested, give his opinion in writing upon all questions of law submitted to him by the general assembly, or either house thereof, the governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, superintendent of public instruction, and other state departments.

It is also his duty to prepare drafts for contracts, forms and other writings which may be required for the use of the state, and shall at the close of each biennial period report to the governor the condition of his office, the opinions rendered and the business transacted in the office.

In addition to the above, the attorney general is chairman of the state board of law examiners, whose duty it is to examine and pass upon the qualifications of all applicants for admission to the bar.

The state board of law examiners was created by an act of the twenty-eighth general assembly which went into effect on the 4th day of July, 1901.

The attorney general is, by virtue of his office, chairman of the board, and the other members are appointed by the supreme court.

The members of the board are paid as compensation fifteen dollars per day out of the fund arising from examination fees. Under the statute the supreme court may also appoint from time to time, when necessary, temporary examiners to assist the commission, who shall serve for one examination only.

Every applicant for admission to the bar must pass an examination by the board as to his legal attainments, and also as to his preliminary educational qualifications, unless he furnishes proof of such qualification by presenting a diploma or certificate that he is a graduate of a college, high school, normal school or academy, or that he has regularly and in good faith pursued and successfully completed four years of the regular course of an accredited high school, or the certificate of the state board of educational examiners that he has successfully passed an examination by that board, or the certificate of the president of the state university or of any college in this state having an equivalent collegiate or liberal art study, that he has been found on proper certification or examination to be entitled to admission, without condition, as a student of such university or college, for which admission the applicant must have actually and in good faith acquired a general education substantially equivalent to that involved in the completion of a high school course of study of at least four years extent.

If the applicant fails to pass the examination he may not take a second examination within three months after such failure. Each applicant is required to pay an examination fee of five dollars, and one dollar for his certificate of admission.

The Thirty-sixth General Assembly provided by legislation for a radical departure from old methods in handling the publication business of the state and created the office of document editor, defining his duties to be to "edit, revise and prepare manuscripts" of all publications of the state, and to "supervise the printing, binding and distribution of all reports, documents and publications" issued by the state or at state expense. The document department, which had charge of the custody and distribution of all such publications, was at the same time transferred to the document editor. The editing and supervision of all the publication work for the general assembly was also placed under the document editor and he was required to audit all bills for everything relating to printing and to keep all records and publish a biennial report. In still further carrying out the idea of concentrating the publication business of the state in one office the Thirty-Seventh general assembly created the state board of public printing and binding, with the governor, secretary of state, treasurer and auditor members ex officio and the state document editor secretary by virtue of his office. This board was given the duty of making contracts for everything pertaining to printing in all its forms and the purchase of the stock and these contracts to supersede the statutory prices for such printing under which the work had been done. The duties of state printer and state binder, which offices were abolished, were transferred to the document editor, and this change took place January 1, 1919. It is required that contracts shall be let on bids duly advertised for in accordance with Chapter 183, 27th general assembly. In December, 1918, the board awarded the contracts for 1919 to various contractors in and out of Des Moines.

The department has control of the contracts, supervises the printing, determines the number of copies of each publication issued, audits all bills and issues all orders for every kind of printing or expenditure related thereto.

The staff of the commander-in-chief consists of an adjutant general, with rank of brigadier general, who is chief of staff and acting quartermaster-general, an assistant adjutant general, with rank of major, and twelve aids who have the rank of lieutenant-colonel, except that any person so appointed, who has held a higher rank for a period of one year or more in the guard may be appointed with the rank of the highest rank so held by him, or the twelve aids may be detailed for such service from the active membership of the guard, but if so detailed they hold their rank in the guard and shall perform the duties of aid in addition to their regular duties.

The adjutant general is appointed by the governor. He issues and transmits all orders of the commander-in-chief and keeps a record of all appointments of officers commissioned by the governor, of all the general and special orders and regulations, and of such matters as pertain to the organization of the military force and his duties. He holds office for a period of four years, first period starting July 4, 1915, and also performs the duty of quartermaster-general in addition to his duties as adjutant general. He has charge of the state arsenal and grounds and all other property of the state kept or used for military purposes and receives and issues all quartermaster and ordnance stores and camp equipment upon the order of the commander-in-chief. He furnishes at the expense of the state such blanks and forms as are approved by the commander-in-chief. In each year, preceding a regular session of the general assembly, or at any other time the governor may direct, he makes out a detailed report of the transactions of this office, the expenses thereof and such other matters as shall be required by the commander-in-chief for the period since the last preceding report.

All muster rolls, reports, returns, enlistments, discharges and complete records of the organized militia are filed and made a matter of record in his office. The records of Iowa soldiers of the Civil and Spanish-American wars are on file in his office and all information desired from such records is furnished by him. Certificates of military service of Iowa soldiers of the late wars or past service in the organized militia are given by him under the seal of the state. He is the disbursing officer of all state appropriations for the use and support of the organized militia and as acting quartermaster-general all military property is committed to his custody which he is required to issue for the use of the militia, keeping an account of the same. He is required to furnish such reports of the organized militia of the state as the secretary of war may from time to time require. As chief of staff he is to perform his duties as such officer as directed by the commander-in-chief or required by the laws of Iowa governing its organized militia or by orders and regulations.

In addition to his duties as adjutant general the thirty-sixth general as-

sembly required that he should perform the duties formerly imposed on the custodian of the capitol grounds and public buildings.

As such custodian it is his duty to take charge of and protect the capitol building and all furniture and other property connected therewith, to preserve the same from injury; to control and take care of the capitol grounds, walks, fences, trees, shrubbery, statuary and other property of the state; to take charge and have control of all buildings and grounds at the seat of government, not by law placed in charge of some other person; to appoint the necessary employes; to make sworn statement at the end of each month of expenses incurred, and to make a biennial report to the governor.

The powers and duties of the board of railroad commissioners are: To generally supervise all railroads in the state, both steam and electric, except street railroads; to inquire into any neglect or violation of the laws of the state by any railroad corporation doing business therein; to make examinations and inspections of the physical conditions, conduct and management of such railroads and report their condition to said companies; to stop and prevent railroad companies, under certain circumstances, from running or passing their trains over unsafe bridges; to adjudge changes in station houses, rolling stock and rates of fare; to make report on first Monday in December in each year to the governor of its doings for the preceding year, accompanied with appropriate suggestions and recommendations; to receive, tabulate, and report upon the annual reports filed with it by railroad companies; to examine any of the books, papers or documents of any such corporation; to examine under oath employes of such corporation; to issue subpoenas, administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses; to make and fix maximum schedules of freight rates for such corporations, such schedules to be deemed reasonable until disproved; to examine into rates in force, upon complaint that the rate charged by a railroad company, or that the maximum rates fixed by the commission are unreasonably high or discriminating, and to fix the rate again, which must not be higher than any rate established by law, such decision of the commission is prima facie evidence that the rate so made is a reasonable maximum rate; to bring suits to enforce its orders; to inquire into the management of the business of such carriers and to obtain from them full and com-

plete information necessary to enable the commissioners to carry out the objects of the law; to hear, investigate and determine all complaints alleging unreasonable rates; unjust discrimination, undue preference, violation of the long and short haul clause, or other infractions of the commission law, and make proper orders thereupon; to establish joint through rates, upon application, over two or more connecting lines; and to have the same authority over express companies as the act confers concerning railroads.

Before any railway company may condemn lands for additional depot grounds, or for straightening or relocating track, the permission of the board must be obtained. Interlocking switches may be placed at grade railroad crossings or draw bridges, thus obviating the necessity of stopping trains before passing over such grade crossings or draw bridges, but before the interlocking switch may be used, consent of the board must be obtained.

The thirty-fifth general assembly gave to the commission the power to grant to individuals or corporations "engaged in the manufacture, sale, or distribution for sale of electric current for light, power, or heating purposes; the right within the state, except in cities and towns, to erect and maintain poles, wires, towers, fixtures and other necessary construction for the purpose of conducting electricity for lighting, power and heating purposes over, along and across any public land, highways or streams or the lands of any person or persons, and to acquire the necessary interests in real estate therefor." It also provided that transmission lines proceeding under the provisions of the law should be subject to "such reasonable regulations as the commission may from time to time, prescribe."

The thirty-fourth general assembly created the office of commerce counsel, to be appointed by the board of railroad commissioners for a term of four years, subject to confirmation by senate. The law provides that the counsel may appoint assistants, subject to the approval of the board of railroad commissioners. The duties of the office briefly are as follows:

DUTIES OF COMMERCE COUNSEL

The legal advisor of the board of railroad commissioners. To investigate and present matters with reference to intrastate rates to the board of railroad commissioners, prosecute the same before said board, or to any court to which same may be taken. To investigate on his own motion, or at the request of the board, all matters involving interstate rates in which the people of Iowa are interested, and present the same to the interstate commerce commission and prosecute same to the final determination. To act as attorney for and represent the board of railroad commissioners in all courts of this state or of the United States, in which the validity of any order of said board is in issue; to institute and prosecute in any of the courts any and all suits necessary to the proper enforcement of any rule or order of said railroad commissioners or make defense therein wherever said rule or order may be called in question.

The statutes of Iowa provide the sentence of a prisoner convicted of a felony shall be for the maximum term provided for the crime committed; thus leaving to the court imposing the sentence no discretion as to the time of confinement. The board of parole is given authority to release on parole outside the prison, all prisoners, except those sentenced for life terms. The law which provided for the fixing of a definite time of prison service by the judge before whom the trial was had, contemplated punishment for the particular crime; in other words, forfeiture of liberty on account of guilt, for a length of time which in the judgment of the judge would be the penalty the man should suffer. Hence, the oft repeated remark that a prisoner "has served as long as he should be required to serve for what he did."

The maximum sentence contemplates the keeping of a man in prison not alone for punishment, but for discipline, training, education and reformation, as well as example by which others may profit or be deterred from committing crime; this involves the consideration of past life, opportunities, environment, mental ability, criminal tendencies or want of them, and evidences of reformation and change in desires and ambitions. The board of parole has time and opportunity to investigate all these things. The object of the parole law is, that the man who gives evidence of the fact that he will be a law abiding citizen if given his liberty, shall be released on parole, always taking into account what would be a reasonable term to be served as an example. The marked difference between the definite term fixed when sentence is pronounced and the indeterminate sentence is that the first is for punishment on account of a particular crime, while the second contemplates not only the protection of society, but the study of the individual and the handling of him with a view of securing reformation from other causes than simply fear of imprisonment, which is not reformation at all. On the trial of a man indicted for crime, guilt or innocence may be established by evidence, but the evidence proper to be used for that purpose will not determine what the man has been or is, except as one may conclude from the single illegal act of which he is found guilty. The paroled man is kept under the control and supervision of the board of parole and in the custody of the warden of the prison; employment is found for him, he is placed in charge of some one whose duty it is to be in constant touch with him, to aid and encourage him, and keep the board advised of his conduct. The time he is on parole is not deducted from his prison sentence, and if returned to prison, he must serve the balance of his sentence unless paroled again. The prisoner, however, cannot be kept in prison longer than the maximum time provided by statute for the crime for which he was convicted. Rules and regula-

tions are provided which must be observed by the man while on parole, and for the violation of which he may be remanded to prison. This reformatory method of handling prisoners had its origin in the law establishing the Elmira Reformatory in the state of New York in 1869. Now more than half of the states in the union have adopted it, and in most cases the laws closely follow the system as then approved in the state of New York. No state enacting laws providing for the maximum sentence and parole provisions has ever repealed them. No state has yet adopted the absolutely indeterminate sentence, although such a sentence was advocated by the author of the New York law and is favored by practically all criminologists and those who have had experience in prison management and administration of parole laws. The law provides that the board of parole shall have the power to parole, under such rules and regulations as it may adopt, all prisoners committed to the men's reformatory or penitentiary excepting those sentenced for life. When such life sentence is passed the consideration of those cases is primarily with the governor who, upon application for pardon or commutation of sentence must refer them to the board for advice and recommendation before he passes upon them.

The department of agriculture for the state of Iowa was created by legislative enactment of the twenty-eighth general assembly in the year 1900. The office of the department is in the northeast wing of the state capitol building, in the rooms formerly occupied by the Iowa state agricultural society (said society ceased to exist when the department of agriculture was created.) The department is managed by a board, styled the state board of agriculture, of which the governor, president of the State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, state dairy and food commissioner, and state veterinarian are *ex officio* members; other members are a president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and one member from each of the eleven congressional districts of the state. The president, vice president, and district members are chosen at the annual agricultural convention, which is composed of delegates from each of the county and district fairs, county farmers' institutes, state dairy association, horticultural society, improved stock breeders' association, and members of the state board of agriculture. The president and vice president are elected for a term of one year, and the district members for a term of two years. The secretary and treasurer are elected by the board.

The department annually compiles and publishes the "Iowa Year Book of Agriculture." This book contains useful information upon various topics relating to agriculture, live stock, a review of the weather and crops for the preceding year, a synopsis of the work and proceedings of the state dairy and food department, state swine breeders' and state dairy associations, and such other matter as will be of interest to the farmer. It is also the duty of the secretary to carry out the provisions of the state law with reference to issuing state certificates of enrollment of all pure bred stallions and jacks and certificates of soundness for all grade stallions and jacks offered for public service, sale, exchange or transfer in the state of Iowa. It is also the duty of the secretary to prepare and send out the blanks, and receive the reports of the county and district fairs, farmers' institutes and short course associations entitled to receive state aid.

The thirty-third general assembly makes it the duty of the department to prepare and furnish blanks to the township assessors for the purpose of listing the acreage and yield of farm crops, the number and value of live stock, poultry and egg production, and other farm statistics and to tabulate the returns and publish same in the Iowa year book of agriculture.

By statute the state board of agriculture is made the custodian for the state fair grounds. It is also made the board of managers for the annual state fair. The state does not provide any support fund for the maintenance of the state fair, nor pay any of the yearly expenses or premiums of same, the statute providing that all expenditures connected with the holding of the fair must be paid out of the fair receipts. The title to the state fair grounds is in the name of the state of Iowa, all deeds and abstracts being on file in the state auditor's office.

The thirty-fourth general assembly created the commission of animal health, the members of which are to be appointed by the governor and are to consist of the state veterinary surgeon, who is to be the chairman and executive officer thereof, two veterinarians and two stockmen. The thirty-eighth general assembly provided two additional stockmen to serve for two-year terms. When the terms of the members of the commission expire their successors are to be appointed, the veterinarians to serve for three years and stockmen to serve for two years.

The commission is to hold at least two meetings a year and it has power and authority to make such rules and regulations as may be necessary for the prevention, suppression and quarantine of diseases among animals in the state and those being driven or transported through or into Iowa. Such rules and regulations are to be effective when approved by the executive council.

The state veterinary surgeon and the two veterinarians on the board constitute a board for the examination of applicants to practice veterinary medicine, surgery and dentistry.

The members of the Animal Health Commission, other than the state veterinary surgeon, are to receive \$100 a year for their services and in addition thereto the veterinarians, other than the state veterinary surgeon, are to receive \$100 for their services as members of the examining board.

The office of dairy commissioner was established May 1, 1886. On July 4, 1906, the office became that of the food and dairy commissioner. On July 4, 1907, the food law became effective and the work of the department was also increased by the passage of the commercial feeding stuffs and agricultural seed law. Later enactments make the department responsible for the laws governing the sale of paint, linseed oil, turpentine, calcium carbide and commercial fertilizer. The 35th general assembly also gave the department the enforcement of the sanitary law, which provides for the proper sanitation of all food producing establishments; the weight and measure law which provides for scale inspection and for general supervision of weights and measures and the use of such apparatus in connection with the purchase or sale of merchandise; and the cold storage law, which provides for the making of reports of stocks and gives the commissioner and assistants supervision over food products held in storage and limits the time that foods may be cold stored. The insecticide and fungicide law was enacted by the 37th general assembly and given to the dairy and food commissioner for enforcement. The 38th general assembly passed the egg law and the renovated butter law enforcement which is placed in the dairy and food commissioner.

The total annual expenditures amount to approximately \$75,000. The term "food" is defined as including all articles used as food, drink, confectionery or condiment by man or beast. The inspectors employed by the dairy and food department are given authority to enter all places of business where food products are manufactured, stored or sold and all wagons used in the transportation of such products and authority is given for taking samples of any goods offered or exposed for sale within the state.

The department issues licenses to all users for commercial purposes of the Babcock test. The fee for the license is \$2.50 per year for each operator. Milk inspection is extended to all incorporated cities and towns and a license fee of \$1.00 a year is required of all persons selling milk from stores or vehicles.

A license fee of \$3.00 is collected for each scale or weighing device where a fee is charged for weighing and the same license is required of all bakeries, candy factories, ice cream factories, canning factories, slaughter houses and meat markets. Dealers in eggs are issued annual licenses; the license fee is \$1.00. Cold storage plants are required to pay an annual fee of \$25. Condimental stock foods and tonics are included within the term "commercial feeding stuffs" and each manufacturer is required to pay a license fee of \$100 annually.

The Iowa Library Commission was created by an act of the twenty-eighth general assembly in March, 1900. Two years later the Traveling Library previously under the State Library was transferred to the Commission.

The executive officer of the Commission is the secretary who also bears the title of director of library extension. The activities of the Commission consist (1) of the work of extension and supervision carried on by the secretary assisted by the organizer.

This consists of help given by personal correspondence and visits in the inaugurating of library projects and the arousing of interest in the submission of the question of tax support in communities without public libraries, and of advice and help in the selection of building plans, equipment and furniture, and the selection and purchase of books, in their classification and cataloging, the installation of modern methods and records whereby the efficiency of the library is greatly increased, the encouragement and information of library boards and the instruction of librarians. In addition addresses are made by the secretary before library boards, teachers' meetings, farmers' institutes and other public gatherings in the interest of libraries and reading throughout the state. All this help is available to

communities and libraries without charge except the entertainment of the organizer when employed in a library.

(2) The second activity of the Commission is the Traveling Library which is made up (a) of fixed groups of 50 volumes each for general reading by adults and children. These groups become small libraries in the communities to which they go where they are loaned to individual borrowers free of charge; (b) of a general loan or subject collection for the use of students desiring material on specific subjects; (c) of books for the blind in New York Point loaned to any blind reader in the state; (d) of study club outlines and syllabi to assist in the preparation of programs; (e) picture collections for study club or exhibit purposes. These are all loaned with no charge except the cost of transportation, the books for three months and the pictures and outlines for two weeks.

(3) A periodical clearing house is also maintained by the Commission for the purpose of aiding small libraries in completing sets of standard periodicals without cost. (4) The work of publication includes the Iowa Library Quarterly, leaflets, lists and other material helpful in giving library information and increasing the reading of good books throughout the state.

The accession list of the general, law and legislative reference departments of the state library on the first day of July, 1918, included 153,073 volumes. The total accessions of the biennial period ending June 30, 1918, were 10,282 volumes. The historical department is separately reported.

The librarian notes with satisfaction the steadily growing utilization of the state library by advanced students of literature, philosophy, science and social problems, by debaters in the high schools and colleges of the state; also by state legislators and those interested in state legislation. This satisfaction is enhanced by the steadily increasing ability of the library to satisfy the wants of those who visit it with serious purposes. In fact the mission of the general library as a reference library—a final report for information in science, the mechanic arts, the fine arts, biography, general history, literature and philosophy, is finding generous recognition with students, scholars, educators, legislators, clubs devoted to research work and the school, college and public libraries of the state. With a single additional assistant, and latterly an apprentice, a legislative reference bureau has been developed during the past few years, and the use made of the new bureau by legislators, legislative committee clerks and persons interested in legislation, has steadily increased to such an extent that legislative reference work must be extended and its efficiency increased in anticipation of the increased demands certain to be made upon its resources. The thirty-fourth general assembly added greatly to the future efficiency of the state library, and contributed largely to the relief of the library board, by increasing the appropriations of the several departments as follows: The general library from \$5,000 to \$6,000; the historical department from \$5,000 to \$6,000, and the law department and legislative reference bureau from \$4,000 to \$6,000. The inclusion of the legislative reference bureau was the first legislative recognition of that increasingly efficient branch of the service beyond the appointment of a legislative reference assistant.

The law department of the state library has been materially strengthened by recent purchases bringing down to date several high-priced sets, and in other ways adding materially to the efficiency of that important department.

The completion of the valuable sets of standard periodicals, legal, scientific and miscellaneous, is one of the gratifying results of recent years, making the periodical feature of the library one of the strongest in the country.

The pressing need of the state library has long been a medical department that will serve the medical profession as the law department has long served the legal profession. A bill was introduced in the thirty-eighth general assembly embodying this need and passed with little opposition. It carries an appropriation of \$2,000 for librarian's salary and \$2,000 for books, periodicals, etc. It is hoped, by means of photography and by utilization of traveling library methods of reaching remote localities, to make the new department extremely serviceable to the medical profession in Iowa.

The crowning work of the thirty-eighth general assembly, as viewed from the standpoint of the library, was the appropriation of \$1,000,000 for a Temple of Justice to be erected on the Capitol grounds, for the housing of the Supreme Court of Iowa, the state library, the attorney general's department, and other departments in close relation with the court.

As now organized this department dates from the first day of July, 1892. Its chief purpose is the collection of historical data relating to our own state and the territory of the middle west, of which it originally formed a part. Special efforts are made to collect Iowa newspapers from the earliest dates to the present time; works of state and general western history, biography and genealogy; works on the histories of all our wars from the earliest times; works relating to the North American Indians; county histories, maps, Iowa pamphlets, biographies of our noted men and women, printed or in manuscript; written or printed documents relating to early settlers and settlements; reports, catalogues and broadsides relating to the churches, educational and benevolent institutions of the state; in short, every species of data which can throw light upon local, state or western history. Two hundred ninety-five Iowa newspapers are currently received, and the department is endeavoring to acquire all Iowa papers. It has ceased the collection of papers from other states. The library is especially strong in genealogy, local history and the history of the civil war.

The department publishes *The Annals of Iowa*, an illustrated quarterly historical magazine of eighty pages; it was suspended during the war. This is made up largely of original contributions in history and biography. By direction of the trustees it is sent free to every organized library in our state. Its price to subscribers is \$1 per year.

In addition to the *Annals*, the historical department is to be credited with the following publications, viz., thirteen biennial reports: "John Brown Among the Quakers and Other Sketches," by Hon. Irving B. Richman, "First Census of the Original Counties of Dubuque and Des Moines," edited by Dr. Benj. F. Shambaugh. "History of the Constitution of Iowa," by Dr. Shambaugh. Reprints of the laws of Iowa, 1828-39 and of 1839-40, and the hitherto unpublished journals of the council and house of representatives of the extra session of 1840. "Early Settlement and Growth of Western Iowa," by Rev. John Todd, Rafinesque; life and biography, by T. J. Fitzpatrick; Downing's Civil War Diary, by Alexander G. Downing, and Iowa authors and their works.

The department has secured one hundred and forty fine oil portraits of distinguished Iowans, which are now on exhibition in the art gallery of the historical building, and has thousands of photographs and other black and white portraits and exhibits. More are promised in the near future.

The museum includes nine large cases for autograph letters, manuscripts and portraits; a collection of recent, aboriginal and prehistoric pottery found in our own state; a large collection of prehistoric implements, among which is an Iowa axe weighing 31 3-4 pounds—one of the largest ever discovered—with hundreds of flints; many teeth, tusks, and other bones of the mammoth and mastodon, all of which were found in Iowa; several large cases of birds found within our state; many Iowa mammals; a case of Indian baskets, bead work, implements and weapons, much of which were manufactured by the Mesquakie Indians of Tama county; a collection of arms—cannon, mortars, swivel guns, rifles, muskets, carbines, swords and pistols, in use during the Civil, Spanish and Philippine wars; and duplicates in bronze of most of the historic medals issued by the United States government.

Chapter 142 of the laws of the thirty-first general assembly made provision for the care and permanent preservation of the public archives by giving the state library and historical department custody of all the original public documents, papers, letters, records and other official manuscripts of the state executive and administrative departments, offices or officers, councils, boards, bureaus and commissions, ten years after the date of the current use of such public documents, papers, letters, records or other official manuscripts.

The act also provided that the public archives shall be housed in the historical, memorial and art building in rooms to be known as the hall of public archives.

Chapter 157 acts of the thirty-second general assembly provided that the executive council should superintend the arrangement, labeling, filing and calendaring of the archives, the same to be delivered to the state library and historical department for preservation.

An act of the thirty-sixth general assembly provided that all of the duties and responsibilities of the executive council and the board of trustees of the state library and historical department with respect to the public archives are transferred to the curator of the historical department to be administered under the direction of the above board of trustees; empowers the curator to certify copies and otherwise hold the same relation to the archives transferred as, for instance, that of the secretary of state to such as originated in his office.

The archives division includes: about five million documents and three thousand bound records that have been classified, cleaned, filed and indexed. In addition to the above there are great masses of documents and records in the storage cases, which have been removed from the state offices to this department.

Since January, 1918, the department has been engaged in assembling original materials relating to the contribution of Iowa to the present war and the collections, aimed at complete and authentic facts, already have invaluable material upon the following phases:

1. A biographical census record of every man and woman serving their country during the world war.
2. Iowa's honor roll.
3. Iowa's decorated men and women.
4. Iowa's members of congress.
5. Iowa's governor.
6. The state's executives.
7. The Iowa legislature.
8. A military section, to include history of the "Guard."
9. A law section to include both national and state laws.
10. A record of civilian activities.
11. An extensive biographical record of leaders and privates.
12. Short histories of army divisions, ship's crews, etc. in which a considerable number of Iowa men have served.
13. Iowans in the allied armies.
14. Iowans in the army of the central powers.
15. Finance.
16. Councils of defense.
17. Educational institutions.

By the act of the thirty-fifth general assembly, creating the highway commission, the Dean of Engineering of the Iowa State College is ex officio a member of the commission. The other two members are appointed from different political parties for a term of four years.

The two commissioners appointed by the governor receive as compensation \$10.00 per day, not to exceed one hundred days per year. The ex officio member of the commission receives no additional compensation. All members receive actual traveling expenses. Terms begin July 1st.

The highway commission was first established in Iowa under Chapter 105, acts of the thirtieth general assembly, which constituted the Iowa State College as an institution to act as the highway commission for the state. From 1904 until 1912, work was carried on under this law.

The thirty-fifth general assembly reorganized the entire system of road administration in the state and created a commission of three men as outlined above. The office of the commission is located at the Iowa State College and the duties prescribed by the law are such that an extensive organiza-

tion is necessary. Under the law as amended by the thirty-sixth and thirty-seventh general assemblies, the duties of the commission are as follows:

First. To devise and adopt plans of highway construction suited to the needs of the different counties of the state.

Second. To disseminate information and instruction to road officers of the state.

Third. To issue an annual report to the governor relative to the operations of the commission.

Fourth. To appoint such assistants as are necessary to carry on the work of the commission.

Fifth. To make investigations as to conditions of road and bridge work in the counties.

Sixth. To have general supervision over the county and township officers in the state and to enforce the provisions of the road law.

Seventh. To devise plans and conduct negotiations between railroad and local officials for the elimination of danger at railroad crossings.

Eighth. To assist county boards of supervisors and the attorney general in defense of patent suits.

Ninth. To have charge of the survey and administration of meandered lakes.

Tenth. To prepare plans and specifications for federal aid road projects and to supervise the construction and maintenance of same.

The work of the Department of Public Instruction. The duties of the superintendent of public instruction may be classified as educational, quasi-judicial, and ex-officio.

Educational. Among the duties of an educational nature may be named his general supervision over the county superintendents of the state, which necessitates his meeting with these officers at least twice each year, and the publication of numerous circulars of instruction and suggestion. He is at the head of the public school system of Iowa, and his duties as such leader are to appoint institutes, and approve institute faculties. He is required by law to promote among the people of the state a proper interest in the general subject of education, including industrial and commercial education, agriculture, manual and vocational training, domestic science and continuation work. Also to classify and define various public schools belonging to his department, and to formulate suitable courses of study therefor, and to publish and distribute such classifications and courses of study. It is also his duty to collect statistics, and report on education, and educational questions, and the condition of the public schools of the state, and to publish them in reports and pamphlets. Among the publications that have become a part of the educational needs of the state and are of national note may be named: The Manual of Methods for the Elementary Schools of Iowa, Special Day Book, Educational Directory, Proceedings of the Iowa State Teachers' Association, Standards for Approved Graded and High Schools, Reference Books for the Approved High Schools of Iowa, Outlines in Agriculture, Domestic Science and Manual Training, Outlines of Psychology and School Management, Outline of Music for Normal Training High Schools and Normal Training Courses in Four Year High Schools, and Iowa Day. Many others of minor importance on various subjects are published.

In order to aid him in organizing and classifying the public schools of the state, the superintendent of public instruction is permitted by law to appoint one normal training inspector, two graded and high school inspectors, and one inspector of rural and consolidated schools. He is also empowered to distribute to the normal training schools and the consolidated schools certain aid which is set aside for these schools under certain conditions. It is his duty to pass upon them finally, and to determine what schools shall receive state aid.

For the purpose of increasing the facilities for training teachers for the rural schools by requiring a review of such common branches as may be deemed essential by the superintendent of public instruction, and for instructions in elementary pedagogy, and the art of teaching elementary agriculture and home economics, provision is made for normal courses of study and training in such approved four-year high schools as the superintendent of public instruction may designate.

He reports biennially to the governor on the conditions of the public schools of the state, and makes suggestions and recommendations as investigation and experience dictate.

Judicial. The quasi-judicial duties of the superintendent of public instruction include the hearing of appeals from the decisions of county superintendents, the rendering of opinions, in writing, when requested by school officials (but in fact opinions are rendered to all who request them) and publication of the school laws and notes on the same, and pamphlets containing session laws.

Ex-officio duties. The superintendent of public instruction is ex-officio member of the Iowa library commission, president of the educational council, president of the State Teachers' Reading Circle board, president of the Educational Board of Examiners and president of State Board of Vocational Education.

As executive of the Educational Board of Examiners, a great amount of responsibility is incurred, since all licenses to teach are issued under authority of this board, and the work is conducted under his personal supervision.

COMPENSATION.

The members of the board receive \$900 per year and railroad expenses for services as members of the state board of health, medical examiners, embalmers, nurses and optometry. The sanitary engineer, who is also a member of the board receives the sum of \$2,500 per year, and necessary traveling and incidental expenses. The secretary receives \$3,000 per year, the assistant secretary \$1,500 per year; chief clerk \$1,500 per year; the director of the bacteriological laboratory receives his compensation from the state university.

The state board of health has a general supervision of the lives and health of the people of the state and has power to make rules and regulations respecting the public health and declare that such rules and regulations when made shall have the force of legislative enactments.

The board through local boards of health establishes, maintains and releases quarantine; requires the disinfection of persons and premises exposed to contagion; supervises through its sanitary engineer the installing of water works systems, the construction of sewerage systems, and makes sanitary surveys through the sanitary engineer and the state laboratory of the board located at the state university, Iowa City. It investigates into the causes of diseases and issues to the people of the state instructions relative to the prevention of transmissible diseases and how to correct insanitary conditions in general which may exist in any part of the state.

The board also supervises the examination and registration of licensed embalmers. The result has been that the science and skill as well as the technique of the funeral director has been greatly improved and the public health has been better protected thereby. In connection with this work the board has

adopted rules and regulations for the transportation of the dead so that bodies, dead of infectious diseases, may be so prepared as to be shipped without interference or danger to any point in the United States, Canada, Mexico or Cuba. The rules for the shipment of corpses are the same in the countries just mentioned—the benefits of which can hardly be appreciated unless one is unfortunate enough to require such services.

The board also supervises the examination, and licenses those who desire to practice nursing as registered or graduate nurses.

It is required to make rules and regulations for the inspection of petroleum products; to determine the manner and methods, and to prescribe the instruments and apparatus to be used for the government of inspectors. Such rules and regulations shall be approved by the governor, and when so approved shall be binding upon all inspectors. It is the duty of the state board of health, to examine lamps and apparatus to be used, as shall be presented to such board, and test said lamps or apparatus, and if it shall find any lamp or apparatus to be safe, said board shall enter the findings of the board upon the records of the proceedings of said board. It is further made the duty of the board to fix a standard of purity of oils and other illuminating materials to be used in mines and to establish regulations for testing the same, and when so determined and established shall be recognized by all of the courts of this state.

It is the duty of this board to dispose of unclaimed bodies by directing to what medical college of the state such bodies shall be sent for anatomical purposes.

In addition to the above specified duties the board supervises the disinterment, burial and transportation of all dead bodies within the state and keeps a record of such disinterments and burials.

The board also has a thoroughly equipped and up-to-date bacteriological laboratory at Iowa City, in connection with the state university, where upon short notice tests are made to determine the presence of tuberculosis, typhoid fever, diphtheria, rabies, etc., and where the best methods of disinfection are determined.

The physicians of the board of health and its secretary are constituted the members and secretary of the board of medical examiners and as such, determine the standing of medical colleges, examine their graduates, and license those who pass satisfactory examinations as physicians and osteopaths, with authority to refuse to issue certificates and to revoke those issued under certain specified conditions and the board also issues certificates on reciprocity with other states and is authorized to grant itinerant licenses.

STATE BOARD OF HEALTH LABORATORY.

The thirty-second general assembly, in providing for the state hygienic laboratory, made an appropriation of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) annually, or so much thereof as may be necessary for the salary of the director, assistants and the running expenses of the laboratory.

At the first meeting of the state board of health following the passage of chapter 101, acts of the thirtieth general assembly, it was decided at that time, on account of limited funds, a great deal of work which the laboratory should do in the interests of the public health must be postponed, and that the work of the laboratory must be limited to the routine diagnostic work in connection with diphtheria, typhoid fever, tuberculosis and rabies. Because of the action of the thirty-second general assembly, in appropriating six thousand dollars (\$6,000) annually, the laboratory is able to do more and better work than formerly. The bacteriological and chemical analyses of public water supplies are problems of great importance and the state board of health feels that these should receive more attention in the future than in the past, hence it would recommend that the secretary and the director of the bacteriological laboratory be consulted freely when the public health is eminently concerned as in epidemics of typhoid fever. On such occasions the director of the laboratory shall make or cause to be made an investigation of the epidemic and have such bacteriological and chemical analyses of water and other substances made as are necessary to the finding and the removal of the causes of such

epidemics. The rapid diagnosis of a certain infectious disease like diphtheria, being of such great importance in order that proper treatment may be begun as soon as possible, the board has devised a method (which places the diagnosis outfits for the collection of material, in the hands of every physician) by establishing one or more culture stations in every city and town in the state where the diagnosis outfits are kept constantly on hand and given free of charge to all physicians.

Examinations are held in June and at such other times as may seem necessary.

Correspondence relating to practice of medicine or osteopathy should be sent to the secretary of this board.

Every person practicing medicine or osteopathy in the state is required to secure a certificate from this board.

Every physician or osteopath itinerating within the state is required to procure a special license.

The board is authorized to issue two classes of certificates; *first to physicians*, and *second to osteopaths*.

DEPARTMENT OF VITAL STATISTICS.

Compensation: State registrar receives no compensation; assistant receives \$1,200 per annum.

Undertakers and coroners are required on or before the 5th day of each month to return to the state registrar certificates of death that have come under their professional or official notice for the month preceding. Clerks of district court report, on forms prescribed by the registrar, all marriages and divorces recorded in their respective offices, and the city. Births are reported by attending physicians, midwives and the people in general, to the clerk of court of the county wherein they occurred.

HOTEL INSPECTOR.

Inspector of Hotels, J. B. HESTNER, Des Moines.

His salary is fixed at \$2,400 a year and it is made his duty to inspect every hotel once each year, or oftener on complaint of three or more patrons, and to require that the law relative to proper construction, fire escapes and cleanliness be enforced. Each hotel is required to pay a license fee, which is to be turned into the state treasury, and into the hotel inspection fund.

STATE BOARD OF OPTOMETRY EXAMINERS.

The board consists of three optometrists appointed by the Governor from a list of registered optometrists recommended by the Iowa State Association of Optometrists and one physician member of the state Board of Health appointed by the Governor. The Secretary of the State Board of Health acts as Secretary of this Board. ✓

The terms of all members of the board are for one year and expire June 30th each year. The members of the board receive five dollars a day for time actually employed. They also receive necessary traveling expenses. The fee for examination is fifteen dollars. Applicants are required to possess certain qualifications before they are admitted to examination. The board meets in the offices of the state board of health in the capitol building. The act creating the board does not apply to merchants or dealers who sell glasses as merchandise and who do not profess to be optometrists.

Note—At time of going to press, the appointments for Deputy Game Wardens have not been made.

