

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DAILY PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

THIRTY-NINTH SESSION.

FIRST DAY.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Wednesday, Sept. 5th, 1894.

The Detroit Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church met in the Central M. E. Church, Sault Ste. Marie, Wednesday, Sept. 5th, at 8:30 A. M., Bishop John M. Walden presiding.

The Bishop read for scripture lessons, Malachi, chap. III, and I Thess., chap. III. Hymn 160 was announced and sung: "When all Thy mercies, O, my God." Preliminary to the administration of the sacrament of the Lord's Supper, the Bishop discoursed effectively upon some of the significant truths embodied in that ordinance. The pastor of the church and the Presiding Elders of the Conference assisted the Bishop in the consecration and distribution of the elements, three hundred and thirty persons partaking. With prayer by the Bishop there closed an unusually devotional and inspiring communion service.

The following resolution was introduced by O. J. Perrin, and was unanimously passed:

WHEREAS, Rev. Wm. Dawe, D. D., has declined re-election to the office of Secretary of the Conference, which position he has ably filled for four years; and

WHEREAS, His official duties have been executed with marked accuracy and promptness; and

Whereas, He has been very useful to this session by securing very cheap excursion rates to the seat of the Conference, thus saving hundreds of dollars to its members; therefore

Resolved, That a rising vote of thanks be tendered to our esteemed brother for the valuable services rendered to this Conference.

The Secretary nominated Arthur W. Stalker for assistant, Carlos L. Adams for Financial Secretary, Samuel M. Gilchriese for Secretary of Examinations and D. Burnham Tracy for Railroad Secretary and the nominations were confirmed.

Frank L. Osborne was elected Treasurer and nominated Edgar L. Moon and Wm. G. Nixon for assistants. They were confirmed.

Charles B. Case was elected Statistical Secretary. He nominated and the Conference confirmed John L. Newkirk as assistant.

The rules of order of the last session were adopted after Rule 2 was amended so as to read:—"The President shall take the chair precisely at the time to which the Conference stood adjourned. The first half hour of the session shall be devoted to religious services and thereafter the journals of the preceding day shall be read and approved."

The bar of the Conference was fixed so as to include the first eight rows of pews.

It was ordered that the names of the supernumerary and the superannuated preachers, also of all applicants for admission to the Conference and for admission on trial be referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

L. S. Tedman moved that the "New York East" plan as modified by this Conference last year be put into effect. An amendment declaring that in this assessment salaries shall not include house rent was carried. The plan was then adopted with amended modifications as follows:

1st. That instead of the per capita tax of five dollars as originally proposed, we substitute an amendment of one-half of one per cent. on

all salaries, not including house rent, received by members of this Conference.

2nd. That all money received from collections and from the assessment on preachers' salaries, aforesaid, be distributed annually among claimants.

By motion, the Board of Conference Stewards was authorized to nominate a treasurer to collect these assessments. A. F. Bourns was nominated and elected.

The time of the session was extended.

The Conference was notified that there is still an indebtedness against it for the publication of the minutes of 1889. To consider and to arrange for the amount of the deficiency was made the special order of the day for Thursday, 10 A. M.

W. C. Hicks was elected Conference Post-master.

Notices were given, the doxology sung, and the benediction pronounced by Bishop Walden.

SECOND DAY.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Thursday, Sept. 6th, 1894.

The Conference met at 8:30 A. M., Bishop Walden in the chair. After the half-hour's religious service conducted by Seth Reed, the minutes of Wednesday's session were read and approved.

The Statistical Secretary and the Conference Treasurer respectively read the names of all charges from which reports had not been received.

The Statistical Secretary and Treasurer were appointed a committee to present some plan to insure the prompt delivery to them of the statistical reports and collections of the charges.

Herman C. Scripps was introduced to the Conference, and his transfer by Bishop H. W. Warren from the New England Southern Conference was announced.

C. B. Steele was appointed in place of S. Plantz on the committee to examine candidates for Local Elders' orders.

The consideration of the proposition for constitutional changes was made the order of the day for Friday, 10 A. M.

By vote the order of the day was taken up, viz: to provide for the deficiency incurred in the publication of the minutes of 1889.

F. A. Smart, J. F. H. Harrison and J. J. Smith were constituted a committee to collect the unpaid subscriptions for minutes of last year, and apply the same in payment of said deficiency.

Moved and carried that the amounts apportioned to this Conference by our benevolent societies and for General Conference expenses and for the Episcopal Fund be apportioned to the several districts by the presiding elders.

The Bishop reported the amount of the apportionment for General Conference expenses to be \$2,805, and for the Episcopal Fund \$2,805.

The Bishop stated that the dividend to which this Conference is entitled from the Chartered Fund is \$25.00, and from the Book Concern, \$2,212.00. Drafts for these amounts were ordered, and placed in the hands of Franklin Bradley, Chairman of the Board of Conference Stewards.

Communications relating to the Chartered Fund and to the Veteran Ministers' Relief Association were referred to the Board of Conference Stewards, to consider fully and report.

It was moved that the names of those paying the ½ of 1% assessment, and the amounts paid, be published in the minutes apart from other statistics. Carried.

J. E. Jacklin, associate editor of the *Michigan Christian Advocate*, reported that notwithstanding the stress of the times, the *Advocate* had had a prosperous year and its subscription list in the two Conferences of this State had been increased 653 names. He presented the Conference with a check from the Methodist Publishing Co. for \$1,856.01 for the Conference claimants. The Conference welcomed the report and extended thanks to the company for the dividend.

The Conference also expressed its appreciation of the dividends from the Chartered Fund and Book Concern.

A recess was ordered for the purpose of holding the annual meeting of the Corporate Conference.

DETROIT CORPORATE CONFERENCE.

C. T. Allen was elected to preside, in the absence of President L. R. Fiske.

Seth Reed, the Secretary, submitted the annual report of the Board of Trustees.

The Trustees of the Detroit Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church beg leave to submit their annual report:

At their annual meeting held in Detroit, Aug. 27, 1894, the Treasurer, John McEldowney, submitted his report and financial statement, which, together with securities and vouchers were referred to the Finance Committee for examination. They reported them correct. The statement shows the value of the Winter's Fund at date to be in deeds, mortgages, notes, certificates of deposit and cash, \$16,345.42. The extreme financial depression has reduced the payment of interest on loans somewhat, yet the Trustees are happy to be able to recommend that \$1,000 from the interest account be turned over to the interest account of the Superannuated Preachers' Aid Society, to be disbursed by them according to their rules.

During the year the remaining 80 acres of the J. B. Russell farm in Sanillac County have been sold.

The Board recommended that the accumulated interest of \$20.40 on the Osborn gift be paid to the Epworth Church, Saginaw.

The Board also requested their Treasurer to see that the accumulated interest on the G. W. Lowe bequest be paid over to the two most necessitous cases, according to the terms of the will. In addition to the assets of the Winter's Fund, the other items of property held by the Conference, to wit: The Geo. O. Robinson parsonage in Roscommon, the Thos. Wakelin house in Mt. Morris, and the cemetery lot in Flint remain essentially as last year.

The term of office of Samuel Clements, Seth Reed and J. E. Jacklin expires, and the Board respectfully nominate them for re-election.

The report was accepted and adopted and the Conference ordered the Secretary to cast the ballot of the Conference for Samuel Clements, Seth Reed and J. E. Jacklin for Trustees, as nominated in the report.

The Secretary reported the ballot as cast, and the Corporate Council adjourned.

Bishop Walden resumed the chair and introduced Rev. J. G. Haller of the Evangelical Association.

13th Question of the Discipline was taken up.

The characters of William Dawe, the Presiding Elder of Saginaw District, and I. E. Springer, Presiding Elder of Port Huron District, were passed and they reported their districts.

J. D. Hearne, of Covington, Ky., and W. L. Holmes, of Detroit, Methodist laymen, were introduced.

The characters of J. E. Whalen, Presiding Elder of Lake Superior District, A. J. Bigelow, Presiding Elder of Flint District, and C. T. Allen, Presiding Elder of Detroit District, were passed and they reported their respective districts.

Paul Desjardins was appointed to secure subscribers for *The Gospel in All Lands*, and H. Cansfield to secure subscribers for *The Methodist Review*.

The Secretary was instructed to telegraph Dr. L. R. Fiske expressing the sympathy of the Conference with him in his illness.

A communication from the Michigan Conference of the

Methodist Protestant Church, relative to the co-operation of the churches in temperance work, was received and referred to the Committee on Temperance.

O. J. Perrin was appointed on the Committee on Sanctity of the Sabbath, in place of J. L. Hudson.

Notices were given, the doxology sung, and the benediction pronounced by Bishop J. M. Walden.

THIRD DAY.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Friday, Sept. 7th.

The Conference assembled at 8:30 A. M., Bishop Walden in the chair. After the half-hour's religious service, conducted by John McEldowney, the minutes of Thursday's session were read and approved.

A communication from the Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society was referred to the Committee on the work of that Society; one from the Boston University, to the Committee on Education.

Moved and carried that the several Committees on Examinations be a committee to present a better plan for conducting examinations

The following additional members reported themselves as present:

The character of Roland Woodhams, Presiding Elder of Bay City District, and of L. P. Davis, Presiding Elder of Adrian District, were passed and they reported their districts.

On motion, the order of the day was taken up, namely, the consideration of the propositions for the constitutional changes submitted to the Annual Conference of 1894.

Proposition 1. On Equal Ministerial and Lay Representation. Carried by a vote of 119 to 45.

Proposition II. On change in ratio of Ministerial Representation. (a), Carried by a vote of 167 to 1.

(b), The alternate proposition carried 163 to 1.

Proposition III. On change in the time of the meeting of the General Conference. Carried by a vote of 162 to 0.

A communication from the Baltimore and one from the Northern New York Conference concerning the submission to the annual Conferences of the proposition of the General Conference to change the second restrictive rule were respectfully received and action thereon deferred for one year.

