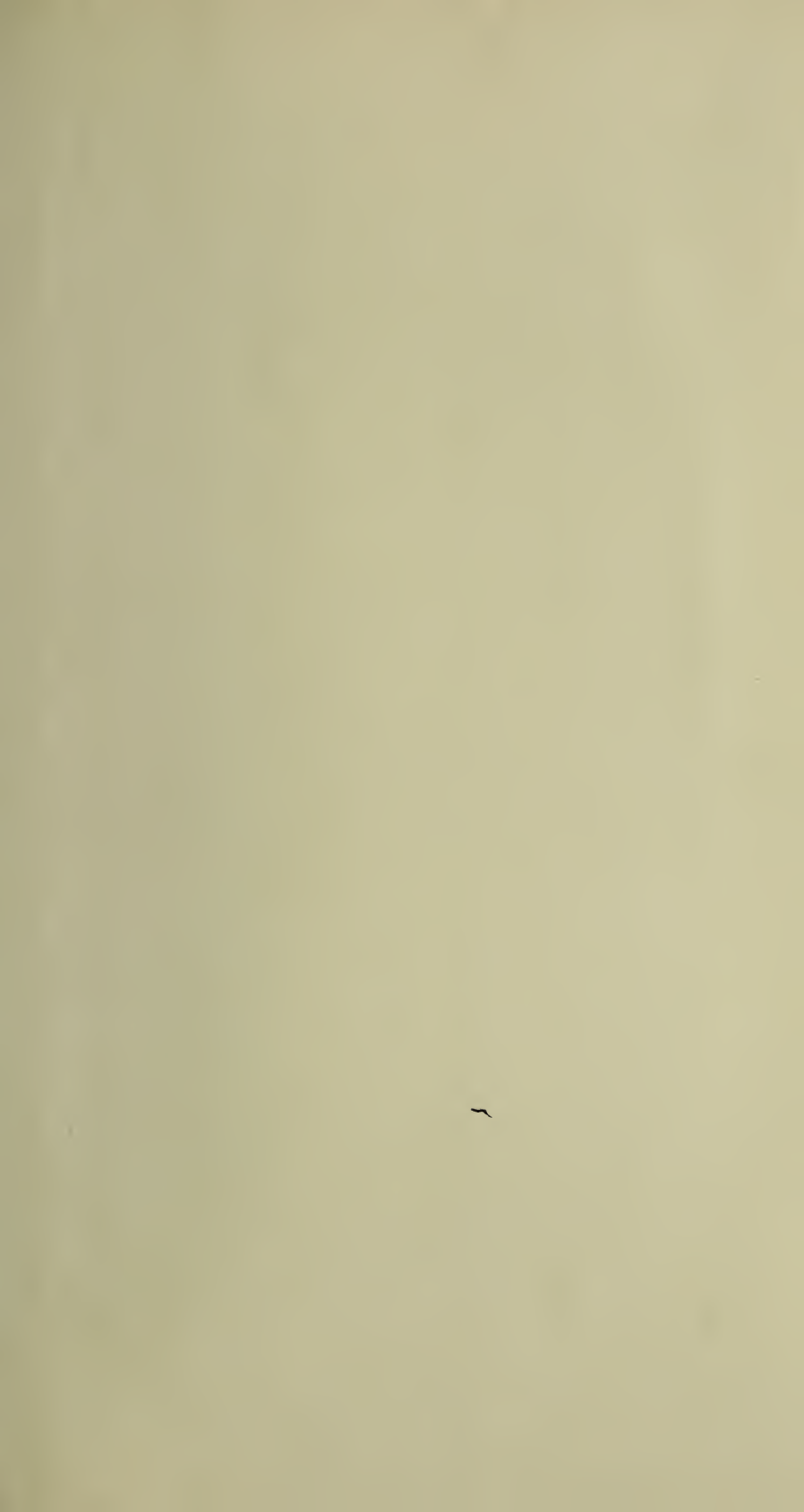

THE present Catalogue comprises some very curious books on English, Scotch, and Irish History; and some rare French Romances, at this time sought for with peculiar curiosity and interest by the French Collectors; but its distinguishing feature is, that, with the exception of the duplicate inferior copies, it contains the major portion of Mr. Heber's Collection of English Poetry, and of Authors connected with the commencement and progress of the English language and literature. This was the part of his Library, of which Mr. Heber was the most proud, and which he laboured, for nearly forty years, with unceasing perseverance, and equally constant pleasure, to enrich and complete. Very few previous observations will however be here necessary, as to many of the most valuable articles are appended descriptions or notices, furnished principally by the kindness of a friend, whose knowledge in this branch of literature is pre-eminent. After mentioning the Ancient Ballads and Broad-sides, forming so curious and so interesting a branch of our national Literature, by Tarleton, Elderton, Preston, Newton, Birch, Peele, Phillips, and others, whose names are quite new to Poetical Antiquaries; and the beautiful condition of the copies of Chapman, Daniel, Drayton, and Sir David Lindesay: it will be only necessary to direct

attention to the writings of Breton, Churchyarde, Decker, Greene, Harvey, Lodge, Nash, Rowlands, Ryche, &c., which are curious and worthy of preservation for the following reasons.