The duties of the fish and game warden, as defined by chapter 15 of the code, are as follows:

He shall make biennially a report to the governor of his doings, together with such information for the protection of fish and game as he may think proper. He shall make monthly an itemized statement to the executive council under oath of all moneys expended and for what purpose, and the number and varieties of fish distributed and in what waters; also all prosecutions made under the law. He shall have charge of the re-stocking and distribution of fish to the public waters of the state, and shall impartially and equitably distribute the same. He shall faithfully and impartially enforce obedience to the provisions of the fish and game laws. He may suspend for a specified period specified portions of fish and game laws and issue permits authorizing the persons to whom said permit is issued, to take from certain designated lakes of the state, having an area of not less than two square miles, certain fish designated in said permit in any quantities and for all purposes. He shall not permit seining in said lakes between the first day of December and the fifteenth day of June.

He may grant certificates to proper parties to collect birds, their nests or eggs for scientific purposes. He shall seize and take possession, without warrant, any fish, birds or animals which have been caught, taken or killed, at any time, in a manner or for a purpose or had in possession or under control, or have been shipped contrary to law, and shall sell the same for the purpose

of paying any costs, and balance of proceeds, if any, shall be turned into the school fund of the county in which the seizure is made. He shall seize and destroy or sell without warrant or process, any net, seine, trap, contrivance, material, and substance whatever while in use or had and maintained for the purpose of catching, taking, killing, trapping or deceiving any fish, birds or animals contrary to the provisions of the fish and game laws. He may appoint such number of deputies as he may deem necessary, and their duties are to report all violations of the law, to make arrests where crime is committed in their province, and to aid the warden in the enforcement of the law. The provisions of the law make the state and game warden a state marshal, and it is his duty to ferret out offenders and bring them to justice.

By an act of the thirty-third general assembly, "no person shall hunt, kill or take any wild animal, bird or game in this state with a gun without first procuring a license." The fee for such license is one dollar a year for each citizen of the state and ten dollars a year for each non-resident or alien. The county auditors of the state issue the licenses. All licenses expire on the first of July of each year. Owners of land, their children and tenants are not required to procure a license to hunt on their own premises. Provision is made in the law for the amount of game that a non-resident may take from the state. Penalties are provided for the enforcement of the law. Another law of the thirty-third general assembly provides for an annual license under certain restrictions for the use of seines and nets in the Mississippi and Missouri rivers where they form part of the boundary line of the state.

By an act of the thirty-fifth general assembly, three district deputy wardens are provided for, to be appointed by the state fish and game warden. The state will be divided into districts with a man in charge in each as a general supervisor.

By an act of the thirty-sixth general assembly, no person shall keep game birds in possession for the purpose of propagation and sale, without first procuring a license from the State Fish and Game Warden, the fee for which is \$2.00.

The office of state mine inspector was created by the eighteenth general assembly in the year 1880. At that time the mining of coal in this state was in its infancy. But few large mines were in operation and the tonnage of coal was small as compared to that of the present time. Then but one inspector was needed. Owing to the growth of the coal industry the twenty-first general assembly amended the mining laws and provided for three inspectors, and gave the governor power to divide the state into three inspection districts. Today the entire time of the three inspectors is taken up with the work of inspecting the mines of the state and seeing that they are worked in conformity with the mining laws of the state as regards safety to the employes therein, proper ventilation, condition of the shafts, escape ways in times of danger, safety catches on cages, condition of the cables for hoisting men and coal, and everything that would tend to guard against accidents to men employed in the mines.

A general office for the inspectors is maintained in the state house and a complete record is kept therein of all inspections, accidents, etc. in record books

for that purpose. A monthly report of the general conditions of all mines is made to the mine inspectors and a general report of the conditions of the mines of the state, tonnage, accidents, number of employes, and other information relative to the coal industry, is published every two years. Copies of the state mining laws are also published and circulated. Blue prints of maps of all mines in the state, brought up to date once each year, are on file in the offices of the mine inspectors subject to public inspection. A secretary, elected by the inspectors, has charge of the general correspondence and books in the office, as the duties of the three inspectors keep them almost constantly in the field.

In 1900 Iowa produced 5,117,235 tons of coal and employed 13,041 men, and in 1918 the coal production amounted to 3,219,133 tons and 14,563 men were given employment in and around the mines. Between 250 and 300 mines are in operation in the 22 counties, which are divided into three inspection districts.

The first district includes the counties of Appanoose, Lucas, Taylor, Monroe (part), Wayne, Page and Adams. Mr. W. E. Holland of Albia, Iowa, is the inspector in this district, where mines employing 5,576 men, and producing 2,624,878 tons of coal during the calendar year 1918, are located.

The second district comprises the counties of Mahaska, Marion, Monroe (part), Jasper, Keokuk, Van Buren, Davis, Jefferson, Wapello and Warren. Mr. Rhys T. Rhys of Ottumwa is inspector for this district. 3,331,868 tons of coal were produced by the mines of the second district in 1918 and employment was given to 5,009 men.

The third district comprises the counties of Polk, Webster, Boone, Greene, Guthrie, Scott and Dallas. Mr. Edward Sweeney of Des Moines is the inspector. During the calendar year 1918 the mines in this district produced 2,262,387 tons of coal and employed 3,978 men.

The state board of mine examiners was created by the twenty-second general assembly, and is composed of five members; two coal operators, two miners, and one engineer. Their duties are to examine and issue certificates to those qualified to act as state mine inspectors, hoisting engineers and mine foremen. An examination for state mine inspectors is held the first Monday in March in even-numbered years in the office of the state mine inspectors in the state house. Examinations for hoisting engineers and mine foremen are held at various times during the year in different parts of the state. A fee of two dollars for registration, and an additional fee of two dollars is required of those taking and passing the examination for mine foremen and hoisting engineers. The law requires that each certificate issued by the board shall be recorded in the office of the examining board, and shall show the name, age, residence and years of experience of the person to whom it was issued.

The state board of audit was created by the thirty-sixth general assembly and is composed of the auditor of state, the attorney general or one of his assistants, and the secretary of the executive council or his first assistant.

It is the duty of this board to audit all claims except those for salaries of various officers which are fixed by law and claims on account of the institutions under the control of the Iowa Board of Control of State Institutions and the Iowa State Board of Education. Before approving any claim it is the duty of this board to determine that such claim is fully and clearly authorized by law; that the officer, board, commission, department or executive council empowered to authorize the creation of the claim has granted or authorized the same and has certified the fact to the board of audit; that all the legal requirements have been observed, including notice and competition, if required by law; that the claim is in proper form and duly verified and that the charges are reasonable, proper and correct.

The board is authorized and directed to formulate such rules and regulations as it may deem necessary to enable it to determine: that services charged for were actually performed; the time necessary devoted to such service and the exact and necessary expenses incurred in the performance thereof. The board will require information relative to any and all other matters which will aid it in performing its duties and protecting the interests of the state, and may require a strict compliance with said rules before auditing any claim.

The members of the board receive \$10.00 per diem with expenses while the board is in session, but per diem and expense cannot exceed the amount of fees received from applicants.

Under the provisions of the law the board meets at least once annually to examine persons desiring to practice in Iowa as certified public accountants and issues certificates to those qualifying.

The examination fee is \$25.00.

An applicant for examination must be a citizen of the United States and a resident of the state of Iowa; must be 25 years of age or more and of good moral character; must be a graduate of a high school with a four year course, have an equivalent education, or pass a preliminary examination by the board; must have had at least three years of practical accounting experience, at least one of which shall have been as a public accountant.

The board may register the certificate of any person who is the lawful holder of a certified public accountant's certificate issued under the laws of another state, which extends similar privileges to certified public accountants of this state, or to holders of degree of certified public accountant or chartered accountant or the equivalent thereof, issued by any foreign government provided that the requirements of such certificate or degree are, in the judgment of the board, equivalent to those provided for Iowa.

Practicing as a certified public accountant or chartered accountant or posing as such without having secured the necessary certificate is made a misdemeanor under the law.

Persons granted a certificate to practice, must furnish bond to the auditor of state in the sum of \$5,000.00.

The general assembly in 1884 provided for the creation of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the appointment of a commissioner, defining his duties, and his tenure of office. The work as outlined was purely statistical and was designed for the purpose of making inquiry into the conditions surrounding the employment of labor, its connection with the development of industries both mechanical and those arising from the natural resources of the state, the advantages and inducements offered in various localities for the establishment of desirable industries, the extent and productive value of industries already established and information relative to the home life and general welfare of the workers.

Information regarding working conditions in factories, strengthened by actual personal investigation made by the commissioners and exemplified in their reports, proved the necessity for periodical and systematic inspection of the factories and workshops by competent persons whose time could be devoted to their work. The legislature of 1902 provided for such inspection and the enforcement of requirements made. This inspection of factories, mercantile establishments, theaters, buildings, etc., embracing employment of over a half million workers, is one of the most important services the bureau renders to the state.

The increased activities of the bureau are indicated in part by the growth of the manufacturing industries, the 1895 census reporting 29,532 factory employes, our statistics of 1917 showing this number to have increased to 97,607.

Inspection efficiency is indicated by comparison of the last three biennial reports. For comparative purposes, taking the guarding of gears, removal or covering of set screws, and guarding of saws, jointers and dangerous machinery, the total of these recommendations for the first period is 2,442; for the second period, 2,096, and for the third period but 574, this decrease showing an improvement in three hazards ordinarily considered the most dangerous in manufacturing plants.

The present child labor law which has been operative since July 4, 1916, has been successful in checking child labor, and while the stress of war conditions brought an increase in the number of children employed, the conditions of employment were carefully guarded as were the prohibitions of age and other necessary standards of child welfare.

The thirty-sixth general assembly provided for the state free employment bureau, with one clerk to perform its duties as a part of the Bureau of Labor Statistics. The purpose of the bureau was to prevent labor turnover, and to place men in jobs with the least economic waste. With the opening of the war, need was felt for extension of the service and offices were opened in twelve cities, with the result that from April 1, 1918, to January 1, 1919, 86,882 persons were sent into employment, with an actual record of 78 per cent placed in jobs.

BOARD OF VOTING MACHINE COMMISSIONERS.

Appointed by the Governor. Term five years. Compensation not to exceed \$1,500.

The voting machine commission was created by an act of the twenty-eighth general assembly, providing for the use of voting machines at all state, county, city, town, and township elections. By this act the governor was authorized to appoint three commissioners, not more than two of whom should be from the same political party. The commissioners are appointed for the term of five years, subject to removal at the pleasure of the governor.

Individuals or corporations owning or interested in any voting machine may call upon the commissioners to examine the said voting machine. After such examination the commissioners are to report the results to the secretary of state, giving the capacity of such machine to register the vote of the people, its accuracy and efficiency, and its mechanical perfections or imperfections.

No board is acting at the present time.

Composition—Three members of the board are members by reason of their official position, and two (one of whom must be a woman) are appointed by the governor for a term of four years.

Meetings—The board meets five times each year for the transaction of business at such times and places as the president directs.

Certificates—The educational board of examiners has charge of examinations for all teachers' certificates and issues all certificates except high school normal training certificates, which are issued by the superintendent of public instruction. There are three classes of certificates, viz., (1) state diplomas and state certificates, (2) uniform county certificates, (3) high school normal training certificates.

State certificates are issued upon (1) graduation from accredited Iowa colleges; (2) graduation from colleges and normal schools of other states which meet the Iowa standard; provided the applicants file proofs of two years' successful teaching; (3) state certificates of other states which meet the Iowa standard; (4) examination. The state diploma is issued only upon examination.

Uniform county certificates are issued only upon examination.

High school normal training certificates are issued upon graduation from approved normal training high schools.

Accredited Schools—The educational board of examiners makes regulations for the granting of certificates to graduates of the regular and collegiate courses of the state university of Iowa, the state teachers' college, and the state college of agriculture and mechanic arts, and determines what other colleges and normal schools of the state are entitled to like recognition.

Library List—The board is required to prepare and publish a list of books suitable for rural school libraries, from which list the library committee of all rural schools must make selection when purchasing books for their libraries.

Organization—Pursuant to a call signed by D. F. Wells, then of the Muscatine schools, and seventeen others, a number of teachers met in the court house at Muscatine, May 10, 1854, and organized the Iowa state teachers' association, adopted a constitution and elected the following officers: President, J. A. Parvin, Muscatine; Vice-President, Rev. Daniel Lane, Davenport; Recording Secretary, D. Franklin Wells, Muscatine; Corresponding Secretary, Rev. Samuel Newberry, Dubuque; Treasurer, G. W. Drake, Oskaloosa; Executive Committee, Rev. Samuel Newberry, Dubuque; G. B. Denison, Muscatine; Rev. W. W. Woods, Iowa City; D. S. Sheldon, Davenport, and H. K. Edson, Denmark.

The real work of the association began with its second session which convened at Iowa City, December 27 and 28 of the same year. After a very important meeting this session adjourned to meet at Davenport, September 4, 1855. When the time came for this meeting, so few were present, it was abandoned.

An educational convention was called to meet at Iowa City, June 18 to 18, 1856. At this meeting a permanent organization was effected and the constitution of the association of 1854, somewhat modified, was adopted. Since that time a session has been held each year.

At the session in December, 1905, the semi-centennial anniversary of the association was celebrated by a special campfire program, which was participated in, either in person or by letter, by many of the veterans in education in Iowa.

In the fall of 1917 a reorganization of the association was effected by the incorporation of the five district or section associations with the Iowa state teachers association and the establishment of a permanent office in the city of Des Moines with a permanent secretary in charge.

DIRECTOR OF WEATHER AND CROP SERVICE.

Appointed by the Governor. Term two years. Term expires June 30, 1920. Salary \$1,500.

CHARLES D. REED, of Polk County; Postoffice, Des Moines.

The state weather and crop service was established in June, 1890, since which date it has been maintained in co-operation with the U. S. weather bureau. Under existing statutes the director is appointed by the governor upon recommendation of the state board of agriculture, and all expenditures are drawn upon vouchers issued by the president and secretary of that board. It is made the duty of the director to establish volunteer weather and crop stations to the number of two or more in each county, to appoint observers thereat and receive reports therefrom of meteorological and crop conditions; to tabulate reports for permanent records of climate and crops; to edit

and cause to be printed a monthly weather and crop review; to issue weekly weather and crop bulletins during the crop season, April 1 to October 1, and to compile an annual report which shall contain a complete review and summary of the service for the year, which may include articles and papers upon the subject of meteorological science and climatology, and which shall be printed and bound in such numbers as the executive council shall direct. The director's compensation for such service shall not exceed fifteen hundred dollars per year.

The inspectors are appointed by the governor to hold office for a term of two years from the first Monday in May in the even-numbered years. Each inspector is required to make an annual report to the governor on or before the first day of January, giving in detail the number and date of licenses granted pilots and engineers, number and kind of boats inspected, the fees received therefor, and other matters considered useful and of general interest.

The law provides that "any inspector, on the request of owner, agent or master of any boat other than a row boat, upon the inland waters of the state having a carrying capacity of five or more passengers, shall carefully and thoroughly inspect such boat, its appliances and machinery, and, if found in proper condition and safe for the carriage of persons or passengers, give his certificate thereof, including therein the number of persons or passengers that may be carried, and on what waters; which certificate, or a copy thereof, shall be posted in a conspicuous place on the boat, and any boat so inspected and certified shall be entitled to run for the season following the date thereof. In like manner, upon the request of any pilot or engineer for a license as such the inspector shall forthwith investigate the competency of the applicant, his acquaintance with and experience in his business, his habits as to sobriety, and other qualifications, and, if found capable of performing well his duties, and of good habits, he shall issue his certificate authorizing him to act as pilot or engineer, as the case may be, for five years from the date thereof, unless sooner revoked for cause, which revocation when made shall take effect upon the approval of the governor. The inspector may charge and require advance payment for inspection, for each sailboat, one dollar, each boat propelled by other power with a capacity of not more than twenty persons, five dollars; those of greater capacity, ten dollars, and for each applicant for license as pilot or engineer, three dollars."

The penalty for hiring or offering to hire such boat for the carriage of passengers, without first securing the certificate above mentioned, or for permitting or receiving for carriage a greater number of persons than authorized in the said certificate, is a fine of not to exceed one thousand dollars or imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed one year, or both fine and imprisonment. The same penalty applies to anybody acting as a pilot or engineer without first having obtained a license, or having obtained such license, continuing to follow such avocation after his certificate has been revoked.

This department was established in 1913 by legislative act. It has jurisdiction in the matter of adjusting claims for personal injury arising out of and occurring in course of employment where the same is not agricultural, clerical, domestic or casual. The deputy commissioner is invested with full authority of administration in the absence or disability of the commissioner.

In cases of controversy arbitration is resorted to, each party in interest appointing an arbitrator, the commissioner or deputy acting as chairman of the committee.

Appeal may be taken from the decision of the arbitration committee to the courts under statutory limitation.

Employers not under insurance are definitely excluded from the provisions of the act. With the approval of the insurance and industrial commissioners employers may be authorized to carry their own risks upon satisfactory financial showing.

The department has a standing appropriation of \$20,000 annually.

The state is divided into fourteen inspection districts which may be changed as the exigencies for the service may require.

An inspector is appointed for each inspection district, one of which is designated as chief inspector, who exercises supervision over the entire inspection service of the state. The state fixes his bond at \$10,000.00. No person interested in the manufacture or sale, either directly or indirectly, in petroleum products can serve as inspector, or act as surety on his official bond, which is fixed by statute at \$5,000.00. Inspectors may be removed for neglect or failure in the performance of their official duties.

Inspectors are furnished by the state with suitable apparatus for making inspection of all illuminating oils sold within the state, which includes miners'

oil and oils used for illuminating boats, railway cars and street cars. A sample is taken by the inspector from each tank or barrel and subjected to a test. For petroleum oil (kerosene) the closed cup test is used. If the vapor arising from the heating process ignites at a temperature of 100 degrees or less, the entire lot from which the sample is taken is rejected and cannot be sold for illuminating purposes within the state. Miners' oil is subjected to a gravity test of 22 degrees, Taglibue hydrometer, at a temperature of 60 degrees Fahrenheit. Oils used for illuminating boats, street or railway cars are tested to an igniting or burning point of 300 degrees Fahrenheit.

All persons for whom inspections are made must report directly to the chief oil inspector of state all inspections made for them for each month. This is compared with the inspector's report for the same month, and if any discrepancies are found, corrections are required until a complete check is secured.

Rules and regulations for making inspections are formulated and adopted by the state board of health and become effective and a part of the law when approved by the governor.

The office of state fire marshal was created by an act of the thirty-fourth general assembly. The principal duties of the fire marshal are to investigate the cause, origin and circumstances of every fire occurring in the state; to determine if any building or structures, by reason of want of proper repair or by reason of age and dilapidated condition, are especially liable to fire and to order their repair or removal; to require teachers in public and private schools to have at least one fire drill a month and instruct the pupils at least four times a year in the causes and dangers of fires; to make an annual report to the governor. For the purpose of enforcing the orders of the fire marshal suitable penalties and fines are provided and he and his deputy are empowered to administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses. If the state fire marshal shall be of the opinion that there is evidence sufficient to charge any person with the crime of arson or criminal conduct in connection with any fire he shall cause such person to be arrested. Provision is made for the appointment of a deputy fire marshal and of such other help as may be necessary. Reports are required to be made to the fire marshal by all chiefs of fire departments of each and every fire, and where there is no established fire department the report is to be made by the mayor of incorporated cities and towns, and by township clerks outside of incorporated cities and towns. An appropriation of \$14,500 a year is provided for defraying the expenses of the office.

Under the provisions of the law the board of dental examiners must hold one or more meetings annually for the examination of applicants for license. An applicant must be in possession of a diploma from a four years high school or its equivalent, also for a reputable dental school (reputable being construed to be a college that maintains a course equal to that recommended by the National Board of Dental Examiners.) No European diplomas are accepted. The fee for examination is \$20.00.

The passing grade is 80%. Practical examination in operative and prosthetic dentistry; written examination in anatomy, physiology, chemistry, pathology, therapeutics, materia medica, anaesthesia, histology, hygiene, bacteriology, prosthetic dentistry, oral surgery, metallurgy, operative dentistry, orthodontia and jurisprudence.

The fee for interchange license is \$25.00, for exchange certificate is \$5.00. Iowa has reciprocity with District of Columbia, Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, Kansas, Wisconsin, Tennessee, Illinois, Missouri and Vermont.

Upon the payment to the board of the fee of \$25.00 a renewal license is issued to any one who failed to record his license with the county clerk within six months after its issue.

Duplicate license is issued to any one whose license has been lost or destroyed; fee for same is \$2.00.

The dental board is under the law concerning boards and commissions which provides that all moneys collected must be turned into the state treasury each month. A bill for expenses and per diem must be rendered to the executive council each month.

The state historical society of Iowa was organized January, 1857. The objects of the society today are practically the same as set forth in its original constitution. "To preserve in authentic form a library of books, pamphlets, maps, charts, manuscripts, papers, paintings, statuary and other material illustrative of the history of Iowa, * * * to exhibit faithfully the antiquities and the past and present resources of the state; and to promote the study of history by lectures, and diffuse and publish information relating to the de-

scription and history of Iowa." The activities of the state historical society of Iowa are now largely confined to critical historical research and publication.

Since its organization the society has published three different quarterly magazines. From 1863 to 1874, inclusive, it published *The Annals of Iowa*, 12 volumes, now called the first series. From 1885 to 1902, inclusive, it published *The Iowa Historical Record*, 18 volumes. From 1903 to date the society has published *The Iowa Journal of History and Politics*, now in its seventeenth volume.

Numerous other publications have been issued by the society, the most important of which are the Messages and Proclamations of the Governors of Iowa, in seven volumes; *The Executive Journal of Iowa, 1838-1843*; the *Lucas Journal of the War of 1812*; six volumes in the *Iowa Economic History Series*; nine volumes in the *Iowa Biographical Series*; three volumes in the *Iowa Applied History Series*; two volumes in the *Iowa Social History Series*; the Proceedings of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Constitution of Iowa; a volume entitled *Amana*; *The Community of True Inspiration*; the Territorial Governors of the Old Northwest; the *Battle of Shiloh*; the *Hollanders of Iowa*; the *Quakers of Iowa*; the *History of Senatorial Elections in Iowa*; the *History of Township Government in Iowa*; four volumes on the *History of Education in Iowa*; *Third Party Movements Since the Civil War—With Special Reference to Iowa*; *Marches of the Dragoons in the Mississippi Valley*; *Old Fort Snelling*, and *The Spirit Lake Massacre*. The society has also issued a monthly series entitled *Iowa and War*, of which eighteen numbers have appeared.

The library of the society now contains over 52,000 titles. The membership of the society now includes about six hundred and fifty active members and twenty-four auxiliary members. One hundred and sixty public and college libraries within the state have been designated as official depositories for the publications of the society, and sixty libraries and institutions outside of the state have been designated as exchange depositories.

The law which provided for the organization of the Iowa Geological Survey outlined its work to be that of making "a complete survey of the natural resources of the state in their economic and scientific aspects, including the determination of the characteristics of the various formations and the investigation of the different ores, coals, clays, building stones and other useful materials."

The present geological survey was organized in 1892 and since that time has been engaged in two lines of research. The first of these is the detailed study of the geology of the state by counties. In this work all the natural features of interest and value are studied and described, such as the general character of the surface, its soils, water resources, deposits of valuable minerals and other like topics.

The second line of work has been that of special investigation of the minerals of the state. Thus the coal deposits have twice been studied and reported on and an extensive examination of the peat beds has been made. Similar studies have been made of the lead and zinc of the Dubuque region and of the gypsum field at Fort Dodge. The clays of the state and their qualities have been investigated and the availability and suitability for road and concrete purposes of the sand, gravel and limestone deposits have been determined. The survey has since its organization kept careful records of the deep wells of the state and has also carried on an investigation of the character of surface waters. A resource which will be of increasing importance as Iowa becomes more of an industrial state is that of water power, which has been closely studied for several years. A large amount of work remains yet to be done before our knowledge of the geology of the state is complete, as much of the earlier study was of necessity largely reconnaissance work and needs to be supplemented by the results of later work done under more favorable conditions.

For several years past the state survey has co-operated with the national survey in the making of topographic maps of the Des Moines valley. These maps show the character of the surface, the drainage, and elevations above sea level, as well as cultural features. They are of especial value in coal prospecting, engineering and drainage projects. Parts of Hamilton, Boone, Story, Dallas, Polk, Warren, Marion, Mahaska, Lucas, and Monroe counties have been covered. These maps are printed by the federal government and may be purchased at a cost of ten cents each from the United States Geological Survey or from the Iowa Geological Survey. They are bounded not by county lines but by meridians of longitude and parallels of latitude and each map covers about 225 square miles. Topographic surveys were made in the northeast part of Iowa by the United States Geological Survey a number of years ago and the maps covering this area are available also.

The directors for the odd-numbered districts are elected in the even-numbered years, and those for the even-numbered districts in the odd-numbered years.

Any resident of the state is eligible to membership in the society. The secretary will on application furnish information relating to membership.

The annual meeting begins on Tuesday before the second Wednesday in December of each year.

The society publishes an annual report full of valuable and interesting papers.

The object of this society is the promotion and encouragement of horticulture and arboriculture in the state by the collection and dissemination of practical information regarding the cultivation of such fruits, flowers and trees as are best adapted to the soil and climate of the state. The rooms of the society are kept open at all times for the reception of visitors. All communications on horticultural topics will be promptly answered by the secretary.

STATE FORESTRY COMMISSIONER.

WESLEY GREENE, of Scott county, secretary of the state horticultural society is ex officio state forestry commissioner. His address is Des Moines, Iowa. He serves as commissioner without compensation. The law authorizes him to appoint deputies to serve without salary for each county or group of counties, who shall assist him in the performance of his duties, and also make report to him annually of forestry matters for the use of the horticultural society.

The object of the law is to encourage the planting of forest and fruit trees in the state. The act provides that any person owning land in the state may plant or select a tract of land not less than two acres in area for a forest reservation, provided there shall not be less than two hundred forest trees growing on each acre and that cattle, horses, mules, sheep, goats and hogs are not permitted on said reservation.

A fruit reservation shall not be less than one or more than ten acres in area and can be claimed for a period of eight years after planting; provided that there are not less than forty apple trees, or seventy other fruit trees growing on each acre, under proper care.

Forest and fruit tree reservations are assessed at a taxable value of one dollar an acre.

Any landowner in this state wishing to enter a forest or fruit tree reservation, or both, should do so when the assessor is listing property for assessment.

Membership is not limited to those giving their time to the advancement of science either in teaching or in original research, but is open to those interested in scientific subjects.

Members of the academy are divided into four groups: (1) fellows, who shall be elected from residents of the state of Iowa actively engaged in scientific work; (2) associates, residents of the state of Iowa who are interested in

the progress of science, but not direct contributors to original research; (3) corresponding fellows, fellows who have moved outside the state, and (4) honorary fellows, to be elected by vote from original workers in science in other states.

Papers of general interest in addition to those that are technically scientific are presented at each annual meeting.

Meetings are held each spring, time and place being fixed by the executive committee.

The academy publishes each year a volume containing a report of the proceedings of the annual meeting and the papers which have been presented at that time.

SUPREME COURT OF IOWA.

ORGANIZATION.

The supreme court consists of seven judges, four of whom constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but one alone may adjourn from day to day, or to a particular day, or until the next term.

The judge whose term first expires is the chief justice, and so on in rotation, except when the term of two of the justices expire at the same time the senior in age serves first as chief justice.

JURISDICTION.

The supreme court has appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery and constitutes a court for the correction of errors at law. It has appellate jurisdiction over all judgments and decisions of all courts of records, except as otherwise provided by law.

An appeal may also be taken to the supreme court from:

1. An order made affecting a substantial right in an action, when such order, in effect, determines the action and prevents a judgment from which an appeal might be taken;
2. A final order made in special actions affecting a substantial right therein, or made on a summary application in an action after judgment;
3. An order which grants or refuses, continues or modifies a provisional remedy; grants or refuses, dissolves or refuses to dissolve an injunction or attachment; or grants or refuses a new trial; or sustains or overrules a demurrer;
4. An intermediate order involving the merits or materially affecting the final decision;
5. An order or judgment on habeas corpus.

If any of the above orders or judgments are made or rendered by a judge, the same are reviewable, the same as if made by a court.

*will be chief justice after January 1, 1920.

The supreme court has power to issue all writs and processes necessary to secure justice to parties, and to enforce its appellate jurisdiction, and it may exercise supervisory control over all inferior judicial tribunals.

It may enforce its mandates upon inferior courts and officers by fine and imprisonment, which imprisonment may continue until mandates are obeyed.

TERMS.

There are three regular terms in each year, held as follows, to-wit: The first term beginning with the second Tuesday in January and ending with the first Monday of May; the second beginning with the first Tuesday after the first Monday in May and ending with the third Monday of September, and the third beginning with the first Tuesday after the third Monday of September and ending with the third Saturday of December.

The time allotted to each term is divided as nearly as practicable into periods of four weeks each, the first part of each period is devoted to the argument and submission of cases, and the second to consultation and the preparation of opinions. Cases assigned for each period are called in their order as shown on the term docket but no more submissions are taken for one period than in the judgment of the court can be properly considered and determined before the next succeeding session. All causes on the docket are heard at each term unless continued or otherwise disposed of by order of court.

The regular public sessions of the court are held in the supreme court room at the capitol, commencing at 9 o'clock A. M., standard time. On Tuesday and Friday of the first and second week of each four weeks' period submission of motions are taken before calling the calendar. Motions noticed for a day when the court is not sitting are taken on the next motion day on which the court sits.

Judgments of affirmance, rulings and orders in causes submitted and orders authorized by law may be made and entered by the court at any time regardless of the term of court.

APPEALS IN CIVIL CASES.

Appeals from the superior and district courts may be taken to the supreme court at any time within six months from the rendition of the judgment or order appealed from, and not afterwards. No appeal shall be taken in any cause in which the amount in controversy between the parties, as shown by the pleadings does not exceed one hundred dollars, unless the trial judge shall, during the term in which judgment is entered, certify that the cause is one in which the appeal should be allowed, and upon certificate being filed the same shall be appealable regardless of the amount in controversy, but this limitation shall not affect the right of appeal in any action in which an interest in real estate is involved, nor shall the right of appeal be affected by the remission of any part of the verdict or judgment returned or rendered.

APPEALS IN CRIMINAL CASES.

Appeals from the final judgment of the district court may be taken in all criminal cases within six months after the judgment is rendered; and either the defendant or the state may appeal. Upon appeal the supreme court may affirm, reverse or modify the judgment or render such judgment as the district court should have done. It may order a new trial or reduce the punishment, but cannot increase it. If the state appeals, the court cannot reverse or modify the judgment so as to increase the punishment, but may affirm it and shall point out any error in the proceedings and its decision shall be obligatory as law.

SALARY.

The salary of each justice is six thousand dollars (\$6,000) a year. Each general assembly also appropriates sufficient funds for the payment of stenographers, bailiffs and such other incidental expenses as may be incurred by the court.

THE DISTRICT COURTS OF IOWA.

There are at the present time sixty-four judges of the district court of the state of Iowa. The state is divided into twenty-one judicial districts and each district is entitled to from one to five judges, the number being fixed by statute. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary of \$3,500. Each judge appoints a shorthand reporter, who receives \$3 per day for each day's attendance upon said court, and in case the per diem does not equal \$1,000, then the county or counties composing the district make up the deficiency in proportion to the number of days of court held in such county or counties.

The following is the section of the code governing the jurisdiction of the district court:

SECTION 225. *Jurisdiction—civil, criminal, probate—successor of circuit court.* The district court shall have general original and exclusive jurisdiction of all actions, proceedings and remedies, both civil and criminal, except in cases where exclusive or concurrent jurisdiction is or may hereafter be conferred upon some other court or tribunal by the constitution and laws of the state, and shall have and exercise all the powers usually possessed and exercised by courts of record. It shall also possess and exercise jurisdiction in all appeals and writs of error taken in civil and criminal actions and special proceedings authorized to be taken from all inferior courts, tribunals, boards or officers, under any provisions of the laws of this state, and shall have a general supervision thereof, in all matters, to prevent and correct abuses, where no other remedy is provided.

First. The district court of each county shall have original and exclusive jurisdiction to probate the wills of, and to grant administration upon the estates of, all persons who at the time of their death were residents of the county and of non-residents of the state who die leaving property within the county subject to administration, or whose property is afterwards brought into the county.

Second. To appoint guardians of the persons and property of all persons resident in the county subject to guardianship.

Third. To appoint guardians of the property of all such persons non-residents of the state who have property within the county subject to guardianship, or whose property is afterwards brought into the county.

Fourth. It shall have jurisdiction in all matters in relation to the appointment of executors and trustees, and the management and disposition of the property of and settlement of such estates; *provided*, that where jurisdiction has heretofore been acquired, the same shall be retained until such estate is closed.

The district court shall succeed to and exercise full authority and jurisdiction over the records of the circuit court, and may enforce all judgments, decrees and orders thereof in the same manner and to the same extent as it may exercise like jurisdiction and authority over its own records, and for the purpose of the issuance of process, and of any and all other acts necessary to the due and efficient enforcement of the orders, judgments and decrees of the circuit courts the records thereof shall be deemed records of the district court.

Transcripts and process from the judgments, decrees and records of the circuit court shall be issued by the clerk of the district court and under the seal of his office.

SUPERIOR COURTS.

The statutes provide that any city containing four thousand inhabitants, whether organized under a special charter or under the general law for incorporation of cities and towns, may establish a superior court. There are at present seven of such courts, located respectively in the cities of Council

Bluffs, Cedar Rapids, Grinnell, Keokuk, Oelwein, Perry and Shenandoah. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary of \$2,000, which is paid quarterly, the first two quarters being paid from the city treasury and the last two quarters from the county treasury of the county in which said court is located.

The judges of the superior courts appoint a shorthand reporter, who receives five dollars per day for each day's attendance upon said court.

The following is a copy of the section of the code, as amended, governing the jurisdiction of the superior court:

SECTION 260. *Jurisdiction—attachments of real estates—city prisons used.*
Said court shall have jurisdiction concurrent with the district court in all civil matters, except in probate matters and actions for divorce, alimony and separate maintenance. It shall have exclusive original jurisdiction to try and determine all actions, civil and criminal, for the violation of city ordinances, and all jurisdiction conferred on police courts as now or as may hereafter be provided by law, and concurrent jurisdiction with justices of the peace. Writs of errors and appeals may be taken thereto from justices' courts in the township in which the court is held, and, by consent of parties, from any other township in the county. For the trial of criminal actions on information and complaint, the court shall be open at such times and under such rules as it shall prescribe. In actions by attachment, where real property is levied on by writ of attachment, the officer levying the writ shall make entry thereof in the incumbrance book in the office of the clerk of the district court, in like manner and with like effect as of levies made in the district court. Parties may be committed to the city prison for confinement or punishment, instead of the county jail, at the option of the judge. In the absence of the judge, or in case of his inability to act, then, during such time, proceedings for the violation of city ordinances may be had before a justice of the peace, residing in such city.

Superior courts shall have original concurrent jurisdiction with the district courts of the state of Iowa, in all matters pertaining to the detention and treatment of dipsomaniacs, inebriates and those addicted to the excessive use of narcotics, as provided in title XII, chapter 2-a of the supplement to the code, 1907, and the same proceeding shall be held so far as applicable. Whenever the words "district judge," "district court" or "judge of the district court" appear in title XII, chapter 2-a the same shall be construed to apply to the superior courts or the judge thereof to the same extent that the same applies to the district court or the judge thereof.

