## MR. JUSTICE DUFF FOR SUPREME COURT

### British Columbia Representative Appointed Member of Highest Tribunal of Canada - Leaves for Ottawa Wednesday.

Mr. Justice Duff, who since February, 1904, has been a member of the Supreme Court Bench of British Columbia, has accepted the vacancy on the Supreme Court of Canada. He will leave Victoria on Wednesday morning for Ottawa in order to be sworn in to the highest court for the Dominion. The appointment is a very popular one with the exception of the fact that the province is sorry to lose him from the provincial court. There is no question as to his ability to do honor to the province and to reflect credit upon the province from which he goes.

Among the legal men of British Columbia none have had a more brilliant career than has Mr. Justice Duff. Without the least disparagement to the members of the Supreme Court of British Columbia, it can be said that although one of the latest members appointed to the bench there was none whose judgments were accepted by the profession as better than those of Mr. Justice Duff.

He was born in Meaford, Ont., in 1852, being the son of the late Rev. Chas. Duff, a prominent clergyman in the Congregational church. He graduated in Arts from Toronto University, taking the degree of B.A. in 1888, and that of LL.B. in the following year.

During his course in the University he had a brilliant scholastic career, graduating with first class honors in mathematics and metaphysics. He was also president of the literary society during one of his years, and was a prize winner in public speaking.

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## VICTIMS OF THE 'FRISCO DISASTER

### BODIES FOUND IN RUINS OF LODGING HOUSE

Building Was Overturned by Earthquake - Remains of Scores of Inmates Unearthed.

(Associated Press.)  
San Francisco, Sept. 24. - Another tragedy of the great fire of April 18th was brought to light through the finding of a score of human bodies in the ruins of a lodging house on Fifth and Minna streets. The lodging house, which was a four-story frame building, was tossed bodily into Minna street by a heap by the earthquake, and immediately took fire. It is said that the fire south of Market originated in the house.

Fifty persons were in the place at the time of the earthquake, only seven of whom have been accounted for. Mrs. Murray, the landlady, has never been heard from by friends, and it is thought that her body is among those found. She is said to have a wealthy daughter in New York city.

## TRUBLE AT THE FERNIE MINES

### REGARDING EMPLOYMENT OF NON-UNION MEN

Two Hundred Miners' Absent From Work Saturday - Company Claim They are Breaking Contract.

(Special to the Times.)  
Ferne, Sept. 22. - It looks very much as if there would be a strike at Coal Creek colliery. To-day out of 900 men employed at the mine only 700 were present for work. These were all non-union men.

The matter of non-union men being employed is the cause of the trouble. On September 6th the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Co. received the following communication from the secretary of the local union: "I am instructed to notify your company that we intend to cease work with non-union men at your Coal Creek mines and Fernie colliery, and we stand ready to suspend operations when called upon."

Printed notices were then posted as follows: "Acting under instructions of resident Mitchell, we hereby give all non-union miners notice that ten days after this date, September 14th, we will cease work with non-union miners."

The Crow's Nest Pass Coal Co. company has this day posted a notice that all miners not presenting themselves for work on Monday, 24th inst., will be dismissed. The company claim that the miners are breaking their contract by having their grievances arbitrated.

## SOLDIERS AND POLICE GUARD CITY

### LARGE FORCE STILL ON DUTY AT ATLANTA

### Ten Negroes Believed to Have Been Killed - Race Trouble Almost at End.

(Associated Press.)  
Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 23. - Following the riot of Saturday night and Sunday morning, there were unconfirmed rumors of a white man killed by negroes to-day and of a negro being shot to pieces by enraged whites. Governor Terrell has ordered to Atlanta several companies of state militia, which have arrived and are on duty in the streets. With the local companies the force of militia on duty is something more than 1,000 men, besides a battery of light artillery held in reserve.

