

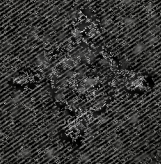

Explanation of the Articles in the Calendar.

Standard times* are given in all columns headed Toronto, Quebec, and Winnipeg. The times* of the SUN'S RISING AND SETTING† are given for the upper limb, and are corrected for refraction for Toronto, Quebec and Winnipeg.

The standard times* both for the rising and setting of the Moon's centre are given for every day for Toronto, Quebec and Winnipeg.

The column, SUN ON MERIDIAN, gives the time that a watch keeping local mean time should show, when the shadow of a sun dial is on the noon mark.

MOON'S AGE.—This column shows to the nearest tenth of a day the Moon's age at Toronto mean noon.

The column, UPPER TRANSIT OF POLE STAR, shows for every day the mean time* at which the Pole Star makes its upper transit across the meridian of longitude 4h. 46m. W. It passes the meridian twice on October 14th.

The time at which the lower transit of the Pole Star occurs may be found by adding 11h. 58m. 2s. to the time of the preceding upper transit.

The column, TRANSIT OF FIRST POINT OF ARIES, shows for every day the mean time* at which the FIRST POINT OF ARIES passes the meridian of longitude 4h. 46m. W. (71° 30'), and for any other meridian a correction of 0.655 secs. per degree will have to be applied, minus for longitudes west of the 71° 30', and plus for east.

GREATEST ELONGATION OF THE POLE STAR.—This table gives the greatest azimuth of the Pole Star east or west from the meridian as observed at a place in latitude 42°, with the corresponding corrections, which are additive, for latitudes up to 65°. (See pages 33 and 34.)

From the time of the upper transit of the Pole Star may be found the time of its greatest western or eastern elongation, by adding or subtracting the constants given in the annexed Table. These constants are calculated for declination 88° 48' 45". The maximum error in the use of this Table will not exceed 5 secs. in the higher latitudes, and proportionately less for the lower latitudes.

MOON'S PHASES.—This Table gives the times (standard 75th meridian)* when the Moon passes the geocentric longitudes of 0°, 90°, 180°, and 270° east of the sun. It gives also the times of her greatest and least distance from the earth.

* In the present Almanac the hours are numbered from 0 (midnight) to 23.

† Although these times are calculated for Toronto, Quebec and Winnipeg only, the standard times at other places not differing much from them in latitude may be obtained with sufficient accuracy for ordinary purposes by adding four minutes for every degree west, and subtracting four minutes for every degree east of these places.

STAR TABLE.

From the times of the transit of the *First Point of Aries* may be derived, with the aid of the following table, the approximate times of culmination, rising and setting of the principal fixed stars, as seen from the parallel of 45° north latitude.

To ascertain when any star found in the following Table will be on the meridian, add the number in the left-hand column of figures to the transit of the *First Point of Aries* for the given day in the calendar. If the result exceeds 24 hours, subtract 23h. 56m.

To find the time of rising of a star, subtract the number opposite to it in the right-hand column of figures from

the time of its meridian passage. For the setting of a star, add the same number to the time of its meridian passage. The stars marked (...) revolve in a circle of perpetual apparition, and do not rise or set at places in and to the north of latitude 45°.

Example.—Find the time of culmination rising and setting of a *Aquila*.

ECLIPSES IN 1907.

In the year 1907 there will be four eclipses, two of the sun and two of the moon.

I.—A *Total Eclipse of the Sun*, 1907, Jan. 13th, invisible in Canada. The path of totality will traverse Central Asia.

II. A *Partial Eclipse of the Moon*, 1907, Jan. 28-29, partly visible at Toronto, the moon setting eclipsed; the beginning visible generally in North America, the Pacific Ocean, Central and Eastern Asia, and Australia; the end visible in Northwest North America, the Pacific Ocean, Asia, Australia, Central and Eastern Europe.

III.—A *Annular Eclipse of the Sun*, 1907, July 10th, invisible in Canada. The path of the Annular Eclipse will cross near the central portion of South America.

IV. A *Partial Eclipse of the Moon*, 1907, July 24th, visible at Toronto; the beginning visible generally in Central and Western Europe, Africa, South America, and North America, except the northwest portion; the end visible generally in Western Africa, South America, and North America except the peninsula of Alaska.

EASTERN STANDARD TIME.

First contact angle from the north point 41° to E. Magnitude of the eclipse = 0.620 (Moon's dia = 1'0).

A *Transit of Mercury*, 1907.—A Transit of Mercury over the Sun's Disk, November 14th, partly visible at Toronto, the sun rising with Mercury on its Disk. The ingress will be visible generally in Europe, Africa, Western and Central Asia, Western Australia, and South America; the egress in Europe except the north-eastern portion, Africa, Western Asia, South America, and North America except the northwest portion.

The Greenwich mean times of the last two contacts for any point on the surface of the earth may be computed from the following two formulæ, respectively, in which ρ denotes the radius of the earth at that point, ϕ' the geocentric north latitude, and λ the longitude west from Greenwich. The numbers in brackets are the logarithms of the respective coefficients.

Eq. int. = 13h. 47m. 18.3s. + [1.7922] ρ sin ϕ' + [1.4077] ρ cos ϕ' cos (72° 18' 30" - λ).

Eq. ext. = 13h. 49m. 57.8s. + [1.7838] ρ sin ϕ' + [1.4091] ρ cos ϕ' cos (74° 26' 42" - λ).

In these formulæ the G.M.T. is reckoned from midnight (oh).

At Toronto the interior contact at egress will take place at 8h. 48m. 19s. Standard time 75th meridian. The exterior contact at egress at 8h. 50m. 58s. The least distance of the centres will be at about 7h. 7m., Mercury being to the north of the sun's centre 12' 38". 4. The sun rises in Toronto that day at 7h. 10m.

These Tide Tables, with Tidal Differences for other places, are issued by the Tidal and Current Survey, in the Department of Marine and Fisheries of the Dominion of Canada. They are based upon observations obtained by means of self-registering tide gauges, which are kept in continuous operation day and night throughout the year. The records are reduced by the latest methods of analysis, and the computation of the tables is made in the Nautical Almanac office, London.

The Tide Tables for Halifax are based upon the analysis of a tidal record which was obtained during the years 1851, 1852, 1860 and 1861, together with the record from the present tide gauge during five complete years; between October 1895 and August 1901. The Tide Tables for Quebec are based upon tidal record during eight complete years, between November 1893, and March 1902. The Tide Tables for Father Point are based upon tidal record during six complete years; from January 1897 to June, 1903. The Tide Tables for St. John, N.B., are based upon tidal record during eight complete years; between April 1894 and June 1903.

Statement of the Receipts and Payments from the Consolidated Fund for the year ending 30th June, 1905.

The receipts from the sources of the ordinary revenue of the country are paid into what is called the Consolidated Fund, and payments therefrom are made to cover the ordinary expenses. These receipts and payments, therefore, constitute what may be considered as the regular income and expenditure of the country, receipts from and expenditure out of loans and all other extraordinary transactions being excluded.

LEGAL WEIGHTS AND MEASURES IN CANADA.

The legal weights and measures of Canada are the Imperial yard, Imperial pound avoirdupois, Imperial gallon (of 277·27384 cubic inches), and the Imperial bushel. The Imperial gallon is equal to 4·54174 litres, while the wine gallon, used in the United States, is equal to 3·785 litres.

By Act 42nd Vic. (1879), Chap. 16 (amended by Chap. 30, Acts of 1898), it is provided: That in contracts for sale and delivery of any of the undermentioned articles, the bushel should be determined by weighing, unless a bushel measure be specially agreed upon, the weight equivalent to a bushel being as follows:—

Wheat, 60 lbs. Indian Corn, 56 lbs. Rye, 56 lbs. Pease, 60 lbs. Barley, 48 lbs. Malt, 36 lbs. Oats, 34 lbs. Beans, 60 lbs. Flax seed*, 56 lbs. Hemp, 44 lbs. Blue grass seed, 14 lbs. Lime†, 80 lbs. Castor beans, 40 lbs. Potatoes, 60 lbs. Turnips, 60 lbs. Carrots, 60 lbs.

Parsnips, 60 lbs. Beets, 60 lbs. Onion‡, 50 lbs. Bituminous coal, 70 lbs. Clover seed, 60 lbs. Timothy, 43 lbs. Buckwheat, 43 lbs.

By the same Act the British hundredweight of 112 pounds and the ton of 2,240 pounds were abolished, and the hundredweight was declared to be 100 pounds, and the ton 2,000 pounds avoirdupois, thus assimilating the weights of Canada and the United States.

By recent Acts it is ordered that for apples the barrel shall be 96 quarts. Size, length, 26 inch between head (inside measure); diameter (head) 17 inches; middle diameter, 18½ inches. Boxes, 11 x 10 x 20 inches containing 2,200 cubic inches.

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SHORT HISTORY OF CANADA.

FROM 1497 TO 1905.

The following brief resumé of the principal events in the history of our country is taken from the Statistical Abstract, and will be found of interest. The remarkable events of the year 1903-1904 are given in another portion of the Almanac.

CHRONOLOGICAL LANDMARKS IN THE HISTORY OF CANADA.

- 1497—June 24. Cabot discovered Cape Breton.

 1613—St. John's, Newfoundland, founded. Ottawa River discovered by Champlain. (Champlain sailed up the Ottawa River, crossed Lake Nipissing, and descended French River into Georgian Bay and Lake Huron, returning by Lake Ontario.)

 1620—Population of Quebec, 60 persons.
 1621—First mention of the name "Nova Scotia" in a grant of the Province to Sir W. Alexander by James I. First code of laws promulgated at Quebec.
 1624—Nova Scotia first settled by the English.
 1625—Jesuits first arrive in New France.
 1627—Canada granted to the Company of "100 Associates" by the King of France. Feudal system established in Canada.
 1629—July. Capture of Quebec by the English under Sir David Kirke. 117 persons wintered there.
 1632—Canada, Cape Breton, and Acadia restored to France by the Treaty of St. Germain-en-Laye. First school opened in Canada at Quebec.
 1634—July 4. The town of Three Rivers founded. August 13. Fort Richelieu (Sorel) founded.

 1659—M. de Laval, first Roman Catholic Bishop of Canada, arrived from France. Lake Superior discovered by French traders.
 1663—Company of "100 Associates" dissolved. Royal government established. First courts of law.
 1664—Seigniories granted.
 1667—Acadia restored to France by Treaty of Breda. White population of New France, 3,918.
 1670—May 13 (n.s.). Hudson's Bay Company founded.
 1672—Count de Frontenac appointed governor. Population, 6,705.
 1673—June 13. Cataragui (Kingston) founded.
 1674—Iroquois established at Caughnawaga.
 1689—August 5. Massacre at Lachine by Indians.
 1690—Capture of Port Royal by Sir William Phipps, and unsuccessful attack upon Quebec.

 1695—Iberville took English forts in Hudson's Bay.
 1697—Treaty of Ryswick. Mutual restoration of places taken during the war.

 1701—August 4. Ratification of a treaty of peace with the Iroquois at Montreal. Canadians granted leave to manufacture.
 1709-10-11—Canada invaded by the British. Port Royal (Annapolis) taken by Nicholson (1710).
 1713—Treaty of Utrecht, by which Hudson's Bay and adjacent territory, Nova Scotia (Acadia) and Newfoundland were ceded to the British.
 1715—First ships built at Quebec.
 1719—First government founded by the British in Nova Scotia.
 1720—Population of New France, 24,434, and of St. John's Island (Prince Edward Island), about 100. Fort of Louisburg built.
 1721—January 27. Mail stages established between Quebec and Montreal.
 1722—Division of settled country in Canada into parishes.
 1739—Population of New France, 42,701. First forge erected in Canada—at St. Maurice.
 1745—Louisburg, Cape Breton, taken by the British.
 1747—Militia rolls drawn up for Canada. Courts of Justice constituted in Nova Scotia.
 1748—Restoration of Louisburg to the French in exchange for Madras, by the peace of Aix-la-Chapelle.
 1749—June 21. The city of Halifax founded by Lord Halifax; 2,544 British emigrants brought out by the Hon. Edward Cornwallis.
 1752—March 23. Issue of the Halifax *Gazette*, the first paper published in Canada.
 1755—Expulsion of the Acadians from Nova Scotia. About 3,000 were deported at the request of the New England colonists.
 1758—First meeting of Nova Scotian Legislature. July 26. Final capture of Louisburg by the British.
 1759—July 26. Capture of Fort Niagara by the British under General Prideaux, who was killed during the assault. July 25. Commencement of the siege of Quebec. September 12. Battle of the Plains of Abraham and defeat of the French by General Wolfe, who was killed on the field. Loss of the British, 700; and of the French, 1,500. September 13. Death of General Montcalm, commander of the French forces. September 13. Capitulation of Quebec to General Townsend.
 1760—April. Unsuccessful attack on Quebec by General de Lévis. Capitulation of Montreal and completion of the conquest of Canada. Population of New France, 70,000.
 1762—British population of Nova Scotia, 8,104. First English settlement in New Brunswick.
 1763—February 10. Treaty of Paris signed, by which France ceded and guaranteed to his Britannic Majesty in full right "Canada with all its dependencies." Cape Breton annexed to Nova Scotia.

- 1764—June 21. Issue of the *Quebec Gazette*. In this year Pontiac, chief of the Ottawas, organized a conspiracy for a simultaneous rising among the Indian tribes, and a general massacre of the British. The plan was successfully carried out in several places and all the inhabitants put to death, but finally the Indians were forced to succumb.
- 1768—General Carleton, afterwards Lord Dorchester, appointed Governor-General.
- 1769—St. John's Island (Prince Edward Island) made into a separate province, with Walter Patterson for the first governor. The first meeting of an elected House of Assembly took place in July, 1773.
- 1774—The "Quebec Act" passed. This Act gave the French Canadians the free exercise of the Roman Catholic religion, the enjoyment of their civil rights, and the protection of their own civil laws and customs. It annexed large territories to the Province of Quebec and provided for the appointment by the Crown of a Legislative Council, and for the administration of the criminal law as in use in England. North-west coast of British Columbia explored by Vancouver and Cook.
- 1775—Outbreak of the American Revolution and invasion of Canada by the Americans; every place of importance rapidly fell into their hands, with the exception of Quebec, in an attack upon which General Montgomery was defeated and killed on 31st December.
- 1776—Reinforcements arrived from England, and the Americans were finally driven out of Canada.
- 1777—Order of Jesuits abolished by Papal decree and consequent escheat of their estates in Canada to the Crown.
- 1778—June 3. First issue of the *Montreal Gazette*. This paper is still published.
- 1783—September 3. Signing of the Treaty of Versailles and definition of the boundary line between Canada and the United States, viz., the great lakes, the St. Lawrence, the 45th parallel of north latitude, the highlands dividing the waters falling into the Atlantic from those emptying themselves into the St. Lawrence and the Ste. Croix river.
- 1784—Population of Canada, 113,012. (United Empire Loyalists in Upper Canada not included.) Fredericton, N.B., founded. Cape Breton separated from Nova Scotia politically. British population of Nova Scotia, 32,000 (about 11,000 Acadians not included. About this time began the migration into Canada and Nova Scotia of the United Empire Loyalists, as they were called—that is, of those settlers in the United States who had remained faithful to the British cause. This migration lasted for several years, and though it is not possible to arrive at any exact figures, it is probable that the number altogether was not less than 40,000. The Loyalists were well treated by the British Government, and large grants of land were made to them in various parts of the country. The banks of the St. Lawrence and the shores of Lake Ontario, in particular, were settled by about 10,000 persons, on lands allotted to them by the Government.
- 1785—May 18. Date of charter of St. John, N.B., the oldest incorporated town in Canada. Sydney, C.B., founded by Lieutenant-Governor Desbarres. August 16. New Brunswick made a separate province; population, 11,457. Reintroduction of the right of *habeas corpus*.
- 1787—First Colonial See established in the British Empire in connection with the Church of England, in Nova Scotia.
- 1788—Western Canada (now Ontario) divided into five districts, and English law introduced. King's College (N.S.) founded.
- 1791—Division of the Province of Quebec into two provinces, viz., Upper and Lower Canada. Each province to have a lieutenant-governor, and a legislature composed of a house of assembly and a legislative council. The members of the council were to be appointed by the lieutenant-governor for life; those of the assembly to be elected by the people for four years. Population of the two provinces, 161,311.
- 1792—September 17. First meeting of the parliament of Upper Canada at Newark (Niagara), under Lieutenant-Governor Simcoe. The House of Assembly consisted of sixteen members. December 17. Opening of the Legislature of Lower Canada, at Quebec, by Gen. Clarke. The house of assembly consisted of fifty members.
- 1793—Abolition of slavery in Upper Canada. Upper and Lower Canada separated from the Church of England See of Nova Scotia, and constituted a separate See. Toronto founded as York. Rocky Mountains crossed by Mackenzie. Public accounts first published.
- 1796—The seat of government of Upper Canada removed from Niagara to York (Toronto).
- 1798—The name of St. John's Island changed to that of Prince Edward Island, in honour of the Duke of Kent, the change to take effect in 1800. Population, 4,500.
- 1799—Education Act passed in Upper Canada.
- 1800—Jesuits' estates taken possession of by the Government. King's College (N.B.) granted a royal charter.
- 1805—January 1. Founding of the *Quebec Mercury*.
- 1806—November 22. Issue of *Le Canadien*, the first newspaper printed entirely in French. Population of Upper Canada, 70,718, and of Lower Canada, 250,000.
- 1807—Grammar schools founded in Upper Canada.
- 1809—First steamer on St. Lawrence river.
- 1811—Judges excluded from parliament.
- 1812—War declared between Great Britain and the United States. July 17. Mackinaw surrendered to the British. July 18-20. U. S. troops repulsed at River Canard. August 5. Tecumseh defeated U. S. troops at Brownstown. August 16. Surrender of Detroit by the Americans under General Hull to General Brock. September 16. U. S. troops repulsed at Presqu'île. September 21. Gananoque raided by U. S. troops. October 13. U. S. troops defeated at Queenston. November 10. Kingston bombarded by U. S. troops. November 20. U. S. troops repulsed at Odell town. November 23. U. S. troops repulsed near Fort Erie.
- 1813—January 22. U. S. troops defeated at Frenchtown. February 6. Brockville raided by Americans. February 22. Ogdensburg taken by British. May 5. U. S. troops defeated before Fort Meigs. May 29. U. S. troops defeated at Sackett's Harbour. June 5. U. S. troops defeated at Stoney Creek. June 19. United States stores captured at Great Sodus. June 24. U. S. troops surrendered at Beaver Dams. July 4. U. S. troops made prisoners at Fort Schlosser. October 1. U. S. troops repulsed at Four Corners. October 26. U. S. troops defeated at Chateaugay. Defeat of three thousand Americans under General Hampton by Colonel de Salaberry and four hundred French Canadian militia. November 11. U. S. troops defeated at Chrysler's Farm. - 1814—March 30. U. S. troops repulsed at La Colle Mill.
 May 6. Oswego captured by British.
 July 19. Prairie du Chien surrendered to British.
 July 25. U. S. troops defeated at Lundy's Lane.
 August 12. U. S. troops defeated near Fort Erie.
 September 17. U. S. troops repulsed at Fort Erie.
 December 24. War terminated by the Treaty of Ghent.
 Population of Upper Canada, 95,000, and of Lower Canada, 335,000.
- 1816—Common schools established in Upper Canada.
- 1817—First treaty with the North-west Indians; the Earl of Selkirk signing on behalf of King George III. First banks opened in Montreal and Quebec cities.
- 1818—October 30. Convention signed at London regulating the privileges of the United States in the British North American fisheries. Halifax and St. John, N. B., made free ports.
- 1821—Commencement of the Lachine canal. (First vessels passed through in 1825.)
 Amalgamation of the Hudson's Bay Co. and the North-west Trading Co.
- 1825—Great fire in the Miramichi district of New Brunswick. Five hundred lives estimated lost. Three million acres of forest destroyed.
- 1827—Guelph founded by John Galt. Treaty of London. McGill College received its charter. It was founded in 1811. King's College, Toronto, founded.
- 1828—Saguenay district explored. Pictou and Sydney made free ports.
- 1829—Upper Canada College opened.
- 1831—Population—Upper Canada, 236,702; Lower Canada, 553,134.
- 1833—August 5. The steamer "Royal William" left Quebec for Pictou, N. S., discharged cargo and coaled, leaving Pictou on 18th August for Gravesend, England, at which port she arrived after a stormy passage, during which she disabled one of her engines. The boat was built at Quebec during 1830-31, and was the first steamer that ever crossed the Atlantic, the motive power of which was entirely steam.
- 1834—By Act of Legislature York became Toronto.
- 1836—July 21. Opening of the railway from Laprairie to St. Johns, the first railway in Canada.
- 1837-38—Outbreak of rebellion in both provinces. It was suppressed in Upper Canada by the militia, and in Lower Canada by the British troops.
- 1840—Death of Lord Durham, to whose exertions the subsequent union of the provinces was mainly due. Quebec and Montreal incorporated. Montreal daily *Advertiser* founded; first daily journal in Canada.
- 1841—February 10. Union of the two provinces under the name of the Province of Canada, and establishment of responsible government. The legislature was to consist of a legislative council and legislative assembly, each province to be represented by 62 members, 42 elected by the people and 20 appointed by the Crown.
 Population of Upper Canada, 455,688.
 May 17. Land slide from the Citadel rock, Quebec; 32 persons killed.
 June 13. Opening of the first united parliament, at Kingston, by Lord Sydenham.
- 1842—August 9. Settlement of the boundary line between Canada and the United States by the Ashburton Treaty.
- 1843—Victoria, B. C., founded by James Douglas.
- 1844—Population of Lower Canada, 697,084.
- 1845—Large fires in the city of Quebec; 25,000 people rendered homeless. Welland canal opened.
- 1846—Oregon Boundary Treaty.
- 1847—Grand Trunk Railway begun. Navigation laws repealed.
 Electric telegraph line established between Quebec, Montreal and Toronto.
- 1848—The St. Lawrence canals open for navigation.
- 1849—April 25. Riots in Montreal over the passage of the Rebellion Losses Bill, and burning of the parliament library at Montreal.
- 1850—The first sod of the Northern Railway turned by Lady Elgin. The road was opened from Toronto to Bradford on 13th June, 1853, and was the first locomotive railway in operation in Upper Canada. The Robinson Treaties with the Indians of the northern shores of Lakes Huron and Superior concluded. The main features of these treaties, viz.:—Annuities, reserves of land and liberty to fish on the domains of the crown not alienated—have been followed in the subsequent treaties.
- 1851—Transfer of the control of the postal system from the British to the provincial governments, and adoption of a uniform rate of postage, viz.;—3 pence per $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce. The use of postage stamps was also introduced.
 Population of Upper Canada, 952,004; of Lower Canada, 890,261; of New Brunswick, 193,800, and of Nova Scotia, 276,354.
 Young Men's Christian Association organized in Montreal; first in America.
- 1852—Commencement of the Grand Trunk Railway. Trinity College, Toronto, and Laval University, Quebec, opened.
- 1853—The number of members in the legislative assembly was increased from 84 to 130, being 65 from each province.
 May 9. First ocean steamer arrived at Quebec.
- 1854—January 27. Main line of the Great Western Railway opened for traffic.
 Abolition of Seigneurial Tenure in Lower Canada, and settlement of the Clergy Reserve question.
 June 5. Reciprocity Treaty with the United States signed at Washington. It provided for mutual rights of fishing in certain Canadian and United States waters, for free interchange of the products of the sea, the soil, the forest and the mine; it allowed Americans the use of the St. Lawrence river and Canadian canals on the same terms as British subjects, and gave to Canadians the right to navigate Lake Michigan. The Treaty was proclaimed by the President of the United States on 16th March, 1855, on which date it came into operation. It was to last ten years.

- 1856—The Legislative Council of the province of Canada was made an elective chamber. Allan steamship line commenced regular fortnightly steam service between Canada and Great Britain.
- 1857—March 12. Desjardins canal railway accident; 70 lives lost.
- 1858—Adoption of the decimal system of currency. Selection by the Queen of the City of Ottawa as the capital of the Dominion and permanent seat of Government. Atlantic cable laid between England and Nova Scotia.
 April. Gold found in British Columbia.
 September. Gold found in Tangier river, Nova Scotia.
- 1859—New Westminster founded by Colonel Moody.
- 1860—Winnipeg founded.
 First Provincial Synod of the Church of England—held in Montreal.
 August 25. Opening of the Victoria Tubular Bridge by the Prince of Wales (now Edward VII). [This bridge crossed the St. Lawrence at Montreal, on the line of the Grand Trunk Railway, until the year 1898 when it was superseded by the Victoria Jubilee Bridge. It was the largest iron tubular bridge in the world, was 60 feet high in the centre, and nearly two miles in length.]
 September 1. Laying of the corner stone of the Dominion buildings at Ottawa by the Prince of Wales (now Edward VII). These buildings, together with the departmental buildings, have been erected at a total cost, up to 30th June, 1894, of \$4,979,242.
 Art Association founded in Montreal.
- 1861—Population of Upper Canada, 1,396,091; of Lower Canada, 1,111,566; of New Brunswick, 252,047; of Nova Scotia, 330,857; of Prince Edward Island, 80,857; of Vancouver Island, exclusive of Indians, 3,420.

- 1862—Conference at Charlottetown *re* Confederation. Manitoulin Island Treaty with Indians arranged by Hon. William Macdougall.
- 1864—Quebec Conference held. Resolutions passed in favour of Confederation of British North American provinces. Raid from St. Albans into Canada.
- 1865—Free public school system introduced in Nova Scotia.
- 1866—Nova Scotia and New Brunswick accept Confederation with Canada.
Great fire in Quebec, 2,129 houses burned in St. Roch's and St. Sauveur suburb.
March 17. Termination of the Reciprocity Treaty, in consequence of notice given by the United States. It lasted 11 years.
June 1. Invasion of Canada by Fenians. Battle of Ridgeway, and retreat of the volunteers.
June 3. Withdrawal of the Fenians into the United States.
June 8. First meeting of Parliament in the new buildings at Ottawa. At this meeting the final resolutions necessary on the part of the Province of Canada to effect the Confederation of the provinces were passed.
November 17. Union of Vancouver Island and British Columbia proclaimed.
- 1867—February 10. The British North American Act passed by the Imperial Legislature.
July 1. Union of the provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick under the name of the Dominion of Canada. The names of Upper and Lower Canada were changed to Ontario and Quebec respectively.

SIXTY YEARS AFTER: 1847-1907.

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THIS is the sixtieth year of the existence of THE CANADIAN ALMANAC, and, in a new country like Canada, a publication is indeed noteworthy that, without interruption, has appeared regularly for so long a time. It is worth while to survey some of the changes which the world has seen since 1847, when THE CANADIAN ALMANAC first appeared. Then Europe and Asia were vastly different from anything we know now. France was still ruled by a king. Italy was, as Prince Metternich said, a mere "geographical expression;" there was no kingdom of Italy, and the peninsula contained some ten separate states, each weak and dependent upon foreign support. Instead of a German Empire there were nearly forty practically independent German states, in which not Prussian but Austrian influence was what chiefly counted. Bismarck had hardly yet been heard of. In Russia were still about 40,000,000 serfs, sold like cattle with the soil, and with no rights that counted as against their masters. In the United States there were millions of black slaves. Chicago, now one of the great cities of the world, was then a second-rate little town with about 20,000 inhabitants. The Far East was a sealed book to the West. In Japan intercourse with the outside world was still forbidden by law, and the penalty of death was imposed upon Japanese visiting a foreign country. So complete was Japan's isolation that, nearly ten years later than this, an American resident in Japan was a whole year without receiving any mail, and telegraph and railway were alike unknown to the Japanese. The Emperor of China still claimed to be the ruler of the whole world, and denounced as arrogant and insolent the proposal of Great Britain to treat with him on equal terms. The Indian Mutiny—that tragic episode in our Empire's life—was still ten years away.

