

Northcliffe Says WANTS DOHERTY'S All Should Work for **Conference Success** 

Declares In Vancouver That If Delegates At Washing ton Disarmament Meeting Truly Represent Nations Agreement Will Be Made.

Vancouver, Aug. 5 .- (Canadian Press) .- "If the delegates at the Washington disarmament conference truly and consistently represent the desires of their respective nations," said Lord North-cliffe, speaking before the Canadian Club at a luncheon given in his honor here to-day, "I am convinced that an agreement will be reached and an era of peace and prosperity will be opened in the Pacific. Nor will this be all. The example set will be so compelling that the movement will extend from the Pacific to Europe and throughout the world. "The limitation of armaments or, as some prefer to call it, dis-

armament, is a matter of such transcendant significance that to dismiss it in a few phrases would be unpardonable.

dismiss it in a few phrases would "You will have seen from the resolution of the British Empire Premiers, communicated to the Brit-ish House of Commons on Wednes-day, that while the British Govern-ment and those of the Dominions and India are agreed that the minimum naval standard for Empire defence is equality of strength with any one other power, precise recommendations for the maintemance of this standard should be deferred until after the fortheoming conference on disarma-ment. That is, to my mind, a very wise resolution. It recognizes by implication the great importance of the Washington conference and it re-frains from prejudging the situation which the conference may create. Saw Harding.