C. H. Morgan moved that this Conference declares itself in favor of the principle of equal ministerial and lay representation.

A. R. Bartlett moved to amend by adding, "providing the size of the General Conference is not increased." Amendment lost.

The original motion was carried unanimously.

Dr. J. W. Hamilton, one of the Secretaries of the Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society, Dr. A. J. Mead, of the American Bible Society and C. E. Manning, pastor of the Methodist Church of Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., were introduced.

F. A. Smart reported that the committee appointed to collect unpaid subscriptions for last year's minutes had secured \$47.00, still leaving a deficiency of \$29.78. A collection was taken amounting to \$24.35. Balance of debt carried to expense account of this year, \$5.43.

Moved and carried that when the Conference adjourns, it adjourn to meet at 2:00 P. M. to hear the missionary sermon.

W. J. Campbell read the report of the Committee on Conference Claimants, stating that they had examined all claims

and submitted their recommendations to the Conference Stewards. It was accepted.

- J. S. Breckinridge, Superintendent of the Brooklyn Hospital, was introduced and addressed the Conference.
- A. J. Bigelow offered a resolution asking our release from pledge to endow a bed in Brooklyn Hospital and approving the action already taken by the presiding elders towards that that end.
- A. B. Storms presented a substitute providing for a continuance of the work of raising the endowment. Both resolutions were referred to the presiding elders and A. B. Storms, C. M. Cobern and A. F. Bourns, to report at this session of Conference. The Committee on Brooklyn Hospital for 1893 were added to this Committee.

The Secretaries and the Treasurer were made the Committee on publication of the minutes, and it was ordered that the printed minutes be the official journal of this Conference.

Seth Reed was appointed by the Bishop to preside at the afternoon session.

Notices were given, the Doxology sung and the Conference adjourned.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Conference met at 2:00 P. M., Seth Reed presiding. Devotional services were conducted by J. B. Goss.

The annual missionary sermon was preached by R. T. Savin, from Rom. I: 14-16. The subject was "The Three-fold Consciousness Necessary in Missionary Endeavor, of Obligation, of Readiness and of the Power of the Gospel." Adjourned.

FOURTH DAY.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Saturday, Sept. 8th, 1894.

The Conference met at 8:30 A. M., Bishop Walden in the chair. After the half-hour's religious service conducted by J.

B. Oliver, the minutes of Friday's session were read and approved.

Ordered, that when the Conference adjourns, it adjourn to meet at 2 P. M.

Dr. A. J. Mead was introduced and spoke of the work and claims of the American Bible Society.

John McEldowney, in behalf of the Board of Stewards, introduced the following resolution, which was adopted:

The Board of Stewards, as Committee, recommend that the Treasurer appointed to collect the one-half of one per cent. on preachers' salaries, be requested to procure an account book in which he shall enter the names of all the effective workers of the Conference, and charge them with the amount which should be paid by each. When paid, credit and report the same in the minutes of the Conference; when not paid that the amount shall stand as a claim against them with annual interest at 7 per cent. per annum until paid.

Dr. Homer Eaton, one of the agents of the New York Book Concern, was introduced.

10th Question of the Discipline was taken up—"What members have completed the Conference Course of Study?"

The following were called, their characters passed, they reported their collections and the number of probationers received, their examinations were reported and they were passed in the studies of the fourth year and elected to Elders' orders:

William F. Davis, already an Elder, was excused from examination in the studies of the fourth year and his passage of the examinations in the local preacher's course was accepted as satisfactory.

Menno B. Diehl was continued in the studies of the fourth year.

Ephraim Sedweek was, by request, to be left without an appointment to attend one of our schools.

7th Question of the Discipline was taken up—"Who have been admitted into full connection?"

The class was called forward and addressed by the Bishop and answered the disciplinary questions.

The characters of the following were passed, they reported their collections and work, their examinations were found satisfactory and they were admitted into full membership:

Dr. J. F. Goucher, of the Baltimore Conference, J. C. Carman, pastor of the Baptist Church in this city, Frederick Bagnall, pastor of the Congregational church, J. F. Crane, a Congregational pastor, were introduced.

The time of the session was extended.

Dr. J. W. Hamilton addressed the Conference in the interest of the Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society.

Dr. Homer Eaton addressed the Conference on the publishing interests of the church.

The consideration of the Episcopal residence fund was made the special order of the day at 2:30 p. m.

Seth Reed was appointed by the Bishop to preside at the opening of the afternoon session.

Notices were given, the benediction pronounced by Dr. Homer Eaton, and the Conference adjourned.

FOURTH DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Conference convened at 2 P. M., Seth Reed presiding. After religious services were conducted by C. E. Benson, Bishop Walden took the chair, and the minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

11th Question of the Discipline was taken up—"What others have been elected and ordained Deacons?"

Tom Thompson, a local preacher, recommended by the Metamora Quarterly Conference, was found to have passed a satisfactory examination and was elected to Deacons' orders.

L. P. Davis read the report of the Trustees of Albion College and it was referred to the Committee on Education.

By vote the order of the day was taken up and the following resolutions introduced:

Resolved, 1. That the Conference instructs the Presiding Elders to immediately notify the preachers of the amounts now due, with accrued and accruing interest from their charges to the Episcopal residence fund.

2. That the Presiding Elders are requested to see to it that every preacher shall present the matter to his people, and the preachers will be held responsible for making their best effort to raise one-half the amount required on or before the first of December, 1894, and one-half before the first of July, 1895; and that when the amount due from a charge is paid over the obligation of such charge to said fund shall be considered fully met.

W. L. Holmes, a member of the Episcopal Residence Committee, was invited to speak upon the subject. After a free and extended discussion by members of the Conference, the resolutions were passed.

The accounts of the Western Book Concern were turned over by the Bishop to C. E. Benson, of the Committee on Debts due the Concern.

certain paragraphs of it read and referred to the Committee on Periodicals.

Bishop Walden read from a letter received from Bishop Joyce news of very gracious results in the religious meetings held at the sessions of Conferences on the Pacific coast.

A. J. Bigelow pronounced the benediction and the Conference adjourned.

FIFTH DAY.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Sept. 9th, 1894.

The Conference love feast which began at 9 A. M. was in charge of A. R. Bartlett. At 10:30 A. M., to an audience equal to the capacity of the church, Bishop Walden preached from I Cor. 2:9-10, a sermon freighted with weighty thought and inspiring truths.

Resolved, That the public educational collections provided for in paragraph 4, of the chapter on education in our Book of Discipline—this does not refer to the "Children's Fund"—taken during the coming Conference year, be directed to be paid into the treasury of Albion College, to aid in the work of the institution.

Resolved, That we will put forth a special effort to make such col-

lections aggregate at least \$2,000. C. M. Cobern.

The following resolution was adopted:

We indorse the action of the Wesleyan Guild of Ann Arbor in attempting to provide a paid secretary of the Epworth League, who shall have for his work the furthering of the interests of Methodism and practical Christianity among the students of the University of Michigan, and we commend to the Methodists of the State the great importance of providing a permanent endowment for the support of such a Secretaryship.

We also emphatically concur in the former action of this Conference, by which it favored the erection of a Methodist Hall at Ann Arbor and the endowment of Lectureships on Christian Evidences and Church History. Since our former action on this subject in 1889, at least \$100,000 have been given by non-residents, and bequests to the the local church enterprises of other denominations in this city; it is time for the Methodist church, which has about 600 non-resident students in attendance at the Ann Arbor High School and State University to make provision in some generous way for the care of these young men.

We recommend Wm. H. Shier, D. D., and Rev. A. B. Storms, as members of the Advisory Council for the present year, and urge every minister and layman to heartily co-operate with these gentlemen and the local committee in carrying forward such plans as may be calculated to reach the most successful results.

- A. F. Bourns read the following report of the committee concerning churches embarrassed by debt, and it was adopted.

Your committee would recommend:

First—That in the case of the Ironwood church, the Conference adopt a plan which was suggested to the committee by the Presiding Elder of the district, J. E. Whalen, which consists of the issuing of a leaflet with Scripture reading, appropriate hymns, a brief, clear statement of the facts concerning the building of the church and its embarrassments; also a cut of the church edifice and the parsonage, and that a sufficient number of these leaflets be placed in the hands of every pastor in the Conference, with instructions that on the first Sabbath of November, 1894, a service shall be held and a collection taken for the relief of the Ironwood church.

And further, that the pastor of Ironwood, the Presiding Elder of the district and Captain Piper of Bessemer, be a committee to carry out the plan and disburse the money.

Secondly—That in the case of the Ishpeming church, the pastor be authorized to visit our charges, present the facts to our people and take collections for the relief of the church. Also that the pastor at Ishpeming, the Presiding Elder of the district and Captain S. Mitchell, of Negaunee, be a committee to receive and disburse the funds.

Thirdly—That in the case of the Tremont Avenue church, in view of the stringency of the times and in view of the fact that immediate relief does not seem so imperative, they recommend that action be delayed for one year. A. F. Bourns, Chairman.

A leave of absence was granted A. R. Bartlett.

The Conference unanimously requested that the General Committee of the Church Extension Society extend for another year the life of the grant of \$2,500, conditional donation to Epworth Church, Saginaw.

WHEREAS, The large Protestant churches of the United States and their adherents freely and cordially concede to, and are ready to vindicate in behalf of Roman Catholics their liberty of conscience and right to worship God according to their conviction and training, and

WHEREAS, This conceded liberty has received the approbation of the Head of the Roman Catholic church, which approval has been explicitly expressed by the Pope to his authorities and subordinates in the United States, and

WHEREAS, We are informed that Protestants and non-Catholics in the South American States of Peru, Bolivia, Ecquador, and perhaps other states, labor under grave disabilities as to the expression of their religious faiths, the exercise of their divine worship, and the enjoyment of certain civil liberties, as, for instance, the inability to be married legally unless they renounce their non-Roman Catholic faith; therefore,

Resolved, That we suggest to the head of the Roman Catholic church, that he so exert his influence and authority which are paramount in the countries named, that residents therein may be enabled to enjoy the same rights which are enjoyed by Roman Catholics in the United States.—(Signed) ARTHUR EDWARDS, M. C. HAWKS, E. W. RYAN.

