HUGE PARADE MAKES NEW RECORD IN GLENDALE

More Than 1000 Autos Turn Out For Big Booster Procession Saturday

Glendale's "Ten Million Dollar Parade" Saturday afternoon was an epochal event.

Participated in by practically every commercial institution in the city, as well as clubs, lodges, churches and private individuals, it marked the transition of "The Fastest Growing City in America" from the town to the city class.

It marked the accomplishment of a definite objective; it marked the determination to do greater things in 1924; it marked beyond dispute that the citizens of Glendale, with but few exceptions, are wholeheartedly for the sewer bonds to be voted on tomorrow.

It certainly was the greatest parade in the history of Glendale. By actual count, over 1000 vehicles were in line; and as the head of the column turned to the left and swung back north on San Fernando road, after proceeding south on Brand boulevard, it seemed that the parade at Broadway had just been started. It was over four miles in length, with cars one behind the other as close as possible.

It seemed that everyone in the city who had a car was in the parade. Large firms turned out their entire personnel to advertise the fact that they were proud of Glendale's \$10,000,000 record, and to let people know they supported the sewer bonds. The luncheon clubs were in line 100 per cent strong. The churches joined in with decorative floats. The contractors who have made this city the scene of their activities helped to swell the column. Private cars by the hundreds, plastered all over with sewer bond publicity, trailed the leaders.

Floats in Parade
Conspicuous, of course, were the two Glendale floats that won first prize in the Tournament of Roses parade in Pasadena, the civic and Elks' entries, both the handwork of L. W. Choche. Persons who were unable to get a good view of the floats at Pasadena were on hand to see the prize-winners, and they received an ovation as they proceeded along the route of the parade.

Headed by Chief of Police John D. Fraser, Mayor Spencer Robinson and city officials, the parade (Continued on Page 3)

FIRE THREATENS BUNGALOW COURT

Outbreak in Garage Subdued By Firemen Only After Desperate Efforts

Fire, resulting from the open door of an incinerator near a garage, threatened for a time Sunday morning to consume the bungalow court at 424 Windsor road, as well as adjoining buildings.

The fire in the incinerator had spread to a three-car garage in the rear of the court and the fire had gained a good headway when the department arrived and the firemen saved the court only by strenuous efforts. The building, owned by Mr. Woodmansee, caught fire several times, and in the course of erection, was, for a time, threatened with destruction. The entire loss is estimated at \$2500.

A defective flue called the fire department at 1:45 Saturday afternoon to 1021 South Brand, where the building occupied by "The Little Shop" is located. The damage was slight.

A Ford car, the property of Mr. Flaherty, 1825 Colina drive, caught fire from a short circuit yesterday noon. It was extinguished by the fire department, after damage amounting to \$25 had resulted.

Procession Is Divided By Traffic

Chairman Myers Explains Why Route of Parade Is Not Followed

L. H. Myers, when seen at his office this morning, was recovering from the effects of a very strenuous afternoon as chairman of the monster "Ten Million Dollar Parade" Saturday.

"If the parade had been planned with this end in view, which it was not," said Mr. Myers, "nothing could have demonstrated to any greater degree the strategic position which Glendale occupies. I feel that an apology is due the people of the east side for the non-appearance of the procession in their side of the city as advertised. This was not due to any lack of consideration on the part of the officials. The answer is contained in one word—traffic. It was physically impossible to hold the parade together, and keep the route clear, despite the efforts of citizens detailed to help the police officers in this connection. The parade so far surpassed our expectations in numbers that, although it was started at 2:07 o'clock, just seven minutes after the advertised time, it stretched out over so great a length that traffic on the cross streets could not be denied and broke into the line.

Traffic Is Blocked
"When the head of the column passed the intersection of Los Feliz and San Fernando roads traffic coming from Hollywood along the former was halted. In no time the cars were blocked three deep along this road to a point beyond Vermont avenue in Hollywood, and they finally forced their way through. On Glendale avenue, San Fernando road, Colorado street and Broadway conditions were the same and it was beyond human agency to keep the procession intact.

"While, as I say, this is a matter of regret to the officials, it must bring to our minds the ideal location of our city. With this thought we hope the people will understand the circumstances.

"As the head of the citizens' division was being started at the corner of Wilson and Glendale avenues, I received a report from one of my lieutenants that the (Continued on Page 3)

Barbara Belle Chandler, Age 10, Passes Away From Her Injuries

Miss Barbara Belle Chandler died at 7:30 o'clock Saturday night, January 5, 1924, at the Glendale Research hospital, where she was brought following grave burns suffered that morning at the Lindsay studio, 201-A West Broadway, where she was taking a dancing lesson, when her light frock caught fire from a gas radiator.

The deceased, who was 10 years old, was born in Los Angeles August 8, 1923. She is survived by her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Charles L. Chandler, of 2406 Canada boulevard, and by two sisters, Sara and Meta Chandler, and a brother, David Chandler.

Doran School Pupil
Little Miss Chandler was a member of the A4 grade at the Doran street school, where she was an excellent pupil and greatly loved by teachers and pupils alike, for her charming personality and real talents. This is the only school she ever attended, starting here in the first grade. Her mother, Mrs. Charles L. Chandler, was the first president of the Doran Street Parent-Teachers' association.

The Chandlers attend the Unitarian church of Hollywood and Miss Chandler was a member of the Sunday school there. Rev. Theodore Curtis Abel, pastor of this church, will have charge of the funeral services, which are to be held at the residence, 10:30 o'clock tomorrow morning, Tuesday, January 8, and will be of a strictly family nature. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of Bressee Brothers, Los Angeles.

