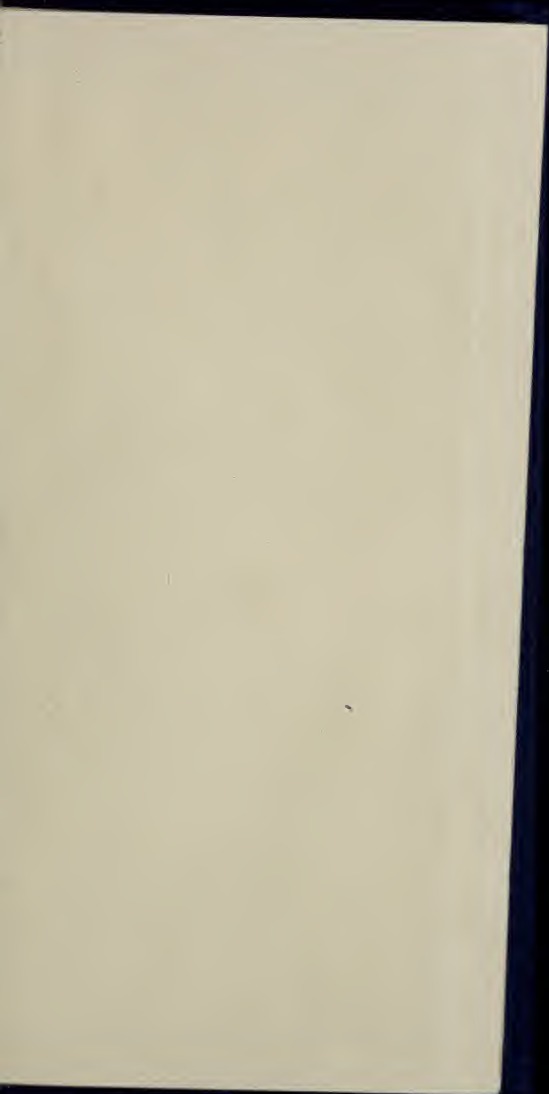

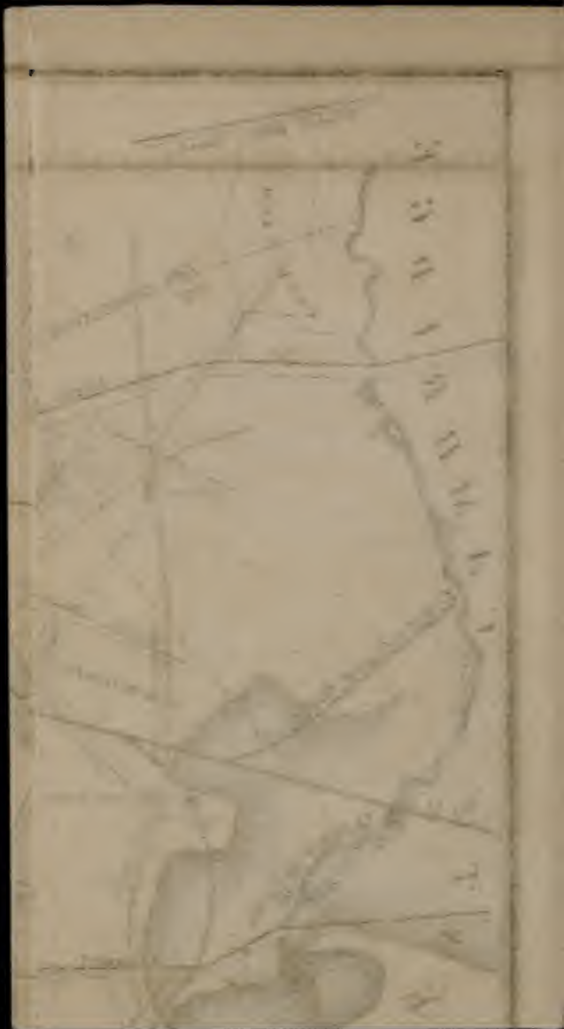

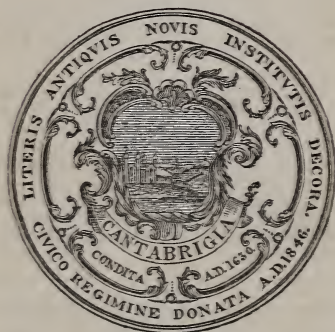

PREFACE.

We are now enabled to present to our fellow citizens and the public the third number of the "Cambridge Directory and Almanac." Several important additions have been made, and improvements adopted, which, we trust, will be satisfactory to our patrons. Two or three items are worthy of notice.