On July 1, 1909, the management and control of the State University, the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, and the Iowa State Teachers College was assumed by the Iowa State Board of Education. This board consists of nine members, who are appointed by the governor and confirmed by the senate, under the provisions of an act of the thirty-third general assembly, approved by the governor March 29, 1909, and effective on publication. By chapter 141 of the acts of the thirty-fourth general assembly, the College for the Blind was placed under the control of this board, and the thirty-seventh general assembly transferred the supervision of the School for the Deaf from the Board of Control of State Institutions to the State Board of Education. Under the provisions of the law, not more than five members of the board may be members of the same political party; and

not more than one alumnus from each of the institutions may be members of the board. As required by the act, three of the members of the board were appointed for two years, three for four years, and three for six years. Subsequent appointments on the board, except to fill vacancies, are to be for terms of six years. Offices at the seat of the state government are to be furnished the board by the executive council, and the board also maintains an office at each of the three institutions. Members of the board are not required to give bond; and they are to receive a compensation of ten dollars per day for the time actually employed in the performance of their duties not exceeding sixty days in any one year, and are also allowed traveling expenses. The board is required to have four regular meetings each year and may hold additional ones on the call of the president or secretary. The duties of the board as set out in the act as follows:

Sec. 4. The state board of education shall have power to elect a president from its members; a president and treasurer for each of said educational institutions, and professors, instructors, officers and employes; to fix the compensation to be paid to such officers and employes; to make rules and regulations for the government of said schools, not inconsistent with the laws of the state; to manage and control the property, both real and personal, belonging to said educational institutions; to execute trusts or other obligations now or hereafter committed to the institutions; to direct the expenditure of all appropriations the general assembly shall, from time to time, make to said institutions, and the expenditure of any other moneys; and to do such other acts as are necessary and proper for the execution of the powers and duties conferred upon them by law. * * *

Members of the board choose, from outside their own membership, a finance committee of three members, not more than two of whom shall be members of the same political party. Each member of the finance committee receives a compensation of thirty-six hundred dollars a year, and serves for three years unless sooner removed by the board. The board designates one of the finance committee as chairman and one as secretary, and the secretary of this committee also serves as secretary of the board. The secretary has charge of the general offices and of all books and papers of the board at the seat of government. The members of the committee, in addition to their salaries, are entitled to mileage and necessary expenses. Each member of the finance committee is required to file a bond in the sum of \$25,000, which is to be approved by the governor. The members of the finance committee are required to visit each of the institutions once a month, and to familiarize themselves with the work there being done.

The State University of Iowa, established February 25, 1847.

An act of congress, July 20, 1840, authorized the secretary of the treasury to set apart and reserve from sale of lands in the territory of Iowa for the use and support of a university to be established when Iowa should become a state. In 1846 Iowa was admitted into the union with a constitution which provided that the general assembly should take measures to care for the lands granted and for the application of the income to support the university. In accordance with this provision the first general assembly on February 25, 1847, passed an act establishing and locating at Iowa City a state university. The capitol building and the land upon which it stood were donated to the university in view of the contemplated removal of the seat of government from Iowa.

City. Delay in removing the capital prevented the opening of the institution until March, 1855. The organization of departments began in the same year. From 1858 until 1860, owing to the lack of funds, the normal department was the only one in operation, and the university was reorganized in 1860. The law department was established in 1868, the medical department in 1870, the homeopathic medical department in 1876, the dental department in 1882, the department of pharmacy in 1885, the graduate college in 1900, the college of applied science in 1905, the college of fine arts, or Mark Ranney memorial institute of fine arts, in 1911 (discontinued in 1913), and the college of education in 1913. In the course of the evolution of the university the various departments became, and now are, colleges.

From 1847 to 1870 the management of the university was in the hands of trustees, elected throughout most of the period by the legislature. In 1870 the legislature substituted a board of regents, consisting, aside from *ex-officio* members, of one member from each congressional district. In 1909, pursuant to an act of the thirty-third general assembly, the control of the state university of Iowa, together with that of the Iowa state teachers' college and the Iowa state college of agriculture and mechanic arts, passed into the hands of a state board of education.

The state university of Iowa is an integral part of the public school system of the state. As contemplated in its establishment, the work of the university is based upon the preparation afforded by the duly accredited high schools of the state, whose students are admitted to the undergraduate and professional courses upon the presentation of the proper certificates—except in the colleges of medicine and law, which require two years of collegiate work in preparation. The state, through the university, undertakes to furnish instruction in the various branches requisite for an education in the liberal arts, law, medicine, dentistry, pharmacy, fine arts, nursing, commerce, engineering, etc. It also aims to encourage research work in all departments.

The university embraces the following colleges and schools:

The Graduate College;

The College of Liberal Arts;

The College of Law;

The College of Medicine;

The College of Homeopathic Medicine;

The College of Dentistry.

The College of Pharmacy;

The College of Applied Science;

The College of Education;

The School of Commerce;

The Schools for Nurses (Medical and Homeopathic Medical).

The School of Music.

Integral parts of the institution are also: The summer Session, including the Iowa Lakeside Laboratory at Lake Okoboji, the School for Library Training.

The Graduate College unites the university's equipment for advanced study and research, its courses beginning where the courses in the other colleges end. It offers work leading to the degrees of M. A., M. S., and Ph. D.

The College of Liberal Arts is the center around which the university has grown. It offers upwards of three hundred liberal and vocational courses in the arts and sciences, these courses leading to the degree of B. A., and B. S., the latter only in connection with combined courses in liberal arts and professional studies (see below).

The College of Law offers a course of three years leading to the degree of LL. B. For admission two years of study in a liberal arts college are required.

The College of Medicine offers a course of four years leading to the degree of M. D. The college is recognized by the American Medical Association in "Class A." Two years of liberal arts study are required for admission.

The College of Homeopathic Medicine offers a course of four years, leading to the degree of M. D. Its departments of surgery, obstetrics and gynecology,

ophthalmology, etc., materia medica, and theory and practice of medicine have been established by statute. Its other departments (anatomy, physiology, bacteriology, etc.) are shared with the College of Medicine.

The College of Dentistry offers a course of four years leading to the degree of D. D. S. The college is one of the six leading dental colleges in the country which meet the standards of the Dental Faculties Association of American Universities.

The College of Pharmacy offers a two years' course leading to the degree of Ph. G., and a three years' course leading to the degree of Ph. C.

The College of Applied Science offers courses in civil, sanitary, mechanical, electrical and general engineering, and in chemistry. These are each of four years and lead to the degree of B. E. A five-year course is also arranged. Advanced degrees are given in C. E., M. E., etc.

The College of Education unites the various facilities of the university for the training of teachers, with special reference to administrative work and the higher positions. Its courses lead to the certificate of the College of Education.

The School of Commerce, established in September, 1914, is organized within the College of Liberal Arts and its course leads to the degree of B. S. in Commerce.

The Schools for Nurses are two in number, one conducted in the university hospital under the direction of the faculty of the College of Medicine, the other in the university of homeopathic hospital under the direction of the faculty of the College of Homeopathic Medicine.

The School of Music is a part of the College of Liberal Arts. It offers courses in piano, voice, pipe organ, violin, band instruments, and in the history and theory of music.

The Summer Session of two terms, one of six weeks, from June 16 to July 26, the other four weeks, from July 28 to August 23, is a regular session of the university. The session also includes the Iowa Lakeside Laboratory and the School for Library Training.

"Combined courses" in Liberal Arts and professional studies permit the attainment in a shortened period of the double degrees of B. S. or B. A. and M. D.; B. A. and LL. B.; B. S. and D. D. S.; B. S. and B. E.; and D. D. S. and M. D.

This college was formally opened on March 17, 1869. Provision for maintaining its scope of work was given by state and federal legislation. In 1858 the state legislature first provided for the establishment of such an institution. In 1862 congress provided for the support of instruction in agriculture and the mechanic arts in each state, under certain provisions. In the same year the general assembly of Iowa accepted the federal grant and thus entered into contract with the United States government. In later years other federal and state legislation has increased the support of the institution and has enlarged and strengthened its work along its special lines.

The college is governed by the state board of education consisting of nine members appointed by the governor. The work of the college is conducted along the following five major lines:

Agriculture, Engineering, Home Economics, Industrial Science, Veterinary Medicine.

GRADUATE AND UNDER GRADUATE COURSES.

In each of these five major lines stated above, collegiate and graduate instruction is given, leading to Bachelor's, Master's and Doctor's degrees.

Graduate instruction is adapted to the needed requirements of candidates for different degrees. Undergraduate or collegiate instruction is given in four-year, five-year, and six-year courses offered in the different divisions of the college, and jointly between divisions. Graduate and undergraduate courses are fully described in the college catalog, and include courses in agricultural education, agricultural engineering, animal husbandry, ceramics, chemical engineering, dairying, electrical engineering, farm crops and soils, farm management, forestry, home economics, horticulture, industrial science, mechanical engineering, mining engineering, structure design, and veterinary medicine.

NON-COLLEGIATE COURSE.

These courses are offered especially for young men and women who have not completed the requirements for admission to collegiate courses. They include two year courses in Agriculture, vocational work in Engineering, Home Economics, Rural Structure Design, and one year courses in Dairying, Bee-keeping, and Livestock Management.

SUMMER SESSION.

The summer session is divided into two six weeks periods in which some courses especially adapted to public school teachers are offered, including work in Agriculture, Home Economics, Manual Training, Industrial Science, and Vocational Education, work for rural and grade teachers. Special attention is given to collegiate and graduate courses.

WINTER SHORT COURSES.

These are given at different times on different subjects with one special week known as Short Course or Convention Week.

ENROLLMENT.

Total attendance in 1917-18 was 5,397, divided as follows: Industrial Science, 85; Agricultural (collegiate) 703; Agricultural Engineering, 42; Engineering, (collegiate) 532; Graduate Division, 103; Home Economics, (collegiate) 614; Veterinary Medicine, 111; Summer School, 419; Non-collegiate Agriculture, 198; Non-collegiate Engineering, 121; Non-collegiate Home Economics, 36; Non-collegiate Music, 19; Winter Short Course, 2,504; Six-week Garden Club, Leader's Course, 9.

OPENING AND CLOSING DATES.

The first quarter opens September 22, 1919, and closes December 19, 1919. The second quarter opens December 27, 1919, and closes March 13, 1920. The third quarter opens March 22, 1920, and closes June 4, 1920. The summer session is given in two halves beginning June 14, 1920, and closing August 26, 1920.

AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION.

Charles Franklin Curtiss, B. Sc., D. S., Director, Ames.

The Iowa Agricultural Experiment Station was established in accordance with an act of congress, approved March 2, 1887, for the purpose of aiding "In acquiring and diffusing among the people of the United States useful and practical information on subjects connected with agriculture, and to promote scientific investigation and experiments respecting the principles and application of agricultural science."

This station derives its support in part from the national government and in part from the state, as follows: For the year 1917-1918 from the national government, \$20,000.00, from the state \$151,206.78; the latter amount includes the purchase price of the Patten farm at Charles City, Iowa.

The work of the Agricultural Experiment Station now includes the following lines of investigation: Farm crops and soils, farm management, animal husbandry, horticulture and forestry, agricultural engineering, botany, dairying, entomology, chemistry, bacteriology, rural sociology, and agricultural economics. The results of investigations and experiments along these lines are published in bulletins and circulars which are distributed free to all residents of the state who apply for them. During the biennial period ending June 30, 1918 the Agricultural Experiment Station published sixteen (16) regular bulletins, sixteen (16) research bulletins, twenty-five (25) circulars, four (4) soil reports and five (5) miscellaneous bulletins, making a total of sixty-six (66) bulletins.

In the first year of the biennium, the number of publications distributed was 409,336. In the second year the number amounted to 458,441, making a total of 867,777 publications distributed during the last biennial period.

The work in the Agricultural Experiment Station is of direct service to the agricultural interests in the state and nation. The results of experiment station investigations serve as the basis for agricultural instruction from the standpoint of both the college and extension work. It is now universally recognized that little progress can be made by agricultural colleges, either in teaching their students or in carrying information directly to farmers, until definite data has been secured concerning the scientific and practical problems which constitute the basis of our present day agriculture.

ENGINEERING EXPERIMENT STATION.

Including Good Roads Experimentation.

Anson Marston, C. E., Director, Ames.

The Engineering Experiment Station was established at the Iowa State College by the legislature of Iowa in 1904 to afford a service, through scientific investigations, evolution of new devices and methods, educational information on technical subjects and tests and analysis of materials; for the manufacturing and other engineering population and industries of Iowa; for the agricultural industries of the state in the solution of their engineering problems; for the urban and rural population of the state in the solution of the engineering problems of urban and rural life.

From the first the station has carried on original investigations along lines of vital interest to the people of Iowa, including drainage, sewerage and sewage disposal, water supply, roads and road traffic, pavements, bridges, clay products, concrete materials and other materials of construction, lighting, steam and electric power, engineering economics and others. The results have been published in more than fifty bulletins for free distribution. Any of these bulletins not out of print will be sent free upon request addressed to Director Anson Marston, Engineering Experiment Station, Ames, Iowa.

The station has given special attention to water supply, sewerage and lighting for farm homes.

Twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) annually is available for station work.

For many years the station has made tests and analysis of construction and other materials for state departments, counties, townships, cities, factories, corporations and individual citizens of Iowa. The charges for such tests are at least equal to those charged by responsible commercial testing laboratories, as the station will not assume the role of competitor with commercial laboratories. The station stands ready to make check tests or to act as final authority on questions of this nature, but would prefer that all routine tests be made by outside laboratories. The amount and character of the testing work is so restricted as not to interfere seriously with the investigational work.

VETERINARY INVESTIGATIONS.

C. H. Stange, Dean.

This work was organized under provisions made by the thirty-fifth general assembly. Considerable information concerning hemorrhagic septicemia in cat-

tle has been secured, a serum produced and a number of herds treated. Other diseases have been studied and much time has been given to hog cholera and complications of this disease.

EXTENSION WORK.

R. A. Pearson, President.

The extension work of the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts is divided into two branches—agricultural extension and engineering extension.

AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION.

R. K. Bliss, Director.

The agricultural extension work was established permanently by enactment of the thirty-first general assembly of Iowa. This act provided for giving lectures and demonstrations on the growing of crops and fruits, on stock raising, dairying, land drainage and kindred subjects, including domestic science. Specific mention was made in this act on instruction in corn and stock judging at the agricultural fairs, institutes and clubs and aid in conducting short courses of instruction at suitable places throughout the state.

ENGINEERING EXTENSION.

D. C. Faber, Acting Director.

The thirty-fifth general assembly of Iowa provided an appropriation for the establishment of engineering extension and trade school work. Two-year courses in trades and industry are conducted at the college for young men wishing to prepare themselves for expert positions in industrial lines. Short courses of instruction and technical institutes are conducted in industrial centers. Technical information is supplied municipalities and civic organizations. Bulletins of information are issued from time to time.

HOG CHOLERA SERUM PLANT.

C. H. Stange, Director.

This work was started under an appropriation of \$35,000 made by the thirty-fifth general assembly for the production of biological products, especially hog cholera serum. The plant is self-supporting. Permanent buildings have been erected. Up to December 31, 1918, 25,730,357 cubic centimeters of serum had been produced. This serum was used in treating 10,091 herds.

STATE APIARIST.

Appointed by the State Board of Education. Term at pleasure of Board. Appropriation \$1,500 annually.

F. Erick Millen, of Ames, Story County.

By an act of the thirty-seventh general assembly of Iowa, the state board of education was authorized to appoint a state apiarist to work under the supervision of the director of agricultural extension and professor of entomology of Iowa State College. Previous to July 1, 1917, the duties of this office were carried by the inspector of bees, who was appointed by the governor.

It is the duty of the apiarist to give lectures and demonstrations in the state of Iowa on the production of honey, the care of the apiary, the marketing of honey, and upon other kindred subjects relative to the care of bees and the profitable production of honey. Also, upon request the apiarist shall examine the bees in a locality suspected of being affected with any of the contagious diseases common to bees. It is the duty of the apiarist to furnish the owner of the bees, without cost, written instructions in regard to the nature of the disease and the best methods of treating it. It is a misdemeanor of anyone to fail to properly take care of a colony of diseased bees or in other ways cause the spread of contagious diseases among bees.

The state apiarist also is required to make an annual report to the governor, stating the number of apiaries visited, number of demonstrations held, number of lectures given, the number of examinations made upon the request of the beekeepers, together with such other matters of general interest concerning the business of bookkeeping.

This institution was founded in 1876 as a school for the instruction and training of teachers for the public schools. It used the title of Iowa State Normal School from 1876 to 1909 and since that time the title Iowa State Teachers College, authorized by an act of the general assembly. It is a college in its standards as to graduating with a degree from its courses, though it admits and instructs teachers and grants diplomas of special varieties for all classes of teachers, rural and elementary, needed by the public schools. For admission to college courses, graduation from an accredited high school is required. For admission to sub-collegiate courses and rural teachers work an elementary education is required. For information regarding courses and organization of the institution see another page in this publication.

The institution is organized to give teacher education and training and does not undertake any other kind of educational work. Its courses are planned to give efficiency and capability to the students as workers in public schools. Its field of service grants preparation to high school teachers, to elementary and primary teachers, and to all kinds of special teachers now demanded by the public schools of the state. Its plan is that of a vocational school and everything that is done has a bearing upon the training of young men and women for service in the system of public education maintained in the state. Its degree graduates are admitted without conditions to the graduate schools of the universities and its alumni hold important positions in public service in every state where they are employed. Its diplomas are Bachelor of Arts in Education, Special Teacher Diplomas such as Primary, Junior College, Kindergarten, Art, Public School Music, Manual Arts, Home Economics, Physical Education, Commercial, Rural Education, Rural Teacher and Normal Course. In addition music teachers are granted diplomas for piano, organ, violin and voice.

The college year is divided into four quarters of twelve weeks each and a class graduates at the end of each quarter, thus giving much flexibility to the courses and a superior opportunity for candidates for graduation in their practice in teaching in the training schools. The training schools are located on the campus—all grades being organized from the kindergarten to the senior in the high school—in the school buildings in the Cedar Falls and East Waterloo city schools and in seven civil township systems in Black Hawk county. The expanse of this organization gives unusual opportunities for practical development and for the acquiring of capability in instruction. Students are able to be admitted at the opening of each quarter and by continuous attendance can complete a four year college course in three calendar years.

The enrollment of students and training schools in 1917-18 was as follows: College Graduates, 88; College Course Students, 472; Two and Three Year Diploma Course Students, 1071; Special Students, 81; Sub-Collegiate and Rural Teacher Students, 1597; Special Music Students, 124; Extension Summer School Students, 1917, 338; Total enrolled in Institution, 3,767. Training Schools: Campus High Schools and Grades, 352; City High School and Grades,

498; Rural Demonstration Schools, 585; Consolidated Schools, 804. Total Pupils, 2249.

The extension service consists of Saturday classes meeting in the several counties of the state, receiving all day instruction in the subjects and topics approved by the county superintendent and continuing from month to month and from year to year for the improvement in scholarship and methods of the teachers in service. In 1917-18 there were 16,665 teachers enrolled in the study center classes. Credit Extension Classes are organized in the cities and towns where 15 students can be secured for one class in a college subject. In 1917-18, 372 were so enrolled as students.

The value of the permanent improvements and equipments is estimated to be \$1,500,000.00. This annual support, granted by the state in 1917-18, and including balance on hand at the opening of the year was \$510,885.81. The income from all other sources such as laboratory fees, hospital fees, student tuitions, etc., was \$92, 395.43.

The income for the support of this institution, and to meet the ordinary and current expenses, including the compensation of officials, teachers and other employees, the purchase of food, supplies, clothing, furniture and furnishings, books, maps, apparatus, and other expenses, is \$24.00 a month for nine months of each year for each resident pupil actually supported by the school. Whenever the average number of pupils in any month is less than 275, the school is entitled to draw \$6,600.00 from the State Treasury.

Therefore, the regular annual appropriation for the support of this institution is not less than \$59,400.00.

Every resident not less than five or more than twenty-one years of age too deaf to be educated in the common schools, and every such person who is over twenty-one and under thirty-five years of age who has the consent of the board of control, is entitled to receive an education in the institution at the expense of the state. Non-residents similarly situated may be entitled to an education therein upon the payment of sixty-six dollars quarterly in advance.

The session of the school begins the first day of October and continues until the last day of June of each year. Pupils should come promptly at the beginning and remain until the end of the session.

The aim and purpose of this institution is purely educational. The literary work covers a period of twelve years and is outlined similar to the work done in the public school, having a fully accredited high school. The department of music is supplied with a number of pianos, one pipe organ, and a number of stringed instruments. All students who have talent in music are given a thorough course in this department. All students are required to do work in the industrial department. The girls are taught knitting, crocheting, fancy-work, hand and machine sewing, and domestic science. The boys are taught netting, weaving, broom making, cane seating, manual training and piano tuning. These advantages are free to all blind children of school age and those who have vision so defective as to prevent them from attending the public schools, providing they are mentally normal. The school year begins the first Wednesday in September and closes the last week in May. For further information address the superintendent.

The Board of Control of State Institutions was created under the provisions of chapter 113, laws of the twenty-seventh general assembly, which with the amendments thereto, clothes the board with full power to manage, control and govern, subject only to the limitations contained in the act, the following named institutions:

The board is required to inspect county and private institutions in which insane persons are kept, associations and societies receiving friendless children and detention homes provided for juvenile offenders.

Prior to July 1, 1898, the foregoing state institutions, except the reformatory and penitentiary were in charge of separate boards, each of which had its officers and each had a secretary and treasurer.

The board of control was organized on April 6, 1898, and took full control, as provided by statute, on July 1, 1898, of the institutions subject to its control. At that time the various boards of trustees and commissioners ceased to exist.

The board publishes quarterly a bulletin of over one hundred pages, devoted to the scientific investigation of the treatment of insanity and epilepsy and the feeble-minded, and information embodying the experience of soldiers' homes, charitable, reformatory and penal institutions in this and other countries.

As provided by law, under the direction of the board the state institutions under its control are supplied with goods for their support on competitive bids, thus procuring proper supplies at the lowest market prices. An opportunity to bid is afforded anyone who asks for it.

The board is required to investigate the management and financial condition of the state institutions under its control to determine questions as to the sanity of patients in state hospitals, and to determine when persons shall be admitted to them as state charges, and is required to divide the state into hospital districts. It is required to make biennial reports to the governor and legislature showing the cost of operating the institutions for the preceding two years and to visit all institutions twice each year. Some member of the board or its agent is also required to visit each hospital once each month. It is required to meet the superintendents and other heads of institutions in quarterly conferences, to gather statistics, to publish a bulletin, to require official bonds of certain institution officers, to make a semi-annual invoice of all the stores of the institutions, to fix annually the salaries of officers and employees not fixed by law, and to appoint a state architect and perform other duties provided by law.

The United States government pays to the state of Iowa the sum of \$100 per year for each male inmate of the soldiers' home who served in any war in which the United States was engaged, which amount is used as a part of the support fund of the institution.

Persons who have sufficient means for their own support may be admitted to the home on payment of the cost of their support, which cost shall be fixed from time to time by the board of control of state institutions. Provided, however, that no person having sufficient means for his or her own support shall be received or permitted to remain in the home unless there be room for all eligible applicants who do not have such means, but pension money received by any member of the home from the United States government shall not be taken from him for his support in the home.

The regular appropriation by the state is \$22 per month for each member, and \$10 per month for each officer and employe not a member of the home.

There is in connection with this institution a school building, pleasant, commodious and well lighted, and it is the policy of the board to have the course of instruction of a high standard. A kindergarten is operated for the very young pupils.

The age limit beyond which children are not kept in the home is sixteen years. Fewer than 20 per cent remain to the age limit.

A library of well selected juvenile literature is a source of pleasure and profitable entertainment to the children, as from necessity their pastimes and pleasures are somewhat circumscribed.

It is the aim to provide the children with plenty of good, comfortable clothing, and to have them taught to take care of the same. All their clothing is manufactured at the home, the large girls assisting in its manufacture. The table is supplied with a good variety of plain, wholesome food and a reasonable amount of luxuries.

The home is supported by a regular appropriation of \$25 per month for each inmate and the actual transportation charges of inmates to and from the institution. Each county is liable to the state for the support of its children to the extent of \$7.50 per month, except soldiers' orphans, who are cared for at the expense of the state.

It further aims to provide a home for those who are not susceptible of mental culture, relying wholly on others to supply their simple wants.

There is appropriated for the support of these schools the sum of \$24.00 monthly for each boy and \$18.00 monthly for each girl inmate.

The object of the institutions is the reformation of juvenile delinquents. They are not prisons but compulsory educational institutions where wayward boys and girls are brought under the influence of Christian instructors and

taught by example, as well as precept, the better ways of life and where the moral, intellectual and industrial education of the child is carried on at one and the same time.

Any boy or girl over ten and under eighteen years of age, excepting married women, prostitutes, or any girl who is pregnant, found guilty in any court of record of any crime excepting that of murder, may be ordered committed, if a boy to the school at Eldora, and if a girl to the school at Mitchellville. Any boy or girl may be discharged, or paroled from the school, at any time after one year's training, upon satisfactory evidence or reformation. They may also in exceptional cases be paroled or discharged in less than one year.

The prisoners of the penal institutions are employed largely on state work, quite a number being employed on construction work at other institutions, and in the building and improving of highways adjacent to the institutions. The large farm at Clive, purchased as a custodial farm, was turned over to the board of control and has been operated as an industry by prisoners from Ft. Madison.

The manufacture of chairs at the penitentiary and butter tubs at the reformatory, has given employment to about 200 men, with very satisfactory results.

CENTRAL COLLEGE—PELLA, IOWA.

In the fall of 1854 the academic department of Central University of Iowa opened for work, and by 1861 freshmen, sophomore and junior classes in the collegiate department were doing regular work. During 1861-62 one hundred twenty-three professors and students enlisted in the army. Since that time the college has had a varied and checkered career, with many ups and downs, but has steadily continued its work and has constantly strengthened and enlarged it.

In religious affiliation the institution was for sixty-three years Baptist. In June, 1916, it passed under the control of the Reformed Church of America. It is governed by a self-perpetuating board of trustees. Rev. B. F. Brinkman of Pella, is president of the board of trustees. Rev. Milton J. Hoffman, D. D., is president of the institution. The college maintains the regular work, leading to the liberal arts degree; departments emphasizing vocational training and meeting the state regulations concerning these departments; Central Academy, offering the four-year course including work in Normal Training for the grade and rural schools of Iowa, and commercial work. Central Conservatory of Music offers work leading to the degree of Bachelor of Music and to a teacher's certificate for public school work.

For the year 1917-18 the number of students of college grade is 66, the total attendance being 212.

BIOGRAPHIES OF STATE OFFICERS.

WILLIAM L. HARDING.

Twenty-second Governor of state of Iowa, was born in Osceola county, on his father's farm, October 3, 1877. His parents were natives of Pennsylvania and came to Iowa in 1872. Secured a common school education and later entered the law school of the state university of South Dakota from which place he graduated in 1905. Began the practice of law at Sioux City the same year and in 1906 became candidate for a member of the house of representatives; was elected and chosen to succeed himself in 1908 and again in 1910, serving in the thirty-second, thirty-third and thirty-fourth general assemblies. Married January 9, 1907, to Miss Carrie Lamoreaux. Was elected lieutenant-governor in 1912 and re-elected in 1914. Elected governor in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

ERNEST R. MOORE.

Lieutenant-governor, was born in Anamosa, Jones county, Iowa, November 1, 1868. He moved to Cedar Rapids, Iowa, with his parents in 1877 and has since resided in that city. He is of Scotch-Irish stock, his parents settling in Iowa in the early fifties. Received his education in the common and high schools of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, supplemented by private instruction. Served about ten years in the Iowa National Guard, resigning in 1897. On the outbreak of the Spanish-American war he enlisted as a private in Company C, Forty-ninth Iowa, and was afterwards commissioned as first lieutenant and quartermaster. Is a banker by profession, being president of the American Trust and Savings Bank, of Cedar Rapids, Iowa. Married December 25th, 1901, to Winifred Evans. Four children, Jane, Ruey, Betty and Bob, complete the family. Has been active in republican politics for twenty years. Was a delegate to the republican national convention at Chicago in 1908. Elected representative in 1906, re-elected in 1908 and 1910. Elected lieutenant-governor Nov. 7, 1916, re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

WALTER C. RAMSAY.

Secretary of State, was born in Ford county, Illinois, August 15, 1878. His parents were natives of Ohio, both being of Scotch-Irish lineage. Received his early education in the graded schools of Paxton, Illinois, and the high school at Owatonna, Minnesota. He came to Iowa in 1895, locating at Garner, Hancock county. Taught a country school four years and moved to Belmont, Wright county, Iowa, in 1901, and engaged in newspaper work. Served as postmaster, mayor and on the school board of Belmont and as chief clerk of the Iowa house of representatives in the thirty-sixth, thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth general assemblies. Was second in the contest for secretary of state in the 1918 June primary. Appointed by the governor April 3, 1919, and assumed office July 1, 1919. Married October 2, 1904, to Miss Una Ames, of Minneapolis. A republican in politics.

WILLIAM S. ALLEN.

Was born at Hillsboro, in Henry county, Iowa, August 26, 1857. Received his early education in the graded schools of Hillsboro and then entered Denmark Academy. Attended the liberal arts and law departments of the state

university' of Iowa, from which institution he graduated in the year 1877. Was a member of the house of representatives from Van Buren county in the twenty-fifth, twenty-sixth and twenty-sixth extra general assemblies, and was chairman of the second division of the code revision committee, the work of this session giving to the state the code of 1897. He moved to Fairfield, Jefferson county, in September, 1909, where he has since been engaged in the practice of law. He was elected state senator in 1908 from the Jefferson-Van Buren district and served in the thirty-third and thirty-fourth general assemblies. He was married to Miss Ella M. McCormick. Elected secretary of state in 1912. Re-elected in 1914, 1916 and 1918. He has always been a republican in politics. Resigned April 2, 1919.

FRANK S. SHAW.

Auditor of State, was born in Stephenson county, Illinois, October 27, 1859. Received his education in the public schools of Illinois and Western (now Leander Clark) College, located at Toledo, Iowa. At the age of 16 he went to Grundy county, Iowa, working on a farm for about three years, after which he located in Grundy Center. In November, 1881, he removed to Toledo, Iowa. In 1882 he entered the employ of the Chicago & North-western Railway Company. In 1884 he returned to Toledo and engaged in the jewelry business. In 1896 was appointed deputy county treasurer of Tama county and served as such until December, 1900, when he again entered the jewelry business, continuing in that line in Toledo and Allison, Iowa, until 1904, when he returned to Toledo, to enter the office of the county auditor as deputy, serving as such two years. He then served two years more as deputy county treasurer, and in November, 1908, was elected county auditor and served in that capacity for four years. During 1912 and 1914 he was engaged in the real estate and insurance business. Was elected auditor of state November 3, 1914, re-elected November 7, 1916, and again re-elected November 5, 1918. Was married June 17, 1897, to Miss Mabel L. Clark, of Toledo, Iowa, and has five children. A republican in politics.

EDWIN HIRAM HOYT,

Treasurer of State, was born October 27, 1871, in Manchester, Delaware county, Iowa. His parents, who were born in Vermont, came to Iowa in 1853 and located in Delaware county. Attended the Manchester public schools, Iowa college at Grinnell and Upper Iowa University at Fayette, graduating from the latter institution in 1891. Took a course in commercial law and banking at Cross Commercial College, Downers Grove, Illinois. Resided in Manchester until he was twenty-one years of age, when he removed to Lamont, Buchanan county, where he organized the Lamont Savings Bank, of which he was president until 1912, when he removed to Manchester, Iowa. Elected senator in 1908 and served during the thirty-third and thirty-fourth general assemblies. Appointed treasurer of state May 15, 1917. A republican in politics.

HORACE MOORE HAVNER,

Attorney General, was born of American parentage near Corydon, in Wayne county, Iowa, November 22, 1871. He was reared on the farm, and after attending the public schools, entered Simpson college. He later entered the College of Law at the State University of Iowa, graduating in 1899. After his graduation he formed a partnership with R. G. Popham, under the firm name of Popham & Havner, for the practice of law at Marengo, Iowa, the partnership continuing until Mr. Havner's election to his present office on November 7, 1916. When the Spanish-American

war broke out, Mr. Havner enlisted as a private in Company I of the Fiftieth Iowa Infantry. In 1901, Mr. Havner married Ada Dean of Griswold, Iowa, and has two children, Ada 16, and Rachel 9. He is a republican in politics.

SCOTT M. LADD,

Judge of the Supreme Court of Iowa, was born at Sharon, Wisconsin, June 22, 1855. His parents were American born, though of German, English and Welch ancestry. Reared on a farm, he attended an academy, was a student at Beloit College, Wisconsin, and later received a diploma from Carthage College, Illinois. He taught mathematics and history in Hillsboro Academy, Illinois, studied law in the office of France & Sedgwick, of York, Nebraska, completed a course at the law department of the state university of Iowa in 1881, and immediately began the practice of his profession at Sheldon. In 1886, he was elected judge of the Fourth Judicial District of Iowa and served as such ten years when he was elected to the supreme bench to succeed Judge Rothrock and has been continued in that position since. Carthage College conferred on him the degrees of M. S. and LL. D. and the state university of Iowa the degree of LL. D. in 1906. He has been a trustee of Morningside College for many years, and is a member of several societies for the advancement of learning and is interested in a practical way in scientific farming.

SILAS M. WEAVER,

Judge of the Supreme Court, was born December 18, 1842, in Arkwright, Chautauqua county, New York. He acquired his education in the common schools and at Fredonia Academy, Fredonia, New York. He was admitted to the bar at Buffalo, New York, May 4, 1868. In the same year he moved to Iowa Falls, Iowa, where he has since resided. He served as representative from Hardin county in the twentieth and twenty-first general assemblies. In the twentieth general assembly he was chairman of the house judiciary committee, and in the twenty-first general assembly he officiated as chairman of the board of managers in the impeachment trial of John L. Brown. In 1886 he was elected judge of the district court for the eleventh judicial district and was re-elected in 1890, 1894 and 1898. In 1901 he was nominated and elected to succeed Judge Josiah Given upon the supreme bench, becoming chief justice on January 1, 1907. He was re-elected to the supreme bench in 1908 and 1914. Judge Weaver is a republican in politics.

BENJAMIN I. SALINGER,

Born in Wronke, Germany; emigrated with parents to United States at close of the Franco-Prussian war, coming to Clarksville, Iowa, moving thence to Chicago, then returned to Clarksville. Attended the public school for two years; did janitor work, and worked on farms and at sawing wood when not attending. Later attended Cornell College at Mount Vernon, entered the law office of Gray, Dougherty and Gibson at Waverly, then to Webster City where he studied in the law office of Chase and Covil, and assisted the editor of the "Freeman." He taught the first country school three miles southeast of Williams in Hamilton county. He next located at Spencer, Iowa, joined with a lawyer to take on "justice practice" because not of age. After this he went to Cherokee county where he engaged in school teaching, herding, farm work, and working on streets of Aurelia. At this time he met Lucy M. Boylan as his pupil, and married her before either were of age. Went to the town of Manning, which was then being started. Was the first school teacher there. In the spare time justice of the peace work was done, as a member of a newly formed firm of

Doty, Hughes & Salinger. Was naturalized at Carroll by Judge C. F. Loufborrow, and admitted to the bar. Went into the practice of law at Manning, and after fifteen years moved to Carroll. The home remains at Carroll. Their children are Daisy R. Minchen, Benjamin I., Jr., and Louis Howard. Mr. Salinger has held one term as school director in Manning and two four year terms of supreme court reporter. Politically he has been identified with the republican party. He campaigned for it in New York in the national election of 1888 ;in the Pacific states in 1892; all over the country in 1896, 1900 and 1904. Was delegate to the congressional convention held at Webster City in 1888 of which he was chairman. Was chairman of the state convention in 1899. Elected to the supreme bench in November, 1914.

WILLIAM D. EVANS,

Judge of the Supreme Court, was born in Marquette county, Wisconsin, May 10, 1852. His parents were both born in Wales. In October, 1858, he came with his parents to Williamsburg, Iowa. Here he attended the public schools and in the fall of 1873 entered the State University. While a student at the university he taught school and was an instructor in a number of teachers' institutes during vacation. He graduated from the classical course of the university in 1878 and the following year took the law course, from which he graduated in 1879. Following his admittance to the bar in 1879 he located at Hampton. In 1902 he was elected judge of the district court for the eleventh judicial district. During the years 1907-8 he was law lecturer at the State University. In September, 1908, he was nominated for judge of the supreme court by the republican state convention to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Judge Charles A. Bishop. He was elected at the general election and by reason of statute became chief justice of the supreme court in January, 1909. Was re-elected in 1910 and again in 1916. A republican in politics.

TRUMAN S. STEVENS,

Judge of the Supreme Court, was born in Tama county, Iowa, 51 years ago; attended the public schools, the Guthrie County High School, graduated from the Law Department of the State University and in 1892 located at Hamburg, Fremont county, where he still resides. Was appointed Judge of the Fifteenth Judicial District February 1, 1917 and to the Supreme Court May 1, 1917. Has held no other public office except that of county attorney of Fremont county for one term.

FRANK R. GAYNOR,

Judge of the Supreme Court, was born September 2, 1852, in Hamilton, Canada. Moved with his parents to Iowa in 1856. Acquired his education in Professor Wood's Academy at Clermont, Iowa, Griswold College at Davenport, Iowa, and the State University of Iowa, graduating from the law department of the latter in 1877. Was associated with John T. Scott and later with John F. Talbot in the town of Brooklyn, Poweshiek county, in the practice of law. Moved to Marshalltown in 1885, where he resided until 1886, when he moved to Le Mars where he has since resided. Was elected judge of district court in 1890 and served continuously until his election to the supreme court on November 5, 1912. Was married to Anna C. Judd at Iowa City in 1877, and has one daughter. A republican in politics.