Injures Man In Auto Accident, Suicides

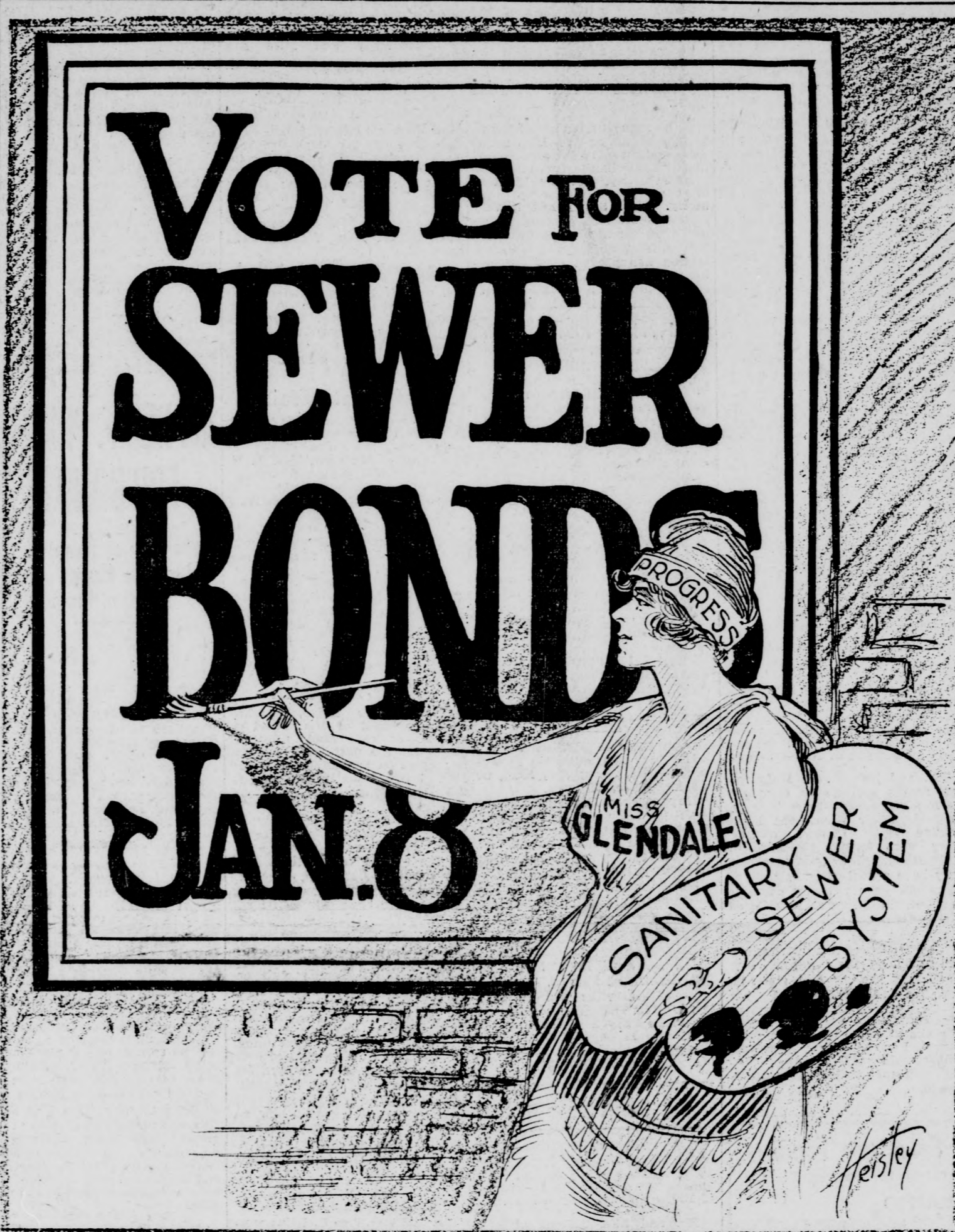

'I Never Rob Poor Man' Says Thief, Taking Company's Coin

Completely disregarding the heavy traffic that was passing at the time, an unmasked bandit held up and robbed the Hercules filling station at 900 San Fernando road at 7:30 o'clock Saturday night.

Fred A. Bornhoff, 501 West Maple street, who was in charge of the station at the time, looked up to see the bandit as he entered flourishing "a big, blue gun."

"Open that register," commanded the visitor. Bornhoff complied.

"Now back up against the wall. By the way, whose money is that, yours?" asked the bandit.

"No, it belongs to the company," replied Bornhoff.

"Fine! I never rob a poor man."

Then the hold up man proceeded to gather in the \$45 which the register contained, along with eighteen pennies.

He ordered Bornhoff out the door, and followed him for one block up Garfield avenue. "I have no car, now beat it," he commanded.

The robber disappeared in the dark. Bornhoff immediately notified the police department, and Detective Sergeant Blake and Officer Stanford rushed to the scene of the robbery, but the bandit had disappeared.

PIRATES ATTACK U. S. STEAMSHIP

Captain of Dollar Company's Vessel Massacred by Chinese Bandits

SHANGHAI, Jan. 7.—Chinese river bandits attacked the Dollar Steamship company's steamer Tsdnli while it was anchored for the night near Fung Shien between Chungkiang and Ichang and killed Captain F. J. Brandt and one Chinese. Several Chinese passengers were wounded by the robbers.

The bodies of Captain Brandt and the Chinese victim of the attack were thrown overboard into the river by the bandits.

Captain Brandt was a Britisher. Mrs. Brandt, residing here, when informed of the death of her husband said she already knew it, having dreamed Saturday night of seeing the captain on the bridge struggling in the midst of a crowd of Chinese.

WEATHER IMPROVES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—While cold weather continues today in the southern states, with freezing temperature as far south as northern Florida, the weather has become warmer over the northern and middle states, from the Missouri valley eastward, and the outlook is for generally fair weather tonight and Tuesday in most states east of the Mississippi river.

WINTER RELAXES GRIP IN MIDWEST

Mercury Rises After Cold Snap; Leaves Trail of Dead In Storm's Wake

CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—Comparatively mild temperatures with jumps as high as seventy degrees, today soothed the northwest and Midwest in a sudden relaxation of the wintry grip which sent the thermometer twenty to forty degrees below zero and claimed more than a score of lives in the Midwest alone.

Eighteen died in Chicago, five in St. Louis and single deaths were reported from St. Paul, Denver, Ullin, Illinois and Henryetta, Okla.

Chicago's rise from 16 below to 24 above was typical of the moderating temperatures. In South Dakota, which saw 30 below zero Saturday, it was 44 above today.

Denver had 35 above, Minneapolis 20, Des Moines 22, Omaha 20, Lincoln 26, Kearney 24. Two above was a climb of more than twenty degrees for Winnipeg, from Saturday's mark.

Kansas City and Indianapolis were thankful for 20 above.

POINCARRE VICTORY

BOTH BONDS AND CITY'S CONTRACT REQUIRE ACTION

Get TWO Ballots When You Go to Polls and Use Both of Them

Voters of Glendale will tomorrow cast their ballots on the \$1,600,000 bond issue for a sewer system.

They will also ballot on the ratification of the agreement with the city of Los Angeles relative to the sewage disposal system.

Both propositions require a two-third vote to carry. The polls will open at 6 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. There are seventeen polling places, as given elsewhere in tonight's Glendale Evening News.

There are more than 12,000 registered voters in the city, and, because of the importance of the two propositions, it is believed that a record vote will be cast.

If you have no way of reaching the polls, telephone Glendale 2163 and an automobile will be sent for you.

If you are in doubt as to your voting place, call Glendale 1790 and you will be given the information.

Get Two Ballots!

Information as to polling places will also be given by the police department and the city clerk's office.

It is of vital importance for voters to remember that they will be given TWO ballots when they go to the polls tomorrow. Be sure you receive TWO ballots.

One of these ballots will carry the question as to whether the bond issue of \$1,600,000 for the construction of the Glendale sewer system shall be authorized by the voters.

The other ballot will carry the question as to whether the agreement that has been entered into between the cities of Glendale and Los Angeles, through their properly chosen officials, shall be given the approval of the people of Glendale.

Cast Both of Them

It is essential, in order that the sewer bond issue pass and Glendale have a sewer system, that BOTH these questions be answered in the affirmative by the citizens of Glendale.

The result would be that the taxpayers of the city of Glendale would be paying to have these cesspools pumped out daily, so as to allow a proper condition to exist within the business section, and in some certain places the pumping of the present sewer system is being done. This is a tremendous expense to the city which the taxpayer ultimately absorbs.
There is no question but what Glendale needs sewers to continue her prosperity. The growth as shown in the past few years has beyond estimate, and undoubtedly will be in the future, unless retarded by a few of the vital problems that confront every growing city. Glendale is particularly fortunate in making possible this sewerage disposal through the city of Los Angeles, and it surely is the duty of every citizen to assist the work which has already been done in connection with this sewerage problem, by going to the polls and voting in favor of the bonds.