The statistical matter presented on our Calendar pages relate exclusively to incidents in the history of Cambridge, and were prepared expressly for this work. The concise history of our Schools and Schoolhouses will, we doubt not, be found highly interesting. The detailed account of the Schools in the third Ward was prepared by J. S. LADD, Esq., of the School Committee, and embodies an amount of highly valuable and useful information.

We have been at considerable pains to prepare the sketches of the different religious Societies, places of worship, &c. We acknowledge our indebtedness to the several clergymen and others, for the facilities and information furnished us; and we only regret that time and space does not allow us to present a more detailed history. From some of the societies we have been unable to obtain the necessary facts, which accounts for their non-appearance.

The utmost care has been made use of in obtaining the names of the citizens, and no pains has been spared to render the "Directory" as complete as possible. An improvement has been adopted in the alphabetical arrangement of the given names, which will be found to add greatly to the convenience of the work. So far as we have been able to obtain them, we have inserted the places of business of those doing business in Boston. We cannot flatter ourselves there are no omissions or errors; but we can say we have taken all reasonable care to prevent them.

We have been at great expense in preparing our Map, as also other portions of the work; and it is hoped our citizens will feel the importance of sustaining our enterprise by a liberal and extensive patronage.

Cambridge Fire Department.

The Fire Department of the City of Cambridge is composed of a Chief Engineer, four Assistant Engineers, five Engine Companies, and one Hook & Ladder Company. There is also another Company in Ward One; the Engine is the property of private citizens residing in that Ward. The regular Companies are allowed not more than forty men, and not less than thirty-five; and the Hook & Ladder Company not more than twenty-five men, nor less than twenty.

The compensation paid to each member is \$15 per annum, and such further sum to each Engine Company, as, when added to the amount paid to the several members, shall make a total of \$700 per annum; and for the Hook & Ladder Company \$425. This is in

full for fuel, oil, Steward's fees, &c. The appropriation for this Department is \$7000.

On the first floor are two rooms, one of which is used for a Mixed School, the other is used in connexion with the High School. The second story is for the exclusive use of the High School. It is approached by two flights of stairs from the two entrances on Amory street. In the main room are seats for 108 scholars. There are two recitation rooms, and a room neatly and conveniently fitted up for the Philosophical and other apparatus, and for a Library for the use of the school. The number of scholars at the opening of the new school house was one hundred and eight. In the September following thirty-one additional scholars were admitted. At the annual examination for admission in July 1849 upwards of seventy scholars were received—the present number belonging to the school is one hundred and fifty-three.

The following are the names of the teachers who have been employed in the High School since its establishment with the dates of their appointment. Elbridge Smith, Sept. 1847. Miss Nancy W. Manning, Sept. 1847. Miss Abbie Dalton, April, 1848. Thomas Chase, Sept. 1848. Eliza C. Bubier, Sept. 1849.

Miss Dalton was appointed teacher in the Quincy School, in Boston and resigned her situation in the High School in March, 1849. The course of study in the High School is both English and Classical. It is believed that the scholars who have gone from this school to Harvard College have compared favorably in their examination

for admission with those from any other school in the State. The facilities for acquiring an English or Classical education in this school are certainly great. The apparatus, though not complete is far superior to that possessed by any school in Boston or its vicinity. The city has given \$700, for the purchase of apparatus and this amount has been increased from other sources to \$1500. This apparatus is of the very best character and in the very best order.—The Library of the Master is open for the use of the pupils. The number of volumes to which they may have access is about 500. No other school in the State can compare with the Cambridge High School in this respect, unless it be the Latin School in Boston. In addition to these advantages the gentlemen connected with the University have expressed their willingness to maintain a course of weekly lectures in the High School. Prof. Agassiz is at present lecturing in a most able and interesting manner upon Natural History. With proper attention we see no reason why the Cambridge High School may not rank among High Schools as Harvard College does among Colleges. It certainly ought to do so.

The HOPKINS CLASSICAL SCHOOL, on Dana Hill, is taught by E. B. Whitman, A. M. Free instruction is given in this school to nine pupils, intending to enter College, as beneficiaries of the Hopkins Charity;—said pupils to be selected and recommended by the School Committee. The Chairman of the School Committee is *ex officio* a member of the Visiting Committee of this school.

The Schools in Ward One are under the immediate direction of Messrs. Albro and Felton; those in Ward Two, of Messrs. Parker, Stearns and Wellington; those in Ward Three, of Messrs. Clarke and Ladd. The High School is under the direction of a Special Committee, consisting of His Honor, the Mayor, and Messrs. Stearns, Albro, Felton and Ladd.

Music is taught in all the public schools.