In 1847 there was no Canada in our sense of the word, for the term still meant only the present provinces of Ontario and Quebec. Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island were not only no part of Canada but they had no connection with each other; while the whole North-West was still a quite separate country in the hands of the Hudson's Bay Company, which had a monopoly of its trade. British Columbia was hardly thought of: for years still it was to remain a wilderness inhabited by Indians and a few miners and fur traders.

In 1847 not only Canada, but no single British Colony anywhere, had real self-government. Most of them had legislatures, but with very restricted powers; and the governors from England thought that they had the right and the duty to override local action, if it seemed to them wise to do so. In Canada there was a kind of assumption that in all questions the last word was with the Governor or the Home Government, not with the Canadian people, and there was a constant looking to London to have measures disallowed which were attacked by one or other of the Canadian parties. In 1849 a Canadian mob burned down the Parliament buildings at Montreal because Lord Elgin, the Governor of the day, refused to take steps that would lead to the disallowance in London of a measure—the Rebellion Losses Bill—that had passed the Canadian Parliament by a sweeping majority.

If, politically, in 1847, Canada was backward, it is not easy for the present generation to realize what commercially was her situation. The country was at that time on the verge of bankruptcy. In 1843 Canadian wheat and flour had been given a preference in the British market. But in 1846, when Britain adopted free trade, this preference was repealed. All the available capital in Canada had been invested in building mills, wharves, warehouses, and in opening up lines of communication, for the vast trade in grain which, it was expected, the preference would develop, and its repeal wrought ruin. Not only were private individuals bankrupt; the finances of the government itself were seriously embarrassed. There was not ready money

enough in the country even to pay the government officials, and the Governor-General, the judges and other high personages had to take their salaries in debentures redeemable in cash at some future time. It is an amusing fact that when, in 1849, the St. Andrew's Society of Montreal was angry with Lord Elgin and, to show their anger, resolved to repay to him his subscription of £10, they had no money, and had to order the issue of a debenture for the amount.

Other distresses were troubling Canada in 1847. It was the era of the Great Famine in Ireland, and famine brought with it plague. From the stricken land hundreds of thousands fled to America. They came out in small over-crowded ships. No provision was made for proper care and ship fever wrought among them terrible havoc. In 1847 no less than 100,000 of these poor people landed in Canada. Hundreds died at the quarantine stations, and at Grosse Isle rows of graves of these forgotten dead still remind one of the horrors of those days. A good many persons ministering to the afflicted new-comers caught the plague and died, and the Government, itself almost bankrupt, was put to great expense in caring for the many who landed on Canada's shores.

But though in 1847 an old world, to us very strange, still survived, striking changes were at hand. A new spirit was working and the next year saw revolt and revolution in nearly every important capital in Europe. In France the monarchy was overthrown. In some of the states of Germany and Italy, though less was accomplished than enthusiasts desired, constitutions were established which form still the guarantee of public liberty in those countries. Enthusiasm ran high in 1848 and everywhere among Liberals was the belief that a new era had dawned for mankind. In 1851 was held in the Crystal Palace, near London, the Great Exhibition which was intended to show that the struggles of the nations were henceforth to be in the peaceful competitions of the arts and sciences. The clarion of war, some thought, would be heard no more.

But disillusion came speedily. Europe and America were in fact on the verge of an era of war less prolonged but more terrible, because of the vast numbers engaged, than anything the world had yet seen. The Crimean War, which involved Russia, Britain, France, Turkey, and a part of Italy, broke out in 1854. France, Austria and Italy engaged in a bloody struggle in 1859; Prussia, Austria, and Denmark in 1864; Prussia, Italy and Austria in 1866; and in 1870 the whole of Germany was engaged in a Titanic combat with France. The United States saw a similar convulsion in the great struggle between the North and the South from 1861 to 1865.

It might at first seem that with such carnage the world had gone backward since 1847. Yet out of these conflicts have come some of our greatest movements. The obstacles which check human progress are so strong that only mighty upheavals will loose them. Thus it happened that in Russia what brought the nation face to face with its real condition was the Crimean War, with its terrible record of disaster and inefficiency. Almost all classes demanded reform, and under this pressure Russia made some great strides forward. In 1861, just when civil war on the question of slavery was breaking out in the United States, Russia took the momentous step of freeing her forty million serfs. In other states, too, war led to progress. Italy's wars in 1848, 1849, and 1866 brought national union in the Kingdom of Italy, which we know and take so much as a matter of course that we forget how recent it is. There are men not yet old who were grown up when it came into existence. Likewise Prussia's wars led to German unity, to the German Empire which is so conspicuous in the European world to-day. And we all know that the freedom of the slave, and the firmer welding together of the nation were the enduring results of the tragic struggle in the United States, which lasted longer and cost more lives than any of the European wars. True, therefore, it is that the stupendous struggles into which the nations have plunged since 1847, with their many evil results, have yet helped to promote national unity and public liberty, those two things for which the best minds of the last half of the nineteenth century cared more than they cared for anything else.

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But not only on the political side has our world changed. Since 1847, our whole outlook upon life is in many respects different. The world has become smaller. There was then no Suez Canal to make easy the passage from the East to the West. In America there was no transcontinental railway, and to have crossed the American continent was a considerable distinction. Now the "globe trotter" who has been everywhere is a commonplace. Nature herself is changed to us. It was not until more than ten years after 1847 that Darwin gave to the world his theory of Evolution which has so profoundly modified our whole outlook upon nature and given to her working a charm and interest that have proved almost too absorbing. This new thought, like all change, was to bring conflict and controversy, but what was true in it has survived and has made men to-day freer, nobler, more potent, by giving them a deeper understanding of the world about them.

Changes due to Science.

In 1847 for the first time the telegraph connected Quebec, Montreal and Toronto. Of course there was, as yet, no Atlantic cable, and it usually took at least a fortnight by the fastest ships for news of what happened in England to reach America. The railway, still a comparatively new thing even in Europe, was hardly known in Canada and points beyond water communication were remote indeed, for freight and passengers must reach them chiefly by horse carriage. Not until some years after 1847 had Toronto any railway. In 1851 the Northern Railway running northward to Bradford and Barrie was begun, and after that railways came thick and fast. Yet not until 1856 was there a service between Toronto and Montreal, and only in 1860 was the St. Lawrence bridged so that trains from the south could run into Montreal. The two Canadian provinces had at the time about 1,200,000 people, and when we remember how few they were we almost wonder that they had the courage to undertake the vast enterprises of railway and canal building which began during these early years.

In 1847 Canada had not even a post office of her own; until 1851 the postal service was carried on by the Imperial Government. Money was still reckoned in pounds, shillings and pence. The unfortunate person who got into debt might be thrown into prison until he should pay. In the two Canadas there was but one Anglican prelate—the bishop of Quebec. The Presbyterians were divided into three separate churches—the Church of Scotland, the Free Church and the United Presbyterians, and there were Wesleyan Methodists, New Connection Methodists, and so on. In Upper Canada something like a state church still existed, for what is now the state University of Toronto was under Anglican control, and the state endowment of religion known as the "Clergy Reserves," the subject of burning debate, was used chiefly for the benefit of the Church of England. In the Province of Quebec feudalism still survived. The great majority of the farmers were tenants of the land they tilled, not owners, and, if the law was strictly enforced, must grind their grain at the seigneur's mill, and perform for him other services more fitting in mediaeval Europe than in modern America. At that time Canada had no fixed capital, the legislature wandering from place to place, much to the inconvenience of those carrying on the government, who, with the railway still unknown, had to carry the papers necessary for the work of government to places as remote from each other as are Toronto and Quebec.

Social Changes in Canada since 1847.

Though in 1847 Toronto had been for nearly half a century, if not always, the most important place in Upper Canada, it was still in appearance not unlike a flourishing frontier town with a population of not more than twenty-five thousand. Excepting Osgoode Hall not one of the fine structures of to-day existed. Where the University buildings stand there was the forest primeval. Duke and Duchess streets, now well nigh forgotten in their obscurity, were centres of fashion, and the corner of Bay and Front streets, now in the heart of the business district, and near which THE CANADIAN ALMANAC is published, was a residential district. When there were disturbances in Toronto in 1849, in connection with the Rebellion Losses Bill, and the Liberal ministers were attacked, the crowd, clamorous before the residence of one of them, the Hon. Robert Baldwin, at the corner of Bay and Front streets, had not far to go to show its disapproval before the residence of another, the Hon. William Hume Blake, a little farther up Bay street.

Toronto in 1847.

Since that time, while great indeed have been the changes, the greatest of all is in the significance of the word Canada itself. In 1847 the word meant two half-bankrupt provinces, with so gloomy an outlook on the future that some of the most conspicuous leaders thought of finding political salvation by annexation to the United States. Soou, however, came a great revival. Soon after 1850 the opening up of lines of communication brought movement, trade, ambition, and by 1854 Lord Elgin noted that Canada was already totally different in outlook from the half despairing colony of 1847. This new progress involved a wider political vision and in time the half-dozen British colonies in North America began to think of union in one great state. We all know what happened. In 1867 the Dominion of Canada came into being. It consisted then of only Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. But the spirit of union was in the air. Other provinces came in speedily and in 1871 "Canada" meant a vast state stretching from ocean to ocean, thinly peopled it is true, but with latent possibilities, the measure of which we are only beginning to understand. It is not without significance that just at the time when we have United Canada appeared also United Germany and United Italy. The United States, too, had just passed through a great civil war to save the Union. It may be that in the annals of mankind the union in Canada will prove to be as important as that in the greater states.

When Sir John Macdonald and his colleagues were planning the Canadian Federation they gave little thought to the great region in the West, then the preserve of the Hudson's Bay Company. Of course they counted upon Canada's getting it some day, but it did not bulk large in their plans, and only the discriminating few dreamed of the real value of the country. Never was a better bargain made than that completed in 1869, by which Canada paid to the Hudson's Bay Company \$1,500,000 and took over the Canadian West, with the additional promise that the Company should have one-twentieth of all the land in the country as it was surveyed—for a trading company a magnificent heritage, making it one of the greatest land-owners in the world. No sooner was this territory acquired than clamour began for a railway to cross it. British Columbia joined Canada on the express understanding that such a line across the continent should soon be built. The difficulties in the way were enormous. The railway would cost more than \$200,000,000—\$50 per head for every man, woman, and child in Canada: an expenditure equal to \$4,000,000,000 for the 80,000,000 people of the United States—a sum that makes huge aggregations like the United States Steel Corporation and the Standard Oil Company take a secondary place. But the thing was done in an incredibly short time, and in 1885 the West and the East of Canada were linked together by steel. After twenty years we see now what all this meant and we must admire the magnificent courage of the men who carried through so stupendous a project. The West has been opened up. Its fertility is beginning to be understood and all Canada is throbbing with hope in regard to its future. Merchants and manufacturers in the East of Canada are finding in the West their needed markets. Toronto and Montreal are growing because the West is growing.

In Canada to-day there is optimism everywhere. Population, for a long time almost stationary, is increasing rapidly and the Canadian people have in themselves a confidence to which they were long strangers. In 1864 the Hon. George Brown visited Ottawa to inspect the parliament buildings then in course of erection. "The buildings are magnificent," he wrote, "the style, the extent, the site, the workmanship are all surpassingly fine. But they are just 500 years in advance of the time. It will cost half the revenue of the province to light them and heat them and keep them clean. Such monstrous folly was never perpetrated in this world before." The great Liberal statesman proved to be a bad prophet. In reality, not twenty years after he wrote, the buildings had proved quite inadequate as a home for Canada's government and new ones are being added all the time. The foreign trade of Canada has grown beyond all dreams of possibility. It will soon be \$500,000,000 a year, and this is, of course, a comparatively small sum compared with the volume of the internal trade.

Nothing is more impressive than to look at a recent map of Canada and to see what rapid changes are coming. North towards Hudson Bay, a land that a few years ago seemed almost as remote as Arabia, settlement is not creeping but running, and towns are springing up which have become considerable places almost before we know of their existence. New Liskeard and Cobalt and Haileybury are names that we see in the newspapers. The average man knows that these places are somewhere in the north but he hardly realizes that they mean a domain of vast wealth that has been discovered within the last few years almost as literally as America itself was discovered long ago.

The New North.

When we turn to the West the changes are bewildering. Winnipeg, with more than a hundred thousand inhabitants, and now the third city in Canada, was little more than a village, without even a railway, less than thirty years ago, and between it and the Pacific Coast stretched a great lone land. It is still, with its vast unpeopled areas, a "lone land" in many ways, but towns and villages are growing up with such magic swiftmess that a new map is necessary every two or three years. On the Pacific Coast there was no Vancouver twenty years ago; now it is a city of nearly fifty thousand inhabitants; and soon we shall have farther north a new city, Prince Rupert, which will be to Vancouver what Portland and Seattle are to San Francisco.

The New West.

Optimism is in the air, but alas! optimism has not always been justified. Twenty years ago, or even ten years ago, for instance, it seemed as if mankind might have grown out of the possibility of war between civilized states. But within these ten years we have seen three great wars. Yet still one hopes that war on the North American continent is almost impossible. It is a very striking fact that, in the two greatest divisions of the British Empire, Australia and Canada, the war drums have hardly been heard for a hundred years. Australia, indeed, has never known war; it is a tribute to Britain's might upon the sea that, once the British flag was raised there, no other state has ventured to intrude, though for many years there were thousands of miles of coast unpeopled except by a few natives. The command of the sea, without being exerted openly, still held a whole continent linked to Britain. Canada's record has been only less free from strife. The war of 1812 was our last war, and since that time the whole energies of the Canadian people have been directed to the problems of peaceful development. Two or three times slight rebellions have broken out, but probably not more than two or three hundred people have lost their lives in all of Canada's conflicts since 1812. Is there any state outside of the British Empire that, in the whole course of its history, can show such a record?

The Duration of Peace in Canada.

Canada's conflicts have been keen enough. Any one who glances over the debates in parliament during almost any period of her history will see how vehement have been the differences. But reason and votes, not violence, have settled the issues. One compensation for Canada's slow growth has been that the people who have come to her, not being rushed in in crowds, have fallen under the influence of the orderly spirit of the country. There is nothing of which Canadians have more right to be proud of than the few crimes of violence in their history. Canada has had, and has, its rushes to mining camps; more and more it is attracting varied elements of population; but every one has been made to understand from the first that there is law in the land, and that at all costs the law will be vindicated. The Canadian Government has let it be known that no outlaw will be spared to punish crime. It spent \$130,000 in hunting down the criminals in connection with a recent murder case in the Yukon. In the development of Western Canada the average of crimes of violence has been probably not one-fifth of what it has been for similar conditions in the United States.

The Supremacy of Law in Canada.

The near future has in store wonderful changes for Canada. It is well that we should see the special advantages which her citizens enjoy, but I should not like to close this brief sketch in a spirit of mere jubilation. Much remains to be done to make Canada what it ought to be. A new country has its special dangers. Conditions are hard, and strength and energy are the qualities that tell. Nothing is impossible to the ambitious man. Everything is in a state of flux. There are

few traditions. There is little inherited wealth. There is no inherited rank. In such a situation to many the only goal that seems worth while is the goal of success, and the prevailing gospel is likely to be how to "get there." The changes of the past sixty years have been very remarkable from the point of view of material development. Has Canada grown remarkably in other ways? Do her people think with greater sanity upon the vast issues which they have to decide? Are they better educated? Do they care more for truth, for honour, for uprightness of conduct? Perhaps the answers to some of these questions may give us pause. I am myself disposed to think that they can all be answered in the affirmative, but I am not very sure. In a word, one can be quite certain about our material growth; one is a little doubtful whether our moral stature is increased. Here is the danger to our society. And the remedy? Let each citizen of Canada feel that he is helping to lay the foundations of a great state; let him realize that there are better things than mere "getting on"; let him give his children the very best education in his power and see that, whatever else they learn, they are taught to fear God and to honour Justice and Truth; let him, at whatever cost, take his stand for righteousness and never cast a vote for a man who is bad morally. With such a spirit in Canada we shall be worthy of our noble heritage.

METRICAL WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

The French metrical system is based upon the (assumed) length of the fourth part of a terrestrial meridian. The ten-millionth part of this arc was chosen as the unit of measures of length, and called a *Metre*. The cube of the tenth part of the metre was adopted as the unit of capacity, and denominated a *Litre*. The weight of a litre of distilled water at its greatest density was called a *Kilogramme*, of which the thousandth part, or *Gramme*, was adopted as the unit of weight. The multiples of these, proceeding in decimal progression, are distinguished by the employment of the prefixes *deca*, *hecto*, *kilo* and *myria*, from the Greek, and the subdivisions by *deci*, *centi* and *milli*, from the Latin :-

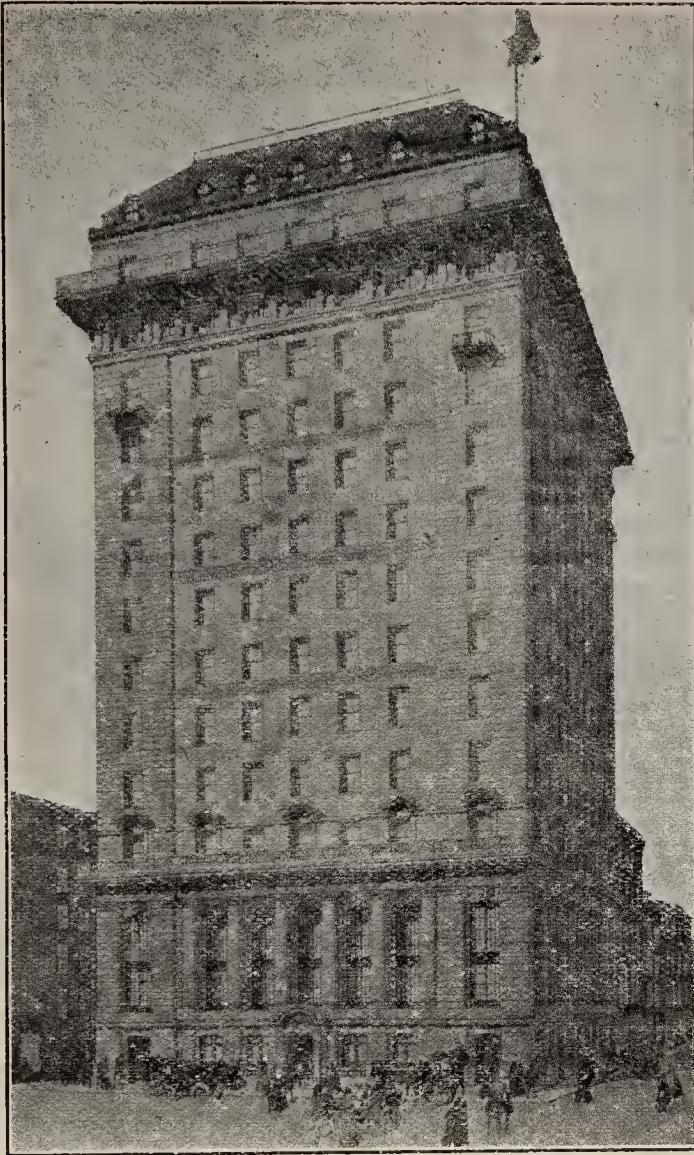

FORMS OF GOVERNMENT THROUGHOUT THE WORLD.*

I.—GOVERNMENT OF THE BRITISH EMPIRE.

NOTE.—The figures for the area and population and the names of colonial governors are in many cases taken from "The Statesman's Year Book."

Population.—In 1904 estimated 400,500,000. Area, 11,876,745 sq. miles.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.—Monarchy under parliamentary government. Population in 1904, 43,217,687; England and Wales (1901), 32,526,075; Scotland, 4,472,103; Ireland, 4,458,775; Isle of Man, 54,758; Channel Islands, 95,841. Area, 120,979 square miles; England, 50,867; Wales, 7,442; Scotland, 29,785; Ireland, 32,583; Army and Navy, etc., 367,736.

REIGNING KING AND EMPEROR OF INDIA.—Edward VII.

EXECUTIVE POWER.

A sovereign, exercising all powers of executive government through a cabinet composed of certain sworn privy councillors, who act as advisers of the crown, and conduct the public administration in accordance with law and constitutional usage. The crown is hereditary, but subject to such limitations as may be imposed by parliament—*i.e.*, by the crown, lords and commons. The head of the administration is the premier, or first minister, who is the choice of the crown; he selects the members of the cabinet and ministry, with the approval of the sovereign. The cabinet consists, at present, of nineteen ministers; the first lord of the treasury is generally premier. In addition to the inner or advisory council, called the cabinet, there are other ministers holding subordinate positions in the government, but who also retire with the cabinet in case of resignation or defeat. The whole number of persons comprising the government of Great Britain, including the chief officials for Scotland and Ireland, is forty-eight. The government hold office as long as they retain the confidence of the house of commons. The common law is the basis of justice in Great Britain and Ireland, and in all colonies and dependencies of the crown. Wherever, in the latter, the civil or other law is in force, it will be stated below in the case of the particular colony.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

The parliament of Great Britain is composed of the crown, lords, and commons. The house of lords consists at present of 591—archbishops (2), bishops (24) and peers, the latter divided into dukes, marquesses, earls, viscounts and barons. Three princes of the royal blood have also seats in the house. Scotland is represented by 16 peers, elected for each parliament, and Ireland by 28 representative peers elected for life. The speaker is the lord high chancellor of Great Britain, who is a member of the cabinet, and retires with a change of government. The house of lords has coordinate powers of legislation with the house of commons, except as respects taxation or money bills. It cannot initiate or amend such bills, but it may reject them as a whole. The house of commons is the body where the chief political power rests. It consists of 670 members, elected by the legal electors of Great Britain and Ireland, as follows: England 465, Wales 30, Scotland 72, Ireland 103. All elections are now by ballot. Since the reform bill of 1832 the franchise has been widely extended to all classes who have a stake in the country. The suffrage is now divided among freeholders, copyholders, leaseholders, occupants of lands and tenements, and lodgers of a specified value. The house of commons lasts for seven years, unless sooner dissolved by the crown with the advice of the cabinet. Parliament is summoned, prorogued and dissolved by the sovereign. The speaker and deputy speaker of the commons are elected by the house for the duration of the parliament. Members do not require a property qualification, but they must be British citizens of the age of 21 years, not bankrupts, nor idiots nor criminals. Members are not paid. The system of

local government has been much simplified of late years. England and Wales are now divided into 62 administrative counties, including the city of London. In every county there is a council composed of aldermen and councillors. Aldermen are elected for six years, half of them retiring every third year. A councillor is elected for three years. The counties are again divided into "urban districts" and "rural districts," in which councils are elected. The parish continues to be a unit of local government, and the duties formerly performed by "vestries" are now discharged by "parish meetings" and "parish councils." In cities and towns the affairs are administered by municipal corporations, consisting of mayor, aldermen and burgesses; the mayor and aldermen are elected by the council, and the burgesses by ratepayers. Women can be elected only to district councils and parish councils, including the London vestries. Married as well as single women can vote at parochial elections. In Scotland there are parish councils, and municipal bodies in towns and cities. The councils of the latter consist of a provost and bailies. In Ireland in some towns and boroughs there are corporations consisting of mayor, aldermen and councillors. In the majority of towns local government is entrusted to commissioners, appointed by the Irish government.

BRITISH COLONIES AND DEPENDENCIES, viz.:

Aden, a British protectorate and fortified station; estimated population, 42,000, mostly Bedouins; area, 75 square miles.

PERIM, a dependency of Aden, has five square miles, and a population of 2,000.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Under the lieutenant-governor and council of Bombay, who are represented by a president or political resident, who is the commandant of the British troops in the peninsula.

Andaman and Nicobar Islands, a penal settlement in the Bay of Bengal; estimated population, 24,500; area, 2,635 square miles. In 1905 there were 14,112 convicts in the settlement, including 720 women.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Subject to government of Bengal (see India, p. 93). A chief commissioner and superintendent are appointed by the Indian government.

Ascension Island, a naval station; area, 35 square miles; population, about 500.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—This rocky island is under the control of the British Admiralty.

Australia, Commonwealth of, a federal dependency with representative and responsible government; population (1901), 3,771,715; area, 2,972,906; see statistics given below for New South Wales (p. 95), Tasmania (p. 96), South Australia (p. 96), Western Australia (p. 97), Queensland (p. 95), and Victoria (p. 96), which form the new federation proclaimed in 1901, under the Imperial Act passed in 1900, in accordance with the vote of the people of these several dependencies.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—The king represented by a governor-general, appointed by the crown, and advised by an executive council, consisting at first of seven members. The government holds office as long as it has the confidence of the people, as expressed by their representatives in parliament. The principles of English parliamentary government prevail in the commonwealth and states of the federation. The common and criminal law of England obtains in all the states. The judicature consists of a federal high court, and such other federal courts as the parliament of the commonwealth may establish. The justices of these courts are appointed by the

governor-general-in-council, and hold office during good behaviour. The high court is a court of appeal from the courts of the states. Appeals may be made from its decisions to the Privy Council of Great Britain under limitations. The state courts remain under the sole jurisdiction of the state governments, and appeal can be made direct to the king-in-council, as heretofore, under certain restrictions.

GOVERNOR-GENERAL.—Right Hon. Lord Northcote, G.C.M.G.

LEGISLATIVE POWER.—The king, senate and house of representatives. The senators are elected by the people of the states for six years. Each state has an equal representation of six members, and half the number of senators shall retire every three years, but are eligible for re-election. The franchise for the election of a senator is the same as that for the popular body at the time of the union. The president is elected by the senate. The place of a senator becomes vacant if he is absent for two consecutive months of a session. The house of representatives consists, as near as possible, of twice the number of senators, but no state shall have a smaller representation than five members. The first house of representatives consisted of 75 members as follows:—New South Wales, 26, Victoria, 23, Queensland, 9, South Australia, 7, Tasmania, 5, and Western Australia, 5. Members are elected for three years. The speaker is elected by the house. Members of each house receive £400 each as a sessional indemnity. Bills appropriating revenue or moneys, or imposing taxation shall only originate in the house of representatives. As in Canada and England by practice, the senate may not amend bills imposing taxation or appropriating revenue or moneys for ordinary annual services of the government. But the senate may at any stage return to the lower house a bill requesting the amendment of any items or provisions therein, and the house may accept or reject such proposals. In case of a deadlock a dissolution takes place, and afterwards a joint sitting at which a majority of votes decide the fate of the disputed measure. The federal parliament has power to alter the franchise on which its members are elected, but it cannot diminish the voting powers of the people, or withdraw the right of women to vote as long as adult suffrage obtains in any states. The legislative powers of the federal parliament are alone enumerated, and all other powers rest with the state parliaments. In the event of a federal law conflicting with an existing state law, the federal law shall prevail. The federal government has the administration of the departments of customs and excise, which form the chief sources of federal revenue, but of the net revenue from such duties not more than one-fourth shall be applied annually by the commonwealth towards its expenditure, and the balance shall be paid to the several states or applied towards the payment of interest on debts of the several states taken over by the federal government. Uniform duties of customs must be imposed within two years after the establishment of the commonwealth. The king may disallow any federal law within one year from the governor-general's assent.

Bahamas (West Indies), representative but not responsible government; population, 53,735; area, 5,800 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir Wm. Grey-Wilson, K.C.M.G.), appointed by the imperial government, as in other colonies and dependencies (except the provinces of the Dominion of Canada), assisted by an executive council of nine members, partly official and partly unofficial, having seats in one of the branches of the legislature.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council of nine members, chosen by the crown, and a representative assembly of 29 members elected on a small property qualification. Members must have a property qualification.

Bahrein Islands, British protectorate; estimated population, 25,000.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary chief or sheik, who is a Mohammedan. A British resident controls affairs.