WATCH FIRE EAT SEASIDE RESORT

Many Glendalians See Fire Wipe Out Ocean Park Amusement Center

Among the many people viewing the ruins of the Ocean Park fire yesterday were Mr. and Mrs. Merrill D. Davis, the former being an advertising man on The Glendale Evening News staff. Damage to the pleasure zone was most complete, he stated, and while it was impossible to get close enough to the dying embers to make notations, Mr. Davis says the loss is not at all overestimated at \$4,000,000.

Only the wide promenade saved the city of Ocean Park proper, and it took the pleasure efforts of the Santa Monica Bay and Los Angeles fire departments to save the new civic auditorium north of the burned area. The largest losers, outside of the pier owners, were the Dome theatre, Bon Ton ballroom, Rosemary theatre and Giant Dipper. Other smaller amusements, concessions were ruined, while many of the store stocks were destroyed before hundreds of moving vans could be summoned.

Recall Other Fires
Residents of Glendale for the last ten years will recall other fires which have done great damage to the bay pleasure resorts. It is said by those who witnessed yesterday's fire that the burning of the great dome of the theatre and dance hall was most spectacular. Fortunately, no one was killed, due to the hour at which the fire started.

Three men, forced to jump into the ocean to save their lives, were rescued and the strict police regulation of the crowds kept all spectators away from the fire zone. It was 3 o'clock in the afternoon before the fire was finally controlled.

Start Investigation to Determine Fire's Cause
LOS ANGELES, Jan. 7.—An investigation was under way today by fire and county officials to determine the cause of the fire which yesterday razed four blocks of the Ocean Park pleasure zone, doing damage estimated at four million dollars.

The fire is reported to have started in a small fish market in a room of one-story business establishments near Pier avenue from a stove.

The fire first wiped out the million-dollar Pickering pier, and within a short time the flames ate their way to the Frazier and Lick pier, destroying several concessions, including the giant dipper and Bon Ton ball room. Fire apparatus was called from all the bay cities, including Santa Monica, Santerre, Beverly Hills and Culver City, and equipment was also sent from Los Angeles. The fire raged for two hours before being brought under control. Only a slight wind is said to have prevented the fire from wiping out the entire Ocean Park business section.

The \$750,000 municipal auditorium was barely saved. No casualties were reported.

ART CLUB HEARS NOTED SCULPTOR

Exhibit of Modeling in Clay Given at Meeting in Public Library

The members and friends of the Glendale Art Club enjoyed a most interesting meeting yesterday afternoon at the public library. A novel feature of the afternoon was the demonstration of modeling in clay, given by Mrs. Woodhead Steere, well-known sculptress, of Los Angeles, Virginia Farrow, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. C. G. Farrow, posed for the artist, who produced a remarkably clever likeness in relief, in an incredibly short period of time. Mrs. Steere did not deliver an address on the subject, but told a few very interesting incidents regarding her work, relative to her studying in Europe and her varied success in the States. She explained in detail the manner in which casts of plaster or bronze are made and of work in marble.

Shows Finished Work
The sculptress had on display a number of pieces of her finished work, including figures in relief, animals and various other pieces, in plaster and bronze. Examining her beautiful work and meeting the artist informally, following the demonstration of working with a living model, gave added pleasure to the very delightful afternoon.

The club president, Mrs. Roy Ballagh, presided at the meeting, and minutes were read of the two previous meetings. Announcement was made that at the next meeting Mrs. Kirke-Smith of University of Southern California will lecture on the subject of designing.

There is no need to cover up facts about this serious sewerage subject. Tell the truth and let these knockers be known before they accomplish their hellish purpose. Some of these knockers have brought up the old time bunk about the large increase of taxes and that Los Angeles has been using sharp practice in getting the sewerage system all their own way. What rot.

I, myself, am for annexation to Los Angeles, but believe in a fair fight in the open and I believe that almost everyone have a dislike of being tricked. There is a proper time for all things and that bunch of eager annexationists have, I believe, put one over on themselves; they have put the cart before the horse which is very inconvenient for the horse.

COMMENT That's All

Vote Yes On Both Ballots Origin Of Sewer Contract Annexation Is Irrelevant Get People To Polls

There is but one subject on which to comment today in the city of Glendale. It is the passage of the sewer bonds at tomorrow's election and the ratification of the contract with the city of Los Angeles to care for Glendale's outfall.

Two ballots will be handed each voter going to the polls. It will be necessary to stamp X opposite the word "Yes" on each to carry the long planned project. Every loyal citizen of Glendale will go to the polls. Every person who has the interests of Glendale at heart will vote for the sewer bonds. Any who vote against the issue will do so because they are not aware of the true facts. It should be 100 per cent in favor of the bonds.

The writer of this column has followed the subject of sewage disposal throughout its discussion. It would be possible to sit back and say nothing this day either for or against the bonds. But we believe in them, believe in the contract and look to the prosperity of this city as dependent on a sewerage system.

Therefore, the following, which is a little different angle on the situation than you have likely read before:

First, the proposal that Glendale build a trunk line sewer to Los Angeles' outfall, caring for adjacent territory along its route, was made in a conference between City Attorney Jess E. Stephens of Los Angeles and Judge Hartley Shaw, then city attorney for Glendale.

The Los Angeles officials recognized the right of Glendale to outfall connection and they did all in their power, from a legislative standpoint, to aid in the passage of the enabling act which was introduced by Representative Frank C. Weller of this district.

It is a matter of personal knowledge that Los Angeles representatives not only voted for this measure, but were urged to do so by representatives of the Los Angeles city government.

The Glendale city council, as well as the Los Angeles city council, were practically unanimous in their endorsement of this plan, which is to be approved by the voters here tomorrow.

And, to the writer's knowledge, there is no civic organization in either Glendale or Los Angeles which has ever disapproved of the compact, or the bond issue to be voted upon tomorrow.

Any opposition which has been publicly voiced may be traced to individuals, whom you could count on the fingers of one hand, who in turn have offered no satisfactory solution of Glendale's sewage disposal problem.

Rather remarkable, isn't it?

While the subject has been discussed, annexation is NOT an issue in tomorrow's sewer bond election. As lawyers say, it is irrelevant and immaterial. Annexation would not give this city sewers without Glendale paying for them and the longer Glendale waits to solve its sanitary problems the more expensive it will be.

Ardent annexationists, many of whom are our friends, recognize this fact and are equally ardent in supporting the sewer bonds. They recognize the fact that consolidation of Los Angeles-city and county is a matter of evolution.

Further, Los Angeles does not, from a civic standpoint, desire to annex any territory which has not provided itself with all necessary improvements. To quote an official of the metropolis:

"Los Angeles wants undeveloped territory, or that which has reached its limit of development. It does not want to burden its overworked departments with problems which could be thrashed out in local councils—at least not until a more representative form of government is adopted."