Memoirs.

Rev. Daniel Cook Jacokes.

Daniel Cook Jacokes was born in Charlestown, N. Y., April 15, 1813. A few of his school years were spent in Geneva, now Hobart College, in Geneva, N. Y.

He was married in 1832, and while yet young he and his wife came to Michigan, spending one year in Detroit, where he was a member of the elder Dr. George Duffield's church.

He then moved to Lodi, Washtenaw county, where he spent two years with his father, who had located there. During this time he pursued his studies preparatory to entering the ministry. In early life his mother had consecrated him as, she did also his two brothers, to that calling, and it is a little remarkable that the three sons carried out their mother's wishes.

It was expected that Daniel would enter the ministry of the Presbyterian church, but he announced his change of views in regard to Bible doctrines, and changed his denominational relations.

In the fall of 1840 he offered himself to and was admitted on trial in the Michigan Conference of the Methodist Episcopal church. His ministerial appointments were Farmington Circuit, Lake Superior Indian Mission, Grass Lake, Girard, Northville, Mt. Clemens, Port Huron, Pontiac, Trenton, Lafayette St. (Detroit), Chaplain to the Fifth Michigan Infantry, Dexter, Pontiac, Adrian District as Presiding Elder, Hudson, and Chaplain of the Eastern Michigan Asylum at Pontiac. This last position he held from 1878 till 1892, when failing health led him to resign the position and also to ask of the Conference a superannuated relation.

Bro. Jacokes was no ordinary man. The majestic form in which his spirit dwelt drew marked attention wherever he went. With head erect, with forehead broad and surmounted by a luxuriance of jet black hair, with eyes keen and piercing, with face in every line and contour expressive of the strong character behind it; he moved among men with the ease and bearing of a born commander. Few men have possessed a physical constitution equal to his. During his long life he was scarcely ever laid aside from his activities by sickness, and he often spent twenty of the twenty-four hours in work and study.

His intellect was characterized by strength and quickness of perception. If there was any lack of equilibrium in his mental powers, it was in the excess of his imagination over the reasoning faculty. His native endowments were large and varied. He was shut up to no one department of study, but the doors of the kingdom of knowledge were open to him in many directions, and he heard voices within inviting him to enter and revel in her hospitalities. Had he selected some one department of the great empire of truth and committed his strength to it, he doubtless would have been counted among the world's leaders in that department. He delighted in scientific pursuits. Astronomy was his favorite study. In this field he was an enthusiast. Many a midnight hour did he spend in his observatory. which he constructed at a large expense and which he transported from place to place as his ministerial appointments were changed. He equipped it with a very fine equatorial refracting telescope. For many years of his life he was more familiar with the stars and the nebulæ than with the faces of men. Under the influence of his enthusiasm in this department of science, many a youth was encouraged in high resolves which led to success in life, among whom was the late eminent astronomer, Dr. Watson, of the Michigan University, also the late Dr. Walker, of Chicago. Bro. Jacokes said to the writer of this sketch: "I love the telescope which carries me over such vast fields of God's universe, but when I want to contemplate God's greatness, I study his works through the microscope." Bro. Jacokes possessed mechanical genius in an unusual degree, and would easily have been an expert worker in wood, brass and iron. His study, which contained from four to five thousand volumes, many of which were of great value, contained also his tools and turning lathe, and there he made his telescopes and microscopes and musical instruments.

He was an extensive and a comprehensive reader, grasping the meaning and scope of an author with remarkable facility. The fields in which he spent most of his reading were "Metaphysics Moral Philosophy and Ecclesiastical History." He had carefully studied the different system of religions in the world and compared their influence and teaching with that of Christianity, and thus furnished he was an able defender of the faith. He gave much study to the languages, especially those more immediately connected with scripture history, and was more or less familiar with the Latin, Greek, Hebrew and Arabic, and also with the German and French.

In the wonderfully instructive and rapidly widening field of Bible Archæology, Bro. Jacokes had few equals. He read thoroughly the doings and reports of the various exploration parties and obtained possession of a vast number of maps and photographs of their discoveries from the old world. His lectures on archæology were full of instructive illustrations as they were by maps and charts of recent discovery.

As a preacher he was instructive, drawing largely upon his accumulated resources for illustrations of the truth. His profound belief in the scripture doctrines, his masterly use of the English language, his vast sweep of imagination enabled him at times, especially under the excitement of a great occasion, to reach heights of Christian thought unknown to many minds. There are old people today who speak with lively interest of sermons they heard him preach more than fifty years ago.

His vast and varied reading, his retentive and well stored memory, his intense love of knowledge and pleasure in imparting it, together with his genial spirit, made him a delightful conversationalist. The children gathered around him wherever he went and the young people called him their friend and instructor.

Bro. Jacokes' abilities were recognized beyond the bounds of his pastoral charges or of his Conference or State. In about the year 1853, the Weslyan University, of Delaware, Ohio, conferred on him the degree of Master of Arts, and afterwards the degree of Doctor of Philosophy. At the time of the revision of the State Constitution by which the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage was prohibited, he took a prominent part and was a very able advocate of the cause of temperance. At that time the Sons of Temperance was a very powerful organization in the United States and he was their Grand Worthy Patriarch. At the American Centennial Exposition, in Philadelphia, in 1876, Governor Bagley appointed him Commissioner of the Educational Exhibit for the State of Michigan. Here his genius rendered most valuable service. He organized a scheme for an educational exhibit which at once met the approval of and was adopted by the National Board of Education and copies of it were sent to each state and to foreign nations. The educators of other nations studied his plan with admiration and copied it for their use in their own countries.

In 1877 he was appointed by the governor a member of the State Board of Health, a position which he held for nine years; and also agent of the State Board of Corrections and Charities for Oakland County. In 1882 he became a member of the American Public Health Association, a scientific society of very high character.

Bro. Jacokes' mental activities continued to the closing year of his life, and his sympathies in every good cause waned not with his increasing years. As the world receded from his view, his heart seemed to grow and glow in the light of the unseen world, and he seemed to rest and revel in the very inner meanings of the gospel he had believed and preached. He died of paralysis, in Pontiac, January 11, 1894.

His widow, the wife of his young manhood, and his only son, Judge James A. Jacokes, remain to cherish his memory.

A great concourse of Christian mourners gathered at his funeral, among whom was a large number of his brethren in the ministry, whose hands bore him out of the house of worship and laid him in his last resting place.

Rev. Andrew Bell.

Andrew Bell was born in Warwick, Orange county, N. Y., Sept. 7, 1818. Previous to 1840-42, he had been in business and was a member of the Dutch Reformed church; but while boarding in New York city with a Methodist family he began occasionally to attend the Methodist church, and soon after, having moved to Adrian, he was led to conversion, under the preaching of Rev. John P. Baughman. Almost immediately Bro. Bell felt the call to preach the gospel, but being of a modest disposition, it was not until after much prayer, and until the church had joined its call to that of the Spirit, that he cut loose from his business obligations and began to study for his high vocation This he did in 1842.

In 1844 he was married to Miss Susan Thompson, of New York city. In the year following (1845) he was admitted to the Michigan Conference, and appointed to White Lake circuit, living at Fentonville, now Fenton. He remained there two years. In 1847 he was received in full connection, and appointed to Genesee. In 1848 his appointment was Saginaw, the people being, as he afterwards said, the most liberal and the most wicked that he had ever met. In 1850 he was sent to Clarkson, and in 1852 to Byron, where he held two long protracted meetings, and because of his ceaseless labors without sufficient rest, he broke down in health. The next year (1853) the Presiding Elder, desiring to give him "easy work," sent him to Ann Arbor (Lower Town), where he preached once a Sunday, and also at Dixboro and Lodi. Much good was done during his few months' ministry upon this circuit. It has only recently come to our knowledge that various young men who at that time came under his influence such as the present President of Fisk University-date back their active Christian life to that year's work. He broke completely down before the next conference, and his entire ministry seems but short. For a long time after his physical collapse he cherished the hope that he would yet be able to once more enter the efficient ranks; but all such hopes proved groundless. Chronic bronchitis and a severe form of asthma had taken such hold on him that no medical treatment could bring him cure. For two score years this good man has been a superannuate -voluntarily relinquishing his claim upon the Conference funds until our new rule of distribution brought him some much needed help last year. For ten years he was a great sufferer. He lay for years, a spectacle to men and angels of the power of grace to sustain the afflicted saint. In the early morning of August 21, he stepped out from the dim sick-room into the glad light of his new home, the house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens.

Physically, Bro. Bell, though small and diseased, yet for forty years refused to be conquered by the most terrible attacks of the great adversary. Mentally, his was a peculiarly strong and fine organization. His words were chosen, even in common conversatian, as carefully as those of a professor before his class. He could not speak other than accurately and with close discrimination. He was a strong man intellectually, and his judgment was clear and his faculties to be depended on, even to the last moment of his life. His great fear during the past few months was lest he should lose his consciousness, or at least lose clearness of perception in his last hours. While this fear was justified by certain symptoms, he was able to go hence marking intelligently each step of the journey.

He longed to leave this world, not chiefly because of his sufferings, but because of his intense eagerness to pierce the veil which separated him from the unseen. He expressed himself, months ago, as anxious not to miss any of the new experiences in that supreme change between the earthly and the larger life. He was quiet and undemonstrative, yet all who entered his sick-room were impressed with the depth and steadiness of his faith. Almost the last words which the suffering lips uttered were these: "Praise the Lord! The Lord is good; He is good." Even then was this dying saint enduring "as seeing Him who is invisible;" but now hath he seen face to face the King in his beauty.

