The number of firms that had signed agreements were augmented to-day by about a hundred, which brings the aggregation of the establishments making the concessions during the past three or four days to one thousand in round numbers. Save in one or two instances, as at Scranton, Pa., the allied trades have not yet been affected. It is said at the general headquarters of the machialists, however, that where agreements are not effected by this afternoon to-morrow, many of the men in the allied trades will go out in the individual shops where the machinists are already out. EXPOSITION DEDICATED.

Buffalo, May 20.—The Pan-American exposition was to-day formally dedicated. The day Began with a parade, in which there were men from nearly every country in the world, and ended with a bonilardment from flying bombs and a brilliant electrical illumination. Between the two were the formal exercises of the dedication. The city was bright with flags and bunting.

The parade that formed at the city hall and marched by way of the main streets to the exposition grounds, made an interesting spectacle and thousands.

Vice-President Roosevelt was the guest of the hour, and when he reached the hall the parade was started with a volley of aerial bombs. The entry of the procession to the exposition grounds at noon was a magnificent spectacle. The crowd in the grounds at that time numbered fully 40,000, and the greater part of it was massed in the Esplanade. Dozens of war kites carried flags and streamers floated high in the air.

The exercises began at 12.45 o'clock with the rendition of Handels "Alleluia," by the First Regiment band. Bishop Charles H. Cowler led in prayer. President Milburn read a series of congratulatory telegrams from Central and South America and Canada, and their reading provoked cheer upon cheer. The telegram received from Lord Minto was as follows:

"The Governor-General of Canada directs me to express to you his hearty congratulations on the opening of the Pan-American exposition, which His Excellency sincerely hopes may be in every way successful, (Signed) Harry Graham, aide decemp to the Governor General."

To-day's total admissions from 8 a.m. until 11 n.m. were 101,687. This does not include several thousand persons who came in through the Lincoln park way entrance with the parade.

Mechanical engineers and business men generally aim at obtaining a maximum amount of energy at a minimum cost. For many years the steam-engine has been supreme as the generator of power, but the water-turbine and the gas-engine have become dangerous rivals. It is, therefore, important to know the comparative cost of power, obtained from the various sources, and this has been worked out by Mr. J. B. C. Ker shaw. Mr. J. A. Bailey has just reached London from Mombasa, having travelled overland via Uganda and the Upper Nile, the journey having been undertaken specially with a view to ascertaining the conditions of transport by this route, and the practicability of its adoption as a megas of communication between British Equatorial Africa and England. CLEANING WOOLEN FABRICS.

To clean dust or grime from light cloths

To clean dust or grime from light cloths first brush thoroughly, then rub with cornmeal, using a piece of light cloth for the rubbing. By this simple process I have known cream-tan broadcloth coars and skirts, so much worn now, entirely freshened and gleaned.

Grease-spots must be removed by solvents or absorbents. If the spot be fresh, and the color of the fabric will not be changed by heat, the easiest method of removal is to place white blottingapees above and under the spot, and then to stand an iron on it—not hot enough to color the paper. Another effective measure is to cover the spot with pulverized French chalk dry, or with the same chalk or fuller's earth moistened in benzene, to remain twenty-four hours, and then be renewed if necessary, always brushing it off, nowever, with a soft brush. 