Baluchistan, an independent feudatory state of India under the protectorate of Great Britain; popu-

lation, 1,049,808, largely nomadic; area, 132,315 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—The British portion of the country is governed from Quetta by the agent to the governor-general. The head of the native states is Sir Mir Mahmud Khan, G.C.I.E.

Barbadoes, with representative, but not responsible government; population, 195,000; area, 166 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir G. T. Carter, K.C.M.G.), assisted by an executive committee, officials, military officers, and such other persons as may be nominated by the king, one member of the legislative council, and four members of the assembly, nominated by the governor.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—A legislative council of nine members, appointed by the king, and a house of assembly of 24 members elected annually by the people on a very liberal franchise, including persons enjoying pensions.

Basutoland, crown colony; population, 350,000, nearly all natives; area estimated at 10,300 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—A resident commissioner, appointed by the crown, acting under the direction of the high commissioner for South Africa.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative authority is exercised by the commissioner by proclamation.

Bechuanaland, British; formerly a crown colony in South Africa. Annexed to Cape Colony in 1895. Population, about 84,000; area, 52,000 square miles.

Bechuanaland, protectorate of, in South Africa; population, about 200,000; area, 336,000 square miles. Chiefs rule the tribes under the protection of the British, represented by a resident commissioner and assistants.

Bermudas, with representative, but not responsible government; population, 17,500; area, 20 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Lt.-Gen'l Sir R. M. Stewart, K.C.B.), assisted by a privy council, appointed by the crown, and consisting of four official and two unofficial members.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—A legislative council of nine members, three of whom are official, and six unofficial, but all appointed by the crown. A house of assembly of 36 members, elected by a freehold qualification. Members must have a property qualification, and are paid 8s. a day for attendance. Hamilton and St. George have corporations.

British Central Africa, comprising Nyasaland, a British protectorate; estimated population, 1,000,000. Area, estimated at 42,217 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—The affairs of Nyasaland are administered by an imperial commissioner (Sir Alfred Sharpe, K.C.M.G., C.B.) under the instructions of the secretary of state for foreign affairs, and the territory beyond, under British influence, by a commissioner directed by the British South Africa Chartered Company.

British East Africa, comprising the East Africa protectorate and the Uganda protectorate, on the Maerland, is under the jurisdiction of the foreign office, including the islands of Zanzibar and Pemba at present under the government of the Arab sultan. Commissioners and consul-generals represent British interests in the East African protectorates. The total area is probably 1,000,000 square miles, with a population of three or four millions, of whom whites do not reach a thousand altogether. Present Commissioner, Col. J. H. Sadler, C.B.

British Honduras; crown colony; population, 39,000; area, 7,562 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Lieutenant-governor, assisted by an executive council of six members.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council appointed by the crown, and consisting of three official and five unofficial members. Governor, General E. J. E. Swayne.

British North Borneo, a British protectorate; estimated population, 200,000; area, 31,106 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—The affairs of this protectorate are, under a royal charter, administered by a court of directors in London, with a governor, treasurer-general and residents appointed by them, but in the case of the governor the appointment must be approved by the foreign secretary of state. The Indian penal and other laws are administered with such modifications as are necessary. English magistrates are stationed in the several provinces. Acting Governor, Major Harrington.

Brunei, a British protectorate; population, 45,000; area, 4,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—A native state, with a sultan as a ruler. The consular courts at Borneo have jurisdiction here, with appeals to the supreme court of the Straits Settlements.

Canada, Dominion of, a federal dependency, with representative and responsible government. Population (1901), 5,371,315; area, 3,745,574 square miles (exclusive of waters).

EXECUTIVE POWER.—The king represented by a governor-general, appointed by the crown, and advised by a cabinet chosen from members of the privy council of Canada, and consisting of 14 ministers, holding departmental offices, besides one or more ministers without office. The government holds office as long as they have the confidence of the popular branch of parliament. The principles of parliamentary government are those of England. The common and criminal law of England prevails in all the provinces except Quebec, where the old French civil code and English criminal law are in force.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—The king, senate, and house of commons. The senate is composed of 81 members, when full, appointed by the crown, possessed of property qualification and of the age of 30 years. The speaker is appointed by the crown. It has co-ordinate powers of legislation with the house of commons, except in the case of revenue, taxation, or money bills. Though it cannot initiate or amend such bills, it may reject them. Members are paid \$2,500 for a session of over 30 days, and a sum for travelling expenses at the rate of 10 cents a mile going and returning. The house of commons consists of 214 members, elected from 1885 until 1898 on a dominion franchise, which was, in the latter year, repealed. Dominion elections are run on the provincial voters' lists with some unimportant limitations. Members require no property qualification, but they must be of the age of 21, and British subjects, not disqualified by law. The speaker is chosen by the commons. Parliament has a legal existence of five years unless sooner dissolved by the governor-general, and meets once every year. Members are paid the same as senators. As Canada possesses a system of federal government, her legislative powers are limited to certain subjects of dominion or national import, set forth in the written constitution, or British North America Act, of 1867, with the residue of power not expressly given to the provinces in the federal government. All the provinces of Canada, except Prince Edward Island, possess a very complete system of municipal government, which entrusts certain *quasi* legislative powers to councils in municipal divisions known as cities, counties, townships, towns, villages and parishes, and elected by ratepayers. The rules and usages of procedure of the Canadian parliament and of the legislatures are based on those of the imperial parliament. The closure does not exist in Canada.

Provinces and Territories of the Dominion, viz.—Nova Scotia, population, 459,574; area, 21,428 square miles. New Brunswick, population, 331,120; area, 27,985. Prince Edward Island, population, 103,259; area, 2,184. Quebec, population, 1,648,898; area, 351,873. Ontario, population, 2,182,947; area, 260,862. Manitoba, population, 255,211; area, 73,732. British Columbia, population, 178,657; area, 372,630; Alberta, population, 72,841; area, 254,559. Saskatchewan, population, 91,460; area, 251,887; North-West Territories (including unorganized districts of Mackenzie, Keewatin,

Franklin, Ungava and portions of Arthabaska and Saskatchewan not included in the new Province of Saskatchewan), population, 20,129; area, 1,931,458. Yukon Territory, population, 27,219; area, 196,976.

The population given are those indicated by the census of 1901.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—In all these provinces there is a lieutenant-governor, appointed by the governor-general of the dominion-in-council, and aided by an executive council of eight or less members, who have seats in the legislature, and are responsible to the Legislative Assembly in accordance with the principles of English parliamentary government.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—In Nova Scotia and Quebec there is a legislative council of 19 and 24 members respectively, appointed by the lieutenant-governor-in-council of each province. The assembly in these provinces consists of 38 and 74 members respectively, elected for five years on a limited franchise based on property and income. The speaker of the legislative council is appointed by the crown. In the seven other provinces there is only one house, an elected assembly, viz. Ontario, 98 members; New Brunswick, 46; P. E. Island, 30; Manitoba, 40; British Columbia, 42; Alberta, 25; Saskatchewan, 25. In all these provinces, except Quebec, there is manhood suffrage, limited by residence and citizenship, but in P. E. Island 15 are elected on a special real estate qualification.* In all of these provinces, except Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Quebec in which it is five years, the duration of the assembly is four years, unless sooner dissolved. Sessions are annual. In all of the provinces the speakers of the assemblies are elected by the members. In both houses members are paid. Members require no property qualification. The legislative powers of the legislatures are defined by the British North America Act of 1867.

The North-West Territories.—The North-West Territories comprise the territories formerly known as Rupert's Land and the North-Western Territory except such portions thereof as form the Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, and the Yukon Territory, together with all British territories and possessions in North America and all islands adjacent to any such territories or possessions, except the colony of Newfoundland and its dependencies.

The administration of the Territories is entrusted to a commissioner appointed by the governor-in-council, and the governor-in-council may appoint a council, not exceeding four in number, to aid the commissioner in such administration. The commissioner-in-council may also be given by the governor-in-council certain limited legislative powers.

The gold discoveries in the Yukon have rendered it necessary to provide a simple system of government for that region. A commissioner, a council—partly elective—and judges are appointed by the dominion government, under authority given by the parliament of Canada.

Cape of Good Hope, or Cape Colony, with responsible government; population (1904), 2,405,552; area, 276,995 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—A governor, assisted by an executive council of five or more members, having seats in the legislature and holding office on the principles of responsible government. The Roman-Dutch civil, and English criminal laws are in force.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—A legislative council of 26 members elected for seven years, presided over, *ex officio*, by the chief justice, and a house of assembly of 107 elected members. The members of the legislative council must have a property qualification, but any person not an alien or otherwise disqualified may be elected a member of assembly. Members of both houses are elected by ballot on a very liberal franchise, based on property, income or wages, and certain elementary educational requirements. Members are paid. The debate may be either in English or Dutch. The assembly elects its own speaker, meets

annually, and has a duration of five years unless sooner dissolved. A municipal system has been established, and councillors are elected to boards and councils.

HIGH COMMISSIONER.—Rt. Hon. Earl of Selborne, G.C.M.G.

GOVERNOR.—Hon. Sir Walter F. Hely-Hutchinson, G.C.M.G.

Ceylon, crown colony; population, 3,578,833; area, 25,323 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir Henry A. Blake, G.C.M.G.), aided by an executive council of five members, composed of officials and the commander-in-chief. The Roman-Dutch law and Indian penal code prevail.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—A legislative council of 17 members, including the members of the executive council, four other office-holders, and eight unofficial members appointed by the crown. The governor is president. Government agents administer local affairs of the nine provinces.

Channel Islands: Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, Herm, representative dependencies; population, 96,141; area, 75 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—One lieutenant-governor appointed by the crown, for Jersey, and another governor in Guernsey for the other islands.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—States assembly, partly officials, partly elected members. The islands have their own laws and customs.

Cyprus, British protectorate by convention with Turkey; estimated population, not including military, 237,022; area, 3,584 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—High commissioner (Sir C. A. King-Harman, K.C.M.G.), appointed by the British crown, and aided by an executive council of five members, including the administrator and commandant of the garrison.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council composed of the high commissioner (president *ex-officio*), six non-elective members or officials, and 12 elected members, nine chosen by the non-Mahometan population and three by the Mahometan population. The franchise, which can be exercised by British subjects and foreigners after five years' residence, is based on the payment of native taxes. The council may last five years unless sooner dissolved. The English and Ottoman law prevails, and British or native judges exercise jurisdiction according as the case affects Ottoman or foreign interests. Elective councils exist in towns for local purposes.

Falkland Islands, crown colony; population, 2,000; area, 6,500 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir W. L. Allardye, C.M.G.), aided by an executive council, composed of the governor and two officials.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council of six members, including the executive council, the judge, and two other unofficial members. The governor is president.

Fiji and dependencies, crown colony; population, 122,000; area, including Rotumah, 8,045 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir E. F. Thurn, C.B., K.C.M.G.), aided by an executive council of three official members. Natives are employed in administrative positions throughout the islands.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council of 18 members, composed of the governor, as president, ten official and eight non-official members, all appointed by the crown. A system of local government exists and the natives are represented in village and district councils. An annual meeting of the high chiefs and representatives from each province is held under the presidency of the governor.

Gambia, crown colony; population, 13,500; area, 69 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir G. C. Denton, K.C.M.G.), aided by an executive council of five members.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council of six persons, composed of the administrator, the three officials who are executive councillors, and two non-official members, all appointed by the crown.

Gibraltar, crown colony; population, 27,460; including military; area, two square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Gen. Sir Frederick Forestier-Walker, G.C.M.G., K.C.B.), who is the general commanding and exercises all necessary powers of government.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—The management of local matters like water supply, drainage, health, etc., is entrusted to a body nominated by the governor, called the sanitary commissioners.

Gold Coast Colony, crown colony; population, 1,486,433; area, including Protectorate, 119,260 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir John Pickersgill Rodger, K.C.M.G.), aided by an executive council composed of the commandant and four officials.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council of the governor, the chief justice, members of the executive council and three non-official persons. For the purposes of administration the 13 districts of the colony are presided over by a commissioner.

Guiana, British, with representative but not responsible government; population, 280,000; area, 104,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir F. Hodgson, K.C.M.G.), assisted by an executive council chosen from members of the court of policy. The jurisprudence is the English criminal law and the Roman-Dutch code.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Combined court, consisting of a court of policy of seven official and eight elective members, and also of six financial representatives, the elected members being chosen by a very liberal franchise based on property, income, taxes and residence. Membership to the combined court and court of policy is based on a property and income qualification. Taxation and finance are dealt with by the combined court alone. Municipal institutions have been introduced into this colony.

Hong-Kong, crown colony; population, not including the military, 233,905; area, 406 square miles. By a convention signed at Peking on June 9, 1898, the Chinese government leased to Great Britain for 99 years the port of Kaulung and land farther inland, together with the waters of Mirs Bay and Deep Bay, and the island of Lan-tao. Area nearly 400 square miles; population, 100,000.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir Mathew Nathan, R.E., K.C.M.G.), aided by an executive council of six official persons.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council, composed of the governor (president), seven official and six non-official members, four nominated by the crown, one by the justices of the peace, and one by the chamber of commerce. Two Chinese are chosen as part of the four non-official members.

India.—1. British provinces, population, 231,900,000. 2. Feudatory or native states, under British protection, population, 62,461,500. Total population of India, 294,361,500; area, 1,766,642 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—1. In England, a secretary of state for India, a member of the cabinet, aided by a council of not less than 10 members, mostly former residents of India. 2. In India, a governor-general (or viceroy nominally) appointed by the king, acting under secretary of state for India, and aided by a council of six members, also appointed by the king. 3. British India is divided into 13 local governments and administrations. The governors of Madras and Bombay (still called presidencies) and their councils are appointed by the king or secretary of state; the lieutenant-governors of Bengal, Burma, and the north-west provinces with Oudh and the Punjab, by the governor-general; the chief commissioners of the other provinces by the same. 4. In the native and feudatory states the government is administered by the native princes with the assistance of an English resident or political agent.

GOVERNOR GENERAL.—The Right Hon. The Earl of Minto, G.C.M.G.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—For India generally there is a legislative council, composed of the viceroy's council and some 12 or 16 other appointed members, for the purpose of making laws

and regulations. In Bombay, Madras, Bengal, Eastern Bengal and Assam, Agra and Oudh, The Punjab and Burmah, there are both executive and legislative councils. The chief commissioners have no legislative powers. In all the large towns there is a municipal system and committees or councils are elected by the ratepayers, but they cannot levy new taxes or pass by-laws without the assent of the provincial government.

Isle of Man, representative dependency; population, 54,758; area, 220 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor and council of ecclesiastical and judicial dignitaries, appointed by the crown.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Court of Tynwald, composed of the governor, the council, which is also an upper house, and house of keys, consisting of 24 members, elected on a property qualification. The island has its own laws and customs, but the approval of the British crown is essential to every enactment.

Jamaica, crown colony; estimated population, 808,000; area, 4,193 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir J. A. Swettenham, K.C.M.G.), aided by a privy council of eight official and other persons appointed by the crown.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council composed of the governor (president with only a casting vote), five official members, ten nominated and fourteen elected members. The council can be dissolved at the end of every five years. Parochial boards exist in the parishes for local administrative purposes.

Kuria Muria Islands, five in number, under government of Aden. (See Aden, p. 90.)

Labuan, crown colony; population, 8,411; area, 30 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir John Anderson, K.C.M.G.).

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Governor can make ordinances.

Laccadive Islands, population, 15,000; none exceeds a mile in length. Subject to Madras presidency. (See India, p. 93.)

Lagos Territory, crown colony and protectorate, comprising certain adjacent islands; area of colony, 3,460 square miles; area of protectorate, 25,450; estimated population, 1,500,000.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir Walter Egerton, K.C.M.G.), aided by an executive council of three officials.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council, composed of the governor (president), five official and five non-official members appointed by the crown. Commissioners attend to administrative affairs in the several districts.

By an Order-in-Council, dated 16th February, 1906, the Southern Nigerian Protectorate was placed under the colony of Lagos, and the name of that colony changed to Colony of Southern Nigeria.

Leeward Islands (West Indies), federal colony with representative government in part; total population of islands, 127,000; area, 701 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir E. B. Sweet-Escott, K.C.M.G.), aided by one common executive council of seven officials for the five presidencies or island governments, set forth below.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council consisting of eight elective and eight appointed members. The island council of Antigua elect three of the elective members; the legislative council of Dominica, two; the non-official members of the legislative council of St. Kitts and Nevis, three. The nominated members comprise four officials, and four non-official members, one from each of the island councils. The president is chosen from the latter bodies. The legislative council has concurrent legislative powers with the island legislature, but the general legislature prevails in case of clashing between the respective enactments. The general legislature meets annually, and has a duration of three years.

Presidencies of Leeward Islands Federation, viz.:

1—**ANTIGUA**, with dependencies of Barbuda and Redonda; population, 35,000; area, 170 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor, aided by an executive council of nine members, official and non-official.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council of 16 members, divided into 8 crown nominated persons, and 8 members with a fixed income, and elected by a liberal franchise based on property. The council has a duration of five years, and the president and vice-president are appointed by the crown.

2—**St. CHRISTOPHER** (St. Kitts), Nevis and Anguilla; population, 45,000; area, St. Christopher, 65 square miles; Nevis, 50; Anguilla, 35.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor for the united presidency, aided by one executive council of 11 or more persons, four of whom are officials.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council composed of the governor (president or a commissioner appointed by him), six official and six nominated unofficial members.

3—**DOMINICA**; population, 29,000; area, 291 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, representing the governor of the Leeward Islands, assisted by an executive council of seven members.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative assembly of twelve nominated members, presided over by the president. Electors must be tenants or occupiers of land or houses, and have incomes or pay taxes.

4—**MONTERRAT**; population, 12,000; area, 32 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor, aided by an executive council of five members, four of whom are officials.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council of six or more members, all appointed by the crown.

5—**VIROIN ISLANDS** (32 in number); population, 4,900; area, 58 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Administrator, representing the governor of the Leeward Islands, and aided by an executive council of three official members.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council of two official and three non-official members, presided over by the administrator.

Malta (including Gozo and Comino), partly representative government; population, 202,000; area, 117 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Gen. Sir Charles M. Clarke, Bart., G.C.B.), aided by an executive council of 10 members.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Council of government consisting of the governor as president, a vice-president, the lieutenant-governor, nine officials and eight elected members.

Mauritius, partly representative government; population, including military, 378,000; area, 705 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir Cavendish Boyle, K.C.M.G.), aided by an executive council of five official and two elected members. The French civil law as codified by the code Napoleon is in force.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council of 27 members, eight officials, nine appointed by the governor and ten elected on a moderate franchise, chiefly based on property, rental and income. Members are not paid and may speak either French or English. The governor is president.

The following islands are dependencies of Mauritius: Rodrigues, population 3,200, St. Brandon or Cargados Islands, Chagos Islands, and the Trois Freres or Eagle Islands.

Natal, with responsible government; population, including Zululand and the districts of Vryheid and Utrecht, 1,108,000; area, 36,200 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Col. Sir Henry E. McCallum, R.E., A.D.C., etc.), aided by an executive council of six members having seats in the legislature and holding office on the principles of responsible government.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council of 13 members summoned by the governor in council, and holding their seats for ten years, and having a property qualification. The assembly consists of 43 members, elected by a franchise, based on a property, rental or income qualification. It has a duration of four years, unless sooner dissolved. Members must be registered as electors, and are paid an allowance. A municipal system exists in the settled districts.

Newfoundland (including Labrador), with responsible government. A portion of Labrador is within its jurisdiction; population, 220,984; area, Newfoundland 40,200 square miles, Labrador 120,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir W. MacGregor), aided by an executive council of nine members, responsible to parliament.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council of not more than 15 members appointed by the crown. An assembly of 36 members, elected by registered male electors in 18 constituencies. Members must have a property or income qualification, and are paid. The president of the council is appointed by the crown, and the speaker of the assembly is elected by its members.

The French claimed fishing rights by treaty of Utrecht (1713), on the northern and western shores, and the vexatious questions arising therefrom between Great Britain and France were finally settled in 1904.

New Guinea, British, under the control of the Australian Government; population, 350,000; area, 90,500 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Lieut.-Governor assisted by an executive council.

New South Wales, one of the states of the Australian Commonwealth (see p. 90), with responsible government. Norfolk Island, Lord Howe Island and Pitcairn Island are under its jurisdiction; population, 1,405,450; area, 310,700 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir Harry Holdsworth Rawson, R.N., K.C.B.), aided by an executive council of eight ministers responsible to and having seats in parliament.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council of 61 persons, appointed by the crown, and not paid. An assembly of 90 members, elected by universal suffrage, qualified by citizenship and residence. In 1903 the franchise was extended to women. Simultaneous voting and the ballot exists. The principle of "one man one vote" prevails. Members require no property qualification, and are paid £300 per annum. The assembly elects its own speaker, and lasts for three years. The president of the council is appointed by the crown. A municipal system is in existence in "boroughs," "municipal districts," and in the city of Sydney.

New Zealand, with responsible government; population about 815,000, including Maoris; area, 104,471 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (The Right Hon. William Lee, Baron Plunket, K.C.V.O.), aided by an executive council of eight members, responsible to and having seats in parliament.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council of 44 members, now appointed by the crown for seven years only. The house of representatives consists of 80 members, of whom four are Maoris chosen by the natives. The white representatives are chosen by universal suffrage, qualified by residence and citizenship. Natives vote on a freehold qualification. The principle of "one man one vote" prevails. Members are only required to have qualification of electors. Members of both houses are paid—legislative council, £200; house of representatives, £300 per annum. Women can vote, but cannot be elected to the houses. A municipal system has been in operation for years in counties, boroughs, ridings.

Nigeria, an extensive sphere of British influence, coming within lines of demarcation arranged by treaties with France and Germany since 1885. Population from 25,000,000 to 40,000,000; area, upwards of 500,000 sq. miles. On 16th February, 1906, Southern Nigeria was placed under the colony of Lagos.

GOVERNMENT.—Divided into two divisions, one for Northern Nigeria, and the other for Southern Nigeria, directly under the control of the crown since January, 1900. An imperial commissioner and other officials watch over imperial interests in this extensive protectorate.

HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR NORTHERN NIGERIA.—Brig. Gen. Sir F. J. D. Lugard, K.C.M.G., C.B., D.S.O.

HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR SOUTHERN NIGERIA.—Sir Walter Egerton, K.C.M.G. (See Lagos).

Nyasaland. (See British Central Africa, p. 107).

Orange River Colony; estimated population, 387,315, of whom 142,679 are white; area, 50,000 square miles.

In 1899 this country, then known as the Orange Free State, joined the Transvaal in taking up arms against Great Britain, and on May 24th, 1900, was annexed to the British crown, Viscount Milner, G.C.B., G.C.M.G., being sworn in as the first Governor and Commander-in-Chief on June 23rd, 1902.

LIEUT.-GOV.—Brig. Gen. Sir H. J. Goold-Adams, K.C.M.G.

Queensland (one of the states of the Australian Commonwealth, p. 90), with responsible government; population, 512,604; area, 668,500 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Lord Chelmsford), aided by an executive council of eight ministers having seats in and responsible to parliament.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council of 44 members appointed by the crown for life. An assembly of 72 members elected by ballot under a universal franchise qualified by a short term of residence. No property qualification is required for members of either house. Members of the assembly are paid £300 per annum. A municipal system prevails.

Rhodesia, comprising the region between the north and west of the Transvaal Colony, and the 22nd degree of south latitude and the southern boundaries of the Congo Free State; on the east and west it is bounded by the Portuguese and German spheres, and the Zambesi river divides it into Southern and Northern Rhodesia. The southern region, includes Matabeleland and Mashonaland, and is within the British sphere of influence; it has a population of about 450,000, of whom only about 12,500 are Europeans, and an area of 192,000 square miles. North-western Rhodesia and north-eastern Rhodesia are also administered by the South African Company. Their total population is about 400,000, nearly all blacks.

GOVERNMENT.—The South African Company exercises chief control. An imperial order-in-council has established an executive council, and a legislative council on which the company's officials and an imperial commissioner have seats. Registered voters elect seven members of the legislative council.

RESIDENT COMMISSIONER.—Lieut.-Col. R. Chester-Master.

Sarawak, a British protectorate; estimated population, 600,000; area, 50,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—The internal administration is under a rajah (H. H. Sir Charles Johnson Brooke) and supreme council of 11 members, composed of the rajah, and eminent native officials. The imperial government control foreign relations.

Seychelles, a crown colony; population, 20,000; area estimated at 148 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (W. E. Davidson, C.M.G.), aided by an executive council of three officials.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council, composed of the Governor, members of executive council, and three unofficial members appointed by the crown.

Sikkim, an Indian feudatory state under British protection; population, 59,000; area, 2,818 square miles.

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EXECUTIVE POWER.—Nominally a hereditary maharaja and council, aided by a British political agent. The council and agent at present rule.

Sokotra, dependency of Aden; population, 12,000; area, 1,382 square miles. (See Aden, p. 90).

Somali, British protectorate; estimated population, 500,000; area, 75,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Political agent and consul.

St. Helena, crown colony; population, 5,200, including the garrison; area, 47 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Lieut.-Col. Henry Lionel Gallwey, C.M.G., D.S.O.), aided by an executive council of four members, including the Episcopalian bishop and commandant.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Governor alone can make ordinances. No municipal system exists.

Sierra Leone, including Sherbro Island, crown colony; population, 76,655; area, 4,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Leslie Probyn, C.M.G.), aided by an executive council of seven members.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council, composed of the governor (*ex-officio president*), the executive councillors and three unofficial members, appointed by the crown.

The **SIERRA LEONE PROTECTORATE**, which was proclaimed August 21st, 1896, has an area of about 30,000 square miles and a population estimated at about 1,000,000. The territory is divided into five districts with a commissioner over each.

South Australia (one of the states of the Australian Commonwealth, p. 90), with responsible government; population, 370,700; area, 903,690 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir George Ruthven Le Hunte, K.C.M.G.), aided by an executive council of four members.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council of 18 members elected for three years by ballot and qualified by residence, citizenship and the full age of 30 years. Electors for this house must have a property qualification. An assembly of 42 members elected for three years by ballot, by universal suffrage, qualified by citizenship and residence. Women can vote. Members only require to be electors. Both legislative councillors and representatives are paid £200 per annum and receive a free pass over government railways. The municipal system establishes elected councils for counties hundreds, municipalities and districts.

Straits Settlements (Singapore, Penang and Malacca, Christmas Island and Cocos Islands), crown colony; population, 596,000; area, 1,526 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir John Anderson, K.C.M.G.), aided by an executive council of eight officials and officer in command.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council composed of the governor (*president ex-officio*), executive councillors and seven unofficial members, of whom two are nominated by the chambers of commerce of Penang and Singapore, and five appointed by the crown. A municipal system has been established with certain restrictions.

Tasmania (one of the states of the Australian Commonwealth, p. 90), with responsible government; population, 182,510; area, 26,215 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir Gerald Strickland, K.C.M.G.), aided by an executive council of four ministers, responsible to and having seats in parliament.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council of 18 members, elected for six years and qualified by residence and citizenship and of the age of 30 years. The electors for the house must be freeholders, leaseholders, barristers, graduates, ministers of religion or military or naval officers. A house of assembly of 35 members elected by ballot for three years by all persons qualified as owners or occupiers of property or by income. Members are paid £100 per annum and receive free railway passes. A liberal municipal system exists and women vote.

Tobago, now a dependency of Trinidad (see below); population, 19,000; area, 114 square miles.

Transvaal Colony, formerly the South African republic; white population, 300,000; natives, estimated, 945,000; area, 111,196 square miles. Swaziland; population, 85,484; area, 6,536 square miles.