The estimates of dead are still uncertain, but there seems to be no reason to believe last night's loss of sixteen negroes and one white man will be decreased. The report from Grady hospital says eight negroes were admitted to the wards of the hospital last night. Twenty-seven cases for medical attention and were admitted. Two are in a critical condition and two died during the night. A meeting of citizens, bankers and business and professional men, representing the best element of Atlanta citizenship, was held to-day to consider the present emergency. Speeches were made and warmly applauded, in which the killing of innocent and the wounding of a score of negroes were referred to as a reflection on the city, the state and the south. The heralding of assaults on women by negroes in flaring headlines in the press was condemned in unmeasured terms and it was urged that hereafter no special editions announcing these details be published. The closing of low negro dives, in which it was declared more of the crime among the negro classes has its origin, was advocated.

Throughout last night the race war went with varying ebbs, and when morning dawned to-day it found the downtown streets in possession of eight companies of the Fifth Georgia infantry with a battery of light artillery in reserve.

This condition came as the result of numerous and repeated assaults upon white women by negroes. Late in the evening about 10 o'clock a negro man shoved a white woman from the sidewalk on Whitehall street in the centre of the town. Almost simultaneously a negro woman made an insulting remark to a white man on an adjoining street and he administered what he considered due punishment.

EXPRESS ENGINEER DIED AT HIS POST

BRavery PREVENTED RAILWAY DISASTER

Accidents in the East in Which Three Lives Were Lost—Woman Burned to Death.

Napanee, Sept. 21.—At 2.35 this morning a collision occurred on the Grand Trunk railway just west of this town, between express No. 2 from Toronto and a freight train, resulting in the death of Frank Blaine, engineer of No. 2. The night was foggy and the engineer did not see the freight until they were upon it. When he saw the danger Engineer Blaine called to his fireman to jump, but he himself stuck to his post, and applied the brakes and had it not been for his bravery, another Azilda disaster might have been repeated on the Grand Trunk railway. The body of the engineer was frightfully mutilated. His hand was upon the brakes when released. The crew of the freight train jumped and escaped with slight injuries.

She was so badly burned that she cried to the doctors not to let her live when she was taken to the hospital.

Body Recovered. St. Thomas, Ont., Sept. 21.—A body was found on the lake shore near Port Burwell, which was identified as that of George Whittitt of Courtright, who was one of the crew of the Tasmania, which sank in Lake Erie last October. The body will be sent to Courtright for burial.

Lawyer's Sudden Death. St. Mary's Ont., Sept. 21.—J. A. Donohoe, B. A., barrister of this town, dropped dead suddenly on the street. He had not been ailing, and death came unexpectedly, caused by heart trouble. Mr. Donohoe was but in his thirties. He was born here, and was a candidate for parliamentary honors in the Liberal interests a few years ago.

MOROCCO SITUATION. It is Becoming Menacing—Sultan's Authority Non-Existent.

Tangier, Sept. 22.—The situation in Morocco is becoming daily more menacing. European property at Taflet, Raf, Mogador, Casablanca, and even Tangier is threatened. Natives are organizing and equipping as if for a holy war, and the Sultan's authority is non-existent. The Sheikhs in the Marakech region have demanded complete autonomy. Up to the present time the Sultan has succeeded in preventing the big feudatories from uniting, but their power is growing daily. They intend to raise taxes, raise taxes and expel officials sent by the Sultan. Sheriff Elk-senteh of Fez, one of the bitterest anti-European, is going to Marakech on a mission to preach to the tribes against the European population. Raisuli has nearly recovered from his recent illness.

TRAIN WRECKED. Struck a Cow Asleep Between the Rails—The Fireman Killed.

Syracuse, N. Y., Sept. 22.—The Syracuse bound train on the R. W. & O. railway, leaving Oswego at 5.35 p. m., with 100 passengers aboard, was wrecked at Battle Island, seven miles from Oswego, and Samuel Wadrig, of Oswego, the fireman, was killed, his body being pinned under the driving wheels of the locomotive. The train had left a steep grade and was making fast time when the engine struck a cow asleep between the rails. The engine, baggage car, smoker, and one coach left the track. None of the passengers got hurt.

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ROSSLAND CAMP. Rich Ore in the Centre Star—Most Important Strike Ever Made in the Mine.

Roseland, Sept. 22.—The new ore chute on the 1,600 foot level of the Centre Star is the talk of the town. It is 40 feet in width and assays 48 to the ton. It is believed by some that the second enrichment of the ore, similar to that found in the deep levels of the mines of Butte, has been found here.