Rev. Harvey Hodskiss.

Rev. Harvey Hodskiss was born in Prattstown, Steuben county, N. Y., Feb. 12, 1818, and died in the town of Locke, Mich., Jan. 12, 1894.

He was of Puritan ancestry, and his grandfather was a defender of liberty in the Revolutionary war.

When quite young he moved with his parents to Orleans county, N. Y., and when ten years old to Chautauqua county, and there grew to manhood.

Bro. Hodskiss learned the trade of a cooper, which he followed for a number years. This, with his early rural life, was not advantageous in laying the foundation so requisite in the educational world, but his love for learning and intense ambition led him on, and by diligent application he received a liberal education, which made him acceptable as an ambassador of Jesus Christ.

April 9, 1837, he was married to Miss Desire Hill. Four of their five children were early called to enjoy the heavenly home. Louisa, the one spared, wife of Leander Wright, lives near her mother's home.

Bro. Hodskiss joined the Methodist Episcopal church when 18, and began to exhort and preach when 23. Being an ardent antislavery man, he joined the Wesleyans and aided them in organizing that church.

In 1855 he and his family moved to Michigan, and settled in Locke. For nearly four years he was Chaplain of the State Prison at Jackson, but resigned in 1868 to join the Detroit Conference of the Methodist Episcopal church. This he did as an Elder from the Wesleyan Methodist church, and was stationed at Francisville and Leoni one year, 1868; Fowlerville, 1869; Hamburg, 1870; Perry, 1871–2 and 3; Owosso, 1874; Hartland 1875 and 6; Leroy, 1877 and 8; Webberville, 1879. It was his intention in 1880 to take a supernumerary relation, but was simply left without an appointment.

In 1881 he was placed upon the supernumerary list, where he remained ten years. In 1892 he was numbered with the superannuates, where he remained till 1894, when he was called up higher.

Advancing years and the continued illness of his wife compelled him to discontinue the active work of an itinerant, and he settled on his farm, where he was able to support himself without aid from the superannuate fund.

His countenance indicated candor and sincerity, his life righteousness from principle, which commanded the respect and confidence of those who knew him.

His sermons contained a blending of the intellectual with the affectional, that made the Christian feel profited under his ministrations.

He was fervent, fluent and powerful in prayer.

One could but realize that he was a man of strong convictions, and had the courage to proclaim what he believed to be the truth. This was seen pre-eminently in his address on temperance. In this field he proved himself a worthy workman.

As a superannuated brother he was useful and acceptable in work with his brother ministers.

It is home life that tests our virtues. Tried by this rule we may say, "Behold an Israelite,"

His death was quite unexpected, but a slight stroke of paralysis was soon followed by heart failure, and he entered into the land of rest.

The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. T. Barbour McGee, assisted by Revs. John C. Martin of the Wesleyan Church, A. Cuthburt of the Free Methodist and Alfred Allen of Detroit Conference. A brother pastor pronounced the highest of eulogies, when he said, "He was a man full of faith and of the Holy Ghost."

Rev. Wm. Birdsall.

Rev. Wm. Birdsall died at Flint, Jan. 3, 1894. His funeral was held from Garland St. church the following Friday. He was born at Lake Pleasant, N. Y., July 3, 1816, being the eldest of ta family of ten children. He enjoyed no school privileges. His place of study was chiefly the shoe bench and at his own fireside with his family. His parents were Methodists and their influence over him was hallowed. He was converted at the age of fifteen and united with the M. E. church. He felt a call to preach, but thought himself not qualified. An exhorter's license was fairly thrust upon him, and also that of local preacher. In 1857, at the age of thirty-nine, he was recommended by the Fentonville Quarterly Conference for admission into the Detroit Annual Conference.

His first charge was Oak Grove, and he enjoyed a good year. His other appointments were: Byron, two years; Brighton, one year; South Lyon, two years; Tuscola, one year; South Flint, three years; Mt. Morris, three years; Clio, two years; Chesterfield, one year; Goodrich, two years; Gaines, three years, Parshallville, one year; Oak Grove, two years; Otisville, two years; Woodhull, two years.

In 1883, on account of infirm health, he was admitted into the superannuated ranks, which relation he has retained, although acting as supply with much acceptability, when his health permitted.

Bro. Birdsall was married in 1833 to Miss Polly Lobdell, who proved to be a worthy companion and faithful wife. Seven children were born to them, four of whom God hath taken to Himself, and the others are members of the church.

Bro. Birdsall was a true man, a loyal and faithful minister, and his record is on high.

Rev. C. W. Pilcher, D. D.

Born at Jackson, Mich., August 2, 1848; accustomed to the vicissitudes of a Methodist itinerant's home—for he was son of Elijah H. Pilcher, D. D.; graduated at the age of 19 from the Ohio Wesleyan University; principal of High School at Pontiac, Mich., for one year; superintendent of public schools in same city for one year; appointed Missionary to China in 1870; returned to United States in 1874; graduated from Boston Theological School in 1876; during the same year married Miss Mary Garwood, of Monroe, Mich., and immediately after sailed again to China; fulfilled the various duties incumbent upon a missionary until his death, Nov. 24, 1893; such, in brief, is the life of our departed Leander W. Pilcher.

The church press naturally have most to say of the signal ability with which he administered as president of the Peking University;

but his fellow-laborers, while detracting not the slightest from his well-earned fame as an educator, will speak also of the same ability and faithfulness in a number of equally laborious but less honored offices. The press of China and of United States have been generous in their editorial expressions of sorrow and respect.

To the members of the Detroit Conference he was, by reason of his continued absence, very largely a stranger. Let the writer, in the name of his fellow-workers on the mission field but say this one word: We are proud of his success and realize the greatness of the loss which the church has sustained; but we sorrow more because we loved him. He never lost his child's heart. His was a rarely loving and lovable nature, and all the wealth of his affectionate soul was poured out upon his companions in missionary life. The work will go on. God has other workmen. But those who knew this man in the intimacies of Christian friendship, will be hungry-hearted until they see him again in the better country.

Mrs. Pilcher, with the three-years-old Raymond, and the two daughters, Helen and Leonora, has made her home in Albion, Mich. For Leander's sake, let them never want for prayer, sympathy or efficient aid from an appreciative and grateful church.

Rev. William M. Pampbell, M. D.

Dr. Campbell was born in New Brunswick, Sept. 2, 1823. He was converted at the age of fifteen, and began to preach as a local preacher when sixteen, and took active work when seventeen. For thirteen years he continued to preach. He located then and practiced medicine for eight years. Then again he took up the active work of the ministry in the Congregational church, where he preached for nine years—five at Keeler, two at Cooper, one at Webster, one at Vernon. Once more he discontinued the work of the ministry, and returned to the practice of medicine for three years at Vernon. Re-entering the pastorate, he joined the Detroit Conference, taking the following appointments: Hartland, one year; Davison Station, one year; Perry, one year; Memphis, one year; North Branch, two years; Cheboygan, two years; Ridgeway, one year; Napoleon, one year; Dexter, one year; Chelsea. Then, on account of health, he superannuated, and located in Ann Arbor for awhile, and from thence he came to Plainwell, where he made his home until his death.

He was married to Miss Alvira Aldrich, in Canada, in the year 1846. Two children were born to them, a son and daughter; both are now living. His wife died in 1885. He was again married in 1887, to Mrs. Bovee, of Kalamazoo, who survives him.

The latter part of June he had gone to Bay View on business, and had returned home to make preparation to go there to spend the summer. They had made all preparation, and expected to take the early train for Bay View, when he was taken suddenly ill. He remained so for some time. A part of the time his recovery was doubtful, but he finally rallied so that he felt strong enough to go on his vacation. He went to Bay View, but after a few days the disease returned, and he lasted only a few hours. His body was brought to Plainwell, and he was buried from his old home, being laid by the side of his first wife in the beautiful cemetery in Cooper. The funeral services were conducted by his pastor, Rev. W. J. Hathaway, assisted by the Revs. Rossiter and Osinga, of the Presbyterian church.

Bro. Campbell was a good man, beloved by the church, and will be greatly missed. He was faithful to the church, loyal to the pastor, and ready ever when possible to give assistance in the work of the church.

Rev. James W. Kennedy.

The death of Rev. James W. Kennedy, pastor of the Haven M. E. Church, Detroit, occurred Feb. 14, 1894. Bro. Kennedy had been confined to his bed about six weeks. Though having the appearance of health, he had not been really well for a long time. He was first attacked with peritonitis. Later other serious trouble with the internal organs developed, requiring a surgical operation. Improvement followed, with good prospect of complete restoration, but a second operation was found necessary, which gave small hope of recovery, and from which he gradually sank until he passed away. Bro. Kennedy suffered great pain during his illness, but bore it all with wonderful patience and cheerfulness.

His death, in early manhood, is a profound loss. He was a preacher of genuine worth and large promise. Modest and unassuming, sweet spirited and tender hearted, sincere and devout, a manly man and a true Christian gentleman, he was at the same time a man of marked personality, and breadth and depth of character, a close student and a profound and independent thinker. His brief service of ten years in the ministry was marked by steady, solid growth. Those who knew him best had a high appreciation of his worth, and predicted for him a place in the front rank in his conference.