In the autumn of 1899, President Krüger, President of the old Republic, proclaimed war against Great Britain, and in September, 1900, Lord Roberts, commander-in-chief of the British forces, issued a proclamation annexing formally the old Dutch republic to the colonial empire of Great Britain. Lord Milner was sworn in as the first Governor on June 21st, 1902.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—A Governor (Earl of Selborne, G.C.M.G.) and Lieut.-Governor (Sir Arthur Lawley, K.C.M.G.), assisted by an executive council.

LEGISLATIVE POWER.—A legislative council consisting of 29 members, 15 official and 14 unofficial.

On May 30th, 1903, was established the Intercolonial Council of the Transvaal and Orange River Colony consisting of 25 members, with the High Commissioner as president. The Council advises as to the administration of railways, constabulary, etc.

Trinidad and Tobago, crown colony; population of Trinidad, 255,148; area of Trinidad, 1,754 square miles. (See Tobago above.)

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir Henry M. Jackson, K.C.M.G.), aided by an executive council of six members, of whom the majority are officials.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council composed of the governor (president), 11 official and 11 unofficial members, all appointed by the crown. Tobago is represented by its commissioner and an unofficial member in the council.

Tristan D'Acunha, Gough Island, and adjacent rocky islets; with population of about 100.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—The affairs of this and adjacent islands, which have only a very insignificant population, are under the "moral rule" of one of the British inhabitants, who have founded this settlement. A British ship visits the Island annually.

Turks and Caicos Islands, a dependency of Jamaica, and crown colony; population, 5,300; area, 223 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor of Jamaica, with a resident commissioner as administrator.

COMMISSIONER.—William Douglas Young.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative board composed of the commissioner, the judge, and not more than four other persons to regulate taxation and all local matters.

Uganda Protectorate, area about 89,000 square miles; population estimated at 4,000,000, of whom 300 are Europeans.

EXECUTIVE GOVERNMENT is administered for Europeans by His Majesty's Consular Courts. The native kingdom is under the rule of a Kabaka with the title of Highness.

COMMISSIONER.—H. J. Bell, C.M.G.

Victoria (one of the states of the Australian Commonwealth, p. 90), with responsible government; population, 1,201,341; area, 87,884 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Maj.-Genl. Hon. Sir Reginald Talbot, K.C.B.), aided by an executive council composed of eleven ministers, responsible to and having seats in parliament.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council, or upper house, of parliament of 35 members, elected for six years on a franchise based on the ownership or occupancy of freehold or leasehold property, and certain professional qualifications. One-third retire every two years. Members must possess freehold property, but are not paid. The assembly contains 68 members, returned for three years on manhood suffrage. Members require no property qualification and receive an indemnity of £300, besides free passes over government railways after seven years' standing, the latter privilege extending to legislative councillors. An excellent system of municipal government exists in cities, towns, boroughs and shires. Women can vote at municipal elections.

Wei-Hai-Wei, in the Chinese province of Shantung, leased to Great Britain July 1st, 1898, for as long a period as Russia has possession of Port Arthur. Area, 285 square miles; population, 123,750. A commissioner is appointed by Great Britain.

COMMISSIONER.—J. H. Stewart Lockhart, C.M.G.

Western Australia (one of the states of the Australian Commonwealth, p. 90), with responsible government; population, 184,124; area, 975,920 sq. miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Admiral Sir F. G. D. Bedford, G.C.B.), aided by a cabinet of seven responsible ministers.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council of 30 members, who must be citizens and residents for five years, and elected on a property franchise for six years. The assembly is composed of 50 members, elected for three years by a liberal franchise, practically manhood suffrage. Members of the legislature are paid £200 a year and travel free over railways. A municipal system exists.

Western Pacific Islands, viz., Southern Solomon I., New Hebrides, Tonga or Friendly I., Cook or Hervey I.; Navigators' I., and Melanesia, British protectorates, estimated population, 150,000.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Great Britain has appointed high commissioners, judicial commissioners, and deputy commissioners for the purpose of guarding British interests in these seas. Courts exist for the purpose of settling disputes between British subjects on these islands. Cook, or Hervey Islands, were annexed to New Zealand in October, 1900.

Windward Islands, a federation, viz.:

1—**GREENADA**, with representative but not responsible government; population, 64,098; area, 133 sq. m.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor (Sir Robert Baxter Llewelyn, K.C.M.G.), exercising jurisdiction over the united islands, and aided by an executive council of five members, including the governor, for administrative purposes.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council, composed of the governor (president *ex-officio*), six official and seven unofficial members, all appointed by the crown.

2—**ST. LUCIA**, as above; population, 50,000; area, 233 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Administrator (P. C. Cook, C.M.G.), subordinate to the governor of the Windward Islands, aided by an executive council of four members, including the administrator. The French civil law and the English criminal law prevail.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council, composed of the administrator (as president *ex-officio*), seven official and six unofficial members, all appointed by the crown.

3—**ST. VINCENT**, as above; population, 44,000 (reduced by volcanic eruptions of the Soufrière, 1902); area, 132 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Administrator (E. J. Cameron, C.M.G.), subordinate to the governor of the Windward Islands, aided by an executive council composed of five members, including the administrator.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council, composed of the administrator (president *ex-officio*), four official and four unofficial members, appointed by the crown.

Zanzibar Protectorate, and Pemba; British protectorates; estimated population, 207,000; area, about 1,020 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Forms part of the territory on the east coast of Africa, now administered by imperial commissioners and consul-generals, with hereditary sultan (Seyyid Ali).

Zululand.—Dependency of Natal; estimated population, 165,000; area, 10,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor of Natal, who is represented by a resident commissioner. The customary native law prevails as to the natives.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Governor of Natal, legislating by proclamation. Zululand sends two members to the Legislature of Natal.

For names of other islands and rocks which are under British protectorate, but are not included in any colony or separate protectorate, see "The Colonial Office List."

II.—GOVERNMENT OF ALL OTHER COUNTRIES.

Abyssinia and Shoa (ancient "Ethiopia"), absolute monarchy; population, 3,500,000; area, 150,000 square miles. The country is made up of semi-independent small states, possessing feudal institutions. King Menelek II.

Afghanistan, absolute monarchy; population, tribal, 4,000,000; area, 215,400 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary amir (Habibullah Khan), with a governor (hakim) in each province.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—No representative or legislative body. All laws emanate from the monarch.

Andorra, republic under joint sovereignty of France and Spain; population, 6,000; area, 175 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Syndic elected by a council of 24 members, elected for four years by the heads of families in each commune or parish. A French préfet is appointed by the French government to supervise the general interests of the republic. France and the Bishop of Urgel, in Spain, alternately appoint a civil judge and a vicar to exercise judicial functions.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—The council is charged with general administration.

Argentine Republic, federal republic, with representative but not responsible government; population, including territories, 5,410,028; area, 1,135,840 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for six years by representatives of the 14 provinces, equal to double the number of senators and representatives combined, and aided by a cabinet of eight secretaries of state appointed by the president, but not having seats in or responsible to congress. The vice-president is elected

by the same constituencies; he acts as chairman of the senate. In the provinces (14) there are elective governors, with such executive powers as are exercised by similar officers in the United States, and remaining in office for three or four years. President, Dr. Jose F. Alcorta.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—A national congress of two houses exercising jurisdiction over national affairs. A senate of 30 members elected by the legislature of each province and by the capital; one-third of the body being renewable every three years. Senators must be citizens of 30 years of age, have incomes, and are paid. The house of deputies consists of 120 members, requiring no property qualification, but must be citizens for four years; they are elected for four years, but one-half must retire every two years. Members are paid. In the provinces there are legislatures of two houses elected for three years, and having full control over provincial affairs.

Austria-Hungary, federal monarchy, under parliamentary government; population, 45,242,889, or about 46,810,981 with Bosnia and Herzegovina; area, 240,142 or 264,204 square miles with the last-mentioned countries, which are under its administration.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Emperor king (Franz Josef I.), who rules by hereditary right over the united states of Austria and Hungary, with the title of emperor of Austria, king of Bohemia, king of Hungary, etc., and is aided by a common supreme ministry or executive council of three departments of state, responsible to the delegations, or two bodies of 60 members each, selected each year by the reichsrath of Austria and the reichstag of Hungary. Ministers may be impeached by the delegations. For Austria also there is a ministry of seven heads of departments responsible to the reichsrath.

In each province there is a provincial council, which is an executive body, composed of the president of the diet and other members elected. The executive of Hungary is a ministry and nine heads of departments, responsible to the reichstag. One of these heads is minister for Croatia and Slavonia. The general administration of the affairs of the Ottoman provinces of Bosnia and Herzegovina is exercised under instructions of the imperial finance minister at Vienna. In these provinces there is a government for internal administration, judicial and legislative affairs.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—1. The delegations, which transact the foreign, financial and military affairs of the whole empire—120 members in all—derive their power from the Austrian reichsrath, and the Hungarian reichstag, 20 from the upper and 40 from the lower house of the parliaments in question. 2. The Austrian reichsrath or imperial parliament, consists of an upper and lower house. The upper house (herrenhaus) consists of princes, nobles, archbishops, bishops, and life members distinguished in art or science, and who have rendered signal services to church or state. The lower house (abgeordnetenhaus) consists at present of 353 members, elected every six years by landowners, towns, chambers of commerce, taxpayers in rural districts. Females can vote on a special property qualification. 3. The parliament meets annually. For Austria there are also 16 provincial diets of one assembly, having the right to legislate on all matters not expressly reserved for the reichsrath. The deputies to the diets, who are archbishops, bishops, rectors of universities, and representatives of great estates, towns, etc., are elected for six years. Members are paid. 4. The Hungarian reichstag (országgyűlés) consists of an upper house (főrendiház) or house of magnates, archbishops, bishops, life peers appointed by the crown, state dignitaries and judges *ex-officio*, delegates, hereditary peers, archdukes. The lower house or house of representatives (képviselet) is composed of between 400 and 500 members, of whom the majority are returned by direct election every five years from towns and rural constituencies on a very liberal property, house, or income franchise. Croatia and Slavonia send 40 delegates to this house. Members to the lower house are paid, and travel at reduced rates. 5. For Croatia and Slavonia there is a provincial diet consisting of 90 members, elected for five years. In Hungary and Austria there is a very complete system of local government, based on the representation of communes and districts in councils and assemblies.

Belgium, limited monarchy, with parliamentary government; population, 6,693,548; area, 11,373 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary king (Leopold II.), advised by a council of eight heads of departments, responsible to and having the right of entry and speech in the chambers. In addition to this responsible ministry there is a privy council, composed of "ministers of state" without portfolio, who may be summoned for consultation on extraordinary occasions.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Parliament of two houses, composed of a senate and a chamber of representatives. The senate consists of half as many members as the lower chamber, elected for eight years, partly directly by constituencies and partly indirectly by provincial councils. All senators must be at least 40 years of age and pay taxes. The house of representatives is composed of 166 members chosen directly by citizens paying taxes, of the age of 25, and resident Belgian citizens. Members of this house not resident in Brussels are paid, and receive a pass over government railways for the purpose of attending the session. The chamber is renewed by halves every two years. Both houses meet annually and nominate their own presidents and officers. The king has the power of dissolving the houses either simultaneously or separately. Belgium has an excellent system of local government in provinces and communes.

Bhutan, independent state of India; population, 25,000; area, nearly 17,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Elected *deb rājā*, or secular head, in conjunction with a *dharm rājā*, or spiritual head, are at the head of the government of this state, while the rule is practically in the hands of the chieftains. The British government exercise a control over the affairs of the state.

Bolivia, republic, with representative government; estimated population, 2,181,000; area, 703,400 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for four years by universal suffrage. Two vice-presidents are elected at the same time. The head of the executive is aided by a council of five ministers, who have no seats in congress. President, Senor Ysmael Montes.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Congress of two houses, a senate of 16 members; a chamber of deputies of 72 deputies. The franchise is in the hands of all who can read and write. For the departments, provinces and cantons of the republic there are prefects, sub-prefects and corregidores entrusted with the administration of their internal affairs.

Bornu, now in Northern Nigeria (p. 95), absolute monarchy; estimated population, 5,000,000; area about 50,000 square miles.

Brazil, United States of, federal republic with representative government; population, 14,333,915; area, 3,218,130 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for four years, but not eligible for a second term. Both the president and vice-president are elected directly by universal suffrage, and aided by a cabinet of six secretaries of state, to be appointed and dismissed by the president, and not having seats in congress. President, Dr. Francisco Rodrigues Alves.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Congress of two houses; a senate of 63 members chosen for nine years—one-third renewable every three years. The vice-president is president of the body. The chamber of deputies comprises 212 members elected for three years by universal suffrage. Members of both houses are paid. Each of the 20 states of the republic must have administrative, legislative and judicial authorities in accordance with the American model, followed by the new constitution of 1891. The federal district has an elected council and a prefect appointed by the president. There is a system of local or municipal government in parishes and municipalities.

Chile, republic, with representative government; population, 2,800,000; area, 307,620 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for five years by delegates chosen for the purpose by ballot of the full electorate (the American system practically). He is aided by a responsible council of state of 11 members, five chosen by the president and six by congress. In addition there is a cabinet of six secretaries of state. President, Senor Pedro Montt.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—National congress of two houses; a senate of 40 members elected every six years by cumulative voting. Senators must have a certain income and are not paid; the chamber of 110 deputies elected every three years by all male persons who can read and write; deputies must have a small income. In legislation the president has a veto, but it may be over-ruled by a two-thirds vote of the members present in the two houses. The republic is divided into provinces, and the provinces into departments for purposes of local government. Intendants and governors appointed by the president preside over the provinces and departments respectively. In the town districts there are elective councils.

China, absolute monarchy; population, including dependencies, about 430,000,000; area, 4,277,170 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Emperor (Tsai-Tien Kwang-Hsu), who rules by *quasi* hereditary right, though the succession is not from father to son necessarily, but it is left to the reigning sovereign to appoint his successor from his relatives of imperial blood. He is aided by a grand council (*chun chi ch'u*) of notables, summoned as occasion demands. The duties of administration are under the direction of the *neiko* or executive council, composed of seven heads of departments. The emperor's power is despotic except so far as it is controlled by the supreme or grand council. The public service is based upon superior education and literary attainments.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—No system of legislative government exists in the European or American sense, but all laws and edicts are framed and promulgated by the emperor with the aid of his councils.

Colombia, federal republic, on United States plan, but with a responsible ministry; population, about 4,000,000; area, 504,773 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for six years by universal suffrage through electoral colleges, and aided by a cabinet of six secretaries responsible to congress. President, General Reyes.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Congress of two houses; a senate of 27 members chosen by the representatives of the nine departments or states. The house of representatives includes 66 members elected for four years by universal franchises. The departments are under the administration of presidents or governors chosen by the federal executive, and have control of financial and other local matters.

Congo, independent state under the sovereignty of the government of Belgium; population, 30,000,000, of Bantu origin, the Europeans being about 2,400 in all; area, 900,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—The central authority is at Brussels. The local government is in a governor-general and other officials, appointed by the Belgian authorities. Affairs of the provinces (14) are administered by officials appointed by the governor.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—All legislative power is in the hands of the local government, under the instructions of the Belgian authorities.

Corea, or Korea, monarchy; population probably from 15,000,000 to 17,000,000; area, 82,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary king (Heui Yi), called li-hi in Chinese, and aided by ten departments of state. The Chinese emperor was for years nominally suzerain of Corea, but Japan wrested this suzerainty from China in the war of 1894, and the Japanese interest in Corea is now acknowledged by both Russia and Great Britain.

Costa Rica, federal republic, with only one legislative chamber; population, 331,000; area about 18,400 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for four years by electoral assemblies, chosen by all persons who live "respectably," and aided by a cabinet of four ministers. President, Ascension Esquivel.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—House of representatives of 32 members, chosen in the same manner as the president, for four years, one half retiring every two years.

Cuba, republic, with constitution similar in many respects to the United States; population, about 1,606,000; area, 44,000 square miles. The United States went to war with Spain in 1898 for the independence of this island, where internecine strife prevailed for years, to the disgrace of Christendom. Spain was soon driven from her ancient dependency, and on February 21, 1901, a constitution was adopted establishing a republican form of government. On February 24, 1902, the first president and vice-president were elected. President, Senor Estrada Palma. On 24th February, 1902, the United States formally handed over the government of the island to the new administration.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, and vice-president, assisted by a cabinet of six secretaries. On the 29th September, 1906, the United States assumed the provisional government of Cuba and President Palma resigned.

Denmark, limited monarchy, with parliamentary government; population, 2,464,770; area, 15,388 sq. miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary king (Frederick VIII), aided by a council of state of eight responsible ministers, who can sit and debate in the legislative assemblies, but vote only in that of which they are actually members.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Parliament (rigsdag) of two houses. The landsting or senate consists of 66 members, partly appointed by the crown and partly elected by the people for eight years on a tax-paying franchise. The folkething, or lower house, consists of 114 members, elected for three years by universal suffrage, the limitation being that electors must be 30 years of age and residents. Members of both houses are paid. Denmark has a system of local government in counties, towns, hundreds, and parishes.

Danish Colonies and Dependencies:

St. Croix, St. Thomas and St. John (Danish West Indies); population, 30,527; area, 138 square miles. The government is under a governor and other officials at St. Thomas. [A treaty for the sale of the Danish West Indies to the United States was signed on January 24th, 1902, but the treaty was rejected by the Danish Lands-thing on October 22nd, 1902.]

GREENLAND; population, 11,895; area, 46,740 square miles; is governed by a board at Copenhagen and by officials in two inspectorates or districts.

ICELAND has a legislative assembly (althing) of 36 members, and the chief administration of the government is under a minister at Copenhagen and two resident governors (amtmands) or eastern and western divisions. Area, 39,756 square miles; population, 78,470.

FAROE ISLANDS; population, 15,000; area, 514 square miles. An amtmand, or governor, administers affairs.

Ecuador, republic; population, about 1,300,000, the majority Indians; area, 120,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for four years by direct vote of the people who can read and write and are Roman Catholics, and aided by a cabinet of five ministers. A vice-president is also elected and acts as president of the council of state, which is composed of the cabinet and seven other members. President, Senor Lizarda Garcia.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Congress of two houses; senate of 32 members elected for four years, one-half retiring every second year; a house of 42 deputies, chosen for two years. The electorate is the same as that for president. The government of the 16 provinces is entrusted to governors appointed by the federal executive. The cantons are regulated by political chiefs, and the parishes by political lieutenants.

France, republic, with representative government and responsible ministry; population (1901), 38,961,945; area, 207,054 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President (M. Armand Fallières), elected for seven years by a majority of the votes of the senate and chamber of deputies meeting as a national assembly. He chooses his cabinet of responsible ministers from the chamber of deputies. In case of a vacancy by death or resignation a new president is immediately elected by the united houses. He has the right of dissolving the chamber with the consent of the senate. His ministry, who are members of and responsible to the chamber, consists of eleven heads of departments. In connection with the work of administration there is also a council of state, of which the minister of justice is president. Its special duty is to act as a consultative body in administrative matters. Members have the right of speech in both houses.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Congress or national assembly of two houses; a senate of 300 members and a chamber of 584 deputies. Senators must be 40 years old, and are elected for nine years—one-third retiring every three years. They are elected indirectly by an electoral body. The senate still contains a number of the life members originally elected by the united chambers, but all senators are now elected. The chamber of deputies is elected for four years by universal suffrage. Deputies must be 25 years of age. Both senators and deputies are paid, and the presidents of the two houses receive a large sum for entertainment. Members travel free on all railways. Both houses have the same powers of legislation except in the case of financial measures, which must be first presented in the chamber of deputies. The departments of France have a system of local government in which the commune is the unit. The prefect or warden of the departments is appointed by the central government. In the communes there are elected councils, but their acts are subject to the approval of the prefect. Centralization is the governing principle in France.

French Colonies and Dependencies:

ALGERIA, colony; population, 4,739,331; area, 184,474 square miles.

Executive Power.—Governor (M. Jonnart), appointed by the French government (as in all other cases of colonies), aided by a consultative council.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Represented by three senators and six deputies in the national assembly of France, which legislates for all the colonies.

ANNAM, French protectorate; population, 6,000,000; area, 52,000 square miles.

Executive Power.—King (Buñ Lain), called Thanh Thai. French interests are protected by the presence of troops.

CAMBODIA, French protectorate; population, 1,500,000; area, 37,400 square miles.

Executive Power.—King (Sisawath).

Legislative Power and Local Government.—The country is divided into arrondissements for local purposes.

COCHIN-CHINA, colony; population, 2,968,000 natives, including a small French population of about 4,000; area, 23,082 square miles.

Executive Power.—Lieut.-Governor.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—One deputy. The local government is exercised in provinces and arrondissements.

The French possessions of Cochin-China, Tonking, Laos, Annam and Cambodia are now united under the name of French Indo-China and have a governor-general.

DAHOMY; estimated population, 1,000,000; area, 60,000 square miles.

FRENCH CONGO AND GABUN, colony; population, 8,000,000 of natives; area, 450,000 square miles.

Executive Power.—Commissioner-general assisted by a lieutenant-governor and administrative council.

FRENCH GUINEA AND DEPENDENCIES, colony; population, estimated 2,000,000; area, about 95,000 square miles.

Executive Power.—Governor.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—No representation.

FRENCH INDIA, colony; population, 300,000; area, 196 square miles.

Executive Power.—Governor.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—One senator and one deputy.

FRENCH SAHARA AND WADAI; for the boundaries of the French protectorates see "The Statesman's Year Book" for 1901, page 598; area of the Sahara about 1,500,000 square miles; area of Wadai and dependencies about 245,000 square miles.

FRENCH SOMALI COAST, including Obock; a protectorate with an area of about 12,000 square miles; population, estimated 50,000.

Executive Power.—A governor-general, aided by a general council.

FRENCH WEST AFRICA, including Senegal, French Guinea, the Ivory Coast, Dahomey and the territories of Senegambia and the Niger.

Executive Power.—A governor-general over the whole of French West Africa; each colony has a lieutenant-governor, and the territories are under the charge of the governor-general or secretary.

GUADELOUPE AND DEPENDENCIES, colony; population, 182,112; area, 722 square miles.

Executive Power.—Governor and elected council.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Senator and two deputies; a local system of arrondissements, cantons and communes.

GUIANA, colony; population, 33,000; area, 30,500 sq. mls.

Executive Power.—Governor and Privy Council.

Legislative Power & Local Government.—One deputy.

MARTINIQUE, colony; population, 187,600 (considerably reduced by volcanic eruptions of Mont Pelée, St. Pierre, 1902); area, 380 square miles.

Executive Power.—Governor and an elected general council.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Senator and two deputies; municipal councils.

NEW CALEDONIA AND DEPENDENCIES, French penal colony; population, 52,000; area, 7,700 square miles.

Executive Power.—Governor.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—No representation.

MADAGASCAR; population, 2,500,000 probably; Diego Suarez, on northern part of the island, is held by France. The same is true of Nossi-Beg Island and St. Marie; area, 228,500 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor-general (M. Augagneur), and administrative council.

REUNION, colony; population, 175,000; area, 1,000 square miles.

Executive Power.—Governor.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—A senator and two deputies. French municipal law prevails.

SENEGAL, colony; the boundaries of Senegal were fixed by a decree on 13th February, 1904; area, about 800,000 square miles; population, about 4,500,000.

Executive Power.—Lieut.-Governor, assisted by a colonial council.

Legislative Power & Local Government.—One deputy.

SOCIETY AND MARQUESAS ISLANDS AND FRENCH ESTABLISHMENTS IN OCEANIA.—Population, about 100,000; area, 9,170 square miles.

Executive Power.—Commandant-general at Tahiti, exercising jurisdiction over Oceania, and aided by two councils, one for consultative purposes and another elected by universal franchise.

ST. PIERRE AND MIQUELON, fishery station; population, 6,000; area, 90 square miles.

Executive Power.—Governor.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—No representation.

TONKING AND LAOS, colony; population, 10,650,000; area, 144,400 square miles.

Executive Power.—French President.

TUNIS, French protectorate; population, 1,900,000, including nearly 30,000 French residents; area, 51,000 square miles.

Executive Power.—Native bey or prince (Prince Mohamed), having hereditary rights to the throne; the French interests are guarded by the presence of a minister resident and two secretaries, who administer affairs under the instructions of the French government.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—All legislative and executive power is nominally in the bey or prince, but France has a veto.

WADAI (Central Sudan), and subject states of Kanem and Bagirmi, estimated population, 3,000,000; area, 245,000 square miles. These semi-civilized states are now within the sphere of French influence, which also extends practically to the whole of the Sahara and Libyan Deserts.

OTHER FRENCH ISLANDS.—St. Paul and Amsterdam, Kerguelan, Mayotte, and the Comoro Islands are too insignificant to require special mention here.

German Empire, federal empire, with representative institutions; population (in 1900), 56,367,178; area, 208,830 square miles. The empire exercises a protectorate through imperial commissioners or governors in certain countries in Africa and the Pacific. In Africa, Togoland, Kamerun, German South-West Africa, German East Africa and Kiau-Chau in Asia. In the Pacific, Kaiser Wilhelm's Land, Bismarck Archipelago, Solomon Islands, Marshall Islands, Caroline, Pelew and Ladrones Islands, Samoan Islands, with a probable population, 15,000,000; area, 1,027,120 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—The supreme executive is in the king of Prussia (hereditary) under the title Deutscher kaiser or German emperor (Wilhelm II), who controls the combined administration and organization of all the German states. He has the aid of a chancellor and thirteen heads of departments. In addition to these ministers (who do not constitute a responsible cabinet), the bundesrath or legislative federal council (see below) itself has administrative powers which it exercises through 12 committees.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—In the bundesrath or federal council and the reichstag or diet of the realm. The former consists of 58 members representing the individual states of the empire and appointed for each session by their several governments. The reichstag is composed of 397 members elected for five years in the states by ballot and universal suffrage. Both parliaments meet annually on a summons of the emperor. The chancellor presides over the bundesrath. All laws must receive the votes of an absolute majority of both bodies and be assented to by the emperor.

Germany, States of, viz. :—

ALSACE-LORRAINE; population, 1,719,470; area, 5,603 square miles.

Executive Power.—Governor-general (statthalter) (Prince Hohenlohe-Langenburg), appointed by the emperor, and aided by a ministry of four members, and a council of state, of whom three are recommended by the provincial committee (see below).

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Landesausschuss, or provincial committee of 58 members.

ANHALT; population, 316,085; area, 906 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary duke (Friedrich), aided by a minister of state.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Diet of 36 members, two appointed by the duke and the rest chosen by certain classes of the population.

BADEN; population, 1,867,944; area, 5,823 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary grand duke (Friedrich I), aided by an executive council of responsible ministers.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Landtag of two chambers; an upper house of ecclesiastical dignitaries, princes and nobles, partly nominated by the grand duke and the rest representative of the nobility, universities, etc. The second chamber is elected indirectly by the towns and rural districts for four years, one half retiring every two years. Members are paid when they are elected or appointed, and do not sit by hereditary right in the upper house.

BAVARIA; population, 6,176,057; area, 29,286 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary king (Otto, Regent Prince Luitpold), with a responsible ministry and a council of state.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Parliament of two houses; a chamber of reichsräthe or upper house of princes, hereditary and appointed; peers and ecclesiastical dignitaries; a house of 159 representatives chosen indirectly by electors. Members are paid and receive passes over railways.

BREMEN, state and city of; population, 224,882; area, 99 square miles.

Executive Power.—Burgomasters and a senate from which is formed a ministry.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Bürgerschaft or convent of 150 burgesses, elected by the citizens, university men being one of the classes of voters.

BRUNSWICK; population, 464,333; area, 1,424 square miles.

Executive Power.—At present time a regent, through the failure of the rightful heir, a duke, to claim the throne. He has the assistance of a responsible ministry of three heads of departments.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Legislative assembly of 48 members, elected by taxpayers, clergy, towns and rural districts for four years, and meeting every two years.

HAMBURG, state and free city of; population, 768,400; area, 158 square miles.