The members of the Canadian Society of Civil Engineers, who were here yesterday, were shown the big ore chute and were amazed at its width and extent. It is probably the most important chute of ore that has ever been uncovered in the Centre Star, and will yield a good many dividends for the stockholders of the Consolidated Mining Company.

The War Eagle, another of the Consolidated Company's mines, is reported to be looking exceedingly well. The lower levels of the Le Roi and the section west of the Josie Dike are also turning out remarkably well. There is considerable probability of a move which will include the Giant, California and Novelty, three very promising properties on Red Mountain, which are now lying idle. People close to the Great Northern are said to be engineering the deal.

THREE NEGROES KILLED. And Several Fatally Injured in Race War at Atlanta, Georgia.

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 21.—Four attempts at assault on white women by negroes within or near the limits of the city today wrought white citizens here to a high pitch of excitement.

A negro walking along Whitehall street, the principal shopping section, was attacked about 7 o'clock, beaten and escaped with few clothes. The news of this attack spread rapidly and within a few moments the appearance of a negro was feared from the negroes, going to their homes by back alleys, or hooked to De-catur street, the home of part of the negro elements. Soon after cars were attacked and negroes going to their homes were taken from the cars and beaten, stamped upon and in several cases fatally hurt.

The barber shops where negroes were employed next became the objects of attack. One of the hardest fights of the night took place about the post office. A negro barber, who was called out by the object of attack, the shop was wrecked and the negroes were beaten, one to death, the other proprietors escaping by the aid of the police.

On Peters street a hard fight took place. This was started by a negro shooting at the crowd below from a second story window. A bullet hit and killed one negro, who was found with a pistol in his hand, was beaten to death on the viaduct, in the centre of the city.

Grand Forks, Sept. 22.—Some seventy-five members of the Canadian Society of Civil Engineers, some of whom are accompanied by their wives and daughters, arrived here last evening. They will make Grand Forks their headquarters until Sunday evening, visiting Greenwood, Phoenix and other points of interest during the two days. The civic authorities and the board of trade will entertain the distinguished visitors. Several hundred colored electric lights are decorating the streets and business is practically suspended.

The funeral of Gen. Nikoloff, who was assassinated on Wednesday last, was held at Warsaw on Saturday. Fear of the throwing of bombs, the authorities prohibited all traffic on the principal streets, and other extraordinary precautions were taken during the funeral. The burial passed without incident.

THE SEALING QUESTION. London Dispatch Says Negotiations Are Making Headway.

London, Sept. 22.—With the increasing interest in Canadian affairs, there has been a revival in England of the discussion of the negotiations that Sir Mortimer Durand, the British ambassador at Washington, has been carrying on with the American government for the settlement of the various questions in dispute between Canada, Newfoundland and the United States.

As far as the fisheries question with the ancient colony is concerned, the points of difference are settled. Sir Mortimer and the state department at Washington having practically arrived at an understanding.

Of the outstanding questions affecting Canada, that of sealing is causing the greatest difficulty, but here again the British ambassador and the state department are making headway. Canada. It is thought, appears to be more favorably disposed toward the American proposal for the entire stopping of pelagic sealing, with compensation to the Canadian affected thereby. Sir Mortimer has kept in close touch with the Canadian authorities during the negotiations, the foreign office considering this to have been better than the Canadian suggestion made early in the year, for the appointment of a Canadian commission to advise the ambassador on Canadian affairs. This Great Britain declined to agree to. It was considered hardly likely such an appointment would be acceptable to the United States, no matter who was the appointee, as he probably would have been considered the special advocate of Canada.

**COWICHAN HOLDS SUCCESSFUL SHOW**  
 GOOD AGRICULTURAL AND STOCK DISPLAYS  
 Interesting Programme of Sports Carried Off—Many Outside Visitors to the Exhibition.

