BUDGET SHOWS FINANCIAL STABILITY

Decision on Naval Policy at the Next Imperial Conference

In the Meantime Canada Will Carry on Her Naval Service on Pre-War Basis, Says Ballantyne; Warships Offered by Admiralty Accepted.

Ottawa, March 25.—The Canadian naval service will be carried on along a pre-war basis, Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Minister of Naval Service, announced this afternoon, in a statement on the future of the Canadian navy.

Action, he announced further, would be deferred on the adoption of a permanent policy pending discussion by the Overseas Dominions and Great Britain at the forthcoming Imperial Con-

The offer from Great Britain of one light cruiser and two torpedo boat destroyers to take the place of the Niobe and Rainbow had been accepted, he said. Demobilization of all officers and naval ratings had been order-

ed in order to reorganize the present service thoroughly and place it on an economical basis.

Admiral Kingsmill, Mr. Ballantyne also announced, has retired as Director of Naval Services.

The Government will not appoint an officer of such high rank to take charge of the smaller temporary force now proposed. An officer of lower rank will succeed to the post.

The Ministers not in the old Cabinet are Gessler, who is Mayor of Nuremburg; Captain Cuno, who is the director of the Hamburg-American Steamship Company; Boltz and Silberschmidt, who is the leader of the Builders' Trade Union.

Municipalities Are to Collect Special Service Tax and Get Portion of Amusement Impost

Budget Statement of Minister of Finance Indicates Financial Recovery of Province; Will Create Special Fund For Road Improvement Purposes; Readjustments in Financing the Municipalities.

Evening Sitting, March 24. After the Hon. John Hart had resumed his seat in the Legislature this evening it must have been patent to his colleagues, as well as to the occupants of the public galleries, that his grasp of the financial condition in which British Columbia finds herself at the present time is by no means a superficial one. Practically every sentence of his speech dealt with cold fact, and only the briefest periods were given over to the discussion of matters other than those closely related to the administration of the public treasury. No budget speech permits of a very spectacular display of oratory, and the Minister's annual presentation this evening made no pretense to depart from the clearly defined path of customary procedure. The reception accorded to Mr. Hart as he rose to commence his task, the applause which punctuated his address at frequent intervals, and the ovation which greeted his concluding remarks were proof of an apparent appreciation of service well

Municipal Financing

Not an inconsiderable time of the Minister's speech was taken up with the financial position of British Columbia's municipalities. Mr. Hart went very fully into the condition created by the of British Columbia's municipalities. Mr. Hart went very fully into the condition created by the tremendous increase in municipal indebtedness during the so-called boom years, which had resulted in a total aggregate liability at December 31, 1918, of \$106,300.00, fifty per cent. of which represented non-productive expenditure. He pointed out that the sinking funds which should have been on hand at that date were short by \$5,206,093. Moreover, he declared that the net loss on the operation of public utilities during 1918 reached a total of \$204,975, while the aggregate expenditures of municipalities in 1918 had exceeded their total receipts from all sources by \$832,000.

What Government Will Do.

To give the municipalities some assistance the Government proposes to give up the collection of poll tax in the unorganized districts and to allow the municipalities to collect a service tax of \$5.00 from all males between the ages of twenty-one and sixty-five. The amusement tax will be increased to twenty per cent, on the price of admission tickets, and each municipality will be given one-half of this tax collected within its limits. The receipts from both these sources are to be ear-marked for schools and hospitals. It is estimated by the Minister that the increase in the amusements tax will produce \$600,000, \$300,000 of which will go to the municipality. On this basis, therefore, Victoria should derive approximate. ly \$50,000 from the service tax and an additional \$50,000 from the amusements tax. It is estimated that Vancouver should receive \$100,000 and \$150,000 respectively.

DOMINANT FEATURES OF BUDGET ADDRESS SET IN PARAGRAPHS

British Columbia municipalities may collect a service tax of \$5 from all males between the ages of 21 and 65.

The Provincial Government will discontinue to collect the poll tax in the unorganized districts of the Province.

Amusement ticket taxation will be increased by twenty per cent., and the municipalities will be al-lowed one half.

Both service tax and the muni-cipality's share of amusement tax are to be ear-marked for hospitals and schools.

