## FOOD RULES OF ENGLAND STRICT

Washington, May 30.-Food regu-Zations of the Allies, which probably will furnish the basis for annual entertainment given by the somewhat similar rules in the United States, are being assembled by the government.

American regulations probably will be less stringent, but that is mot deterring Herbert C. Hoover, selected for food administrator, and wither officials from giving careful study to the codes of other warring malions.

Here are some of the more striking British regulations:

For public meals the allowance of meat is based on an average of five ounces for each luncheon and dinner, and two ounces for each

Tuesdays are meatless days in London and Wednesdays elsewhere in the kingdom.

Potatoes must not be served except on meatless days and Fridays. The making of any light fancy pastries, muffins, crkumpets, fancy teacakes and other light articles of

food is prohibited. No ornamental cake or bun may he made.

Sale of bread, unless twelve hours old, is prohibited.

All bread must be sold by weight, and all loaves must be one round for an even number of pounds.

Fifteen per cent of the sugar is callowed in cakes and biscuits: 10 per cent in buns. No sugar may be used in scones.

No person shall acquire supplies of food beyond the needs of his ordinary consumption. The food con-Itroller may order the inspection of premises in which he has reason to believe that hoarding is taking

No wheat, rye, rice or tapioca may be used except for human foods.

The output of beer is limited to the rate of 10,000,000 barrels per mannum, as compared with 36,000,000 barrels before the war.

Penalty for violation of any rule Is six menths' imprisonment or 100 pounds sterling fine, or both.

William S. Brady, president of the National Association of the Motion Picture Industry, requested the Louisiana men to come to Washingfon and join the other moving picture men in their protests. It is understood that they will appeal to the Senate and get that body to modify the tax so as not to make it so prohibitive "I do not believe there's an ex-

hibitor in the United States," said Mr. Gugle, "who is not willing to do his full share to assist the federal government in financing the great conflict. But the proposed tax of 10 per c ent on the gross receipts is absoclutely out of all reasoning. This is from the viewpoint of the exhibitors as well as the patrons. We are not in a position, nor have we any desire to double the admission fee, which, in the long run, would mean that the publie must shoulder the extra cost incidental to the tax. The tay as it now stands spells absolute destruction to the motion picture industry. in so far as the exhibitors are concerned. The South is vitally interested in this matter, more so than in anything that has yet commanded the attention of the exhibitors."
