MAINTENANCE OF STRONG NAVY CERTAIN GUARANTEE FOR PEACE Naval Battles Not Abolished By Decision Of Washington Conference, Claim

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.-An American navy second to none in strength of material and personnel, trained to the highest efficiency and maintained in readiness, is the surest support for the decisions of our statesmen and the best guarantee for the predominance of justice, declares Admiral Robert E. Coontz, writing in a recent issue of the American Legion Weekly.

The various treaties concluded at the Washington arms conference, Admiral Coontz asserts, were made in the interest of peace, and the United States can "ill afford at this time, either in our own interest or in the interest of the world at large to withdraw from a position where we can speak clearly and with authority in world councils."

On the score of humanitarian issues, we owe to Johnson's administration the eight-hour law for women, the minimum wage law for women, the effective housing law, the workmen's compensation act, and numerous other measures as important.




