TESTIMONY OF A FRENCH OFFICER.

TO THE EDITORS OF THE EVENING POST.
I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your issue of the 1st and 2d of September, 1862, in which you published a French officer's testimony of the valor and intelligence of the negro soldiers.

These are the blacks fought well, even in the early days of the war, when they were a despised and despised race.
