

MEXICO'S LEADER LOOKS TOWARD RECOGNITION

President Obregon Predicts Early Resumption of Relations With U. S.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 23.—President Obregon predicts the resumption of diplomatic relations between the United States and Mexico by September 15, according to semi-official advices received here from Mexico City today.

While confirmation is lacking at the state department officials believe the frank statement of Secretary Hughes respecting the inadequacy of the Mexican supreme court decisions has had a most beneficial effect on Mexican opinion, both official and public.

It would be an easy matter for President Obregon to bring about the resumption of diplomatic relations, administration officials declare, and they therefore decline to brand as without foundation the reports from Mexico City regarding the possibility of recognition by September 15.

President Obregon, it is understood, has approved everything done by Adolfo De La Huerta, Mexican finance minister, while in the United States. De La Huerta had a long conference with Secretary Hughes and another with President Harding while he was in Washington and it is admitted that he left the capital with a much clearer conception of the American attitude toward the Obregon regime.

Papers Condemn Court In addition, officials here point out that the newspapers of Mexico City were almost unanimous in condemning the Mexican supreme court for having "quibbled about technicalities" when a broad comprehensive decision was needed.

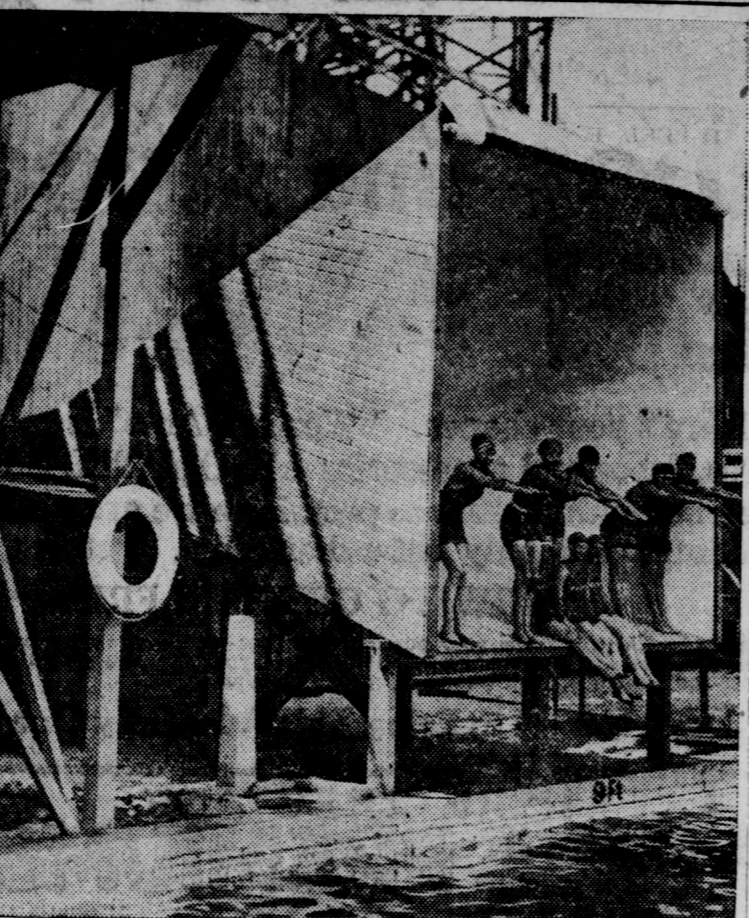
"Go on!" Dollops' voice expressed incredulity, amazement, and an awed interest that rather flattered the butler.

Largest Radio Megaphone Outdoes Band



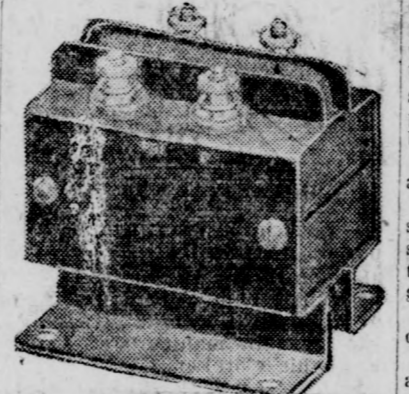

FREQUENCY TRANSFORMER DOES AWAY WITH NOISES

An audio frequency transformer showing a very effective curve on a plotted chart is here described. The impedance of the primary winding of this transformer equals that of the secondary coil and exceeds the impedance of the plate filament circuit of the amplifying tube to which it is connected. This results in giving a very high ratio of amplification and does away with tube noises. Materials used in its construction are carefully selected to obtain the most satisfactory results. The exterior is shielded and its construction combines sturdiness and strength. It is sold mounted or unmounted and the price is reasonable.

