THAT, the Hon'ble the Governor in Council will receive, on Friday next the 29th instant, Proposals from any Person willing to Contract for executing the Annual Repairs to the Hon'ble Company's Civil, Commercial, Police and Marine Buildings ; at Bombay, Parell, the Breach, Mahim, Mazagon, and Coolabah ; as also, the necessary Repair to the several Sluices, and Chokies, at Worlee, Mooree, Daravie and Sion ; and, to the Breach Valard: together with, the Sluices and Chokies of the Salt-works at Rowley, Sheik Miffery, Wadala and Suree, comprising 132 different premises.

CALCUTTA.

MARCH 9th.

The following vessels have arrived in the river since our last publication:

On Sunday the American ship France, from the port of Balcan—sailed the 23d of October last.

On Monday accounts were received in town, of the arrival of the Portuguese flag Andromeda, after a favourable run of 37 days, from Macao.

The commercial advices are on the whole favorable; the demand for cotton, continued, which is quoted at from 14 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 15 tare per peccul, with prospect of further amendment.

The price of opium was nearly stationary, and may be quoted at from 1000 dollars to 1050 per shotta.

The Aurora, from this port, arrived at Macao on the 17th January. The Mornington had not then appeared. The Andromeda touched at Malacca and Penang, and left the latter port on the 12th ultimo.

Private letters received by the Andromeda, communicate the seizure of a large quantity of treasure, by the Chinese government, under an attempt to elide the order prohibiting its exportation. The circumstances attending the transaction, are said to have excited a considerable degree of irritation.

Extract of a letter, dated Macao, the 17th January, 1811.

"The cold here is so intense, that I am scarcely able to write. The Ocean, I lament to say, is entirely given up. There are 15 sail of Americans this season, at China."

A small grab named the Concession, passed Kedgerree on Tuesday last, from Rangoon the 25th ultimo.

An unexpected scarcity of timber continued to prevail at Rangoon; part of the grab's cargo, consisting of thinbin plank, having been bought at the extraordinary high price of 40 rupees per pair.

On Monday the Tweed arrived in the river, from the Mauritius, last from Madras.

Passenger.—Lieutenant Kinsley, of the royal navy. This officer, we understand, is one of those who volunteered his services on shore, under the command of Captain Montague, at the Isle of France.

On Wednesday, arrived the ship Britannia from Penang the 14th ultimo.

The brig Lady Rollo, (commander Mr. Astell,) arrived on Thursday last, from the Coast of Pedier, which place she left on the 17th ultimo. We are concerned to hear by this arrival the melancholy fate of Captain Robert Jones, late commander of that vessel, who was drowned in attempting to go on shore in blowing weather, at Boroong, on the Coast of Pedier. The following are the particulars of this unfortunate circumstance:

"With heartfelt regret I have to communicate the dreadful accident that happened on the 31st January last, on which day we anchored at Boroong. Captain Jones willing to go on shore, left us that day in the long-boat.

"On the following day, February 1d, at 7 A. M. a sand-pau belonging to the King of Acheen's cruiser, came along side with an officer and three lascars, and informed me that the long boat was swamped by the violence of the surf in attempting to land. The Captain of the cruiser and his officers used every exertion to save the lives which were then floating on the bottom of the boat; but am sorry to say, their efforts were ineffectual. Captain Jones and one lascar unfortunately perished. The others were carried on shore in a state of insensibility, and narrowly escaped sharing the fate of their comrades." Upon this I went on shore to see what could be done, and with the assistance of fishermen, we picked up the body of Captain Jones on the second bay, almost as far down as Pedier; which we buried as decently as possible. The lascar could not be found."

On Thursday, arrived the Fifeshire, Captain Bissett, from Penang the 24th ultimo.—Passenger:—Mr. McCollum.

The Kedgerree Report of yesterday announces the arrival of the Honorable Company's cruiser Ariell, Lieut. Macdonald, from a cruise; and the country ship Windham, Capt. French, from Penang the 10th ultimo. A disjou to the passengers mentioned in a former paper, Lieuts. Skardon of the 20th Regt. and Macalister of the Artillery, have come round by this opportunity.

The heavy advance on the price of grain, which has taken place within these few weeks begins to be very severely felt, particularly by the lower orders of the natives, in and about the settlement.

Mooy rice, first sort, which used to sell at rs. 2.6 to 2.8, cannot now be procured under 2.6 to 2.8.

Ditto inferior, which used to sell at 1.4, is now advanced to 1.42 and 2.12 per maund.

Dauil, &c. having risen in proportion. The cause of this extraordinary enhancement on the value of two articles of primary request, it may appear difficult to trace, various reasons having been assigned for it.

Among others, we have been told, that vast and extensive tracts of country, formerly cultivated for the production of rice, have within a short period been converted into indigo plantations, and for the raising of hemp.

While others ascribe the present high price of grain to monopoly.

That the general average return throughout Bengal has been fully equal, to that of any, we might safely add, even the most productive season, which has been known for several years past, cannot be questioned. Whence then, it may be asked, proceeds the cause of the present exorbitant price of grain? From

monopoly, and monopoly alone, founded on the superstition of an ignorant and credulous population, who have to thank the phenomenon which of late has been so frequently witnessed within the last three months. We allude to the flight of locusts, and which has certainly been followed by the very evil, predicted by the authors of the present scarcity, though happily for the existence of the multitude, in a more limited extent, than was perhaps expected.