James Worthington Kennedy was born in Moorfield, Ohio, April 24, 1854. He received an early moral training, and joined the Presbyterian church; after some years, having serious doubts as to his fitness for such a relation, sought a definite religious experience, and received clear evidence of his acceptance with God. At sixteen he began teaching, and continued in that work for twelve years, studying law at spare time, and then going to college. He had fitted himself for the practice of law, and was ready to be admitted to the bar,

when his new religious experience changed the course of his life and directed him to the Christian ministry. Following his conscientious convictions, he joined the M. E. church in Ohio, left his native state and came to Michigan, in 1883. He was received on trial and appointed to Davison. In 1885 he was admitted into full connection and ordained deacon. In 1889 he was ordained elder by Bishop Foss. When he went to Davison, was wholly without experience in the ministry, having but two sermons at this time; but he had a definite religious experience, a clear perception of divine truth, and a vigorous mental grip, and he did strong, successful work from the start. He served the full limit of the pastorate, three years, the people wished that the time could have been extended. His next appointment was Perry, which then included Morrice. During his term here was built the neat and convenient church at Morrice. He served three years at Perry, leaving amid the general regret of the people. His third appointment was Fenton, where he also served three years, and then came to Haven church, Detroit, in the fall of 1892. He had the universal love of his church and the esteem of all. The Haven people followed him to his grave with tearful affection and keenly feel their loss.

Bro. Kennedy was married to Miss Agnes A. Simmons, in Deersville, Ohio, Nov. 2, 1876, who, with two children, Mary Simmons, aged sixteen, and Horace Winfield, aged thirteen, now mourn the loss of a loving husband and kind father.

Bro. Kennedy took post-graduate studies and graduated from Scio college, Ohio, in 1891. He possessed scholarly tastes, and was progressive, wideawake and original. He was particularly interested in work for children. It was his habit to preach a little sermon to them before the morning service. He organized a boys' reading club of fifty members in the Haven church, and was an enthusiastic Epworth leaguer.

At the funeral the church was crowded. The services were in charge of Rev. C. T. Allen, D. D., Presiding Elder. Rev. Seth Reed, Bro. Kennedy's first Presiding Elder, paid a feeling and worthy tribute to his memory, speaking appreciative words of his character and work. Revs. S. Plantz and R. T. Savin also made appropriate addresses. The remains were then borne to Woodmere cemetery and laid to rest.

Mrs. S. P. Warner.

Mrs. S. P. Warner was born in New Hampshire in 1835, and died at her home in Wayne, Mich., Oct. 25, 1893.

She was converted at the age of 15 and joined the M. E. church. When she came to Michigan in 1862, she united with the church at

Wayne, where she remained a faithful and devoted member until her decease. For eight years she held the office of steward, and was the treasurer of the Board of Stewards. For many years she was the wife of Dr. Converse, but was left a widow by his death ten years ago. Two years ago last March she was married to the Rev. S. P. Warner, of the Detroit Conference. During life she was much beloved and died after a brief sickness, deeply mourned by the church and friends. Being fully ready, she met her death with marked fortitude. A few days before her decease, feeling conscious that the end was near, she said to her husband that "it was always her greatest joy to see souls converted and the church prosperous," and this feeling caused her to desire to live on and work in the church.

The deceased leaves a husband, a daughter, Mrs. Eaton, of Ypsilanti, a sister, Mrs. O. N. Baker, of Wayne, a brother, Mr. A. Hubbard, of Lake Pleasant, Ind. The funeral was held at the home. Presiding Elder Allen conducted the services, assisted by the pastor.

Mrs. Sophia Shank.

Mrs. Sophia Shank, wife of Rev. Joseph Shank, was born in Coblerkill, N. Y., Dec. 3, 1820, and died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. P. Paddock, in Coral, Mich., Feb. 28, 1894.

After a brief illness of heart disease she passed away peacefully, having finished her work. She was an earnest Christian, a kind, devoted mother and a helpful wife, a neighbor of the good Samaritan type, always forgetful of self in her devotion to others. In 1842 she she was married to Rev. Joseph Shank, and with him served twenty-five years in the active work connected with his ministry in the M. E. church. Bro. Shank died in 1868 and was buried at Fenton, Mich. She leaves three children, a son and two daughters, to mourn the loss of a fond, affectionate mother. The children mourn, the church may mourn, but who shall tell the joys of the meeting and greeting on the bright eternal shore, of companions so long separated. So the fathers and mothers of our Israel are gathering home.

Mrs. Addie L. Walker.

Mrs. Addie L. Walker was born March 25, 1859, at Otsego, N.Y., and passed to rest Jan. 26, 1894.

She came to Michigan with her parents in 1864, and settled at North Branch.

At the age of fifteen, under the labors of Rev. L. L. Houghton, she was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal church. She became a working Christian, and one who knew her well, said that "she lived a faithful, earnest and blameless life."

On the 22nd day of May, 1889, she was united in marriage to the Rev. J. L. Walker, of the Detroit Conference. She proved herself worthy of the new surroundings in which she was placed, assisting her husband in giving Bible readings and in teaching the Word of God to build up the cause of the Redeemer.

Over a year previous to her death it was seen that she needed the best medical skill, which was sought first in Detroit, then in Ann Arbor. She was called up higher after a lingering illness, of constantly increasing helplessness, endured without complaint.

Our sister had written home a few hours before she died, expecting to be with them in a few days, but a messenger from the celestial world called for her.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Frederick Coates, a large congregation of sympathizing friends being in attendance.

She leaves her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lake, a brother and sister, who, with her husband and his two sons and two daughters, mourn her departure.

Harrist Rowley Benton.

Harriet Rowley Benton, daughter of Levi and Alma Rowley, was born August 4, 1840, in Ingham county, Mich. Her early education was received in the district school.

She was converted at a revival meeting in the winter of '59 and '60, conducted by Rev. Elisha Wright. The Christian life then begun she continued to the end with increasing devotion and usefulness.

Her religion led her to live a quiet life, with an evenness of temper and cheerfulness of spirit. This made her a friend greatly appreciated.

In June, 1861, on the 23d day of the month, she was married to Rev. Wm. H. Benton. Bro. Benton began the duties of the traveling ministry in the fall of the same year, and for thirty-three years she was an itinerant minister's wife, performing the labors, enduring the hardships and sharing in the joy of an itinerant life.

At the end of these thirty-three years many arise to call her blessed, and many, many more were blessed in their day, who, like her, now rest from their labors.

The following beautiful tribute to her character is given by a friend:

"She was a beautiful Christian woman; her life was devoted to doing good to others, always lending a helping hand wherever needed;

especially was she noted for her kindness among the sick, even caring for them when she was hardly able.

"In the eighteen months she lived among us she gained friends innumerable and made no enemies. Her home life was perfect. She was a devoted wife; always gentle, pleasant, with a cordial greeting for all. She was a regular attendant upon the means of grace, never missing a prayer or class meeting when her strength permitted her to be present."

On the 17th of Feb., 1894, the Master said, "It is enough, come up higher." She realized that death was near and talked about it to her husband with composure and confidence. Her funeral services were attended by the Rev. C. T. Allen, D. D., the Presiding Elder of the district, and other clergy and friends. These services were held in the parsonage at Salem, after which her husband and son carried her body to Locke, Ingham county, and laid it down in its last sleep beside her little babe, where together they await the resurrection of the dead.

Mrs. Sarah Phillips Anderson.

Sarah Phillips, wife of Rev. C. M. Anderson, was born in Albany, N. Y., Aug. 6, 1817, and died in Hadley, Mich., at the home of W. H. Johnson, her son-in-law, Jan. 10, 1894. She was converted at the age of 14 years and at once joined the M. E. church and remained a member until her death. She was married to Bro. Anderson March 30, 1848, and for 46 years they shared the joys and sorrows of life together, forty-four years of this time were spent in the itinerancy. She was a true helper in the work of God. Her piety was shown by an even temperature and holy zeal. During her last sickness of over fifteen months, while her body wasted to a mere skeleton, she bore her prolonged suffering calmly and patiently, feeling that the gospel "hope was an anchor to the soul sure and steadfast."

She was a sister to Revs. Zebulon and Jonas Phillips, deceased ministers of Troy Conference. The former was at one time assistant book agent at New York when the firm name was "Carlton & Phillips."

She was the mother of four children, one dying in infancy. Three are now living.

Mrs. Emma Diehl.

Mrs. Emma Diehl was born in Attica, Lapeer Co., Mich., May 7, 1869, and passed to her reward in Gainsville, Florida, Dec., 24, 1893. She was married to Rev. Menno B. Diehl, Jan. 27, 1886, and was a

constant sharer in the anxieties, trials and labors of her husband. She was converted in early life and became at once passionately devoted to the cause of the Master. As a Sunday School teacher she was remarkably successful. Her intense desire for personal purity, her perfect devotion to duty, her spirit of self-forgetfulness, her absolute trust in the promises of the Word, were an inspiration to the children. They became as much attached to her as she was devoted to them. While at Port Hope she organized the little people into a mission band which was very helpful to the church. She attended the class-meeting whenever possible. She believed in prayer. Not only did she pray in her devotions morning and night, but she took everything to God in prayer. It is not known that she ever undertook a journey after she was converted without first bowing in silent prayer.

While at Port Hope, sister Diehl's health broke down. Two years ago, at his own request, Bro. Diehl was given a supernumerary relation. He went East, taking work in New Jersey, hoping that a change of climate would be beneficial to sister Diehl's health. She followed him in the spring, but her health continued to fail. As a last resort they went to Florida, but it was in vain, the time of her departure was at hand. In a few weeks, in great joy and peace, she closed her eyes to all things earthly, bade farewell to beloved husband and friends, and joined the ransomed host before the throne.

Bro. Diehl bears testimony to the kindness of ministers and members of the M. E. church, South, to him and to Sister Diehl while they in trouble and sorrow were in the Southland.

He speaks especially of the Rev. J. H. Howland, who came from Cedar Keys to visit them, and of the Rev. J. B. Tey, pastor at Gainsville. The latter sent the following testimonial:

"I met sister Diehl soon after her arrival in Gainsville, and visited her frequently. I saw that death had marked her, and hence at an early moment conveyed to her the fact of her serious condition. She was spiritually prepared for the news that she was very ill and would probably not recover. From time to time we talked of her spiritual condition. Not a cloud was over her sky. She knew whom she had believed and was persuaded of his keeping power. She was submissive, cheerful, and even the last day of her life showed a tender solicitude for others. Sister Diehl was a true Christian as she was a loving, devoted wife, and she went from earth safely and fearlessly to her heavenly home."