As the Victoria train rumbled up to the depot at Duncan on Saturday morning the crowds, who had come to see the annual exhibition under the auspices of the Cowichan Agricultural Association, were welcomed by the strains of music from the Kuper Indian band. The sun was shining and it seemed as though the entire population of the little town was on hand to greet the outsiders, so that the latter were made to feel perfectly "at home" and in the humor to enjoy the pleasures of the occasion. The fair brings with it festivity to residents of Duncan and the surrounding district. They turned en masse, enter into the programme prepared by the agricultural society with absolute abandon, and plainly enjoy the brief respite from daily routine. Their high spirits lend to the atmosphere a feeling of holiday gaiety which affects the visitor and soon the latter finds himself entering into the events with no less interest. Thus during exhibition time Duncan is a carnival centre at which one and all have a thoroughly good time. Saturday was no exception, despite the fact that a shower of rain caused some inconvenience during the afternoon.

The exhibition proper was not equal to that of previous years in respect to the quantity of the displays, but those shown were of the highest quality. It is no reflection upon the management to say that the fair did not come up to the standard of an agricultural standpoint. Under the circumstances it could scarcely be expected to because practically all the farms on the opposite side of the Cowichan river were barred from entering the exhibition. The bridge over the river being repaired and is not in such shape as to permit vehicles to pass over. Therefore anyone wishing to bring over large exhibits had to drive for miles and miles out of the regular route before being able to ford the stream. Very few took the trouble of doing this, and consequently the show had to rely for its support principally from the farmers located on the Duncan side of the river. When this fact is taken into consideration it is safe to say that the majority of Victorians present will agree that the exhibition was a credit to those responsible for its arrangement. Really the difference was not so striking as it is noticeable, the discrepancy in numbers, as already stated, being made up for by the improvement in quality throughout.

It would be out of the question to enter into a full description of all that was on exhibition in the neatly decorated hall. But there were some displays so striking that it would be just to pass them over without some special mention. For instance, there was a bunch of English corn standing fully sixteen feet high in the stock grown by G. T. Corfield. Nearby were some fine specimens of musk melon from the property of A. B. Wille, taken from the property of A. B. Wille, and some splendid squashes from A. H. Holmes' farm. Among the fruit there were some collections which would be hard to excel in point of size, coloring, and perfection of shape. This applies not only to the apples, but to almost all the prize winners on exhibition. The competition for first places was very keen, the judges in many cases hesitating before deciding upon which was entitled to receive the honors. Then there were grapes and peaches, which are generally believed to need a more tropical climate than that of Vancouver Island in order to thrive. Some of the latter were taken from the orchard of W. B. Robertson. The latter kindly presented one of these peaches to a Times representative, who has no hesitation in saying that not in point of size, coloring and flavor—particularly the favoring—can Mr. Robertson's fruit be beaten by the best.

A pleasant feature of the exhibition was the art exhibit. Here was found an excellent piece of water glass work by Mrs. C. E. Walker, representing sunset on the Spanish Arm. There were other paintings of little less merit. In addition several poems by children of extreme youth were exhibited, as "The Birds," "The Woods," etc., occupied prominent places on the wall. These were well worth reading, and certainly demonstrated that the rather romantic atmosphere that surrounds the quiet town of Duncan has all inspiring effect upon the budding literature of the young here. Among the ladies' work also were things worth viewing. There was a pretty piece of drawn-thread work by Miss Kingston, but best of all was a beautiful specimen of Battenberg lace designed and executed by Miss M. Anderson. The exhibit of flowers also was excellent,

outclassing that of last year in every respect.  
 Of the stock it is impossible to speak of it in too praiseworthy terms. Here also it was apparent that the unfortunate combination of circumstances aforementioned had interfered with the entry. But that there was of first-class quality, the cattle were splendid, the sheep all that could be desired, the horses as good as could be found anywhere upon the coast collectively speaking, but the swine carried the day. This is particularly so in the Walberton Poland class. These were entered by Irvine and Lenoze. They included a boar and a sow, which had won prizes at New Westminster and other large fairs. Several of the latter "got" magnificent pigs, although only a few months of age, and with a record of having added over a pound a day to their weight since the day of birth, were exhibited. These attracted marked attention among the buyers in attendance.