In other words, annexation is not a question for consideration tomorrow, or for several years to come, although it cannot be denied that city and county consolidation may occur within the decade.

Politics is another issue which has been injected into the hare-brained argument against the

sewer bond issue. It, too, is an immaterial factor.

The fact that the city council saw fit to retain a certain appointee, or to hire certain engineers, in face of criticism, has nothing to do with the voting of the bonds and the approval of the contract. Such things are trivial and incidental and in no way should be permitted to interfere with the greater good of the community.

We admit having our likes and dislikes—some of our most intimate acquaintances may not be personally agreeable, and we are surely disagreeable to some whom we admire—but that has no bearing whatever on the merits of a bond election or the contract for sewage disposal.

Indeed, the voter who permits "personal equation" to enter into a question of this kind is hare-brained. And we are glad to see little evidence of personalities entering into the contest.

Without exaggeration, the argument is all one-sided—in favor of the bonds. But it is necessary to arouse public sentiment and get the people to the polls.

That is the big thing to be accomplished tomorrow. The loyal Glendale voters will put over the sewer bonds as nearly 100 per cent as any issue was ever voted if they accept the opportunity.

Our advice to the energetic realty board, the Chamber of Commerce and all others looking to the future prosperity of Glendale is simply this:

"Get the people to the polls." Think clearly, vote YES. And victory is won.

"We have advertised to the world that we are a city of 50,000 without sewers. Tomorrow we have a chance to remove this stigma. Nor is this a mere matter of pride. The health of our city is menaced, so we no longer dare ignore the situation.

"For thirteen years we have been the 'fastest growing city in America.' Without sewers we cannot expect long to hold this place. For in spite of Glendale's prestige and past record, capital will be compelled to go elsewhere unless we have sewers. Hotels, apartments, and business buildings cannot go up. The home seeker and the home builder must stay away. We shut the door to the carpenter, the plasterer, the painter, and the brick layer.

GROWTH SEEN IN DECEMBER TAXES

Increase Over Same Month in 1922 Is 23 Per Cent, Says Collector

Sales tax and manufacturers' excise receipts for December in the office of Collector of Internal Revenue Rex Goodcell indicated an increase of 23 per cent, compared with the corresponding month of 1922.

Admission taxes collected by motion picture theatres and other places of amusement were \$268,195.25, as against \$216,491.99 for December of 1922, a gain of 19 per cent.

Manufacturers' excise tax receipts were \$116,100.08, showing an increase of 12 per cent.

In the jewelry line, retailers paid \$65,127.30 in taxes on sales, as against \$52,133.37, a gain of 25 per cent.

Beverages and syrups still showed an advance in sales, with an increase of 10 per cent.

Telephone and telegraph messages furnished taxes of \$24,520.20, a substantial increase over December, 1922.

Collector Goodcell predicted that the January receipts for sales taxes, which will cover business transacted in December, will develop the most impressive increase in the history of the Southern California district, and will reflect a record-breaking Christmas business.

C. H. Bates of 2026 Sycamore Canyon road, Glendale, reported that the machine which he was driving Saturday night was sideswiped by a passing touring car on Verdugo road, near York boulevard, just south of the Glendale city limits, and sent hurtling over a twenty-five-foot embankment.

Cathedrals and Churches Of Rome Are Described In Present Kirk Letter

More of Rome is described in the travel letter today from W. B. Kirk. His last letter gave many interesting details of this great Italian city and today he continues his sketch. He writes: "The Pantheon is a very old, well known building, but it is of little beauty, outside or inside, being of octagonal shape with a dome covering the entire building. It contains the tomb of Raphael."

"The most beautiful thing in Rome, externally, is the monument to Victor Emmanuel. It was begun in 1888 and is almost finished. It is about 450 feet long, about that wide, and 250 feet high. It is all white marble, a mass at either end with a circular row of columns between and is ornamented with statues and bas-reliefs. On a fine pedestal in front stands the statue of The Thinker. Another fine outside statue is that of Garibaldi, of bronze on granite pedestals adorned by four groups of bronze figures, two of which represent Europe and America. Another beautiful building is the Palace of Justice, which cost about \$6,000,000, is 600 feet long and took twenty years to build. It is in a fine location on the river, not far from St. Peter's landmark of Rome, the Saint Angelo's castle, a large round fortress, standing at the end of the bridge of the same name. I have detailed to you some of the best known and most outstanding objects of interest in Rome, leaving the three largest cathedrals till the last, because I want to tell you a little more about them."

Three Cathedrals
"We saw them in the afternoon of Friday and on Monday morning. They are all Basilicas, that is, built in the form of a cross, St. Peter's, St. Paul's and St. John's."

"The former, of course, is the best known church in the world. Its exterior is not as imposing as expected, although it faces a very wide, open space, surrounded by semi-circles of pillars. Neither is the interior so vast as you might expect, because it is semi-divided into parts by archways, and, of course, the cross-section parts cannot be seen without entering them."

"The large central dome is not decorated, as I supposed, but contains only portraits, I think. There are several smaller domes. The magnificence of it, however, makes you take long breaths. To the right, as you enter, is the celebrated 'Pietà' of Michael Angelo, a marble statue of Mary holding the dead body of Christ. "I won't attempt to list the many statues and paintings, not-

MAIL OUT FORMS FOR INCOME TAX

Revenue Collector Provides Blanks for 500,000 For Returns on 1923

Half a million tax forms for reporting incomes for the calendar year 1923 are now in the hands of taxpayers in the Southern California district, who filed returns for the year 1922.

Taxpayers who did not file returns for 1922, but who had taxable incomes in 1923, are required by law to secure forms and file. The following penalties are imposed by the statute: For making fraudulent return, not to exceed \$10,000 fine or one year's imprisonment, or both, and in addition 50 per cent of tax evaded; for failure to make return on time, not more than \$1000 fine, and in addition 25 per cent of the total tax; and for failure to pay tax when due, or understatement of tax through negligence, etc., 5 per cent of tax due, plus interest at 1 per cent per month during the period it remains unpaid.

Collector of Internal Revenue Rex Goodcell pointed out today that every person, corporation, firm or partnership that pays anyone salary, wages, interest, rents or royalties, amounting to \$1000 or more, is required by law to report the payments made by the internal revenue bureau. This gives the government an absolute check on income from salaries, wages, rents, royalties and interest. For this reason Collector Goodcell said it did not pay for a person with a taxable income to attempt to evade the filing of a return. In a statement made today, Collector Goodcell outlined to taxpayers the proper way to make returns, and explained the important changes in the method of filing, especially with regard to the new and simplified form which approximately 230,000 taxpayers in the Southern California district will use this year. The filing period ends on March 15.

Simplified Forms
Two forms have been sent out to taxpayers. The new and simplified form 1040-A will be used exclusively by the taxpayers whose net income in 1923 was \$5000 or less, coming principally from salaries and wages. Persons, any part of whose income for the year 1923 was derived from business or profession, farming, sale of property or rents, regardless of

TODAY—De Valera Still in Jail; peril of unemployment.

