There is a lot of need for technical improvement throughout the wikis. But: there don't seem to be enough development resources to make these improvements happen, especially, it seems, those improvements that are most wanted by contributors with specific or local needs.

THE TECHNICAL WISHES TEAM

at Wikimedia Deutschland, a Wikimedia Chapter, has successfully established a community-centered approach to MediaWiki software development.

Originating from a survey called "Technical Wishes," set up by User:Raymond on German Wikipedia at the end of 2013, the Technical Wishes project has always been more than just that. It's an approach to collect and prioritize technical needs in a collaborative way and to support diverse groups of users through technological improvements.

The defining feature of Technical Wishes isn't the survey, it's the community-centered

process we apply, including: transparent and continuous communication, extensive research, participatory design and decision-making, as well as iterative changes, learning from failure, and finding sustainable, long-term solutions.

Over the years the Technical Wishes approach has inspired others to start similar formats, including the Wikimedia Foundation's Community Tech team [1] running the International Community Wishlist [2] on an annual basis.