It is estimated that the amuse-ment tax henceforward will pro-duce \$600,000 annually for equal division.

The service tax and her share of the amusement tax are expected to net Victoria the sum of \$100,000 annually. Mr. Hart is of the opinion that it would be in the best interest of the Province if the Government were to exercise more control over muni-cipal financing.

Motor license fees are to be in-creased and the additional revenue will be applied to meet charges on a loan of \$5,000,000 for trunk road

The exemption from income tax is to remain as it is at present in the case of married people and widows, or widowers and dependents.

Revenue expected by the Province from all sources during the fiscal year which commences on April 1 next, is \$13,978,245.13

The estimated expenditure to cover the same period is placed by the Minister of Finance at \$13,960,-711.94 on current account and \$3,449,961.36 on capital account.

Mr. Hart pointed out that the estimated revenue for the next fiscal year is greater by \$1,500,000 than the best previous year.

If the Eastern market is not favorable it is possible that a domestic loan will be floated during the year.

Government Control

In view of the demands made by municipalities for the surrender of municipalities for the surrender of motor taxes, amusement taxes, personal property and poll taxes, Mr. Hart made the interesting statement that the total grants to schools and hospitals and expenditures upon roads in municipal limits amounted in 1918 to \$75,000 more than the receipts from these sources for the whole Province. And at the close of his remarks on this subject the Minister made the significant statement that his observations had led him to think that it would be in the best interests of the Province if the Government were to exercise control of municipal financing and take over municipal sinking funds. This plan is proposed under the draft of the new Municipal Act, funds to be transferred to a Local Government Board, the municipalities being charged an administration fee.

The estimates for the fiscal year commencing April 1 show that the revenue which it is expected will be collected will be \$13,978,245.13. which is something over \$1,500,000 greater than the best year previously, 1912-1913. The revenue shows a growth of 122 per cent. since the Governmen. came into office. The estimated expenditure is \$12,960,711.94 on current account, and \$3,449,961.36 on capital account. Mr. Hart intimated that a domestic loan might be put on the market during the year if the Eastern market was not favorable, and he took occasion to point out that the action of the Dominion Government in reducing the price of Victory Bonds will have an adverse effect on Provincial and municipal financing.

Ottawa. March 25.—Prairie members who have been gathering strength for their fight to secure the completion of the Hudson's Bay Railway this year have lined up a series of questions to be raised in the House on Friday. They have also framed the resolution for the order paper which was decided upon at a well-attended meeting last week. C. P. R. CARS TO BE **BUILT IN CANADA**

Montreal Gazette Says Industries Will Benefit to Extent of Millions

Montreal, March 25.—In regard to the announcement from New York relative to Canadian Pacific Railway equipment notes, The Montreal Gazette says to-day:

"The equipment against which the new securities will be issued, involving an outlay of \$15,000,000, will all be constructed in Canada, thereby assuring to the car building and allied industries a highly substantial volume of business for some months to come.

"The issue is one of the first equipment ones brought out since the end of the war, and marks a further step in the carrying out of the construction programme of the Dominion. It is furthermore one of the largest pieces of corporation financing ever effected in Canada, and is the first financing done by the Canadian Pacific Railway since 1915."

The New York Sun and Herald said yesterday that the Canadiar Pacific Railway Company would issue \$12,000,000 of special notes which would be handled by New York

which would be hathered bankers.

JOINT INDUSTRIAL **COUNCIL SET UP**

Manitoba Industrial Conditions Act Amended; New Electoral Districts

Winnipeg, March 25.— (Canadian Press)—Two important measures received second reading yesterday in the Legislature of Manitoba, which has been sitting afternoons and nights in anticipation of getting through with the session on Friday. One was a bill to effect a partial redistribution of the electoral divisions of the Province, and the other a bill amending the Industrial Conditions Act.

By the former three new constituencies are created—two, Fair—the doctors of medical supplies and of hospitals.

New York, March 25.—Post-war commerce between Australia and the United States cannot be maintained under conditions that obtained during the war, and unless American exporters arrange to purchase Australian raw materials much of this trade likely will be lost, Mark Sheldon, Trade Commissioner from Australia, declared in an address before the American Manufacturers' Export Association here to-day. Merchants of Great Britain and France, he said, will win back the trade the war forced them to abandon unless the exchange situation is improved and American manufacturers more Australian products.