Executive Power.—Senate of 18 carefully selected members, with special legal, financial, and other qualifications, and elected for life by the house of burgesses. Two burgomasters, chosen by ballot, preside.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—House of burgesses of 160 members, elected by ballot for six

years, one-half retiring every three years, by taxpayers, guilds, courts of justice, corporations, etc. The senate has a veto over legislation. In case of conflict there is a court of arbitrators chosen equally from the two chambers.

HESSE; population, 1,119,893; area, 2,965 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary grand-duke (Ernst Ludwig), aided by a ministry.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Legislature of two chambers; an upper house of princes, ecclesiastical dignitaries, elected, appointed and hereditary members; a lower house of 50 elected members. Members of both houses are paid when elected or appointed.

LIPPE; population, 138,952; area, 469 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary prince (Count Leopold IV), aided by a minister.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Diet of 21 elected members with also consultative functions.

LUBECK, free city and state of; population, 96,755; area, 128 square miles.

Executive Power.—Constitution similar to that of Bremen.

MECKLENBURG-SCHWERIN; population, 607,770; area, 5,135 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary grand duke (Friedrich Franz IV), aided by a ministry responsible to the head of the executive alone.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Partly in the hands of the grand duke through an ancient institution that has come down from feudal times, called the domain, and in the landtag, in which the knights' estates and the burgomasters of the towns are alone represented. The people generally elect no members except to the German parliament.

MECKLENBURG-STRELITZ; population, 102,628; area, 1,131 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary grand duke (Adolf Friedrich), with the aid of a minister of state.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Its diet is in common with that of the Duchy of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, and is composed of land-owners and burgomasters. Only the province of Stargard has a share in the constitution.

OLDENBURG; population, 399,183; area, 2,479 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary grand duke (Friedrich August), aided by a responsible ministry.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Landtag or diet elected for three years by indirect election.

PRUSSIA; population, including Heligoland, 34,472,509; area, 134,622 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary king (Wilhelm II), who is also German emperor, and aided by a ministry appointed by himself.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Parliament or landtag of two houses: a house of lords, herrenhaus, composed of princes, hereditary peers, life peers, elected nobles, representatives of universities, burgomasters of large towns, etc.: a lower house, or abgeordnetenhaus, of 433 members elected by the people for five years on a very liberal franchise. Financial questions can only be initiated in the chamber (lower), but they may be rejected as a whole by the upper house; otherwise both houses have equal powers of legislation. Members of the lower house are paid. The kingdom is divided into provinces, over which governors preside, and into counties and other minor local divisions for purposes of local government.

REUSS (Elder Branch); population, 68,290; area, 122 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary prince (Heinrich XXIV), aided by a minister of state.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Legislative body of 12 members, partly elective and partly nominated by the prince.

REUSS (Younger Branch); population, 139,210; area, 319 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary prince, aided by a small cabinet. Heinrich XIV is the reigning prince, but the government is carried on by Heinrich XXVII.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Diet of 15 elected members and the prince.

SAXE-ALTENBURG; population, 194,280; area, 511 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary duke (Ernst), aided by an executive council.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Chamber of 30 members, elected for six years—the sessions being held every three years.

SAXE-COBURG GOTHA; population, 229,600; area, 755 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary duke (Duke of Albany), aided by a minister of state.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—In the duke, and two chambers chosen for four years for each of the two duchies by an indirect system of election, and meeting in common for the common affairs of both; otherwise separately. Deputies are paid.

SAXE-MEININGEN; population, 250,683; area, 953 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary duke (Georg II), aided by a minister of state.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Elective chamber of 24 members with an existence of six years.

SAXE-WEIMAR; population, 362,873; area, 1,388 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary grand duke (Wilhelm Ernst), aided by an executive council responsible to the assembly.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Chamber elected directly and indirectly on a very liberal franchise and meeting every three years.

SAXONY; population, 4,200,000; area, 5,787 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary king (Freidrich August III), aided by a council.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Parliament of two chambers: an upper house of princes, elected, appointed and hereditary nobles, college and university representatives, burgomasters; a lower chamber of 82 members, elected by the towns and rural communes on a very liberal franchise. Members of both houses are paid, except in the case of hereditary and official members.

SCHAUMBURG-LIPPE; population, 43,133; area, 131 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary prince (Georg).

Legislative Power and Local Government.—In the prince and diet, partly appointed by the prince and classes, and partly elected by the people.

SCHWARZBURG-RUDOLSTADT; population, 93,059; area, 363 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary prince (Gunther).

Legislative Power and Local Government.—House of representatives elected for three years by taxpayers and inhabitants generally.

SCHWARZBURG-SONDRERSHAUSEN; population, 80,678; area, 333 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary prince (Karl Gunther).

Legislative Power and Local Government.—In the prince and diet, partly appointed by the prince and land-owners, and partly elected by the people.

WALDECK; population, 56,000; area, 433 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary prince (Friedrich), but the real power is placed in the king of Prussia, who appoints all public officials and administers financial and other affairs.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Assembly of 15 elected members whose functions are confined to purely local matters.

WURTEMBERG; population, 2,169,430; area, 7,528 square miles.

Executive Power.—Hereditary king (Wilhelm II), aided by a minister and a privy council—the latter consultative.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Legislature or landstande, composed of an upper house of princes, hereditary and appointed nobles; a house of deputies, elected by nobles, clergy, university towns, districts, the electors in the latter case being all citizens over 25 years. The ballot is in force. The term of each member is six years. Members of both houses are paid. A permanent joint committee represents both houses when not sitting.

German Dependencies or Protectorates:

TOGOLAND (with Little Popo and Porto Seguro); estimated population, 2,500,000; area, 33,000 sq. miles.

CAMEROONS OR KAMERUN; estimated population, 3,500,000; area, 193,570 square miles.

SOUTH-WEST AFRICA; estimated population, 200,000; area, 322,450 square miles.

EAST AFRICA; estimated population, 6,800,000; area, 384,040 square miles.

IN THE PACIFIC:

MARSHALL ISLANDS; estimated population, 13,000; area, 150 square miles.

SOLOMON ISLANDS; estimated population, 45,000; area, 4,200 square miles.

BISMARCK ARCHIPELAGO; estimated population, 188,000; area, 20,000 square miles.

KAISER WILHELM'S LAND; estimated population, 110,000; area, 70,000 square miles.

CAROLINE, PELEW AND LADRONÉ ISLANDS. These islands were sold by Spain to Germany by treaty dated February 12th, 1899. The three groups for the present form part of the German New Guinea Protectorate. Estimated population, 40,000; area, 560 square miles.

KIAU-CHAU, on the east coast of the Chinese province of Shan-tun, leased to Germany, March 6, 1898. Area, 200 square miles. Population, 20,000.

SAMOAN ISLANDS. The islands of Savaii and Upolu are now German dependencies; area of the two islands, 1,000 square miles; population, 31,000.

All the foregoing colonies or dependencies are under commissioners or imperial governors.

Greece (Hellas, Kingdom of), constitutional monarchy; population, 2,645,000; area, 25,014 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—King (Georgios I, elected in the present case, but the succession to be in his heirs under constitutional limitations), aided by a ministry.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative assembly (boule) of 235 representatives, elected by universal suffrage for four years. Members are paid. A municipal system exists in the monarchies or provincial divisions.

Guatemala, republic; population, 1,842,000, mostly Indians; area, 43,290 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for six years, by universal suffrage. President, Don Manuel Estrada Cabrera.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—National assembly, elected by universal suffrage for four years.

Hayti, republic; population, about 1,300,000, negroes mostly; area, 10,204 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, generally chosen by the national legislature, though the constitution requires his direct election by the people for seven years. Rebellions are frequent. The president has a ministry. President, General Nord.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—National legislature of two houses: a senate of 39 members, appointed for six years by the house of representatives from lists submitted by the executive and electoral colleges—one-third retiring every two years; a house of representatives, elected for three years by manhood suffrage. Members are paid.

Honduras, republic; estimated population, 745,000, mostly Indians; area, 46,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected by universal suffrage for four years, and aided by a ministry. President, Dr. Bonilla.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Single congress of 37 deputies, elected for two years by universal suffrage.

Italy, constitutional monarchy; population, 33,000,000; area, 110,646 square miles. Its foreign possessions are Eritrea, Massowah, Keren, Asmara and Dahlak Archipelago, on the Red Sea, in which a civil governor is appointed by the king; Obbia Habab, Bogos, Assab, Aussa, Somali, and Gallaaland in Africa are under Italian influence or protectorate. The total population of these dependencies is probably about 850,000; area, 183,500 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary king (Vittorio Emanuele III), aided by a responsible ministry.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Parliament of two houses; a senate of 341 members, composed of four princes and 337 life members appointed by the king, and conspicuous for their position, scientific, literary or other attainments; a chamber of 508 deputies, elected by a very liberal franchise in which educational qualifications have a prominent place. Members of the two houses are not paid, but they travel free. A system of local government is exercised by means of provincial, municipal and communal councils.

Japan, constitutional monarchy; population, 47,812,702; area, 147,655 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary emperor or mikado, (Mutsuhito), aided by a responsible ministry and a consultative privy council. The mikado has the power of dissolving the legislature and of giving sanction to all bills as a branch of the legislature.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Imperial parliament or diet of two houses; a house of 364 peers composed of princes, hereditary, elected or appointed nobles, who hold their seats for life or for seven years, according as their position is hereditary or elected or appointed; a house of 369 representatives elected on a very liberal franchise for four years. Members of both houses are paid, excepting hereditary peers; the legislative powers of both houses are equal; voting is by secret ballot. The provinces of the empire are governed by governors, appointed by the emperor, and by representative assemblies for purposes of local administration.

Formosa, population 3,059,235; area, 13,500 square miles. This island has been under the control of Japan since 1895.

Korea. (See Corea, p. 99.)

Liberia, African republic; population, about 2,200,000; area, 45,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for two years by universal suffrage, and aided by a ministry. President, Arthur Barclay.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—National legislature of two houses: a senate of nine members and house of representatives of 14 members—the former elected for four and the latter for two years by universal suffrage.

Luxemburg, independent grand duchy; population, 236,543; area, 998 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary grand duke (Wilhelm).

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Chamber of 45 deputies, elected for six years by the cantons or townships, one half being renewed every three years.

Mexico, federal republic; population, about 13,605,000; area, 767,005 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for four years by electors chosen by universal suffrage, and aided by a council. President, General D. Porfirio Diaz.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Congress of two houses: a senate of 56 members, elected by universal suffrage, two for each state; a house of 227 representatives elected for two years by manhood suffrage. Members of the two houses are paid. Each of the 28 states of the federation has a governor and a legislature of two houses elected by the people.

Monaco, independent principality; population, about 15,000; area, eight square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary prince (Albert), having exclusive executive and legislative power, aided by a governor-general and a council of state.

Montenegro, independent principality, with a measure of constitutional government; population, 228,000; area, 3,630 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary prince (Nicholas I), aided by a ministry.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—State council of eight members, four appointed by the prince, four elected by the inhabitants who can serve as soldiers.

Morocco, absolute despotism; population, estimated from 2,500,000 to 10,000,000; area, 220,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Sultan (Mulai-Abd-el-Aziz), spiritual as well as civil head of the state, with a consultative ministry.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—All legislative as well as executive power is in the sultan.

Nepal, military oligarchy; population, estimated about 4,000,000; area, 54,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Nominal hereditary sovereign, (Maharaja-Dhiraj), but the chief authority is in the prime minister.

Netherlands, constitutional monarchy; population, 5,509,659; area, 12,648 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary sovereign, at present a queen (Wilhelmina Helena Pauline Maria); a responsible council of ministers aids the sovereign.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—States-general of two houses; a first chamber of 50 members, elected for nine years—one-third retiring every three years—by the provincial states from the highest taxpayers or important officials; a second chamber of 100 deputies, elected by male tax-payers and lodgers of the age of 23, for four years. Members of both houses are paid. Ministers can attend the proceedings of both chambers, but they have only a deliberative voice except when they are members of either. New legislation can only be initiated in the second chamber and by the government. The upper house can only reject or approve, but not amend measures. Each province has a representative system of only one elected chamber. In every commune there is an elected council for local affairs.

Netherlands, Colonies of the, viz.:

IN THE DUTCH EAST INDIES:

JAVA and MADURA, with the following outposts: Sumatra, Borneo, Riau, Lingga Archipelago, Banca, Billiton, Celebes, Moluccas, Sunda Islands, New Guinea (in part); total population, 35,000,000; area, 736,400 square miles.

Executive Power.—Governor-general (J. B. van Heutsz), assisted by a purely consultative council, administers affairs of Dutch India. Java and Madura are governed by a resident and assistant residents, and controllers in the provinces. The outposts are governed by governors, residents, assistant residents, controllers.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Legislative power is in the council and governor.

IN THE DUTCH WEST INDIES:

SURINAM or DUTCH GUIANA; population, 70,000; area, 46,600 square miles.

Executive Power.—Governor, aided by a council, all appointed by the sovereign.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Colonial states, whose members are partly appointed by the governor and partly elected.

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CURACAO and its dependent islands; population, 52,301; area, 403 square miles.

Executive Power.—Governor, aided by a council, all appointed by the sovereign.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Colonial council, composed of the four members of the council and nine members appointed by the sovereign. The internal affairs of the several islands are administered by chiefs appointed by the sovereign.

Nicaragua, republic; population, about 500,000; area, 49,500 square miles

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for four years by universal suffrage and aided by a responsible ministry. President, General José Santos Zelaya.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Congress of 40 members elected by universal suffrage for two years.

Norway, constitutional monarchy; population, 2,240,000; area, 124,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary king (Haakon VII), assisted by a council of state of nine members.

LEGISLATIVE POWER.—A legislature called the storting consisting of 123 representatives. The storting, when elected and assembled for business, is divided into two houses, the "lagthing," or one-fourth of the storting, and the "odesthing," or remaining three-fourths of the storting. The odesthing has the whole right to inspect and consider public accounts. All new laws are initiated in the lower house, and are accepted or rejected by the lagthing. If the two houses do not agree, they assemble in joint session, and a majority of two-thirds decide. Members are paid.

Oman, independent state in Arabia; population, 1,550,000; area, 82,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary sultan (Seyyid Feysal bin Turki), with absolute power, as in all similar states of the East.

Panama, republic, population about 340,000; area 31,570 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President (Dr. Manuel Amador), assisted by a council.

Paraguay, republic; estimated population, about 550,000; area, 157,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for four years by universal suffrage, and aided by a council of responsible ministers. A vice-president is also elected. President, Dr. Balz.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Congress of two houses, a senate and house of representatives elected by universal suffrage. The members are paid.

Persia, absolute monarchy; population, estimated 9,000,000; area, 628,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary shah, or shahenshah (Muzaffar-ed-din), aided by a consultative council of ministers. The country is divided into provinces, each governed by a governor-general and lieutenant-governor, all acting under the instructions of the central government.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—In the shah, whose powers are only limited by the principles of the Koran and of the Mohammedan tenets.

Peru, republic; population, 4,700,000; area, 695,733 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for four years by universal suffrage, and aided by an executive council. Two vice-presidents are also elected to act in case of death or incapacity of the president. President, Señor Jose Pardo.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Congress of two houses; a senate of 48 members, chosen by the provinces or departments, and a house of 108 representatives, elected by an indirect vote of electors. There are municipal councils for local purposes.

Portugal, constitutional monarchy; population, 5,428,659; area, 36,038 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary king (Carlos I.), aided by a responsible cabinet and a consultative privy council.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Cortes geraes or parliament of two houses; a house of peers,

(camãra dos pares) hereditary peers elected or appointed for life, peers, universities, and literary and scientific bodies having representatives; a house of 155 deputies (camãra dos deputados), elected for four years by a very liberal franchise, regard being had to educational qualifications. Colonial members are paid, other deputies travel free by state railways. The sovereign cannot veto a law passed twice by the cortes. Madeira and the Azores form an integral part of the kingdom for legislative and administrative purposes. Portugal has a municipal system.

Portuguese Colonies and Dependencies.

IN AFRICA:

CAPE VERDE ISLANDS, Guinea, Prince's and St. Thomas' Islands, Angola, Ambriz, Benguela and Massamedes and Congo, East Africa, Mozambique, and Lourenço Marques. Total population, 8,200,000; area, 792,040 square miles.

IN ASIA:

GOA, Damao, Diu, Timor, etc., Macao, etc. Total population, 941,000; area, 9,020 square miles.

Executive Power.—Portuguese colonies have no legislatures or representation in the national cortes, like Spanish or French colonies, but their affairs are administered by governors, judges, and other functionaries appointed by the king, and all laws are initiated and promulgated by the same authority.

Rumania (Wallachia and Moldavia), constitutional monarchy; estimated population, 6,000,000; area, 50,720 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—King (Carol I.), aided by an executive council.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Parliament of two houses; a senate of 120 members, elected for eight years, by electoral colleges, universities being represented; a chamber of 183 deputies elected by electoral colleges for four years. The franchise is very liberal and encourages educational qualifications. Members are paid. Senators must be 40 years of age; deputies, 25. The districts or provinces have a system of local government fairly liberal.

Russia, the empire of, absolute monarchy; population, estimated 141,000,000; area, 8,660,395 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary emperor, or czar of all the Russias (Nicholas II), aided by a council of state, a ruling senate, a holy synod and a committee of ministers, in whose hands are entrusted the supervision of all the secular and religious affairs of the empire. All the work of government is in the hands of committees, cabinets or departments. Bureaucracy is the essence of government in the Russias.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—All legislative and administrative power is in the emperor and his councils. The empire is divided into vice-royalties, governments and districts, governed by governors-general, appointed and controlled directly by the emperor. Military governors are established in some provinces. Centralized government rules in Russia. The only shadow of local self-government is to be seen in the mirs or assemblies of the communes or parishes of European Russia. These "mirs" elect certain officers for taxation and purely local purposes, and are relics of old Aryan institutions which survived in the village assemblies of India and Germany, and originated the township government of England and New England. In the provinces, towns and cities there are municipal institutions, but almost exclusively controlled by the large powers of the imperial authorities.

In August, 1905, the czar announced the formation of a state council or дума to be elected not later than January, 1906. The дума to hold office for five years and to meet annually. No law to be valid without the approval of the дума, but it was expressly provided in the czar's manifesto that the fundamental laws of the imperial administration shall not be touched.

Russian Dependencies, viz.:

BOKHARA, under control of Russia; population, about 1,250,000; area, 92,000 square miles.

Executive Power.—Ameer, ruling by hereditary right. A Russian resident watches over Russian interests.

FINLAND, grand duchy; population, 2,800,000; area, 144,255 square miles.

Executive Power.—Governor-general, appointed by and instructed by the secretary of state and four members of a council for the affairs of Finland; a senate aids the government in administrative affairs.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—A national parliament composed of four members, representing the nobles, clergy, burghers and peasants, severally called together by the emperor every four or five years. Laws are prepared by the council at St. Petersburg, and discussed by the parliament. The emperor has a veto. In 1901 and 1902 many changes were made in the administration of Finland with the apparent intention of taking away the independence of the grand duchy.

KHIVA, under control of Russia; population, 800,000; area, 22,340 square miles.

Executive Power.—Khan, ruling by hereditary right.

Salvador, republic; population, 1,006,848; area, 7,225 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for four years by universal suffrage and aided by a ministry. President, Senor P. Jose Escalon.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Single chamber, or national congress of 70 deputies, elected for one year by universal suffrage.

Samoa Islands; population, 36,400; area, 1,701 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—In 1899 the kingship was abolished and by an agreement made between Great Britain and Germany in November, 1899, ratified and accepted by the United States in 1900, it was decided that Germany should control Savaii and Upolu and the United States Tutuila and the other islands east of 171° long. A Court of Arbitration was formed to settle disputes between Europeans and Americans.

Santo Domingo (part of Hayti), republic; population, 610,000; area, 18,045 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for four years by universal suffrage and aided by a ministry. The provinces and districts are administered by governors appointed by the president. President, Carlos F. Morales. Civil war is now going on in this island and a new government will probably be formed.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—National congress of 24 members, elected for two years on a limited franchise. In the communes there are councils elected by the ratepayers, for municipal purposes.

Servia, constitutional monarchy; population, 2,493,770; area, 13,630 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—A king (Peter I), aided by a responsible ministry.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—National assembly (narodna skupstina) of two houses; a senate of eight members, four appointed by the king, and four elected by the assembly, which is composed of deputies elected for three years indirectly by the taxpayers. A certain number of deputies must be university men. Deputies are paid. The constitution is in process of radical changes. The kingdom is divided into counties, districts and municipalities, which have representative assemblies for administrative purposes.

Siam (Thai) and dependencies of Kedah, Patani, Kelantan, etc.; absolute monarchy; estimated population, 5,000,000; area, 220,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary king (Chulalong Korn I), aided by a council (senabodi) from which the king has formed a cabinet.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—All legislative power is in king and council. The kingdom is divided into provinces or districts administered by governors appointed by the king.

Sudan (Anglo-Egyptian); population about 2,000,000; area, 950,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Under the influence of the British and Egyptian governments. Since the British victory at the battle of Omdurman (1898) a large portion of the Sudan has been brought under British rule. A governor-general appointed by Egypt with the consent of Great Britain; present governor-general Sir F. Reginald Wingate, K.C.B.

Spain, constitutional kingdom; population in 1900, 18,618,086; area, 194,783 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary king (Alfonso XIII), aided by responsible ministers, nine in number.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Parliament (cortes) of two houses; a senate composed of three classes (1) 80 senators by their own right, princes, grandees, captains-general, archbishops, admirals, judges of the courts, patriarchs of the Indies, presidents of the council of state; (2) 100 life senators appointed by the crown; (3) 180 elected for five years by the communal and provincial states, clergy, universities, academies and largest taxpayers, one-half of the number being renewed every five years; a congress of 431 members elected on a very liberal franchise based on land, income, educational, professional and public services. The principle of the representation of minorities is observed in large constituencies. The cortes meet annually and the congress is elected for five years. The king has the power of summoning or dissolving the congress and the elected part of the senate. The senate is a court of impeachment when charges are laid against ministers by the congress. In the provinces and communes of Spain there is a representative system of local government.

Spanish Colonies and Dependencies—

IN AFRICA:

ADRAR AND RIO DE ORO; population, 100,000. Rio Muni and Cape San Juan; population, 140,000. Fernando Po, etc., Annabon, Corisco, Elobey, San Juan; population, 25,000; total area in Africa, 80,580 square miles.

Sweden, constitutional monarchy; population, 5,175,228; area, 172,876 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary king (Oscar II), aided by a council of state of eleven members.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—1. In Sweden there is a council of state of 11 members; a diet or parliament of two houses; an upper or first house of 150 members elected by provinces and town corporations for nine years; a lower or second chamber of 230 members, elected by residents of rural districts and towns for three years on a franchise based on property and income. Members of the second chamber are alone paid. The ballot is in use.

Switzerland, federal republic; population, 3,315,443; area, 15,976 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—The supreme executive and legislative power is in a parliament called, when united in joint session, the bundes-versammlung or federal assembly, composed of two houses, a ständerath or state council of 44 members, or two chosen and paid by each canton; a nationalrath or national council of 167 representatives elected by direct vote every three years and paid out of the federal funds. The federal assembly elects president and vice-president one year and a bundesrath or federal council for three years. Members of the council can sit and debate but not vote in the two chambers. President, 1906, M. L. Forrer of Zurich.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—The principles of initiating measures by popular vote (the initiative), and of submitting acts to direct vote (the "referendum") are in force in this republic. The legislative powers of the nation are set forth in the constitution. Each of the cantons has a system of local government based on the fullest possible expression of the popular will. Legislative assemblies and executive councils exist, and in a few cantons there are lands-gemeinden or assemblies of the male citizens for the purpose of making laws and appointing their administrators. The "initiative" and "referendum" also exist to a considerable extent. The cantons or states are sovereign and only limited by the constitution.

Turkey, absolute monarchy; population, about 40,000,000; area, 1,660,000 square miles (including Samos, Egypt and other dependencies). Turkey in Europe has a population of 6,000,000, and an area of 65,752 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary sultan (Abdul Hamed II), whose executive and legislative authority is only limited by the precepts of Mahomet. The sultan is aided by a sadrazam (grand-vizier), and a sheik-ul-

islam, who are respectively at the head of temporal and spiritual affairs under the direction of the sultan.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—The people have no legislative or popular assemblies or councils. The whole country is divided into governments, appointed by and subject to the decrees of the sultan.

BULOARIA, principality, under the suzerainty of Turkey; population, 3,744,288; area, 37,860 square miles. This state includes eastern Roumelia.

Executive Power.—The present prince (Ferdinand), was elected in 1887 by the national assembly, but the title is hereditary. The prince is aided by a council of eight ministers.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Single house, called the national assembly, elected by manhood suffrage for five years. Members are paid.

CRETE.—The island of Crete is an autonomous state under the suzerainty of Turkey with a high commissioner appointed by the powers—Great Britain, Russia, France and Italy. High Commissioner, Prince George: Population, 303,543; area, 3,326 square miles.

EGYPT, under the nominal suzerainty of the sultan; population, about 10,000,000; area, 400,000 square miles.

Executive Power.—A hereditary khedive (Abbas Hilm), aided by a council of six ministers. He has also the benefit of the advice of an English financial adviser appointed by himself, and whose consent is necessary to every decision on financial matters. He can sit on the council though not a member of the executive. British influence prevails in administration.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—The khedive has promulgated a constitution intended to give the people a share in legislation, but so far it is practically nugatory. Egypt is divided into governorships of towns and provinces with extensive powers, but all under the control of the khedive and executive.

SAMOS, ISLAND OF, principality and dependency of Turkey; population, about 54,000; area, 180 square miles.

Executive Power.—Vizier or mushir of Turkey, appointed by the sultan, and aided by a council of four Greeks.

United States of America, federal republic; population in census year 1900, 76,303,387, including Alaska and Hawaii; area, 3,667,563 square miles. The population in 1905 was estimated at 82,859,211.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for four years under the constitution by electoral colleges in each state equal to the whole number of its senators and representatives in congress; but practically the election is by the direct vote of the people. Each political party nominates a set of electors on a presidential ticket and the people vote directly for them. Under the constitution the electors meet in each state on a particular day and invariably cast their votes in accordance with the result of the election. There is also a vice-president elected by the same political method. The president is head of the executive, and has a veto over the legislation of congress, but it can be over-ridden by a two-thirds majority in each house. He is aided by a cabinet of eight secretaries of state and heads of departments, appointed by himself with the approval of the senate, but having no seats in or responsibility to congress. In case of death, resignation or disability of the president, the vice-president succeeds. If there is no vice-president the secretary of state or other members of cabinet succeed in order of seniority until a new president is appointed or the disability is removed. Elections for president and vice-president take place on the Tuesday following the first Monday in November every fourth (leap) year, and they take office on the 4th March following.

President elected, 1904, Theodore Roosevelt. Vice-President, Chas. W. Fairbanks.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Congress of two houses; a senate of 90 members, or two from each state, chosen by the legislatures for six years; a house of 386 representatives elected every second year by the electors of the states in accordance with their respective election laws; universal suffrage limited in a few cases by residence, educational tests, registration and payment of taxes. Senators must be 30 years of age, citizens for nine years, and residents of the states which

elect them. Representatives must be about 25 years of age, citizens for seven years, and residents of the states in which they are elected. The senate has the power of approving or rejecting the higher appointments and treaties made by the president, and of acting as a court of impeachment for the president, judges of the supreme court, and other high functionaries. It can also amend bills for raising revenue, which alone can originate in the house of representatives. The vice-president is *ex-officio* president of the senate, which may also appoint a temporary president. The speaker of the house is elected by its members. Members of both houses receive \$5,000 and travelling expenses every year. The territories are represented by one elected delegate in each case, who cannot vote in the house. The legislative powers of the congress are enumerated in the constitution. The supreme court of the United States can hear and determine issues of laws as to the interpretation of the constitution and may declare the acts of congress unconstitutional or *intra vires*, as the case may be. The federal judges are appointed by the president with the approval of the senate. A permanent civil service is being gradually built up, and removals from office in the case of officials, not political in their nature, are very much less frequent of late years with the extension of civil service rules to all departments.