BYRON W. PRESTON,

Judge of the Supreme Court, was born at Newton, Jasper county, Iowa, February 13, 1858. Lived on a farm until 13 years of age, then went with his parents to Grinnell, Iowa. Son of Sylvester S. and Amelia M. Preston. Attended public school and Iowa College at Grinnell. He engaged in mercantile business at Newton and Grinnell until 1883, when he went to Oskaloosa and read law with Judge L. C. Blanchard. Was admitted to the bar in 1884. Elected county attorney in 1891 and served four years. Was also city attorney. Elected judge of the district court in 1902 and served as such until January 1, 1913. Was elected judge of the supreme court of Iowa in 1912, re-elected in 1918. Married Nellie Blanchard of Newton in 1880. Has two children, a son and a daughter. Is a communicant of St. James' Episcopal church at Oskaloosa. A republican in politics.

BURGESS WILSON GARRETT,

Clerk of the Supreme Court, was born on a farm in Van Vuren county, Iowa, February 24, 1872. He comes of Scotch-Irish parentage on his father's side. His mother's people came from Germany more than 100 years ago. When a child his parents moved to Davis county, and later, to Decatur county. Mr. Garrett was educated in the public schools, Simpson College and Saint Joseph University from which institution he graduated. He educated himself, being dependent upon his own resources from the time he was 14 years of age. He taught school for a number of years, being principal of the Decatur High School. Has been chairman of the county central committee; member of the senatorial and congressional committees. He was pardon secretary to Governor Cummins. Served in that capacity until July 1, 1907, when he became the first secretary of the Board of Parole. He resigned to become a candidate for the office he now holds. The office being made appointive, he has twice been appointed by the court. He has been active in politics, church and benevolent activities. Was president of the state missionary board of his church for seven years. Was temporary chairman of the republican state convention in 1916. A republican in politics.

ULYSSES GRANT WHITNEY,

Reporter of the Supreme Court, was born July 10, 1864, on a farm near Union, Hardin county, Iowa. He is the youngest son of George and Maria Whitney. Mr. Whitney received his early education in the country schools. Remained upon the farm until he was about eighteen years of age. Taught school five years. Attended school for two years at Cornell College, Mount Vernon, Iowa. Graduated from the law department of Drake University, 1890, and in the same month located at Sioux City. Became county attorney of Woodbury county, January 1, 1901, and held that position continuously for ten years. Was married October 30, 1892 to Lillian Rodwell, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Rodwell of Union, Iowa. They have three children, Martha, Craig and George. Elected representative in 1910. Re-elected in 1912. Appointed Reporter of the Supreme Court in 1914. Reappointed in 1918. A republican in politics.

P. E. McCLENAHAN,

P. E. McClenahan, who was elected Superintendent of Public Instruction last November, is a native Hawkeye and has spent all his life in Iowa, with the exception of two years which he spent in teaching in the college of agriculture in Las Cruces, New Mexico. Mr. McClenahan has had a broad educational training and experience. He is a graduate of the Iowa

State Teachers College and of the Iowa State University. He began his work as a rural school teacher in Washington county. Later he served as school principal and city superintendent. He has taught in state normal school, a state college of agriculture, and a state university. Mr. McClenahan was for six years the high school inspector for the Iowa State Board of Education.

DWIGHT N. LEWIS.

Railroad Commissioner. Born in Oskaloosa, Iowa. Son of David and Anna Lewis. His people were originally Quakers, emigrating to Ohio in an early day from Maryland and Pennsylvania. Mr. Lewis attended the public schools at Oskaloosa and Des Moines, and graduated in law from Drake University. Was secretary of the Iowa Railroad Commission from 1899 to 1911. Assistant commerce counsel until January 3, 1917, when he was appointed railroad commissioner by Governor Clarke to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Clifford Thorne. Was elected for full term, 1918. A republican in politics.

JOHN A. GUIHER.

Son of James and Rebecca T. Guiher, was born at Waynesburg, Greene county, Pennsylvania, December 10, 1858. Attended the public schools and Waynesburg College from which he graduated in 1878. Spent one year in the law department of Pennsylvania University. Admitted to the bar in 1881. Moved to Winterset, Iowa, in October, 1883, where he has ever since lived. In June, 1891 he was married to Mary L. Evans, of Winterset. He was county attorney for Madison county, Iowa, from January, 1887 to January, 1891. January 20, 1915, was appointed and qualified as railroad commissioner to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Nathaniel S. Ketchum. Elected November 7, 1916, for a term of four years. A republican in politics.

CHARLES WEBSTER.

Charles Webster, railroad commissioner, was born on a farm at Waucoma, Iowa, May 18, 1859, and still resides on the old homestead. Charles Webster taught in the public schools, edited a county paper, and May 4, 1880, was appointed railway agent and operator at Waucoma. He immediately, in partnership with his brother, Ace, established the firm of Webster Brothers, who have ever since been extensive raisers and shippers of live stock, grain and produce. He is the president of several retail lumber companies operating in Iowa, North and South Dakota and Montana. He has been extensively interested in the building of telephone lines and exchanges. He has promoted and built gas and electric companies in Arizona. He was delegate to the National Republican Convention in 1908. Was a member of the State Council of Defense and later State Fuel Administrator. He was appointed railroad commissioner by Governor Harding to succeed Hon. E. D. Chassell, resigned, and assumed the duties of the office November 5, 1917. He was elected for a full term at the November, 1918, election.

J. H. HENDERSON.

Commerce Counsel, born in Warren county, on the present site of the town of Ackworth, September 16, 1848, and has ever since resided in Warren county. Received his education in the public schools and in college at Indianola. Admitted to practice of law January 12, 1870 and on September 1, 1873 formed a partnership with Senator W. H. Berry, which continued until his election as circuit judge. Member of school board at Indianola; has been

secretary of the board of trustees of Simpson College since 1869, a member of the board of trustees of that institution and its executive committee. Was delegate to the republican national convention at Chicago in 1904. Was elected as circuit judge to fill vacancy at the November election, 1885. Was elected district judge for the Fifth Judicial District, in 1886. Re-elected in 1890, and again in 1894. He resigned January 1, 1896. Re-entered the old law firm of Henderson & Berry. In 1901 formed a partnership with his son and continued the practice of law under the firm name of Henderson & Henderson until his appointment as Commerce Counsel, July 1, 1911. Re-appointed July 1, 1915. Member of the state board of law examiners four years. A member of the M. E. Church; belongs to the Odd Fellows and A. O. U. W.; is a Mason and Knight Templar. Served as Grand Master of the Grand Lodge I. O. O. F. of Iowa, 1906-07 and Grand Representative from Iowa in Sovereign Grand Lodge of I. O. O. F. for two years.

EDGAR RUBEY HARLAN.

Son of Samuel A. and Marinda E. (Rubey) Harlan; born of Kentucky Quaker ancestry at Spartansburg, Indiana, February 28, 1869; brought to a farm in Cedar township, Van Buren county, Iowa, in 1873; attended "Morris" district and Keosauqua high school, graduating 1889, and Drake University, completing the law course with degree of LL. B., and admitted to the bar June, 1896; practiced law at Keosauqua ten years, serving as county attorney 1898-1902; appointed by Charles Aldrich Assistant Curator of the Historical Department of Iowa, 1907; acting Curator after death of Mr. Aldrich, March, 1908, until appointed Curator by Governor Carroll, October 1, 1909; elected Curator by Board of Trustees, June, 1913; honorary member Iowa Chapter, American Institute of Architects; honorary member National Sculpture Society; member American Historical Association; a founder and member board of directors, Mississippi Valley Historical Association; member and Secretary, Iowa Flag Commission; member and Secretary Allison Memorial Commission; member Iowa Board of Conservation, Plant Life Commission; member and director Des Moines Fine Arts Association; member American Civic Association and delegate to Germany, France and England, tour 1913.

GEORGE HOLBROOK MESSENGER.

George Holbrook Messenger, superintendent of banking, was born February 8, 1872, at three hundred fourteen Third Street in the city of Des Moines. At the age of four years he removed with his parents to Fremont, Nebraska, and returned to the city of his nativity in 1880. After one year at West High, in June, 1889, he entered office work and continued such until the spring of 1893 when he removed to Dallas county and soon after engaged in the banking business at Adel. As a banker he has been the active and controlling factor in successful institutions at Atlantic, Breda, Farlin, Harlan, Linden and Van Meter. In July, 1917 he returned to the Capital City to assume his present duties. He is a old-time member of the Grand Lodge Knights of Pythias, a Scottish Rite Mason, a Shriner and is on the rolls of the Elks for life. While never a seeker for political honors he is and always has been a republican.

ARTHUR C. SAVAGE.

Commissioner of Insurance of Iowa, born at Frairfeburg, Linn county, Iowa, January 2, 1870. Was educated in the public schools of Dexter and Stuart, Iowa, and Grinnell College. For twenty-two years was engaged in the banking business at Adair, Iowa, and for a number of years conducted a large fire insurance agency. Mr. Savage is a republican in politics, and served as a member of the Iowa Senate in the Thirty-third, Thirty-fourth, Thirty-fifth and

Thirty-sixth General Assemblies, and as chairman of the public school and appropriation committees. Was appointed commissioner of insurance by Governor W. L. Harding for the term expiring February 1st, 1923.

GEORGE T. BAKER.

Member of Board of Education, was born on a farm in Iowa county, Iowa. He was educated in the district schools of Iowa. Hall's school for boys, at Ellington, Connecticut, McClain's academy at Iowa City, and the Iowa State University. He remained one year at the state university and then completed four years of special work in civil engineering at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, class of 1879. During the years from 1879 to 1889 he was engaged in railway location, construction and maintenance work after which he was chief consulting engineer for the high bridges built across the Mississippi river at Muscatine and Clinton, Iowa, and Winona, Minnesota. From 1893 until January, 1910, he was engaged in general construction work on railways, paving, sewerage, water works, and heavy building construction. Served as a member of the general assembly in the twenty-sixth regular and special session, was a member of the house of representatives from Scott county, was elected mayor of the city of Davenport in 1898, serving two years and was delegate at large to the democratic national convention in 1900. A democrat in politics.

HENRY MARTIN EICHER.

Member of Board of Education, was born on a farm in Washington county, Iowa, in 1858. His father and mother were German Mennonites and their business was farming. Mr. Eicher adopted the religion of his parents and in his youth attended the public schools at his home and the Eastern Iowa normal school at Grandview. He also had opportunities for education by teaching in the public schools from time to time during about five years. In 1883 he was admitted to the bar, located at Washington, and has practiced law there ever since. In 1888 he was married to Frances McKee. They have three children, two daughters and a son. He has always been a democrat, and never occupied a position above a township office except assistant United States attorney in Cleveland's administration.

PAUL E. STILLMAN.

Member of Board of Education, was born in Chicago, Illinois, November 4, 1868, of native born parents. He received his early education in the schools of Chicago and of Waucoma, Iowa, where his father was engaged in the business of milling. In 1884 the family moved to Jefferson in Greene county, where the father, E. B. Stillman, became proprietor of the Jefferson Bee. In 1887 entered the University of Michigan, at Ann Arbor, and graduated with degree of Bachelor of Arts in 1891. Since that time has been connected with the Jefferson Bee as editor and part owner. Has never held public office until elected representative in 1906. Re-elected in 1908 and 1910, and was chosen speaker of the house of representatives of the thirty-fourth general assembly. A republican in politics.

EDWARD P. SCHOENTGEN.

Member of Board of Education, was born August 16, 1873, in Council Bluffs. Attended local schools until 12 years of age. Then entered an academy in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, preparatory to entering the manual training school of Washington University, St. Louis. In 1891 he entered the Massachusetts Institute of Technology at Boston taking the course in architecture, receiving

the degree of S. B. in architecture in 1895. Then followed about three years foreign study; two of which were spent in Paris, France, as a pupil of Jean Louis Pascal, Membre de L'Institute, and architect of the national library. The balance of the time was spent in the French provinces, and Italy. Upon returning to this country, he was identified with architectural work in St. Louis and in 1899, opened an office in Council Bluffs, practicing in that city during the next ten years. He relinquished the practice of his profession soon after the death of his father, John Schoentgen, of the wholesale grocery firm of Groneweg & Schoentgen company, and became actively connected with the business. He was married in 1901 to Miss Mable Pratt of Des Moines, daughter of M. M. Pratt. In 1902 appointed a member of the capitol commission by Governor A. B. Cummins. He rendered no other public service until appointed to the board of education by Governor Carroll. A democrat in politics.

DANIEL D. MURPHY.

Member of Board of Education, was born of Irish parentage near New Diggings, LaFayette county, Wisconsin, August 22, 1862. He was educated in the public schools of the state of Wisconsin, and graduated from the Wisconsin state normal school. In 1883 he came to Guttenberg, Clayton county, Iowa, as superintendent of the high school, which position he held for three years. In 1887 he was graduated from the law college of the State University of Iowa, and returned to Clayton county, finally locating at Elkader, where he has been engaged in the practice of law for the past twenty-three years. He served as county attorney of Clayton county, from 1891 to 1895; has been a member of the school board of Elkader for several years. He is a member of the Iowa state bar association, and was president in 1907 and 1908; is also a member of the American bar association, and of the American academy of political and social sciences. A democrat in politics.

WILLARD C. STUCKSLAGER.

Member of Board of Education, was born in the town of Lisbon, Linn county, Iowa, October 24, 1869. His parents were natives of Fayette county, Pennsylvania. His father located in Linn county, Iowa, in 1851. He graduated from the high school at Lisbon in 1886. Then entered Cornell College at Mount Vernon, Iowa, going in 1893 to Chicago University. In 1894 engaged in the banking business at Lisbon, Iowa, entering the Stuckslager-Aurachter bank, founded by his father in 1874. At present is president of the bank and also of the Mount Vernon bank. Is interested in educational matters and has been a member of the board of trustees of Cornell college for the past eighteen years, twelve years of which time he has been a member of the executive committee. Elected representative in 1899 and served during the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth general assemblies. In 1903 he was elected to the senate and served during the thirtieth, thirty-first, thirty-second and thirty-second extra, thirty-third and thirty-fourth general assemblies. A republican in politics.

PARKER KIMBALL HOLBROOK.

Member of Board of Education, was born at Onawa, Iowa, September 23, 1864, and is the son of Bernard D. Holbrook and Mary F. (Oliver) Holbrook. He was educated in Onawa high school and the State University of Iowa, of which latter institution he was a member of the class of 1886, but did not graduate. In June, 1885, he entered the banking house of Holbrook & Bro., in which he became a partner in 1894 and has continued in that business to the present time. He was elected regent of the state university in 1896, and re-elected in 1902 and 1908. Elected chairman of the executive com-

mittee of the board of regents in 1897, and continued in that position until the establishment of the state board of education. A republican in politics.

THOMAS LAMBERT.

Member of Finance Committee of the Board of Education, was born on a farm near Sabula, Jackson county, Iowa, February 13, 1855. His father, Thomas D. Lambert, was a native of Maine, and his mother, Sarah (Guenther) Lambert, was born in Pennsylvania. Received his education in a select school in Sabula, and has been a resident there from birth. In 1880 he entered the newspaper field, purchasing the Sabula Gazette, which he still owns. His political affiliation is with the democratic party, and served four years as city recorder, followed by eight successive terms as mayor of Sabula. He was justice of the peace over twenty years and secretary of the school board twenty-eight years. He was elected a member of the house of representatives in 1895 and 1897. Elected to the senate in 1899 and 1902, and served three sessions in the house and six in the senate. Served on the legislative commission appointed to investigate and report on the one board of management for the state educational institutions. Was a delegate to the democratic national convention in 1888. On August 3, 1883, he was united in marriage with Miss Jennie Cotton of Sabula.

FRANK F. JONES.

Member of Board of Education, was born in the state of New York, August 25, 1856, of American parentage. His family moved to Illinois in 1863 and to Iowa in 1875. He acquired a high school education and at the age of eighteen began teaching school. After coming to Iowa he taught school and farmed for several years and then was a bookkeeper and salesman in a large hardware and agricultural implement store in Villisca for seven or eight years, until he embarked in business on his own account. This venture proved a success and the "Jones store," still owned by him, is now one of the largest hardware and implement stores in that part of the state. He was cashier and active manager of the Villisca National Bank for sixteen years, and superintendent of the M. E. Sunday School for twenty-seven years. Elected representative in 1903 and re-elected in 1906. He was a member of the commission appointed by the thirtieth general assembly to visit the reformatories of the east and investigate the workings of the reformatory and indeterminate sentence systems. He was also a member of the legislative insurance investigating commission of 1908. Elected senator in 1912. Appointed as a member of the Board of Education in 1915. A republican in politics.

CHARLES RICHMOND BRENTON.

Member of Board of Education, was born near Dallas Center, Iowa, January 30, 1864. When fourteen years of age, he moved to Dallas Center with his parents, where he has since resided. His ancestors fought in the revolutionary and civil wars. Was married in 1893 to Miss Carrie Woodward. Has always been a republican and was a delegate to the national republican convention at St. Louis in 1896. He has been president of the Dallas Center school board for many years and the Dallas Center high school has long been his special pride. He served four years on the board of trustees of the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts. Mr. Brenton and his brother are the owners of several thousand acres of Iowa lands, several banks and many other large outside investments. He has always given his attention to the popular pursuit of farming and has demonstrated the possibilities and profits to be derived from the Iowa lands. He is now vice-president of the bank of Dallas Center. Mr. Brenton is deeply interested in religious matters and was a delegate to the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church held in Balti-

more in 1908. He is a member of the Masonic order and several other fraternal organizations and has always been loyal to his community and steadfast in its interests.

W. H. GEMMILL.

Secretary of the Iowa State Board of Education, was born in Ontario, Canada, March 14, 1871. In September of that year, his parents moved to Keokuk county, Iowa and settled on a farm near South English. He attended the rural schools and graduated from the South English high school in 1889. He entered the Iowa State College at Ames and graduated in November, 1894, with the degree of Bachelor of Science. During those years, he taught several terms in country schools. He has taken educational work in history and economics in Highland Park College, Drake University and Des Moines College. He was principal of schools at Gibson, Iowa, two and one-half years; county superintendent of Keokuk county four years; superintendent of schools at Dallas Center from 1901 to 1911, and superintendent of the Carroll schools 1914 to 1917 and resigned to become secretary of the Iowa State Board of Education. He was married in 1895 to Birdie D. Richards. They have four children, Agnes, John, Helen and Iva.

WILLIAM R. BOYD.

Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Education, is a native of Iowa, having been born in Lisbon, Linn county, May 19, 1864. His boyhood was spent in Tipton, Iowa, where he attended the public schools. He was graduated from the college of liberal arts of the state university in June, 1889, having earned his way by teaching school and clerking in a store. He was principal of the school at Mechanicsville, Iowa two years. He was editor of the Tipton Advertiser two years, editor and associate editor of the Cedar Rapids Republican sixteen years. Mr. Boyd served as postmaster of Cedar Rapids from April, 1899, to July, 1909, resigning this office to accept his present position. He has long been interested in educational matters, and was for several years a member of the board of trustees of Coe College, and for a time lecturer on political economy in that institution. Mr. Boyd is a director of the American Trust and Savings bank, and the Perpetual Savings and Loan association, both located in Cedar Rapids. A republican in politics.

ANTHONY M. McCOLL.

Member of the Board of Control of State Institutions, was born in Caladonia, Livingston county, New York, May 19, 1858. His parents were American born, but of Scotch lineage. He moved with his parents to Iowa in 1876. For many years he was engaged in farming and for three terms was clerk of the district court of Dallas county. Was elected state senator from the seventeenth district in 1910 and re-elected in 1912. Appointed a member of the board of control by Governor Clarke to succeed Gifford S. Robinson, whose term expired July 1, 1913. A republican in politics.

WILLIAM D. SHEEAN.

Member of the Board of Control of State Institutions, was born in Anamosa, Jones county, Iowa, July 7, 1867, and has spent most of his life in that city. His father was born in Boston, Massachusetts, and his mother in Illinois. Received his education in the public schools and college. Served as clerk of the district court of Jones county. Has been mayor of Anamosa several terms. At present is engaged in the practice of law. Studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1896. Married in 1891 to Miss Carrie E. Lull, who died in 1896.

To them were born two daughters, one who died in infancy. Elected representative from Jones county in the 27th general assembly. Elected senator in 1912. Appointed a member of the Board of Control March 26, 1916, to succeed Col. J. H. McConlogue, and term will expire July 1, 1921. A democrat in politics.

J. H. STRIEF.

Member of the Board of Control of State Institutions, was born in Galena, Illinois, August 21, 1865. His parents located at Dubuque, Iowa, in 1866, a few years later moving to Chicago, Illinois, and residing in the latter city until 1876; in August of that year again taking up residence in Iowa, at LeMars, Plymouth county, where Mr. Strief learned the printer's trade and later conducted a weekly newspaper. In the years since 1876 he has been a continuous resident of Iowa. He located in Sioux City in 1884 and for many years was employed in the composing rooms of the daily newspapers of that city. In 1901 he was chosen secretary-treasurer of the Iowa State Federation of Labor, which position he held for a period of twelve years. He was president of the Iowa State Federation of Labor from 1913 to 1917. He is married and has two sons. A republican in politics. He was appointed a member of the Board of Control by Governor W. L. Harding and confirmed by the senate of the thirty-seventh general assembly of Iowa. Legal residence, Sioux City, Iowa.

WINFIELD S. WITHOW.

Member of the Board of Parole, was born September 28, 1855, at Salem, Henry county, Iowa. His education was acquired in the public schools and at Whittier College, located at Salem. In 1880 he graduated from the law department of the State University of Iowa and entered the practice of law at Salem. In 1885 was elected representative in the Twenty-first general assembly, serving one term, declining re-nomination. In 1887 he removed to Mt. Pleasant, continuing in the practice of the law until Governor Drake appointed him judge of the Twentieth judicial district. He was elected judge in 1896, re-elected in 1904, 1908 and 1912, resigning on April 19, 1913, to accept the appointment to the supreme court by Governor Geo. W. Clarke, under the act of the Thirty-fifth general assembly increasing the membership of that court. He was for twenty years a trustee of Iowa Wesleyan University at Mt. Pleasant. He was appointed a member of the Board of Parole July 8, 1916, by Governor Clarke, to fill vacancy caused by resignation of William Dennis. Term will expire July 1, 1921. A republican in politics.

GEORGE T. REDDICK,

Member of the Board of Parole, was born in Prince Edward county, Ontario, March 29, 1884. He came to Iowa in January, 1896, located in Iowa City, and engaged in the general printing business until the spring of 1911; was elected city clerk of Iowa City, Iowa for two terms; was appointed a member of the Board of Parole by Governor Harding in April, 1917, to fill the office made vacant by the death of Dr. John E. Howe, also appointed for the term ending June 30, 1923. A democrat in politics.

JOHN O. WOODMANSEE.

Member of the Board of Parole, was born in Decatur county, Iowa, February 27, 1881. His education was acquired in the public schools and at the American School of Osteopathy from which he graduated in June, 1901. He began the practice of his profession in Des Moines immediately on graduating. Located in Leon in September, 1912, where he has since resided. Has

been a member of the Leon School Board. His service as an osteopathic physician has been in demand in all the territory surrounding Decatur county and he has enjoyed a most lucrative and successful practice. He was appointed a member of the Board of Parole by Governor Harding for the term beginning July 1, 1919. A republican in politics.

LOUIS G. LASHER,

Adjutant General of Iowa, was born in Davenport, Scott county, Iowa, March 17, 1873. His ancestors on his father's side were Swiss, while his mother's were descended from Welsh stock. His education was acquired in the grade and high schools of Davenport, and the military school Kemper Hall, and Griswold College. His business career began as a traveling salesman in 1891, and in 1897 he accepted the position of manager of the provision business of Swift & Co. at Allegheny City, Pa., from which place he rejoined Company B, 50th Iowa Volunteer Infantry in May, 1898, for duty in the Spanish American War. He served from May 13 to November 30, 1898, in Des Moines, Iowa, and Jacksonville, Florida. On January 5, 1899, he enlisted in the 12th U. S. Infantry for service in the Philippines, and was discharged January 4, 1902. On his return to the United States, he traveled until July, 1905, when he helped organize the Lasher Manufacturing Co. of Davenport, Iowa. September 1, 1906, he accepted the general managership of the C. O. D. Cleaning & Dyeing Co. of Davenport, Iowa, and in 1910, became the president and general manager of that firm. On July 24, 1915, he was appointed by Governor Clarke as a Lieutenant colonel and A. D. C., and was reappointed to the same position by Governor Harding on February 1, 1917. On July 20, 1918, he was appointed colonel and assistant adjutant general of Iowa, and on September 1, 1918, he was promoted to be brigadier general, and adjutant general of Iowa, to fill out the unexpired term of Adjutant General Logan. A republican in politics.

ORA WILLIAMS,

State Document Editor and Secretary of the Printing Board, born in Dallas county on a farm 1863; rural schools and Adel High school, taught a year in the high school; learned printer's trade and became editor of Dallas County Democrat 1881; removed to Des Moines 1885, and became reporter, then city editor of the Iowa State Register, then became managing editor of the *Sioux City Journal*, later an editorial writer on the *Omaha Bee*, for two years editor of the *Sioux Falls Press*, and for a year was editor of the *Chicago Daily Review*. He engaged in special news correspondence out of Des Moines for fifteen years, and until he was appointed document editor on organization of the office in 1915, then on adoption of the law placing the printing in charge of a printing board he became secretary of the board. Was reappointed and confirmed, and the term of office was extended by the 38th general assembly to four years.

JOHN PARKER RISLEY,

Chief Oil Inspector, was born in Cincinnati, Ohio, August 30, 1846. His parents were born at Little Egg Harbor, New Jersey. He came to Davenport, Iowa, with his parents in 1857, and received his education in the public schools. Enlisted in the 20th Iowa Infantry, February 3, 1863, and served until the close of the war. Was actively engaged as traveling salesman, and in business life in Davenport, Iowa, until coming to Des Moines upon receiving the appointment of chief oil inspector, August 1, 1915. A republican in politics.

J. A. TRACY,

State Fire Marshal, was born in Washington county, Iowa, May 5, 1858, of American-born parents, who came from Ohio to Iowa in 1849. He commenced work on his father's farm at the age of 13 and when 18 he and his father engaged in the manufacture of brick. Later Mr. Tracy engaged in farming and timber business, cutting and sawing timber into bridge and building material. He bought and sold real estate and moved to Sioux City, Iowa, in 1890. He was appointed deputy United States marshal in 1898, which position he held for 13 years. In July, 1911, he was appointed deputy state fire marshal and on July 1, 1919, he became head of the department. A republican in politics.

A. B. FUNK.

Iowa Industrial Commissioner, administering workmen's compensation service. Born in Adams county, Illinois, January 12, 1854. Son of Solomon Funk, of Pennsylvania, German, origin, and of Jane Walby Funk, born in the city of London, England. Came to Hamilton county in 1865. Identified with the Spirit Lake Beacon for thirty-five years. Established the Enterprise at Flandreau, Dakota, in 1878. In 1879 elected first mayor of Flandreau, and returning to Spirit Lake, was in the same year chosen as its first mayor. Postmaster at Spirit Lake 1882-5. Delegate to republican national convention in 1884. State senator 1888-1900. For three sessions president pro tem and chairman of ranking committee. Eleventh district member resolutions committee in ten republican state conventions. President capitol improvement commission by appointment of Governor Cummins. For six years vice president of state board of education under two appointments by Governor Carroll. Resigned to accept present position upon resignation of Hon. Warren Garst January 1, 1916, by appointment of Governor Clarke. Reappointed 1919 by Governor Harding for term of six years.

BIOGRAPHIES OF UNITED STATES SENATORS.

ALBERT BAIRD CUMMINS,

Republican, of Des Moines, Polk county, was born near Carmichaels, Pennsylvania, February 15, 1850; was educated in the public schools, preparatory academy, and was three years in Waynesburg (Pa.) College; the latter institution conferred the degrees of M. A. and LL. D. upon him, and Cornell College, Iowa, that of LL. D.; is a lawyer by profession, and married; and was a member of the House of Representatives of the Twenty-second General Assembly of Iowa; a member of the Republican National Committee from 1896 to 1900, and Governor of Iowa from January, 1902, until elected November 24, 1908, to fill a vacancy in the United States Senate caused by the death of Hon. W. B. Allison. Was re-elected in 1909 and 1914.

WILLIAM SQUIRE KENYON,

Republican, of Fort Dodge, Webster county, was born at Elyria, Ohio, June 10, 1869; educated at Iowa College, Grinnell, and law school of the University of Iowa; was prosecuting attorney for Webster county for five years; district judge for two years; assistant to the Attorney General of the United States for one year. He was elected to the United States Senate April 12, 1911, to succeed the Hon. Lafayette Young, who was appointed United States Senator November 12, 1910, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Hon. Jonathan P. Dolliver, and took his seat, April 24, 1911; was elected January 22, 1913, for the term ending March 3, 1919. Re-elected November 5, 1918, for the term ending March 3, 1925.

BIOGRAPHIES OF REPRESENTATIVES IN CONGRESS.

CHARLES A. KENNEDY,

Of Montrose, Lee county, Representative from the First district, composed of the counties of Des Moines, Henry, Jefferson, Lee, Louisa, Van Buren, and Washington, was born in Montrose, Lee county, March 24, 1869; finishing the high school course he formed a partnership, which still exists, with his brother in the nursery business. At the age of twenty-one he was elected mayor of Montrose and served four terms; served as a member of the House in the Thirtieth and Thirty-first General Assemblies, being the first republican from Lee county in twenty-two years; was elected to the sixtieth, sixty-first, sixty-second, sixty-third, sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth, and sixty-sixth congresses. Republican in politics.

HARRY E. HULL,

Representative in congress from the Second district of Iowa, composing the counties of Clinton, Iowa, Jackson, Johnson, Muscatine and Scott. Republican, of Williamsburg, Iowa county, Iowa, born Belvidere, Alleghany county, N. Y., March 12, 1864; moved to Cedar Rapids, Iowa, 1873; common school education; grain buyer at Palo, Iowa, 1883; Williamsburg 1884; married Mary Louise Harris June 8, 1891; wife died May 21, 1917; one child, Harris, 10 years old; alderman 2 years, mayor 10 years, postmaster 13 years Williamsburg, Iowa; member Progress Club, Episcopal Church, I. O. O. F., K. of P., B. P. O. E., and Mason (thirty-second degree); nominated congress January 29, 1914; election held February 10, 1914, first real indication of a reunited republican party. Elected to the sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth and sixty-sixth congress.

BURTON ERWIN SWEET,

Of Waverly, Bremer county, Iowa, representative from the Third congressional district, composed of the counties of Blackhawk, Bremer, Butler, Delaware, Dubuque, Franklin, Hardin and Wright, was born in Bremer county, Iowa, on December 10, 1867. Educated in the common schools, Iowa State Normal School, and graduated from Cornell, Mount Vernon, Iowa, in June, 1893, with the degree of Ph. B. Graduated in June, 1895, from the law department of the State University of Iowa, with the degree of LL. B. Was admitted to the bar in 1895. Has been engaged in the practice of law at Waverly, Iowa, ever since, the firm name being Sager & Sweet. Also a member of the law firm of Sager, Sweet & Edwards at Waterloo, Iowa. Was city solicitor of Waverly, Iowa, three years. Was a member of the house of representatives in the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth general assemblies of Iowa. Served four years on the republican state central committee from the Third congressional district of Iowa. Elected to the sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth and sixty-sixth congresses. Republican in politics.

GILBERT N. HAUGEN,

Of Northwood, Worth county, representative from the Fourth district, composed of the counties of Allamakee, Cerro Gordo, Chickasaw, Clayton, Fayette, Floyd, Howard, Mitchell, Winneshiek and Worth; was born April 21, 1853, in Rock county, Wisconsin; since the age of fourteen, and prior to his election to congress, he was actively engaged in various enterprises, principally real estate and banking; was treasurer of Worth county, Iowa, for six years; was elected to the Iowa legislature, serving in the twenty-fifth and twenty-sixth general assemblies; was elected to the fifty-sixth, fifty-seventh, fifty-eighth, fifty-ninth, sixtieth, sixty-first, sixty-second, sixty-third, sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth and sixty-sixth congresses. Republican in politics.

JAMES WILLIAM GOOD,

Of Cedar Rapids, Linn county. Representative from the Fifth district, composed of the counties of Benton, Cedar, Grundy, Jones, Linn, Marshall and Tama, was born September 24, 1856, near that place; graduated from Coe College, Cedar Rapids, in 1892, receiving the degree of bachelor of science; also graduated from the law department of the University of Michigan in 1893, receiving the degree of bachelor of laws; is a lawyer by profession; was married to Miss Lucy Deacon in October, 1893; was elected to the sixty-first, sixty-second, sixty-third, sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth and sixty-sixth congresses. Republican in politics.

CHRISTIAN WILLIAM RAMSEYER,

Of Bloomfield, Davis county, representative from the Sixth district composed of the counties of Davis, Jasper, Keokuk, Mahaska, Monroe, Poweshiek and Wapello, was born on a farm near Collinsville, Butler county, Ohio, March 13, 1875. When two years of age his parents moved to McLean county, Illinois, where his father died in 1881. Since 1887 Davis county has been his home. He graduated from the Southern Iowa Normal at Bloomfield in 1897 and from the Iowa State Teachers' College at Cedar Falls in 1902. He taught school six years, the last two years of which he was superintendent of the Bloomfield public schools. He graduated from the College of Law of the State University of Iowa, in 1906, and since that time has been practicing law at Bloomfield. Was elected county attorney of Davis county in November, 1910, and re-elected in November, 1912. Elected to the sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth and sixty-sixth congresses. Republican in politics.

CASSIUS C. DOWELL,

Representative in the congress of the United States from the Seventh congressional district of Iowa, composed of the counties of Polk, Dallas, Madison, Marion, Story and Warren, was born in Warren county, Iowa, American parentage. Republican in politics. Was a member of the sixty-fourth and sixty-fifth congresses. Re-elected to the sixty-sixth.

HORACE MANN TOWNER,

Of Corning, Adams county, representative from the Eighth district, composed of the counties of Adams, Appanoose, Clarke, Decatur, Fremont, Lucas, Page, Ringgold, Taylor, Union and Wayne, was born at Belvidere, Illinois; received a high school education at that place, also attended the Chicago University and the Union College of Law at Chicago; removed to Iowa

and commenced the practice of law at Corning in 1880; in 1890, was elected judge of the Third judicial district of Iowa and held that position until January 1, 1911; was lecturer on constitutional law at the State University of Iowa for several years while serving as judge; was president of the Iowa State Bar Association; was married to Harriet Cole of Corning in 1887. Was elected to the sixty-second, sixty-third, sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth and sixty-sixth congresses. Republican in politics.

WILLIAM RAYMOND GREEN.

Of Council Bluffs, Pottawattamie county, representative from the Ninth district composed of the counties of Adair, Audubon, Cass, Guthrie, Harrison, Mills, Montgomery, Pottawattamie and Shelby, was born at Colchester, Connecticut, November 7, 1856; received a high school education at Princeton, Ill., and graduated at Oberlin College, Oberlin, Ohio, in 1879 in the classical course; read law in the office of McCoy & Pratt, Chicago, and was admitted to practice at Ottawa, Illinois, in 1882; began the practice of law at Dow City, Iowa; later moved to Council Bluffs and from there to Audubon in the fall of 1886; was elected judge of the district court in 1894, and re-elected in 1898, 1902, 1906 and 1910; and was elected representative in congress at the special election held June 5, 1911, to fill vacancy caused by resignation of Hon. Walter I. Smith. He was re-elected to the sixty-third, sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth, and sixty-sixth congresses. A republican in politics.

L. J. DICKINSON,

Of Algona, Kossuth county, Iowa, representative in congress from the Tenth district, was born in Lucas county, Iowa, October 29th, 1893. His early education was received in the Danbury High School, and graduated with the class of 1892. Attended Cornell College and received the degree of B. S. in 1898. Then studied law in the University of Iowa receiving the degree of LL. B. in 1899. Admitted to the bar in 1899, and located at Algona, Iowa. Was married in 1901 to Miss Myrle Cail. Two children were born to them, Levi Cail and Ruth Alice. Served as county attorney of Kossuth county two terms. Committeeman Tenth congressional district, Republican State Central Committee 1914-1918. Defeated Frank P. Woods for the republican nomination in congress June primary 1918. Elected to congress November 5th, 1918. A life long republican in politics.

WILLIAM DAYTON BOIES.

