## TROPICO TRUSTEES

### RESIDENTS OF PALMER AVENUE PROTEST CHANGING NAME OF THEIR STREET

The trustees of the city of Tropic met in regular session at the city hall of Tropic Tuesday evening at 7:30 with Trustees Peters, Henry, Veselich, Alspach and Seal present; also present were City Attorney Hartley Shaw, City Engineer Wattles, City Health Officer Mabry, City Marshal Gould, Fire Chief Fairfield, and after a two weeks' absence, City Clerk Margaret Coleman was at her desk as clerk to the board.

A communication was received from Arthur Campbell, superintendent of the Water company, in answer to a letter from the board in regard to placing a 4-inch water main in Victor court and La Brea court. Mr. Campbell informed the board that there was already a 4-inch pipe in these streets and suggested that the city move their fire hydrants from the 2-inch pipe in Los Angeles street to the larger pipes in these courts. Referred to the fire chief.

Mr. Retz in behalf of Mr. Baker addressed the board in regard to granting a permit to Mr. Baker to erect a fruit stand at Park and Brand boulevard. On account of the numerous refusals having been made in like cases it was thought advisable to defer the matter for the present.

Trustee Veselich reported that the meeting of the board of supervisors which was to have been held last Thursday for the purpose of disposing of the delinquent tax proposition was postponed one week and Trustee Veselich was retained on the committee to represent the board at that meeting.

The president of the board reported that he and the city engineer met the committee from the Los Angeles board of public works in regard to the drain under the S. P. tracks at the Brand boulevard crossing. Plans were discussed as to whose duty it was to remedy the matter and also as to the best method to adopt to take care of this surplus water. It was finally decided to let the matter rest until the Southern Pacific had moved the tower and then dispose of the matter in some way satisfactory to all.

The city engineer presented a map showing the four foot strip of land along Brand boulevard from Park St. to Magnolia Ave., which had been dedicated to the city by the property owners for street purposes. The same was accepted by the trustees for the city and a resolution was passed authorizing it to be placed on record.

The health officer reported that he had not completed his investigation of the Moore dairy on East 9th street and would not be ready to report on same until next meeting.

Several residents from Palmer avenue were present and urged that the city trustees restore the name of Palmer avenue to their street. Several of them took the floor and tried to show the trustees the injustice that has been done them in changing their street name without consulting the residents thereon. After the matter had been discussed both pro and con it was decided to lay the matter over one or two weeks and in the meantime both sections try to get together on some name that would be satisfactory to all.