According to the census of 1900 there were in the United States 66,893,405 white persons and 8,840,888 negroes.

Executive Power.—In each state there is a governor and a lieutenant-governor and officers to administer the government. The governor and lieutenant-governor are elected by the people for four years in following states: California, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nevada, North Carolina, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia, and Wyoming. In the following states the term is three years: New Jersey and New York. In the following, two years: Alabama, Arkansas, Colorado, Idaho, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, New Hampshire, North Dakota, Ohio, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Vermont, Wisconsin. In the following, the term is one year: Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts and Rhode Island. All the governors have the power of veto over legislation except in Delaware, North Carolina, Ohio, Rhode Island. It requires a majority or two-thirds vote to over-ride the veto. The governor is the head of the executive and has no responsible ministers in the English or Canadian sense, but the executive or administrative officers are generally elected.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—In all the forty-nine states there is a legislature of two houses; an upper house, generally called senate, and a house of representatives, both elected by the people of the state. In the following states the senate is elected for four years, the house of representatives for two years, and sessions are biennial, with the exception of the states mentioned: Alabama, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi (annual), Missouri, Montana, Nevada, North Dakota, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina (annual), Texas, Utah, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia and Wyoming. In the following states the term is for the senate two, for the house, two, and sessions biennial: Idaho, Michigan, Nebraska, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Ohio, South Dakota, Tennessee, Vermont. In the following states the term is one for both senate and house, and sessions annual: Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, Rhode Island. In Minnesota the term of the senate is two years, of the house one, and sessions annual. In New York the senate two, the house one, and the sessions annual. In New Jersey the senate three, the house one, and the sessions annual. Universal suffrage is the rule, though Delaware has a tax qualification in state senate elections. In some states the payment of a poll tax, illiteracy and residence enter into qualifications. In Colorado, Idaho, Utah and Wyoming women can vote. Members of the legislature are paid. All public officials, state and municipal, are elected as a rule, but the tendency in the older states is to have a permanent public service apart from political heads. In 31 states the judges are elected by the people; in five, by the legislature; in eight, appointed by the governor, subject to confirmation by the legislature or council. The Australian or Canadian ballot is now in force in 40 states; nine have passed stringent laws against corrupt practices at elections, but they are practically effective in only two or three states.

Throughout the union there is a very complete system of township, county, and city government. Township local government prevails in the New England states, the county is generally the unit in the south; in the middle and north-western states there is a mixed system. In several of the western states women can vote and be elected for municipal and school bodies. In all cases councils are elective. In the large cities there have been cases of gross corruption and mismanagement, and the best methods of improving municipal government are now attracting much serious attention.

United States Territories:

ALASKA; pop., 63,592; area, 590,884 sq. m.

INDIAN TERRITORY; pop., 392,060; area, 31,000 sq. m.

HAWAIIAN or SANDWICH I.; pop., 154,001 (26,000 white); area, 4,990 sq. m.

Executive Power.—In the territories the governors and other officials, including judges, are appointed for four years by the president of the United States. The legislature (council and house of representatives) of the organized territory of Hawaii is elected for two years, but its powers of legislation are large, though subject to federal restrictions. In the other territories there are only governors and officials appointed by the president.

United States Dependencies:

GUAM (Ladrones). Ceded by Spain to the United States in 1898. A coaling station for the U.S. navy; population about 9,000; area, 200 square miles.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS. These islands were ceded by Spain to the United States on December 11, 1898. They are about 2,000 in number. Total area, including Sulu Islands, about 127,850 square miles; population, estimated, 7,635,000. The islands are now under the control of a governor and seven commissioners, three of whom are natives, the other four are Americans, who are secretaries of the departments of interior, finance and justice, commerce and police, and public instruction. There is also a system of local government in each of the 39 provinces into which the islands are divided.

GOVERNOR, Luke E. Wright.

PORTO RICO. Ceded by Spain to the United States on December 11, 1898. Area, 3,600 square miles; population, 953,243, of whom 589,426 are white. A representative system of government was established in May, 1901, consisting of a governor, an executive council and an elected legislative assembly.

SAMOAN ISLANDS. The island of Tutuila and several small islands of the group are now under the control of the United States (p. 105).

Uruguay, republic; population in 1902, 978,048; area, 72,210 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for four years, and aided by a council of five ministers. President, Señor Jose Batele Ordonez.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Congress of two houses; a senate of 19 chosen by an electoral college for six years, one-third retiring every two years; a house of 69 representatives elected every three years by all male adults who can read and write.

Venezuela, republic; population, about 2,590,981; area, 534,000 sq. miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, chosen for two years, without veto power, and aided by a responsible ministry of six members, and a federal council of 19 members. Congress appoints the council every two years, and the latter choose the president. President, General Gomez.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Congress of two houses; a senate of 40 members or two elected for each state legislature for four years; a house of 52 representatives, elected by direct vote for four years.





THE KING AND ROYAL FAMILY.

THE KING.—Edward VII., by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India. His Majesty was born at Buckingham Palace on November 9th, 1841; succeeded to the throne on January 22nd, 1901, on the death of Her Majesty Queen Victoria. He married Princess Alexandra of Denmark, March 10th, 1863. His Majesty is the eldest son of the late Queen Victoria and the late Prince Consort (His Royal Highness Prince Albert of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha).

THE QUEEN.—Alexandra, daughter of Christian IX., King of Denmark, was born at Copenhagen, December 1st, 1844, and was married to His Majesty (then Prince of Wales) at Windsor, March 10th, 1863.

The surviving children of the King and Queen are :—

His Royal Highness, George Frederic Ernest Albert, Prince of Wales, Earl of Chester, Duke of Cornwall and York, born June 3rd, 1865; married his cousin, Princess Victoria Mary (born May 26th, 1867), only daughter of the late Duke of Teck, on July 6th, 1893. Has issue—Edward, born June 23rd, 1894; Albert, born December 14th, 1895; Victoria, born April 25th, 1897; Henry, born March 31st, 1900; George, born December 20th, 1902; and John Francis Charles, born July 12th, 1905.

Princess Louise, Duchess of Fife (Louisa Victoria Alexandra Dagmar), born February 20th, 1867; married July 27th, 1889, Alexander William George, Duke of Fife. Has two daughters, Alexandra, born May 27th, 1891, and Maud, born April 3rd, 1893.

Princess Victoria Alexandra Olga Mary, born July 6th, 1868.

Princess Maud Charlotte Mary Victoria, born November 26th, 1869; married 22nd July, 1896, to Charles, second son of the Crown Prince of Denmark, chosen King of Norway Nov., 1905. Has one son Olaf.

The deceased children of the King and Queen are :—

Her Royal Highness Louise Caroline Alberta, born March 18, 1848; married March 21, 1871, to the Marquis of Lorne, now Duke of Argyll.

His Royal Highness Arthur William Patrick Albert, Duke of Connaught, born May 1, 1850; married March 13, 1879, to Princess Louise Margaret, daughter of the late Prince Frederick Charles of Prussia, and has issue one son and two daughters. Arthur, Margaret, M. Gustavus Adolphus, Crown Prince of Sweden, and Patricia.

Her Royal Highness Beatrice Mary Victoria Feodora, born April 14, 1857; married July 23, 1885, to Prince Henry of Battenburg, who died Jan. 20, 1896; and has issue three sons and one daughter, now Queen Victoria of Spain; married King Alfonso May 31, 1906.

The deceased children of her late Majesty Queen Victoria are :—

Her Imperial Majesty Victoria Adelaide Mary Louisa, PRINCESS ROYAL, Empress Frederick of Germany, born Nov. 21, 1840, and married Jan. 25, 1858, to Frederick, Crown Prince of Prussia, afterwards (March to June, 1888) second German Emperor, who died June 15, 1888; died August 5th, 1901, and had issue four sons (two deceased), the eldest William, the present German Emperor, and four daughters.

Her Royal Highness Alice Maud Mary, born April 25, 1843; died December 14, 1878; married his Royal Highness Prince Frederick Louis of Hesse, July 1, 1862, who died March 13, 1892; had issue five daughters and two sons; the second son died by an accident, May, 1873; the youngest daughter died November 15, 1878.

His Royal Highness Alfred Ernest Albert, Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, born August 6, 1844; married the Grand Duchess Marie of Russia, January 9, 1874; died July 30, 1900; issue, a son, born October 15, 1874, (died February 6, 1899) and four daughters, born October 29, 1875, November 25, 1876, September 1, 1878, and March, 1884.

His Royal Highness Leopold George Duncan Albert, Duke of Albany, born April 7, 1853; married April 27, 1882, to Princess Helen of Waldeck, and died March 28, 1884, having had issue one son, now Duke of Albany, who succeeded his uncle, the Duke of Edinburgh, as Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, on July 30, 1900, and one daughter.

THE KING'S CIVIL LIST.

Consequent upon the death of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, and the accession of His Majesty Edward VII., there was passed in the Parliamentary session of 1901 what is known as the Civil List Act, the Act by which is determined what charges shall be made on the consolidated fund for the maintenance of the King and his family.

Until George III. came to the throne in 1760, the income of the sovereign was derived chiefly from Crown lands, from a variety of landed property in England and

Wales, Scotland and Ireland, in which the sovereign had a life-interest, and from which he received the rents. In the feudal ages these lands constituted a princely patrimony. In later times this Crown property was greatly reduced by lavish grants to royal favorites. At the Restoration the income from Crown lands was ascertained by a committee of the House of Commons to amount to £217,900 a year, in addition to £4,000 from the Forest of Dean. By the time Charles II. had been on the throne three years he had by his lavish bestowal

of the lands on favorites reduced the income to £100,000. William III., by his grants to favorites who had accompanied him from Holland, made further havoc with the Crown domains; so much so that at the accession of Queen Anne Parliament endeavored to save the remnant by an Act (1 Anne, c. 8) which prohibited alienation of Crown lands, and enacted stringent provisions in regard to the length of the term for which they might be leased and the rents reserved.

Queen Anne, George I. and George II. derived the larger part of their income from their life-interest in the Crown property, but when George III. came to the throne he surrendered his life-interest in the Crown lands. It was turned over to the nation in return for a fixed Civil List of £800,000, subsequently increased to £900,000. George IV., William IV. and Queen Victoria, on their accessions, surrendered their life-interest in the Crown lands in return for a Civil List. The same course was taken by Edward VII. when he came to the throne; and soon after Parliament assembled a committee of the House of Commons was appointed to recommend the new Civil List. It reported on the 4th of April, 1901, and its recommendations were embodied in an Act (1 Edward VII., c. 4), which was read a third time in the House of Commons on June 18th. By this Act the King's Civil List was fixed at a yearly sum of £470,000, assigned as follows:

In the event of Her Majesty Queen Alexandra surviving the King it is enacted that there shall be paid to the Queen during her life an annuity of £70,000.

Another clause provides that there shall be paid to the Duke of Cornwall and York "during the joint lives of his present Majesty and of his said Royal Highness, an annuity of £20,000"; that "there shall be paid to the Duchess of Cornwall and York during the continuance of her marriage with the Duke of Cornwall and York, for her sole and separate use, but without any power of anticipation, an annuity of £10,000; and that in the event of the Duchess surviving the Duke there shall be paid to her during her life an annuity of £30,000."

In respect to His Majesty's daughters, Princess Louise (Duchess of Fife), Princess Victoria and Princess Maud

(Princess Charles of Denmark), it is enacted that as a provision for them there shall be an annual allowance of £18,000 during their joint lives, "to be reduced at the death of each of the said princesses by £6,000."

The Civil List of Her late Majesty, Queen Victoria, as fixed by the Act of 1837, was £385,000, assigned as follows:

Until the death of the Empress Frederick of Germany, on August 5th, 1901, annuities amounting to £72,000 were payable to other members of the Royal Family. These annuities were not affected by the death of the Queen, but with the death of the Empress an annuity of £8,000 came to an end.

The revenues of the Duchies of Cornwall and Lancaster are outside the Civil List arrangement. Those of Cornwall, valued at £60,000 a year, are vested in the eldest son of the reigning sovereign, who becomes by birth the Duke of Cornwall, by virtue of a patent of Edward III. in 1337. The Duchy of Lancaster was the private patrimony of Henry Bolingbroke, son of John of Gaunt. It is separate from the other possessions of the Crown in order and government, but united to it in point of inheritance. It also brings in a revenue of £60,000 a year.

THE BRITISH ARMY IN 1906-1907.

The year 1906-7 will, in accordance with the Army Reorganization Scheme submitted to the House of Commons on July 12th, 1906, by Mr. Haldane, Secretary of War, see a reduction of 20,000 men—two battalions of guards and eight line battalions—in the British military forces. But for this reduction the military forces during the year would have stood as set out in the accompanying table, which is taken from the Army Estimates for 1906-7, submitted to the House of Commons on March 5th, 1906.

Mr. Haldane in explaining the new scheme reminded the House of Commons of the work for which the British Army is organized. "Primarily," he said, "the task of the British Army is to maintain an Empire which extends over twelve million square miles and embraces a population of 400,000,000 people. It is no use making comparisons between the Army of Great Britain and the armies of France and Germany. Their armies exist for a totally different purpose. If you wish a comparison you must compare the British Army and Navy together, with the armies and navies of other countries and you will have nothing to apprehend from the result of that comparison."

"The best organization for this purpose in the unanimous opinion of the experts, after four months of the closest consideration," he continued, "is an organization of six big divisions in three brigades, on a pattern corresponding with our forces in India. We think it important to make our organization accord as nearly as possible with the organization in India, in case our forces should ever have to act together in some great emergency in defence of the Indian frontier. What we aim at is a force of six big divisions, with a proper equipment of cavalry, which, according to the best calculations, would be four cavalry brigades. We have more cavalry than that. I do not cut off a single cavalry unit. Six big divisions of infantry and four brigades of cavalry and artillery would equal three army corps and represent a total of 150,000 men. These are made up of 50,000 men with the colours, 70,000 in the Reserve, and 30,000 trained on a Militia basis. We have considered in the Defence Committee to what extent the forces abroad can, under existing circumstances, be reduced. There are troubles in Egypt. Things are not

wholly clear or settled in South Africa. There are difficulties in various parts of the Empire. Yet after survey, the Defence Committee is quite clear we can reduce eight battalions abroad and two at home. There are at present fourteen battalions which did not exist ten years ago, and of these we are in the position immediately to get down eight. Whether we can get down more afterwards depends upon circumstances of general policy. In this matter I wish to go cautiously, and the Government do not wish to undertake anything that cannot be performed with absolute safety."

The battalions that are to be disbanded are 3rd Battalion Scots Guards; 3rd Battalion Coldstream Guards; 3rd Battalion Northumberland Fusiliers (Bloemfontein); 3rd Battalion Royal Warwickshire Regiment (Standerton); 3rd Battalion Lancashire Fusiliers (Pretoria); 3rd Battalion Manchester Regiment (Middleburg); 4th Battalion Manchester Regiment (Aldershot); 4th Battalion Royal Warwickshire Regiment (The Curragh); 4th Battalion Northumberland Fusiliers (Limerick); and the 4th Battalion Lancashire Fusiliers (Tipperary).

In alluding to these reductions in the Guards Mr. Haldane reminded the House that the guardsman was an expensive man; and said that looking at these things from the point of view of efficiency and economy, it was not possible for the Government to defend the maintenance of the guards at the strength of battalions at which they had stood since 1897, as the justification for the increase then made seemed to the Government to have disappeared. Mr. Haldane added that the officers and men in the battalions to be disbanded would be absorbed. Nobody would be deprived of his pay while the reduction was going on.

Other features of the reorganization scheme are:— (1) The Militia Artillery is to be converted into an ammunition column, to serve with the existing field batteries (of which 93 are now equipped with guns), and the old fifteen-pounder guns, used by the Militia Artillery, are to be given to the Volunteer Artillery, for training purposes; (2) Greater efficiency is to be demanded from the Volunteers, who, with the other auxiliary forces, are to be encouraged by the County Councils; and (3) Medical and sanitary services are to be placed upon an improved footing. It is the expectation of the War Office and the Government that from these changes there will result greater efficiency in every department, and ultimately a large saving in money.

The average cost per head of the personnel of the Army, Army Reserve, Imperial Yeomanry, and Volunteers, according to the War Office figures submitted to the House of Commons on March 5th, 1906, is:—

The non-effective charges (half-pay and pensions) swell the figures, especially in the case of officers of the Regular Army. The most expensive corps in the Army are the three regiments of Household Cavalry, which cost for pay alone £60,600 a year. In each regiment there are a lieutenant-colonel, receiving £428 17s. 6d.; three majors at £282 17s. 6d.; six captains at £246 7s. 6d.; and eight lieutenants at £164 5s. The privates receive 1s. 9d. a day, and the total of all ranks is 430. The pay of a regiment of cavalry of the line (566 of all ranks) when serving at home is £18,326; the lieutenant-colonel receiving £392 7s. 6d.; and the privates 1s. 2d. a day. The pay of a battalion of infantry of the line (831) is £20,620 17s. 7d.; the lieutenant-colonel receiving £328 10s.; and the privates 1s. a day. In each case there is some additional pay, these rates being the minimum.

Since the end of the war (1902) there has been a permanent garrison in South Africa. Its strength was settled in 1904. It numbers 21,500 men, and comprises four cavalry regiments, two batteries Royal Horse Artillery, twelve batteries Royal Field Artillery, two companies Garrison Artillery, six companies Royal Engineers, ten line battalions, and four garrison regiments, together with the necessary departmental units. The excess cost of maintaining this force in South Africa instead of at home is about £1,360,000. Towards this cost no contribution is made by the African Colonies; except by Natal, which makes a grant of £4,000 a year. Cape Colony, the Orange River Colony, the Transvaal and Rhodesia contribute nothing towards this Imperial charge.

India bears her own Army charges; and, nowadays, South Africa makes the greatest call on the British Army and the British taxpayers, on whom the maintenance of the Army falls. The amount included in the estimates for 1906-7 was, for military purposes in the Colonies and Egypt, £5,269,309, exclusive of sea transport, cost of arms and stores (most of which are supplied from England), headquarters administrative expenses, and other charges, which are not separately estimated. Towards the £5,269,309 the contributions by the Colonial authorities amount to £593,300, leaving to the British taxpayer over £4,676,000, besides the other unspecified expenses.

The accompanying table gives details of the expenditures in the overseas possessions, and of the contributions by the local governments.

Among the military expenditures to which no contribution is made are £126,274 in Bermuda, £130,250 in Jamaica, £166,854 in West Africa, and £427,159 in Gibraltar.

In 1906-7 Halifax and Esquimalt disappeared from the War Office statement of expenditures in British overseas possessions.

The military organization of the Dominion of Canada is dealt with elsewhere in the *Canadian Almanac*. All that needs be noted in this article, which is concerned exclusively with the Imperial forces, is that Canada is now raising a Regular Army of from 4000 to 5000 men to equip the fortresses at Esquimalt, Quebec, and Halifax; and that, in the year 1905-6, British troops were withdrawn from a service in which they had been continuously engaged since Great Britain first obtained a foothold on that part of the North American continent which, since Confederation, has been known as the Dominion of Canada.

The British forces compose what is described as a short service army. This term distinguishes it from the army of thirty years ago. In the army, as it existed prior to 1873, men enlisted for 21 years, and at the end of that time were discharged with a pension. In 1873 this long service system came to an end, and in its place there was established what is now known as the short service plan.

The terms of enlistment have varied in length from time to time since 1873. For some years prior to the South African war, and during the war, most men who went into infantry corps enlisted for three years with the colours and nine years in the reserve. Under the Haldane reorganization scheme, men in Line and Cavalry serve seven years with colours and five with reserve; Field Artillery, six years with the colours and six with the reserve; and Garrison Artillery, eight with the colours and four with the reserve.

About the time the short service system was established, what is known as the territorial system also came into being. Formerly infantry regiments were known by numbers, and generally in addition by titles which belonged characteristically to the regiments, or which commemorated some event or incident of outstanding importance in regimental history. Nowadays, and since the early seventies, infantry regiments are known by the names of counties. When the re-arrangement took place regiments were assigned by name to this or that county, and their depôts were then established in the neighbourhoods from which the regiments then took their names.

There are now 69 of these depôts, and English, Welsh, Scotch and Irish county names are borne by the various regiments. The idea at the bottom of the territorial plan was to give regiments territorial connections, to make them locally popular, and as far as was practicable to mass soldiers hailing from the same part of the country into regiments officially connected with the counties from which the men came. To this end, since the seventies, it has been the practice to recruit regiments from the parts of the country in which their depôts are situated. No matter where the main body of the regiment may be stationed, at Aldershot, at the Curragh, in India, or in Malta, its depôt remains in the neighbourhood to which the regiment is titularly attached. A staff of commissioned and non-commissioned officers of the regiment is stationed at the depôt. There the recruits are received; they are put through a long and hard course of preliminary training, and at the end of this course are drafted from the depôt to the colours.

Since the Army Council was organised in 1904, it has been its policy to strengthen these territorial ties of the

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various regiments; and in 1904-5, in many of the *dépôt* towns, monuments were raised to the officers and men of the local regiments who died in the South African War.

Recruiting officers are permanently stationed in most of the large English towns and cities, and frequently these officers go on special duty into the country villages. London is, however, the great recruiting ground of the army.

CHEST MEASUREMENT AND WEIGHT.

The minimum chest measurement is fixed at 33 in., and the minimum weight at 115 lbs.; but the chest measurement and the weight of each recruit depend upon his height and the arm of the service he wishes to join, and are left to the discretion of the approving medical officers.

It is still possible under the short service plan for soldiers to re-enlist and to serve for 21 years. After this length of service has been put in, soldiers become entitled to pensions. For privates and gunners, the pension is from 8d to 1s 6d per day; for non-commissioned officers, 1s 3d to 3s 6d per day; for warrant officers, 2s to 5s per day. Soldiers discharged on ac-

count of wounds or injuries received in action, or for sickness incurred in the performance of their military duty, are entitled to a pension varying with the extent of the disability and with the length of service.

The increase in the rate of soldiers pay, bringing it up to one shilling a day clear of all deductions, dates from April 1st, 1902. The other part of the new scheme of 1902 came into operation on the 1st of April, 1904, and is governed by a Royal Warrant issued on March 27th, 1902, which sets out that—

On and after 1st April, 1904, the following further daily increases of pay shall be granted to all warrant and non-commissioned officers (including paid lance ranks); and to efficient soldiers, who have enlisted for more than three years with the colours, or have been permitted to extend their service, excluding Maltese or non-European soldiers, but including the royal garrison regiments:

Class I shall consist of all warrant and non-commissioned officers (including paid lance ranks); and of men who have completed 2 years' colour service, and who have, in the opinion of the officer commanding their unit, attained all necessary proficiency in the duties of their arm, including, in the case of infantry, such a standard in musketry as may be prescribed by regulation.

Class II shall consist of other soldiers who are allowed to extend their colour service, or who, having been enlisted for more than three years, are not placed in Class I; provided in either case that they have completed two years' colour service. Soldiers enlisted for three years with the colours, and, who have not extended their service, shall, if retained with the colours on account of war, be granted service pay during such retention.

Good-conduct pay, at the rates specified below, is granted in addition to ordinary pay, to privates of good character, after the following periods of service:—

A soldier who has been in the army for not more than three months may claim his discharge on payment of £10. After three months the sum is £18, and in this case the permission of the commanding officer is necessary. Discharges by purchase, however, are allowed to the fullest extent consistent with the requirements of the service, and at ordinary times a soldier finds no difficulty in purchasing his discharge.

Until 1871, commissions in the army were bought and sold. Commissioned officers nowadays are drawn from the military academies at Woolwich and Sandhurst; and admission to these schools is obtained only after stiff examinations have been passed. In the army, promotion is by seniority. The pay of a lieutenant is 5s 4d a day; of a captain, 11s 7d a day; of a major, 16s

a day; and of a lieutenant-colonel, 21s a day. There are some other allowances; but the pay and allowances of officers are not sufficient to maintain them in the style which, according to the social traditions of most regiments, officers are expected to keep up. Comparatively few of them are dependent entirely on their army pay.

What are described in England as the auxiliary forces comprise the militia, the volunteers, and the yeomanry cavalry. The militia is the oldest of these services. It is older than the standing army, and until the second or third decade of the nineteenth century all men not suffering from bodily infirmities due to age or other causes, and not specially exempted, were liable to be drawn by ballot for the militia. They could serve either personally or by substitute. Ballots were taken in counties until 1830 to make up the quota of militia each county was compelled by the law of 1760 to equip and maintain.

The militia is a local force, each regiment being raised in the division of the county in which the regiment has its headquarters. It is called out each year for a period of training which cannot exceed 56 days, but which seldom is longer than four weeks. The men enlist for six years, and when under training their pay, their discipline, and the general conditions of their services are very similar to the conditions in the regular army. Until as late as 1871 the militia regiments in each county were nominally under the command of the lord lieutenant of the county; and nowadays, although there are examinations for officers' commissions in the militia, in issuing these commissions the War Department gives preference to local landed gentlemen who are recommended or nominated by the lords lieutenants, the King's representatives in the counties. In connection with the militia there is a

reserve, consisting of men who have accepted extra bounties to hold themselves in readiness to serve abroad if need be in the regular army.

The yeomanry cavalry, which in 1900 was given the name of the Imperial Yeomanry, in its old form was a volunteer force, dating back to the Napoleonic wars. It was composed chiefly of tenant farmers. Many of the great landlords made it a condition in their farm leases that their tenantry should be of the yeomanry. For a long time the yeomanry was but lightly regarded as an auxiliary force. New life, however, was infused into it during the war. Its numbers were greatly increased; and under a royal warrant of the 17th April, 1901, the force was re-organized. It then became permanently the Imperial Yeomanry. The old brigade organization was abolished, and the force is now organized in regiments of four sections, with a regimental staff and a machine gun section. The regiments are under training in camp for sixteen days each year.

Members of volunteer corps are enrolled for three years, and are compelled to put in sufficient time at the drill hall, on the parade ground, and at the rifle ranges, and at the annual encampments, to make themselves efficient, and to pass the annual inspection before an officer from the War Department. Non-efficient volunteers can be sued in the courts for any loss falling upon their regiment in consequence of their failure to earn the Government grant.

Volunteer officers are drawn from the ranks of professional and commercial classes. There is no pay to the holder of a volunteer officer's commission. On the contrary, he incurs considerable expense in connection with his office, a fact which accounts for numerous vacancies in many of the volunteer corps.

THE BRITISH NAVY IN 1906-1907.

GREAT BRITAIN'S NAVAL POLICY.

It has long been the policy of British governments—Liberal as well as Conservative—that the strength of the Navy should be equal to that of the combined fleets of the next two largest naval powers. In recent years ship-building for the British Navy has been somewhat in excess of this requirement; and the feature of 1904 in British naval history—as was recorded in these pages of the *Canadian Almanac* for 1905—was the abandonment of the old two-powers policy.

There was no formal declaration of the abandonment of the old policy and the adoption of a more progressive one; but something equivalent to a declaration of this kind was made by Earl Selborne, First Lord of the Admiralty, in the House of Lords, on August 9th, 1904, in answer to a speech made by Lord Brassey, who had urged that as the two-power standard had been reached there should be some retrenchment as regards new construction.