Republican, of Sheldon, O'Brien county, Iowa. Was born January 3rd, 1857, on the farm that his father homesteaded the year 1845, in Boone county, Illinois. Received his education in the country and public schools of Belvidere, Illinois, and came to Buchanan county, Iowa in 1873. Graduated from the law department of the State University of Iowa with the class of 1880. Was married in 1881; has two sons; located in O'Brien county, Iowa, October, 1881, where he practiced law until appointed judge of the district court of the Fourth judicial district, January 1st, 1913. On a division of the district he became judge of the Twenty-first judicial district of the state, which position he resigned March 31st, 1918, to become a candidate for the republican nomination for congress. Elected November 5th, 1918, defeating Hon. T. J. Steele, democrat, of Sioux City. Mr. Boies is a trustee of Morningside College, Sioux City, and for ten years preceding his appointment to the bench, was a member of the school board of the independent school district of Sheldon. His property interests are in farm lands.

THIRTY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

THE LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

The legislative department of the state of Iowa is vested in a general assembly, which consists of a senate and house of representatives.

The senate consists of fifty members. Senators are elected for terms of four years; twenty-one senators being elected at one general election and twenty-nine at the next.

The house of representatives consists at present of one hundred and eight members, who are elected for a term of two years.

Sessions of the general assembly are held biennially in the odd numbered years, and they commence on the second Monday of January.

The compensation of the members of the thirty-seventh general assembly was \$1,000 for the session. This is in accordance with an act of the thirty-fourth general assembly which went into effect July 4, 1911. They were also allowed five cents a mile from their homes to the capital and return for traveling expenses. Members are permitted to draw such stationery as they need during the session, the cost to the state for the supplies varying from \$1.50 to \$14.00 per member. No allowance is permitted for postage.

The lieutenant governor is the presiding officer of the senate. His pay is twice that of a member, being \$2,000 for the session of the thirty-eighth general assembly.

The speaker of the house is chosen by the members from among their own membership. His pay is twice that of a member, being \$2,000 for the session.

The lieutenant-governor appoints all committees in the senate and the speaker of the house all committees in the house.

In the regular proceedings of the senate motions made by members are not seconded but are put directly by the presiding officer, the formality of a second being waived. In the house all motions are seconded before being placed before the house by the speaker.

Sessions in both branches of the general assembly are opened by prayer. No regular chaplains are employed, but ministers from Des Moines and elsewhere over the state are assigned dates for these services and are allowed \$5 for each opening prayer.

Bills passed are re-written (enrolled) by the enrolling clerk of the branch of the general assembly where the bill originates; they are then signed by the president of the senate and speaker of the house in presence of these respective bodies, in open session; then by the governor, if meeting with his approval, and then are filed with the secretary of state and by him bound in book form, after the close of a session.

JOINT RULES OF THE THIRTY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

DISAGREEMENT AND CONFERENCE.

1. Whenever either house shall amend a measure and the other house shall refuse to concur in and adopt the amendment, the house which has adopted such amendment shall either insist on or recede from the same. But when a measure originating in one house is amended in the other, the house in which it originated may amend such amendment and a motion therefor shall take precedence of a motion to concur. In case said house refuses to concur, the house which adopted the amendment may either recede from or insist upon such amendment, and a motion to recede takes precedence of a motion to insist. In case a motion to insist on the amendment be decided in the negative, such action shall be deemed a receding from the amendment and so entered upon the journal of the house. In case the amendment is insisted upon, the house so insist-

ing shall request a committee of conference on the subject of disagreement, and shall appoint a committee therefor. The other house shall thereupon appoint such a committee. Unless another number is specified in said request, such conference committee shall consist of four members from each house. They shall meet at a convenient time, to be agreed upon by their chairman, and having conferred freely, each shall report to their respective house the result of their conference. In case of agreement, the report shall be first made, with the papers referred accompanying it, to the house which refused to concur, and there acted upon; and such action shall be immediately reported by the secretary or clerk to the other house, the papers referred accompanying the message. In case of disagreement of conference committee, the papers shall remain with the house which insisted on the amendment. The agreeing report of a conference committee shall be made, read and signed in duplicate by all the members of the committee, or by a majority of those of each house, one of the duplicates being retained by the committee of each house.

PRESENTATION OF MESSAGES.

2. When a message shall be sent from either house to the other, it shall be announced at the door of the house to which it is sent by the doorkeeper thereof, and shall be respectfully communicated to the chair by the person by whom it is sent.

TRANSMISSION OF MESSAGES.

3. All messages between the two houses shall be communicated by the secretary or chief clerk or their respective assistants.

ENROLLMENT OF BILLS.

4. When a bill shall have passed both houses it shall be duly enrolled by the enrolling clerk of the house in which it originated, and the fact of its origin shall be certified by the endorsement of the secretary or clerk thereof.

EXAMINATION OF ENROLLED BILLS.

5. When the bills are enrolled they shall be examined by a joint committee of two from the senate and two from the house of representatives, who shall be a standing committee for that purpose, and who shall carefully compare the enrollment with the engrossed bills, as passed in the house, correct any errors therein, and make report thereof forthwith to their respective houses.

AUTHENTICATION OF ENROLLED BILLS.

6. After the report, each bill shall be signed, first by the speaker of the house of representatives, and then by the president of the senate, in the presence of their respective houses.

TRANSMISSION OF BILLS TO THE GOVERNOR.

7. After a bill shall have been thus signed in each house, it shall be forthwith presented, by committee of the house in which the bill originated, to the governor, for his approval, and they shall forthwith report the date of presentation, which shall be entered upon the journal of the house in which the bill originated.

CONCERNING OTHER ENROLLMENTS.

8. All orders, resolutions, memorials or other votes, which are to be presented to the governor for his approval, shall be enrolled, examined, signed and presented in the same manner as bills.

CERTIFICATION OF BILLS AND OTHER ENROLLMENTS.

9. When any bill, resolution or memorial, which shall have passed in one house, is rejected or adopted in the other, notice of such action shall be

given to the house which passed the same. And each bill, resolution or memorial shall have properly endorsed thereon, at the time of its transmission, a statement, signed by the secretary or clerk, of the action which has been taken thereon by the house transmitting the same, with the date thereof.

REINTRODUCTION OF BILLS AND OTHER MEASURES.

10. When a bill, resolution or memorial which shall have passed one house is rejected in the other, it shall not be again introduced during the session without five days' notice and leave of a majority of the members of the house in which the same is sought to be introduced.

TRANSMISSION OF PAPERS.

11. Each house shall transmit to the other with any bill, resolution or memorial all papers upon which the same shall be founded.

PRINTING OF BILLS AND OTHER DOCUMENTS.

12. When any report, bill or resolution shall be ordered printed by either house, without stating the number, three hundred copies shall be printed for the use of both houses, but when any bill or resolution which may have passed one house is ordered printed by the other, a greater number of copies shall not be printed than the house making the order shall determine.

CONCERNING THE PRINTING OF DOCUMENTS.

13. It shall be the duty of the chief clerk of the house of representatives and the secretary of the senate, when any document, except bills and resolutions, is ordered to be printed in their respective houses, forthwith to communicate such order to the other house.

ROLL CALL IN JOINT CONVENTION.

14. In all elections in joint convention of the two houses, the names of all members shall be arranged in alphabetical order, and they shall be called upon to vote in the order in which they stand arranged.

RECORDS OF THE COMMITTEE ON CLAIMS.

15. It shall be the duty of the committee on claims in each house to keep a book of record, in which shall be entered each claim for money against the state referred to them, whether presented in favor of private persons or municipal or other corporations, entering therein the name of the claimant, the amount of the claim, the grounds therefor, with note of the evidence offered in support of the same, and the final conclusion of the committee thereon. At the close of the session said book of record shall be deposited with the auditor of state, to be kept by him, and he shall provide an index, showing the names of the claimants recorded therein. At any subsequent session the same shall be delivered, when desired, to the like committee having jurisdiction of such claims and shall always be open to the examination of the said committee of either house.

FORM OF BILLS.

16. All bills hereafter introduced shall be typewritten, on legal-cap paper, double spaced, and each line, except first and last lines of paragraphs, shall contain not less than five and one-half inches of typewritten matter.

RULES OF THE SENATE.

REGULAR ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1. The following order shall govern:
 - (1) Presentation of petitions and memorials, addressed to the senate or the general assembly.
 - (2) Introduction of bills.
 - (3) Resolutions.
 - (4) Communications on the president's table, including house messages.
 - (5) Reports of standing committees, in order in which they stand in the rules; except the committee on engrossed and enrolled bills, rules and printing.
 - (6) Reports of select committees.
 - (7) Unfinished business before the senate.
 - (8) Third reading of bills.
 - (9) General order of the day.

DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT.

2. The president shall take the chair at the hour to which the senate is adjourned and call the senate to order; and, if a quorum be present, he shall proceed with the regular order of daily business, unless otherwise ordered by the senate, or unless a special order for the day shall interfere therewith. He shall preserve order and decorum, and decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the senate. He shall appoint all committees, unless otherwise specially ordered. Immediately preceding the adjournment of each morning session, or, in case it cannot be done during that session, then as soon after the convening of the next following session as he may find most convenient, the president shall call for corrections of the journal of the last day's proceedings. He shall then cause any mistakes therein to be corrected by the secretary, and the journal shall then be approved.

THE PRESIDENT PRO TEMPORE.

3. The senate shall, at its pleasure, elect a president pro tem, who shall hold his office during the remaining portion of the time for which the president was elected; and when the president shall, from any cause, be absent, the president pro tem shall preside, except when the chair is filled by appointment by the president.

MESSENGERS.

4. There shall be appointed by the lieutenant governor, at each session of the senate, to hold their positions during such session, but subject to be

discharged by the president of the senate for inefficiency or misbehavior, or other reasons, in his judgment justifying such discharge, six messengers for the senate. And the president may appoint other messengers in the place of any discharged.

CALL OF THE SENATE.

5. One-fourth of the members may have a call of the senate and absent members sent for and their attendance enforced.

DEBATE AND DECORUM.

6. When a member is about to speak, in debate, or deliver any matter to the senate, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to "Mr. President," and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoid personalities and the imputation of improper motives.

MANNER OF VOTING.

7. When the vote is taken viva voce, questions shall be distinctly put in this form: viz.: "As many as are of the opinion (as the case may be) say 'aye.'" And after the affirmative voice is expressed: "As many as are of the contrary opinion say 'No.'" If the president doubt, or a division be called for, the senate shall divide—those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats, and afterwards those in the negative.

DUTY AND RIGHT OF VOTING.

8. Every member present when a question is put shall vote, unless he shall, for special cause, be excused by a vote from the senate; but no member shall vote on any question in the event of which he is directly and personally interested, or except by consent of the senate, in any case where he was not present when his name was called in the taking of the vote. Provided, that any member who was absent by leave of the senate may vote at any time before the result is announced.

FORM AND WITHDRAWAL OF MOTIONS.

9. All motions (except to adjourn, postpone, or commit) shall be reduced to writing, if required by any member of the senate. Any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, provided the same has not been amended by the senate, and that no amendment is pending thereto.

ORDER AND PRECEDENCE OF MOTIONS.

10. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone to a day certain, to commit or amend, to postpone indefinitely, which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are named; and no motion to postpone to a day certain, to commit or postpone indefinitely, being decided, shall be again allowed on the same day, and at the same stage of the bill or proposition. A motion to strike out the enacting clause of a bill shall have the precedence of a motion to amend; and, if carried, shall be considered equivalent to the rejection of the bill.

MOTIONS NOT DEBATABLE.

11. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question, shall be decided without debate, and all incidental questions of order arising after the motion is made for the previous question, and pending such motion, shall be decided—whether an appeal or otherwise—without debate.

THE PREVIOUS QUESTION.

12. The previous question shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and its effect shall be to put an end to all debate, and bring

the senate to a direct vote upon the pending amendments and then upon the main question, unless otherwise indicated by the motion and ordered by the senate, except that the member in charge of the measure under consideration shall have ten minutes in which to close the discussion, immediately before the vote is taken upon the main question. If the previous question is decided in the negative, the senate shall proceed with the matter before it, the same as though the previous question had not been moved.

DIVISION OF THE QUESTION.

13. Any member may call for a division of a question which shall be divided, if it comprehends propositions in substance so distinct that one being taken away, substantive propositions shall remain for the decision of the senate. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible; but, a motion to strike out being lost, shall preclude neither amendments to the matter attempted to be stricken out, nor a motion to strike out and insert.

RECONSIDERATION.

14. When a motion or question has been decided, any member having voted on the prevailing side may move a reconsideration, on the same or next legislative day.

CONCERNING THE PRINTING OF PAPERS.

15. A motion to print any paper presented to the senate may, on motion, be referred to the committee on printing, whose duty it shall be to report, at the earliest time practicable, on the propriety of printing.

INTRODUCTIONS, READINGS, AND FORM OF BILLS AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS.

16. Every bill shall be introduced on the report of a committee, or by leave, and shall at once be given its first reading. Every bill and joint resolution shall have received three several readings previous to its passage; but no bill or joint resolution shall have its second and third readings on the same day without a suspension of this rule; and every bill and joint resolution shall express in its title the object thereof. All rules of the senate applicable to bills shall apply with equal force to joint resolutions. Each bill and proposed joint resolution, when introduced, shall be typewritten double space, and accompanied by two copies thereof.

ENDORSEMENT AND PRESENTATION OF PETITIONS, BILLS, AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS.

17. Before the same is presented, there shall be endorsed on each petition a brief statement of the subject matter thereof, and on each bill and joint resolution the title thereof, and in either case the name of the senator presenting the same. In presenting a petition, the senator shall briefly state from his place in the senate chamber the subject matter to which the petition relates.

FIRST READING AND RECEPTION OR REJECTION OF BILLS AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS.

18. The first reading of a bill or joint resolution shall be for information, and, if objection be made to it, the question shall be: "Shall the bill (or joint resolution, as the case may be) be rejected?" If no objection be made, or the question to reject be lost, the bill or joint resolution shall go to its second reading without further questioning.

SECOND READING AND COMMITMENT.

19. Upon the second reading of a bill or joint resolution, the president shall refer the bill to an appropriate standing committee, unless otherwise ordered by the senate. If ordered by the senate to be considered by the committee of the whole, the senate shall fix the day for its consideration. If the bill or joint resolution be ordered to be engrossed, it shall be in order for its third reading any session after that day. No bill or joint resolution shall be committed or amended until it shall have been twice read.

COMMITMENT OF APPROPRIATION BILLS.

20a. All bills carrying appropriations or involving the expenditure of state funds shall be referred to the committee on appropriations, which the committee

shall report back to the senate not later than the first Monday after March 1st. After the third legislative day prior to said Monday, house bills shall be reported back by said committee within three days from the reference thereto.

No amendment to any bill reported by the committee on appropriations, or to any item thereof, shall be in order, except such as is germane to the subject matter of the bill, or item thereof, sought to be amended, and shall retrench expenditures and reduce the amounts of money covered by the bill or items thereof.

TIME OF INTRODUCTION OF BILLS.

20b. No bill shall be introduced in the senate after March 15th, except such bills as may be reported from standing committees as committee bills.

SCHEDULE AND CONSIDERATION OF APPROPRIATION BILLS.

20c. On or before the first Monday after March 10th, the committee on appropriations shall prepare an itemized schedule of all appropriations recommended by the committee on appropriations, and have the same printed and laid upon the desks of members, and no appropriation bill shall be taken up for consideration and passage until the third legislative day thereafter.

TIME OF INTRODUCTION OF APPROPRIATION BILLS.

20d. Bills carrying appropriations for state educational institutions and the institutions under the charge of the board of control shall not be introduced later than February 15th, and no bill carrying an appropriation for any purpose shall be introduced after March 1st, except by the committee on appropriations.

THIRD READING AND PASSAGE OF BILLS.

21. When a question is lost on engrossing a bill, or joint resolution for a third reading on a particular day, it shall not preclude a question to engross it for a third reading on a different day. After a third reading of a bill or a joint resolution, no amendment (except to fill blanks) shall be received, except by unanimous consent of the members present; and the vote on its final passage shall be immediately taken without debate.

COMMITMENT OF BILLS.

22. A bill or joint resolution may be committed at any time previous to its third reading.

THE FILLING OF BLANKS.

23. In filling blanks, the largest sum and longest time shall be first put.

HOUSE AMENDMENTS.

24. On the return of a bill or joint resolution from the house, with an amendment, it shall be placed with the third reading of bills, unless the senate shall otherwise order. On the question of adopting the amendment the vote shall be taken on the final passage of the bill, and if the amendment be adopted by a constitutional majority, no further vote is necessary.

PRINTING OF BILLS AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS.

25. All bills and joint resolutions introduced, except local or legalizing bills, shall be printed, unless otherwise ordered by the senate, and committees may order to be printed any bills under consideration by them, and any substitutes for bills or resolutions reported by them.

TIME OF MAKING CERTAIN COMMITTEE REPORTS.

26. It shall be in order for the committee on engrossed and enrolled bills, on rules and on printing to report at any time, when no member is addressing the senate.

CONSIDERATION OF SPECIAL ORDERS.

27. When any special order of the day is not proceeded with on the day assigned, it shall stand as a general order on each succeeding day until disposed of, unless otherwise ordered, but its consideration cannot be moved until that order of business is reached, when it shall be taken up in order of its file, and shall be taken up in order of precedence.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS AFTER A SPECIAL ORDER.

28. When the pending question is interrupted by a "special order," it shall, upon the disposal of the special order, be before the senate in the same stage as if it had not been so interrupted.

COMMITTEE CLERKS.

29. Committees are permitted to employ clerks by the majority vote of the whole committee. All applicants for the position of committee clerkship shall be examined by a committee of three appointed by the president of the senate. The clerk shall be selected by such vote, and in like manner may be discharged for inefficiency, or when the services of the clerk become unnecessary. All committee clerks shall be competent stenographers and of good moral character. Any clerk may be discharged for inefficiency, immorality or indecent or unbecoming conduct, whether in or out of the senate chamber; and, upon the request of any senator or the president of the senate, made to the chairman of a committee, a meeting of the committee shall be called for the purpose of considering the question of the discharge of such clerk upon any of the grounds above specified.

DUTIES OF COMMITTEE CLERKS.

30. Clerks of senate committees, when not engaged in duties pertaining to such committees, or work assigned them by the committee chairman, shall be subject to the discretion of the secretary of the senate for any labor connected with the duties of his position or his assistants. The secretary shall, from time to time, make detail from said clerks to assist in preparing copy or correcting proof for the daily journal.

FORM OF COMMITTEE REPORTS.

31. All reports of committees on bills or resolutions shall be made in duplicate and be accompanied with the original bill or resolution to which the report relates. Provided, that this rule shall not apply to the reports of committees on enrolled and engrossed bills.

TIME OF MAKING COMMITTEE REPORTS.

31a. The chairman or clerk of a committee, except of the appropriation committee, to whom a bill is referred, shall note thereon the date of its reference, and it shall be the duty of each committee to report back all bills in its hands, within fifteen days after the order of reference, unless a different time is granted by a vote of the senate.

VOTING IN COMMITTEE.

32. When a vote is taken in any committee upon any bill or resolution before it, or any motion relating to the merits thereof, the chairman shall see that no person is present except the members and clerk of said committee, unless otherwise ordered by the committee.

SMOKING.

33. Smoking in the senate chamber is hereby prohibited, while the senate is in session. And any officer or employe who shall indulge in smoking while on duty in the senate chamber or doorways leading thereto shall thereby subject himself to liability of discharge.

ADMISSION TO SENATE CHAMBER AND PROHIBITION OF LOBBYING.

34. Admission to the floor of the senate chamber shall be granted by the doorkeeper to the governor and his private secretary, members of the house of representatives, the state officers and their deputies, judges of the several courts, ex-members of the legislature, ex-state officers, uniformed soldiers and sailors of the United States army and navy, and the regular reporters of the senate and clerks of committees. No persons, except those herein specified, shall be admitted, except upon special permission of the president of the senate, or of a member of the senate. And no person shall be permitted, by members or otherwise, to come upon the floor of the senate or into the cloak rooms to solicit or influence senators in their official action, or to sell any article or to solicit subscriptions. No officer, or employe elected or appointed by the senate or any of its committees, shall solicit or endeavor to influence members of the legislature in their official action. Any person violating this rule shall be summarily dismissed by the senate.

CLEARING OF LOBBY AND GALLERY.

35. In case of disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobby or gallery, the presiding officer shall have the power to order the same cleared.

EXECUTIVE SESSION.

36. Before acting on executive business, the senate chamber shall be cleared, by direction of the president, of all persons except members, the secretary, the sergeant-at-arms, members enjoined and the secretary and sergeant-at-arms sworn to observe secrecy.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF COMMITTEE MEETINGS.

37. When an adjournment has been ordered by a vote of the senate and before adjournment is declared by the president of the senate, it shall be in order for the chairman of the several committees to announce in open senate the time and place of meeting of their respective committees.

SUSPENSION OF THE RULES AND TAKING FROM TABLE.

38. No standing rule or order of the senate shall be rescinded or suspended, nor shall any matter, tabled upon motion, be taken up, unless by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, except an order fixing the hour to which the senate shall stand adjourned.

CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTIONS.

39. Resolutions, including concurrent resolutions, shall not be acted upon by the senate upon the day the same are introduced or received by the senate, but shall lie upon the table for one legislative day if any member object to the immediate consideration thereof. But if no member object, the same may have immediate consideration. Nothing in this rule shall abridge or prevent the usual right to reference to committee.

RULES OF PARLIAMENTARY PRACTICE.

40. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Cushing's Manual shall govern the senate in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules or orders of the senate, and joint rules of the senate and house of representatives.

TIME OF CONVENING.

41. The hours to which the senate shall stand adjourned from day to day shall be 9 o'clock a. m. and 2 o'clock p. m., unless otherwise ordered by the senate.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES.

42. The duties of the officers and employes of the senate are as stated in the paragraph relating thereto, and appended to these rules.

DUTIES OF SECRETARY.

The secretary of the senate shall have charge of the secretary's desk, and shall see that no one is permitted therein except himself and those assisting him. He shall be responsible for the custody and safe-keeping of all bills, resolutions and other matters laid before or introduced into the senate, except while the same are in the possession of the committee to whom the same shall have been referred, and when delivering the same to said committee he shall take a proper receipt therefor. He shall see that the journal of each day's proceedings is correctly and fully kept, and fully made up before the next day's session, and be responsible for its safe-keeping. He shall have control of Room 25, which is assigned to said secretary for the use of himself and his assistants. He shall endorse on every bill or joint or concurrent resolution the date of its introduction, and by what senator, or of its receipt from the house, and also what action relating thereto is taken by the senate. The assistant secretaries shall be under his direction and he shall assign to them their several duties in connection with the duties of the secretary's desk.

DUTIES OF SERGEANT-AT-ARMS, FILE CLERK, BILL CLERK.

The sergeant-at-arms shall wear the appropriate badge of his office; shall attend the senate during its sessions; shall aid in the enforcement of order under the direction of the president of the senate; shall execute the commands of the senate from time to time, together with such process, issued by the authority thereof, as shall be directed to him by the presiding officers; shall see that the rule prohibiting smoking in the senate chamber is strictly enforced; shall, upon the request of any five members, have the senate chamber lighted up during any evening within the session, except Sunday, to an hour not later than 10 p. m.; shall see that no person, except one authorized to do so, disturbs or interferes with the desks of the members, or with the books, papers, etc., thereof; shall see that the printed bills and daily journals are, at the earliest practicable period, properly distributed and filed upon the desks of senators; shall have charge of the files in the senate room, and shall see that no copy of a bill is given out except to or upon the order of the president, a senator, or state officers; shall see that an additional doorkeeper is detailed for duty at the senate chamber upon each day within the session, except Sunday, from 8:30 a. m. to 10 p. m., but should not five members of the senate desire to occupy the chamber to that hour, the detail may be relieved at 9 p. m.; shall have charge of the messengers of the senate and see that they severally perform their duties, and shall promptly report to the president of the senate any inefficiency or violations of duty on the part of said messengers. He shall direct the file clerk, and bill clerk, if any employed, in the discharge of their duties.

DUTIES OF DOORKEEPER.

The doorkeeper of the senate shall wear his appropriate badge of office; shall have special charge of the main door of the chamber during the sittings of the senate, and shall see that the other doors of the senate are properly attended to; shall have general charge and oversight of the additional doorkeepers of the senate; shall detail such of the additional doorkeepers for such general or special duties as the sergeant-at-arms may deem proper and necessary for the efficiency of the senate and the protection of property within the chamber; shall see that the rule relating to the admission to the floor of the chamber is strictly enforced; shall, ten minutes before the opening of each session of the senate, see that the floor is cleared of all persons not entitled to occupy the same during the session; shall attend to seating visitors, and shall announce all committees and messengers from the governor or house.

JANITOR'S DUTIES.

The janitor of the senate shall have charge, under the direction of the sergeant-at-arms, of the cloak and retiring rooms adjoining the chamber, and shall see that the same are kept in proper order.

MESSENGERS AND THEIR DUTIES.

The messengers of the senate shall attend the senate during its sittings and perform the duties generally devolving on like employes. While the senate is sitting, two of their number shall be detailed for service in front of the secretary's desk. The messengers shall be under the direction of the sergeant-at-arms, while the senate is not sitting, and shall attend to such duties as he may assign them.

At least four messengers shall be on duty in the senate chamber upon every day of the session, except Sunday, from 8:30 a. m. until 6 p. m., whether the senate is in session or not.

VOTING IN EXECUTIVE SESSION.

43. In all executive sessions the method of voting shall be as follows: The secretary shall cut the senate roll call into slips, the roll shall be called, and each senator shall obtain the slip bearing his own name. After having marked his vote, the secretary shall collect same and hand to the presiding officer, who shall then obtain the result of the vote, and shall announce the result in this way: "The confirmation of..... is agreed to," or "The confirmation of..... is refused." The president shall then place these ballots in an envelope and seal it, and retain same until the close of the legislative session when he shall destroy them.

RULES OF THE HOUSE.

CALL TO ORDER.

1. He [the speaker] shall take the chair every day precisely at the hour to which the house shall have been adjourned; shall immediately call the members to order, and on appearance of a quorum shall cause the journal of the preceding day to be read.

PRESERVATION OF ORDER.

2. He [the speaker] shall preserve order and decorum, and speak to points of order in preference to other members, rising from his seat for that purpose; and he shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the house by any two members.

DECORUM IN PUTTING QUESTIONS.

3. He [the speaker] shall rise to put a question but may state it sitting.

PUTTING THE QUESTION.

4. Questions shall be distinctively put in this form, to-wit: "As many as are of the opinion that (as the question may be) say 'aye,'" and after the affirmative vote is expressed, "As many as are of a contrary opinion, say 'no.'" If the speaker doubts, or a division is called for, the house shall be divided. Those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats, and afterward those in the negative.

THE SPEAKER PRO TEMPORE.

5. The house shall at its pleasure elect a speaker pro tempore. When the speaker shall from any cause be absent, the speaker pro tempore shall preside, except when the chair is filled by appointment by either the speaker or the speaker pro tempore. The speaker or the speaker pro tempore shall have the right to name any member to perform the duties of the speaker, but such substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment. The acts of the speaker pro tempore shall have the same validity as those of the speaker. In the absence of both the speaker and the speaker pro tempore, the house shall name a speaker who shall preside over it and perform all the duties of speaker until such time as the speaker or speaker pro tempore shall be present, and his acts shall have the same force and validity as those of the regularly elected speaker.

APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES.

6. All committees shall be appointed by the speaker, unless otherwise especially directed by the house.

VOTE OF THE SPEAKER.

7. In all cases of a call of the yeas and nays, the speaker shall vote; in other cases he shall not be required to vote unless the house is equally divided, or unless his vote, if given to the minority, will make the division equal, and in case of such equal division the question shall be lost.

DOCUMENTS SIGNED BY THE SPEAKER.

8. All acts, addresses and joint resolutions shall be signed by the speaker, and all writs, warrants, subpoenas, issued by order of the house, shall be under his hand and attested by the clerk.

CLEARING THE LOBBY.

9. In case of any disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobby, the speaker or chairman of the committee of the whole house shall have power to have the same cleared.

REGULAR ORDER OF BUSINESS.

10. After the journal is read the following order shall govern:
1. Business pending at last previous adjournment.
 2. Petitions or remonstrances to be offered.
 3. Reports of committees.
 4. Resolutions laid over under Rule 34.
 5. Bills to be introduced.
 6. Resolutions.
 7. Messages and communications on the speaker's table.
 8. Bills and resolutions read a second time.
 9. Bills on their passage.
 10. Reports in the possession of the house shall be taken up in their order.

RECOGNITION AND DECORUM IN DEBATE.

11. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the house, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the presiding officer by his title, saying "Mr. Speaker," and shall not proceed until he shall be recognized by the chair, and shall confine himself to the question under debate and shall avoid personalities.

CALLING TO ORDER AND APPEALS FROM THE CHAIR.

12. When any member in speaking, or otherwise, transgresses the rules of the house, the speaker shall, or any member may, call him to order; in which case the member so called to order shall immediately sit down, but may be permitted with leave of the house to explain; and the house shall, if appealed to, decide the case, but without debate. If there be no appeal, the decision of the chair shall be submitted to; if the decision be in favor of the member so called to order, he is at liberty to proceed. If the case requires it, he shall be liable to the censure of the house.

RECOGNITION BY THE CHAIR.

13. Should two or more members rise at the same time, the speaker shall designate the member entitled to speak.

LIMITATION ON DEBATE.

14. No member shall speak more than once on the same question without leave of the house, nor more than twice until every member choosing

to speak shall have spoken, except as provided in section 26; provided further, when bills are being considered on their second reading debate thereon shall be limited to fifteen minutes to each member desiring to speak thereon, which may be extended by consent of the house.

DECORUM DURING DEBATE.

15. While the speaker is putting a question or addressing the house, no one shall walk out of or across the house; and when a member is speaking, no one shall engage in conversation or pass between him and the speaker.

LIMITATION ON RIGHT TO VOTE.

16. No member shall vote on any question in the event of which he is personally interested.

COUNT ON DIVISION OF HOUSE.

17. Upon a division and count of the house on any question, only those members standing in their places shall be counted.

DUTY OF VOTING.

18. Every member who shall be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the house for special reasons shall excuse him; but such a member must ask to be excused before commencing to take the vote on the main question.

STATING THE QUESTION.

19. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the speaker; or, being in writing, it shall be passed to the desk and read aloud by the clerk before debated.

FORM OF MOTIONS.

20. Every motion, except subsidiary or incidental motions, shall be reduced to writing if the speaker or any member desires it, but this exception shall not apply to motions to amend.

ENDORSEMENT OF BILLS AND OTHER PAPERS.

21. All bills, resolutions, petitions, memorials or other papers shall be accompanied by the name of the member presenting the same, and also the name of the county.

WITHDRAWAL OF MOTIONS.

22. After a motion is stated by the speaker, or read by the clerk, it shall be deemed to be in possession of the house, but may be withdrawn by leave of the house.

ORDER AND PRECEDENCE OF MOTIONS.

23. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn; to lay on the table; for the previous question; to postpone to a certain day; to commit or amend; to postpone indefinitely; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are arranged, and no motion to postpone to a day certain, to commit or postpone indefinitely being decided, shall again be allowed on the same day, and at the same stage of the bill or proposition. A motion to strike out the enacting words of a bill shall have precedence of a motion to amend; and, if carried, shall be considered equivalent to its rejection.

ORDER ON QUESTION OF COMMITMENT.

24. When a resolution shall be offered or a motion made to refer any subject, and different committees shall be proposed, question shall be taken in the following order: The committee of the whole house; a standing committee; a select committee.

MOTION TO ADJOURN.

25. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, except when a member is speaking, or the house voting.

PREVIOUS QUESTION.

26. The previous question shall always be put in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" When a member moves a previous question he shall specifically state in his motion whether it shall apply to the main question and the amendments, or to the amendment or amendments only. It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and when the motion prevails its effect shall be to put an end to all debate and to bring the house to a direct vote upon the question to which the motion applies, except when the motion applies to the main question, the member in charge of the measure under consideration, shall have ten (10) minutes in which to close the discussion before the vote is taken; when the motion applies to an amendment the person proposing the amendment shall have five minutes to close the discussion on the amendment. On a motion for the previous question, and prior to submitting the same, a call of the house shall be in order; but after such motion shall have been adopted no call shall be in order prior to the decision of the main question. If the previous question is decided in the negative the house shall proceed with the matter before it the same as though the previous question had not been moved.

MOTIONS NOT DEBATABLE.

27. Motions to lay on the table, to adjourn, and for the previous question, shall be decided without debate.

EFFECT OF INDEFINITE POSTPONEMENT.

28. When a question is postponed indefinitely, it shall not be again acted upon during the session.

DIVISION OF THE QUESTION.

29. Any member may call for a division of the question, which shall be subdivided if it comprehends questions so distinct that one being taken away, the rest may stand entire for the discussion of the house. A motion to strike out being lost shall preclude neither an amendment nor a motion to strike out and insert. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

COMMITMENT.

30. Motions and reports may be committed at the pleasure of the house.

IRRELEVANT AMENDMENTS.

31. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.

RECONSIDERATION.

32. When a motion has been made and carried or lost, it shall be in order for any member of the majority, on the same or succeeding day, to move for a reconsideration thereof, and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions except the consideration of a conference report, a motion to fix the day to which the house shall adjourn, to adjourn, or to take a recess, and shall not be withdrawn after the said succeeding day without the consent of the house; and thereafter any member may call it up for consideration, provided that such motion, if made during the last six days of the session, shall be disposed of when made. A motion to reconsider any vote by which a bill has passed or failed to pass the house, shall require a constitutional majority to be sustained.

PRESENTATION OF PETITIONS.

33. All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the house shall be filed by the member with the chief clerk or his assistant prior to the convening of the house. When in the regular order of business the time is reached for presenting petitions or remonstrances, the chief clerk or his assistant shall read a list of the petitions on file, giving the member's name who filed the same and a brief resume of the contents thereof, and the same shall be referred to the committee of his selection unless otherwise ordered

by the house. Each member upon filing any such petition, memorial or other paper shall endorse thereon his name and a failure to do so will cause the same to be ignored.

CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTIONS.

34. A proposition requesting information from the governor, secretary or any other state officer, and all resolutions shall lie on the table one day for consideration, and all such propositions shall be taken up for consideration in the order they were presented, immediately after the reports are called for from the select committee, and when adopted, the clerk shall cause the same to be delivered.

CALL OF THE HOUSE.

35. Any five members, if the speaker be in the chair, shall be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members.

METHOD OF CALLING THE ROLL.

36. Upon calls of the house, or in taking the yeas and nays on any question, the names of the members shall be called alphabetically, except that "Mr. Speaker" shall be called last.

ABSENCES AND EXCUSES.

37. No member shall absent himself from the service of the house without leave unless he be sick or unable to attend.

METHOD OF CALLING THE HOUSE.

38. Upon the call of the house, the names of the members shall be called by the clerk, and the absentees noted after which the names of the absentees shall again be called over, and the sergeant-at-arms be directed by the speaker to compel their attendance. Any member occupying his seat during a call of the house shall be counted by the speaker and his name entered in the journal as being present but not voting, for the purpose of making a quorum.

COMMITTEE MEETINGS.

39. No committee shall sit during the sitting of the house without special leave.

QUORUM AND DEMAND FOR THE YEAS AND NAYS.

40. A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum, and upon demand of any two members the yeas and nays shall be ordered; the members demanding the yeas and nays shall arise for that purpose, and their names shall be entered in the journal.

TIME OF CONVENING.

41. The hours to which this house shall stand adjourned from day to day shall be nine o'clock a. m., and two o'clock p. m., unless otherwise ordered by the house.

COMMITTEE ON PAIRS.

42. A committee on pairs may be appointed, to consist of two persons, one of whom shall be selected by the members of each of the two dominant political parties represented in the house. It shall be the duty of the committee to arrange all pairs between members, and to announce such pairs and the time for which they shall continue, to the house, which announcement shall be entered on the journal. Thereafter neither member so paired shall vote (upon any question of a political or partisan nature) until the time of pairing has expired, unless such pair is sooner dissolved by the mutual agreement of the persons so paired. When pairs are dissolved such dissolution shall be entered on the journal of the house.

FORM OF BELLS AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS.

43. All bills and joint resolutions introduced in the house shall be type-

written or printed, accompanied by three carbon or true copies; one copy shall be marked and known as the "original" and one copy marked and designated as "printer's copy." The "original" shall, after registration, be subject to delivery to the chairman of the committee to which reference is made, unless otherwise ordered, and the "printer's copy" shall be delivered to the state printer.

