After two meetings of the colonial premiers, there does not seem to be a presence of reaching any conductions in

prospect of reaching any conclusions in the immediate future. The question of Imperial defence was first considered by the distinguished visitors. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the premier of Canada, and Sir John Gordon Sprigg, the prime minister of Cape Colony, appear to differ materially from Edmund Barton, premier of Australia, and Richard J. Seddon, prime minister of New Zealand, as to what the colonies ought to do. Mr. Seddon is heing constantly employed as apokesman, both in and out of the council, and this has given rise to no little jealousy among his brother premiers. Canadian circles openly express dissatisfaction and declare that Sir Wilfrid is not being treated with the deference due to a man whose Imperial statesmanship is so universally admired.

In the fight against the suspension of the constitution of Cape Colony Sir John Gordon Sprigg had a tacit support from all the colonial premiers, who feared that the suspension might create a precedent most dangerous to their constitutions. It is said that before the premier of Cape Colony attained his purpose unusually sharp passages occurred between himself and Mr. Chamberlain, the colonial secretary. The decision of the British cabinet not to suspend Cape Colony's constitution is taken to be a serious blow to Lond Milner's prestige. The latter openly opposed the premier, and Sir John's victory is not fikely to improve relations which were already strained.



Coal lands may be purchased at \$10.00
per acre for soft coal, and \$20.00 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by one individual or company.
Royalty at such rate as may from time to time be specified by Order in Council shall be collected on the gross output.

QUARTZ.

In place may locate a claim 1,500x1,500 feet by marking out the same with two legal posts, bearing location notices, one at each end on the line of the lode or vein.