DUBLIN, Jan. 7.—Eamonn de Valera is still in solitary confinement in Arbor Hill Barracks. Since his capture in Ennis last August the republican leader has not been permitted to communicate with any of his political friends inside or outside of the prison, although once a week he is allowed to get in touch with his wife and family by mail. Even in this case, however, the letters are under strict censorship. The guard over him is composed of highly trusted Free State military officers. Precautions to prevent him getting into communication with his former republican colleagues are so strict that he is not even permitted to attend the masses which are held in a part of the prison remote from where he is detained unless attended by a guard.

However, De Valera is given plenty of exercise, and his food is equal to that provided in a first-class Dublin hotel.

As the situation shapes up now it looks as though De Valera and the other leaders who are now incarcerated will spend many more days in jail, though virtually all of the rank and file have been released.

Contrary to expectations on the part of the Free State authorities, there have been no outbreaks by those released, though it is regarded as not unlikely that there may yet be.

Thousands of young men who were in the republican ranks and are now free, most of them without employment, are generally regarded as possessing troublesome potentialities. Bombs and revolvers are more readily available than jobs, and the outlook from this point of view is not promising.

At the same time the Free State government was releasing these young republican prisoners it also was demobilizing the army. A few months ago there were 53,000 men in the ranks; now there are less than 20,000.

Approximately 40,000 men, therefore, were thrown on the labor market, in which there was no corresponding increased activity.

The quota being full, it is impossible for America to absorb any of this excess labor until next June at the earliest, while England, of course, is unable to take care of her own unemployment problem.