TIME OF INTRODUCTION OF BILLS. APPROPRIATION BILLS. DUTIES OF THE COMMITTEE ON APPROPRIATIONS.

44. Bills calling for appropriations for state educational institutions, the institutions in charge of the board of control, all claims and all appropriations for clerical help in the executive departments of the state of Iowa, shall be introduced not later than February 15, 1919; no bill carrying an appropriation for any purpose after March 1, 1919, and no other bill of any kind after March 10, 1919, except by standing committee as a committee bill, but this exception shall not be applicable to the appropriation bills which are herein specifically required to be introduced or reported not later than certain dates herein specified.

The appropriations committee shall report back to the house not later than March 10th, all bills in its hands.

Senate bills thereafter received carrying appropriations shall be referred to the appropriations committee, but must be reported back to the house within three days, and remain on the calendar three days before final consideration.

On or before March 10, 1919, the committee on appropriations shall prepare a schedule of all appropriations and have the same printed and laid upon the desks of the members, designating in such schedule such bills as may have already passed the house and such as remain to be considered.

READINGS OF BILLS.

45. Every bill shall receive three several readings, but no bill shall have its second and third reading on the same day.

FIRST READING AND RECEPTION OR REJECTION OF BILLS.

46. The first reading of the bill shall be for information; and if opposition be made to it, the question is: "Shall this bill be rejected?" If no opposition be made, or if the question to reject be negatived, the bill shall go to its second reading without a question.

SECOND READING AND COMMITMENT.

47. Upon a second reading of the bill, the speaker shall state that it is ready for commitment, amendment or engrossment; and if committed, then the question shall be whether to a select or a standing committee, or to a committee of the whole house. If to a committee of the whole house, the house shall determine on what day.

COMMITMENT OF APPROPRIATION AND REVENUE BILLS.

48. All bills to appropriate money shall be referred to the appropriations committee, and all bills pertaining to the levy, assessment or collection of taxes shall be referred to the committee on ways and means.

CONSIDERATION OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS.

49. After a bill has been committed and reported back it shall be considered on its second reading after the amendments of committee have been read.

RE-COMMITMENT.

50. After the commitment and report thereof to the house, or any time before its passage, a bill may be re-committed.

MANNER OF ENGROSSMENT.

51. All bills ordered to be engrossed shall be written with typewriter with black record ribbon.

CONSIDERATION OF BILLS UPON THIRD READING.

52. No amendment, unless by way of correcting an error or omission, shall be received to any bill on its third reading, and no debate shall be allowed on the same.

CERTIFICATION OF BILLS.

53. When a bill shall pass it shall be certified by the clerk noting the day of its passage at the foot thereof.

AMENDMENT AND SUSPENSION OF RULES.

54. No standing rule or order of the house shall be rescinded or changed without one day's notice being given of the motion therefor, nor shall any rule be suspended except by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present; nor shall the order of business, as established by the rules of the house, be postponed or changed except by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present.

TIME OF MAKING CERTAIN COMMITTEE REPORTS

55. It shall be in order for the committee on engrossed and enrolled bills to report at any time when no member is addressing the house.

PRINTING OF BILLS, MEMORIALS, AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS.

56. All bills, memorials and joint resolutions, except legalizing bills, shall be printed for the use and information of the members, unless otherwise ordered by the house.

COMMITTEE HEARINGS.

57. When any matter is referred to a standing committee by motion of any member, it shall be the duty of the chairman of such standing committee to notify such member of the time of the sitting upon such matter referred, and such member shall be permitted to confer with such committee during their consideration of such matter, but no one not a member of the committee shall be present when the final vote is taken on any matter under consideration, and no final action shall be taken by the committee upon any bill on the day of public hearing thereon.

COMMITTEE CLASSIFICATION OF BILLS.

58. Each standing committee of the house shall classify all bills referred to it. The bills of the greatest public importance shall be placed in the first class, and all other bills in the second class. Bills of the first class shall be first considered and reported to the house and no committee shall retain possession of any bill longer than ten days, except by consent of the house. But this shall not apply to the committee on appropriations.

RULES OF PARLIAMENTARY PRACTICE.

59. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the house in all cases where they are not inconsistent with the standing rules of this house and joint rules of both houses.

JOINT RESOLUTIONS.

60. Joint resolutions shall be framed and treated as a bill.

COMMITTEE PROCEDURE AND REPORTS.

61. The chairman or clerk of a committee to which a bill is referred shall note thereon the date of its reference and it shall be the duty of each committee to report back all bills on its hands within ten days after the order of reference unless longer time is granted by a vote of the house, except as provided by rule 58. The minority of any committee may present its rec-

ommendations in writing with the report of the committee, and the same shall be printed in the journal, and said recommendation may, by a vote of the house, be substituted for the report of the committee. The clerks of the different committees shall be subject to their respective chairmen.

When a motion which works a final disposition of a bill in the committee is up for adoption the roll of the committee shall be called and the yeas and nays entered in the minutes of the meeting; this last provision, however, shall not apply to the committee on appropriations and judiciary.

It shall be the duty of the chairman to see that the record of the committee meetings as herein provided, is properly kept, and that the same is deposited with the chief clerk of the house at the final adjournment of the session.

COMMITTEE QUORUM.

62. Seven members, or a majority, shall constitute a quorum of each standing committee.

DECORUM DURING SESSIONS.

63. No member or officer of the house shall be permitted to read newspapers within the bar of the house while the journal is being read, nor shall any person be permitted to smoke on the floor of the house during its session, or in the galleries at any time.

ADMISSION TO THE FLOOR OF THE HOUSE AND PROHIBITION OF LOBBYING.

64. No one shall be admitted to the floor of the house during its sessions, except members of the general assembly and employes in the performance of their duties, ex-members of the general assembly and officers of the state government, judges and ex-judges of the supreme, district and circuit courts, the families of members of the house, trustees, superintendents and officers of the state institutions, on the invitation of the member from the district in which the institution is located, and each member shall have the right to admit a friend who may be visiting him. Representatives of the press to be admitted to the reporters' gallery.

Lobbying shall not be permitted on the floor of the house while the house is in session.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES—CHIEF CLERK.

65. The clerk of the house shall have charge of the clerk's desk and shall see that no one is permitted therein except himself and those assisting him. He shall be responsible for the custody and safe-keeping of all bills, resolutions and other matters laid before or introduced into the house, except while the same are in possession of the committee to whom the same shall have been referred, and when delivering the same to said committee he shall take a proper receipt therefor. He shall see that the journal of each day's proceedings is correctly and fully kept and fully made up before the next day's session, and be responsible for its safe-keeping. He shall have control of rooms 4 and 5, which are assigned to said clerk for the use of himself and his assistants. He shall endorse on every bill or joint or concurrent resolution, the date of its introduction and by what member, or of its receipt from the senate, and also what action relating thereto is taken by the house. The assistant clerks shall be under his direction and he shall assign them their several duties in connection with the work of the clerk's desk.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS.

The sergeant-at-arms shall wear the appropriate badge of his office, shall attend the house during its sessions, shall aid during the enforcement of order, under the direction of the speaker of the house, shall execute the commands of the house from time to time, together with such process, issued by the authority thereof, as shall be directed to him by the presiding officer; shall, upon request of any member, have the house lighted up during any evening within the session, except Sunday, to an hour not later than 10 p. m.; shall see that no person, except those authorized to do so, disturbs or interferes with the desks of the members, or with the books, papers,

etc., thereat shall see that the printed bills are properly distributed and filed upon the desks of the members, shall have charge of the files in the house bill room, and shall see that no copy of the bill is given except to or upon the order of the speaker of the house, or member, or state officer; shall see that an additional doorkeeper is detailed for duty at the house upon each day within the session, except Sunday, from 8:30 a. m. to 10:00 p. m.; but should no member of the house desire to occupy the chamber to that hour the detail may be relieved at 9:00 p. m.; shall have charge of the messengers of the house and see that they severally perform their duties, and shall promptly report to the speaker of the house any inefficiency or violation of duty on the part of said messengers.

DOORKEEPER.

The doorkeeper of the house shall wear his appropriate badge of office; shall have special charge of the main door of the chamber during the sittings of the house, and shall see that the other doors of the house are properly attended to; shall have general charge and oversight of the additional doorkeepers of the house, shall detail such of the additional doorkeepers for such general or special duties as the sergeant-at-arms may deem proper or necessary for the efficiency of the house and the protection of the property within the chamber; shall see that the rule relating to admission to the floor of the chamber is strictly enforced; shall, ten minutes before the opening of each session of the house, see that the floor is cleared of all persons not entitled to occupy the same during the session; shall attend to seating visitors, and shall announce all committees and messages from the governor or senate.

JANITORS.

The janitors of the house shall have charge, under the direction of the sergeant-at-arms, of the cloak and retiring rooms adjoining the chamber, and shall see that the same are kept in proper order.

MESSENGERS.

The messengers of the house shall attend the house during its sittings and perform the duties generally devolving on like employes. The messengers shall be under the direction of the sergeant-at-arms while the house is not sitting, and shall attend to such duties as he may assign them.

COMMITTEE CLERKS.

66. Committee clerks of the house shall be under the general direction of the speaker. All committee clerks shall be on duty at the house from 8:30 a. m. until 5:30 p. m., unless otherwise ordered. Any clerk absenting himself or herself from the house, except for the noon luncheon, without permission from the speaker, shall not receive any pay for the day or days on which he or she is absent. Committee clerks shall do work for any member of the house upon request unless otherwise employed.

EXTRA COMPENSATION OF EMPLOYEES.

67. No employe shall receive any extra compensation or tips for services performed while on duty. Any violation of this rule shall be ground for removal.

ORGANIZATION OF COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

68. In forming committee of the whole house, the speaker shall leave his chair, and a chairman to preside in committee shall be appointed by the speaker.

CONSIDERATION OF BILLS IN COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

69. Upon bills committed to the committee of the whole house, the bill shall be first read throughout by the clerk or chairman, and then read again.

or debated by the clauses, leaving the preamble to be last considered. After report, the bill shall be again subject to be debated and amended by clauses before a question to engross it be taken.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS TO MOTIONS.

70. All amendments made to an original motion in committee shall be incorporated in a motion and so reported.

AMENDMENTS BY COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

71. All amendments made to a report committed to a committee of the whole house shall be noted and reported as in the case of bills.

FILLING BLANKS.

72. In filling up blanks in the committee of the whole house, the largest sum and the longest time and the highest number shall be first put.

RULES IN COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

73. The rules of the house shall be observed in committee of the whole house, so far as they are applicable.

BIOGRAPHIES OF STATE SENATORS.

HENRY C. ADAMS,

Senator from the Forty-seventh district, composed of the counties of Clay, Dickinson, Emmet, Kossuth and Palo Alto, was born at McGregor, Iowa. Moved to Spencer, Iowa, where he acquired his education in the public schools, and by his own exertions became a registered pharmacist at the age of eighteen. He later located at Algona, engaging in the drug business. During the Spanish-American war served as hospital steward. At the close of the war he returned to Algona and entered the real estate and farm loan business, later entering the banking business. Was married June 6, 1900, to Irma D. Clarke. Is prominent in Masonry, having attained the thirty-second degree in the Scottish Rite and is also a Knight Templar and a Shriner. Is also a member of the Knights of Pythias and Elks lodges. Elected senator in 1916. A republican in politics.

WALTER W. ANDERSON,

Senator from Forty-eighth district, was born in Jefferson, Iowa, January 7, 1872, of American parentage. He attended the high school at Jefferson and later took a business course in Des Moines. In 1898 he moved to Scranton, where he has since been engaged in the banking business and farming. He is president of the Bank of Scranton. Elected representative in 1912. Re-elected in 1914 and 1918. Elected senator in 1918. A republican in politics.

WALLACE H. ARNEY,

Senator from the Twenty-eighth district, comprising the county of Marshall, was born in Marshall county, Iowa, April 2, 1862, of American-born parents. Received his education in the public schools and Oskaloosa College. Taught school for a few years, afterwards engaging in farming and feeding, which he still follows; also interested in several banks, being president of the Iowa Savings Bank of Marshalltown and Albion Savings Bank of Albion. Elected representative in 1906, and re-elected in 1908. Elected senator in 1912 and re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

GEORGE W. BALL,

State senator from the Second senatorial district, is a native of West Virginia, and came with his parents to Jefferson county, Iowa, in 1854. He is the son of Joseph and Margaret Langfitt Ball. A descendent of the same family as Mary Ball, the mother of George Washington. His education was secured in the public schools and Fairfield University. He was married in 1872 to Miss Margaret L. Laughlin of Brookville, Iowa, who died in 1912. He has four sons and one daughter. Mr. Ball was elected representative in the twenty-second, twenty-third and thirty-sixth; and senator in the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth general assemblies. He is

engaged in farming, banking and manufacturing, and is a director of the Iowa State Savings Bank, the Iowa Loan and Trust company, and the Fairfield Gasoline Engine company. He is a member of the Christian church, the I. O. O. F. of Fairfield, and is a republican in politics.

NICHOLAS BALKEMA,

Senator from the Forty-ninth district, composed of the counties of Lyon, O'Brien, Sioux and Osceola, was born in Gibbsville, Sheboygan county, Wisconsin, April 7, 1865, of Dutch parents. Attended the district school at Gibbsville and afterwards graduated from the Sheboygan Falls high school. Moved to Newkirk, Iowa, in 1884. Taught school one year and then started in the mercantile business at that place, running the postoffice in connection therewith. Sold out in 1894 and moved to Sioux Center, continuing the same business and in which he still is engaged. Was interested in a bank for a few years and held the office of vice president. Has served on the city council and is president of the school board, having served in that capacity twenty years. Is a member of the Reformed Church of America. Elected senator in 1908. Re-elected in 1912 and 1916. A republican in politics.

J. L. BROOKHART,

Senator from the Tenth district, composed of Washington and Henry counties, was born September 9, 1871, in Missouri, and at an early age moved to Iowa, and in 1894, to Washington, Iowa. Attended rural schools, at the age of seventeen began teaching, farming in the summer time. Graduated from the Washington Academy in 1896, and was principal of the Washington school for two years. During this time he read law in the office of his brother, Col. S. W. Brookhart. Passed the bar examination and was admitted to the bar in May, 1898, and in July of the same year was appointed county attorney, having the unique and unusual experience of being county attorney in his first term of court. His mother, Cynthia Wildman Brookhart, came from Kentucky, and died in 1916; his father, A. C. Brookhart, came from Ohio, is a veteran of the Civil War, and resides at Washington, Iowa. Elected senator in 1918. A republican in politics.

A. L. BROXAM,

Senator from the Twenty-third district, composed of the county of Jackson, was born on a farm near Welton, Clinton county, Iowa, December 16, 1868. His father, Benjamin Broxam, was born near Hull, England, and his mother, Mary Lynch Broxam, was born in Ohio of Dutch-Irish parentage. Attended district and high school also business college at Dixon, Illinois, and later attended the college of pharmacy at Highland Park College, Des Moines, and has since followed this vocation at Maquoketa. Was married in 1903 to Alice Langridge. Was president of the Jackson County Agricultural Society and a member of the city council for six years. Elected to the senate in 1916. A democrat in politics.

JONAS DEMOSS BUSER,

Senator from the Twentieth district, composed of Muscatine and Louisa counties, was born in Louisa county, Iowa, January 15, 1867, of American born parents. He attended the public schools of Conesville, Iowa, and Iowa City Academy. He also attended the collegiate department of the

State University, and in 1892 he completed one of the then two year law course in the State University. He was compelled to relinquish his school work because of serious eye trouble and engaged in farming. Served two terms as county supervisor, and was twice president of the State Association of County Supervisors. Elected senator in 1918. A republican in politics.

O. A. BYINGTON,

Senator from the Twenty-fifth district, composed of the counties of Johnson and Iowa, has been a life-long resident of Iowa City. His father, LeGrand Byington, was one of the early settlers of the state. He is a graduate of the college of liberal arts and of the college of law of the State University of Iowa. Then served as county superintendent of schools of Johnson county for four years. Was a member of the house in the twenty-sixth general assembly; district judge of the Eighth judicial district 1903-1907. Is president of the Citizens' Savings & Trust Company of Iowa City. Has practiced law at Iowa City since 1890, except while serving on the bench. Elected senator in 1916. Is a democrat in politics.

T. C. CESSNA,

Senator from the Twelfth district, composed of Poweshiek and Keokuk counties, born in Bedford county, Pennsylvania. Came to Iowa in 1837, and located in Grinnell. He was educated in the public schools and private instruction. Has been actively and extensively engaged in farming and the cattle business for the past thirty years. An active member of the Corn Belt Meat Producers Association. Is now chairman of the Poweshiek County Council of Defense. Elected senator in 1918. A republican politically.

GEORGE FRANKLIN COBURN,

Senator from the Forty-sixth district, composed of the counties of Cherokee, Ida and Plymouth. Son of Alanson and Mary Ann (Wright) Coburn, born of New England ancestry, at Belvidere, Illinois, May 12, 1856. His Coburn ancestor, who served in King Philips' war, came to America in 1635, settled at Ipswich, thence to Dracut, Mass. Senator Coburn is a descendant from the same family as Governor Abner Coburn, Maine's Civil War governor. He began farming in 1877 on the Elmhurst farm at Marcus, Iowa. was married on November 7, 1879, to Mary Ann Pettengill Coburn, and has five children. He is a member of the Marcus Commercial Club, a Presbyterian, is past master of Little Sioux Lodge A. F. & A. M. No. 521, T. S. Parvin Consistory No. 5 of Sioux City, representative in the twenty-eighth, twenty-ninth, thirtieth, thirty-first, and senator in the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth general assemblies of Iowa. A republican in politics.

BEN EDWARDS,

Senator from the Thirty-first district, composed of the counties of Boone and Story, was born in Scranton, Pennsylvania, May 19, 1854, of Welsh parents. His early education was received in the public schools of that city. In October, 1873, he moved with his family to Beacon, Mahaska county, Iowa, where he attended the public schools. Moved to Carroll county in 1876, and engaged in farming until he was twenty-five years of age. After leaving the farm went into business first at Dedham and later at Carrollton. Was married to Maggie Brammer December 31, 1895, and has four children, one son and three daughters. In 1905 moved to Ames, Iowa, and held the position of superintendent of grounds and build-

ings until 1910, when he entered the retail coal and ice business. Has held various political offices such as township trustee and city councilman. Also served as mayor while a resident of the city of Dedham. Was elected to the senate in 1916 on the republican ticket.

WILLIAM T. EVANS.

Senator from the Thirty-ninth district, composed of the counties of Bremer and Butler, was born on a farm, near Waterloo, Iowa, November 8, 1869. His parents, John O. and Rebecca Evans, American born, came to Iowa from Pennsylvania in 1856. He attended country school and completed the work at the East Waterloo High School as a member of the class of 1889. Entered the State University of Iowa the fall of 1892. Owned and published the Vidette-Reporter, the university newspaper, during 1895 and 1896. Was graduated from the College of Liberal Arts in 1896 and the College of Law in 1897. Has practiced law at Parkersburg, Iowa, since June, 1897. Married Lela Phelps of Independence, Iowa, June 25, 1902. Has one son. Was county attorney of Butler county in 1905 and 1906. Elected senator in 1916. A republican in politics.

ALBERT M. FELLOWS.

Senator from the Fortieth district, composed of Allamakee and Fayette counties, was born in Allamakee county, March 1, 1864. His father, born in Vermont, served as representative in the eleventh general assembly and as senator in the twelfth and thirteenth general assemblies and for twenty years was judge of the Thirteenth judicial district of Iowa. His mother was a native of New York. He obtained his education in the public schools of Lansing and the Upper Iowa University at Fayette. Served the city of Lansing for eight years as councilman and four years as mayor. Married Miss Elsie Smith of Cresco, Iowa, in 1889. Has one daughter and five sons, three sons being now in military service. Is engaged in the lumber business and is president of the Peoples State Bank at Lansing, Iowa. Elected senator in 1912, re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

HERBERT I. FOSKETT,

Senator from Seventh district, composed of Page and Fremont counties. Born in Henry county, Illinois, near Kewanee, December 11, 1861, of New England parentage. Attended grade schools in Illinois and high school in Sacramento, California. Returning to Iowa in 1878 he worked in stores and post office until 1883, when he became cashier of the Commercial Bank in Essex, Iowa. In 1885 he removed to Shenandoah and engaged in the farm loan business, the firm name being Webster and Foskett. This firm was succeeded later by the present firm of Foskett and Nye. In 1901 he was elected president of the Commercial Savings Bank of Shenandoah, which was later changed to a National Bank and in 1910 consolidated with the Shenandoah National Bank, of which he has since been vice president. He was married in 1893 to Miss May Tucker. Elected senator in 1914. Republican in politics.

JOHN W. FOSTER,

Senator from the Seventeenth district, composed of the counties of Audubon, Guthrie and Dallas, was born and reared in Guthrie county. Educated in the State Agricultural College at Ames and graduated from the law depart-

ment of the State University of Iowa in 1879. Beginning in 1880 he served three terms as county auditor of Guthrie county. For many years was an abstractor of titles and practicing attorney. Owns a farm of 1,240 acres adjoining Guthrie Center and is interested largely in live stock business. Is president of the First National Bank of Guthrie Center, and First National Bank of Stuart, and director and majority stock owner in Montieith Savings Bank. Is also president of Iowa Loan and Investment Company and president of Iowa Farm Mortgage Company. Elected senator to fill vacancy caused by resignation of Anthony M. McColl.

JOSEPH R. FRAILEY,

Senator from the First district, composed of Lee county, was born in Ft. Madison March 2, 1876. Graduated Ft. Madison high school 1893; State University of Iowa Liberal Arts, 1898; Law, 1900. Second Lieutenant Company F, Fiftieth Iowa Infantry, United States Volunteers, during Spanish-American war and up to the time this regiment was mustered out of service. City solicitor of Ft. Madison from 1905 up to the time he took his seat in the senate at which time he resigned. Connected with the legal department of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad from 1900 to 1905. Practiced law in Ft. Madison since 1905. Is married, and republican in politics.

W. J. GREENELL,

Senator from the Twenty-second district, composed of Clinton county, was born in the city of Clinton June 13th, 1878. He was educated in the Clinton public schools and business college. Was employed in railroad office work a short time after leaving school, but gave this up to take a position in the wholesale drug business, and has sold pharmaceuticals in eastern Iowa for the past sixteen years. He is a thirty-second degree Mason and a Shriner. Was married to Hazel C. McKinley May 12th, 1910. Elected senator November 5th, 1918. A republican in politics.

JOHN K. HALE,

Senator from the Twenty-fourth district, composed of Cedar and Jones counties, was born August 27, 1858 in Gullford, Conn. In 1859 moved with his parents to Anamosa, Iowa, where he has since resided. Received his education in the rural schools. Was married in 1882 and has two daughters. Has been engaged in farming for many years, still owns his farm. At present is engaged in buying and selling grain and in the grocery and meat business. Served as township trustee and was county supervisor for eight years. Elected representative from Jones county in the thirty-sixth general assembly. Elected senator in 1916. A republican in politics.

WILLIS G. HASKELL,

Senator from the Twenty-sixth district, composed of Linn county, was born June 5, 1857, in Bradford, Iowa. Attended the graded schools of Cedar Falls, Charles City and Independence. Was employed as telegrapher, station agent and traveling freight and passenger agent from 1873 to 1893, then entered the wholesale and retail coal business in which he is still engaged. Is also interested in the manufacturing business being president of the Johnson Gas Appliance Co., and is also interested in the real estate

business, being president of the J. S. Anderson Land Co., and the Mound Farm Land Co. Has been a director of the Merchants National Bank for a number of years. Has served as alderman of Vinton and Cedar Rapids chairman of the park commission of Cedar Rapids, member of the republican state central committee, president of the commercial club and as postmaster from 1909 to 1913. Was married June 15, 1881, to Mae E. Williams and has four children, two boys and two girls. Is a member of the Masonic, Knights of Pythias and B. P. O. E. lodges. Elected on the republican ticket in 1916.

PERRY C. HOLDOEGEL,

Senator from Twenty-seventh district, composed of Webster and Calhoun counties; was born on a farm near Woodbine, Iowa, September 7, 1869; served as apprentice to brick mason and to printer; clerked in grocery and dry goods stores; worked his way through normal school; was engaged in public school work fourteen years. Settled in Rockwell City, where he had been city superintendent and now resides. He has managed the local (Central Mutual) telephone company since its organization. His largest financial interest is in farming. He is also interested in a number of banks. Was married in 1895 to Mattie A. Forest of Dunlap, Iowa, and to this union two children were born, Donald in 1901 and Dorothy in 1905. Served as secretary and chairman of the Republican County Central Committee. Elected to the Iowa senate in November, 1916. A republican in politics.

B. J. HORCHEM,

The senator from Dubuque county, the Thirty-fifth district, is principal of the Audubon school at Dubuque. He was born December 4, 1866, the son of John and Henrietta (Plaster) Horchem. His father, a Union soldier, died shortly after the war. In 1884 he was graduated from the Dyersville schools (of which he was afterwards principal); in 1892, from the Normal School of Valparaiso, Indiana; and from the Business College at Cedar Rapids. He has subsequently pursued special courses of sociology and psychology in Columbia University, and the University of Chicago. He was three times elected superintendent of Dubuque county. His great achievement has been the development of the ideals of "Park Life," and "social center" activities. He is connected with numerous societies of an educational, sociological and scientific character. He is especially interested in all that pertains to education, health and general "uplift." He was elected representative in 1914, was re-elected in 1916, and elected senator in 1918.

CLEMENT F. KIMBALL,

Senator from the Nineteenth district, composed of Pottawattamie county, was born in Anamosa, Iowa, August 11, 1868, of American parentage. His education began in the public schools. Attended Iowa State College, where he graduated in 1889. Also attended the university of Michigan where he graduated in 1895. Married Miss Carroll Williams in 1895. Served as assistant county attorney for Pottawattamie county from 1899 to 1903, and as city solicitor for the city of Council Bluffs from 1906 to 1912. Is a member of the Masonic order, the Knights of Pythias and of the Council Bluffs Rowing Association. Elected senator in 1912. Re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

DAVID W. KIMBERLY,

Senator from Scott county, was born in Deadwood, S. D., August 6, 1878. When six weeks old, he moved with his parents to West Liberty, in Muscatine county, his father being Amos E. Kimberly, a farmer and stock raiser of that place, and has lived on the farm most of his life. He received his education at the West Liberty, Springdale High School and Bryant-Stratton's Business College, of Chicago. His mother was a daughter of David Wilson, of West Liberty, Iowa. He was married to Elsie King, of Chicago. He is a member of the Mystic Shrine, Knights Templar, Scottish Rites, Mohassan Grotto, Eastern Star, Elks, Owls, Odd Fellows and Turner Society. Was elected representative in 1914 and re-elected in 1916, and to the senate in 1918. A republican in politics.

THOMAS A. KINGLAND,

Senator from the Forty-first district composed of Mitchell, Winnebago and Worth counties, was born on a farm in Winnebago county, Iowa, March 27, 1875, of Norwegian parentage. He attended the rural schools and later on St. Ansgar Seminary, Augsburg Seminary, Minneapolis, Minnesota, and entered the State University of Iowa in 1896. Graduated from the College of Liberal Arts and Law in June, 1901. He located at Forest City, Iowa, in June 1901, for the practice of law where he resided until February, 1909, when he moved to Lake Mills in the same county, where he has since resided. Was elected county attorney of Winnebago county in 1904 and held the office for two terms. He represented Winnebago county in the thirty-fifth general assembly and was elected state senator in 1918, on the republican ticket.

KARL M. LE COMPTE,

Senator from the Fourth district, composed of the counties of Wayne and Lucas, was born at Corydon, Iowa, May 25, 1887. His parents located in Corydon at an early date and the subject of this sketch has spent his entire life at Corydon, graduating from the high school in 1905. Four years later he graduated from the State University of Iowa with a degree of Bachelor of Arts. He immediately engaged in the newspaper business as publisher of the Corydon Times-Republican, the oldest newspaper in Wayne county. He was never a candidate for any public office until he was elected to the senate in 1916, being the youngest member of the senate of the thirty-seventh general assembly. He enlisted in the army and served until his discharge on December 24, 1918. He is single and a republican in politics.

DAVID MEREDITH,

Senator Meredith, of Jasper county, Iowa, was born in Poweshiek county, Iowa, in 1867. His father was a native of North Carolina, and his mother a native of Indiana. They moved to Poweshiek county in 1857, where they resided until 1881, when they moved to Jasper county, Iowa. Senator Meredith graduated from the high school at Lynnville in 1887, and attended Penn College at Oskaloosa. He then took charge of his father's farm and live stock business, which has been his principal occupation. He was married to Hattie E. Hunt, of Martinsville, Ohio, in 1890, and to this union four sons and one daughter were born. Senator Meredith has filled the office of township trustee, member of town council. Was elected representative from Jasper county to the thirty-fifth and thirty-seventh general assemblies, and was elected state senator in 1918. A republican in politics.

ELMER E. MITCHELL,

Senator of the Fourteenth district, Mahaska county, was born in the county which he represents, January 27, 1863. He was educated in the public schools. At the age of seventeen took two years general course in Oskaloosa College. For six years he taught in the public schools of his county, spending his vacations on his father's 1,000 acre farm. In 1890, he was appointed to a position in the United States census office in Washington, D. C. Two years later he was called to a position in the United States government printing office. During his incumbency of these positions he attended the University of Washington from which he graduated with Master's Degree of Law. He later took a post-graduate course in Columbian University law school, and was admitted to the practice of law in the United States courts. Since the death of his father he has engaged in farming and stock raising in Mahaska county on his farm which is known as "Mitchell Meadows."

JULIUS A. NELSON,

Senator from the Eighteenth district, was born in Cass county, January 14, 1872, of Danish parents, where he has resided all his life, and received his early education in the rural schools. Is a graduate of business college, and had several terms of Normal training. He is vice president of the Farmers' Savings Bank of Atlantic, Iowa, also president of the Atlantic Building and Supply Company. Was elected senator in 1918. A republican in politics.

BYRON W. NEWBERRY,

Senator from the Thirty-sixth district, was born in Lorain county, Ohio, September 1, 1853. In 1855 with his parents he moved to Strawberry Point, where he has since resided. He was educated in the common schools and at the Upper Iowa University where he graduated in 1875. He attended the law department of the State University of Iowa where he graduated in 1876. In 1877 he opened a law office at Strawberry Point, and in 1887 formed a partnership with his brother Charles W. Newberry. He is also identified with agricultural interests. He served as senator in the thirtieth, thirty-first, thirty-second, thirty-second extra and thirty-seventh session of the general assembly of Iowa. In 1905 he was married to Miss Eva M. Buckley. They have no children. He was re-elected state senator in 1916. A republican in politics.

ADDISON M. PARKER,

Senator from the Thirtieth district, was born in Guthrie county, Iowa, in 1878. His parents are Charles S. Parker and Frances Owen Parker, who came to Iowa from Wisconsin in 1873. He came to Des Moines in 1896; graduated from East High School in 1898, and from Drake University in 1903. Has since been engaged in the practice of law in the city of Des Moines. Was married to Ida Louisa Lange in 1912. Elected senator 1914, re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

MILTON B. PITT,

Senator from Crawford, Harrison and Monona counties, was born June 2, 1876, on a farm in Pottawattamie county, Iowa. His father, Sidney Pitt, was born in Indiana and his mother, Patience E. Pitt, was born in Iowa.

Attended district school and Woodbine Normal. Taught school several terms. Elected township clerk two terms and three terms as county treasurer of Harrison county, Iowa. He is a farmer. Elected speaker of the house of representatives of the thirty-seventh general assembly. Elected senator in 1918. A republican in politics.

JOHN R. PRICE,

Senator from the fifteenth district, composed of the counties of Marion and Monroe, was born in Glamorganshire, South Wales, Great Britain, on June 23, 1875. Moved with his parents to the United States in May, 1881, and has been a resident of Marion and Monroe counties since that time, except two years spent in the state of Washington. Attended the public schools until eleven years of age, then secured a position in the mines, but continuing his education. At the age of eighteen he sustained an injury from which he has never fully recovered. Entered Central University at Pella, Iowa, from 1894 to 1897, then taught school for several years and read law under the direction of John T. Clarkson of Albia. Was admitted to the bar and began the practice of law at Albia in 1900 which vocation he still follows. Was deputy clerk for about one year. Was married April 27, 1889, to Mary E. Welch. Elected senator in 1915. A republican in politics.

A. V. PROUDFOOT,

Senator from Clarke and Warren counties. Born in the village of Liberty, Clarke county, Iowa, June 13, 1862. Came to Indianola in 1881, and has since made that his home. His father represented Clarke county in the sixteenth general assembly. Educated in the country schools and Simpson College, and is now president of its board of trustees. A lawyer with many years practice. Married and has a son and daughter living and two grandchildren. Was six years clerk of Warren county. Served as city solicitor for Indianola and as presidential elector in 1898; an official member in the Methodist Episcopal church. Republican in politics and was senator in the thirty-third, thirty-fourth and thirty-seventh general assemblies.

JAMES J. RAINBOW,

Senator from the Thirty-eighth district, was born in Lima, New York, April 24th, 1855. His parents, James and Eliza (Goody) Rainbow, both natives of England, came to Iowa City in 1856, and after twelve years moved to a farm in Iowa county, and eight years later going to Pottawattamie county. He attended school at Iowa City until twelve years of age, when he attended college at Malvern. He went to normal school at Iowa City, and graduated from the commercial college there in 1881. Engaged in teaching school and after going to Blackhawk county in 1889 continued the teaching with farming. Elected county auditor in 1902, and served eight terms. Married Ida O. Knapp in March, 1889, and has one daughter, Frances Willard. He is a Mason, Odd Fellow, Elk, Modern Woodman, a member of Commercial Club, and a Presbyterian. Elected senator in 1918. A republican in politics.

W. C. RATCLIFF,

Senator from the Eighth district, composed of the counties of Montgomery and Mills, was born at Humboldt, Iowa, May 3, 1881. Was graduated in 1897 from Rolfe, Iowa, high school; attended the State University of Iowa

and was graduated from the law department in 1904. Located in Red Oak, Iowa, in 1904, and engaged in the practice of law. In 1906 was elected county attorney of Montgomery county and held that office for eight years. Was married in 1909 to May L. Wright of Cedar Falls, Iowa. Is a member of the school board of Red Oak, Iowa; a director in, and treasurer of the Mutual Life Association of Iowa; a director in the Red Oak Building and Savings Association. Is a member of the Presbyterian church. Is a Knights Templar, Odd Fellow and Knight of Pythias. Elected senator in 1916. A republican in politics.

CARL W. REED,

Senator from the Forty-second district, Howard and Winneshiek counties, was born at Cresco, Iowa, May 6th, 1873, and has always lived at Cresco; is a graduate of the Cresco High School, and of the College of Law, University of Minnesota. Engaged in the practice of law at Cresco with his father, Henry T. Reed, who was a member of the general assembly, from 1896 to 1904, then practiced alone until December, 1910, when he formed a copartnership with Charles Pergler, now the representative to the United States from the new Bohemian republic. Has been city solicitor of Cresco, and county attorney of Howard county. Is married, and has three children; a member of the Masonic, Odd Fellows, and Elks lodges. Elected to the senate in 1918; a republican in politics.

ARTHUR L. RULE,

Senator from the Forty-third district, comprising the counties of Cerro Gordo, Franklin and Hancock, was born at Mason City, Iowa, January 4th, 1876, and is the son of General James Rule and Jennie A. Rule. He attended the public schools of Mason City until 1892, then he entered Shattuck School at Faribault, Minnesota, graduating in 1895. Went to the Northwestern University. Served in Spanish-American war as first lieutenant and battalion adjutant of Fifty-second Iowa Volunteer Infantry. Later entered the State University of Iowa where he took his law course. He located with Judge Cook of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, in the law department of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad and later in the law department of the Burlington, Cedar Rapids and Northern, under S. K. Tracey. In 1902 he became and is now a member of the firm of Blythe, Markley, Rule and Smith engaged in the general practice of law at Mason City, Iowa. Is a member of the Masonic lodge, Odd Fellows, K. P.'s and Elks. He was married in June, 1901, at Cedar Rapids, to Miss Edith Brady of that place and has two daughters, Edith and Margaret. Elected senator in 1916. A republican in politics.

EUGENE SCHAFFTER,

Senator from thirty-seventh district, composed of Hamilton-Hardin-Wright counties. Born in Lynchburg, Virginia, September 3, 1864. Moved from Illinois to Eagle Grove, Iowa, on February 15, 1882, and worked eighteen years at railroading. Began practice of law in September, 1899, and has continued in the practice at Eagle Grove. He is a republican, and was a delegate to the Republican National Convention at Chicago in 1908. Elected senator in 1918.

