Veitchi, is a rich golden yellow, while the heart of the plant presents a bronzy-orange coloring, which is brightest in the centre, gradually diminishing toward the tips of the leaves. The longitudinal striping of the foliage shows much the same character as $P$. Veitt bi, being generally in alternate broader and narrower stripes of gold and green, while in some leaves one half is green and the other half gold. A strong feature in favor of the new variety is that the variegations in the foliage become stronger and more pronounced as they grow older, while in $P$. Veitchi the older leaves usually lose the variegations entirely.

The plant was discovered by a collector in one of the South Pacific Islands, where he had been sent by Messrs. Sander \& Co., of England, for the purpose of collecting rare Orchids and other tropical plants, and who, with considerable difficulty, succeeded in sending the plant to England, where it was carefully nursed and propagated until the spring of 1901, when we succeeded in buying the entire stock, which then consisted of nearly one thousand plants, at a price far in excess of any ever before paid for a decorative plant of any kind.
