THE SMOKER. BY CHARLES H. HAM.

Of books and papers written against the use of tobacco there is no end; their name is legion. Still the "weed" holds its place in the affections of man. It malign effects upon the human system have been demonstrated (and) painted in the most vivid colors; yet the smoke of the pipe or cigar is wafted on every breeze, curls about the rafters of the old house in the country and gathers in the lace curtains of the fashionable city domicile. The gentleman smoker is every where, from the morning till night. See the old man at the farm house door, his head whitened by the snows of eighty winters, smoking a blackened pipe. His face is calm, his nerves steady, the grasp of his hand firm. If it be true that nicotine is a deadly poison and that it fits its way into the physical system of the smoker, why is the old man who has "puffed" for fifty years, still hale and hearty? According to the theories of the doctors he ought to have been nailed into his coffin a score of years ago at least. We are a nation of smokers. The young, the middle aged, the old, puff the fragrant cigar, or draw consolation from the pipe of meerschaum of briar or clay. And still are they a vigorous people, physically and intellectually; our achievements in the arts of peace and the honors of war are of the highest order.

It cannot be denied that a vast aggregate of comfort is derived from the weed. Who dares to say that smoking does not assist digestion? Behold the army of smokers at the public house for dinner. Their faces are wreathed in smiles; calm content pervades every countenance, and conversation is free and easy. Note that man who sits apart in serene repose blowing ring after ring of smoke from his lips, and then deftly sending a smaller ring through the collection he has formed. No dyspeptic could do that. If he were not at peace with all the world and his own stomach his cigar would not keep him such general company. He is a thoughtful man and his cigar enables him to reflect calmly upon the events of the day and to lay plans for the morrow. He is a merchant thinking of trade, a banker thinking of discounts, a lawyer reviewing the case that has gone to the jury, a doctor regretting the patient that is dead or congratulating himself on his success with the one that is recovering. A philosopher revolving a profound proposition in moral or physical ethics. It is only in repose that the smoker can enjoy the most delicate flavor of the weed. The cigar is, in its way, somewhat of an autocrat. Its life is brief; it must end in smoke. Why then should it not make conditions with its atmosphere? It demands, first of all, a still atmosphere; it cannot endure the storm of the wind; it must be fanned only by the gentlest zephyrs. Observe that man in the street breathing the wind, with the ugly blackened stump of a half-consumed cigar between his teeth; his fire is gone; it is a wreck and the presumptuous smoker deserves to endure the burning sensation communicated to his tongue, and the bitter, nauseous taste produced by pulling and puffing against the gale. The cigar rebels against the slightest neglect. It protests against half devotion by "going out," and when it has once lost its fire it has lost its fine flavor forever. It is as sensitive as the wild flower. It possesses a touch of selfishness. It will endure nothing but thought and amicable conversation, because it promotes the flow of both, and flourishes with them, even while it sacrifices its life to them. When the last blue wreath of smoke floats upon the air and the cigar dies, silence falls upon the smoker and he is at rest.

The cigar is an admirable protector against bores. One can endure much tedious conversation without listening to it, by the aid of a cigar. The smoker puffs forth great volumes of smoke and creates a hazy atmosphere which shields him from his disagreeable companion, and finally it settles upon the head of the inconsiderate talker, and he is in peace and goes off, and there is peace in place of a bore. The cigar is a great aid to diplomacy. The man with a cigar in his mouth always keeps cool. The diplomat who indulges in the fragrant weed feels himself behind his cigar and his face tells no tales. When the smoke wreaths curl about his head, he gains an advantage over his adversary. Smoking is a specific against family quarrels. When the angry housewife scolds, the husband, with a pipe in his mouth, pours forth a volume of smoke, regards it with complacent satisfaction as a triumph of art, replies not a word, and the dispute that was brewing comes to an end, or rather has no beginning.

The manner of handling a cigar and smoking it betrays the leading characteristics of the smoker. The timid man first makes two or three incisions in the end of the cigar with a pin, then hesitates to strike the match, then to apply it, and finally, when the cigar is alight holds it gingerly between his teeth as if fearful of inflating pain. The bold man bites off the end of the cigar fiercely, breaks two or three matches before he gets a light, puffs rapidly and heavily, and draws the fire until his tongue smartens and the end of the weed is ashed. The cautious man examines his cigar carefully to see if there is any defect in the wrapper, cuts off the end of it with a pen-knife, inspects the match to discover whether it has a sufficiency of brimstone, strikes it with slow deliberation and lights the weed gradually. The polite man hesitates about smoking at all, first declines, then reconsiders, takes a cigar and crosses the room to a gas jet, turns his back to

the company and puts his weed to the fire. The miser smokes slowly, regards his gradually consuming cigar with regret, and when there is but a half left inverts his pen-knife in the stump and holds it between his lips until his mustache is shriveled by the heat. As an index of character, the method of the smoker is a more trustworthy guide than the handwriting.

Among smokers there are many epicures; their fastidiousness is exhibited in a hundred ways. The epicurean smoker indulges his darling habit only under the most favorable circumstances, under the right place, the right time, the most favorable circumstances, must unite to entice him. Then the epicure throws himself back in his easy chair in a reclining attitude, and first carefully inspects, then lights his superb "supper" nervously, removes it from his mouth frequently, and scrutinizes the gradually forming "ash" narrowly. After making this observation he suffers the smoke to escape slowly from his lips, inclines his head slightly, and closes his eyes, permitting his face to be bathed in the ascending wreaths of blue, that every sense may sit in judgment on the quality of the cigar. If the verdict is favorable, the smoker's eyes unclose only to beam with delight, a placid smile overspreads his face, and from his now parted lips the remnant of the experimental whiff is borne forth on a sigh of grateful relief and supreme satisfaction.

The man who smokes in his best, intellectually and morally, when he smokes. It is then, if ever, that great thoughts come to him. It is then, if ever, that he forms noble resolutions. Blessed be he, and blessed be the world if these great thoughts and noble resolutions do not end in smoke! The cigar is the chief of comforters in affliction. When all other companionship fails, the cigar soothes. The silent communion between the smoker and his cigar, promotes a contentment akin to that of lovers whose hearts are too full for utterance. As the lover clasps his betrothed in his arms and draws an inspiration of eternal fidelity from her rapturous eyes, so the smoker fondles his cigar, and finds a blessed oblivion in the clouds of ever vanishing, ever renewing wreaths of smoke that circle about his head.

A French paper, earnestly deprecating blindness, says: "A bird's nest contains on an average five eggs, which would, in the natural course, become five little birds. Each little one eats daily fifty flies or other insects, and this consumption extends over four or five weeks. Taking it at an average of thirty days, we shall find the number of flies destroyed by every nest of birds to be 7,500. Now, every fly eats daily a quantity of flowers, leaves, etc., equivalent to its weight, until it attains its maximum of growth; in thirty days it will have eaten a flower a day, a flower which would have become fruit. Each fly [the term is used, we presume, for insects generally] then having, we will say, eaten thirty fruits in thirty days, the 7,500 flies which a nest of birds would have consumed cause a loss to us of 225,000 apples, or of 225,000 peaches. We commend this view of the matter to the parents of marauding children."

WESTERN NORTH CAROLINA.

Southwestern North Carolina is aptly termed the land of the skies. Marion, McDowell counties, is the center of an amphitheatre of mountains.

From twenty-five to thirty cloud-piercing peaks rise in sight. The most prominent is Mount Mitchell, 7,000 feet above sea level, and 1,700 feet higher than the White Mountains of New Hampshire.
