 \$18.60+ per g. - 43 ounces of Standard Gold

The deposit in question is 5.66 ounces at 837 fine equivalent to 4.73742 of pure gold or 5.2638^{gr.} of standard. These figures multiplied by \$800 and divided by 43 equals the value of his deposit in gold viz - \$97.94. The silver in the deposit is paid for at the market rate, less a small charge. -

The value of Pure gold is \$20.6718 per oz – or standard gold (ie 900 fine) is worth \$18.60 + per g. – 43 ounces of standard gold being worth exactly \$800. – This is the valuation the mint gives. –
