Canada's Total Output During the Year 1921

2,800,000 Tons Was Figure of British Columbia

Ottawa, March 2.— (Canadian Press)—The output of coal from Canadian mines during the twelve months ended December 31, 1921, amounted to 15,000,000 short tons, valued at \$74,273,000, or \$4.97 a ton. This quantity was 88 per cent. of the amount mined during the preceding year, when the total output was 16,900,000 tons in 1919 a total of 13,900,000 tons of coal was mined, so that although the output in 1921 was 12 per cent. lower than in the preceding year it was more than 1,000,000 tons more than in 1919. The highest monthly output recorded was for November, when more than 1,000,000 tons were mined, and the lowest was in April, the total being over half a million less, or \$941,000 tons. Alberta Led.

Head of Mining Institute **Makes Statement** 

Treasures in Northern Ontario and Quebec

Ottawa, March 2.—In the course of an address before the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy in annual session here, C. V. Corless, president of the Institute, referred to Canada's enormous pre-Cambrian areas surrounding Hudson Bay as a veritable treasure house of minerals, where real prospecting had been scarcely begun. This area included the nickel mines at Sudbury, the silver mines at Cobalt and the gold mines at Porcupine. Referring to the great pre-Cambrian area, which comprises ninety per cent. of the Province of Quebec, Mr. Corless predicted that enormous mineral treasures awaited discovery by the "thrifty people of this province."

Mr. Corless referred to the tremendous reserve in Canada, estimated at 1,234,000,000,000 tons, or 35,000 times the present annual circulation. THE WORLD'S GOLD IN 1921.

## **FARMERS OPPOSING** SUBSIDY FOR SHIPS

## resent Situation in United States

Washington, March 2.—(Canadian Press) — Representative Dickinson, chairman of House farm bloc, yesterday said that the Middle West would insist that improvement of the St. Lawrence and development of the Mississippi River for traffic were pre-requisites to any grant of a ship subsidy. Pointing out that the agricultural states oppose the subsidy, he said that if the ship subsidy is to be forced on them then it is indispensable that they have water outlets to the sea at low freight rates. Indications are that members of the farm bloc in both Houses hold the key to subsidy legislation and unless agricultural opposition can be overcome the Harding programme will fail. The administration, however, has made a strong bid for support of agricultural interests by pledging itself to the St. Lawrence project.

## **British Economies Outlined by** Chancellor of Exchequer

London, March 2.—Addressing the House of Commons yesterday in a speech in which he minutely detailed the economies the Government had decided to adopt in connection with the recommendations of the National Economy Committee headed by Sir Eric Geddes, Sir Robert Horne, Chancellor of the Exchequer, asserted that these would total £64,000,000 compared with £86,000,000 advised by the committee. Of the total amount of economies to be effected, £54,000,000 would be saved in the coming fiscal year.

The principal points in the Chan-

coming fiscal year.

The principal points in the Chancellor's address were his acceptance of reductions in the army estimates of £16,500,000 instead of £20,000,000 as proposed by the Geddes committee, his statement that the naval estimates for 1922-23 would be below £61,000,000 for the current year, and the announcement that it was the purpose to economize by a reduction of £6,500,000 in the education estimates, instead of £18,000,000 as suggested in the Geddes report.

Another interesting point in the address was the Chancellor's announcement of the Government's decision not to abolish the Ministry of Labor, as was advised by the committee.

The Chancellor said the Government had recommended the cancellation in the army of twenty-four battalions, equivalent to five cavalry regiments, and a reduction of the artillery by 40 per cent.

Regarding the navy, the Chancellor said the committee had recommended a reduction of £21,000,000 without regard to the savings to be effected as the result of the Washington Conference or the savings on the provision of oil.

The Admiralty, however, had offered a saving of £21,000,000, but including the savings to be effected through the Washington resolution, and including certain savings on oil.

Sir Robert said that the comparative figures the Admiralty was setting up against the committee showed £10,000,000 in proposed reductions as compared with the committees £21,000,000 recommendation, with

The Government had considered the whole matter, and had concluded it would not insist on a reduction of the navy personnel below 90,000.

Further Results.