1. The old Language.

2. The talents, invention, and caustic humour of their authors, both in prose and verse.

3. The manners and customs of our ancestors, which may be learned better from them, than from graver or more elaborate writers, and

4. The illustrations they afford to contemporary authors, more especially to Shakespeare, who seems to have been a great reader of these tracts, and to have been indebted to them, sometimes for hints as to the plots of his plays, sometimes for peculiar expressions and forms of speech.

The earliest editions are to be preferred, as being in all probability the most correct and most ancient in phraseology, and orthography; and it may also be said that every reprint of modern times, which has been compared with the original has proved to be full of great errors of omission and commission.

In this sale will also be noticed some important additions from Mr. Heber's Dramatic Library, including a unique copy of the old Play of *The Taming of a Shrew*, 1594, which Pope once mentions, but which disappeared from that time until Mr. Collier procured the use of it for his "History of English Dramatic Poetry."

Such an opportunity as the present, which cannot occur again for many years, will, it is to be

oped, bring forward some new collectors, and induce those already in possession of many of the works here enumerated to make their poetical libraries more complete; and, if they find among them any specimens of Early English Poetry not described in this Catalogue, they may be certain that their value will be much increased by the rare distinction of having been wanting to the Heber Collection.

* * * This is one of the very rarest and most curious books
in Mr. Heber's Library. It consists of Tales, Theatrical
Representations, and Poems, in the Macaronick, Pied-
montese and French Languages. The only Bibliogra-
phical accounts to be found of it have been taken by De
Bure and Brunet, (see Article Macharronea) from im-
perfect copies, wanting the Title, Date, &c. The first
fourteen pieces in this volume have the same number of
leaves as the copy collated by De Bure, with following
exceptions. The first in this contains nine leaves and seven
verses on the tenth, instead of seven leaves and seven
verses on the tenth, as stated by De Bure. The second
contains seventeen leaves and a half instead of seven and
a half. The thirteenth has four and a half instead of

two leaves. This copy also contains two leaves of the Register of Contents instead of one. This second leaf contains the Table of nineteen additional and hitherto unknown pieces, a list of which is here given.

The supposition of an edition of 1496 is quite erroneous. From the description of the last piece in the La Valliere and Gaignat Libraries, it was concluded by De Bure and Brunet, that it could not have been printed sooner. An edition of the *first eleven* pieces only was printed in 1601. This unique copy was obtained from Italy by Messrs. Payne and Foss, and sold by them to Mr. Hanrott.

The second Tract shews that John Heywood the Father was alive in 1570, a fact stated in no other extant authority. The mention of Crawley the Printer and Preacher, is also remarkable. I. to the end, proceeds at much greater length on the same theme, and in a similar style.

This copy belonged to G. Steevens. See his curious notes, as well as others, on the fly-leaf preceding the title.

It is very clear that Ritson had never seen this production by Churchyard, or he would not have found it necessary to quote Tanner's authority for saying that it was printed in the reign of Edward VI. The present copy is probably *unique*, and is the one described in the Lincoln Nosegay.

. This tract refers to the Queen's Progress in 1578. Churchyard tells us that he, Henry Goldingham and Bernard Garter were employed to prepare the shews, and that the productions of his coadjutors had already been printed. The *Welcome Home* to Martin Frobisher is not mentioned in the title-page, and is wanting in more than one existing copy of this tract. As Frobisher returned while it was printing some copies were probably issued without this addition.

I, are interesting. The last Poem is a reprint of *Davie Dickar's Dream*.

365 CHURCHYARD. * * * This vol. consists very much of pieces already published, for in the dedication (where he calls himself "servant" to Lord Surrey the Poet) he likens himself to a Pedlar at a fair, mixing up with a few "new laces and odd trifles," a great deal of "old ware and remnants, that for lacke of a quicke sale hath lain long in a close corner."

