THE NEWER SORTS.—SERIES A.

Price:—From 4-inch pots, grown to single stem and flower, November delivery, except noted, each, 75c.

- Ada H. Le Roy.**—A fine symmetrically-formed variety, petals cupped full to the center; color deep rose-pink, extra large flower.
- A. Ladenberg.**—A full and extremely double Japanese variety of immense size, having been grown 10 inches across; clear delicate rose pink.
- Beacon.**—(FEWKES.) Magnificent full creamy white double flower with strong stems. The color is very delicate and pleasing. Silver medal.
- Clara Bertermann.**—(BERTERMANN.) Old gold. Sport of John Collins with flowers of same shape, opens at first a bronze color, with purplish stripes underneath and changes to beautiful golden color.
- Col. Wm. B. Smith.**—An immense double high built flower, petals very broad and large, forming a mass of the richest bright golden bronze. 75c.
- Eva Hoyt.**—An immense double Japanese bloom, of clearest and brightest yellow, a solid ball with full high built center.
- Emma Hitzeroth.**—A magnificent extra large flower, petals broad and peculiarly arranged completely filling the center. Bright lemon yellow.
- Goguae.**—Sport of Mrs. Irwin Clark. Identical in every respect, except color which is white.
- Golden Gate.**—(Imported Japanese 1890.) Certificate at Chicago. Tawuey yellow quite distinct, full center, large spreading flowers, slightly whorled, regular form. Stout stems, long wide petals of good substance. Good cut flower variety.
- George W. Childs.**—(THORPE) The flowers are of massive size, reflexed with broad petals. Color deep rich velvety crimson with no shade of brown or chestnut. Flowers borne on strong, stiff stems, the foliage resembles Cullingfordi, but is much heavier and darker, growing close up to the flower which gives it an elegant appearance. A fine strong grower. Price \$1 00.
- Geo. Savage.**—Incurved white solid ball.
- Harry Balsey.**—A fine cut flower variety, color a pearl pink, shading to mermet pink.
- Herald.**—Yellow notched, tubular petals.
- Harry May.**—Flower very large, and double, forming a massive sphere; deep old gold, occasionally veined red; petals broad and thick.
- King's Daughter.**—(Imported Japanese, 1891.) White. Certificate at Chicago and Minneapolis. Pure snow white, center petals irregularly drooping. Stout stem, very showy, loose, pure Japanese style; flowers very large.
- Lillian Russell.**—A beautiful broad-petaled, clear silvery pink.
- Mrs. Georgie Coles.**—(Imported Japanese, 1891.) Garnet purple, reverse of petals lighter, large glittering flowers, very double and reflexed, inner petals whorled, distinct color and shape.
- Mrs. Jerome Jones.**—(GANE.) White. Prize winner at Boston. Large, cream white, incurved Japanese, sometimes showing a tinge of pink; high, rounded flower, the true highest type of best Chrysanthemum flowers to date.
- Mrs. L. C. Maderia.**—A perfect compact globe of bright orange color; petals upright like unopened pointed quills; constitution strong; stems stiff; flowers large and of the heaviest substance.
- Mrs. Senator Hearst.**—(Imported Japanese.) White. Very distinct and curious, early, color creamy white, petals very long, flat, of various widths.
- Mrs. Gov. Fifer.**—White flat flowers, broad petals.
- Mrs. J. W. Morrissey.**—Silvery pink shaded rose.
- Miss Ada McVicker.**—Creamy white, reflexed.
- Mrs. E. D. Adams.**—White, reflexed, prize winner.
- Mrs. C. D. Avery.**—Deep yellow, perfectly double.
- Mrs. M. Colgate.**—White, solid ball.
- Olga.**—(RIEMAN.) Pink. Winner of \$25 00 Prize and Certificate for best pink at Indianapolis. It is a fine, well-built flower on stiff stem, full and double to the center. Color, soft rose with magenta shading.
- Patrick Barry.**—The new golden yellow hairy Chrysanthemum; flowers very large, of the brightest golden shade; habit vigorous and tall; stems stiff and erect. This is the grandest introduction from Japan during the past year.
- Roslyn.**—Mermet pink, very fine.
- Secretary Farson.**—(SURMAN.) Bronze, when opened changing to clear yellow. Probably the most double incurved variety in cultivation, forming a perfect sphere.
- Shenandoah.**—Deep chestnut brown, flowers of immense size, full and double to the center.
- Spartel.**—Rose pink. Style, Mrs. A. Hardy.
- Vivian Morel.**—(French Importation.) Deep pink one of the best new flowers seen in 1891. A necessity in every florist's collection.
- Zambesi.**—Bright yellow, dwarf growth, flowers very large, resembles Mrs. A. Hardy in its hairy petals.
