# INVESTIGATION AT

To Learn If War Supplies Caused Explosion

Decomposition of New Product Preceded Disaster

Paris. Sept. 23.—French Government chemists have begun an investigation at Oppau. Germany, wherestseveral hundred persons were killed by an explosion on Wednesday, to determine whether secret war stores and munitions had been secretly manufactured there, says a Mayence dispatch to The Journal. Their inquiry has shown the explosion was due to the spontaneous decomposition of a new product, nitro-sulphate of ammonia, from which wonders were expected as a fertilizer. The manufacture of this had been going on in the plant of the Badische Aniline Company at Oppau for the last five months and considerable stocks of it had accumulated. It is declared in the dispatch that this practice "appears to have been grossly imprudefit," as ammonia compounds are most unstable and the properties of the pew preparation are poorly defined.

### **NOTED FRENCH** AVIATOR KILLED

Plane Traveling 180 Miles an Hour; Canvas Split

Etamps, France, Sept. 25.—Captain Bernard de Romanet, the noted French aviator, holder of the world's speed record for one kilometre, was instantly killed here to-day while taking part in the elimination races for the Deutsch de la Maureth Cup.

The canvas on Romanet's machine split while he was flying more than 180 miles an hour at a height of 650 feet and the plane fell. The machine was a biplane from which the lower plane had been removed to obtain greater speed.

Captain de Romanet's world's rec-ord for speed was established on No-vember 4 last, when at the Buc aero-drome, near Paris, he flew over a measured kilometre at the rate of 20% kilometres 12 metres per hour (about 193 miles) covering the distance in 11 .65-100 seconds.

#### **RUSSIA RECEIVES** POLISH ULTIMATUN

Moscow Soviet Says Russians Desire Peace

Riga, Sept. 22.—A Polish ultimatum expiring October 5 was handed the Russian Soviet Government on Monday last, says a radio message from Moscow to-day. After Trotzky's announcement of the ultimatum, according to the radio, the Moscow Soviet adopted a resolution declaring Russia wanted peace and was prepared to make every effort to get it, but warned its enemies that no attack would catch Russia napping.

According to local Bolshevik sources, Poland's principal demand is for payment of the 30,000,000 gold rubles provided for in the Treaty of Riga, while Russia refuses to pay this sum until General Borts Savinkoff and other anti-Bolshevik leaders whom Russia charges Poland with aiding have been expelled from Poland. Russia, these sources say, wishes to appoint a commission to settle the difficiently.

A Warsaw dispatch to The London Times of September 15 said General Savinkoff had left Poland on his own initiative for a definite period.

### **ONLY TRUE TEST** IS TRAPNEST SAYS WILLOWS DISPLAY

Fair is the first public demonstration by the Poultry Division of the Federal Department of Agriculture of the value of trapnesting records and discoveries made in the past three years through the extensive experiments which have been in hand.

This trapnesting is termed 'Record on by individual poultry owners all over the country, with periodic and irregular inspections by officials of the Dominion Government.

The intent of the new service to poultrymen is twofold. It originated through the widespread practice of poultrymen raising show stock selling their off-grade bigds as 'bredat orlay' birds.