WILLIAM H. SCOTT,

Senator from the Forty-fourth district composed of the counties of Chickasaw and Floyd. Was born October 4, 1888, on a farm in Fayette county,

Iowa. His parents are Alexander and Margaret Scott, now living in West Union, Iowa. His education was secured in the rural schools of Fayette county, and graduated from the West Union High School in 1901. He spent three years in farming and teaching a country school. In the fall of 1904 he entered Upper Iowa University at Fayette, Iowa, and graduated from that institution in 1908. He spent five years as superintendent of public schools in North Dakota, at Willow City, Rugby, and Mott, resigning to enter Drake University Law School where he graduated in June, 1915. Immediately after graduation he opened a law office at Nashua, and was elected mayor of the town, re-elected two years later. In addition to his law practice Mr. Scott spends some time supervising a farm which he owns. He was married in 1909 to Ada E. Heckel, and they have one child, Everett Greig, born in 1913. He is a member of the Masonic lodge. Was elected senator in 1918. A republican in politics.

F. E. SHANE,

Senator from the Sixth district, composed of Adams and Taylor counties, was born in Guthrie county, Iowa, January 28, 1876. Lived on the farm with parents, and graduated from the Coon Rapids High School in 1896. He took a business course at the Capital City Commercial College, graduating in May, 1897. In 1903 he became cashier of the Adams County Bank at Nodaway, Iowa, and advanced to the office of vice president on January 1, 1919. On January 14, 1919, was elected director and cashier of the First National Bank at Villisca, Iowa. He has held the offices of town treasurer, school treasurer, M. E. church treasurer, cemetery treasurer, and Masonic Lodge treasurer. During the great world war he, as township chairman, handled the Liberty Loan, Red Cross, Y. M. C. A. and other drives for funds asked for by the United States government. Elected state senator on the republican ticket in November, 1918.

EDWARD M. SMITH,

Senator from Sixteenth district, composed of the counties of Adair and Madison, was born in Jackson county, Iowa, October 31, 1870. His parents moved to a farm in Madison county in 1886. Began teaching school in 1892 between farm seasons. Was county school superintendent 1897 to 1900. In 1899 entered the publishing business as publisher of the Winterset Madisonian, which position he still holds. Was also postmaster at Winterset, Iowa, from April, 1904, to August, 1908. Attended the Dexter Normal College, and Drake University. Married Eevalyn Crossley of Patterson, Iowa, on June 1, 1898, of which union they have four children. Is a member of the Presbyterian church, Knights of Pythias, Mason, Des Moines Consistory of Scottish Rite Mason, Za-Ga-Zig Temple and Mystic Shrine. A republican in politics.

JAMES A. STEPHENSON,

Senator from the Fifth district, composed of the counties of Decatur, Ringgold and Union, was born in Greene county, Pennsylvania, May 12, 1865. Moved with his parents to Ringgold county in 1867, and located on a farm near Mt. Ayr, receiving his education in the common schools. Has been actively engaged in farming and stock raising all his life. Held the office of township clerk for eleven years. Is vice-president and director of the Mt. Ayr State Bank. Was a representative in the thirty-fourth general assembly and elected to the senate in 1916. A democrat in politics.

BERTEL M. STODDARD,

Senator from the Thirty-second district, composed of Woodbury county, was born at Mionok, Ill., January 21st, 1871. Graduated from Illinois College, Jacksonville, Ill., in 1891. Engaged in the grain business at Toluca, Ill., for seven years, moving to Sloan, Iowa, in 1901. He was married in 1897 to Wilhelmina E. Simater. They have a son, Bela M., and a daughter Jane M. He has been a member of the school board for twenty-three years, a member of the county board of supervisors, drainage trustee, chairman of the local board for Woodbury county, county chairman for the Y. M. C. A. and Red Cross drives, the United War Service fund, and the third and fourth Liberty Loan campaigns. With his son they operate grain elevators at Sloan and Owego, Ia. They are also engaged in farming and stock raising. He was elected in 1918 to fill the unexpired term of Senator C. F. Lytle, resigned. He has always been a republican.

THOMAS E. TAYLOR,

Representative from Buchanan county, was born in Lake county, Illinois, June 20, 1864. He is a son of Charles H. and Elizabeth Ann (Rawson) Taylor, of English descent. His education was acquired in the public schools and at Upper Iowa University, where he graduated in 1887. He entered the Methodist ministry and has spent twenty-five years serving as pastor of East Janesville, Marble Rock, Greene, Cresco, Osage and Independence. In 1901 his Alma Mater conferred the degree of D. D. Three years ago Mr. Taylor resigned his pastorate and has since devoted his attention to his farm, adjoining Independence, but speaks nearly every Sabbath, supplying for all denominations. June 12, 1889, he was united in marriage to Miss Nellie M. Huie, who is also a graduate of Upper Iowa University. Elected representative in 1914, and senator in 1916. A republican in politics.

FRANK E. THOMPSON,

Senator from the Ninth district, composed of Des Moines county, was born in Grand View, Iowa, December 13, 1873, his parents are both natives of Iowa, of Scotch-English lineage. He was educated in the public and high schools of Winfield and Muscatine, and the State University of Iowa, graduating from the law department with the class of 1896, commenced the practice of law in Burlington in 1896, and has practiced continuously in said city from that date. Has served as chairman of the republican county central committee, and county attorney of his county. Was married August 22, 1894, to Lillian Russell. Elected senator in 1914, re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

HOWARD S. VAN ALSTINE,

Senator from the Fiftieth district, composed of the counties of Buena Vista, Humboldt and Pocahontas, was born May 16, 1869, in Boone county, Illinois. Came with his parents to Pocahontas county in 1871 and has since lived in that locality. Received his education in the country and graded schools of this state. Has been engaged in the banking and farm loan business since 1890, and is interested in farming and manufacturing industries. Was married in 1896 to M. Bertha Beers and to them have been born three sons, two daughters. Is president of Iowa Farm Mortgage Bankers Association. A member of the Masonic order, and Knights of Pythias. Was elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Joseph H. Allen, re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

HARRY C. WHITE,

Senator from the Forty-fifth district, comprising the counties of Benton and Tama, was born in Guernsey county, Ohio, October 6, 1869, of Irish parents. When he was six months old his parents moved to Benton county and settled on a farm near Garrison. Educated in the district schools, Tilford Academy and was a student for one term at Cornell College, at Mt. Vernon. Taught school for several terms. Now owns and operates a large stock farm. Has been vice president of the Farmers' Savings Bank of Garrison since it was organized in 1905. Was married in 1894. Elected representative in 1910. Re-elected in 1912. Elected senator in 1914, re-elected in 1918. A democrat in politics.

CHESTER W. WHITMORE,

Senator from the Thirteenth district, comprising Wapello county. Was born at Burlington, Iowa, January 11, 1869. Lawyer of twenty years general practice. Married. Elected senator in 1914, and served in the thirty-sixth and thirty-seventh general assemblies; re-elected 1918. His father, Francis S. Whitmore, was a Union veteran of the Civil War. Military service, four years in Company "G" Fifty-fourth regiment, Iowa National Guard. In the war with the German Empire had a son, Kenneth S. Whitmore, quartermaster on U. S. S. S. von Steuben; and stepson, Frank W. Hook, in artillery officers' training school at Louisville. A republican in politics.

JAMES M. WILSON,

Senator from the Third district, composed of Appanoose and Davis counties, was born September 8, 1866. His father and mother were born in Scotland. He lived his boyhood days in Warren county, Illinois, and then moved to Centerville, Iowa, with his parents in 1882. After graduating from the Centerville high school he went to the State University of Iowa and graduated from the law department in 1896. In the year of his graduation he was elected county attorney and served four years. Later he was city attorney of Centerville for four years. Married Miss Flora M. White, December 24, 1891. At present he is an active lawyer of Centerville. Is a Mason, an Elk and a Woodman. Elected senator in 1912, and re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

BIOGRAPHIES OF STATE REPRESENTATIVES,

 J. V. ADKINS,

Representative from O'Brien county, was born November 15, 1851, near Plymouth, Illinois. Moved to Prairie City, Iowa, in 1865. Received his education in the country and graded schools, supplemented by a full course in a business college. Was married to Allie B. White, of Knoxville, Iowa, December 25, 1877, and to them have been born two sons. Moved to O'Brien county in 1883, engaging in the mercantile business, which he continued for three years, then entered the banking business in which he has been engaged for the past twenty-eight years. Never held public office until his election to the thirty-seventh general assembly in 1916, re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

 U. S. ALDERMAN,

Was born at Nevada, Iowa, August 2d, 1865. Graduate Nevada High School, State University of Iowa. Law. Country lawyer. Has been active in all war work since April, 1917. Ex-chairman Nevada Chapter American Red Cross. Member State Board, Christmas Roll Call, American Red Cross, Chairman for Story county first Red Cross War Drive, United States Fuel Administration, Smileage Book Campaign, and rural chairman Third and Fourth Liberty Loans. Forgot business until we had won the war. Glad of it, and happy now that we won it. Republican, but has supported the administration, all the way.

 GEO. S. ALLYN,

Representative from Ringgold county, was born in Clinton, Illinois. (His father was an itinerant Methodist preacher in the days of Peter Cartwright). His education was received in the public schools of Illinois. After the death of his father, moved to Iowa while in his teens. Taught school in the winter time and farmed in the summer time. He was elected clerk of courts in his twenty-third year—served three terms. Was postmaster at Mt. Ayr, Iowa. He engaged in the real estate, abstract and farm loan and farming and live stock business. In 1880 he organized the Mt. Ayr Bank of which he was cashier and president until September, 1915. He has served as president of the Board of Education for years, was on the board of trustees of the Agricultural College at Ames, and is at present a member of the city council. He served in the senate in the twenty-sixth, twenty-sixth extra, twenty-seventh, twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth sessions. He is a Methodist and a republican.

Has been engaged in the drug business at Elkader, Iowa, continuously since 1892. Served as a member of the school board for ten years. Married Mollie Schmidt in 1899. Elected representative in 1914. Re-elected in 1916 and 1918. A republican in politics.

IRVING E. BEEMAN,

Representative from Allamakee county, was born on a farm near Waukon, Iowa, on the 13th day of November, 1866. Moved to Waukon with his parents in 1877. Graduated from the Waukon High School in 1884. Has been engaged in the mercantile business since that time. Married Miss Anna B. Hall of Waukon. Was mayor of Waukon two terms. Was organizing member of Council of Defense for Allamakee county. County chairman of "Four Minute Men", chairman first Red Cross War Drive and assistant county food administrator. His politics have been republican beginning with his first vote.

CHARLES E. BOIES,

Representative from Buchanan county, was born in Boone county, Illinois, January 15, 1859. Came to Iowa forty-five years ago. Is a nephew of ex-Governor Boies and a brother of Congressman-elect W. D. Boies. Received his education in the rural and public schools of Sycamore, Illinois. Is a farmer owning eight hundred acres of land. Is a member and trustee of the Methodist church. A member of the Masonic lodge, the Eastern Star and Sons of the American Revolution. Was married to Clara I. Miller, January 26, 1880. Their family consisted of two daughters. His son, Corporal Burr B. Boies of the 88th division, went to France, and gave his life for his country October 13, 1918. Representative Boies was elected by the republican party in 1916, re-elected in 1918.

JOHN BRADLEY,

Representative from Poweshiek county, was born in Bureau county, Illinois, April 2, 1864. In 1868, his parents settled on a farm near Montezuma. Attended rural schools and aided his father on the farm until twenty years of age. Took a business course at Elliott's Business College, Burlington, Iowa. Taught school for a number of years. Attended Cedar Valley Seminary at Osage, Iowa, four years, graduated law department, S. U. I., with class of 1901. Lived on farm until 1908; in 1904 was speaker's clerk in general assembly, Hon. Geo. W. Clark, speaker; clerk of courts for six years, practiced law eight years, including six years as county attorney. Lives at Osage, Iowa; married and has two children. Elected representative ninety-third district, Iowa, in 1918. Has always been a republican in politics.

CHARLES FRANCIS CLARK,

One of the representatives from Linn county, was born at Belle Plaine, Iowa, August 13, 1871. He has lived in Cedar Rapids since 1876, and has practiced law there since graduating from the law department of the University of Iowa in June, 1894. Is a member of the Methodist church and of the Masonic, I. O. O. F., Elks, Eagles and Moose lodges. Married December 16, 1880 to Cynthia G. Davis. Elected in 1914. Re-elected in 1916-18. A democrat in politics.

HAROLD E. DAVIDSON.

Representative from Page county in thirty-eighth general assembly, was born on a farm in Jones county, Iowa, March 1st, 1891. Attended the rural school and graduated from the Olin high school. Attended the college of liberal arts of Drake University for two years. He then worked one year in the civil engineering department of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul R. R. Co. Graduated from the law college of Drake University and admitted to the Iowa bar in 1916. Started the general practice of law in Clarinda, 1916; enlisted in the army and commissioned 2nd lieutenant of infantry in November, 1918, receiving his discharge in December. Returned to Clarinda and resumed the practice of law. Is unmarried. Was elected representative in 1918, and is a republican in politics.

HERBERT E. DEAN.

Representative from Osceola county, was born in O'Brien county, Iowa, December 5, 1872, of American parentage. Attended school at Primghar, and Morningside college, Sioux City, Iowa. Served two years as deputy clerk of the court of O'Brien county, under J. W. Walter. Served two years as assistant cashier of the Primghar State Bank under J. L. E. Peck. Entered the Northern Indiana Normal School at Valparaiso, Indiana, and graduated with

the class of 1896. Entered the law department of the State University of Nebraska and graduated with the class of 1898. Was married to Estella M. Bowser of Fort Wayne, Indiana, and has two sons, Wilbur M. and Forest C. Moved to Harris, Iowa, in 1899, and was elected president of the school board. Moved to Ocheyedan, Iowa, in 1901. Was once appointed and three times elected mayor of that town. Devotes most of his time to his farm interests. Elected in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

FRED DURBIN.

Representative from Mills county, was born on a farm in Mills county in 1876. His parents, Joshua and Almire Durbin, were natives of Ohio and early pioneers in Iowa. His early education was in the rural schools. He graduated from the Western Normal College at Shenandoah in 1896, the law department of the State University in 1898. Representative from Monona county, was born in Crawford county, Illinois, March 14th, 1854. Went to Ogle county, Illinois in 1873; was married in 1878 to Mary Ideall Hitchcock and moved to Iowa in February, 1880. Elected representative in 1916. Re-elected in 1918.

F. S. FINLEY.

Representative from Henry county, is now serving his second term. He was born in Ohio, August 12, 1866. Received his education in the country schools, Muskingum College and Ohio University. Has practiced law in Mt. Pleasant since 1895. He is largely interested in agriculture. A republican in politics.

HARVEY W. FLENNIKEN.

Representative from Jones county, was born at Millville, Clayton county, Iowa, February 7, 1859. Attended the rural schools and the Elkader high school. Lived on a farm until twenty years old when he moved to Rockford, Illinois. Entered the N. C. Thompson Manufacturing company for two years, going to Springfield, Illinois, entering the Illinois Watch factory. Helped to start the Aurora Watch company of Aurora, Illinois, and remained until 1892 when he entered a co-partnership with W. J. Creglow and D. W. Hurst, starting the Bank of Delmar, of which he was cashier for seven years. Moved to Olin, Iowa, where he organized the Citizens Savings Bank in 1899, acting as cashier up to the present time. Interested in buying and selling real estate. Elected representative in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. Has always been a republican in politics.

JAS. S. FRANCIS.

Representative from Taylor county, was born in Union county, Iowa, September 27th, 1873. He was educated in the rural schools, at Afton Normal College, and spent three and one-half years in Highland Park College. He spent seven years as teacher and superintendent in the public schools of Union and Adams counties, and for the past eleven years has been editor and publisher of the Gravity Independent. He was married to Mary E. Coan of Creston, Iowa, August 1, 1906. He was president and member of the school board of Gravity ten years, and clerk of Washington township four years. He is a Royal Arch Mason, Modern Woodman and Yeoman. Elected representative in 1918. A republican in politics.

FRANK A. GARBER.

Representative from Decatur county, was born May 8, 1865, in the township where he now resides. He spent two years on one of his father's farms in Union county. Was educated in the rural schools and in the high school of Léon. Taught school during the winter months. Was married to Emma Wolff of Libertyville, Iowa, September 7, 1893. Has been a breeder of registered Jersey cattle and Chester White hogs and an active member of different pure bred live stock associations. He is a member of the Brethren church. Elected representative in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. A democrat in politics.

J. S. GARBER.

Representative from Floyd county, was born in Floyd county, April 18, 1865. His parents were pioneer settlers, coming to the state in 1852. He received his education in the rural schools. Has been engaged in farming all his life. Was married December 7th, 1898 to Marcia C. Petty of Olean, N. Y. Served three terms as township assessor and two as county supervisor. Is present chairman of the republican county central committee. Was elected representative in 1918. A republican in politics.

CHARLES GILMORE.

Representative from Clay county, was born in Charlotte, Clinton county, Iowa, October 18, 1852. His father was born in Massachusetts and his mother in Illinois. Received his education in the public schools of Charlotte. Worked in the Charlotte flour mill most of the time with his father until his death in 1877, when he took charge of the mill, and operated same until 1890. Was married to Clara A. Dickey of Clinton county, September 19, 1882. In 1891 moved to Clay county and located on a farm near Sioux Rapids. Is interested in the banking business, being president of the Rossie Savings Bank. In 1895 was elected county supervisor of Clay county and served until January 1, 1912, being chairman for twelve years. Elected representative in 1914 and re-elected in 1916-18. Is a member of the Masonic and Woodmen lodges. A republican in politics.

WILLIAM EDWARD GILTNER.

Representative from Monroe county, was born on a farm near Albia, Iowa, October 6, 1871; was educated in the rural schools and Albia Academy, attended normal institute and taught two terms; graduated from the Gem City Business College, Quincy, Illinois, 1894, and attended Parsons College, Fairfield, Iowa; studied law in the office of Judge Henry L. and George W. Dashiell, admitted to practice in 1899, and has practiced in Albia ever since; also owns and operates a farm. His father, A. M. Giltner, and his mother, Mary E. Giltner, nee, Newell, came to Monroe county, Iowa, from Indiana as early settlers. His family consists of wife, Hattie E. Giltner, nee, Galliher, and five children, three daughters and two sons. He was elected representative in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. He is a Presbyterian, Mason, Yeoman, and republican.

THOMAS F. GRIFFIN.

One of the representatives from Woodbury county, was born on a farm in Howard county, Iowa, April 19, 1865. His parents were among the early settlers in that part of the state, having come to Howard county in the fifties. He was educated in the common schools and taught several terms of

school. He studied law at the University of Notre Dame and graduated from that institution in June, 1888. He was admitted to the bar in October of the same year and has been engaged in the practice of law at Sioux City since that time. In 1891 he was married to Miss Rose Hartnett. Elected representative in 1912. Re-elected in 1914, 1916 and 1918. A republican in politics.

C. L. GUNDERSON,

Representative from Pocahontas county, was born in Wisconsin, October 13, 1859. His education was acquired in the common and high schools in Wisconsin. He came to Pocahontas county in 1881, locating on a farm. In July, 1884 he married Miss Dena Christensen of Boscobel, Wisconsin. They have six children, three sons and three daughters. He owns one-third interest in the Rolfe Grain and Milling company, of which he is president. He was one of the organizers of the Pocahontas County Farmers Institute, and president of the Farmers Mutual Insurance company of Pocahontas county. One of the organizers of the Farmers Elevator company of Pocahontas, Iowa. Was its secretary nine years. He is presiding elder in the Presbyterian church of Rolfe. Elected representative in 1918. A republican in politics.

J. W. HANNA,

Representative from Benton county, was born in Benton county, Iowa, August 23, 1857, of Scotch-Irish parentage. Was born on the farm his pioneer father, A. H. Hanna, entered from the government. He moved to Vinton in 1914 but owns and operates the farm known as Grandview Farm jointly with his son. He was educated in rural schools and Cornell College. He was one of the organizers and president of the Farmers Saving Bank, of Garrison, Iowa, and is connected with several enterprises there. He has for the last year been member and secretary of the Local Draft Board for Benton county. He is a member of the Presbyterian church. Elected representative in 1918. A republican in politics.

JOHN T. HANSEN,

One of the representatives from Scott county, was born at Davenport, Iowa, November 28, 1858. Moved to Sherman township, Scott county, May 1, 1861, where he attended the country schools and learned the blacksmith trade under his father. He took up farming in 1880, retiring two years ago. Was married to Emma E. Horst in March, 1887 who died in October, 1897, and has two boys and two girls, both boys being now in the army. Always interested in public affairs, member of the school board for eleven years, president of Eldridge Mutual Telephone company for six years, and now vice president of Scott County Farm League. A Modern Woodman. Elected representative in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

T. P. HARRINGTON,

Representative from Kossuth county, was born in Lafayette county, Wisconsin, December 17th, 1867. He came to Iowa with his parents in 1882 and settled on a farm in Wright county where he resided until 1899 when he moved to Algona, Kossuth county, and formed the law firm of "Harrington & Dickinson" of which he is still a member. He secured his legal education in the University of Iowa, was city attorney of Algona for two years and county attorney of Kossuth county for four years. County food administrator and chairman of county council of defense during the world war. Elected representative in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

A. O. HAUGE.

Representative of Polk county, Iowa, was born on a farm in Polk county, Iowa, February 13, 1879, moved with his parents to Emmett county and then to Wright county. He attended the common schools and entered Humboldt College where he remained for seven years, first as a pupil and later as an instructor. In 1902 he took charge of the commercial department in the East High school, Des Moines, Iowa, was cashier in the state treasurer's office, held a position in the United States Treasury Department. In 1906 he was elected cashier of the Iowa Trust & Savings Bank of Des Moines, promoted to vice president and then to president which position he still holds. He is a member of the board of trustees of the American Lutheran Synod. He is a thirty-second degree Mason, Knight Templar and Knights of Pythias. In 1904 he married Miss Elizabeth Heggen to which union two boys, Herbert Henry and Gerhard Stanford have been born. Elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

CHARLES E. HOLLOWAY.

Representative from Fremont county, was born April 21, 1874, in Thurman where he still resides. His parents were Wm. J. and Nancy Thorpe Holloway. He received a high school education supplemented by work in Tabor College and later in Drake University. Was married in 1898 to Miss Stella Nix of Hamburg. They have three children, Marguerite, Charles and William. His business is stock and grain farming. Has always taken a lively interest in politics, was president of the board of education and member of the town council. A member of the Methodist Episcopal church, a Knight of Pythias, a Mason. Elected in 1918. A democrat in politics.

ELLIS J. HOOK.

Representative from Winnebago county, was born on a farm in Tazewell county, Illinois, in 1870. Spent his youth on the farm and in rural school. He spent one year at Hopedale high school and engaged in teaching until 1892, going then to Grundy county. In 1893 he entered Decorah Institute, graduated therefrom and remained two years as teacher. Was principal and city superintendent until 1899 he was appointed county superintendent, elected and served four successive terms. Was a member of the Iowa State Teachers Association, Iowa Educational Council, State Teachers Reading Circle Board. He spent one year traveling and in 1909 entered a law office going then to the State University and graduated from the college of law in 1912. He returned to Decorah forming a partnership with C. S. Boice under the name Boice & Hook. Was chairman of the county central committee, mayor, and president of library board. Married Miss Minnie M. Reed, in 1898. Elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

F. W. INGERSOLL.

Representative from Tama county, was born near Gilman, Iowa in Marshall county, April 29, 1873. Was raised on a farm, attending the rural schools and later taking a business course at Highland Park College, Des Moines. Was married March 14, 1895 to Flora B. Gary. At present time is engaged in farming. Has lived in Tama county twenty-two years. A member of United Brethren church and also a Royal Arch Mason. Elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

G. A. JUSTICE.

Representative from Shelby county, was born in 1857, on a farm in Linn county near Marion, Iowa. His father and mother, John and Margaret Justice, natives of Pennsylvania, immigrated to Iowa in the early fifties, moved to Jones county in 1865, where the subject of this sketch received his education in the common schools with one year in the high school of Mechanicsville; went to Shelby county in the spring of 1881 where he has since been engaged in farming and stock raising; was married to Clara E. Miller of Morley, Iowa, in 1881; served two terms as member of board of supervisors; elected representative in 1918. Republican in politics.

C. E. KELLOGG,

Representative from Adams county, was born at Berlin Heights, Erie county, Ohio, February 13th, 1873. Moved to Iowa with his parents in the fall of 1881 where he resided on a farm. Attended rural school in the winter. In 1892 and 1893 attended high school at Greenfield, Iowa, and Simpson College in 1894. Until 1905 was engaged in farming and teaching in the rural schools in the winter time. Was married to Miss Sarah Vanfleet, September 29th, 1898, have five children. In 1905 engaged in the implement business which pursuit he still follows. Held the office of justice of peace two terms. He is president of the board of education at Corning, Iowa. Elected in 1918. A democrat in politics.

PRESLEY L. KEPPLE,

Representative from Chickasaw county, was born at North Washington, Iowa, July 11, 1857. In 1864 moved with his parents to Chickasaw, Iowa. In 1884 he was united in marriage to Miss Elizabeth Rumbaugh. They resided on a farm at Chickasaw until in 1892, when he moved to Ionia, Iowa, and engaged in the mercantile business. In 1903 he was appointed postmaster of Ionia, Iowa, which office he held for nearly twelve years. Has always been a resident of Chickasaw county. Has held offices of justice of the peace, township trustee, town councilman and has been a member of the school board of Ionia for many years. Is a member of the Congregational church and also of the I. O. O. F., Modern Woodmen, Modern Brotherhood and Masonic lodges. Elected in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

CHARLES B. KERN.

Representative from Warren county, was born in Warren county, February 1, 1867. His parents were John and Miriam Black Kern, who came from Fairfield county, Ohio to Warren county, Iowa in the year 1857. He was reared on a farm, attended the Indianola public schools and Simpson College. He was married August 25, 1892 to Mary Frances Spring, and to this union was born four children, all of whom are now living. He took up farming in early years and has been actively engaged in the same ever since. Elected representative in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

WILL L. KING,

Representative from Hardin county, was born on a farm in Hardin county near Hubbard in 1897. He received his education in the rural schools, high school and four years in Drake University studying law and liberal arts. Taught in the rural schools for one year and worked largely for prohibition interests. Was in the national army during 1918. He is the second youngest man ever elected to the Iowa legislature. He is unmarried. Elected representative in 1918. A republican in politics.

S. W. KLAUS,

Representative from Delaware county, was born in Delaware county, January 12, 1861. He grew to manhood on his father's farm; attended the public school until he was seventeen years of age, after which he attended Northwestern College at Galena, Illinois, from which institution he was graduated in 1882. Taught school two terms. In 1887 he entered the mercantile business at Earlville, and remains in that business to this day. He has served as mayor of his home city two terms; on the city council six terms, and as member of board of education for the past twelve years; chairman of Delaware county republican central committee for ten years. Is a member of the Odd Fellows and K. P. lodges; member of the M. E. church. Has served as secretary of the official board of the local church for the past twenty-five years. He was married to Miss Rose Landis of Colesburg, Iowa, in 1898. Elected representative in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. Republican in politics.

EDWARD H. KNICKERBOCKER,

One of the representatives from Linn county, was born near Cedar Rapids, Iowa, on November 18, 1855, and was reared in that locality. Was educated in the country schools and Fairfax high school, later attending Western College, later known as Leander Clarke College, now merged with Coe College, Cedar Rapids. Was married to Hanna M. Johnson of Delaware county, Pennsylvania, March 22, 1882. To this union were born three children, Charles J., Sara H. and Ruth M. Has always followed the occupation of farming and stock raising and importing of Belgian and Percheron horses. Is a member of the Congregational church and is a thirty-second degree Mason and a Shriner. Elected representative in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

JOHN KROUSE,

Representative from Wayne county, was born in Woodford county, Illinois, August 23rd, 1867. Moved with his parents to Wayne county in 1869 where he received his education in the rural schools. Served six years as member of board of supervisors and four as township trustee. He is a farmer by occupation, is a director of the Farmers and Merchants State Bank, and president of the Wayne County Agricultural Society. Was married December 31, 1890 to Miss Ida A. Kah and has one daughter and four sons. Elected representative in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. A democrat in politics.

FRANK C. LAKE,

Representative from Woodbury county. Born in Golden, Colorado, April 18, 1879. He came to Iowa and located at Cedar Rapids, November 30, 1903, where he joined the reportorial staff of the Cedar Rapids Evening Gazette, and three years later joined the Sioux City Journal. He has made Sioux City his home and served on both the Sioux City Journal and Sioux City Tribune as reporter and department editor. He founded and was editor for one year of the Saturday Mirror. He entered Iowa politics as secretary of the Woodbury County Republican Central Committee, 1912, and served four years. His grandfather, Seth Lake, was an early Iowa settler. He is a Mason, Blk and Yeoman. Elected representative in 1916, re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

JOHN N. LANGFITT,

Representative from Adair county, was born in Scott county, Iowa, May 9, 1866. On his father's side he is of Scotch-Irish descent. His mother was of English descent. His early education was received in the rural schools. He attended Wilton Academy and Davenport Business College. When 21 years of age, he went to Adair county. Four years later he married Clara A. Martin, daughter of W. B. and Lucy E. Martin, of Greenfield. They have four surviving children: Harry M., who is in the service, Bernice Louise, Clara Mildred, and John N. Jr. They lived for several years in western Washington, but returned to Adair county in 1898, purchasing his father's farm. Is a Presbyterian, a member of the K. O. T. M., M. W. A., also a thirty-second degree Mason and a Shriner. Was elected representative in 1916, and re-elected in 1918. In politics a republican.

EMIL A. LARSON,

Representative from Montgomery county, was born in Stanton, Iowa, in 1870. Received his early education in the district schools, and later attended the graded school at Stanton, Iowa. In 1893 he entered the mercantile business and continued the same until 1900, when he was elected auditor of Montgomery county. Was re-elected in 1902 and 1904, and in 1906 he accepted the position of assistant cashier of the First National Bank of Red Oak, Iowa. In 1907 he entered the real estate and insurance business. Was married in 1893 to Emma E. Wallin, of Page county, Iowa, and has two daughters, Myrtle and Dorothy. Elected representative in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. Republican in politics.

JAMES E. LARSON,

Representative from Cedar county, was born February 14, 1881, at West Branch, Iowa. Attended the West Branch High School and State University of Iowa. Was married to C. Rose Pettis, May 5, 1903. She having died July 9, 1917, was again married to Clara May Rose on March 15, 1919. Elected to thirty-eighth general assembly in 1918. Republican in politics.

CHARLES J. LE VALLEY,

Representative from Franklin county, was born in Grant county, Wisconsin, July 20, 1870, came to Sheffield, Franklin county, Iowa, with his mother and sister in 1881. Received his education in the common schools and business college. In 1900 he was one of two men who established the Farmers & Merchants Bank, and has served as its cashier ever since. He is a large land owner, is of high ideals and purpose, and has at all times given the best of his ability for the promotion of all the things that work for the up-building and betterment of the general people. Was married October 25th, 1898, to Mary E. Thomas. They have three children, Chauncey Thomas 19, Esther Louisa 15, Nola May 10. He is a thirty-second degree Mason and a Shriner. Elected representative in 1918. A republican in politics.

JOSEPH COOPER LOCKIN,

Representative from Cherokee county, was born at Brandon, Wisconsin, November 3d, 1853. After completing the public and high school, he engaged in teaching, going to Aurelia in 1876, where in 1878 he was mar-

ried to Josephine Batson of Fairwater, Wisconsin. They took up their abode on Mr. Lockin's farm where he spent fifteen years in extensive raising and feeding of live stock. In 1887, he received the republican nomination to the legislature. In 1895 the family removed to Aurelia, where he built a grain elevator which he operated for ten years. Mr. Lockin has been most active along educational lines. He was a member of the Aurelia school board for twenty years, and was secretary and treasurer of Morning-side College for nine years, having the management of its endowment fund. He also served four years as mayor of Aurelia. For the past eighteen years he has been in the real estate, loan and insurance business, and has been secretary and treasurer of the Maple Valley Insurance Association since its organization. He is a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Elected representative in 1918.

WM. L. LONG,

Representative from Jefferson county, was born in Fairfield, Iowa, December 27, 1860. Worked on a farm in Jefferson county, when a boy. Has been clerk of the district court of Jefferson county, city clerk of the city of Fairfield, superintendent of the Fairfield water works, superintendent of the Fairfield light plant, clothing merchant, and is now a real estate broker. Elected representative in 1918. Is a Royal Arch Mason and Son of the American Revolution. A republican in politics.

ARCH W. McFARLANE,

One of the representatives from Blackhawk county, was born in Waterloo, Iowa, April 14, 1885. Was educated in the public schools and graduated from high school in 1904. Was married April 6, 1908, to Miss Elsie V. Hawkins. Is now engaged as commercial traveler with headquarters at Waterloo. Is a member of the Christ Episcopal church, being a vestryman of that church. Is a member of Knights of Pythias and senior council of United Commercial Travelers, Waterloo Council No. 20. Elected representative 1914, and re-elected in 1916 and 1918. In politics he is a republican.

JAMES H. MCGHEE,

Representative from Cerro Gordo county, was born on a farm near Postville, Allamakee county, Iowa, on June 8th, 1861, of Scotch parentage. He engaged in the farm implement business at Postville for several years, and from there moved to Waukon, Iowa, where he bought and shipped live stock. Elected county sheriff and held that office from 1894 until 1900. He served as township trustee, member of the school board and other minor positions. In 1903 he moved to Mason City, where he has since been actively engaged in farming and live stock. On May 17th, 1885, he married Sophie Jennewine at Waukon, Iowa. He has three children. Elected in 1918. Republican in politics.

H. J. MANTZ,

Representative from Audubon county, Iowa, was born in Iowa county, Iowa, on September 22d, 1877. He comes from American ancestry, his father's people having come from Switzerland in 1754, and his mother's people from Ireland. With his parents he came to Audubon county in 1881. Attended the country schools, the Audubon High School and taught

in the rural schools for about three years. He attended the Drake Law College at Des Moines, graduating therefrom in 1905. He began the practice of law at Audubon where he is a member of the firm of Mantz & White. He has held office as county attorney for four years, was mayor for five years, and chairman of the legal advisory board. Was married in 1910 to Miss Dorothy Sandberg of Oakland, Neb. They have two children, Paul S., aged 3, and Kathleen J., aged 1. A member of the Presbyterian church, and a Mason. Was elected in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

L. H. MAYNE,

Representative from Palo Alto county, was born at Heuvelton, New York, September 2d, 1858. When five years of age, following the death of his mother, his father and family moved to Mendota, Illinois, and in 1876 to Adair county, Iowa. In 1879 he entered a district school in Illinois, and in 1881 the Northern Indiana University, and studied one year. Later he taught school four months, then entered Eureka College. He then spent several years in teaching school, four years in the U. S. mail service, resigning in 1892 and entered the publication of the Algona Republican. In the spring of 1894 he became publisher and editor of the Palo Alto Reporter. He was elected representative in 1918. A republican in politics.

OSCAR L. MEAD,

Representative from Butler county, was born on a farm in Butler county in 1875. Received his education in the rural schools and in Shell Rock High School, afterwards attending business college at Nora Springs Seminary. Was married to Gertrude Graham of Shell Rock in 1897, and to them have been born two children. Has held the offices of township assessor and member of the school board. Is interested in banking but has been an active farmer all his life. Elected representative in 1916, and re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

FRANK F. MESSER,

Representative from Johnson county, was born at Bloomfield, Iowa, on September 19th, 1888. Graduated from the Southern Iowa Normal at Bloomfield, Iowa, in 1907, and from the College of Law of the State University of Iowa, in 1910, and has practiced the profession of Law at Iowa City since admission. Was city solicitor for four years. Discharged from military service of United States, November, 1917. Elected state representative in 1918. A democrat in politics. Unmarried.

