CANADIAN RIFLES HELD POSITION
 UNTIL ALL WERE KILLED OR WOUNDED
 A Day Fight Near Hart's River in Which Both Sides Lost Heavily.

(Associated Press.)
 London, April 4.—There was severe fighting all day long on March 31st in the neighborhood of Hart's river, in the southwestern extremity of the Transvaal, between a party of General Kitchener's force and the forces of General De la Rey and Kemp, resulting in the repulse of the Boers after heavy losses on both sides.

The Canadian Rifles especially distinguished themselves, one party commanded by Lieut. Bruce Carruthers holding its position till every man was killed or wounded.

Lord Kitchener's official report, dated from Pretoria yesterday evening, says: "General Kitchener, Lord Kitchener's brother, sent Colonels Keir and Cookson from Vreikuil, Western Transvaal, March 31st, to reconnoitre towards Hart's river. They soon struck the track of guns and carried on a running fight for eight miles, following the track through the bush.

"Emerging on the plain, large Boer reinforcements advanced against their flank, forcing the British troops to take up a defensible position, which they held until the Boers were repulsed on all sides.

"De la Rey, Kemp and other leaders vainly attempted to persuade their men to renew the action. Fifteen hundred Boers participated in the engagement, but they had suffered too heavily, and cleared away to the northwest and south. The British losses were also severe.

"The Canadian Rifles especially distinguished themselves, one party commanded by Lieut. Bruce Carruthers, holding its post till every man was killed or wounded.

"Others of the forces showed great steadiness, allowing the Boers to advance within two hundred yards of them and repelling them with a steady rifle fire."

Purchasing Horses.
 St. Louis, April 4.—Major-General Sir Richard C. Stewart, in charge of the remount service of the British army, arrived in St. Louis last night. Upon being shown a telegram from New Orleans to the effect that Governor Heard, of Louisiana, had reported to the state department at Washington that the British government is maintaining a military camp at New Orleans in violation of the neutrality law, the general declared that although he had just left New Orleans he knew nothing whatever of the existence of such a camp. General Stewart stated that he would remain in St. Louis for a few days to purchase horses and mules for the British army.

THE COMMAND OF CANADIAN MILITIA
 NO APPOINTMENT HAS YET BEEN MADE
 Lord Dundonald Recommended for the Position, But Nothing Definite Decided Upon.

(Special to the Times.)
 Ottawa, April 4.—Dr. Borden was asked this morning if he had learned anything about the appointment of Lord Dundonald, to the command of the Canadian militia.

Dr. Borden replied that Lord Dundonald had been recommended for the position, but he had not been appointed, as it would require an order-in-council by the Canadian government to do this, and they, as yet, had not a vacancy. Gen. O'Grady-Haly's term would not have expired until June 30th.

Railway Bills.
 The Edmonton & Slave Lake railway and the (Kosland) Mine Railway Bills were reported at the Senate committee today. Senator Templeman said that it looked like a road to carry ore out of Canada. Senators Watson and Gibson, as well as Senator Templeman thought that the line to Kosland was only put in to get a charter for a line to the boundary, and Sir Mackenzie Borden said he had no doubt but the line to the boundary would be the one used. An amendment was made providing that any contract with United States railways could only be had by the consent of the Government-in-council. The bill was then reported.

D. J. Munn Returning.
 D. J. Munn New Westminster, left today for the Pacific coast. He is to act as an appraiser for the company or trust that is arranging to control the canneries in British Columbia.

Finances of Dominion.
 The financial statement of the Dominion, issued today for the nine months ending March 31st, shows the revenue to be \$41,271,818, an increase of \$3,433,801 over the same time last year. The ordinary expenditure was \$36,514,125, an increase of \$2,286,523, or a betterment of over \$1,000,000. The excess in revenue over expenditure for the nine months was \$1,000,000. The expenditure on capital account was \$8,857,451, an increase of over \$1,000,000. The increase in revenue over all kinds of expenditure was over \$1,500,000 for the month of March. There was an increase of over \$500,000 in the revenue and a decrease of over \$100,000 in the ordinary expenditure. On the capital expenditure there was a decrease for the month of \$1,000,000. Altogether the statement is an excellent one.

SECOND DAY OF THE BENCH SHOW
 THE JUDGE RESUMES HIS DELICATE TASK
 List of Awards Made This Morning—Opinion of Visitors From the Other Side.

"The warmest competition I was ever up against. This was the rather emphatic expression of a veteran dog fancier regarding the bench show now in progress, and may be construed a conclusive tribute to the successful efforts of the Victoria club. It was uttered by 'Tinty,' who has charge of the magnificent array of Scottish dogs in the show, and who has shown from Nanaimo to Oakland, California, and back again. 'This is my thirteenth show in exactly three years,' he said, 'and I must say that I never encountered such keen competition. Why, last year, here and elsewhere, I cleaned out nearly everything, but at this show I am taking principally titles.'"