American merchants, the Commissioner said, need not be alarmed at the increase in trade between Japan and Australia, for the increased commerce with the United States was proportionately much greater for a corresponding time, Japan's trade last year amounted to \$41,000,000, as against \$130,000,000 with the United States, he said.

Discussion of the various clauses of the Architects Bill, sponsored by David Whiteside, Government member for New Westminster, occupied two hours in the Legislature this afternoon finally being left over for the further consideration of several hotly debated sections.

Premier Oliver raised various objections, warning that the measure was "serious legislation," and urging the House to go slowly. He ran foul many times of the sponsor of the fill, and differed with the Attorney-General occasionally on legal points. Innumerable amendments were offered, some were withdrawn, and others bitterly contested. The Premier proposed that no architects coming into the Province from outside points should be permitted to take out a licence for four years. His resolution was defeated.

Another amendment which was adopted after a long argument was introduced by J. W. Weart, Government member for South Vancouver. This was to limit the architects fees to five per cent. of the cost of the structure planned.

The question of examinations was a knotty problem, it being decided finally that to ask newcomers to pass an examination would not be consistent. Premier Oliver was in favor of this, while the Attorney-General and others opposed it, claiming that the process of "cramming" might easily permit a youngster to pass, while a veteran of twenty or thirty years practical experience might be tripped up on minor technical questions. This section will be considered further at the next sitting. by Mr. McNutt will be on the Order Paper.

IS NOW OFFICIALLY **EDUCATION MINISTER**

Hon, J. D. MacLean Introduced Bill With Formality

Legislative Press Gallery, Afternoon Sitting, March 24.
One of the most important bills introduced this session was brought down yesterday afternoon by the Hon. J. D. MacLean, Minister of Education and Provincial Secretary. Education and Provincial Secretary.
An interesting, though perhaps not important, clause in the new act provides for a "Ministry of Education," which does not at present exist in this Province—the only Province in the Dominion so situated. The Provincial Secretary is now "Minister of Education" by courtesy only, but with the passage of the bill the Hon. Dr. MacLean will become "Minister of Education," in actuality, as well as Provincial Secretary. The Superintendent of Health, Dr. H. E. Young, becomes Deputy Minister of Education. No administrative change takes place, nor are there any increases in salary.

An important clause in the new act provides that rural School Boards may arrange to contribute half of the expenses of children to and from school where the children live at "too great a distance from the school." This extends to the rural schools a privilege now enjoyed by city schools, it being found sometimes cheaper to make this arrangement than to erect a new structure.

Another section of the Act provides compulsory education for Doukhobors. Hitherto, said Dr. MacLean explaining the measure, these people have evaded the demands of the School Act by "relaying" their children. Some were sent for six months and others for the balance of the school term. It is now provided that children of Doukhobors shall attend public school every school day of the year, except where there are legitimate reasons for non-attendance.

The new act will give power to Boards of School Trustees in any

municipal district having a High School to affiliate with the Univer-sity of British Columbia. This is a provision such as was recently sought by the City of Victoria. Such authority must have approval of the University Governors and the Educa-tion Department.

The act further strengthens the compulsory attendance clauses in the general pet.



The average value of farm land for the Dominion, including improved and unimproved land, together with the value of drellings and other farm buildings, is placed at \$52 per acre, as compared with \$46 last year, \$44 in 1917, \$41 in 1916, \$40 in 1915 and \$38 1917, \$41 in 1918, \$40 in 1915 and \$38 in 1914 and in 1910, according to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This shows an enhancement in value of farm lands of \$14, or \$36.8 per cent., in five years. 





Recognizing that the high cost of living can only be met by increased production; the efforts of the Department of Agriculture have been directed during the year to increasing the production of food stuffs.

Under the production of food stuffs.

Under the provisions of the Land Settlement and Development Act large areas of wildelands are being brought under cultivation, and in connection with this development work soldiers are being employed, many of whom will become actual settlers upon the ready-made farms resulting from these operations.

