Married into the Shimazu family, one of the two chief feudal clans responsible for the Meiji Restoration in 1968, which connection has undoubtedly been an asset in his career. (65)

Has spent many years either in China or in positions directly concerned with Asiatic affairs. While Minister at large in 1938 made an extensive investigation trip throughout China, after which he advised strong economic development in North China by means of mixed Sino-Japanese companies. Nomination in 1939 as Ambassador to France was rejected by French Government because he declined to withdraw his accusation regarding the transshipment of munitions for Chungking through French Indo-China. (75)

Has proved his willingness and ability to work with military authorities in promoting Japanese development in China. Served as Counselor of Embassy in Heinking for three years, whereas his predecessor resigned after a short time due to difficulty with the army in Manchuria. (134) Was Foreign Minister in Tojo Cabinet when formation of Greater East Asia Affairs Ministry, an army-inspired move, stripped Foreign Office of many of its most important functions, particularlyin occupied areas. (65) As Chief of Asiatic Bureau of Foreign Office was "very thick" with Toshio Shiratori, jingoistic spokesman of that Ministry, whose utterances conformed with the militarists aims. (4)

Changed places with Mamoru Shigemitsu, Ambassador to Manking, when the latter was appointed Foreign Minister in April 1943 to implement his policy toward China.

His important posts include the following: Chief, First Section of Asia Bureau in Foreign Office, 1924; Chief, Asia Bureau of Foreign Office, 1930-33; Councillor, Embassy in Manchukuo August 1933; Minister to Austria and Hungary, 1936; Minister at large in China, 1938; Vice Minister of Foreign Affairs in ABE and YONAI Cabinets under Foreign Ministers NUMURA and ARITA, 1939 -July 1940; President, Board of Information, October 1941-April 1943; Foreign Minister in TOJO Cabinet, Sept. 1942-April 1943; Ambassador to Nanking puppet regime, April 1943.

TANI has proved his willingness and ability to work with military authorities in promoting Japanese development in China. Served as Counselor of Embassy in Hakinking for three years, whereas his predecessor resigned after a short time due to difficulty with the Army in Manchuria. Was Foreign Minister in TOJO cabinet when formation of Greater East Asia Affairs Ministry, an Army-inspired move, stripped Foreign Office of many of its most important functions, particularly in occupied areas. As Chief of Asiatic Bureau of Foreign Office he intimately cooperated with EHIRATORI, Toshio, jingoistic spokesman of that Ministry, whose utterances conformed with the militarists aims.

When Foreign Minister of the TOJO Cabinet (Sept. 1942) he summed up his three basic objectives as: (1) closer cooperation among the Axis powers, (2) defeat of the United States and Britain, (3) Establishment of a new order in East Asia.

On the first anniversary of Pearl Harbor, speaking over the radio, he said: "There can be no end to the war until Britain and the United States are brought to their knees. Without the annihiliation of America there will be no true Greater East Asia sphere. Therefore, the enemy's destruction must be carried out in a most decisive manner."