The following history of the Schools in the Third Ward was prepared for the Directory by J. S. LADD, Esq.

No PROVISION for public school instruction was made by the town, for that section of Cambridge now designated as the third Ward, till the year 1813, when the sum of \$50 was granted “for the object of providing a school at Lechnere Point.” The school was taught by Miss Lumas, in the brick building, which is now standing on the northerly side of Bridge street, near the line of the Boston & Lowell Railroad. - The School Committee for that year consisted of Messrs. Abiel Holmes, John Mellen, Royal Makepeace, James

Chaplin, and Abel Whitney. At this period the population at Lechmere Point did not exceed twenty families. No further appropriation was made for school purposes, in this part of the town, till 1815, when the sum of \$50 was again granted. In July, 1816, the School Committee were "authorized to hire a female teacher for Lechmere Point, until the 1st day of November" in that year. The population of this section was now rapidly increasing, and the disadvantages of its isolated position became more apparent. The inhabitants repeatedly urged their claims upon the town for more ample facilities for the education of their children,—and in May, 1817, a report of the Selectmen, recommending "the erection of a School District at Lechmere Point," was accepted by the town, and \$100 appropriated "for the support of a school that season." The boundaries of the District, however, were not defined until June, 1818, when "all that part of the town of Cambridge lying north of Broad Canal, and east of North Canal and the creek leading therefrom to Miller's River," was established as the fifth School District of Cambridge. The appropriation for "schooling at Lechmere Point," in 1818, was \$150. The town also granted \$100 towards the erection of a schoolhouse; and, in the same year, the District having raised an additional sum for the same object, a one story building, 42 feet by 22, was erected on a lot of land on North Third street, presented to the District by the Lechmere Point Corporation. This building was occupied as a schoolhouse during a period of thirty years, till 1848, when it was disposed of by the city. It had long borne the marks of a troublous history, and its demise excited no profound sentiment of regret.

The first Grammar School in the District was established in 1819, under a vote of the town,—“that the fifth School District be furnished with six months schooling of a grammar master, or its equivalent, annually.” The school was placed under the charge of Mr. Jonas Green, a graduate of Harvard College, and now a physician residing at Philadelphia. From the date of its establishment till the autumn of 1836, the Grammar School was taught in the Third street schoolhouse. During the interval between 1819 and 1824, the call for "more schooling" was occasionally heard from the fifth District, and, in the latter year, "twelve months of man school, and three and a half months female school" were granted by the town. An annual female school was established the following year, and the sum of \$550 was appropriated for the erection of a new schoolhouse in the District. A handsome two story building, 42 feet by 23, with a cupola, was erected the same season, on the site now occupied by the brick schoolhouse, at an expense, including the land, of \$1469 18. The room in the second story, however, was not finished and permanently occupied as a schoolroom till 1829. This, for several years, was the best schoolhouse within the limits of the town, and its erection was highly creditable to the public spirit of the inhabitants of the fifth District. It was removed in 1847 to its present location on Third street. Pursuant to the recommendation of a report, presented to the District by the Hon. William Parmenter, in 1827, provision was made, by

subscription, for "an auxiliary school, to be kept three months, for the instruction of the small children, who were entitled to attend the public schools." The classification of the rudimental and primary scholars, thus for the first time suggested, now forms a prominent and peculiar feature of the school system of Cambridge.

"An additional annual female school" was organized in 1829. On the 1st day of May, in that year, the number of children in the town, between the ages of 3 and 17 years, was 1547,—of which 557 belonged to the fifth District. It is to be regretted that no earlier record of the statistics of the District can be found. In 1834, in compliance with the request of the inhabitants of District No. 5, the three schools were "divided into three grades, and the males and females were classed together in each school." This was the introduction of that system of gradation, peculiar to the schools of Cambridge, to which, in no inconsiderable degree, their success must be referred. From this period the "Middle School" begins to be recognized. A measure was adopted by the town the same year, which has eminently promoted the prosperity of the public schools. The District system was abolished, and the town was divided into three Wards, as at present constituted. All prudential duties relating to the schools subsequently devolved upon and were performed by the School Committee. The necessity of further accommodations in this Ward, again became pressing, and, in August, 1836, the School Committee were authorized "to erect another Primary schoolhouse at East Cambridge." A lot of land on Thorndike street, containing 6000 feet, was purchased for \$900, and a one story building, 40 by 26 feet, was erected, the succeeding autumn, at an expense of \$1126 82. It was raised an additional story in 1840, at an expense of \$564 51.