Settlement areas have been established in the interior of the Province, taking in lightly-timbered lands which have been cruised and title to which has been secured. The policy followed in establishing these areas has been to create closely settled communities. This is the only possible way to give settlers conveniences in the way of churches, schools, roads and so forth, in the most economical manner as well as to facilitate efficient and cheap marketing of produce.

The Household Science Branch of the Department has served a very useful phrpose in connection with the work of the Women's Institute and 199 lectures and demonstrations were given, largely to institute members but also to Boys' and Girls' Clubs and at agricultural fairs.

Livestock sales were held during the year with the view of improving the grade of cattle and sheep in the Province, and the Introduction of pure-bred sires for that purpose. Cattle Clubs were formed for the encouragement of settlers in outlying and sparsely settled districts. Eight of these organizations were formed and 750 head of cattle, principally dairy stock, were purchased and distributed at cost.

With an increase of veterinary inspectors it has been possible to administer the tuberculin test to 14,403 head of cattle located upon 2,068 premises, and it is gratifying to note that of the number tested only 573 re-acted. This work has been chiefly carried on in the more thickly settled districts of the Province.



TO FIND OUT WHO SHOULD FIX FEE IN HIGH SCHOOL

City School Trustees Favor Reduction For Saanich Pupils

Saanich need not worry about the accommodation of its pupils at the Victoria High School for the next year at least, a delegation of Saanich School Trustees was told by the City School Board last night. In the meantime, the school authorities of the city and the adjoining municipality will ask the Council of Public Instruction to decide definitely whether the School Board or the City Council has the right to determine what fee Saanich shall pay for each pupil attending the Victoria High

School.

At present this fee is fixed by the City Council. In the opinion of some of the city trustees the fee is exorbitant and should be reduced. Its continual increase, they felt, had caused two outside municipalities to build their own high schools and, if it continued to mount, probably would induce Saanich to take similar action.

ction.
The Saanich delegation last night The Saanich delegation last night commenced the reference with the School, Board by asking advice regarding the establishment of a high school in the municipality. They were advised by Municipal Inspector Paul that it would be possible to start a high school with three classes if the services of three sufficiently able teachers could be procured.

Some of the city trustees expressed surprise that Saanich was seriously considering the establishment of a high school.

Building Additions.

Trustee Raynor suggested that it

Building Additions.

Trustee Raynor suggested that it might be possible to make additions to the Victoria High School so as to accommodate the pupils of the outside municipalities. A large, consolidated school, he thought, would be cheaper and far more satisfactory from an educational standpoint.

Chairman Riddell replied that it would be possible to make such additions. It was only a question of finance, he said.

Secretary Cowper, of the Saanich Board, however, warned against extending the school so much that the human equation, the personal relation between sthudent and teacher, would be lost, and the pupils become nothing more than convicts. It would be far better to have a number of smaller high schools at different points.

Per Capita Fees.

Per Capita Fees.

Answering questions from Trustee Beckwith Mr. Cowper, quoted from the School Act to show that it was the duty of the municipal councils to arrange the per capita price which should be charged for each outside rupil. The School Boan's had nothing to do with this phase of the question. This provision, in Mr. Cowper's opinion, was ridiculous, as it left educational matters to the councils, which knew nothing about them.

Chairman P. C. Coates, of the Saanich Board, declared that continuance of the present system was infinitely preferable to the establishment of a Saanich High School if satisfactory financial arrangements could be made. Saanich, however, was worried over the price charged for its pupils at the Victoria High School—a price which had soared in an alarming way, and which, it appeared, would mount indefinitely.

Plenty of Room. For the next year Sannich need not worry about accommodation, Chair-man Ridell assured the visiting trustees. In the meantime the Vic-toria Board would go into the whole

toria Board would go into the whole matter.

Trustee Beckwith suggested that the Victoria Board might guarantee that the per capita cost for inition at the Victoria High School would not increase next year. The trustee felt that the "exorbitant" figure decided upon by the City Comptroller-causing outlying municipalities to start their own high schools—had been a great miskake. This, however, he was prepared to "battle out" with the City Council.

Mr. Coates urged that some conclusion be reached as soon as possible as Saanich was anxious, if it decided to establish a high school, to have plenty of time to appoint a staff and make other arrangements.

"We advocate an independent air force. We advocate that it should be a large voluntary air force, and not only a small permanent body, and in the formation we would suggest that every use be made of the yarious aeronautical associations throughout the Dominion."

