

A Number of Interesting Papers-The Election of Officers-Last Night's Meeting.

held yesterday morning was a very pro-fitable meeting. Three papers were read —"The Educational Value of Natural Science," by G. H. Knowlton, B. A.; "A Foot Note, to Botany," by Mr. Henry, of the Vancouver High school staff, and the

The "Foot Note to Botany" proved most intensely interesting. Mr. Henry exhibited large wall charts which each teacher could easily make for himself and take into his classroom; these are filled out by teacher and children, and when completed form from year to year most valuable data of provincial; Dominion and even national import in determining comparative tables of temperative, rainfall, flower-appearance and climatic conditions generally.

Mr. Clarke's paper on "English Subjects in the High School" was wide in its scope. He began by a strong plea that subjects of study which make for general culture should have the pre-eminence over those of a merely utilitar-intented the present in tenderer. He departed the present

eminence over those of a merely utilitar-ian tendency. He deplored the present of these great divisions, he considered that the English subjects should un-doubtedly take the first place. The speaker next took up the English

Stress should be laid on the origin and growth of a nation, the great epochs of civil and religious development, and their results on our own time. Geography should also receive richer treatment, bringing out information regarding social life in various countries; commerce

The octimal system, as its name implies, is one in which the unit of numerical progression is eight, in contradistinction to that at present in use, where the unit of progression is ten, the developments of which system are the decimal and metric systems. The speaker said: "I think it may safely be stated as a fact that the system used in Great Britain, and also the hybrid of British weights and measures with decimal coinage adopted here and by our friends to the south, are both of such a complicated character that the advance of civilization demands that a radical change be made. In discussing an ideal system of numeration, I think all will agree there are certain requirements which must be met. To put them shortly, they are: (1) Adaptability to adverse circumstantes; (2) simplicity in notation and calculation; (3) easily recognizable co-relation between numeration, coinage, lineal measures and those of capacity and weight, and, last, but not least, such a system should be easy of explanation; of colliders.

The chief and great advantage of the octimal system is the easy divisibility of its unit into halves, and quarters and eighths, thus following nature. Everything in nature is divided and sub-divided by two. The prime division is living and dead. Living is divided into animal and vegetable, dead into liquid and solid. The whole system of reproduction is founded on the divisions male and female, and no matter where we turn, we are confronted with this, the first law of nature. 

An effort to secure an improved steamship service between Canada and Australia is still being made. The governments of both countries are co-operating in the matter, and the prospect of establishing a faster and larger line of steamships than are now operated is considered very favorable.

It was partially in the hopes of bringing about this desirable end that Hon. Wm. Mulock, postmaster-general of Canada, visiting the land of the Southern Cross last year when he went south to



WILD ASIATIC HORSES.

EARLY POSTS.

Cyrus, King of Persia, possessed a "Haste, Post Haste!" are found written regular riding post, stations and men with horses that were always in readiness when required. The speed of his horses was such, according to Herodotus, as nothing mortal surpassed, and varied on the road from Sosa to Sardis from 60 to 120 miles a day. The early Greeks and Romans were by no means

The early Greeks and Romans were by no means so advanced, the Greeks having but little private correspondence before 600 B. C. while few attempts were made to organize the postal system of the Roman Empire until the Emperor Augustus in stituted couriers and stages along the roads at which relays of horses were always ready.

England was even still more backward, for it was not until the reign of Henry I that permajent messengers, styled nuntil and cursores, were first employed in the delivery of the King's writs to the lords and barons. They, only began to wear the royal livery intended them both in England and inforcing parts on affairs of state, as well as on private and confidential business of the crown. Their payment was an important item in the royal household accounts, and many specimens of the extent to which the system prevailed are to be found in our public records. Thus, on December 18th, 1324, the attention of the wardens of the Cinque Ports, as well as of the mayor and sheriffs of London, was drawn to the fact that many letters, prejudicial to the interests of the crown, were being brought into the country, and they were commanded to make diligent scrutiny of all persons passing from parts beyond the seas and to stop all letters concerning which sinister suspicion might arise. Again a royal writ of Sept. 32, 1326, evidently directed against Queen Isabella, the wife of Filward II, states that "the Queen, by council and abetment of the King's memies, did write daily divise letters to the archbishops, bishops, helates, carle, barens, and others of the King's lieges, as well as of the clergy as of the laity, and to the commons of the various towns, and to individual persons, in order to accomplish their false compassments."