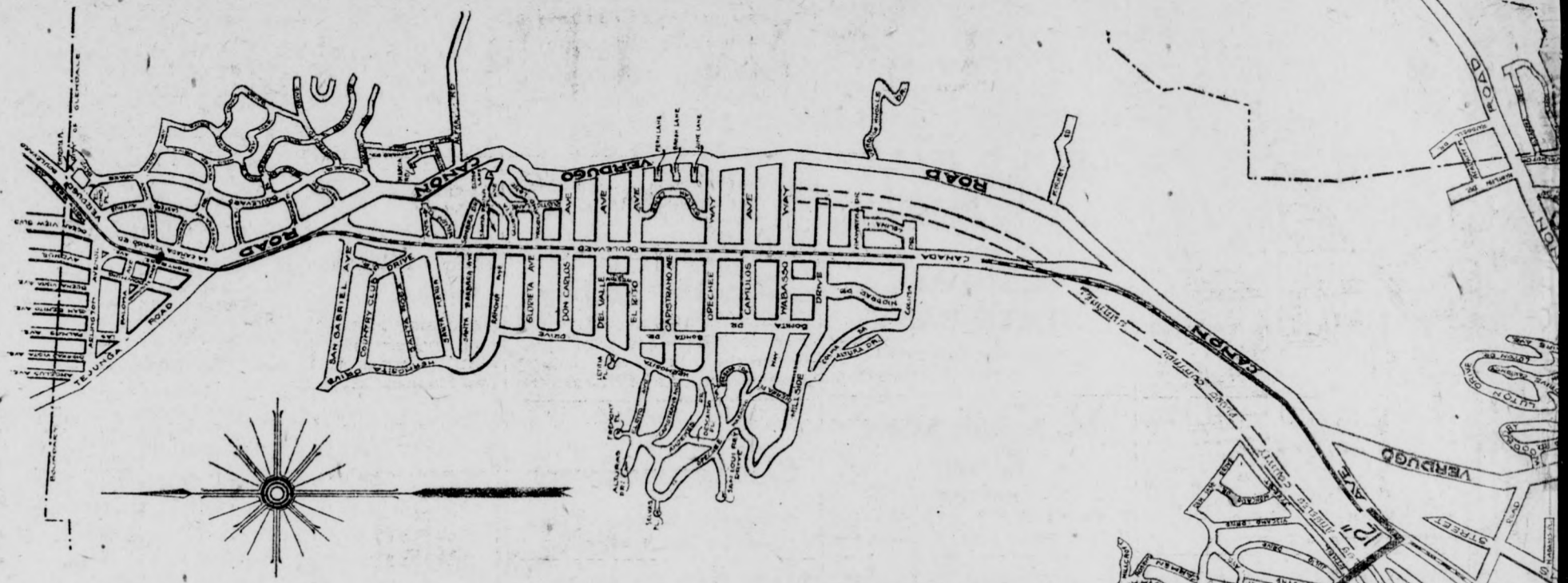

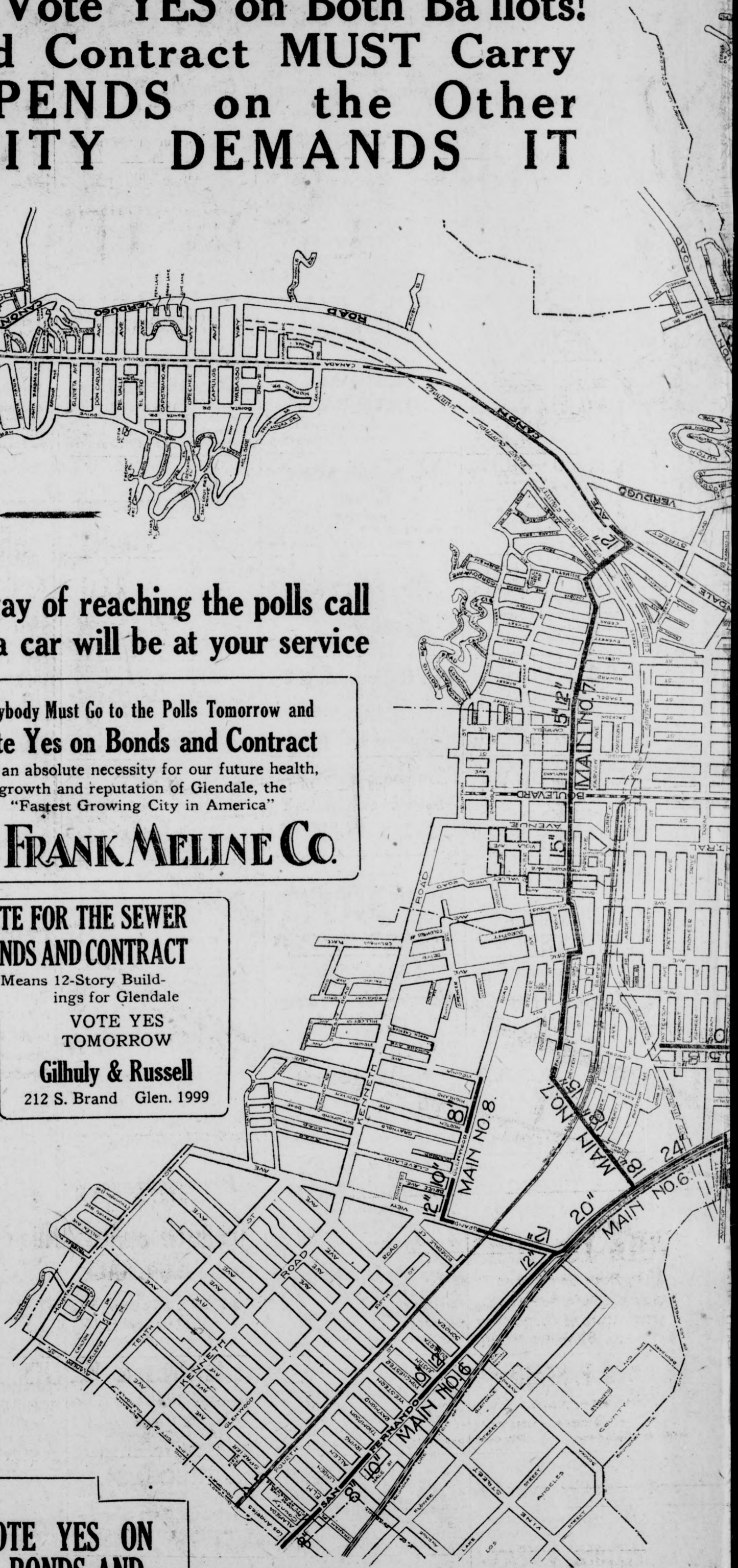

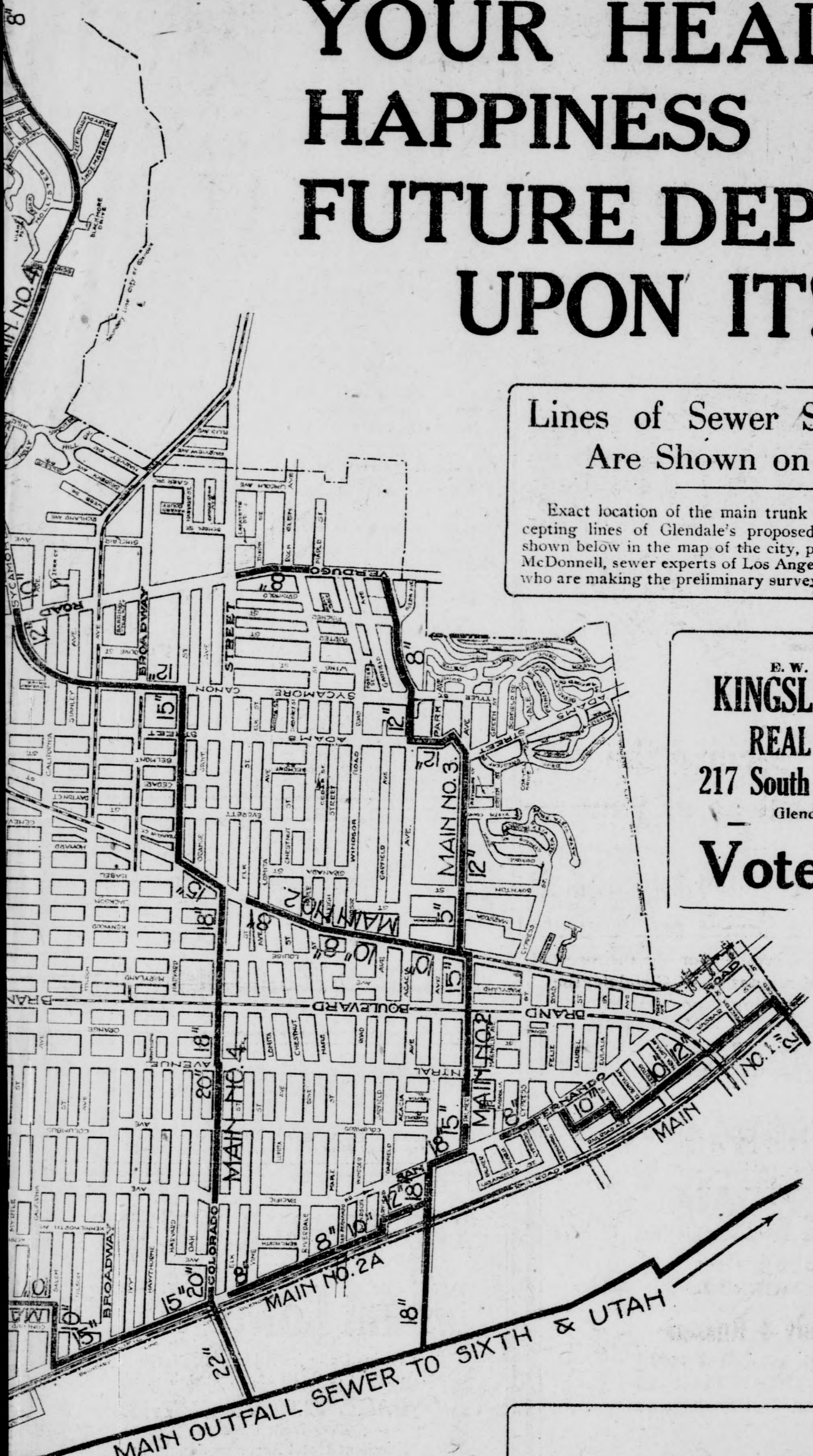

**Lines of Sewer System
Are Shown on City Map**

Exact location of the main trunk line and nine intercepting lines of Glendale's proposed sewer system are shown below in the map of the city, prepared by Burns & McDonnell, sewer experts of Los Angeles and Kansas City, who are making the preliminary survey.



Description of Sewer

The following description of the proposed Glendale sewer system is given by the firm of Burns & McDonnell, noted sewer engineers:

The accompanying map shows the nine proposed intercepting lines or mains which are planned to bring the sanitary sewer system within reach of every home in the city of Glendale. The heavy lines shown on the map and marked "Main No. 1," etc., indicate the location and size of the mains to serve the city.

Main No. 1—Varies from 8-inch to 12-inch in diameter and connects with the main outfall sewer at Tyburn avenue and Hollydale drive, and follows Tyburn avenue to Gardena avenue, thence to Los Feliz road, thence on Los Feliz road to San Fernando, thence on San Fernando to Magnolia.

Main No. 2—Varies from 8-inch to 18-inch in diameter and connects with the main outfall sewer at Parkdale avenue and west of San Fernando road and follows Parkdale to San Fernando, thence on San Fernando to Palmer, thence on Palmer to Glendale avenue, thence on Glendale avenue to Elk avenue.

Main No. 2-A—Varies from 8-inch to 12-inch in diameter and connects with Main No. 2 at Los Angeles street and Parkdale and follows Los Angeles street to San Fernando road, thence on San Fernando road to Elk avenue.

Main No. 3—Varies in size from 8-inch to 15-inch in diameter and connects with Main No. 2 at Palmer and Glendale avenue. This main follows Palmer avenue, Adams, Acacia and Verdugo road to Colorado street.

Main No. 4—Varies from 8-inch to 22-inch in diameter and connects with the main outfall sewer on Colorado and west of San Fernando road. This line follows Colorado, Glendale, Har-

vard, Sycamore Canyon road and Sierra avenue to Scholl drive near the head of Scholl canyon. This main will take care of the principal commercial district of Glendale.

Main No. 5—Varies in diameter from 8-inch to 15-inch and connects with Main No. 4. This line follows San Fernando road, Salem and Chester to Patterson avenue.