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

CHURCH EXTENSION.

The Church Extension Society holds a high place in the affections of our people, chiefly for two reasons:

First, because of the men who have been its prime movers and representatives. The early devotion and tragic death of S. Y. Monroe, its first corresponding secretary, the strong, shaping personality of Dr. Kynett, felt through all the stages of its history, the inspiring leadership and field service of the persuasive McCabe and the dauntless Spencer, have won for it the love of our entire communion.

But still more, the timely help which it has brought to thousands of communities and congregations has called forth a deep and abiding regard.

It has relieved church destitution throughout large sections of our national domain. It has lifted crushing burdens from the shoulders of struggling societies. Interests of incalculable value to the Master and to Methodism have hitherto been delivered from peril by its beneficent and apparently unwasting resources.

We therefore behold with pain and solicitude, this arm of strength unable for the time to avert disaster. Despite the loan by the society of \$50,000 on interest-bearing bonds to carry us past the present distress, twenty churches have been sold and two hundred more are greatly endangered.

The loans and gifts of the society within the territory of our Conference have always been generous; and, at this time, thanks to the wise presentation of our needs by Dr. W. H. Shier, of the general committee, a sum equal to 118 per cent. of our contributions is returned to us, being the largest proportion to any of the older Conferences.

Every claim, therefore, both of love and of self-interest calls for the most strenuous effort on our part to meet in full the apportionments to our charges.—C. H. Morgan, Secretary.

WOMAN'S HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

"As it goes with America so it goes with the world." Our country is the meeting place for all the peoples of the earth; the matrix of the race that is destined to dominate it. It is, therefore, the grand-

est of missionary fields; the strategic point in the battlefield of time. Christianity decisively triumphant here will speedily spread her beneficient conquests everywhere. While, then, not one jot or tittle of zeal in foreign missions should be abated, zeal in home missionary effort should be extended and intensified.

The Woman's Home Missionary Society is at once a providential outgrowth of these ideas, and a potent agency for giving them everenlarging form, force and effect. Competing with no other agency of the church, co-operating with all, its single object is to stimulate and systematize the efforts of Christian women for the Christianizing of our own country. We, therefore, rejoice in its increasing prosperity. Last year it enrolled more members, distributed larger supplies, and operated in a wider field, in more numerous ways, and with larger results, than ever before. The Detroit Conference branch shared in the general advance. But there is need and room for further progress. We wish an auxiliary might be organized in every charge and local society in our Conference. It would be a three-fold blessing to the needy fields in city or frontier, to the church where its members reside, and to the Christian women who thus devote themselves to an enterprise at once imperatively necessary and brimful of promise for the coming of the kingdom.

EDUCATION.

The Methodist Episcopal church is thoroughly committed to the work of education. The number of institutions of learning under her control and patronags is very great. No church in the land has been more active in the matter of making provision for the cultivation of her young people. Thousands of young men and women, who would have been left in contented ignorance, have been initiated into the mysteries of knowledge and qualified for useful lives. The country is still full of Methodist boys and girls, who ought to be stirred up to seek a higher education, and there is money in reach to supply our institutions. An educational crusade should be preached.

However it may have been in the past, in our day a call to preach means a call to get ready to preach. A sound conversion, a divine call to preach, a life of humble piety and unreserved consecration are forever the indispensable conditions of usefulness in the Gospel ministry, but having these things, a man's usefulness in the ministry will be proportional to the intellectual force with which he studies the word of God and preaches the doctrine of salvation. It is indeed

possible that a minister may attain this power without the aid of colleges or theological schools, but it is certain that a thorough training will make any man more effective than he otherwise would be. Hence a call to a thorough college training very generally precedes a call to preach. •

We urge the observance of Children's Day, to call the attention of our youth to the subject of Christian Education and to obtain

funds to assist in securing the same.

Albion College is rapidly approaching the point where it will be counted side by side with the best equipped denominational colleges of the United States. The degree of efficiency it has already attained has made it superior to any denominational college in the state.

The endowment fund with Rev. Washington Gardner as financial agent is rapidly increasing. We recommend the following persons as trustees in the places of those whose term expires with this session of Conference, Hon. H. M. Loud and A. T. Bliss. As visitors we recommend C. T. Allen and O. J. Perrin. For visitors to the School of Theology, Boston, we recommend E. B. Bancroft and Wm. Dawe; to Garrett Biblical Institute, W. W. Washburn and H. E. Wolfe.

We offer the names of A. Edwards and J. F. Berry as trustees of the Northwestern University, and as visitors to the same, R. T. Savin, W. W. Washburn; to Drew Seminary, Rev. J. A. Lowry and J. P. Varner.

We heartily commend to the patronage of the entire church, Summer Assemblies and the Chatauqua and Bay View Reading Circles of our own state.

We emphasize the importance of using every means within our power to inspire and assist the great enterprise begun at Washington, D. C., namely, the American University.

We wish to record our pleasure in the visit to our Conference at this session of Dr. J. F. Goucher, president of the Woman's College, Baltimore. We are gratified to learn of the wonderful development and splendid equipment of that institution.

Dr. Buckley says the Woman's College, of Baltimore, is the most extraordinary educational institution that has ever arisen in Methism considered in connection with the amount of money contributed, the time in which the buildings were erected and furnished, the number of students, and the high rank universally accorded it."

We recommend as visitors to the Woman's College at Baltimore, Dr. C. M. Cobern and Rev. Simpson W. Horner.—J. H. KILPATRICK, Chairman.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ALBION COLLEGE.

The last year has been a trying one for all institutions of learning. While the assets of this institution have been increasing—being larger today than ever before—we have experienced difficulty in pro-

curing funds to meet necessary expenses. Some \$8,000.00 has been, for the time being, added to our indebtedness in equipping the new chemical laboratory. A considerable portion of this \$8,000.00 will be paid from local subscriptions at Albion.

While the College has been generously remembered by her friends, no money has come in to increase our productive endowments so as to meet current expenses. Our new endowments are yet in the future. In 1895, one subscription of \$20,000.00 and another of \$25,000.00 will become due; \$15,000.00 subscribed for the alumni professorship has not yet been paid and will become due next year. This will give \$60,000.00 to be added, in about a year, to our productive endowment.

The new laboratory adds from \$1,200.00 to \$1,500.00 a year to our expenses, and the new library building will add an amount at least equal to this.

Col. Bliss has expressed his readiness to erect the library building, but, in these times, it would be folly to go to the people for \$30,000.00 for endowment of the library and \$10,000.00 for war-memorial museum, the securing of which was a condition of the gift of the building.

Not only has the attendance of students not fallen off, but the aggregate somewhat increased, and a gain of twenty per cent. in the college of liberal arts. The membership of these college classes in 1893 amounted to 183; this year the aggregate was 221. Put this over against 37, the total attendance in the college of liberal arts in 1882, and it gives, at a glance, the change which has taken place. The aggregate attendance of students in all classes is 630. The receipts from students are nearly \$1,000.00 more than any preceding year.

The institution consists of five departments:

- 1. College of liberal arts.
- 2. Sub-collegiate classes.
- 3. The conservatory of music.
- 4. The commercial department.
- 5. The school of painting.

The theory is that the last three are self-supporting. This has been very nearly, though not quite, realized.

As to students doing literary work, the expense is met from two sources: (1) Interest on our productive endowment and (2) the incidentals charged. The student pays, in round numbers, \$20 a year, but it costs the institution about \$60. He thus personally pays into the institution one-third of the amount we pay out for him. The difference is supposed to be met from the interest on the endowment fund. Our present endowment is inadequate to supply these demands. The work requires a productive endowment of \$500,000.00. But it is now actually less than half this amount. If the unproductive endowment could be made productive, we should probably have about \$400,000.00.

The institution is greatly in need of money. Some of you may have gained the impression that the school is receiving large gifts.

(1) It must be remembered that money put into buildings is not available to pay the faculty, purchase fuel or meet other expenses,

but rather adds to the running expenses.

(2) Aside from the subscription of Hon. H. M. Loud, of \$30,000.00, made five years ago, the institution has received in productive endowments, in twenty years, not to exceed \$20,000.00. Mr. Loud has regularly paid into our treasury \$1,500.00 annually, for the expenses of the school. Sixty thousand dollars will soon become due-but, thus far, we have not had a dollar of it, and the foregoing represents the entire pecuniary help we have had from the church, aside from a few thousand dollars local subscriptions at Albion, applied to miscellaneous purposes. The steady, and for the last three or four years, exceptional growth of the college is due, not to the financial support afforded, but mostly to the scholarship, ability and devotion of the faculty. The members of the faculty, with great self-sacrifice, have, in the aggregate, made a subscription of \$6,000.00 towards the current expenses of the college for the coming year, the same to continue until the receipts from our productive funds shall be materially increased. And this subscription is made by men who are not wealthy, whose entire capital would not make one man rich.

Members of the Board of Trustees have subscribed about \$2,500.00 towards the current expenses of the coming year. It is the purpose of the trustees not to allow a dollar's increase of indebtedness.

The terms of office as trustees of Hon. Henry M. Loud and Hon. A. T. Bliss expire at this session of the Conference. Will you please fill these vacancies and appoint Conference visitors?

SANCTITY OF THE SABBATH.