In February, 1837, a new Primary School was opened in the third Ward; and in the spring of 1838, a school was established, "designed to be preparatory to the Primary." This was the first school of the Alphabet grade instituted by the School Committee of Cambridge. This is an important epoch in the history of the schools. A High School for the town was organized at Cambridgeport, in December, and Classical and High School instruction, for the first time, brought within reach of the advanced scholars of the third Ward. The institution of the Board of Education in 1837, and the Statute of 1838, requiring School Committees to make full and specific reports of the schools under their supervision, infused all the elements of progress with new life. Henceforth our school annals are embellished by the introduction of successive improvements in the means of instruction, and for promoting the physical comfort of the children.

In the autumn of 1838, the Sub-Committees were "authorized to furnish backs to the seats in the schools, whenever deemed by them expedient;" and in the succeeding year the order was made imperative, "that backs to the seats in all the schoolhouses" should be furnished. Chairs were substituted, in the place of plank benches, in the Grammar and Middle Schools in 1840.

Previous to 1839, the annual statistics of the schools have not been preserved. On the 1st day of May, in that year, the number of children in the town, between the ages of 4 and 16 years, was 2015,—of which 702 belonged to the third Ward. Another Middle School was established in the autumn of 1840, and a second Alphabet School the year following. Outline maps, for illustrating the study of geography, were provided for the Grammar Schools in 1842; but globes were not generally introduced previous to 1848. The Otis schoolhouse, on Otis street, was completed in the spring of 1843, at an expense of \$5406 78. It is a fine two story building, 50 feet by 42, containing three airy, commodious schoolrooms. The Grammar School was removed to the new building, and a High School department, in connection with it, was organized. This arrangement continued till the establishment of the Cambridge High School, in 1847. An additional Middle School was opened in 1844, and in March, 1845, the Putnam Grammar School was organized, with seventy scholars, under the present excellent master. One of the Primaries was discontinued the same season, but a third Primary was again established in 1848.

The Putnam schoolhouse was completed in 1848, under the superintendence of Mr. Isaac Melvin, and dedicated, with appropriate ceremonies, in June, of the same year. The expense to the city, including the land, paving the sidewalks, ornamenting the grounds, and furnishing the rooms, was \$15,018 76. It is a magnificent brick structure, 70 feet by 50, three stories high, situated on the most elevated site in the third Ward. Its name is commemorative of the fortification which in 1775 was erected on the same location, and designated by the name of the Revolutionary hero, Gen. Putnam. The internal arrangement of the building is in accordance with a plan furnished by the School Committee. In its architectural proportions, its various conveniences, and general adaptation for the purposes for which it was designed, this schoolhouse may be justly regarded as a model of its kind, uniting all the substantial improvements, that experience and science have pointed out. Two of the apartments in the basement story are occupied by Primary schools; the third is used as a Ward room. The second story, which accommodates the Putnam Grammar School, contains, besides the spacious school apartment, two recitation rooms, two ante rooms, and one for apparatus. Designed to supply the prospective, as well as the immediate wants of the Ward, this building will furnish ample accommodation for 550 scholars.

The number of children in the city between the ages of 5 and 15 years, on the 1st day of May last, was 2952, of which 929 belonged to the third Ward. The number attending the several schools, the third quarter of 1849, was 854:—High School, 26;—Grammar, 213;—Middle, 161;—Primary, 212;—Alphabet, 242. Of the character of the schools of this Ward it is sufficient to say, that they hold no second rank among the kindred institutions of the city.

CHURCHES IN CAMBRIDGE.

First Parish in Cambridge.

North Avenue, cor. Church street.

REV. WM. NEWELL, Pastor.

The First Church in Cambridge was gathered on the 1st day of February, O. S. 1636. It appears that in 1632, there was "built the first house of worship, with a bell upon it." On the 11th of October, 1633, Mr. Thomas Hooker and Mr. Samuel Stone were ordained, the one as pastor, and the other as teacher of the congregation at "Newtown," as Cambridge was then called. Mr. Hooker soon asked and obtained permission to remove to Hartford with his people, where he settled. In the year 1636, the first permanent church was gathered, and Mr. Thomas Shepard was ordained as pastor.

The house above referred to was situated on the west side of what is now called Dunster street, a little south of its intersection with Mt. Auburn street. About the year 1650, this house was removed, and a new one "about forty feet square," erected on "Watch House Hill." This locality is supposed to be nearly opposite the head of Dunster street, and between the President's old mansion and the Dane Law School. This site was occupied by the two succeeding meetinghouses, and until the erection of the present one in 1833. In 1706, the second house was taken down, and the third erected, which remained until 1757, when the fourth house was built. The present house, which is the fifth, was dedicated on the 12th of December, 1833.