Earl Selborne reminded the House that the offer made by Lord Goschen, when First Lord of the Admiralty, to bring about a gradual reduction by agreement with foreign nations had never been withdrawn; and, referring to the two-power standard, pointed out that in regard to cruisers and torpedo boats the standard had never had a numerical application. No other Admiralty in the world had to consider that the safe-guarding of its shores was the first duty of the navy, and that on it depended the safety of the food of the people, or had to safeguard a vast and prepondering ocean commerce. Hence they could not compare the naval expenditure of this country with the naval expenditure of any two or more powers. The recent great expenditure on naval works was due to the fact that the question had been neglected for nearly two generations; and it had been necessary during the past ten years that Great Britain should overtake arrears.

This aspect of the British Navy was briefly discussed in the House of Commons at a much more recent date than Lord Selborne's speech on August 9th, 1904. On August 1st, 1906, Lieutenant Bellairs, R.N., Liberal Member for Lynn Regis, asked the Prime Minister whether the two-power standard was the one on which the new naval programme for the ensuing two years was framed; and whether it meant, as had hitherto been the case, a margin of safety over the two strongest European powers in the number of efficient battleships and a large superiority in cruisers. "The new ship-building programme," said Sir Henry Campbell Bannerman, "was framed after careful consideration of the programmes of the various foreign Powers, and the recent changes made in them. No new standard has been adopted, and it is considered equal to the requirements of the nation."

NEW SHIPS THAT HAVE COME INTO SERVICE AND SHIPS IN BUILDING IN 1906-7.

Between the 1st April, 1905, and 31st March, 1906, the following ships were completed and became available for service:—3 battleships, *Dominion*, *Hindustan*, *New Zealand*; 8 armoured cruisers, *Antrim*, *Argyll*, *Carfaxton*, *Devonshire*, *Hampshire*, *Roxburgh*, *Black Prince*, *Duke of Edinburgh*; 1 second-class cruiser, *Encounter*; 8 scouts, *Adventure*, *Attentive*, *Forward*, *Foresight*, *Pathfinder*, *Patrol*, *Sentinel*, *Skirmisher*; 16 destroyers; 13 submarines; 1 floating coal depôt.

On 1st April, 1906, there were under construction:—6 battleships; 10 armoured cruisers; 12 destroyers (coastal); 5 destroyers (ocean-going); 1 destroyer (very fast ocean-going); 1 royal yacht; 15 submarines and a repair ship.

THE COST OF THE NAVY.

The gross expenditures on the Navy for 1906-7, according to the first estimates submitted to the House of Commons on the 19th of February, 1906, were £33,573,302, a decrease of £1,520,000, as compared with the expenditure in 1905-6. The number of seamen proposed and the estimated expenditures were as follows:—

THE PROGRAMMES OF THE OLD AND THE NEW GOVERNMENT.

These estimates, however, which were those of the Balfour Government, were not adhered to in their entirety. Why they were altered and what changes were made were explained by Mr. Edmund Robertson, Secretary to the Admiralty, when the shipbuilding vote was before the House of Commons in Committee, on the 27th of July, 1906.

"The shipbuilding programme," said Mr. Robertson, "was the new programme of the last Admiralty (of which Lord Cawdor was First Lord) and of the late Government. I will remind the Committee of what it consisted. It was proposed, according to the official papers, to begin building this year four classes of new ships. Four of them—much the most important part of the whole programme—were described as armoured vessels. I think there is no doubt of the fact it was intended these four armoured vessels should be vessels of the *Dreadnought* type. Secondly, there were five ocean-going destroyers; thirdly, twelve coastal destroyers; and, fourthly, twelve submarines. The Board

of Admiralty has given this new programme the most anxious consideration during the period of five months which has elapsed since we laid the main estimates as a whole before the Committee. It is the unanimous opinion of the Board of Admiralty that the new programme I have detailed should be reduced in the following particulars:— Instead of four *Dreadnoughts* we propose to lay down only three; instead of five ocean-going destroyers we propose to lay down only two. We leave the coasting destroyers at the number of twelve; but we propose to reduce the number of submarines from twelve to eight.

HOW THE NEW VARIES FROM THE OLD PROGRAMME.

"What," continued Mr. Robertson, "is the financial effect of what we propose? The original new programme, as I detailed it, only called for the trifling expenditure of £645,000 in this year's Estimates. I propose to state to the House the amount of liability involved in the original new programme. For this purpose I am going to take in the provision for armaments. The liability in the original new programme of the Cawdor Memorandum was on Vote 8 £8,132,000. To that we have to add the correlative expenditure on Vote 9 for armaments, amounting to £1,210,000. The total liability of the new programme from beginning to end would therefore be a sum of about £9,340,000, spread over a period of years during which the programme was being carried out. In the case of the *Dreadnoughts*, it would be spread over at least two years, and the heaviest liability would be on the second year. I now want to state what is the corresponding liability in the revised new programme, which, on behalf of the Admiralty, I submit for the consideration of the House. Our new programme involves a total liability of £5,900,000 on Vote 8 alone, and if we add armaments, £6,800,000, roughly speaking. In other words, the effect of the revision is to reduce the total commitment of the new programme from £9,300,000 to £6,800,000—a reduction of £2,500,000."

THE HAGUE CONFERENCE AND THE SHIPBUILDING VOTE FOR 1907-8.

"I have now," Mr. Robertson proceeded, "to make something of a departure from the usual course, and to lift the veil in some respects from the Estimates of next year. In regard to next year, 1907-8, and in reference to the four armoured vessels which it was originally intended to lay down in the year, I have to make the following intimation. We propose in the Estimates of 1907-8 to make provision for two armoured vessels only as new shipbuilding; but with the proviso to be stated in the Estimates that a further armoured vessel will be laid down if the Hague Conference proves abortive in

reducing armaments. Further, the amount to be taken for the new armoured ships to be laid down in 1907-8 is to be limited to a small sum—so small that it will prevent their commencement till late in the financial year. This will emphasize to the Hague Conference the good faith of the British Government, and its desire to bring about a reduction of armaments."

THE "DREADNOUGHT" AND THE "LORD NELSON."

An outstanding event in the history of the Navy in 1906-7 was the commissioning of the *Dreadnought*, the largest battleship afloat, at Portsmouth, on September 1st, 1906. The *Dreadnought* was built at the Government yard at Portsmouth, and was in commission within eleven months of the laying of the first keel plate. As regards both size and rapidity of construction the new ship establishes a world's record. The *Dreadnought* is as unlike any of the most recently-built ships in the Navy as her armour and armament surpass them; for while she carries ten 12-inch guns, no battleship in any fleet carries more than four. These colossal weapons fire a projectile weighing 860 pounds, and are mounted in five barbets, which are protected by 12-inch armour plates. Besides the 12-inch guns, there are twenty-seven 12-pounder quick firers for resisting torpedo attacks. The ship is built in water-tight compartments, without doors; and each compartment is complete in itself—that is to say there is no intercommunication between them, and they can be approached only by way of the armoured deck. Electric lifts are provided in order to facilitate rapidity of movement from one part of the ship to another. The ship is equipped with turbine engines, built for a speed of 21 knots an hour; and she has four propellers, two on each side. The length of the *Dreadnought* is 490 feet; beam, 82 feet; draught, 26 feet 6 inches; displacement, 17,900 tons; horse power, 23,000; coal capacity, 2,500 tons; cost, £1,797,497.

The *Lord Nelson*, another battleship which was launched on Tuesday, September 4th, at Palmer's Shipyard, Newcastle-on-Tyne, is 410 feet long; beam, 79 feet 6 inches; draught, 27 feet; displacement, 16,500 tons; horse power, 16,750; speed, 18 knots; coal capacity, 1,800 tons; primary guns, four 12-inch and ten 9.2 inch; cost, £1,616,083.

THE GREAT WAR FLEETS OF THE WORLD.

Among the Parliamentary papers issued at the time the Naval Estimates were awaiting the attention of the House of Commons was a return (May 23, 1906) giving a comparative statement of the numerical strength of the fleets of Great Britain, France, Russia, Germany, Italy, the United States, and Japan. It was as follows:—

In compiling the table no account was taken of vessels more than twenty years old, except such as have been

rebuilt or rearmed; of vessels authorized but not begun; of transports, colliers, repair ships, torpedo dépôt ships; of vessels of less than 1,000 tons, except torpedo boats; or of torpedo boats of less than 50 tons.

COLONIALS IN THE NAVY SERVICE.

It was reported to Parliament by Lord Tweedmouth (Memoranda by First Lord of the Admiralty, 20th February, 1906) that on the 1st of November, 1905, there were in the Colonial Royal Naval Reserves of Australasia 5 officers and 293 men; in that of Newfoundland, on the 31st of December, 1905, 560 men; and in that of Malta, on the 1st of January, 1906, 366 men—total for this reserve, 5 officers and 1,219 men.

THE NEW DISTRIBUTION OF THE BRITISH NAVAL FORCES.

One important incidental result of the war between Japan and Russia was a re-distribution of the British fleet. It was held by British naval experts that the war in the Far East clearly demonstrated the absolute necessity of concentration. Scattered ships, it is now held, merely court destruction at the hands of a relatively inferior but concentrated force. With the shifting of naval power it became necessary to shift the British forces, and this arrangement was accompanied by the withdrawal of inferior vessels, the strengthening of sea-going fleets, and immense improvements in the organization of the reserve, which has now become a really effective force. The new distribution, which became fully operative in 1905, is as follows:—

THE FLEET IN COMMISSION IN RESERVE.

The re-organization described in the preceding detail was effected at the end of 1904. On January 3rd, 1905, the new fleet in commission in reserve was constituted at the home ports—Devonport, Portsmouth and Chatham. It was the second stage of the naval re-organization scheme, promulgated after Sir John Fisher became Senior Naval Lord of the Admiralty. To-day, as since January 3rd, 1905, the British Navy consists of two divisions, the fleet in commission at sea, and the fleet in commission in reserve. The importance of the new fleet is that it is in commission. The ships are partially manned and are kept in working order with stores on board, ready to go to sea on short notice, whereas the old fleet reserve ships were out of commission and lay empty and inactive in dock and basin.

THE EMERGENCY SQUADRON AND SPECIAL RESERVE.

Besides this fleet in reserve in commission, there is an emergency squadron and a special reserve. Of the emergency squadron, there are six battleships and six cruisers—two of each type of warship at the home ports, Devonport, Portsmouth, and Chatham, which can be at once manned without mobilization, the crews being formed from the floating surplus personnel at each port. The whole squadron can be ready for service at very short notice.

COLONIAL CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE NAVY.

India contributes £103,400 a year towards the maintenance of His Majesty's ships in Indian waters. The Commonwealth of Australia pays £200,000; New Zealand, £40,000; Cape Colony, £50,000; and Natal, £35,000. No contribution is made to the Fleet by the Dominion of Canada.

Newfoundland, as her contribution to the navy, maintains a branch of the Royal Naval Reserve, which entails upon her an expenditure of £3,000 a year. The total contribution of India and the Colonies to British naval expenditure is £431,400.

Under agreements with the great shipping companies, sixty-two vessels are now on the Royal Naval Reserve and Merchant Cruisers' List. Thirty-one of these ships receive subsidies from the Government, and are authorised to fly the Blue Ensign. The other thirty-one are held at the disposal of the Admiralty without subventions.

The cost of the Fleet—maintenance and new construction—now averages 17s. 6d. per head of the population of the British Isles, as compared with 5s. 10d. per head in 1870.

SERVICE IN THE NAVY.

Like the British Army the Navy is manned by volunteers, and there is no compulsory service in connection with it. A large proportion of the seamen enter the service as boys. They are accepted for training-ships up to the age of eighteen, and when a boy reaches the age of eighteen his term of actual service in the Navy begins, and must last for at least twelve years. To be accepted for a training-ship, a boy must be five feet and a half in height, with a chest measurement of thirty and a half inches. The height measurement is made without shoes. If accepted when between fifteen and a half and sixteen a boy must be five feet and one and a half inches in height, and thirty-one inches round the chest. Between sixteen and sixteen and a half a boy must be five feet two and a half inches in height, and thirty-one and a half inches round the chest.

The pay of seamen ranges from one shilling and three pence a day for ordinary seamen, to nine shillings a day for chief gunners and boatswains. Men who have put in nine years' service in the Navy can pass into the Coast Guard Service. Those who stay in the Navy for a period of twenty-two years become entitled to pensions. The amount of pension is from eighteen pounds a year, upwards, according to the rating on retiring from the ranks. The average pension for men of all ranks is £31 a year.

The Naval Reserve, as the result of changes which were made in 1901-2, is now of two branches, the Royal Naval Reserve and the Royal Fleet Reserve. The Naval Reserve is composed of men ordinarily in the merchant service, who put in a certain number of days training each year on board coast-guard ships, and who are liable to be called upon for service afloat in the event of war. The Fleet Reserve consists of men who have served twenty-two years in the Royal Navy and earned pensions, and of men who have served twelve years in the navy and have then transferred themselves to the Fleet Reserve.

GRAVING DOCKS IN CANADA.—There are four graving docks in Canada, three belonging to the Federal Government and one owned by a company. For 20 years from the completion the company has subsidies from the Imperial and Canadian Governments and from the city of Halifax, where it is located, amounting in all to about \$30,000 (£6,180), of which the Canadian Government pays \$10,000 a year. The following statement shows the dimensions of these graving docks:—

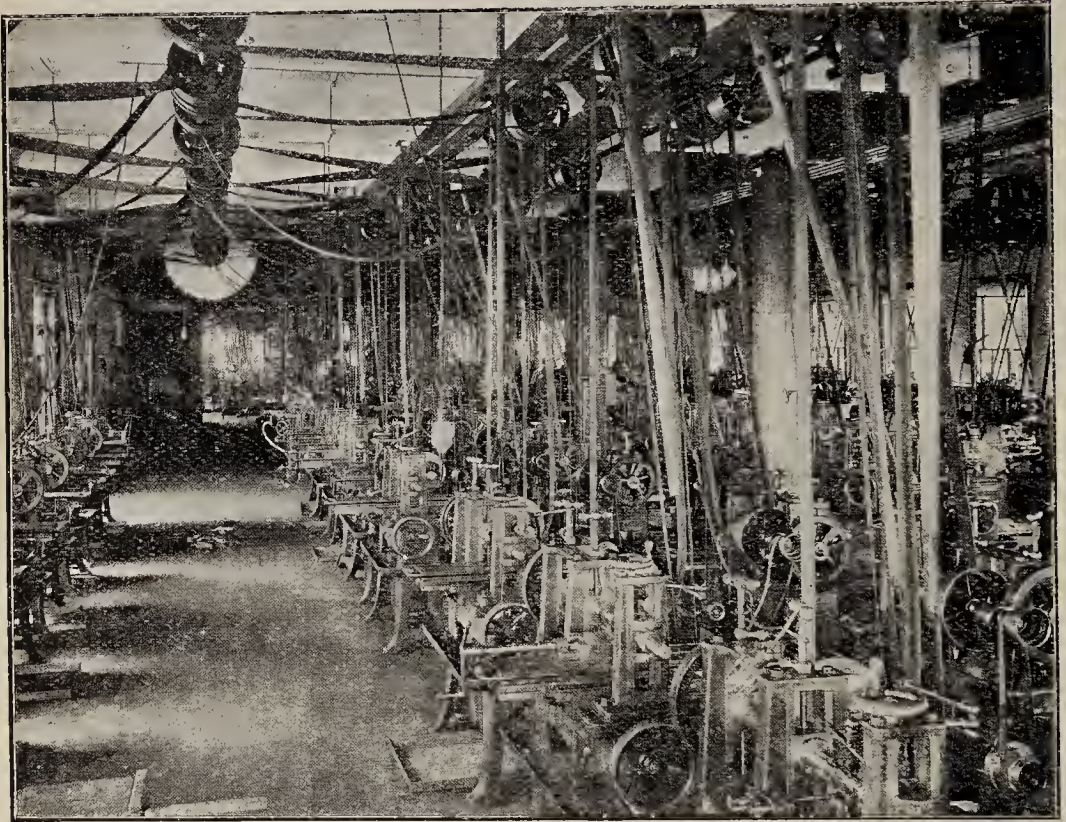

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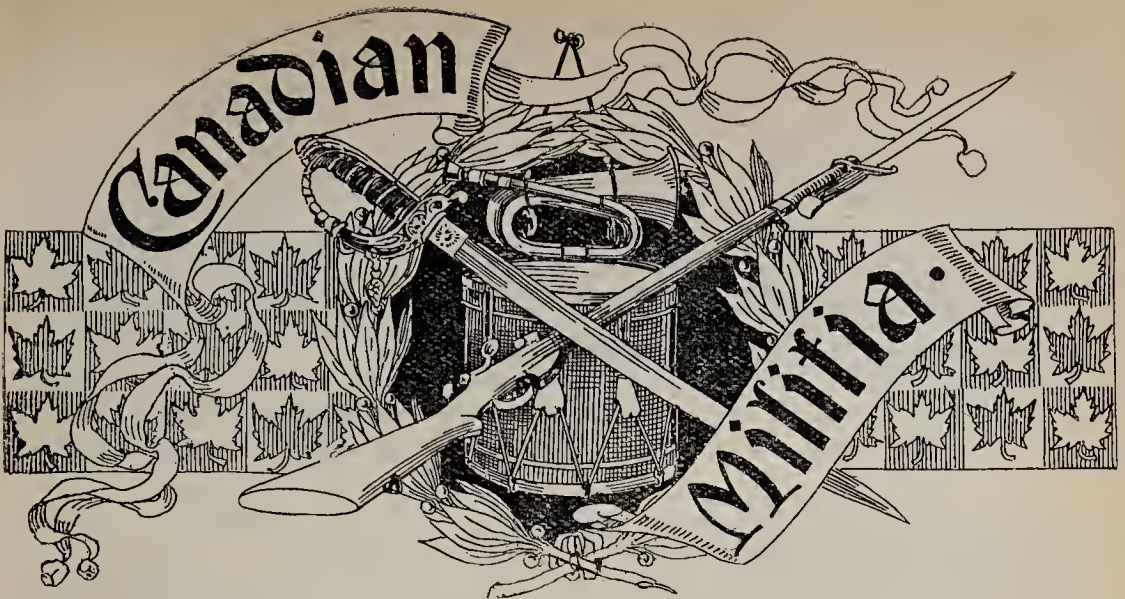

RIFLE ASSOCIATIONS.

1. Their formation and government are laid down by regulations promulgated in Militia General Orders 88, dated June 1, 1903.
2. Are of two following classes :—
 - (a) *Military*—consists of persons in the Active Militia, and are managed by officers of the respective units.
 - (b) *Civilian*—consists of persons in the Reserve Militia, who, while members of any such club or association, are enrolled in such reserve. Are managed under such regulations as may from time to time be issued.
3. Rifle Associations organized under these regulations come under the control of the Department of Militia and Defence.
4. To form an association in a locality requires not less than forty men residing therein, and aged over sixteen years. They must be members of the Active Militia (for Military Associations); or subscribe to the oath of allegiance to His Majesty (for Civilian Associations).
5. A captain is appointed to every Civilian Association, who, with a committee of two members, manage the affairs of the association.
6. The annual subscription to be not less than \$1 each member.
7. A member may resign on three months' notice to the captain. The former must return all government property in his possession before the resignation can be accepted.
8. An association may be disbanded for grave irregularities or mismanagement.
9. A member may be expelled by a two-third vote of the association to which he belongs.
10. No man is allowed to belong to more than one association.
11. The District Officer Commanding is charged with the organization, etc., after the necessary papers have been forwarded by him, are recommended at head-

quarters and approved by the Minister of Militia and Defence.

12. An association maintaining a membership of less than forty must disband.

13. In the event of a national emergency, any person who is or has been duly enrolled in any Rifle Association in Canada shall be deemed to be already enrolled in the Reserve Militia of the Dominion.

14. *Rifle*.—The arm used is the '303 rifle, either of Government issue or of *bona fide* Government pattern, and bearing the Government viewer's mark.

15. Associations may be supplied with rifles for the use of members on the captain's requisition and on his furnishing a bond signed by three responsible members, for the safety, preservation, and safe return when required to do so, of all rifles issued to them. (*Note*.—Each rifle is valued at \$25).

16. Under the conditions of the bond, ten rifles may be issued to each association of forty members, and five additional rifles for every twenty additional members, until the stock of rifles available for this purpose be exhausted.

17. *Ammunition*.—200 rounds a year to each member of a Military Association; 100 rounds to each member of a Civilian Association; free issue.

Regulations, published in pamphlet form, give full details and information as to organizing, etc., rifle associations; officers' duties, returns, also standard rules, instructions as to targets and marking, care of arms, rifle ranges, etc. (issued by Dept. of Militia and Defence).

When demanding ammunition on repayment, the amount should be deposited in a Canadian chartered bank, to the credit of the Receiver General, and the Deposit Receipt annexed to the requisition.

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MILITIA AND DEFENCE OF CANADA

Previous to the confederation of the Provinces, the defence of this country was entirely in the hands of the Imperial Government, who for that purpose maintained troops in each Province, supported by various local volunteer militia corps. This volunteer militia had, when called upon, rendered most efficient service in times of trouble.

After Confederation the British Government gradually withdrew all the Imperial troops from this country, and at present none remain.

By the British North America Act the command in chief of all naval and military forces of and in Canada was vested in the Sovereign, and the control of the same was placed in the hands of the Dominion Parliament. A Department of Militia and Defence was at the same time established, the first Minister being Sir George E. Cartier, and the first Militia Act was passed in 1868, 31 Vic., chap. 40. The Act was subsequently amended in various ways, especially in 1904, when a new Militia Act was passed (ch. 23, 4 Ed. VII.). By it the Militia of Canada is declared to consist of all the male inhabitants of Canada of the age of 18 years or upwards and under 60, not exempted or disqualified by law, this population being divided into four classes, as follows:

The first class comprises those aged 18 or upwards and under 30, being unmarried or widowers without children.

The second class comprises those between the ages of 30 and 45, being unmarried or widowers without children.

The third class comprises those between 18 and 45, being married, or widowers with children.

The fourth class comprises those between 45 and 60.

The following persons are exempt from enrolment and active service at any time: Members of the King's Privy Council for Canada, Judges, Members of the Executive Councils of Provinces, Deputy Ministers of the Federal and Provincial Governments, clergymen and ministers of all religious denominations, professors in colleges and teachers in religious orders, the wardens and officials of all penitentiaries and lunatic asylums, persons physically disabled, and any person being the only son of a widow and her only support. Certain other persons are exempt from service except in case of war.

The Active Militia, or any portion thereof, may be ordered to drill or train for a period of not more than 30 days in each year.

The Militia is divided into Active and Reserve Forces. The Active force is composed of men raised either by voluntary enlistment or by ballot, and the Reserve force consists, practically, of the whole of the efficient men not serving in the Active Militia of the time being.

The period of service, for the Active Militia, is three years; for the Reserve Militia, such as is prescribed.

THE MILITIA PENSION ACT, 1901.

(Synopsis.)

For permanent staff and militia; non-commissioned officers and men; widows and children of officers.

Not applicable to persons who were retired prior to passage of Act.

Officers.

- (a) Compulsory retirement after 20 years' service,—pension for life.
- (b) Voluntary retirement after 25 years' service,—pension for life.
- (c) Constrained retirement (due to body or mind infirmity) before retirement at which a pension might be granted,—a gratuity based on years' service.
- (d) Retirement to promote efficiency or economy,—same gratuity as would be granted in consequence of body or mind infirmity.

Non-Commissioned Officers and Men.

- (a) Compulsory retirement, if required, after 20 years' service,—pension for life.
- (b) Voluntary retirement, after 20 years' service,—pension for life.
- (c) Constrained retirement (due to body or mind infirmity), after not less than 15 years' service,—pension for life.

Rate of Deduction, Etc.

Five per cent. a year on salary, for a period not exceeding 35 years; and no addition to pension after said period.

Widows and Children of Officers.

Compassionate allowances are granted thereto, based on officer's rank and salary.

All of these pensions and allowances are granted upon certain other conditions, which are fully defined in "The Militia Pension Act, 1901."

Note.—An act somewhat similar to this one was passed in 1902, granting pensions to the R.N.W.M. Police Force,

CANADIAN TEAMS TO WIMBLEDON AND BISLEY AND OFFICERS THEREOF FROM 1872 TO 1906.

Canada has always been represented by a team of its best shots at the annual Prize Meeting of the National Rifle Association of England. The first matches were held in 1872, at Wimbledon, but since 1890 they take place at Bisley. The most coveted of all prizes, the Queen's—now the King's prize (£250), was won twice by a Canadian: Pte. T. H. Hayhurst, 13th Regiment, Hamilton, Ont., in 1895, and Pte. J. S. Perry, 6th Regiment, D. C. O. R., Vancouver, B.C., in 1904. Many other important prizes have also been captured by our countrymen. The Kolopore Cup, contested for by the Mother Country and the Colonies was won eight times by the Canadians: in 1872, '75, '81, '84, '89, '96, 1905, and 1906. Eight men compose the team.

Canada sends to Bisley twenty representatives to take part in the various matches open to them, and these men are selected by competition held at Ottawa under the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association.

THE CANADIAN MILITARY RIFLE LEAGUE.

(HEADQUARTERS, OTTAWA, ONT.)

In 1893 the Canadian Rifle League was formed, with Headquarters at Toronto, the moving spirit and chief organizer being Lieut. W. R. Pringle, of the 10th Regiment, Royal Grenadiers. Rifle associations from all over the Dominion affiliated, and a series of simultaneous matches on given dates was inaugurated. In 1895, the Honorable the Minister of Militia and Defence granted free ammunition to the League teams, and with one exception this has been the rule since.

Four matches are held annually over King's ranges (200, 500 and 600 yards), and prizes given to the leading teams. The Lee-Enfield rifle is used. Marksmen's certificates, signed by the Minister of Militia and Defence, and the Chief of the General Staff, are issued as follows:—

For an average of 94 points out of a possible 105, a first-class special certificate; for 90 points, a first-class certificate; for 80 points, a second-class certificate.

The competitions are divided into three series, as follows:—

The first (military) for teams of city corps of the Active Militia; the second (military for units other than city corps); the third, or civilian series, for teams of Civilian Rifle Associations. The entrance fee per team is \$10. Fees for additional teams from the same organization, \$5 each. Organizations bringing five new men to the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association Meeting get free entry for one team to the C.M.R. League competitions for the following year.

By Militia Order of June 10, 1903, the C.M.R. League was placed under the supervision of the Militia Department, Ottawa.

The annual meeting of the League takes place at Ottawa during the D. R. Association competitions.

THE ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE

THERE are few national institutions of more value and interest to the country than the Royal Military College at Kingston. At the same time its object and the work it is accomplishing are not sufficiently understood by the general public.

The College is a Government institution, designed primarily for the purpose of giving the highest technical instructions in all branches of military science to cadets and officers of Canadian Militia. In fact, it is intended to take the place in Canada of the English Woolwich and Sandhurst and the American West Point.

The Commandant and military instructors are all officers on the active list of the Imperial army, lent for the purpose, and, in addition, there is a complete staff of professors for the civil subjects which form such a large proportion of the College course.

Whilst the College is organized on a strictly military basis, the cadets receive in addition to their military studies a thoroughly practical, scientific and sound training in all subjects that are essential to a high and general modern education.

The course in mathematics is very complete, and a thorough grounding is given in the subjects of Civil Engineering, Civil and Hydrographic Surveying, Physics, Chemistry, French and English.

The object of the College course is thus to give the cadets a training which shall thoroughly equip them for either a military or civil career.

The strict discipline maintained at the College is one of the most valuable features of the system. As a result of it young men acquire habits of obedience and self-control, and consequently of self-reliance and command, as well as experience in controlling and handling their fellows.

In addition, the constant practice of gymnastics, drills and outdoor exercises of all kinds, ensures good health and fine physical condition.

An experienced medical officer is in attendance at the College daily.

Seven commissions in the Imperial regular army are annually awarded as prizes to the cadets.

The length of course is three years, in three terms of 9½ months' residence each.

The total cost of the three years' course, including board, uniforms, instructional material, and all extras, is from \$750 to \$800.