VACUUM TUBES IN TRANSMISSION

In the three electrode tube by inserting a grid between the filament and the plate, as stated before, in the form of several small wires the grid is placed in the path of the stream of electrons which constitute the plate current. When this grid is charged positively the same charge will be neutralized, as it is of a negative character and thus a greater plate current will result. Also, if the grid be charged negatively, the space charge will be increased and a greater number of electrons driven back to the filament, with a lessening of the plate current. Thus it will be seen that the value of the plate current can be controlled by means of the third element or grid in the vacuum tube. This control is accomplished in a variety of ways, depending upon the use for which a given set is designed, also upon the characteristics of the particular vacuum tube used. Various tubes have a variance of characteristics.

Thus bearing in mind the theory of the action of the vacuum tube we can pass to a discussion of the various circuits wherein the tubes are used for generating undamped oscillations. Before doing so, however, it may be appropriate to enumerate the advantages gained by using this system.

The main advantages of the undamped, or as they are also known, continuous waves, are the following:

1. Extremely sharp tuning and consequent reduction of interference, especially between stations in the same vicinity.
2. Radio telephony is made possible.
3. The oscillations go on continuously instead of only a small fraction of the time, as in the case of damped waves, their amplitude need not be so great, hence the voltages applied to the transmitting condenser and the antenna are much lower.
4. With damped waves the pitch or tone of the received signals depends entirely upon the number of sparks per second of the transmitter. With undamped waves the receiving operator controls the tone of the received signals and this can be varied and made as high as desired within certain audible limits to distinguish it from "static."

These advantages, freedom from interference from other stations through selective tuning, the high tones and low voltages and the greater freedom from static or strays, combine to permit of a higher speed, to say nothing of the advantages of utilizing the equipment for telephony as well as telegraphy.

It's a Fact

PHILIPPINE YARN TRADE

Colored cotton yarns are used in the Philippines for hand loom weaving in substantial quantities. The finer counts formerly supplied by England, are now being principally imported from Japan. In the importation of coarser counts, the countries to be reckoned as competitors, are China, Japan and India.

In 1913, the Philippines imported 1,615,830 kilos valued at 1,794,118 pesos; in 1920, 1,497,751 kilos valued at 4,198,830 pesos; and in 1921, 1,170,644 kilos valued at 2,071,038 pesos.

TRADE IN RUBBER GOODS

The total crude rubber imports into the United States for the month of June amounted to approximately 52,000,000 pounds, valued at \$7,600,000, according to the rubber division of the department of commerce. These figures show a substantial increase over the previous month, when the total amounted to 37,000,000 pounds, at a value of \$5,600,000. Crude rubber imports for June, 1922, were also greatly in excess of the imports for the same month of last year, which amounted to 45,000,000 pounds, valued at approximately \$6,900,000.

The greater quantity imported during the month of June is undoubtedly caused by the greatly increased activity of the rubber manufacturing concerns, whose volume of output is constantly being reported at or near peak capacity.

It is interesting to note that for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1922, approximately 583,000,000 pounds of crude rubber were imported into the United States, as compared with 377,000,000 pounds for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1921. However, this year's quantity, which was much larger, was valued at about \$89,000,000, as compared with the previous year's total valuation of \$118,000,000.

Practical Housekeeping by Florence Austin Chase

CANDIED ORANGE PEEL, ETC.

Candied Orange Peel—Wipe oranges and remove peel in section, lengthwise of fruit; then cut and scrape, using a small vegetable knife, removing almost all of the white portion. Soak over night in cold water, to which has been added one tablespoon of salt to each quart of water used. (Use just enough water to cover peel). In the morning, drain, put in saucepan, cover with cold water and bring to boiling point; repeat three times and cook in the last water until soft, the time required being three to four hours. Drain for several hours, then cut into strips or small squares; measure, add an equal amount of sugar, pit over simmering burner of gas range and cook until pieces are clear. Remove to plate, taking up as little syrup as possible. Cool roll each piece separately in powdered sugar and spread on a platter to dry. Store in glass jars.