The ministers of this Parish, from its organization to the present time have been as follows:—

Timothy Hilliard, settled Oct. 27, 1783, died May 9, 1790, aged 44.
Abiel Holmes, settled Jan. 25, 1792, dismissed June 8, 1829.
Wm. Newell, settled May 19, 1830.

The present number of communicants is 105. In addition to the Sunday School library, there is a Parish library for adults, commenced in 1839, which now numbers about 900 vols.

First Church & Shepard Congregational Society.

Mt. Auburn Street, cor. Holyoke.

REV. JOHN A. ALBRO, Pastor.

This Church, which was the first permanent Church in Cam-

bridge, and the eleventh in Massachusetts, was organized on the first day of February, O. S. 1636. It was connected with the first Parish until the 19th of May, 1829, when a separation took place; the Church with the pastor and deacons, holding religious services at the Court House, until their present house of worship was completed.

In November of the same year, the Church united with the "Shepard Congregational Society" which had been organized a short time previous.

The pastors of this Church, were the same as those of the first Parish, until the period of the separation. Rev. Abiel Holmes D. D. continued pastor until the time of his death, June 12th 1837. Nehemiah Adams was ordained colleague of Dr. Holmes Dec. 19th 1829, and dismissed March 14th 1834. The present pastor, Rev. John A. Albro, was installed April 15th 1855.

The corner stone of the present house of worship was laid, with appropriate ceremonies, on the 21st day of September, 1830, and dedicated on the 23d of February, 1831. The stone contains a silver plate, inclosed in a leaden box, with this inscription:

"To Jesus Christ and the Church, the pillar and ground of the truth. First Church and Shepard Society in Cambridge.

The present officers of the Church are Deacons S. T. Farwell, and Charles W. Homer; Zelotes Hosmer, Clerk. The present number of the church is 278.

Christ Church—Episcopal.

Garden street.

REV. NICHOLAS HOPPIN, Pastor.

Christ Church was founded 1750, by members of the Church of England residing in Cambridge, with the aid and patronage of the English "Society for the propagation of the Gospel in Foreign parts."

The Church was first opened for divine service, Thursday, Oct. 15, 1761, when Rev. East Apthorp, D. D. (afterwards rector of St Mary Le Bow, London,) first missionary of the the society, preached from Acts ii. 42.

The following inscription was placed on a corner stone of the church.

Deo Æterno, Patri, Filio, Spiritui S, Hanc Ædem, Sub Auspiciis Illustriss Societatis, Promovendo Evangelio in Partibus Transmarinis, Institutæ, Consecrabant, Cont ubrigienses Ecclesiæ Anglicanæ Filii, in Christianæ Fidei Et Charitatis Incrementum; A. D. MDCCLX. Provinciam Procurante, V. Cl. Francisco Bernardo.

(The plan of the church was furnished by Mr. Harrison, then re-

siding at Newport R. I., the architect of King's Chapel, Boston, and of the Redwood Library at Newport.)

Mr. Apthorp was succeeded in 1757 by Rev. Winwood Serjeant, who was rector till about the beginning of the Revolutionary war: after which the church was closed till the year 1790. It was then repaired, and, on Wednesday the 11th of July in that year, was reopened, with a sermon by the Rev. Dr. Parker, of Trinity Church Boston; who also accepted the rectorship of this parish, on condition of supplying it by a curate, and officiating occasionally himself. During the first quarter of the present century the church was served by different clergymen and readers: among whom were the late Rt. Rev. Dr. Dehon, Bishop of South Carolina, Rev. Dr. Jenks of Boston, and the Rev. Dr. Wainwright of N. York.

In 1826 the building was again repaired, (the corporation of the University generously contributing three hundred dollars,) and Rev. George Otis, A. M. tutor in the University, officiated till his death in 1828. The next rector was Rev. Thomas W. Coit D. D. from 1829 to 1835, who was followed by Rev. Mark Anthony De Wolfe Howe, D. D., 1835 and '36, and the Rev. Thomas H. Vail, A. M. from 1837 to 1839; when the present incumbent entered upon his duties.

The number of communicants is eighty one.

Horace Hanford, Sexton, resides Garden street.

Old Cambridge Baptist Church.

Head of Kirkland street.

— — —, Pastor.

This church was constituted, Aug. 20, 1844. It consisted of eighty-seven persons, nearly all of whom were dismissed from the church at Cambridgeport. Religious services were first held in Lyceum Hall, Aug. 11th, 1844, in which place the society continued to meet for more than a year. In the mean time an edifice was erected on land obtained of Harvard College Corporation, and was dedicated Oct. 23d, 1845. On the same day, the first pastor, Rev. E. G. Robinson, was installed. Mr. Robinson resigned Sept. 23d, 1845. Rev. B. I. Lane was installed Dec. 30, 1845. Resigned April 1, 1849. The church continues at present without any pastor.

