Frederick Emery Cook was born in Weymouth, July 2, 1836, and at the age of twenty years he was married to the prevailing custom, he purchased his freedom of his father and engaged in business for himself. On the thirty-first day of October, 1856, he was united in marriage to Alice Maria Bates, in August, 1867, he removed to New Jersey where he conducted a bakery for about one year, returning to his native town in September of the following year.

For about four years he was identified with the manufacture of boots and shoes, retiring two years ago. At one time he was engaged in business with his brother Arthur H. Cook, under the firm name of F. E. & A. H. Cook, and more recently he was associated with Aurora Sterling, carrying on business under the name of Cook, Sterling & Co.

He is survived by a widow and one son, Robert H. Cook, and more recently he has the entire company in their great and sudden bereavement.
