### Allies Will Force Germany to Carry Out Their Decisions

London Reparations Conference May Not Be Held Because of German Reply to Allies; In That Case Allies Would Make Their Position Clear.

Paris, Feb. 17.—Germany has been asked by Great Britain and France to communicate to them the counter-proposals of the Berlin Government before the opening of the London conference, which is fixed for March 1, says The Journal. The newspaper adds: "It would not be surprising if the conference should become unnecessary because of the derisive character of the German offers." In this case, it is said, the Allies would notify Germany of their decisions and give the German Cabinet a few days to make known if it would accept or refuse to execute them.

Berlin, Feb. 17.—(Associated Press)
—Dr. Walter Simons, German Foreign Minister, speaking yesterday before the Baden Diet, declared that no German statesman should dare call upon Germany to perform a forty-two-year agreement under the conditions prescribed by the Entente in the reparations demands. "Therefore," Dr. Simons declared, "we must refuse to sign such an undertaking. Germany's situation must become clear within the next few weeks. Two important factors in this clearing up of the situation will be what Germany's position in Upper Silesia is and what Germany's relations with the United States are."

Normal Conditions Being Restored After Big Storm

Winnipeg, Feb. 17.—Clear weather, with the thermometer well below zero, has succeeded yesterday's storm in Winnipeg and throughout Manitoba, and the blizzard's damage was being rapidly repaired to-day. Half of Winnipeg homes were without light last night until after midnight through the fallure of transmission lines in the civic system.

Trains are being restored to schedule to-day, and telegraph lines were working normally before noon. Messages from points west of Winnipeg for the last twenty-four hours have come through to this city at rare intervals and by circuitous routes.

During the storm newspapers in Alberta and Saskatchewan received their news service out of Seattle, by way of Vancouver and Calgary, ordinary routes being impossible.

Journalist's Death Loss to Canada

Will Be Buried at Edmonton Early Next Week

Definite funeral arrangements in connection with the death yesterday of Milton R. Jenning, at 1626 Rockland Avenue, will not be announced until the arrival in the city of J. H. Woods, of The Calgary Herald. It is expected that he will arrive in Victoria to-morrow morning.

Mr. Woods was in the city interviewing the late Mr. Jennings on business last week, and he had just reached his home in Calgary when he received the telegram calling him back to Victoria.

It is stated, however, that it is almost certain that the remains will be shipped from Victoria Saturday, night, and the funeral will take place in Edmonton Monday or Tuesday next.

Ottawa, Feb. 17.—(Canadian Press)—The grand total of Canadian trade for the ten months of the fiscal year ended January 31 was \$2,150,232,774, an increase of \$217,538,484 over the total for the corresponding period a year ago.

Comparative figures for the month of January alone, however, show that there has been a falling off in trade compared with January, 1920. The total value of Canadian exports and imports during the month of January, 1921, was \$154,186,081. During January, 1920, the figure was \$225,096,920, so that a comparison between the two months shows a decrease in trade value amounting to \$70,910,839.



New York, Feb. 17.—Police reserves were rushed to Carnegle Hall last night to suppress a disturbance during an address by Sir Philip Gibbs, English war correspondent and author, occasioned by his references to appropriations by the United States for new battleships. His subject was "What a Man Means to the World." The interruptions came from the audience when persons voicing Irish republic aspirations grew demonstrative after the speaker, alluding to naval expansion, declared: "There is no quarrel between your country and mine. America may build a big navy but it will not raise a hair in a single Englishman's head."

Sir Philip was greeted with hoots and catcalls, chiefly from the gallery. For several minutes he was prevented from continuing. When the police arrived he was under fire of heckiers. Order was restored after fifteen of the audience were requested to leave. Sir Philip then finished his address.

LEADER CABLE IS **PROVED SUCCESS** 

Portsmouth, Eng., Feb. 17.—Foreign naval attaches accredited to this country have visited this city at the request of the Admiralty, to witness a demonstration of the leader cable which is used for directing ships into

a demonstration of the leader cable which is used for directing ships into Portsmouth harbor.

The objects of the leader cable system are to enable ships, by means of submarine sound signals, to make a good landfall in foggy weather, to lead ships into the harbor, to lead a ship from open water through a restricted channel to open water, to give warning of outlying dangers, and to assist a vessel to keep a straight course from port to port and thus save fuel. The system was invented by the British navy, which made an exceedingly successful use of it in war time, but owing to the great potential value of the system to the mercantile marine during the war the Admiralty has not disclosed the full methods of working it until now. The recent tests were designed as a practical demonstration to all the powers of the utility of such cables. A leader cable has already been laid in the Ambrose Channel, New York harbor.