Francis R. Trow, Sexton, resides Mt. Auburn street.

St. Peter's Church--Roman Catholic.

Concord Avenue.

MANASSES P. DOUGHERTY, Pastor.

The corner stone of the house of worship of this church was laid, according to the rites of the Roman Pontifical, on the 12th day of July, 1848, by the Bishop of the diocese. In the corner stone was deposited a metal box containing copies of various papers, several ancient and modern coin, and a parchment with a Latin inscription.

The church was first opened for religious services on the 1st of January, 1849. Number of communicants, 500. The edifice is of brick, on a beautiful and conspicuous site, and is quite an ornament to that section of the city.

Cambridgeport Parish.

Austin street.

J. F. W. WARE, Pastor.

In 1805, the spacious brick edifice originally used by the Cambridgeport parish was erected by the Cambridgeport Meetinghouse corporation, which had been chartered the previous year for the purpose. It was situated on a square of land containing about two acres, which was laid out by the corporation for *public* uses, between what is now called Broadway and Harvard street. It was furnished with (what was then called) a *large, elegant organ* and a bell. This house was dedicated Jan. 1, 1807. Sermon was preached by Rev. Dr. A. Holmes. July 14th, 1809, a church was gathered and organized on the principles of the Congregational churches of New England. January 19th, 1814, the Rev. Thomas B. Gannett was ordained the first pastor of the society and continued in that capacity until May 1st, 1833. Nov. 9th, 1833, the old house was partially unroofed in a severe storm, and was not deemed worthy of repair; and the society worshipped in the Town house until their new house on Austin street was ready to be occupied, which was in Oct. 1834. Jan. 1st, 1831, the Rev. A. B. Muzzey was installed as pastor; services took place in the Baptist church. He remained until May 1st, 1846.

The present pastor, Rev. J. F. W. Ware, commenced his labors Nov. 29th, 1846. Thus it will be seen that from the date of the settlement of the first pastor in 1814 (a period of thirty-six years,) there has been but a little more than a year that the society has been without a settled minister. In 1842, galleries were added to the house. In 1844 a commodious vestry was erected at a cost of about \$1000. There is a library connected with the parish containing several hundred volumes, which is free for all the members of the society.

First Baptist Church.

Magazine, junction of River street.

JOSEPH W. PARKER, Pastor.

Meetings of the "professed friends of Christ of the Baptist denomination" were held, mostly at private houses, during the larger part of the year 1816. In the spring of 1817, measures were taken to erect a place of worship and to constitute a church. On the 25th of December, 1817, the present house of worship was dedicated and

the church publicly recognized. Sermon by Dr. Baldwin, of Boston.

The property is owned exclusively by the church, and the act of incorporation was approved Feb. 8, 1819. The first pastor, Rev. Bela Jacobs, was installed July 18, 1819. Some time during the year 1819, the bell was placed in the tower. In 1826, an organ was introduced, the first, it is believed, used in any Baptist church in this vicinity. In the summer of 1827, the house was enlarged by the insertion of a length sufficient for two windows in the centre.

May 7th, 1833, Rev. Bela Jacobs resigned his charge, and the Rev. Stephen Lovell was installed March 18th, 1834. He resigned May 15th, 1836, and the present pastor was ordained on the 11th Dec. of the same year.

In Feb. 1821, several members were dismissed to aid in forming a church in Roxbury. June 1st, 1828, several others were dismissed to aid in forming a church in Brookline; April 15th, 1830, still others were dismissed to aid in forming a church in Watertown; and Aug. 16, 1844, 85 were dismissed to form a church in Old Cambridge.—The present number is 260.

First Universalist Society.

Main street,—junction State.

EDWIN A. EATON, Pastor.

This society was organized March 12, 1821, and incorporated by act of the Legislature Feb. 9, 1822. The first sermon was preached by Rev. Hosea Ballou. A church was formed in connection with the society in 1827. The corner stone of the present house of worship was laid on Monday, June 24, 1822. A silver plate with the following inscription was deposited under the stone:

“The corner stone of this edifice designed for the service of Almighty God and erected by the first Universalist Society in Cambridgeport was laid in Masonic form by Amicable Lodge, R. W. Tarbell, Master, in the year of Christ, 1822, and of Light 5822.”

On the back of the plate was inscribed “James Munroe President U. S. A., John Brooks Governor of Massachusetts, Thomas Mason, Peter Tufts jr., and Josiah Mason jr., committee for erecting the building.”