It was announced that some 114 of the "gift machines" were already in Canada, having been donated by the Imperial Air Ministry to Canada for the work of the Canadians in the flying services. The machines comprise aeroplanes, scapianes, flying boats and airships (Bilmps) and represent a cost of over two millions of dollars, being of the latest types and new from the Old Country factories.

The League is getting into touch with the Air Board with a view to finding out what will eventually be decided in the disposal or refusal of the machines in question.

SCHOOL BOARD NUT **INCLINED TO CUT ANNUAL ESTIMATES**

And, Moreover, Will Form Its Own Opinion on Legal Phase of Matter

The School Board is not inclined to reduce its annual estimates, to any considerable extent, as demanded by the City Council. Nor is it prepared to accept the opinion of the Council's solicitor on the matter.





MOTOR LICENSE FEES BY TREASURY DEPT.

"It is our intention," the Minister continued, "to have the motor license fees colected by the Taxation Department in future. The Attorney-General is now working out a new scale of fees, which will be fixed on a unit basis of weight and value, thereby making allowance for depreciation of cars. In Victoria the debt maturing between 1919 and 1925 amounts to \$6,038,090 with an approximate levy of \$705,090. Taxation in both these cities will be reduced each year, until in 1925 the whole of these levies will be elliminated. This local improvement taxation affects all cities and the large district municipalities equally. To give an idea of the increase in the indebtedness of the large municipal centres, during the years 1910 to 1915, Vancouver's increase was \$24,726,051; \$16,810,300 general debentures, \$7,515,751 for local improvements. Victoria's debt increased during the same period approximate.



or \$74,566.25 more than total received from such sources. On the basis of 86 per cent of population within municipalities would be \$1,-344,075.25. The Province therefore would be giving to the municipalities \$281,637.65 more revenue than that received from them through the sources mentioned.

Amusement Tax Increase

"What appears to be the most serious question is schools and hospitals. It will be noticed in statement of expenditure that 20,26 of total is spent on schools and 1.71 on donations and grants, which include hospitals. In order to grant relief a readjustment of the whole situation as it effect municipalities it is proposed that the Province cease collecting the poll tax in organized districts and allow the municipalities to collect a minimum service tax of \$5 from all males from 21 to 65, which tax should be earmarked for schools and hospitals. In addition to this it is also proposed to increase the amusement tax to twenty per cent, on the admission, and divide this tax with the municipalities, each municipality to be given fifty per cent. of the total tax collected within its boundary, these receipts also to be ear-marked for schools and hospital purposes.

AMUSEMENT TAX **GRADUATION REVISION**

"There will be no increase of the present tax on 5 or 10 cent tickets." It will, however, add 1 cent to the 15c and 20c tickets and 2 cents to the present 25 cent ticket. The current year shows quite a large increase in the amusement ticket tax collection. It is therefore estimated that the increased tax will produce a total revenue of \$600,000; \$300,000 of which will be given to the municipalities. Taking the total amount of Revenue derived from these two sources, Vancouver would received in the neighborhood of \$100,000 from the Service Tax and at least \$150,000 from amusement tax. Victoria would receive \$50,000 from Service Tax and approximately \$50,000 from amusement tax. Victoria would receive \$50.000 from Amusement tax. The cities and districts such as New Westminster, Nanaimo, Nelson, Prince Rupert, South Vancouver, Burnaby and North Vancouver, etc., would receive from \$4,000 to \$12,000 annually.

Sinking Funds.

sinking Funds.

"From the statistics I have submitted it will be observed that the shortage of the sinking fund accounts amounted to over \$5,000,000, the greater proportion of which was in the cities of Vancouver and Victoria. In view of this fact and also on account of the increased revenue being given to the municipalities I think the Government might well consider the advisibility of taking over the sinking funds of the municipalities and issuing its own debentures therefore. Provision could be made of course that where a sinking fund has been accumulated in a municipality and that it is possible to purchase the bonds for which the sinking fund was set aside permission to do so could be given.

More Government Control.

"From my observation I certainly think it would be in the interests of the Province as a whole if the Government was to exercise more control over municipal financing." Sinking Funds.


