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This disease is said to be peculiar to the United States. It is one of the most fatal diseases to which children are subject; it prevails in its severest form, in large cities during the hot months of summer. It attacks children from one to twenty months old, most frequently during the period of dentition; children are most liable to the disease during the second summer. A profuse discharge is usually the first symptom, the stool being yellow coloured and thin; this is succeeded

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By great irritation of the stomach, constant vomiting, and purging, great languor, and prostration, often coming on in a few hours.

The pulse, quick, and hard; the tongue is covered with a white slimy coat; the skin becomes dry, harsh; intense heat of the head and abdomen, with coldness of the extremities.

Towards evening there is considerable fever, with restlessness, and pain.

Delirium sometimes occurs, manifesting its self by tossing of the head, and attempts to bite the nurse,

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The eyes which were sunk and dull, now become wild and injected.

Death may take place within eight hours; the case however is usually more protracted. The countenance becomes pale, the eyes hollow and languid, the emaciation is extreme, the skin shrivels, the nose pointed and sharp, the lips shrivelled, thin, and dry; the skin becomes tight and shining upon the forehead.

The child lies in a half sleeping state, with half closed eyelids insensible to external impressions. The

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