The house was dedicated Dec. 18, 1822. During the summer of 1839 it was remodelled, and a bell and clock placed in the tower. On the 1st of January 1846, a fine toned organ from the manufactory of George Stevens of the third Ward was placed in the chapel.

The following have been the different pastors of the society.

Thos. Whittemore, installed April 28, 1823, resigned May 29, 1831.

Saml. P. Skinner, ordained June 19, 1831, resigned May 31, 1832.

Lucius R. Paige, installed July 8, 1832, resigned July 1, 1839.

Lemuel Willis, installed Oct 1, 1842, resigned Sept 28, 1845.

Luther J. Fletcher, installed April 5, 1846, resigned May 13, 1848.

The present pastor, Edwin A. Eaton was installed April 8, 1849.

The officers of the society are Isaac Davis, clerk; Asa Murdock, Treasurer; Edwin Scudder chairman of standing committee.
John Pear, sexton, resides Front street.

First Evangelical Congregational Church.

Norfolk street.

WILLIAM A. STEARNS, Pastor.

This church was organized, Sept. 20th, 1827, and the names of forty-five individuals enrolled as its members. On the same day its present meeting-house, having been previously completed, was publicly dedicated to the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost. Its first pastor, Rev. David Perry, was ordained April 23d, 1829, and continued with this people during a ministry of about eighteen months.—The present pastor, Rev. Wm. A. Stearns, was settled Dec 14th, 1831. The congregation gradually increasing from small beginnings, the meeting-house has been twice enlarged. It is still too small for the accommodation of the society, who have been for some time considering the subject of erecting a new building.

Roland Litchfield jr., Sexton, resides Main cor. Columbia street.

Second Evangelical Congregational Society.

Austin street.

J. C. LOVEJOY, Pastor.

This church was formed March 10, 1842. On the 12th May, 1842, a chapel which had been erected on Austin street, was dedicated, and on the 26th of January, 1843, the Rev. Joseph C. Lovejoy was installed pastor. The present house of worship was dedicated January 3d, 1844. The house is 65 feet by 52, and contains a fine organ and a bell in the tower. The chapel is now used as a vestry. The cost of the house was about \$10,000. The present number of the church is sixty-five.

Lee Street Church—Unitarian.

Lee Street.

REV. A. B. MUZZEY, Pastor.

This Society was organized on the 25th of August, 1846. The Church was established on the 9th of April, 1847. The corner stone of the present house of worship was laid Nov. 9th, 1846, and was dedicated on the 25th of March, 1847. Rev. A. B. Muzzey, former pastor of the Church of the Cambridgeport Parish, has been the pastor of this church from its commencement. The church numbered at its formation 24; the present number is 38.

Andrew B. Harlow, Sexton, resides Trowbridge, cor. Broadway.

St. Peter's Church.

Prospect street.

M. P. STICKNEY, Rector.

The parish of St. Peter's, in Cambridgeport, was formed by due organization under the laws of Massachusetts, October 27th, 1842.

For some time after their organization, the parishioners met for public worship on Sundays and other festivals, in the Town Hall; and there the sacrament of the Lord's supper was first administered Christmas day, 1842, by the late Bishop Griswold.

The church in Prospect street, was consecrated to the worship and service of Almighty God, according to the ritual of the Protestant Episcopal Church, January 31st, 1844, by Bishop Eastburn.

The Rev. Darius Richmond Brewer was the first Rector of the parish. He began his ministrations in the parish, in the autumn of 1842, and became the rector about Easter, 1843. In August, 1844, Mr. Brewer relinquished the charge of the parish on account of the failure of his health, and was immediately succeeded by the Rev. Edmund F. Slafter, who continued in the rectorship till Sept. 30, 1846, when he removed to St. John's Church, Jamaica Plain.

After a vacancy of several months, the Rev. M. P. Stickney, rector of St. Michael's Church in Marblehead, was invited to take charge of the parish and became the rector in June 1847.

The present number of communicants in St. Peter's church is 70. Caleb S. Munroe, Sexton, resides Auburn near Canal street.

First Methodist Episcopal Society.

Cambridge street.

JAMES SHEPARD, Pastor.

This society was incorporated June 14th, 1823. The corner stone of the present house of worship was laid by Rev. Elijah Hedding, now Bishop of the M. E. Church, Sept. 1823. The house was dedicated June 1824; sermon by the Rev. Daniel Fillmore. The first stationed preacher was Rev. Damon Young. The present number of the church is 75.

Second Baptist Church.

Cambridge street, cor. North Fourth.

Pastor.