Early in the afternoon the crowds began to pour into the exhibition grounds, and soon the sports were in full progress. There was first an exhibition-baseball match between the Hillside (Victoria), and Duncan baseball teams. It resulted in a victory for the latter by a score of 14 to 8 runs. The game was keenly contested. Up to within a couple of innings of the finish the visiting nine were well ahead. Then, however, the Duncan batters began to find Melmoyl, the Hillside pitcher, and soon ran up a score which placed victory in their hands by a decided margin. Following this was the juvenile meet, for which an excellent programme had been prepared, and which resulted as follows:  
 100 yard race for boys of 15 years and under—First, Abraham Point; second, E. Bassett; third, A. Ford.  
 75 yards race for boys of 12 years and under—First, Robert Jeffrey; second, W. Jeffrey.

 Sack race for boys, 16 years and under—First, H. Ford; second, A. Ford.  
 Thread and needle race—First, Violet Hamilton; second, Edna Miller.

The gymnastics sports were much enjoyed. They started rather late, opening with a tug-of-war on horse back, in which the contending teams were those of Stemsman, South Cowichan and Duncan. After a hard struggle the former won out with the Cowichan team second. In the thread and needle race George Mutter crossed the line first while the second place was taken by B. James. Other events were being arranged as the Victoria train left the station.

Appended is a complete list of judges: Fruit, S. Macpherson and P. Laxton; vegetables, S. McMillan; dairy produce, bread, jam and flowers, Miss Rose, from the agricultural department, Ottawa; fancy work, Mrs. Davies; paintings, L. Springett; sheep and pigs, Mr. Elliott; poultry, James Flett and S. Woodton; horses, P. Dalzell and Mr. Brett; cattle, Mr. Elliott; Kenneth A. Duncan, the honorary secretary, is to be congratulated upon the smoothness with which the arrangements were carried through. With the able assistance of J. E. Hall and Frank A. Harrison, the energetic secretary, was able to attend to every detail with a thoroughness which permitted everything to run along like well-lubricated machinery. There wasn't a hitch anywhere, and to the gentlemen mentioned are due the congratulations of all interested in the success of Cowichan's annual exhibition.

As stated, there were a large number of Victorians and other visitors in attendance. Among these were noticed Hon. Wm. Topleman, Minister of Inland Revenue; Ralph Smith, M. P., and Mrs. Smith, J. A. Macdonald, M. P., J. L. Drury, M. P., and Mrs. Drury. All united in praise of the outing, the entertainment and the hospitality of residents of Duncan having contributed to a day of extreme pleasure.

**THROWN FROM HORSE**  
 J. F. Barber, of Kamloops, Met His Death on the Nicola Road.

An accident attended with fatal results occurred this week on the Nicola road about a mile from Mrs. Palmer's ranch," says Saturday's Kamloops Standard. "John F. Barber, an old-time resident of the town, was returning on Tuesday afternoon to Collett's ranch with G. McLean. Barber was riding some distance ahead of his companion and when about a mile past the Nicola road, he was thrown from his horse. McLean rode to Collett's for assistance and when he returned Barber was removed to the house, where everything was done to restore him to consciousness, but without avail. Dr. Tuthill was sent for, and on his arrival a thorough examination was made, and it was found that the body was completely paralyzed, death resulting at 5:45 on Wednesday morning. # KILMARNOCK CUP CONTEST POSTPONED

## SITUATION EXPLAINED BY ONE OF TRUSTEES

Rev. W. W. Bolton Gives Reason for Calling Off New Lacrosse Series—Sporting Notes.

The revision committee of the British Columbia Amateur Lacrosse Association, which met on Saturday night at Vancouver to discuss the work done by each member of the committee and discuss the same.

The following week is full of lacrosse at New Westminster, and the men are anxious to lay their stakes up by then. The three clubs believe our financial needs, and the fact that we are not seniors, to get full return for our efforts in securing the Kilmarnock cup for the game throughout the province.

However, even this has been offered by one team, the Maple Leafs, who have most generously proposed to come down after the Westminster fair, paying all their expenses, and giving the other two teams a very full share of the gate receipts.

It is to be noted in connection with the Kilmarnock cup that the contest is a matter apart from the succeeding ones. At the latter, each team is compelled to pay its own expenses, getting an even share, however, of the gate receipts.