Mr. Tinty is an enthusiast of the first class. The canines under his care instinctively recognize that they have a master who understands them thoroughly, and who looks upon them as charges worthy of the kindest care and attention. He has in hand a large number of dogs owned by prominent Seattle fanciers, and is showing some of his own. Among these might be mentioned his famous collie bitch, Seattle Betty, which has never been beaten. Betty is a superb collie with aristocracy on ever line, and has an admirable record extending from Seattle to Oakland. She has been awarded the palm for being the best collie in the show.

Another of his distinguished four-footed prizes is Seattle Roy, leader of the tri-colored class and winner of the cup. Dr. Sharples has a great quartet of cockers, capturing a first, second and a third. A fine lot of black and tan terriers are being shown by Mrs. F. Levy, of Walla Walla, while Mr. Redelheimer's kennels are royally represented by some splendid fox and Boston terriers. Other dog fanciers who are contributing to the success of the show by exhibiting their canines are Dr. Mcintosh, R. M. Palmer and A. M. Macpherson.

Another gentleman from the Sound who adds his words of commendation to those uttered by Mr. Tinty is J. R. Biplinger, city comptroller of Seattle. He was particularly impressed by the fine showing of English setters and cockers, and on the whole endorsed the show as one of the finest he had ever attended. One of his dogs, Clip Monte, captured a prize in the setter class, but unfortunately the other, a likely setter out of Victoria Belle, of this city, became ill, and was not exhibited.

A number of the Seattle fanciers are in the city, but others are expected to-night, among them is Jules Redelheimer, president of the Seattle Kennel Club, and of the Pacific Coast Kennel League. E. A. Willis is handling the Portland dogs.

Victoria, April 4-5 a. m.—A high barometer area from the ocean has moved inland over the North Pacific states and southern British Columbia, and the trough of low pressure yesterday over the Rockies is slowly following the eastward movement of the high barometer area which for some days past has occupied the Northwest and is now passing through Manitoba. These conditions have caused general light to moderate rainfall west of the ranges, where mild temperatures have prevailed at most stations, with occasional frost on the higher levels.

SITTINGS OF THE ROYAL COMMISSION

(Continued from page 3.)

TO-DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

The royal commission resumed its sittings at 10 o'clock this morning. R. H. Green, M. P., was the first witness. Before he proceeded with the evidence, Mr. Curtis again protested against documents which he had asked for not being produced. He had already stated that the commissioner had treated him fairly in the examination of witnesses yesterday and the day previous, but he wished to say now that he would not have that chance to prove his charges against the production of these documents were insisted upon. He asked particularly for the voucher of Mr. Green's expenses, a telegram from Mr. Green's wife to Mr. Wells, stating that he had important dispatches from Mackenzie & Mann to Mr. Dunsmuir and a telegram from Mr. Green's wife to Mr. Wells, also the correspondence that passed between Mr. Dunsmuir, the E. & N. Railway Company, and the Pacific Improvement Company in reference to the proposed sale. He wished to have these documents and some time to examine them before cross-examining the witnesses.

The suggestion was that the telegrams referred to were stated to be of a political nature, and he wanted to protect the commissioner from any possible charge of having passed upon such telegrams unfairly. It was not intended as any reflection upon the commissioner. The commission then adjourned until this afternoon. Mr. Curtis during the sitting intimated that he would probably finish his case with the cross-examination of Mr. Dunsmuir, which will begin tomorrow morning, and will likely continue all day.

THE DAWSON CHURCH. A B. C. Clergyman Will Go There—Result of the Transfer Committee Meeting. The Methodist transfer committee, which met yesterday in Toronto, refused the request of Rev. W. Bridgman into the B. C. conference. This is understood to be due to the fact that there was no request for a corresponding transfer out of this conference. The effect of it will be that some minister already a member of the B. C. conference will be sent to Dawson. It is quite probable that the Dawson church will leave the matter of selection to the stationing committee, which will meet in Vancouver early in May.

NOT THE BLAKEY. Vessel Supposed to Be Her Is Probably the Belgantine-Itwin. When the report became known yesterday afternoon that the Blakeley was in the Straits on her return from Coos Bay with the Victorians aboard who had dug for the millions buried there by the crew of the bark Mary Dee and other craft, several stockholders in the enterprise were signing on his or her possible fortune. The Blakeley's return was everywhere discussed about the amount of fortune she had aboard. In twenty minutes after the news was given out it was reported that the ship had \$200,000 aboard.