366 — A Scourge for Rebels; wherein are many notable services truly set out and thorowly discoursed of, with everie particular point touching the troubles of Ireland, as farre as the painfull and dutiful service of the Earle of Ormound in sundrie sortes is manifestly known, *black letter*, Imprinted for Thomas Cadman, 1584

Holstocks, Dr. Underhill and The Unhappy Man’s deere adewe that findes nothing good, cheape, but sorrowe.” This is personally one of the most interesting as well as one of the very rarest of Churchyard’s productions. The last piece is remarkable as it shews that in his old age he again contemplated serving in the army in order to relieve his poverty. It is dated 1592, but from the dedication it is clear that his *Challenge* was at that time published which bears date in 1593, and no earlier edition exists.

370 — CHALLENGE, *black letter, Printed by John Wolfe, 1593*

. This miscellany consists mainly of reprinted productions, the most interesting of which is “Shore’s Wife augmented.” together with the dedication where Churchyard asserts his property in that poem. At the close of the list of Churchyard’s productions, printed and MS. is a remarkable mention of Spenser as “the spirit of learned speech.”

granted to Churchyard, which placed him above want yet below envy. To this he alludes also in the close, and there also lauds Nash at the expence of Gabriel Harvey, for the applause he had bestowed upon "Shore's Wife."

"Sung so long until quite hoarse he grew."

which line Malone mistakingly thought alluded to Arthur Golding. Churchyard in another of his Poems applies it to himself.

In this Poem Churchyard takes occasion again to lay claim to "Shore's Wife" with no small satisfaction, and the whole is very interesting from its personal references.

The notices of his contemporaries in the second piece in this vol. *the Praise of Poetrie*, are very remarkable and curious: he particularizes Lord Surrey whom he had served, Spenser, Daniel, Barnes, Sidney.

"*Lucrece, of whom proud Rome hath boasted long,
Lately reviv'd to live another age, &c.*"

This shews also that Shakspeare's *Tarquin and Lucrece* had been printed in 1594, anterior to the appearance of Drayton's *Matilda*. It may be a curious matter of speculation why this praise was omitted after 1596, and why also the stanza relating to Spenser, in which this line occurs,

"*Though not like Collin and thy Britomart,*"

was also left out. The praise of Elizabeth is extravagant, but not more so than she was accustomed to think deserved.

It is much to be lamented that the present, the only known existing copy, should be defective. It wants two or three leaves at the end and four are omitted in the middle of the volume. It seems to have been hastily made up by the printer; the paging and numbering of the poems are irregular and perhaps he withdrew it from circulation.

A vast deal of biographical matter is to be collected from nearly all Gascoigne's printed "Poesies," and from prose and poetry by him among the King's MSS. in the British Museum. In the frontispiece to one of them Gascoigne has introduced his own portrait kneeling and presenting a book to Queen Elizabeth. Gascoigne informs us that he was at one time confined for some offence, and Nash in his *Strange Newes*, 1592, says that his imprisonment was in the Counter. He was brought up to the law, abandoned the profession, and after becoming a soldier and leading a riotous life, he returned again to Gray's Inn and resumed his studies. It looks as if it had not sold well in 1592 under the title of "*Strange Newes*," and that the Stationer in order to secure a sale to it, had connected it in 1593 with the extraordinarily popular production of "*Pierce Penneless his Supplication to the Devil*." *Apis Lapis* to whom it is dedicated so humourously was probably *Bee-stone* or *Beeston*, perhaps the father of Christopher Beeston who was Master of a Company of Players and himself an actor not many years afterwards. It will be observed that there is no printer's name to the present edition of 1592: John Danter is the publisher of that of 1593. They have been treated by Bibliographers as if they were different productions.

There was another impression of this piece for Abell Jeffes in the same year.

He also there denies that he had written a second part of *Pierce Penniless*, or that he was the Author of the *Groatsworth of Wit*. That was evidently the second and the present the first impression of the tract. Ritson quotes an edition of 1595, as if he was not aware that it had appeared three years earlier. In the edition by A. Jeffes there are no numbers to the folios until 16, and then they proceed regularly page for page with the Edition by Jhones.

The dedication is to Lady Elizabeth Carey, the author of the tragedy of *Mariam*, whom the wisest poets, according to Nash, had vowed to enshrine as a second *Delia*, alluding of course to Daniel's popular poems under that

title. Nash also speaks of this lady's mother as having been lately adopted into the society of the muses, and "purchased divine Petrarch another monument in England." This translation has probably not survived. The body of the work contains a great deal that is merely personal to Nash, and relates to his misfortunes and other events of his life.

* * * "This curious little Vol. is excessively scarce, indeed I know of no other copy, and though Ames, Herbert and Dibdin record its existence, it is plain none of them had seen it, but content themselves with copying Maunsell's Cat. where it is thus described :—

"Pierce Plowman in prose, I did not see the *beginning of this booke*, but it endeth thus :—

"God save the Kyng," &c. &c.