HARRY J. MILES,

Representative from Jackson county, was born in Miles, Jackson county, Iowa, September 13, 1869, of Scotch descent. Was educated in the graded schools of Miles, and at Grinnell College. Was married to Alice Lehman of Lyons, Iowa, in 1903. Is engaged in farming and stock raising, and served four terms as mayor of Miles. Is a member of the Masonic, Knights of Pythias and Odd Fellows. Elected representative in 1916, and re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

ROBERT O. MILLER,

Representative from Lucas county, was born September 28, 1862, in Mason county, Illinois. Father was born in Armagh, Ireland, of Scotch parentage. Mother born in Illinois of American parentage. Moved to Norwood farm in 1868, where he now resides. Has been engaged in breeding and importing pure bred horses, sheep and Shorthorn cattle all of his life. Was a student of Simpson College, class '85. Member of Delta Tau Delta fraternity. Representative to Grand Lodge in 1912-13, I. O. O. F. Married to Amy E. Puderbaugh, January 1st, 1890. Elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

SIMON MILLER,

Representative from Dubuque county, was born on a farm in Grant county, Wis., February 5, 1861. He lived in this vicinity until 1884. Locating permanently in the city of Dubuque in 1886, following the vocation of a teamster. Was married to Miss Mary Folan, January 9, 1887. Was elected representative in 1906, re-elected in 1908, 1910, and 1918. Is a democrat in politics.

W. D. MILLER,

Representative from Boone county, was born in Shenandoah Valley of Virginia, near Washington, D. C., September 4th, 1878. Has been a resident of Iowa since 1900. Was engaged in operating department of railroad work for several years; later engaged in banking business and for last five years publisher of Ogden Reporter. Married Anna B. Clark, December 25th, 1906. Have two children, Virginia, age 8, Clark, age 5. Member Congregational church, Knight Templar Mason. Elected representative in 1916, re-elected in 1918. Republican in politics.

BRUCE R. MILLS,

Representative from Harrison county. Was born in Bushnell, Ill., January 28th, 1867. His parents moved to Logan, Iowa, in May, 1870. He has been a resident of Harrison county for 48 years. His education was acquired in the graded schools of Logan. Was married to Miss Armetta D. Kirk, in 1889. The family consists of two daughters and two boys. He moved to Woodbine in 1897, was engaged in the live stock and real estate business, until 1907. He was appointed postmaster at Woodbine, and served for nine years. A practicing attorney, and a member of the county and state bar associations. He was married to Miss Ruth W. Miller of Harlan, Iowa, November 18, 1906. Has served on the Walnut Board of Education as its president and secretary. Mayor of Walnut for the fourth time. Is secretary of the Walnut branch of the Red Cross, and is secretary-treasurer of the Layton Council of Defense and War Service Council. He attended the district school and the Rock River Seminary. He came to Calhoun county, Iowa, in the spring of 1878, and engaged in farming until he moved to the town of Farnhamville in 1898. Representative from Dickinson county, was born at Delhi, Iowa, January 1, 1858. Educated in public school. With the exception of three years spent in New York state, from 1876 to 1879, has lived in Iowa all his life. Was in Ida county 1879 to 1880, where he worked on farm summers and taught school winters. Farmed in Delaware county during 1881. Moved to Dickinson county in 1882. Farmed eight years. Married Miss Jennie E. Jones, March 18, 1886. Have no children. Moved to Milford in 1890, where he has since resided. Was appointed postmaster July 1, 1897, and served twelve years. Was member of city council many years. Has been in the real estate business since 1900. Elected representative in 1916, re-elected in 1918. Republican in politics.

C. A. QUICK,

Representative from Clinton county, was born of American parentage, September, 1879, in Clinton county. His schooling consists of common and public school education, leaving same at the age of 15. Learned telegraphy at which he worked for six years, then entered clerical work for the C. & N. W. Ry, and train service as brakeman in 1902, then switching and yardmaster service in 1904. His political career started in 1914, when elected alderman of Clinton, serving until 1918. Elected representative in 1918. A republican in politics.

DOUGLAS ROGERS,

Representative from Carroll county, was born on a farm in Shelby county, Iowa, April 8, 1867. His parents were pioneers of Shelby county. He attended the rural schools, Harlan High School, Western Normal College, taught in the rural schools for two years, and graduated from the College of Law at the State University of Iowa, June 17, 1891. In July, 1891, he located at Manning, Iowa. He was mayor of Manning for six and one-half years, and a member of the board of education for four years, being president for three years. He is president of the Iowa State Savings Bank of Manning. Was married to Miss Mary E. Flannery in 1892. They have two daughters, Eulalia and Ruth. Elected representative in 1914. C. B. SANTEE,

His father and mother were pioneers in Butler county. He moved to Cedar Falls April 10, 1890, where he has since resided. Was recorder of Black Hawk county from 1895 to 1900. On the 5th of April, 1899, he was married to Lulu Probert of Shell Rock, Iowa. They have five children, Harriet M., Leslie C., Donald P., Margaret E. and Paul J. All members of the Methodist Episcopal Church. He is a Knight Templar, a Shriner, and a republican in politics. In 1912 he was elected as a delegate to the Republican National Convention at Chicago. Served in the state legislature, the thirty and thirty-first sessions from Bremer county. Member M. W. K. of P., I. O. O. F., Maccabees, Mystic Tilters, Masons and Commandery. Re-elected representative in 1918. Republican in politics.

C. H. SCOTT,

Representative from Appanoose county, was born on a farm in Walnut township, Appanoose county, Iowa, September 14, 1862. He received his education in the rural and graded schools. Is engaged in farming and truck gardening. He was married to Miss Lura F. Campbell, on April 1, 1887. To them were born fourteen children, five boys and eight girls living. Served as school director and township trustee for many years. He was elected representative in 1916, re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

RAY PAUL SCOTT,

Representative from Marshall county, Iowa, born in North Eaton, Ohio, June 5th, 1884. Came to Marshalltown in 1899, graduated Drake University in 1909. Served as county attorney of Marshall county from 1914 to 1918. Elected to the legislature in 1918. Republican in politics.

ARTHUR WAYLAND SLAUGHT,

One of the representatives from Wapello county, was born at Hector, Schuyler county, New York, July 6, 1855. His father and mother were both born in

Schuyler county. He was born and lived on a farm, and received such education as was afforded in the rural schools. GEORGE ALFRED SMITH,

D., practices his profession in Clinton. He was a brigade surgeon, commanding the 2nd Division, 3rd Army Corps Field Hospital, in the "war with Spain;" a lieutenant colonel on Gov. B. F. Attended the rural schools at Bode, and Luther College at Decorah. Was elected assistant cashier of the State Savings Bank at Bode, in 1913, and cashier the following year. Married Lottie J. Alstad at Decorah in 1915. Was elected representative in 1918. A republican in politics.

ARTHUR SPRINGER,

Representative from Louisa county, was born in that county, near Columbus City, September 30, 1855. Attended collegiate department, S. U. I., graduated in law department in 1877. Practiced law at Columbus Junction until 1891, and at Fort Worth, Texas, from 1891 to 1899, and has practiced in Wapello since. Was member of the commission appointed by Gov. Cummins to revise the school laws, and later a member of the "Better Iowa Schools" committee. Elected representative in 1918. Republican in politics.

 J. C. STERLING.

Representative from Hamilton county, Iowa, was born on a farm in McLean county, Illinois, January 22, 1863. He attended the district school, the LeRoy high school and Illinois Wesleyan University. He taught school for several years. August 16th, 1888, he was married to Minnie Gilmore of LeRoy, Illinois. In 1890 he came to Hamilton county, Iowa, and engaged in farming and teaching, until the fall of 1910 when he was elected clerk of the district court of Hamilton county, which office he served for six years. Mr. Sterling's family consists of six children, four girls and two boys. Elected representative in 1918. A republican in politics.

D. O. STONE.

Representative from Sioux county, was born in Belpre, Washington county, Ohio, February 25, 1864. In 1867 he came with his parents to Cherokee county, Iowa, and in 1868 moved with them to Calliope, Sioux county. He received his education in the common schools. At the age of fourteen he started to learn the printer's trade in the office of the Sioux County Herald, published at Orange City. In 1880 his father, Rufus Stone, established the Independent at Calliope (now Hawarden) and two months later died, leaving the entire management of the paper upon his son who was then only seventeen years of age, being the youngest editor in the state. He is still owner and publisher of the paper established by his father. Was postmaster of Hawarden from 1885 to 1889. He was united in marriage with Miss Generzia Dunham of Albion, Marshall county, Iowa, December 25, 1884. Elected representative in 1914. Re-elected in 1916 and 1918. Republican in politics.

WILLIAM STUART.

Representative from the ninety-sixth district, Emmet county, was born in Antrim county, Ireland, January 10, 1851. In 1856, his parents moved to Ontario, Canada, where he gained his education in the public schools of West Monkton, Canada. In 1864, they moved to Fulton, Illinois. In 1879 he came to Iowa and settled in Grundy Center, engaged in blacksmithing and later took up the sale of agricultural implements. In 1890 he was elected mayor of Grundy Center. He was united in marriage to Miss Jennie Dunn, on December 28, 1882, and to this union four daughters were born. In 1892, he moved to Armstrong, Iowa, served three years on the board of supervisors, and two years as president of the school board. He is a member of the M. E. church. Elected representative in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

WM. SUTHERLAND.

Representative from Washington county, was born in Albemarle county, Virginia, August 3, 1852, of Scotch-Irish parents. Moved to Mineral county, West Virginia, in 1874. Came to Washington county in 1875 and engaged in farming and stock raising until 1911, when he moved to Washington, Iowa. Was married to Winnie Davis at Wayland, Iowa, February 15, 1882, and has one daughter. Has served as director of Farmers Mutual Insurance company fourteen years, nine of which he was president. Served twenty-one years on the school board; township trustee six years; justice of peace; member of board of stewards M. E. church nine years; an Odd Fellow. Was elected representative in 1918. A democrat in politics.

M. L. TEMPLE,

Representative from Clarke county, was born September 16, 1848, in Monongalia county, Virginia. Was brought up on a farm, attended subscription school 140 days. Entered the State University and received the degree of A. B. in 1873 and A. M. in 1878. Married Julia M. Protzman, September 30, 1873, came to Osceola, Iowa, October 3, 1878. Member of A. F. & A. M., K. of P., Shrine, and Elks. Republican in politics. Was presidential elector in 1892, member of the house in the twenty-sixth, twenty-eighth, thirtieth and thirty-first general assemblies. United States attorney for So. District of Iowa, from March 14, 1907, to March 16, 1914. Elected county attorney in 1914, re-elected in 1916 and elected to the thirty-eighth general assembly in 1918.

OSCAR ULSTAD,

Representative from Wright county, was born at Leland, Illinois, October 30, 1867. At the age of five years he moved with his parents to Lee county, Illinois, where he resided until twenty years of age, when he moved to Wright county, Iowa, where he has since resided. Received his education in the rural schools of Illinois. Was engaged in the mercantile business at Holmes, Iowa, for fifteen years retiring in 1913 and has lived on a farm adjoining Holmes since that time. Was postmaster at Holmes for seventeen years, township trustee four years, township clerk two years and is now president of the school board. Is married and has five children. Elected representative in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

J. H. VAN CAMP,

Representative from the forty-second district, was born in Muscatine county, Iowa, June 20th, 1860. His parents came from New Jersey in 1850, taking up land in Muscatine county. Received his education in the rural schools and attended the Wilton Academy one year. Since that time he has been actively engaged in farming, at present owning and operating 252 acres. Served as township assessor for six years, and on the board of trustees for four years. Was elected representative in 1918. A republican in politics.

WALTER H. VANCE,

Representative from Madison county, was born in Washington county, Indiana, April 19, 1857, moving with his parents to a farm in Knox county, Illinois, in 1865. Attended district school, high school at Oneida, finishing his education in Monmouth College. He came to Madison county, Iowa, in 1878 where he taught in the district schools and farmed for a number of years. Moved to Winterset in 1892, engaged in the insurance business. Elected county recorder in 1900, serving two terms. Was postmaster of Winterset from 1908 to 1918. Served three and one-half years as deputy clerk and six months as deputy auditor. Is a member of the Methodist Episcopal church. Lodge affiliations are: Masonic, Knights of Pythias and M. W. A. Elected representative in 1918. A republican in politics.

W. G. VANDER PLOEG,

Representative from Marion county, was born in Marion county, and a resident of this county all his life. Graduated from the law department of the State University of Iowa in 1903, and engaged in the practice of law at Pella

and Knoxville. Was a member of Company 3, 3rd Battalion, C. O. T. S. for about three months, and was in the service at the time of election to office. Elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

CHAS. H. WALLACE,

Representative from Howard county, was born near Manlius, Onondaga county, New York, November 15, 1858. At the age of eleven years he came with his father to Howard county, Iowa. In youth he was accustomed to labor on the farm incident to those pioneer days. Received his education in the public schools. On November 15, 1881, he was married to Della C. Miller and has one son, who carries on the farm "The Oaks." He served nine years as member of the board of supervisors, five of which he was chairman. He has until recently been actively engaged in farming. A member of the M. W. A. and Masonic order and Congregational church. Elected representative in 1918. A democrat in politics.

ALANSON K. WESTERVELT.

Representative from Greene county, was born on a farm in Greene county, Iowa, of American parentage, in 1884. He lived on this farm until seventeen years of age, attending the rural schools. At the age of eighteen he entered Des Moines College Academy. From here he went to Brown University, Providence, R. I., and completed his junior years there. At the death of his father in 1912 he returned home to Churdan, Iowa, and engaged in the banking business left by his father, in which business he is still engaged. He was married to Clara Olevia Northrop of Boone, Iowa, June 24th, 1918. Elected representative in 1918. He is a republican in politics.

W. H. WALRATH,

Representative from Fayette county, is of American parentage. His parents came to Iowa in 1856 and settled on the land, on which a part of the town of Arlington, Fayette county, is now located. He took up the work of farming and stock raising, which he followed until 1902, and has since been engaged in real estate business. He was interested in public affairs, having served several terms as assessor and township trustee, and was a member of the board of education over twenty years. In 1902 he was elected a member of the board of supervisors which office he held until January 1, 1916. Married in 1880 to Miss Velma E. Doan who died in 1884. In 1889 was married to Miss Mary G. Hutchison. Elected representative in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

JAMES B. WEAVER,

One of the representatives from Polk county, and the son of Gen. James B. Weaver and Clara Vinson Weaver, was born at Bloomfield, Iowa, August 19, 1861. Attended the common school at Bloomfield. Farmed from 1877 to 1879 and clerked in a general store from 1879 to 1881. Graduated from the law department of the State University in 1882 and entered the law offices of Barcroft and Gatch and became a member of the firm of Gatch and Weaver in 1882, a member of the firm of Gatch, Conner and Weaver in 1885 and Conner and Weaver in 1897. Since 1904 he has continued the practice alone. Was active in public movements. Was president of the University Club, Prairie Club, Golf and Country Club, Des Moines Public Library, Iowa Press and

Author's Club and is a member of the Des Moines Town Planning Commission and Des Moines Better Housing Association. Was named state director of American Red Cross in 1917 and organized the state in 167 chapters. Elected representative in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

JOHN E. WICHMAN,

Representative from Hancock County, was born at Galena, Illinois, April 16, 1859. Educated in the public schools of Galena and Northwestern German English Normal school. Removed to Hancock county, Iowa, in 1879, where he has since resided. Taught school in Illinois and Hancock county, Iowa, for four years, and was admitted to the bar in 1884, and since that time has given his attention to the practice of law, and to banking. Was county attorney for four terms. Was married to Mary L. Prescott in 1888 and has two daughters, Lois and Charlotte. Was elected representative in 1916, and re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

JAMES A. WILLIAMS,

Representative from Pottawattamie county, born in Council Bluffs. Was graduated from high school and Omaha Commercial College. Attended University of Wisconsin 1898 and 1899. Went to Texas in 1900 and employed in banking and loan business. Appointed to clerkship in Signal Corps, War Department, Washington, and graduated from National Law University in 1907. Assigned to Fort Omaha Balloon School as chief clerk post headquarters. Served ten years as court reporter fifteenth judicial district. Practiced law with J. J. Hess, and member of firm of Williams Bros. Co., real estate, loans and insurance. Married to Irene Ruth Jones of Cedar Rapids. Member Methodist church, a Mason, Elk. Elected representative in 1918. A republican in politics.

THOS. J. WILSON.

Representative from Mahaska county, was born in Washington county, October 23rd, 1854. Educated in common school. Was married to Frances E. Davis, May 30, 1876. Moved to Mahaska county in 1882. Served as township trustee for twelve years and member of board of supervisors for three years. Was elected to the thirty-sixth, thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth general assemblies. A farmer by occupation. A republican in politics.

WM. C. WINDETT,

Representative from Keokuk county, was born of English and American parentage on a farm in Kendall county, Illinois, November 25, 1853. Attended rural district schools. Left farm at twenty, came to Iowa in 1874, to Keokuk county in 1884. At age of twenty-one entered employ of Chicago and Northwestern Ry. as telegraph operator, occupying various positions in station service until 1887 when he resigned to become cashier of What Cheer Savings Bank. This position he still retains. Has been twice married, now a widower. Elected representative in 1918. A republican in politics, always.

JOHN M. WORMLEY,

Representative from Plymouth county, was born near Macomb in the state of Illinois in 1863. Came to Newton, Iowa, with his parents in 1866, traveling in a prairie schooner, and crossing the Mississippi on a flat boat at Keokuk. Received his education in the common schools of Jasper county, Hazel Dell Academy at Newton, Ames College, and is a graduate from the Law College at Iowa City, class of 1889. He began to practice law the same year at Kingsley, Iowa, from which he retired in 1916 to devote his time to his extensive real estate interests, stock raising and farming. He has held many local offices, public and private, including councilman, postmaster and was mayor of Kingsley for many years. Elected representative in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. A republican in politics.

FRANK C. YOUNG,

Representative from Davis county, was born in Davis county, December 6, 1862. Parents born in Virginia. Scotch-Irish decent, moved to Davis county, 1843. He grew to manhood on his father's farm; attended rural school, high school and Southern Iowa Normal College at Bloomfield, Iowa. Engaged in grain and mercantile business from 1885 to 1896. Was elected sheriff in 1897, re-elected 1899. Engaged in farming since 1900. He is a director of the Davis County Savings Bank. He is a member of Farm Bureau Farm Institutes, and secretary of the Davis County Fair. Was married to Pearl Davies, February 25th, 1885. Member of Christian church, Mason, K. of P., and Modern Woodman. Elected representative 1918. A democrat in politics.

REPUBLICAN PLATFORM--1918.

The following was adopted as the platform of the Republican party of Iowa at the state convention held in Des Moines, July 10, 1918:

The republicans of Iowa, in delegate convention assembled, hereby adopt the following declaration of principles and submit the same to the voters as their platform:

The republican party was born in the midst of the storm when the life of the nation hung in the balance. Its first president, the martyred Lincoln, kept the faith without faltering or wavering, and brought the ship of state to a safe port. The party has never halted for a moment in its fealty to the flag and to the principles of human liberty. Its leaders have been distinguished by their unselfishness and patriotic service to the nation. And this has been true since the day of Lincoln. We hereby consecrate all that we are and everything that we have to the winning of the world war.

This is not the war of any party; it is not the war of any section or class. It is the war of our nation. The burdens are being borne by all, without regard to creed or party or age or sex. It is so great that we must pass on to our children the duty of paying much of the cost. We, as republicans stand fully committed to the policy of treating the war and everything which relates thereto as the work of all the people and we invite to our standard every patriot who believes that Americans should meet this world crisis in the broadest spirit of genuine patriotism.

In this crisis of not only the life of the nation, but of the world as well, there is one duty which rises high above every partisan consideration and which should govern and control every citizen of the republic. That duty is to hold all that he has, or is, for the deliverance of the country and of mankind from the cruel, criminal and atrocious designs of the imperial government of Germany. No man should be elected to any high office, no matter what his party may be, unless he can fulfill this test in perfect measure. We can endure some degree of inefficiency, but we can tolerate no degree of disloyalty; no degree of selfishness. We are fighting an outlaw among nations. Our enemy has neither honor nor conscience nor civilization. We are struggling not alone for our own institutions, but for humanity and decency among the people of the earth. We have sent a million of the bravest men who ever wore a uniform across the sea and we will soon have a million more.

The supreme task is to win the war, speedily if we can, but to win it. No party feeling must be permitted to touch our consecration to this sacred undertaking.

That the republican party, full of the spirit of 1776 and the desire for liberty and the perpetual union of 1861, sends greetings to all of our brave and vallant men in the army and naval service of the United States and hereby express our pride in the men from Iowa that have joined the service of their country, knowing that they are the bravest and most sacrificing men that any state or country can produce.

In connection with the after war problems, we advocate the protective tariff as a means of safeguarding the welfare of the laboring men of this country and protecting them against the flooding of the markets of this country with the products of cheap labor of foreign lands. We advocate the protective tariff as a safeguard for the industries of this country, and as a means of making stable the social and economical situation after the war.

The republican party of Iowa reaffirms its declaration for equal suffrage. It urges immediate passage of the federal amendment by the United States senate and its ratification by the state, and commends our senators and representatives in congress for their support of this amendment.

That the republicans of Iowa will take no backward step on the temperance question and that we favor the ratification by the next general assembly of the federal prohibitory amendment to the constitution.

We favor a simplified ballot and to that end we recommend a modification of the primary and election laws.

That we heartily endorse the administration of W. L. Harding, governor of Iowa, in his patriotic and virtue leadership in support of this war, and all his activities, and we especially approve his efforts to bring about the universal public use of the English language in the state of Iowa.

We endorse and most heartily commend the distinguished and patriotic service of our senators, A. B. Cummins and W. E. Kenyon, and endorse and commend the election of our republican nominees for congress and state officers.

DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM—1918.

The Democracy of Iowa, in convention assembled, rejoices with the emancipated peoples of the Universe in the providential leadership of Woodrow Wilson in this, the greatest crisis in the history of the world. It dedicates itself anew to the overshadowing purpose of the present—to win the war, and it assures him of its enthusiastic approval of his acts and sympathy with his aims.

While we, as Americans devoted to honorable peace, three years ago reverently thanked God for Wilson and witnessed the sorry partisan spectacle of our opponents deriding him as unfit properly to guide the destinies of the nation, today we give room for Americans of every party that they may with like reverence thank God that the honor of our country and the well-being of our boys are in his keeping.

For a generation the Democratic party was so persistently maligned as unfitted for the custodianship of any great task, and as so utterly lacking in men of the vision or capacity to direct national affairs, that the party was denied opportunity to disprove the calumny until the cohesive power of public plunder no longer availed to keep together the corrupt corpse of the Republican party.

The party "lacking in leadership," "unfitted for the proper discharge of any public duty," "incompetent" and comprising "irreconcilable elements" has become, with opportunity, the greatest governing authority in the history of the republic. McAdoo the greatest constructive genius ever in the cabinet; in the vilified Josephus Daniels, secretary of the navy, whose achievements baffle his enemies and give consolation to the mothers of America, whose sons have gone or will go to the fields of France; the patient, masterful Baker, who, like Daniels, was the butt of scorn and ridicule, and whom now a committee of congress—Republicans no less than Democrats—unanimously felicitates on the scope of his accomplishments. So complete and so satisfactory are the achievements of the President and his associates that the demand, born of partisanship, for a coalition cabinet, is heard no more, and the people of America resign their welfare with confidence and trust to the keeping of the Democratic party.

Not without reason is this faith. One of the first acts of the Wilson administration was to adopt, over the calamity cries and protests of every plumed knight of privilege and over the opposition of the leaders of the Republican party the Banking and Currency bill, which forever took from the money centers control of the nations banking reserves, which made financial panics forever impossible, which, when the European war broke, and the credit systems of the world tumbled into ruins protected the people of the United States against loss and suffering and the industries of the United States from prostration and ruin, and which today, by the operation of the rediscount privilege makes it possible for the country to absorb war issues of securities and have left money enough to keep the industries of the country going.

This law, the constructive masterpiece of fifty years of legislative history, was speedily followed by the act incorporating the shipping board, which gave to the government the right to build ships for the use of commerce. Like the currency bill, this legislation had to meet and overcome Republican opposition, and today we rejoice that it did this, because this organization thus created has made possible what otherwise were impossible—the speedy provision of a merchant marine to restore American commerce to the seas, and promote the speedy movement of troops and supplies to Europe.

The Democratic party is restoring the American flag, driven from the seas with the 3,000,000 tons of shipping it floated over by the Republican policy of exclusive tariffs, and is preparing for the day when, the war over, the industries of the United States will seek the markets of the world.

It was Democratic genius which conceived and drafted the rural credits bill, another forehanded measure which makes possible borrowing by struggling farmers for long periods, and not only reduced the rate of interest throughout the country, but equipped farmers better to meet the food demands of the world.

It was Democratic genius which evolved in the draft law the most democratic method ever devised for raising an army and enabled this country, fifteen months after it had entered the war, to confront the Hun with a million Americans in arms.

It was Democratic genius which shifted from the shoulders of the consuming millions the burden of taxation, and put this instead, in the tax on incomes, on the shoulders of wealth.

It was Democratic genius which created the war finance corporation, which effects to make sure that the money of the nation shall be used first to finance the country in war and, secondly, provide for the expansion or establishment of industries needful to successful prosecution of the war.

It was Democratic genius which evolved the means and supplied the skill for taking over as a war measure control of operation of the railroads of the country. Experience with government control is too brief to admit of fair judgment

and while the first objective is to serve war needs, yet we are confident that the wisdom of the action will be repeatedly emphasized in benefits to shippers, travelers, employees, and investors, many of which are not now foreseen by the average man.

It was Democratic genius which liberated the spirits of the country's sailors and soldiers in provision for allowance for their dependents and in the further provision of war insurance for their families. The same foresight and solicitous regard which so admirably provides for them at home and abroad may be trusted to work out a practicable plan looking to training of the wounded in vocations suited to their abilities, so that they may not suffer from inability to support themselves in useful employment after serving their country on the field of battle; and to make such other provisions as may be necessary to enable all surviving soldiers and sailors to re-enter various avenues of employment and opportunity on most favorable terms at the conclusion of the war. The duty of making these provisions is dictated alike by conscience, gratitude, and economy and is one that we are sure, will be met by all the people of the nation unselfishly, and from a desire to help to the uttermost.

The Democratic genius which has anticipated and provided for every need of the nation will provide wisely for the conditions to obtain here, after the war. Confidence is begot by faith redeemed, and in the redemption of its promises to the people, no less than in the admirable wisdom it has revealed in handling each problem, the Democratic party has earned the right to enduring confidence.

The problems pressing for solution at the conclusion of the war will be so grave and so numerous as to call for the broadest constructive statesmanship and most careful preparation now to meet them. We bespeak for President Wilson the co-operation in his legislative endeavor of all citizens mindful of the gravity of his task, and we call for support only of those candidates for congress pledged to stand by his policies.

A measure of industrial democracy new to the world is to be one of the fruits of the war, and we rejoice in this for the higher estate the toiling masses are to enjoy. The task of making the world safe for political democracy is one which those who toil are making easier by their unflinching industry and loyal devotion to duty. It is fitting and proper that they shall be large beneficiaries in the new measure of democracy they are themselves unselfishly seeking to make a boon to all people dominated by the Prussian autocracy.

We rejoice in the war spirit of Iowa. We rejoice that here and there patriotic Republicans have driven from official life representatives more solicitous for the Prussians in America, than for the Americans in America, and we welcome as supporters of our President and his policies other men in and out of official life who adjourn politics and convene patriotism in order to hold up his hands.

We approve the candidacy of William S. Kenyon for re-election to the United States Senate, and point to this in proof that the Democracy of Iowa is broad enough and big enough to give credit where due and reward deserving even to the point of giving support to his candidacy.

We denounce the greed which robs in war time, and urge upon congress so to draft the revenue bill now in committee that taxation shall absorb the gains of profiteers. Excess profits taxes should be made to fall upon the lazy, no less than the earned income, and the injustice of taxing him who earns his living by his industry while absolving him whose income is the product of others' industry, forever ended. Profiteering in the necessities of life should be made a crime.

We recognize that the rank and file of the Republican party have full confidence in the President of the United States—the commander in chief of our great army and navy, who stands today by the common consent of the world, outside of our enemies, as the most dominant representative of the rights of the common people. We resent the impudent assumption of a few politicians, who, like Governor Harding in his speech at the Republican State Convention, sneeringly referred to the "democratic handicap, weakness and indecision" of the present administration which is carrying the burdens of this war. We protest against the policy of a few politicians who endeavor to damn the President of the United States by faint praise, and we resent the assumption of Governor Harding that "it was in response to this insistence of Republican leadership that the preparation we now have was brought forth." We give to the Republicans

who have stood by the President, the highest possible credit, but we resent the effort of Governor Harding and other politicians who assume that the achievements of this war is solely the result of Republican effort, and that the Republicans in this effort have been handicapped by the obstacles which Democracy has placed in their way. The Governor of Iowa should emulate the example set by the really great men of his party and should remember that his country is at war and as the chief executive of a great state he should at all times loyally support the commander in chief of our army. He should remember that his belittling and slurring references to the officers of our country will be treated as a pleasing encouragement by our enemies.

The Governor of Iowa should be a leader and should be big enough to grasp fully the seriousness of the world's war; he should be possessed of such patriotism that he could disregard all partisan allegiance during the war. We believe his support of Burton E. Sweet, Harry E. Hull, Gilbert N. Haugen and C. W. Ramseyer, who are candidates for re-election to congress from this state, each of whom supported Germany more often than he supported America, convicts him of insincerity and proves he is actuated by blind spirit of partisanship.

We think the time opportune for the state to offer its credit along the line of the Farm Loan Act to the soldiers of the republic on their return so that they may acquire their own homes in Iowa on long time credits at the lowest possible rate of interest.

We endorse the action of congress in submitting to the legislatures of the states the proposed amendment to the federal constitution provided for national prohibition and favor such action as legally necessary to support our President therein.

We favor the speedy enactment of the pending federal amendment giving equal franchise to women, and pledge the Democratic members of the legislature of Iowa to ratify promptly such amendment, and in recognition of the splendid work they are doing in support of all war activities and believing in the principle of equal suffrage, we invite them to participate in the council of our party.

We favor such amendment to the primary election laws as will remove all existing evils as well as all opportunity for thwarting the will of the people in the selection of public officials.

We take pride in presenting to the people of Iowa our candidate for governor, Hon. Claude R. Porter. He is a lawyer of great ability, as evidenced in his selection by the government for the prosecution in another state of one of the most important cases arising within the present generation. He possesses a keen sense of responsibility and a lofty purpose to fulfill his every duty in life. His large ability, clean personal character, high ideals and supreme courage warrant our confidence that a careful consideration by the people of Iowa will result in his election as governor.

Primary Election June 3, 1918.

The term "Primary Election" is construed under the law to apply to an election by the members of various political parties for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for public office, for selecting delegates to conventions, and for the selection of party committeemen. The law provides that the primary election shall consist of an election by all political parties and shall be held at the various voting places of the several precincts on the first Monday in June, in the year 1912 and biennially thereafter, for the nomination of candidates for such offices as are to be filled at the general election in November next ensuing (except candidates for Judge of the Supreme, District and Superior Courts, which shall be by a Judicial Convention,) for senator in the congress of the United States, and for the electors of the President and Vice-President of the United States in the years in which senators or president and vice-president are to be elected.

The Board of Supervisors of each county (acting as a County Board of Canvassers) meet on the second Tuesday following the primary election in June and canvass the votes cast at the several precincts and make an abstract thereof. A separate abstract of the canvass duly certified is then forwarded to the Secretary of State for the following offices:

United States Senators.

Electors of the President and Vice-President of the United States.

All State Officers.

Representatives in Congress.

Senators and Representatives in the General Assembly.

On the second Monday after the June primary election, the Executive Council meets as a State Canvassing Board, and opens and canvasses the abstract returns received from each county in the state. Said board makes abstracts of its canvass, showing the number of ballots cast for each person voted for, and the person having the highest number of votes in the state or district (provided he receives 35 per cent of all the votes cast by the party for such office), is duly and legally nominated and is entitled to have his name printed on the official ballot for the General Election.

PRESIDENTIAL ELECTIONS FROM 1789 TO 1916.

AGGREGATE POPULAR VOTE AND ELECTORAL VOTE FOR CANDIDATES FOR PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENT AT EACH ELECTION.

NOTE.—There is, properly speaking, no popular vote for President and Vice-President; the people vote for electors, and those, chosen in each state meet therein and vote for the candidates for President and Vice-President. The record of any popular vote for electors prior to 1824 is so meager and imperfect that a compilation would be useless. In most of the states, for more than a quarter century following the establishment of the Government, the State legislatures "appointed" the presidential electors, and the people therefore voted only indirectly for them, their choice being expressed by their votes for members of the legislature. In this tabulation only the aggregate electoral votes for candidates for President and Vice-President in the first nine quadrennial elections appear.

ELECTORAL VOTES.

1789. Previous to 1804 each elector voted for two candidates for President. The one who received the largest number of votes was declared president, and the one who received the next largest number of votes was declared Vice-President. The electoral votes for the first President of the United States were: George Washington, 69; John Adams, of Massachusetts, 34; John Jay, of New York, 9; R. H. Harrison, of Maryland, 6; John Rutledge, of South Carolina, 6; John Hancock, of Massachusetts, 4; George Clinton, of New York, 3; Samuel Huntington, of Connecticut, 2; John Milton, of Georgia, 2; James Armstrong, of Georgia; Benjamin Lincoln, of Massachusetts, and Edward Telfair, of Georgia, 1 vote each. Vacancies (votes not cast), 4. George Washington was chosen President and John Adams Vice-President.

1792. George Washington, Federalist, received 132 votes; John Adams, Federalist, 77; George Clinton, of New York, Republican (a) 50; Thomas Jefferson, of Virginia, Republican, 4; Aaron Burr, of New York, Republican, 1 vote. Vacancies, 3. George Washington was chosen President and John Adams Vice President.

1796. John Adams, Federalist, 71; Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 68; Thomas Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 69; Aaron Burr, of New

York, Republican, 30; Samuel Adams, of Massachusetts, Republican, 15; Oliver Ellsworth, of Connecticut, Independent, 11; George Clinton, of New York, Republican, 7; John Jay, of New York, Federalist, 5; James Iredell, of North Carolina, Federalist, 3; George Washington, of Virginia, John Henry, of Maryland, and S. Johnson, of North Carolina, all Federalists, 2 votes each; Charles Cotesworth Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 1 vote. John Henry Adams was chosen President and Thomas Jefferson Vice-President.

1800. Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 73; Aaron Burr, Republican, 73; John Adams, Federalist, 65; Charles C. Pinckney, Federalist, 64; John Jay, Federalist, 1 vote. There being a tie vote for Jefferson and Burr, the choice devolved upon the House of Representatives. Jefferson received the votes of ten states, which, being the largest vote cast for a candidate, elected him President. Burr received the votes of four States, which being the next largest vote, elected him Vice-President. There were 2 blank votes.

1804. The Constitution of the United States having been amended, the electors at this election voted for a President and a Vice-President, instead of for two candidates for President. The result was as follows: For President, Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 162; Charles C. Pinckney, Federalist, 14. For Vice-President, George Clinton, Republican, 162; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 14. Jefferson was chosen President and Clinton Vice-President.

1808. For President, James Madison, of Virginia, Republican, 122; Charles C. Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 47; George Clinton, of New York, Republican, 8. For Vice-President, George Clinton, Republican, 113; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 47; John Langdon, of New Hampshire, 9; James Madison, 3; James Monroe, 3. Vacancy, 1. Madison was chosen President and Clinton Vice-President.

1812. For President, James Madison, Republican, 128; De Witt Clinton, of New York, Federalist, 89. For Vice President, Elbridge Gerry, of Massachusetts, 131; Jared Ingersoll, of Pennsylvania, Federalist, 88. Vacancy, 1. Madison was chosen President and Gerry Vice-President.

1816. For President, James Monroe, of Virginia, Republican, 183; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 34. For Vice-President, Daniel D. Tompkins, of New York, Republican, 183; John Eager Howard, of Maryland, Federalist, 22; James Ross, of Pennsylvania, 5; John Marshall, of Virginia, 4; Robert G. Harper, of Maryland, 3. Vacancies, 4. Monroe was chosen President and Tompkins Vice-President.

1820. For President, James Monroe of Virginia, Republican, 231; John Q. Adams, of Massachusetts, Republican, 1. For Vice-President, Daniel D. Tompkins, Republican, 219; Richard Stockton, of New Jersey, 8; Daniel Rodney, of Delaware, 4; Robert G. Harper, of Maryland, and Richard Rush, of Pennsylvania, 1 vote each. Vacancies, 3. James Monroe was chosen President and Daniel D. Tompkins Vice-President.

Jackson called himself a South Carolinian and his biographer, Kendall, recorded his birthplace in Lancaster county, South Carolina, but Parton has published documentary evidence to show that Jackson was born in Union county, North Carolina, less than a quarter of a mile from the South Carolina line. The Democratic party of today claims lineal descent from the first Republican party, and President Jefferson as its founder. Political parties were disorganized at the time of the election of John Quincy Adams. He claimed to be a Republican, but his detractors were decidedly Federalistic. The opposition to his administration took the name of Democrats and elected Jackson President.