Chocolate Dipped Candied Orange Peel—Follow directions given for candied orange peel, leaving on quite a bit of white portion. Melt confectioners' dipping chocolate in a small saucepan, placed in a larger saucepan containing boiling water. Dip each piece of candied peel separately in chocolate, put on waxed paper and let stand until cool.

Crystallized Mint Leaves—Wipe fresh tender mint leaves, remove from stems and brush each leaf with white of egg, beaten until stiff. Dip in granulated sugar which has been flavored with a few drops of oil of spearmint. Place closely together on baking sheet covered with waxed paper and dry in a very slow oven.

Rose petals may be crystallized in the same manner.

Syrup From Berries—Put very ripe perfect berries in an enamel or earthenware pot and let them stand over night in a warm room.

SELF MASTERY THROUGH CONSCIOUS AUTO-SUGGESTION

There is a good deal that is helpful in Coue's book, "Self Mastery Through Unconscious Auto-Suggestion," and there is a great deal more, it seems to me, of pure unadulterated quackery.

In justice to Coue, I must say that most of the good of the book is the smaller part that he has written, and most of the part that favors of charlatanism is contributed by his admirers in the form of homage, observation and letters.

Inasmuch, however, as Coue must have sanctioned it since it appears in his book, he is open to a great deal of criticism. M. Coue is a chemist by profession, and in his interpretation of some of his results he shows very plainly that he has not had a course, apparently, in ordinary physiology.

Some of the good things he says are as follows: "We can control and lead our imaginations just as the unbroken horse can be controlled. We constantly give ourselves unconscious auto-suggestions. BEAUTY CHATS

SHAPING THE EYEBROWS

The sharply defined eyebrow is no longer in fashion. I prefer the artificially made line that requires shaving, or many tweezer pluckings. This should be a relief to the girls who have passed through that tedious experience.

While the extreme fashion for the severely fine line has gone, the eyebrow is still to be as symmetrical as formerly. This symmetry is not an impossible achievement for those with brows in which many hairs are out of alignment. The first thing is to train the hairs so they will fall into an arched line, after which it will only be a matter of a few strokes with the brush—and running of finger tips over the brows—to keep them in place. A small brush can be purchased at any drug store, or a stiff tooth brush will answer.

Begin by brushing all hair that grows under the line of the brow and make the strokes both upward and outward. Conversely, brush all the hair that grows above the line, making the strokes downward and outward. A little practice will be needed as these strokes are intended to make all hair, from below and above, overlap in the center; after which it is only necessary to run the fingers over the line to shape it into a becoming curve.

If the hairs will not stay in place, moisten them at first with some thin muckilage water. If there are still any hairs that break the symmetry of line, they will have to be taken out with the tweezers or clipped off; but this should not be attempted unless they disfigure. The idea now is merely a becoming and neatly arranged brow, not the sharply defined one of the past.

Auburn—As it is easier to prevent freckles than to cure them, the best advice I can give is to rub the skin full of cold cream and use quite a little powder before each trip on the water.

Discouraged—Biting the nails is a nervous habit which can only be overcome by exerting your will power. You might try rubbing alum on them as a reminder, since you will get the bitter taste whenever you begin to bite. And keeping the nails manicured until the bad habit is broken is a great help.

"Somewhat to my surprise I find the whisper about that Mr. C. C. Moore, candidate for the United States Senate against Senator Hiram W. Johnson, has a most excellent record in favor of prohibition and in support of moral issues, while it is intimated that Senator Johnson has not.

To one who has followed the course of so-called moral legislation in this state for the last twenty-five years, this would be amusing if it were not so completely false.

To the administration of Hiram W. Johnson as governor and his personal support, we owe the local option law, the redlight abatement act, under which every segregated district in the state has been closed, the effective anti-racetrack gambling law under which racetrack gambling was banished from the state, and many other measures such as the law that banished the nickel-in-the-slot machine.