"If Maunsell had examined it with due attention he must have perceived that a large portion of the text (though not the whole) is written in *verse*, and runs into loose accentuated *rhyming* stanzas and couplets. To say the truth I am more than half disposed to ascribe the Authorship to the famous W. Roy, of whose poem of *Rede me and be not wroth*, the present composition reminds me both in sentiment and measure. It is worthy of remark that G. Steevens's copy of the first edition of that poem (now in my possession) is bound exactly uniform, and being of precisely the same dimensions, they probably were united in one cover till he separated them. It is plain that he attached equal and considerable importance to both, having bestowed on each his best russia binding, with his initials on the sides, and inscribed his autograph on the back of title and at the foot of the last leaf, infallible signs of his especial favour." MS. note by Mr. Heber.

No printer would hazard the putting of his name to this vigorous attack upon the Roman Catholics, in which the Author mentions the death of Sir Tho. More, and speaks of Henry VIII. as still living. There is no good reason why it should not be considered as the first idea of his play, as the difference between the two is little more than that between the recently discovered *Hamlet* and the more perfect Editions afterwards printed ; and also between the first Edition of the *Merry Wives of Windsor*, 1602, and that in the folio, 1623. The variations in the names of the characters between the present Edition and that in the folio of 1623 will not militate against the supposition, as it was not an unfrequent practice among the Dramatick Authors of the time. Ben Jonson changed the names of the Dramatis Personæ of his *Every Man in his Humour*, as will be seen by comparing the 4to. Edition of 1601, and the folio 1616. But aye study to forge and lye," &c.

She afterwards married a person of the name of Ellys, but eloped from him with a servant of the Earl of Wiltshire.

The title page of this edition also states that she lived "in the time of King Henry the Eighth." It is a highly curious description of manners, and the stories are very entertaining, all displaying the cunning and frauds of the widow in various situations, *beautiful copy, in morocco, by C. Lewis.*

Had Steevens ever seen this Collection of Watson's Sonnets, there would have seemed better ground for his statement that Watson was "a more elegant sonnetteer than Shakespeare" for the Poems are generally superior to any to be found in the *Ekatompathia*, besides being limited to the requisite number of 14 lines. They are assigned to Watson, not merely on the strength of the initials T. W. at the end of the volume, but on account of the internal evidence, great similarity of turn and style of thought. Steevens has been a little ill-used on account of the opinion above quoted; and it has been dealt with as if he had asserted roundly that Watson was a *better* sonnetteer than Shakespeare. He might be "a more elegant sonnetteer" without being a *better* sonnetteer. Elegance is only one point of recommendation out of many.

Bound up with this volume is an imperfect copy of the *Complaint of Rosamond*, by Samuel Daniel, 1592.

Watson was too well acquainted with the true form of the Sonnet, (which was introduced into English by Lord Surrey) to call these productions by that designation: each consists not of fourteen but of sixteen lines. It is to be doubted if there be another perfect copy in existence, and Mr. Heber lent the present for the fabrication of the article upon the Ekatompattia, in the *British Bibliographer*, Vol. IV. It was entered on the books of the Stationers' Company in 1581, and it was printed either in that year, or very early in the next. Watson was dead when Nash published his "Have with you to Saffron Walden," for he there says—"A man he was I dearly loved and honoured, and for all things hath left few of his equals in England."

This was Whetstone's earliest production, and a great

deal of personal matter may be gleaned from it, especially from that part which he terms "the Garden of Unthriftiness," and in the prefatory epistle he speaks of his former misled life, during which he had principally penned these poems. He tells us that it was "the first increase of his barren brain."

It was a singular error committed by Whetstone about ten years afterwards, when, in writing a memorial of the death of Sir P. Sidney, he attributed to him Spenser's "Shepherds Calendar," which had been first printed in 1579, and had then gone through several editions. It shows that he was not so well acquainted with the literature of the time as might be expected.

. The productions of the press of Richard Fawkes (the ancestor of the family of Fawkes in Yorkshire) are very rare, and the present is a very singular specimen. Dr. Dibdin has given a fac-simile of the least interesting part of the wood-cut on the title-page, viz. the lady's head and shoulders. Had he engraved her lower extremities he would have included the figure of the professional fool or jester, who is sitting on the ground, in his hood, with his bawble, his morris-bells and his other caparisons, admiring the beauty of the lady. The poem is anonymous, but the language is graceful for the time, and seems to shew that the writer was a practised versifyer: he tells us that he translated it from the French work called *La Beauté de Femmes*, at the desire of some gentleman not named.

The same work was also printed by Wyer, who is supposed by Herbert to have been servant to Fawkes.
