London, Oct. 25.—The almost complete silence to-day as far as the Russian southern front is concerned is causing great interest in military circles here.

REPORTED BULGARIANS HAVE LOST STRUMNITZA
London, Oct. 25.—The evacuation of Strumnitza by the Bulgarians before the vigorous attacks of the French and Serbians was reported in a dispatch received here to-day from Athens by the Exchange Telegraph company. The dispatch stated that the French lost one officer and 30 men killed and two officers and 25 men wounded.