On the score of humanitarian issues, we owe to Johnson's administration the eight-hour law for women, the minimum wage law for women, the effective housing law, the workmen's compensation act, and numerous other measures as important.

More fundamentally, we owe to him the initiative and the referendum without which our gains for good morals in California during the last ten years would have been impossible, while, because of his effective work for advance legislation, California secured woman's suffrage five years before it would otherwise have been possible.

On the other hand, at the 1913 session of the legislature, we find the Panama-Pacific Exposition which Mr. C. C. Moore was the executive head, at Sacramento, lobbying for the defeat of the bill introduced by Senator Kehoe to keep booze-selling out of the exposition grounds. Because of effective opposition put up by Mr. Moore and his associates, the Kehoe bill was defeated.

After the exposition was opened, the scandal of certain of the zone concessions shocked San Francisco.

It was my privilege to escort the late Dr. D. M. Gandler through the zone to show him the things that were being done with the complete sanction of the exposition directorate of which Mr. Moore was the executive head. We appealed to this directorate for correction, but without result.

Dry Cause Leader Lauds Johnson as Moral Force

Franklin Hichborn, for a number of years publicity manager for the Anti-Saloon League of California, has written a letter to prominent Californians strongly indorsing Senator Hiram Johnson's work in support of moral legislation.

Mr. Hichborn was for nearly two decades a newspaper correspondent at the sessions of the California Legislature, and he was one of the foremost influences in the crusade that led to the political regeneration of this state.

His letter follows:

We then made our appeal direct to Governor Johnson. Governor Johnson set himself to eliminate the nasty conditions on the zone. They were eliminated. In taking this decided stand for public decency, Governor Johnson estranged the underworld element which in retaliation struck back at him, by opposing the measures which had been submitted to state-wide vote in October, 1915, and intended to carry out policies which Governor Johnson was advocating. But the Governor's course on this occasion won for him the approval of every decent citizen of this state.

In view of these facts, it is extraordinary to me that Mr. Moore's supporters should have the audacity to attempt to make decent men and women believe that in the interest of good morals, they must support Mr. Moore in opposition to Senator Johnson.

Those, my dear sir, who have been on the firing line for clean conditions in California recognize that we owe more to Hiram Johnson than to all the other men who have held the position of governor of this state combined."

Senator Johnson voted for the submission of the prohibition amendment and for the Volstead Enforcement Law.

Mrs. Mable Walker Willebrandt, Assistant Attorney General of the United States, who is in charge of the enforcement of the Volstead Act, for the United States Department of Justice, is authority for the statement that Senator Johnson has always stood staunchly for law enforcement, and that he has never asked for leniency for any constituent charged with violating the prohibition laws, although many other members of Congress have done so.

Mr. Gandler was manager in the state of California for the Anti-Saloon League for several years.

Former United States Senator John W. Works and Mrs. Works called on Senator Johnson during his (Senator Johnson's) recent visit to Los Angeles.

Senator Works is for clean government and good politics. Senator Works says: "You can say I intend to vote for Senator Johnson this year." Mrs. Works seconded her husband's declaration on this point.

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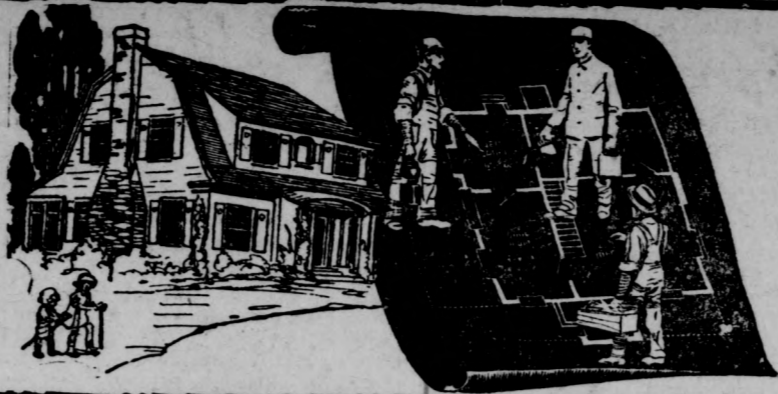