The observance of the Christian Sabbath as a day of rest and worship is a universal obligation. The most beneficial results have followed to both men and nations who have kept the Sabbath. "The Sabbath was made for man and not man for the Sabbath." The laws of the body as well as of the soul demand such a day. As Americans, we are under special obligation to obey this mandate of heaven. Our forefathers intended that the Christian Sabbath should be the corner stone of the Republic. As a result of their wisdom and the goodness of God, we became a Sabbath-keeping nation and grew into greatness and power. But things have changed. We cannot close our eyes to the painful fact that there is much of Sabbath desecration in our land. In our great cities, saloons and theatres are open and a large amount of business is transacted on the Sabbath. It is to be feared

also that professing Christians do not always act consistently in maintaining the sanctity of the Sabbath. In certain localities, camp-meetings are held under the auspices of the church. The gates are opened on the Sabbath, fees are collected, multitudes are admitted who come with loaded baskets to enjoy a day of pleasure, paying no regard to the religious services. It is a question whether more harm than good is not done by such gatherings. Your committee thinks that the gates of all such meetings should be closed on the Sabbath. We would admonish Christians to avoid the Sunday newspaper and all other forms of pleasure-seeking on God's holy day. We would offer the following:

Resolved, 1st. That we will sustain with the whole weight of our influence the authorities of the land in upholding the Sabbath day.

2nd. That we would respectfully request railroad and steamboat companies and all other agencies employing men, to permit their employes to have the full b nefit of the Sabbath rest.

3rd. That, as a Christian people, we will strive faithfully to "remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy."

CHARTERED FUND.

The Board of Stewards, as a committee, to which was submitted a communication from the Veteran Ministers' Relief Association and also a paper on the Sustentation for Superannuates, recommend the adoption of the following resolution in behalf of the Chartered Fund:

1. That this Annual Conference recommends that the General Conference of 1896 shall adopt some plan for the celebration of the Centennial of the Chartered Fund which shall so present its benevolent object to the church that by concentrated contribution a large addition may be made to its invested fund.

2. That we will heartily co-operate with the Corresponding Secretary in his work of presenting this cause to the church. We will permit him to occupy our pulpits in this interest at such times as may be mutually satisfactory, and will aid him by helping him to secure the assistance of the members of our churches in carrying out the plans of the Board of Trustees for the increase of this fund.

We further recommend that this Conference petition the General Conference to modify the Article of the Discipline, Part XV, Chapter III, so as to omit from Article 301 the sentence "The apportionment made to each charge for this purpose shall be made a ministerial claim and shall be paid pro rata with the claims of the Pastor, Presiding Elder and Bishop."

Also to modify Article 4, Section 302 so that it shall read: "Each member of the Annual Conference, except those who are superannuated, shall contribute annually at least one-half of one per cent. of their salary, not including house rent, to the above funds."

TEMPERANCE.

A communication from the Conference of the Methodist Protestant church, in session at Capac, requesting that the Conference take steps to inaugurate some scheme of concerted action of the Protestant churches of the state, with reference to the suppression of the saloon business, was referred to us. After careful examination, your committee recommend that it be put into the hands of the Committe on Temperance that you shall appoint for next year, and that they be given authority to invite correspondence and to institute such measures as may seem wise.

We deem it unnecessary to speak at length of the multiplied evils of the liquor business; but in view of your former, oft-repeated utterances, we regard the following truths to be eminently apparent.

1. That the drink traffic, involving as it does, a waste in money expended and energy destroyed, of more than a billion dollars annually, outweighs in importance all other financial questions at present agitating the public mind.

2. That, in its social aspect, it is responsible for two-thirds, at least, of all the crime and consequent suffering to which the body politic is subject, and is therefore by far greater than all other social

questions before the American people.

3. That, from the moral point of view, it stands alone the mightiest impediment to the progress of the kingdom of our God and His Christ.

4. That this nefarious business is so intrenched in politics, that, while we recognize the value of the pulpit and other agencies for the dissemination of knowledge on this great question, it is to us obvious that all these must fail of their purpose, except as they lead to conscientious and intelligent voting.

5. That any political party that fails to make this a prominent issue, must so fail for one of three reasons: 1st. Such variance of sentiment in its own ranks as to render action impossible. 2nd. Culpable indifference to the best interests of the nation; or 3rd. A wicked

connivance for some sinister purpose; therefore,

Resolved, That any political party, to claim the suffrage of conscientious, intelligent men, must of necessity make the immediate and total suppression of this infamous business a prominent issue.—W. C. Clemo, Jacob Horton, W. W. Washburn, Committee.

DEBTS DUE THE BOOK CONCERN.

Your committee finds, First, that quite a number indebted to the Book Concern are not at the seat of Conference. Second, that many others claim inability to pay, and recommends:

1st. That all Book Room accounts needing special attention be placed in the hands of some person or persons appointed by this Conference, whose duty it shall be to write to each person so indebted and require settlement, either by cash payment or bankable note before the next Annual Conference.

2nd. That the person or persons so appointed shall correspond with Conference claimants whose accounts with the Book Room remain unsettled, requesting their consent to use a part of all the money apportioned to them in payment of said accounts.

WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, organized March 30, 1869, has had twenty-five and a-half years in which to test the wisdom of the enterprise.

It now has ten associate branches, including 5,894 auxiliaries and a membership of 151,275.

The receipts of the Society for the year 1893 were \$277,303.79, an increase of \$11,961.64 over the previous year.

The Detroit Conference Society is within the jurisdiction of the Northwestern Branch. The Branch receipts (1893) were \$61,725.55, of this amount the Detroit Conference Societies furnished \$7,558.82. There are 121 auxiliaries in Detroit Conference with a membership of 2,920.

With the collection and disbursement of money and with the administration and development of the work, the officers of the Society have approached the maximum of self-denial and the minimum of cost. Having accomplished their arduous work on the basis of unpaid voluntary labor.

Organized with the approval of the missionary authorities of the church, its purpose, "To engage and unite the efforts of Christian women in sending women as missionaries to the women in mission fields of the Methodist Episcopal church and supporting them and native Christian teachers and Bible readers in those fields," where millions of women, unable to read God's word, and surrounded by the environments of laws and customs prohibiting them from associating with men, except their husbands and fathers, are thus excluded from hearing the missionaries ordained and sent to preach the gospel.

The degraded condition of the women of heathenism, their influence in their homes, and the possible influence, like the influence of the Christian women in our own land, which they shall exert for good among their own people, when converted, proves the wisdom of sending teachers who can gain access to them.

This is especially true of India and Corea, where women today stand across the track of Christianity.

The W. F. M. S. is laboring to remove the barrier and thus "prepare the way of the Lord."

We rejoice in the growth of the Society and the increase of its contributions.

We recognize the W. F. M. S. as being one of the efficient agencies of the church, and we assure our sisters of our hearty co-operation in their work. We will do our best to assist them in increasing the membership and contributions in the auxiliaries already organized on our charges, and we urge our ministers and their wives to use all possible effort in securing an organization on all charges where none now exist.—R. L. Cope, *Chairman*.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

In our Methodist economy the relation of the Sunday school to the church is intimate and vital.

We rejoice that such has been its growth in our own church, that we have to-day 28,856 Sunday schools, with 328,343 teachers and officers and 2,409,874 scholars.

There are, however, many localities within the bounds of our Detroit Conference, where no Sunday school or Bible instruction is given. We urge upon our people the importance of gathering both young and old for the study of the Scriptures and general Sunday school work.

We also desire increased proficiency in workers and methods of work; therfore, be it

Resolved, 1. That pastors be urged to establish a Sunday school at every point of each charge of our Conference.

- 2. That we urge the presence of the membership of the church and the adult part of our congregations in the Sunday school.
- 3. That the Sunday School Board on every charge be asked to make diligent efforts to secure the attendance of teachers and scholars at the public services of the church.
- 4. That from a doctrinal, a financial and a connectional standpoint, we commend our Sunday schools in every case to use our own Sunday school helps and publications, the first and most important of which is the Bible.
- 5. We recommend that normal classes for the preparation and supply of teachers be organized wherever possible, and recognizing the educational value of our church catechism to the young, we recommend that it be a part of the studies in all our Sunday schools.

6. That, whereas, the Sunday School Union has aided during the past past year 3,000 Sunday schools of our church, and asks of this entire connection the sum of \$50,000 as the smallest amount with which its work can be accomplished; and whereas, the apportionment for this Conference is \$842, we recommend that this amount be approved by Conference, apportioned by the Presiding Elders pro rata to the charges, and raised during the coming year.—Joshua Stansfield.

TRACTS.

From the time of John Wesley until now the Methodist church has recognized the value of religious literature freely distributed among the people, and tract distribution has from the first been one of the evangelizing forces of our Methodism.

Resolved, 1. That our pastors be asked to present the claims of our Tract Society.

- 2. That as the Tract Society generously provides to give to every church in tracts one-half the amount of their collection for that cause, we urge upon our pastors the wisdom of securing, and, through their local committee on tracts, using such a valuable help in their work.
- 3. That we rejoice in the work of the Society during the past year in both home and foreign fields, and will strive during the coming year to secure our Conference apportionment of \$842 for this excellent cause.—Joshua Stansfield, *Chairman*.

FREEDMEN'S AID AND SOUTHERN EDUCATION SOCIETY.

In our land, we have six or eight millions of citizens whose ancestors have spent centuries in fetish worship and, with us, generations in abject slavery. About one-third of a century ago our immortal Lincoln proclaimed these serfs freed men, and we, by a constitutional amendment, gave them all the rights of American citizens.

The South could not relieve the necessities of the freed men, if they would, while the U. S. government considered its work done in that the colored man had been freed and made a citizen.

Our church felt that God called it to assist these newly enfranchised brethren. Our General Conference formulated the machinery, appointed the officers, and our people have furnished hundreds of thousands of dollars to carry on the work.

Schools of various grades have been established, church and school buildings have been erected at a cost of millions of dollars.

We also have a membership of over four hundred thousand colored men and poor whites in the South.

There have grown up in our Southern work men of genius, culture and piety, who love the church and realize their obligation to it, and who feel that they should be represented in our corps of General Conference officers. The M. E. church, South, is not backward in saying that they ought to be an independent church, officered with men of their own color—The various colored Methodist churches are constantly agitating this question. These things are telling upon our colored brethren, and to help them we must say to the church and the world we know of no color line in our Christian work. We offer the following resolutions:

1st. That we recommend a full recognition of the General Conference supervision of the schools, both as to location and course of study.