The offer was made by the trustees to play for the cup at once on the Mainland, as by that time they could not meet. Some thought lightly of debt in connection with sport, but the board cannot look at it in that way.

# A BY-LAW.

To Raise \$200,000 For Water Works Purposes.

Whereas a petition, under Section 9 of the Municipal Clauses Act, has been presented to the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Victoria, signed by the owners of more than one-tenth of the value of the real property in the City of Victoria, as shown by the last revised Assessment Roll, requesting the said Council to authorize a By-Law to raise the sum of \$200,000 for improvements to the Waterworks system of the City, viz: construction of a reservoir at Smith's Hill, connecting this reservoir with a high level tank, the construction of a high level tank at some point between St. Charles street and Rockland avenue, the construction of the Smith's Hill reservoir with the distribution system; the construction of a pumping station and water mains on the shore of the lakes and shores, measuring water shed of the Highland District; obtaining information, etc., as to the available water supply, and incidental works.

And whereas the Council desire to give effect to such petition in manner hereinafter appearing.

And whereas the whole ratable land and improvements or real property of the Corporation of the City of Victoria, according to the last revised Assessment Roll for the year 1906, was \$4,821,800.00.

And whereas the total amount required to be raised annually by rate for paying the debt which will be used hereunder, and the interest thereon, and for creating an annual sinking fund for the payment of the said debt within fifty years, according to law, is \$9,310,000.

And whereas it will require an annual sum of the said sum of \$200,000.00 in order to pay the new debt and interest, and whereas this By-Law may not be altered or repealed except with the consent of the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council.

Therefore the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Victoria enact as follows:

1. It shall be lawful for the Mayor of the Corporation of the City of Victoria to borrow upon the credit of the Corporation, by way of debentures hereinafter mentioned, from any person or persons or body or bodies corporate or unincorporated, or any individual or individuals, or any firm or firms, or any company or companies, a sum of money not exceeding in the whole the sum of \$200,000.00.

2. It shall be lawful for the said Mayor to cause any number of debentures to be issued, each debenture to be of the denomination of \$100.00, either in currency or sterling money, at the rate of 4 1/2 per cent. on the one-pound sterling, and to be secured by the said sum of \$200,000.00 to be paid into the hands of the Treasurer of the said Corporation for the purposes of the said debentures.

3. The said debentures shall bear date the 15th day of October, 1906, and shall be payable by the said Mayor, on or before the 15th day of October, 1907, and thereafter, at such place, either in the Dominion of Canada, Great Britain or the United States of America, as may be directed by the said Mayor, and shall have attached to them coupons for the payment of the interest, and the signatures of the Mayor, which coupons may be either written, stamped, printed or lithographed.

4. The said debentures shall bear interest at the rate of four per cent. per annum from the date thereof, which interest shall be payable half yearly, at such place, either in the Dominion of Canada, Great Britain or the United States of America, as may be directed by the said Mayor, and shall have attached to them coupons for the payment of the interest, and the signatures of the Mayor, which coupons may be either written, stamped, printed or lithographed.

5. It shall be lawful for the said Mayor to cause the said debentures and interest coupons, either or both, to be made payable at such place, either in the Dominion of Canada, Great Britain or the United States of America, as may be desired.

6. It shall be lawful for the Mayor of the said Corporation to issue the said debentures at a rate below par, and to authorize the Treasurer to pay out of the moneys raised by the sale of the said debentures, all expenses connected with the preparation and issue of the said debentures and coupons, or any discount or commission or other charges incidental to the issue of the said debentures.

7. If deemed advisable by the Mayor, there shall in the said debentures be reserved to the Corporation the right to any future consolidation of the debentures issued in pursuance of this By-Law, and in each debenture issued under a clause conditioned for such substitution may be inserted.

8. For the purpose of raising annually the required sum for the payment of the interest on the said debentures during the currency thereof, there shall be raised annually the sum of \$8,000.00, and for the purpose of creating the sinking fund thereon, there shall be raised annually the sum of \$130,000.