Main No. 6—Varies from 8-inch to 24-inch in diameter and connects with the main outfall sewer at Aviation drive and west of San Fernando. This line follows Aviation drive to San Fernando, thence on San Fernando to the northwest city limits of Glendale.

Main No. 7—Varies from 12-inch to 18-inch in diameter and connects with Main No. 6 on San Fernando road. This line follows along Palm drive and Dryden street until it comes to the point on Verdugo road where it will connect with the present sewer system which is already constructed in Verdugo canyon but has no outlet.

Main No. 8—Varies from 8-inch to 12-inch and connects with Main No. 6 at San Fernando and Grand View. This line follows Grand View to Glenwood road, thence on Glenwood road to Virginia avenue.

These nine mains listed above connect with the main outfall sewer which follows approximately the line of the Los Angeles river to Sixth and Utah where it connects with the outfall sewer of the city of Los Angeles, a distance of approximately ten miles. The cost of construction of the nine mains in Glendale is \$277,966 and the cost of the main outfall sewer is estimated at \$1,250,000.

Diet and Health

By Lulu Hunt Peters, M.D.
Author of "Diet and Health, with Key to the Calories"

IS WATER FATTENING?

Saturday I told you the definition of the term calories—that is the unit of measure of heat, or of the energy value of foods; and, technically, it is that amount of heat necessary to raise one pound of water four degrees Fahrenheit, or one kilogram one degree Centigrade.

It does not, like the thermometer, measure the degree of heat but the amount of heat. For instance, a thermometer would register the same degree of heat for a pint of water a certain temperature as it would for a gallon of the same temperature, but the amount of heat would be registered as eight times that in calories. You can see the difference.

But let me say here that while water is absolutely necessary for life it has no caloric or fuel value in the body. In other words, water is not fattening.

Water is composed of hydrogen and oxygen. Starches and sugars are composed of the same elements, but with carbon added. The lack of the carbon keeps water from being a food in the sense that we use the term. So drink all you need—and that is a liberal amount.

You will find you are not nearly so thirsty when you are eating less, for the system does not demand so much water to keep the blood and the tissue fluids in the right concentration. However, drink at least a quart in addition to what you take with your meals. Do not use it to wash your food down; therefore, do not drink while there is food in the mouth.

I met a young woman in Italy, beautifully slender, who said she got that way smoking a cigarette and drinking two glasses of water just before her meals. So you see in her case, instead of water being fattening, she thought it was reducing. Questioning her, I found she did not eat so much; therefore, it was not the water, nor the cigarette. Emphatically, I do not advise smoking to reduce. We have had habits enough already. So remember, I said that it was not the cigarette.

Now as I cannot be giving you menus the rest of my life, I must give you some guide as to the number of calories in different foods so that you can make out your own menus. I shall give you more instructions later about balancing them, so you will have the right kind of food in your diet as well as the right amount of it.

You should have a text book on the subject, and there are several good ones you can get at any public library or book store. We will give you a list of them if you send a self-addressed, stamped envelope.

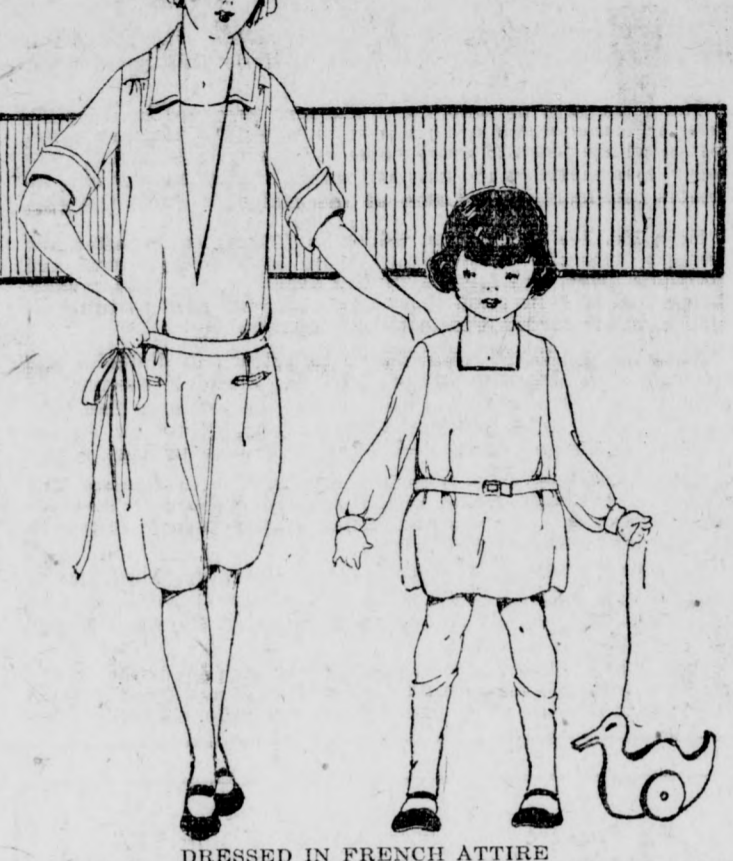

Then drain well and mix it with the following cold dressing: Mix one-half teaspoon of dry mustard to a smooth paste with a very little vinegar, then turn this into a saucepan with two eggs, one teaspoon of salt, two teaspoons of rich sweet top-milk, two teaspoons of butter, one teaspoon of sugar

THE HOUSEKEEPER'S HANDS

Betty J.—It is possible that your skin has not recovered from its attack of blackheads. If you could have an occasional treatment at a beauty parlor, where the work is strictly on a health basis, you might hasten the improvement. When doing this for yourself, always close the pores

The housewife should take to heart that good old saying about the value of an ounce of prevention and a pound of cure. It will take her an hour to undo the damage done by a day of housework. It will take her no time at all to pull on gloves before setting to work. At first they may make her feel awkward and unable to work with her usual speed, but once she is used to them they will not impede her at all.

Very old, loose, leather gloves can be used for all the work but washing and scrubbing, or old cotton gloves will do as well. Rubber gloves, to be pulled over the hands when they must be kept in water, should be of good quality as possible, with a gauntlet long enough to come well up over the wrist. Even the best quality ones are not expensive and are worth a hundred times what you pay for them.

I have a friend whose hands are always admired. She does all her own household and laundry work, and, though she is 50, her hands are those of a woman of 30, and so well cared for no one would dream the amount of work she does. She does all her dish-washing, and all such things as scrubbing floors and paints, ordinarily devastating to the hands and fingernails, with stout rubber gloves on. She uses long-handled dish mops and long-handled floor mops, not only to save the gloves, but also to save bending her back; she even has a scrubbing brush on a long handle, which saves much stooping and reaching. Three times a week she coats her hands with cold cream before putting on the rubber gloves and gives them a beauty treatment while she works.

For what she calls the dry and dirty work she wears loose black cotton gloves; that is, for dusting and sweeping and such jobs. The only household tasks that are hard on the hands where she cannot protect them with gloves are the chopping of vegetables which stain the skin and the weekly laundry work. But she rubs her hands with lard when she is done with these tasks.

Sally—I will be glad to mail you the formula for a hair tonic that will correct this condition. In the meantime massage the scalp vigorously every day until it glows from increased circulation. Lemon juice or buttermilk will lighten the freckles, which is all that is necessary at this season of the year.