After an experimental existence of over a year, the Portsmouth cable has now become a permanent addition to the navigating facilities of the port, and all large war vessels are now being fitted with the receiving apparatus necessary to enable them to use it.

Empire to Be Consulted Before United States

Wellington, N. Z., Feb. 17.—Statesments to the effect that the Dominions had conferred with the United States in regard to Pacific, naval policy have aroused keen interest in New Zealand. The comment of the press is that the Dominions are not to be used as puppets to force the hand of the British Government.

Though she is vitally interested in the defence of the Pacific, New Zealand's problem differs from that of America and Australia in important respects. New Zealand has no huge tracts unsuitable for white settlement. An active immigration policy will provide a white population capable of holding the islands. Japanese are almost unknown, there being under 100 in the Dominion, compared with 3,500 Chinese and 700 Hindus. The new immigration restriction law is expected to keep Asiatic immigration within bounds without causing friction.

For a stretch of fifteen months there was not a single runaway from the Provincial Industrial School for Girls, but the sudden return to the school of certain recidivists stirred up trouble and an epidemic of escapes, seventeen in all, ensued.

The story of what is being done for wayward girls committed to this home and what the girls themselves are doing is told in the annual report presented to the Legislature this afternoon by the Honorable J. W. de B. Farris, Attorney-General.

"When the last pair made their escape five of the other girls were sent out to hunt for them through the brush," says the

Attorney-General's report. "Three of these five had a few months previ-ously been runaways themselves. ing of their muscles rather than by the more abstract method of the printed page."

"The chief offender was finally transferred to the Mental Hospital where she underwent treatment for her malady. The presence of rank offenders among the better intentioned girls tend to keep the School in a state of turmoil and hinders the progress of reformative work."

The school has a commercial course which is turning wayward girls into good stenographers. Several are now occupying good positions as stenographers, two have filled positions in the Civil Service under competitive examination, two have married and one gone to England. Three remained at their own request in the school to complete their studies, while two advanced ones were permitted to complete their business courses in the city, going to town each day on their honor. Both obtained diplomas of graduation.

"I am not objecting to that course. It was right and proper to say to the people, 'this is a social problem upon which people differ, but not along party lines; decide the question by your votes, apart altogether from party politics."

"That was right; it was logical; it was sound.

Washington, Feb. 17.—The population of Petrograd and Moscow, in Soviet Russia, has greatly decreased, according to a Russian dispatch to the State Department.

The population of Petrograd is 70,-00, seventy-one per cent. less than in 1917, and in Moscow the population has dropped to 1,015,000, about fifty per cent. less.

The death rate, the dispatch said, in Moscow has increased from eight per thousand in 1918 to twenty-two per thousand inst year, while in Petrograd the death rate was two and one-half times as great as in Moscow. The birth rate has also failen, despite increased marriages.

The report said that about three-fourths of the workers in Russia now were women, aged men and children.

"He tells us that this course of resolving this House into committee of the whole is not constitutional; it is not proper practice; it is an evasion of responsibility. Is he right in that contention? Clearly not.

Not According to Rules?

Two Objections Analyzed "You will notice that May states that this course, namely, the course followed in the present instance, is not inconsistent with any parliamentary principle.' That language should be clear enough for the dullest comprehension.

"Then the writer goes on to point out two objections, and two only, to this course. What are they? Let us see if they apply to the present motion. If the objections clearly are not applicable that ends the matter.

"The first objection is that 'it involves a double discussion of the same questions in committee.' Even if that did take place, namely, a double discussion, first on this motion and then in committee, it would be a matter of little moment.

Principle Aiready Decided
"The other case where there is an objection to this course is where 'it reverses the accustomed order of procedure by giving precedence to the consideration of the details of a measure instead of the principle.' Clearly that objection has no application to the motion before the House, because the question of principle on this question has aiready been settled and only the discussion of details remains.

"The question of principle was 'shall we have Government control and sale of spirituous and salt liquors in sealed packages?" That was settled by the people not as a party issue. It was kept clear of any party trammels. Hence we need not concern ourselves with this question Principle Already Decided

"Only one question remains, the details of the measure, and it is details of the measure, and it is these details which the Opposition, if it blindly follows its leader, insists upon making a party question. Not only it is therefore sound practice, in line with the authorities, apart altogether from the fact that it is what the public demands, namely non-partisan treatment, but my honorable friend himself proved that the same practice was on at least three occasions followed by this Government.

In an effort to probe interested opinion on the matter, Mrs. Herchmer stated that she had approached the principal of the High School, but Dr. Robinson was somewhat non-committal, suggesting that any attempt to reform dress by starting on the school girls was a waste of time.