9. For the purpose of the payment of the said sums in the next preceding paragraph mentioned there shall be raised and added to the said sinking fund the sum of a mill in the dollar on all the ratable land and improvements in the City of Victoria, during the continuance of the said debentures or any of them.

10. This By-Law shall be subject to the assent of the Mayor, and shall be subject to the assent of the Mayor, and shall take effect on the 15th day of October, 1906.

11. This By-Law may be cited as the "Waterworks Loan By-Law, 1906."

REACHED DESTINATION AHEAD OF SCHEDULE

The Empress of China Made Fast Trip Across the Pacific With Oriental Mail.

(Associated Press.)  
 Montreal, Sept. 24.—The C. P. R. steamer Empress of China arrived at Hongkong at 9 a. m. yesterday, delivering the mails from Great Britain in twenty-nine days, seven hours and thirty-five minutes, or four hours and twenty-five minutes within the time allowed by the post office. This successful inauguration of the fast mail service between Liverpool and Hongkong under the flag of the C. P. R. Co. is particularly gratifying, the entire half circuit of the globe having been made without a hitch or without interference with the ordinary routine work of the road. The Oriental mails left Liverpool Friday, August 24th, at 7 p. m. on the Empress of Ireland, which reached Quebec at 2.10 a. m. the following Friday, were carried across the North American continent on the Overseas mail train, which arrived at Vancouver sharp on time at 6 a. m. Tuesday, September 4th, and were then taken by the Empress of China, which arrived at Hongkong, her destination, nearly four and a half hours ahead of time. The distance covered was nearly 13,000 miles.

ELECTION CASES

Five Appeals to Be Heard at Next Sitting of Supreme Court.

 Ottawa, Sept. 24.—Five election appeals have been inscribed at the Supreme court. The first on the list is St. Anne's election, Galleries vs. Darling. There is also the Shelburne and Queen's elections, the appeal being Cowie vs. Fielding. The record in the Fielding case has been returned for some formal matters which have not been carried out in the record. It is expected to be returned in time for the opening of the court on October 2nd.

 Paris, Sept. 24.—The Temps says it learns from an absolutely trustworthy source that the latest consultations of medical advisers of the Sultan of Turkey established the fact that Abdul Hamid was suffering from cancer of the kidney. This malady, the paper says, does not permit of an operation being performed, and is usually fatal within a year.

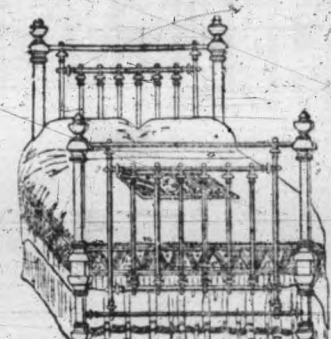

**NORTH WARD PARK.**  
 By-Law for Purchase of Grounds Before Ratepayers To-Day.  
 Voting is taking place at the market building to-day on a by-law providing for the raising of \$2,000 for the purchase of a portion of the Finlayson estate, North Ward district. There are two schemes submitted to the ratepayers. The first is for the borrowing of the amount mentioned in the customary way and the second for the raising of that fund upon the mortgage of their tax amount to be returned from the proceeds received from the sale of civic lands in James Bay and other districts. Up to noon approximately one hundred votes had been recorded, an evidence of the small amount of interest taken in the by-law by the general public. But a committee of North Ward residents are out after supper, and the results of their energy should be felt before the polling booth closes. In this connection it might be stated that the doors will be open until 7 o'clock, thus allowing those whose employment prevents them from voting during the day time to do so early in the evening.

**PONDO, OUTBOUND.**  
 Sailed for New Zealand on Saturday With 6,000 Tons of Cargo.  
 Carrying six thousand tons of cargo the Pondo sailed for New Zealand points. This is the largest general cargo ever taken from Vancouver for the Antipodes by any single vessel. The principal item in the cargo is a consignment of 4,200,000 feet of lumber, 2400 and 2400, which the Pondo received at the Hastings mill. Five hundred tons of articles of Canadian manufacture for exhibition at the international exposition at Christchurch, New Zealand, were also carried by the Pondo, besides several hundred tons of potatoes and two thousand cases of salmon. The Pondo called off the outer wharf on route in sea.