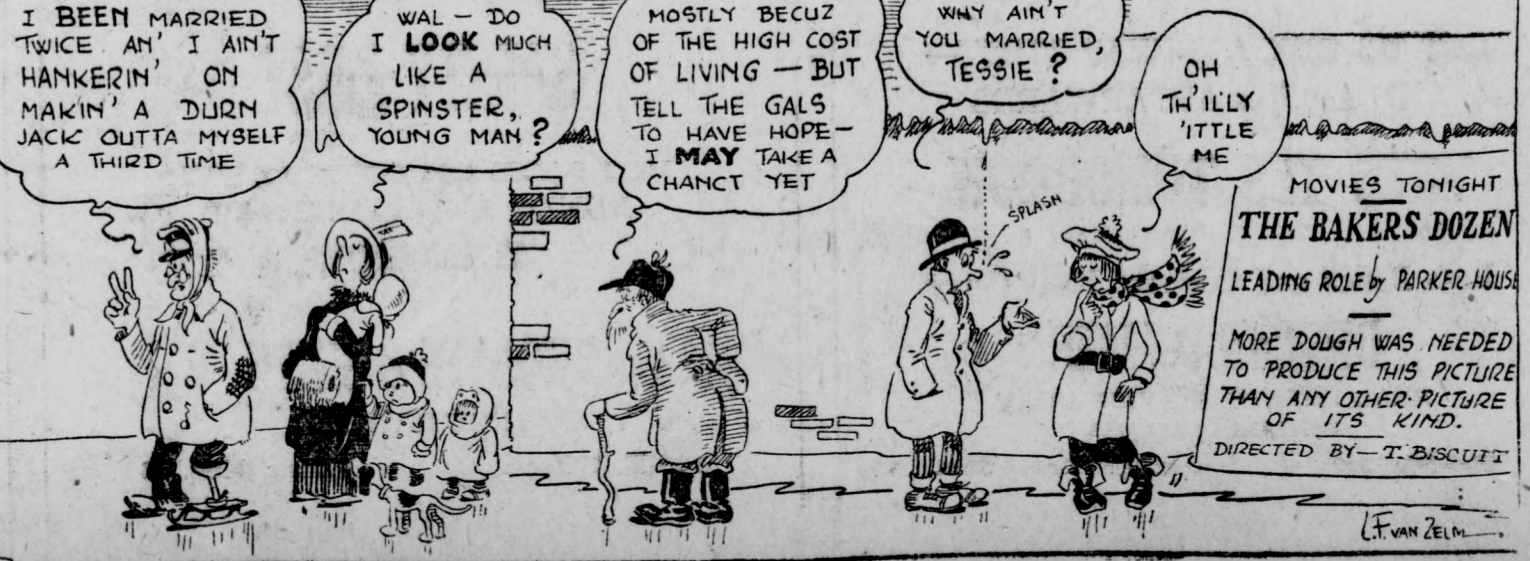

(Continued from Page 1) three, however, to me, is St. Paul's. It is about seven miles out, but surely repays the time and expense. As you approach it, massive pillars of gray granite in double rows form a square in front of it, behind which can be seen the building, adorned at the top with frescoes and gold, and within, what a dream! "The double rows of these beautifully polished grey granite pillars extend the full length on both sides, twenty in a row, making a total of eighty, just imagine! At the front on either side is a much larger one, the finest I have ever beheld. The altar is beautiful, the statuary and paintings appropriate and we were simply charmed with it. The cloister, surrounded by twisted columns, which is pictured largely, was not pretty to me.

"We spent three hours in the Vatican galleries, and museum, which contain much for the artist and art lovers. 'The Laocoon' is there, and is the one piece of statuary I remember pictures of in childhood. 'The Apollo Belvedere,' 'Praxiteles' 'Venus' and 'Horses and Chariot of the Sun' are marvelously executed. 400,000 books in library. The wall and ceiling frescoes are beautiful to anybody, the large vases in mosaic and bronze and the library containing 400,000 volumes are among the priceless things of the world.

The business section is about the same character as these other European cities. The town is growing and has 600,000 or 700,000 people. The 'Quirinal' is a very plain three or four story building facing a large open square.

Forms Mailed Out For Income Taxes

(Continued from Page 1) the amount, will be required to use the larger form 1040. The use of Form 1040 will be required, also, in cases where the net income was in excess of \$5000, whether from salary, business, profession, or other taxable sources. Formerly Form 1040 was used only for reporting individual net income of more than \$5000.

Forms for filing individual returns of income were sent to persons who filed similar returns for the year 1922. It being impossible to determine this year the form desired by the taxpayer—whether he be a man whose income was derived chiefly from salary or wages or from business, profession, or other taxable sources—the taxpayer received both forms, and is expected to select the form that will meet his income requirements.

To avoid errors which may result to their disadvantage, taxpayers are advised by Collector Goodcell to study carefully the instructions on the forms, especially those with regard to credits for personal exemptions and dependents. Married persons required to make a return on Form 1040-A, those whose net income was \$5000 or less, derived chiefly from wages and salaries, are allowed an exemption of \$2500. The exemption for married persons whose net income was in excess of \$5000 is \$2000.

Exemptions Allowed
The exemption for single persons is \$1000. Also whether married or single, the taxpayer is allowed a credit of \$400 for each person dependent upon him for chief support, if such person is under eighteen years of age or incapable of self support because of being mentally or physically defective.

Collector Goodcell said it should be remembered that the requirement to file a return is placed upon every married person whose net income for 1923 was \$2000 or more, or whose gross income was \$5000 or more, and upon every single person whose net income was \$1000 or more, or whose gross income was \$5000 or more. The fact that by reason of the exemptions and credits, a person's income is not taxable, does not nullify the requirement to file a return if the income equals or exceeds these specified amounts. Net income, upon which the tax is assessed, is gross income less certain deductions for business expenses, bad debts, losses, con-

tributions, etc., provision for which is made on the forms. A head of a family—"a person who actually supports and maintains in one household one or more individuals who are closely connected with him by blood relationship, relationship by marriage or by adoption" is allowed the same exemptions as a married person. In the returns of married persons must be included the net income of both husband and wife and dependent children. If they make separate returns they receive but one personal exemption, \$2500 or \$2000, as the case may be. The exemption may be taken by either or divided between them. The exemption of \$400 for a dependent may be claimed only by the one who furnishes the dependent's chief support. Status of Taxpayer
The taxpayer's status on the last day of the taxable year—December 31, 1923, if made on the calendar year basis—determines the amount of his exemptions and credits. If married and living with wife or husband on that day the exemption is \$2500 or \$2000—according to the amount of net income. If single

and without dependents on that day he may claim but \$1000 as his exemption, even though he may have been married or the head of a family during the greater part of the year. Widowers, widows, divorcees and persons separated by mutual consent are classed as single persons. Collector Goodcell urged salaried and wage-earning taxpayers especially, to file their returns during January and avoid the loss of time and inconvenience which results from the February rush with its long line of taxpayers who must wait for their turn at the cashier's window.
