Dr. Robert Pease, CCE Dean, To Retire After 25 Years At RIT

Dr. Robert D. Pease, dean of the College of Continuing Education at RIT, will retire at the end of the current academic year (June 30, 1974). Pease was appointed associate dean in 1951 and has served as dean since 1961.

According to Dr. Todd H. Bullard, provost, appropriate methods of con sulting with the faculty and staff of the College of Continuing Education will be developed after Jan. 1 to seek a replacement for Dr. Pease.

When Pease joined the College of Continuing Education 22 years ago, CCE had 3,200 students in business or technical courses, and a staff of four administrators and 15 instructors from the day faculty. Today's enrollment is 13,000 registrants in programs ranging from non - credit and diploma to associate's, bachelor's and master's degrees.

Currently, CCE has 17 on the administrative staff, 17 full - time faculty and 375 adjunct faculty from business, industry and scientific community.

During that same time, Dr. Pease's priority has been the continuation of a close relationship with business and industry.

"Our tradition," he said, "has been one of cooperation in defining and meeting needs brought about by the

extensive influx of new occupations and the changing methods and technical demands of the old."

Prior to joining RIT in 1948 as an instructor in the Division of General Education, he was employed by the (Pennsylvania Department of Public Assistance) and Taylor Instrument Companies.

He is a graduate of Ursinus College (B.S.), University of Rochester (M.A.) and the University of Buffalo (Ed.D), where his dissertation was, "The Occupational Achievements of the Graduates of a Technical Institute."

While making Pease's retirement announcement, Dr. Bullard stated, "The departure of Dean Pease after so many years of service to RIT will leave us with a substantial void.

"He has been a most effective spokesman on behalf of continuing education in the councils of the Institute. His labors have served to remind us of the importance of the continuing education function in an institution which traces so much of its history and strength to that tradition."


Dean Pease holds professional memberships in the Adult Education Association and the National University Extension Association. He is the RIT representative to the Association for Continuing Higher Education, management groups within the Industrial Management Council, the Small Business Association of the Rochester Chamber of Commerce, the New York Association for Continuing Education, the Monroe County Association for Continuing Education and the Genesee Chapter, American Society for Training and Development.

He is chairman of the Adult Education Advisory Board of the Gates - Chili School District; chairman, Advisory Council to the Board of Cooperative Educational Services No. 2.

Basketball Team Opens 50th Season With Invitational Win

Paced by the scoring of Ed Davis and playmaking of Arnold Cole, the RIT basketball team opened its 50th season on a winning note, capturing the 16th annual Invitational Tournament.

The Tigers downed Plattsburgh, 78 - 67 in the opening round to advance to the finals where they stopped RPI in a thriller, 58 - 51.

In the eighth annual wrestling Invitational, also held at RIT this weekend, junior Bob Parker paced the Tigers in a sixth place finish with three outstanding performances at 118 pounds.

The basketball competition shaped up as was expected with four strong contests in the two-day tourney. In Friday's opening round of competition, RPI took the measure of Keene State, 5161 - 51 and advanced to the finals for the sixth consecutive year.

In the nightcap, the Tigers called on junior forward Ed Davis with eight minutes gone in the first half. Davis came off the bench and responded with 26 points in an outstanding offensive effort. Senior co-captain Arnie Cole added 14 points and sparked the offensive attack.

The Tigers played consistent defense, particularly in the second half. Junior Ray Brown paced the squad with 11 rebounds while sophomore Steve Keating came off the bench for a strong defensive effort.

In the consolation game Saturday night, Keene State came from behind in the first half and then proceeded to thwart Plattsburgh, 76 - 57. It was the first Invitational appearance for both squads.

The championship contest was one of the best finals in the 16 - year history of the tournament. The Tigers were off to a flying start as they built an early 14 - 4 lead. Holding a comfortable 22 - 10 margin, the Tigers suddenly went cold and the RPI Engineers responded with 10 straight points. The half ended in a 26 - 26 deadlock.

In the second half, it was a superb defensive effort by the Tigers that held RPI in check and gave RIT its seventh title in 16 tries. RPI was stopped with a mere three points in the final five minutes as the Tigers continually forced turnovers.

Cole was high for the Tigers with 16 points while Davis added 14. Both were named to the All-Tournament Team and Davis gained the MVP Award for his two outstanding performances in leading the Tigers to the Crown.

Meanwhile, it was the determination of Bob Parker, Ray Ruliffson and Dave Gibson that led the Tigers in the wrestling classic.

Brockport State grappled its way to a third straight Invitational title and set a new mark for most points with 139. Finishing second in the eight-team field was Syracuse with six freshmen in the lineup (107.5), followed by Notre Dame (88.5), Delaware (86.5), Akron (85.5), RIT (72), St. John Fisher (38) and University of Rochester (24.5). It

and University of Rochester (24.5). It was Delaware's first appearance, replacing Colgate.

Parker started his drive toward the 118 - pound crown and the tournament's Most Outstanding Wrestler Award with a 5 - 1 decision over Chris Macey of Delaware.

Cash For Energy Ideas

Students with workable ideas about conserving energy and other resources on campus might be able to make money for them.

The Institute Task Force on Environmental Concerns will award cash prizes of \$150, \$100 and \$50 to the students who come up with the three best ideas for conserving energy and consequently improving the quality of life at RIT.

The ideas, of course, must be able to be implemented. Presentation is up to the entrant, but the entry should include:

- 1. The idea
- 2. An explanation of how this idea may be implemented
- 3. An estimate of the savings to be realized from implementing it
- 4. A statement of what the idea would do to improve the quality of life on campus

Entries are encouraged that cover a broad range of topics from the conservation of energy, chemicals and other materials to efforts in the areas of recycling to suggestions dealing with instructional and educational activities.

Entries should be submitted to Dr. Robert M. Desmond, department head, mechanical engineering. Deadline for submission is Monday, Jan. 14.

Buildings To Open After March 15

The first section of new facilities to house the NTID program is expected to be ready for occupancy following March 15 and prior to June 30, 1974, according to Tom Hussey, director of Physical Plant.

"Office personnel in the academic building will most likely be the first to move in," Hussey siad. "NTID's academic programs should move in sometime in June with the dining commons and housing ready for occupancy in time for the next school year."

"The important thing is to have everything functioning by next fall. There are variables such as equipment that could change specific move - in dates," he said.

Dr. Miller Authors Book

RIT President Paul A. Miller is one of three college presidents who have authored a book, "Patterns For Lifelong Learning," published in October, 1973, by Jossey - Bass, San Francisco.

Theodore M. Hesburg, president of the University of Notre Dame, and Clifton R. Wharton, Jr., president of Michigan State University, are the other collaborators. The study was made under a grant from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation.

The book's theme is that learning should be continuously integrated with life rather than just a preparation for it, Miller said. Colleges and universities must take the lead in providing the means and the incentives for continuing education within the total community. To do this, many institutions must change; the authors provide concrete recommendations for action.

Dr. Miller authored the section that analyzes trends in adult education, the concept of community and education as inter-dependent, and the relationship of continuing education to technological and social change.
