A GOOD JUDGE.

Those of us who live on Vancouver Island and enjoy the manifold advantages which its climate and scenic possessions continually shower upon all and sundry are too prone to forget or ignore the commercial value of these priceless natural assets.

Just what a Californian resident thinks of Victoria and Vancouver Island may be judged from his own summary of his own impressions conveyed to The Times in an interview yesterday. It is worth repeating and reads as follows:

- 1. Vancouver Island is an epitome of the fine scenery of British Columbia... 2. The season may be said to be eight months long... 3. In natural grandeur of waterfalls, forests, and lakes the heart of the island will compare favorably with the Yosemite Valley in California...

From the same source comes the suggestion for a circular route by pack trail and lake from Great Central Lake to Campbell River and the construction of two chalets of an inexpensive character at each end of the trail.

There is much to support the suggestion. There is nothing against it. To argue that the tourist who goes in for camp life is of little economic value to the Island is to talk without the book.

WELL DONE GARDEN CITY!

At this stage of Provincial development when the tendency to appeal for Government aid on the slightest pretext seems to be increasing rather than diminishing it is refreshing to observe and to be able to commend the enterprising initiative of the people of Garden City.

IMMIGRATION.

Dominion and Provincial Governments would do well to take Lord Northcliffe's observations on the subject of immigration very seriously to heart. His unpleasant reminder that a fairly large number of young farmers on the other side of the Atlantic are ready to emigrate to other parts of the Empire in preference to Canada is not nice reading.

As far as general immigration is concerned it has acted wisely in calling a halt. But no opportunity should be lost in emphasizing the fact that there is plenty of room in Canada for men of agricultural experience who are in a position to look after themselves during the time which is bound to elapse between actual settlement and production in kind.

In any case if Canada is to derive appropriate benefit from the general movement of peoples which is now commencing in earnest she must be prepared to adopt methods that the changed conditions both here and abroad would seem to dictate. We are living in exceptional times and it does not do to follow orthodox procedure too religiously.

FOREST TOURS.

One fails to experience particular glee in singling out any German example for emulation on Vancouver Island. But the Victoria and Island Development Association might find it profitable to work up a little enthusiasm towards the formation of a touring association for those who find pleasure in penetrating the forest but who hesitate to tramp into Nature's solitude because of the absence of signs and general direction charts when once they have left the open country.

This is the way to do things. If the workingmen of Britain want to rule the roost they must first of all convince the people that it will be in their interest to give them the requisite authority.

One of Lord Northcliffe's interviewers has described the distinguished publisher as the man who "makes and unmake ministries from behind a battery of printing presses served by a small army of news writers and editors." This is true; but Lord Northcliffe will have to confess that he is still puzzled about the sort of clay that was used to make one particular political "object" which refuses either to be "downed" or even remodelled by the "moulder" from Printing House Square.
