Dear Mr. Okazakit

In reply to your letter of August 19, 1950, Colonel Pulliam informs mo that this matter has been previously discussed with Mr. Masuhara. Mr. Masuhara was informed that five (5) NRP officers, one (1) to head each division of his office, would be made available. General Shepard agrees with this. Selection of officers will be made by Mr. Masuhara and Director General Saito, HRP.

In addition to the above, each company organized at reception conters (NRP Regional Schools) will have two (2) NRP officers attached who will accompany the organization to its training area or other location, and will remain with the company or detachment until their services are no longer needed. NRP is also prepared to loan other officers to negotiate contracts and assist in the supply of materials, labor, etc., at camps, training areas, and MRP schools, or wherever needed.

Mr. Masuhara was also advised that none of these MRP officers could be transferred permanently to the NPR. It is undesirable to weaken the present police forces while this new force is being organized and trained. Some recommendation can be made at a later date.

Colonel Pulliam will be available for further details.

Mr. Masuhara and Director General Saito, NRP. In addition to the above, each company organized at reception centers (NRP Regional Schools) will have two (2) NRP officers assigned and accompany the organization to training areas or other location and remain with the company or other detachment until cover is no longer needed.

In addition to the above NRP is prepared to loan other NRP officers to negotiate contracts and assist in the supply of materials, labor etc. at camps, training areas and NPR schools or wherever needed to assist the NPR.in the overall accomplishment of the mission assigned.

The policy and understanding set forth above is known to Mr. Masuhara as a result of numerous discussions. Col Pulliam has made this point quiet clear to Mr. Masuhara. This understanding is well known to Gen Shepard and Mr. Saito and the NRP staff.

"Col Pulliam also pointed out to Mr. Masuhara that none of these NRP officers would be transferred to the NPR, but that they would assist in the work until cover is no longer needed when they will return to the NRP.

"We cannot afford to weaken the present police forces while this new force is being organized and trained."

3. The above is well known to Mr. Masuhara, Gen Shepard, Mr. Saito and myself. All agreed to this schedule weeks ago.

Declassified E.O. 12065 Section 3-402/NNDG NO. 775009 THE PRIME MINISTER'S OFFICE TOKIO August 19, 1950. Dear General Willoughby, Mr. Masuhara, Chief of the National Police Reserve, told me that he was given to understand from G-2 that no officers might be taken from the existing Police (N.R.P. or Municipal Police) to the Police Reserve. As you are well aware, the important personnel of the Police Reserve should be those in whom Mr. Masuhara can have full confidence. In this sense, it is our sincere desire that a few officers be obtained from the experienced officers of the existing Police Forces who are well known to Mr. Masuhara. Mr. Masuhara discussed the matter with General Shepard. General Shepard, however, did not commit anything, and it seems that the final authority in this question rests with you. Under the circumstances, I appeal to you on behalf of Mr. Masuhara, that you will be good enough to concur to his having a few officers from the National Rural Police as Municipal Police, provided that the existing Police may not be weakened in any way by taking away such officers.