Many references were made by the Chancellor to the Washington Conference on Limitation of Armaments, and he expressed the hope that there might be further developments from it. When it was known what other powers were doing, still further naval reductions might be possible, but at present he thought the Government was not justified in asking the Admiralty to reduce further, adding the extent of Empire responsibilities. It was only through the great achievements of the Washington Conference that the present reductions were possible, the Chancellor added. He pointed out that the personnel of the navy was 98,000 as compared with a pre-war strength of 151,000, and a personnel of 129,000 in the American fleet.

Sir Robert explained that the difference between the advice of the Geddes report for a reduction of 54,000 men in the army and the actual reduction of 33,000 actually adopted as having been largely due to the requirements of the Indian Government. He said the size of the army exclusive of India, would now be 20,000 less than before the war.

The Chancellor said the air estimates would be reduced next by £10,500,000 as compared with the suggestion of the Geddes report for a reduction of £18,500,000.

## STEEL TO STATES

## Dominion's 1921 Export Total

24,079 Tons

New York, March 2.—(Canadian Press).—Canada heads the list of countries from which the United States imported iron and steel during the year 1921, a report made public here discloses. Importations from the leading countries during the year were: Canada, 24,079 tons; Belgium, 18,529 tons; Sweden, 5,507 tons; China, 4,610 tons; Germany, 4,282 tons; United Kingdom, 3,385 tons. Of the total importations from Canada, 21,251 tons consisted of steel rails. Canada and Belgium furnished 65 per cent of the total imports for the cent of the total imports for

Washington, March 2.—(Canadian Press).—A report has been issued by the Department of Commerce shows that harness and saddlery to the value of \$22,562 was shipped by United States manufacturers to Canada during 1921. Canada's purchases amounted to 8.6 per cent of the total exports.

In 1920 the corresponding averages were: \$86 for men, including board value \$20. For the complete year 1921 the average value of wages and board was \$669 for men and \$449 for women, as compared with \$821 for men and \$492 for women, as for women in 1920.

## **NEW BRUNSWICK** LEGISLATURE MEETS

Frederickton, N. B., March 2.—"I commend to your careful consideration such proposals as may be submitted to you with a view to improving the financial situation of the Province." declared Hon. William Pugsley, Lieutenant-Governor, in the opening speech in the Provincial Legislature this afternoon. Further than that no inkling was contained in the official document of what steps the Provincial Government propose to take to augment the depressed revenue of New Brunswick, nor was there any direct reference to amendments to the Intoxicating Liquor Act of 1916.

Chicago, March 2.—The Standard oil Company of Indiana made net earnings of \$21,288,348 during 1921. according to the annual statement made public after a meeting of the board of directors to-day. The gross earnings were approximately \$2,000,000 greater, the difference being used for federal taxes and similar items.



Love of Astronomy Evidently Runs in Families

W. F. H. Waterfield, of Crescent Bay, Nakusp, has erected a private observatory on his place near Nakusp. Mr. Waterfield, who is Secretary of the Nakusp Board of Trade, is a great grandson of Sir William Herschel. He has lived at that point for the past eight years. The telescope is a reffector, 12½ inches in diameter and seven feet long, and without the standard, weighs over a ton.

Describing the telescope of the Newtonian type called after its inventor, the famous discoverer of the law of gravity, the rays of light from a star or planet instead of being collected by a lens, as in the great Yorkes and Lick telescopes, are reflected from a curved mirror, made of glass with a chemically deposited coating of pure silver. Mr. Waterfield's telescope is mounted in the usual manner of large instruments and has a clock-work attachment so that once the telescope is pointed at a star, the clock will keep it on that star and leave the hands free for other work. The instrument stands on a concrete pillar and a stimple house has been built around this, of Mr. Waterfield's own device, with a roof which swings completely open, with the help of counterpoised levers admitting a clear view of the whole sky.



When the jury, retiring at twenty minutes to five returned in less than an hour and brought in a verdict for the detectives. Start Henderson, K.C., senior counsel for Dr. Hall, an nounced that he would take an appeal from the verdict and judgment in the damages named, with costs and this was speedily ordered by Mr. Justice Morrison.

The jury's verdict was expected on all sides by those who had followed the case and occasioned no surprise to Dr. Hall following the judge's summing up of the evidence. His Lordship, in his charge to the jury could find little in favor of Dr. Hall but a great deal on the side of the detectives.