2nd. That we request our General Conference Committee on Freedmen and Southern Education to give all possible attention to this great work.

3rd. That, as a Conference, we will agitate the necessity of an amendment to the U. S. constitution making attendance upon public schools obligatory upon all children and youth from seven to fourteen years of age, without reference to color, nationality or creed.

ARMY AND NAVY.

We recommend:

1. That the petition to the Congress of the United States, as formulated by the United Christian Commission, be adopted, and that a copy be sent to the Secretary of War and one to C. Herbert Reibarden, Baltimore, Md.

2. That the Presiding Elders of this Conference be a perpetual committee to co-operate with like committees from other Conferences and churches, for the purpose of promoting the moral and religious interests of the Army and Navy.—H. S. White, Chairman.

PARSONAGES.

The reasons that may be urged for a good parsonage on every charge are numerous, cogent and unanswerable.

If they could be codified, printed and circulated in all our congregations, they would bear fruit in construction, extension and repair. And we would emphasize the fact that the improvement and care of

parsonages is of equal importance with their erection. We believe that not a few of our parsonages are small, inconvenient and out of repair.

To secure a parsonage in every way adequate to the needs of the pastor and to keep it in excellent condition, should be the aim of every charge.

We recommend the appointment of a select committee, with the understanding that they are to magnify their office in the following and other particulars as far as practicable:

1. By a series of printed questions ascertain, if possible, the actual condition of our two hundred and more parsonages.

2. Secure the names of the parsonage committee on each charge. If the committee is useless let a new one be appointed; if none exists let careful appointments be made.

3. Secure from the preachers and their wives their ideas of the fundamental necessities of a parsonage and the prevailing deficiencies.

4. Prepare from our annual reports and original sources an appeal on this subject, to be printed in the *Michigan Christian Advocate* and put into the hands of a parsonage committee and circulated in our churches as far as possible.—P. Ross Parrish, F. E. Pearce, Philip Price.

BOARD OF DEACONESSES.

There is but one Deaconess' Home, the Detroit, where Deaconesses are employed, within the bounds of the Conference, located at 53 Elizabeth St., West. This is under the auspices of the Woman's Home Missionary Society. At this Home during the year there have been five Deaconesses: Miss Lucretia A. Gaddis, Superintendent; Miss Sarah Elizabeth Thornborough, Miss Deborah Kerfoot, Miss Mary Hartwell, Miss Minnie West. We ask that the above named licensed Deaconesses be approved by the Conference, that they may continue in their work according to the provisions of the discipline.

The licensed Deaconesses have given their whole time to the work, while the probationers have pursued the course of study and given part of their time to outside work. Our visitors have very largely carried on their work under the direction of the city pastors:

We have had charge of one Woman's Sewing School and two Girls' Sewing Schools; also a mothers' prayer meeting, held in the Home.

We have conducted services and visited the sick in the following hospitals in Detroit: Woman's hospital, Grace hospital, Marine hospital and Emergency hospital.

One of our number has charge of the Tillman Ave. mission with its various branches of work.

Miss Ida Wood, who was connected with our Home for some time, suffered during the year past with tubercular consumption and recently answered the summons to enter the heavenly city. Her sweet, gentle presence will be greatly missed in our Home.

Our nurses, during the year, have gone into the homes of the sick and the poor and ministered to the suffering. The visitors have sought and found the wanderers from the fold and, in many a sad home, both classes of workers have been a blessing indeed.

BIBLE CAUSE.

It is gratifying to the friends of the Bible that while our Holy Book is being assailed as never before, it is also being read with an extensiveness and interest which are unparalleled. We reaffirm our belief in the Bible as God's infallible revelation to man.

We recommend that our pastors make greater efforts to place the Bible in our Sunday schools and in the homes of our people.

The American Bible Society has aided our church in her work in the home and foreign field. It has circulated, during the past year, nearly a million and a half of copies or portions of the Sacred Scriptures. We regret that one-half of our charges fail to take a collection for this society, and that the total gifts of our Conference to this society do not average one cent per member. From information received, we learn that the grants to our church equal five cents per member. In view of this fact, we suggest that collections which would help us, as a church, from being dependent upon the bounty of this society are the least that we can honorably do. We, therefore, recommend that the Presiding Elders apportion to the respective charges sums equal to five cents per member.—Samuel Jennings, Chairman.

PERIODICALS,

The rapid increase in the circulation and influence of periodical literature in the last few years is a fact of great importance. The number and variety of periodicals indicate the vast ranges of its power. There is scarcely a home unvisited by these messengers of truth or error.

Whether inspiring or depressing, the fact remains that periodical literature—particularly the daily newspaper—is the mightiest agent in society for the propagation of truth or error, in the formation of public opinion, and in giving direction and intensity to the social forces.

The Christian church is wisely using this agency for the diffusion of the gospel. There is no reason why religious journalism should be

confined in its operations to the field of the church, but should seek to penetrate the regions beyond. It should not only be our aim to place a religious newspaper in every Methodist home, but to create, as far as possible, a general demand for such reading. Aggressive energy can carry a literature permeated with the spirit of Christianity in every department of our complex social life. Wholesale denunciation of the secular press only fails to diminish the circulation of such literature, and it is impolitic and unjust. While those papers which aim to meet the demands of all classes of readers set forth many things that are repulsive to the refined and the good, it must not be forgotten that many things concerning the work of the church and a measure of religious truth are carried by this agency to quarters where the strictly religious paper does not go. It is not our business to antagonize, but as far as possible to utilize, the secular press. Our great need is a periodical literature not mainly devoted to denominational interests, but furnishing pure and healthful reading in a form that will attract the general reader, and, at the same time, so cheap as to be within the reach of all. But the occupation and culture of the vast fields all about us demand—like every other work men and money. The richest gifts of nature, strengthened by culture, a knowledge of men and of the world, with a special training in the high art of journalism, can meet the demands of the hour. In the large field occupied by the Methodist Episcopal Church, with all its varied interests and agencies, we have the conviction that nothing is more vital to the progress of the work than the preaching of the gospel through the agency of periodical publications.

We rejoice that the storm which has swept over the business world, and which has left so many wrecks in its path, has only proven the stability of our church publications. There has been a decrease in the circulation of our periodicals during the year, but not to an extent to cause embarrassment.

We earnestly appeal to our people to avail themselves of the help to religious growth and usefulness which a religious paper affords.

Our General Conference publications have a claim, first of all, to the patronage of the church. No pastor has a right to give preference to secular or unofficial religious publications on his charge. We are assured that the discretionary power given our agents to reduce the prices of our periodicals will be exercised when the interest of the preachers and people warrant the reduction. Let us promptly furnish a basis for such action. And we respectfully suggest that our agents should have a practical faith in the willingness of the people to support our periodicals at reasonable prices; and we have no doubt that the response will show that such confidence has not been misplaced.

Prominent among the periodicals that deserve our patronage is the *Christian Advocate*. Oldest of the family of Advocates, central in its relation to the whole church, conspicuous among the religious journals of the world for its literary excellence, it is entitled to a wide circulation.

It is a matter of surprise and regret that the Northwestern Christian Advocate has only about 20,000 names upon its subscription lists. The extent of its patronizing territory, the ability displayed in its editorial management, ought to insure it at least double that number. The Epworth Herald has a large circulation, but in view of the phenomenal growth of the Epworth League, it ought to be much larger. The Michigan Christian Advocate is widely circulated throughout the Conference, and as the special organ of Michigan Methodism, receives special attention at the hands of the pastors. We believe its efficiency would be increased by a closer official relation to the church.—J. S. Joslin, Chairman.

RULES OF ORDER

As Adopted in 1869, Modified in 1875, and Adopted at Each Session Since.

1. The Conference shall meet at 8½ o'clock A. M., and adjourn at 12 M., but may alter the time of meeting and adjourn at its discretion.

2. The President shall take the chair precisely at the time to which the Conference stood adjourned. The first half hour of the session shall be devoted to religious services, and thereafter the journals of the preceding day shall be read and approved.

3. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but, in case of an appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

4. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference, but any member may decline serving on more than one committee at the same time.

but any member may decline serving on more than one committee at the same time.

5. All motions and resolutions introduced by any member shall be reduced to writing, if the President, Secretary, or any member of the Conference requests it.

6 When a motion, resolution or report presented, is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference, but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the major term in the before the.

resolution may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before action or amendment.

7. No new motion or resolution shall be made before the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following should intervene, which motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, viz: Indefinite postponement, lying on the table, reference to a committee, postponement to any circumstance.

posterior to any given time or amendment.

8. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President, to call him to order when he departs from the question, uses personalities, or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems the speaker out of order, or any other member may explain when he thinks him-

deems the speaker out of order, or any other member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.

9. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President.

10. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject, or more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

11. When any motion or resolution shall have passed, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration.

12. No member shall absent himself from the services of Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

unless he is sick or unable to attend.

13. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time such question is put by the President, except by leave of Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

14. Every member who shall be within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons, excuse him.

15. No motion shall be considered unless seconded.

16. The Secretary shall keep a journal of the proceedings of the Conference, and, when approved, shall record them in a book provided for that purpose. He shall take charge of the journal and other papers of the Conference, and preserve them with care; suffer no person to take a copy of any paper during the interval of Conference, except with the consent of the Conference; and shall forward the journal and papers to the next Annual Conference. Annual Conference.

17. A motion to adjourn shall be in order at any time, and shall be decided without

debate.

18. No preacher shall bring any charge against any member of this Conference until he has first given him information of the same, either by letter or otherwise, ten days in advance, if practicable, so that the accused may have an opportunity for defense.

19. When any brother intends to object to the passage of another's character, it shall be his duty to hand the name of the person against whom objections are to be made to the

President of the Conference

20. Two-thirds of the members present, and voting, may order the previous question on a pending motion.