This church, which originally consisted of twenty members, was established on the third of September, 1827. On the 10th of October, of the same year, the first house of worship, which was of wood, 66 feet by 46, was finished and dedicated. On the 14th of April, 1837, this house was destroyed by fire. The corner stone of the present house was laid in June, 1837; the services of dedication took place Jan. 11, 1839. This is a brick building, 70 feet by 54, and cost about eight thousand dollars.

The Third Congregational Society in Cambridge was formed June 30, 1827. The present house of worship was built the same year.— Rev. Warren Burton, the first pastor, was settled March 5, 1828, and resigned May 14th, 1829.

Rev. James D. Green was settled January 6th, 1830; resigned April 21st, 1840.

Rev. Henry Lambert was settled June 2d, 1841; resigned April 6th, 1845.

Rev. Dr. George G. Ingersoll was settled Dec. 5th, 1847; resigned Nov. 1st, 1849.

The society is at present without a pastor.

Second Universalist Society.

Cambridge street.

REV. MASSENA GOODRICH, Pastor.

This Society was organized April 30th, 1837. In July, 1834, however, a number of individuals had united in procuring a hall and maintaining religious worship. The first pastor was Rev. Henry Bacon, who commenced his labors on the first Sunday in December, 1834, and removed to Haverhill in April, 1838. The Rev. E. G. Brooks was his successor, who commenced his labors in July of the same year. The present house of worship on Cambridge street was dedicated Dec 5th, 1843. Mr. Brooks continued his services as pastor till the first of April, 1845, and was succeeded by the Rev. W. R. G. Mellen, in August of the same year. Mr. Mellen continued pastor till the last Sunday in October, 1848. The present pastor entered upon his duties in April, 1849.

Connected with this society is a church which was recognized Jan. 1st 1833. It first consisted of twenty members; the present number is about fifty. It has also a Sunday school which numbers upwards of one hundred scholars and about twenty teachers.

Third Evangelical Congregational Society.

South Second street.

FREDERIC G. PERKINS, Pastor.

This society was organized on the 2d of July, 1842. The church was constituted on the 8th of September of the same year. The present house of worship is of wood, 60 feet by 45, and was dedicated on the 13th of September, 1843. The present pastor was ordained January 11th, 1843. The number of communicants at the formation of the church was 24; the present number is 59. There is connected with the society a flourishing Sunday school. They have also a small but finely toned organ, which was purchased in the year 1848.

On the evening of the 16th of December, 1849, this building was nearly destroyed by fire.

Calvin Coburn, Sexton, resides Spring street.

NEW POST-OFFICE REGULATIONS.

LETTERS.—On a letter not exceeding one half an ounce in weight, sent any distance not exceeding 300 miles, 5 cents. When sent any distance over 300 miles, 10 cents. For an additional weight of half an ounce, or fractional excess of less than half an ounce, an additional postage of 5 or 10 cents, according to the distance. When a letter exceeds 1 ounce, but does not exceed 2 ounces, it will be rated with 4 charges of single postage; when it exceeds 2 ounces, but does not exceed 3 ounces, it will be rated with 6 charges of single postage, and so on; there being a single postage for the first half ounce, a double postage for the first ounce, and two additional charges for each succeeding ounce, or fraction of an ounce, beyond the first oz. Letters in Great Britain and Ireland are rated *by weight*, the same as in the United States. The entire postage for a single letter, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. in weight, will be 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents to Havanna, 30 cents to Chagres or Panama, to be prepaid in all cases.

NEWSPAPERS.—All newspapers except those received in exchange by publishers are hereafter to be rated with postage, as follows:—

All *regular newspapers* (meaning those sent from the office of publication) for any distance within the State, and for any distance out of the State not exceeding 100 miles, for each paper, and not exceeding one sheet in size, one cent. For any distance exceeding 100, (if out of the State) for each paper, one cent and a half.

All *transient newspapers* (meaning those not sent from the office of publication) are to be rated the same as *regular newspapers*, but the postage is in all cases to be prepaid, as heretofore.

In respect to British mails, where the official postage entries, on the letters received, are in *red ink*, the letter is to be considered as paid—where in *black ink*, as unpaid, and the postage is to be paid.—Letters may be mailed in the United States or in Great Britain, *free of postage*, to either country, or *prepaid*, at the option of the sender, at the above rates, *if the whole amount is tendered*.

Letters sent to any foreign country, or British possession, and mailed to any office in Great Britain, must be prepaid 5 cents, for U. States inland postage, if sent by a British steamer or packet, for a single rate; and 21 cents (including the sea postage,) if sent by an American steamer or packet: to be doubled, tripled, &c., as above, according to weight.