The annual competitive examination for admission to the College will take place at the headquarters of the several military districts in which candidates reside, in May of each year.

Letter Rates, &c.

Canada.—Letters posted in Canada, addressed to any place within the Dominion, 2 cents per oz. If unpaid, such letters cannot be forwarded, but will be sent to the Dead Letter Office. If partially prepaid, the letter will be forwarded to its destination and double the deficiency charged on delivery. Letters mailed at any office for delivery at or from the same office, provided that the office is not one at which free delivery by letter carriers is established, are charged 1 cent per oz., and must be at least partially prepaid; otherwise they are sent to the Dead Letter Office. Letters of this nature mailed at and for delivery from an office at which there is a free delivery by letter carriers are liable to 2 cents per ounce. All postage must be prepaid by postage stamps.

Post Cards.—From any place in Canada to any place in Canada or to the United States or Mexico, 1 cent each. British and Foreign, 2 cents each.

Private Post Cards.—The face of a Private Post Card may be used for advertisements, illustrations, etc., provided that a clear space of at least $\frac{1}{4}$ inch is left along each of the four sides of the postage stamp, and a clear space $3\frac{1}{4}$ inches long and $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches wide reserved for the address at the lower right hand corner of the card. Private Post Cards must not exceed a size of 6 inches in length by $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches in width. Cards exceeding these limits are treated as insufficiently paid letters. The words "Private Post Card" must be written or printed on the face of private post cards addressed to places outside of Canada.

Pictorial Private Post Cards which have communications on address side.—Cards which have the back covered by a picture, and one-half of the front to the left of the address space reserved for written communications, are admitted as post cards when addressed to places in Canada, the United States, Mexico, Great Britain, France, Switzerland, Italy, Austria, Montenegro, Persia, Roumania, Belgium, Congo Free State, Denmark, Danish West Indies, Egypt, Luxembourg, Norway, Sweden, Netherlands, Hungary, Crete, Hayti, Germany, Portugal, Bulgaria, Transvaal, Orange River Colony, Australia, New Zealand, Holland, Dutch East Indies, Panama, Siam, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Japan, Paraguay, and Tunis. The rate for Canada, Mexico and the United States, one cent, and for the other countries two cents. A few of the countries mentioned above do not yet forward the cards described at post card rate, although they have agreed to accept and deliver such cards coming from other countries prepaid at that rate.

United Kingdom, and the following British Possessions and Protectorates: Aden, Ascension, Australia, Bahama Islands, Barbados, Bermuda, British Central Africa, British East Africa, British Guiana, British Honduras, British India, British North Borneo Company's Territory (including Labuan), Cape Colony, Cayman Islands, Ceylon, China (British Postal Agencies in), viz., Amoy, Canton, Chefoo, Foochow, Hankow, Hoihow, Liu-Kung-Tau (Wei-Hai-Wei), Ningpo, Shanghai and Swatow; Cyprus, Fanning Island, Falkland Islands, Fiji, Gambia, Gibraltar, Gold Coast Colony, Hong Kong, Jamaica, Johore, Lagos, Leeward Islands, Malay States, Malta, Mauritius, Natal, Newfoundland, New Zealand, Nigeria (Northern), Nigeria (Southern), Orange River Colony, Sarawak, Seychelles, Sierra Leone, Somaliland Protectorate, Straits Settlements, St. Helena, Tobago, Transvaal Colony, Trinidad, Turks Islands, Uganda, Windward Islands, Zanzibar, and Egypt, including the Soudan (after 1st January, 1907).—Postage on Letters, 2 cts. per half oz.

Foreign Countries, except United States and Mexico.—Postage on Letters, 5 cents per half oz. If sent unpaid, double postage will be charged.

United States and Mexico.—The rate on letters to the United States and Mexico is the same as in Canada, and at least one rate (2 cents) must be prepaid.

It is very important to bear in mind that the postage upon letters for the United Kingdom and all Foreign Countries, except United States and Mexico, is calculated by the *half ounce* and *double* the deficient postage is charged on all unpaid or short-paid letters.

Express or Special Delivery Letters.—Arrangements have been made for the delivery by special messenger daily, except Sunday, of letters bearing, in addition to the usual prepayment of two cents an ounce, a "Special Delivery" stamp addressed to the following cities in Canada: In Ontario—Toronto, Hamilton, London, Brantford, Kingston and Ottawa; in Quebec—Montreal and Quebec; in New Brunswick—St. John and Fredericton; in Nova Scotia—Halifax; in Manitoba—Winnipeg; in British Columbia—Victoria and Vancouver. The "Special Delivery" stamp required for this purpose is of the value of ten cents, and may be obtained at any post office.

Registration of Letters.

Persons posting letters containing value should be careful to require them to be Registered, and to obtain from the Postmaster a certificate of receipt for Registration.

The charge for Registration in addition to the Postage is, on all classes of matter, five cents.

Both the Postage charge and Registration fee should, in all cases, be prepaid by stamp.

Registration is not an absolute guarantee against the miscarriage or loss of a letter; but a Registered Letter can be traced where an Unregistered Letter can not, and the posting and delivery or non-delivery can be proven.

Insurance of Registered Letters.

Registered letters posted at and addressed to any P.O. within the Dominion of Canada may be insured against loss for amounts not exceeding \$25. The insurance fee as well as the ordinary postage and the registration fee must be prepaid in postage stamps on all insured registered letters. The insurance fees and the corresponding limits of compensation are as follows:—

Book Post, &c.

A Book Packet may contain any number of separate books. Limit of weight for domestic post, 5 lbs. (unless consisting of a single book, in which case a weight of 10 lbs. is allowed); for foreign post, 4 lbs. Limit of size, domestic: 30 inches in length by 1 foot in width or depth; foreign: two feet in length, by one foot in width or depth.

Book packets must be open at *both ends or both sides*, and must not contain any letter or sealed inclosure.

Books for the use of the blind are free of Canada postage, and correspondence passing between blind persons in raised characters is chargeable at the rate of 1 cent per 2 ozs.

The rate on Book Packets for delivery in Canada, Great Britain, the United States and all Postal Union Countries, is 1 cent per 2 ozs.

Miscellaneous Matter.

Miscellaneous matter, described as under, may pass between places in the Dominion of Canada upon prepayment of the rates indicated below. The regulations do not admit of the transmission by mail to the United Kingdom (or other countries beyond the sea) of miscellaneous matter as such; but a great part of the matter referred to under that head may be forwarded to the United Kingdom and other countries by Book Post:—

Matter (other than newspapers and periodicals), wholly in print without reference to process, such as circulars, catalogues, calendars, hand-bills, books, pamphlets, printed forms, maps, prints, drawings, plans (without written specifications) engravings, lithographs, photographs (when not on glass or in cases containing glass) official or private post cards in quantities, sheet music (whether printed or written) instruction books in music, visiting cards, the manuscript of books or newspapers (whether hand-written or type-written) indented or perforated sheets of paper containing characters which can be read by the blind, botanical entomological and mineralogical specimens and the following partly-written and partly-printed matter:—militia and school returns, customs manifests, voters' lists, school or college examination papers, printers' proof sheets with corrections, exhibition entry tickets, municipal assessment rolls, Dominion and Provincial Government returns on official blanks, and all Dominion and Provincial Government documents, statute labor returns and municipal returns in general, etc., on which the rate of postage is 1 cent for each 2 ozs. or fraction thereof. To come within this class the material printed upon must be either paper, cardboard or parchment.

The following articles are subject to the rate of 2 cents for the first 4 ozs. or fraction thereof, and one cent for each additional 4 ozs.:—Seeds, cuttings (but not cut flowers), roots, bedding plants, scions or grafts.

Writing paper specially prepared for the use of the blind transmitted from a recognized Institution for the Blind in Canada to blind persons for their own use is allowed to pass at the rate of 1 cent for each 4 ozs. or fraction thereof; but before any Institution can post such paper at the above rate the Post Office Department at Ottawa must be satisfied as to its claim to be considered an Institution for the Blind.

No letter or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter must be sent or inclosed in any such package or thing mentioned, and the same must be sent in covers open at the ends or sides, or otherwise so put up as to admit of the contents being, if necessary, easily withdrawn for examination by the officers of the Post Office to ensure compliance with this provision (if enclosed in sealed envelopes notched at the ends or sides, or with the corners cut off, letter rate of postage will be charged).

No packet of miscellaneous matter can be transmitted by mail if it exceeds 5 lbs. in weight, 30 inches in length or 12 inches in width or depth, nor may the combined length and girth of any packet exceed 6 feet.

Legal and commercial papers generally are liable to *letter rate* of postage when posted for delivery within the Dominion of Canada.

Printed or written *requests for return* are recognized on 3rd and 4th class matter, addressed to places within the Dominion, and same will be *returned direct to the sender*, subject to the payment by the sender, on delivery to him through the Post Office, of the full amount of postage to which the article was in the first place liable, together with any charges rated thereon on account of any deficiency in the original prepayment.

Newspapers and Periodicals.

The general postage rate on newspapers and periodicals *published in Canada* not less frequently than once a month, and addressed to regular subscribers in Canada, the United States, Mexico, the United Kingdom, the Bahamas, Barbados, Bermuda, British Guiana, British Honduras, British North Borneo, Ceylon, Cyprus, Falkland Islands, Figi, Gambia, Gibraltar, Hong Kong, Jamaica, Leeward Islands, Malta, Mauritius, New Zealand, Northern Nigeria, Sarawak, Seychelles, Sierra Leone, Southern Nigeria, Transvaal, Trinidad and Tobago, Turk's Islands, Zanzibar, and Newfoundland, and to newsdealers in Canada, is fixed by law at $\frac{1}{2}$ cent per pound, provided the distance in Canada which any such newspapers or

periodicals are required to be transmitted does not exceed 300 miles from the place of publication. If the distance in Canada exceeds 300 miles from the place of publication the postage rate is $\frac{1}{2}$ cent per pound. The following exception, however, is to be noted: Newspapers and periodicals published not *more* frequently than once a week and not *less* frequently than once a month, are entitled to pass free to regular subscribers and newsdealers in Canada within a circular area of 40 miles in diameter, having as centre either the place of publication or any established Post Office not more than 20 miles distant therefrom, the choice of a centre within these limits resting with the publisher; and such newspapers and periodicals are to be put up into packages and delivered into the Post Office, under such regulations as the Postmaster-General may from time to time make.

On all newspapers and periodicals posted in Canada, for delivery in the Dominion, or in the United Kingdom, or the British Possessions mentioned above, or the United States or Mexico, other than those addressed to regular subscribers or news agents, from office of publication, the rate is *one cent per 4 ozs.*, to be invariably prepaid by Postage Stamp.

Newspapers and periodicals weighing less than 1 oz. each may be posted singly, if prepaid by Postage Stamp $\frac{1}{2}$ cent each.

The postage on *bona fide* specimen newspapers, and on papers and periodicals published less frequently than once a month, is 1 cent per lb.

British and foreign publications may be posted by newsdealers in Canada to subscribers in Canada at the rate of 1 cent per lb. They cannot however be posted at that rate for local delivery at places where there is a free letter carrier service.

Transient Newspapers.

Transient newspapers and periodicals include all newspapers and periodicals posted in Canada, *other than Canadian newspapers sent from the office of publication, and British and foreign newspapers posted by news agents for regular subscribers* in Canada. When addressed to any place within the Dominion, the United Kingdom, Bahamas, Barbados, Bermuda, British Guiana, British Honduras, British North Borneo; Ceylon, Cyprus, Falkland Islands, Figi, Gambia, Gibraltar, Hong Kong, Jamaica, Leeward Islands, Malta, Mauritius, New Zealand, Newfoundland, Northern Nigeria, Sarawak, Seychelles, Sierra Leone, Southern Nigeria, Transvaal, Trinidad and Tobago, Turk's Islands, Zanzibar, or the United States or Mexico, they must be prepaid the following rates by Postage Stamp:—

If posted singly and weighing not more than 1 oz., half a cent each.

If weighing over 1 oz., one cent per four oz. or fraction of four oz.

Patterns and Samples within the Dominion.

Patterns and Samples of Merchandise and Goods for sale, not having saleable value and not exceeding 3 lbs. in weight, except samples of tea, which must not exceed 8 oz. in weight, may be posted in Canada, to be forwarded to any place within the Dominion, on prepayment by Postage Stamp of a rate of 1 cent for each 2 ozs. or fraction thereof under the following regulations:

If insufficiently prepaid the packet will be forwarded charged with double the deficient postage, provided at least 1 cent is prepaid.

Packages of Samples and Patterns, addressed to any place in Canada, may be registered by affixing thereto stamps to the value of 5 cents in addition to the postage rate, and provided such packet be handed into the Post Office for registration.

Patterns or samples must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, &c., which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen, or such like material, fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened.

The packet may bear on the *outside* the address of the sender, in addition to the address of the person for whom it may be intended; and also a trade mark or number, and the price of the sample enclosed; *inside*, there must be no enclosure but the samples or patterns themselves. The particulars, however, of the trade

marks, numbers, and prices may be marked on the articles themselves instead of on the outside of the packet, at the option of the sender.

Articles of saleable value even when intended to serve as samples are not admissible at sample rate.

Goods sent for sale or in execution of an order, however small the quantity may be, or any article sent by one private individual to another, which are not actually trade patterns or samples, are not admissible.

Liquids, oils, etc., may be sent by mail in the Dominion if put up carefully in strict accordance with the directions given in the Postal Guide and ascertainable at any post office.

United Kingdom, United States and Foreign Countries.

Patterns and samples of Merchandise, when addressed to places in the United Kingdom, must not exceed 5 lbs. in weight; to the United States and other foreign countries, 12 oz.; and must be prepaid by postage stamp at the following rates:—1 cent per 2 oz. or fraction of 2 oz., with a minimum prepayment of 2 cents covering a weight of 4 oz.

Samples of liquids, oils, glass, etc., are admitted as samples provided they are put up in strict accordance with the directions given in the Postal Guide.

Useful Hints.

Register all valuable letters. Transmit money by Postal Notes or Money Orders. Make complaints and inquiries in writing, and address the Postmaster-General at Ottawa. Preserve, and request correspondents to preserve, envelopes of missent or delayed letters. Send to the Postmaster-General envelopes of letters about which you seek information or make complaint. In addressing letters add the name of the *County* and *Province* in which the office addressed is located. Place stamp on the right-hand upper corner of the address side. Put your own name and full address in or on letter, to insure return if it cannot be delivered. In affixing postage stamps moisten the envelope, *not the stamp*. When stamps are moistened the gum is apt to be removed.

Parcel Post with the United Kingdom, Newfoundland and other British Colonies and Foreign Countries.

Closed parcels may be exchanged with the United Kingdom, Newfoundland and most foreign countries and British colonies under the following Regulations:—

1. Every Parcel must be fully prepaid by postage stamps.

2. The dimensions of a Parcel addressed to the United Kingdom must not as a general rule exceed 30 inches in length or 1 foot in width or depth, nor must the combined length and girth of any parcel exceed 6 feet, a length of 3 feet 6 inches is allowed, however, in the case of parcels containing articles such as golf sticks, umbrellas, etc. The dimensions of a Parcel addressed to any country other than the United Kingdom must not exceed 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth.

3. A Parcel must not contain a letter or any writing in the form of a letter, or any explosive, combustible, or dangerous articles.

4. All Parcels must be securely and substantially packed and closed.

5. Oils, liquids, etc., can only be forwarded if put up with the same security required in connection with their transmission as samples in the ordinary mails. Fragile articles should be packed with special care.

6. Each Parcel must be plainly directed, and such direction must include the name and full address of the person for whom the parcel is intended.

7. For each Parcel the sender must fill up a Customs Declaration. On this form the sender will supply an accurate statement of the contents and value of the Parcel; also the address thereof, with signature and place of abode of the sender. The Customs Declaration must be securely affixed by mucilage or paste to the parcel to which it relates.

Parcels from the United Kingdom or any other place beyond the Dominion will be liable to Canadian Custom duties, and under existing regulations must be examined for the purpose by an Officer of the Customs *in the presence of the persons addressed*.

Rates and limits of weight vary. See Postal Guide, or enquire at Post Office.

Parcels must be handed to the Postmaster; in no case should they be dropped into a letter box or other receptacle for mail matter.

Fourth Class Matter.

Postage rate 1 cent per ounce or fraction thereof, to be prepaid by postage stamp. Miscellaneous articles of merchandise, including seeds, bulbs, etc., to United States, and generally all matter permitted to pass by mail in Canada, which is not of the nature of a letter, and therefore subject to letter rate of postage, nor entitled to pass as 3rd class matter, may pass as 4th class when addressed to any destination within the Dominion or the United States. Fourth class matter must be so packed or put up as to be open to examination of contents and must not exceed 5 lbs. in weight. The limit of size is 30 inches in length by 1 foot in width or depth, but the combined length and girth of any packet must in no case exceed 6 feet. When passing between Canada and the United States it will be subject to Customs regulations if liable to duty. The registration charge on 4th class matter is 5 cents in addition to postage.

A packet of 4th class matter may contain invoices and accounts, provided they relate exclusively to the contents of such packet; it is also permitted to enclose a card or slip of paper giving in a brief manner necessary directions for the identification or treatment of the article or articles contained in the packet. Care must be taken not to abuse this privilege by converting such notes or marks, designed solely for the facilitation of business between the sender and the addressee, into what might properly be called correspondence. A packet of 4th class matter containing a letter or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter in the ordinary sense will become liable to letter postage, and the sender will incur the penalty provided by law.

When several separate articles are enclosed in a packet of 4th class matter, there is no objection to each bearing a distinguishing number, so as to enable the sender to give directions by letter (sent of course separately and duly prepaid) respecting the several articles which the packet contains.

Prohibited Articles.

All explosive, dangerous or destructive substances, glass bottles or glass in any form liable to break, and all matter subject to speedy decay, all obscene or immoral books, publications, pictures, etc., libellous post cards and letters the covers of which bear words of an offensive character, and letters and circulars relating to illegal lotteries or other fraudulent schemes.

Foreign Post—Commercial Papers.

“Commercial Papers” are understood to comprise all papers or documents written or drawn wholly or partly by hand (except letters or communications of the nature of letters or other papers or documents having the character of an actual and personal correspondence), documents of legal procedure, deeds drawn up by public functionaries, copies of or extracts from deeds under private seal and (whether written or printed on stamped or unstamped paper) way bills, bills of lading, invoices and other documents of a mercantile character, documents of insurance and other public companies, all kinds of manuscript music, the manuscript of books and other literary works. The rate is 1 cent per 2 ozs., but each packet must have a minimum prepayment of 5 cents; this prepayment will cover a weight of 10 ozs. No packet must exceed 2 feet in length or 1 foot in width or depth, unless in the form of a roll, when a length of 30 inches is allowed, provided the diameter does not exceed 4 inches. The weight must not exceed 4 lbs.

POST OFFICE MONEY ORDERS.

In sending money by mail it is always best to transmit by Money Order if possible.

No single Money Order can be issued for more than \$100; but as many of \$100 each may be given as the remitter requires.

The Order of Baronets, the lowest hereditary rank, was instituted in 1611; a Baronet is designated "Sir John Smith, Baronet"—usually written Bart. Taking precedence of Baronets are members of The Most Honourable Privy Council, who are addressed "Right Honourable."

The Order of the Bath, instituted in 1399, and revived in 1725, is divided into three classes—Knights Grand Cross, G.C.B.; Knights Commanders, K.C.B.; and Companions, C.B.

The Order of St. Michael and St. George, instituted in 1818, has also three classes—G.C.M.G., K.C.M.G., and C.M.G.

The Royal Victorian Order, instituted in 1896, has five classes—G.C.V.O., K.C.V.O., C.V.O. Members 4th and 5th classes—M.V.O. Col. S. B. Steele, C.B., M.V.O., is a member of the 4th class.

In all Orders of Knighthood the Knights Grand Cross and the Knights Commanders have the prefix "Sir" with the initials of their class following the name. Companions and Members bear no title, but have the letters C.B., C.M.G., C.V.O., M.V.O., as the case may be, attached to their names.

Knights Bachelors are gentlemen who have received the honour of Knighthood, and are entitled to the prefix "Sir" and to "Knt." after name.

It follows that members of any order of Knighthood may be entitled to several prefixes and affixes, as: Field Marshal The Rt. Hon. Earl Roberts of Kandahar, Pretoria, and Waterford, K.G., K.P., G.C.B., G.C.S.I., G.C.I.E., V.C.; The Rt. Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, G.C.M.G.; The Hon. Sir C. Tupper Bart, G.C.M.G., C.B.

THE IMPERIAL SERVICE ORDER.

This civil order of distinction was instituted by King Edward VII, August 8, 1902, to more fully recognize the faithful and meritorious services rendered by members of the Civil Services of the various parts of the Empire. The following is a synopsis of the statutes relating thereto:—

- (a) Name.—The Imperial Service Order.
 (b) Consists of the Sovereign, the Prince of Wales, and such Companions as may be appointed.
 (c) Only members of the administrative or clerical branches of Civil Services are eligible to Companionships.
 (d) Number of Companions.—Limited to 425, of whom 250 for the home Civil Service and 175 for Civil Services of Colonies and Protectorates.
 (e) Eligibility.—At least twenty-five years' meritorious service. In Colonies or Protectorates recognized as unhealthy, it is reduced to sixteen years. The periods are not compulsory in special cases of *eminently* meritorious service.
 (f) Description of decoration.—A badge or medallion of gold and enamel, bearing on one side the Imperial and Royal Cypher, and on the reverse "For Faithful Service," both in dark blue enamel on a plaque or shield of Gold, surrounded by a wreath of laurel, surmounted by the Imperial Crown.
 (g) Decoration to be worn on left breast suspended by a ribbon one inch wide.
 (h) Names of those upon whom the decoration is conferred will be published in the *London Gazette*.
 (i) Companions have the privilege of adding the letters "I.S.O." after their names.
 (j) Members of this order are not deprived of eligibility to other orders of knighthood, and *vice versa*.

THE IMPERIAL SERVICE MEDAL.

It is also provided that members not eligible for companionships in the Imperial Service Order may, on retirement after service of twenty-five years or sixteen years, as above explained, receive the "Imperial Service Medal," which is of silver and of a design similar to that of the badge of the Companions of the Imperial Service Order.

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THE BRITISH GOVERNMENT.

THE CAMPBELL-BANNERMAN ADMINISTRATION—DECEMBER, 1905.

The Balfour Administration which was formed on the 12th of July, 1902, after the retirement of the late Marquis of Salisbury from the offices of Premier and Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, came to an end on December 5th, 1905. Between December 5th and 9th the Campbell-Bannerman Administration was organized. The Parliament which was elected in 1900 was then in existence. It was dissolved on January 8th; and at the general election which followed (see British Parliament, page 258) the Campbell-Bannerman administration was continued in power. It is now constituted as stated below:—

THE OFFICE OF PRIME MINISTER.

By Royal Warrant dated December 6th, 1905, an important change was made in the status of the Prime Minister. Until 1894 the office of Prime Minister, although it had existed for so long, had no official recognition. "Departmentally," Mr. Gladstone once wrote in reference to the Prime Minister, "he is no more than the first-named of five persons by whom jointly the powers of the Local Treasurerships are to be exercised. He is not their master, or otherwise than by mere priority their head, and he has no special function or prerogative under the formal constitution of the office. He has no official rank, except that of Privy Councillor. Eight members of the Cabinet, including five Secretaries of State and several other members of the Government, take official precedence of him. His rights and duties as head of the administration are nowhere recorded. He is almost, if not altogether, unknown to the statute law."

The first official recognition of the office came on March 3rd, 1894, when the "Court Circular" stated that Queen Victoria had offered to the Earl of Rosebery the "post of Prime Minister, vacated by whom jointly Hon. W. E. Gladstone, M.P." Even after this first official recognition the precedence of the Prime Minister was not determined; and there was no determination of his precedence until the Royal Warrant of December 6th, 1905, which announced "our Royal will and pleasure that in all times hereafter the Prime Minister of us, our heirs and successors, shall have precedence next after the Archbishop of York." Consequently the Prime Minister now has his place between the Archbishop of York and the Lord Chancellor of Ireland, and precedence over every member of his Government except the Lord Chancellor.

THE GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS.

THE TREASURY.

Chancellor of the Exchequer—Rt. Hon. Herbert Asquith.

First Lord of the Treasury—Rt. Hon. Sir H. Campbell-Bannerman.

Financial Secretary to the Treasury—Mr. R. McKenna.

Patronage Secretary to the Treasury—Mr. George Whiteley.

Junior Lords of the Treasury—Mr. J. A. Pease, Mr. Herbert Lewis, Capt. Cecil Norton.

The Treasury, of which the Chancellor of the Exchequer is the political head, provides the means for meeting the charges for the military, naval, and civil services. The Parliamentary heads of each of the spending and administrative departments of the Government are responsible for the estimates for their respective departments; but it is the duty of the Chancellor of the Exchequer, with the permanent Secretary to the Treasury, to check all these estimates before they are submitted to the House of Commons in Committee of Supply. The Cabinet becomes responsible for estimates which have been submitted to Parliament, and the rejection or reduction of an estimate by the House of Commons is tantamount to a defeat of the Government. The duties which bring the Chancellor of the Exchequer most prominently before the country, are those in connection with the Budget. The first Lord of the Treasury is one of its Parliamentary heads; but the duties of the First Lord are little more than nominal, and the office is usually held by the Leader of the House of Commons. The Patronage Secretary to the Treasury is the official title of the Government whip in the House of Commons. The Junior Lords are his assistants. The Financial Secretary represents the Treasury in the House of Commons.

THE FOREIGN OFFICE.

Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs—Sir Edward Grey.
Under Secretary—Lord Fitzmaurice.

All diplomatic intercourse is conducted by the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, who is usually of the House of Lords. The office is next in rank and importance to that of Premier, and is sometimes held in conjunction with that office. Ambassadors and consuls receive their instructions from the Foreign Office. Foreign ambassadors in London have their audiences with the Secretary of State, and he also conducts the negotiations for international treaties. The Under Secretary represents the Department in the House of Commons.

THE COLONIAL OFFICE.

Secretary of State for the Colonies—Earl of Elgin.
Under Secretary—Mr. Winston Churchill.

The Colonial Office dates back to 1660, when a Committee of the Privy Council was appointed for the Plantations, as the Colonies were then called. This Council was continued until 1768, when colonial affairs were placed under the control of a Secretary of State. When the United States secured their independence in 1783, the office of Colonial Secretary was abolished, and colonial affairs were managed from the Home Office. In 1794 the colonies were placed under the care of the Secretary at War. This arrangement was continued until 1854, when the War Department was reconstructed, and separate Secretaryships of State were established for War and for the Colonies. The colonies are divided into three classes. In the first are the Crown colonies, in which the Crown has entire control of legislation, and which are administered from the Colonial office. India and Cyprus are examples of Crown Colonies. In the second class are the colonies with representative institutions, but not responsible government. In these the Crown has a veto on legislation and retains control of the public offices. Such colonies are Ceylon and Jamaica. The third class includes the colonies having responsible government, such as Canada and the Australasian colonies.

THE INDIA OFFICE.

Secretary of State for India—Rt. Hon. John Morley.
Under Secretary—Rt. Hon. J. E. Ellis.

The India Office in its present form dates from 1858, when an Act of Parliament was passed which directed that all the powers and duties hitherto exercised by the old East India Company, or the old Board of Control, should in future be exercised and performed by one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State. At the same time there was established a council to assist the Secretary for India. It consists of not less than ten members nominated by the Secretary. The majority of these members must be men who have served or resided ten years in India, and have not left India more than ten years previous to the date of their appointment. Members hold office for ten years, and under the direction of the Secretary for India, conduct all the business transacted in London in relation to the government of India.

THE HOME OFFICE.

Secretary of State for Home Affairs—Rt. Hon. Herbert Gladstone.

Under Secretary—Mr. Herbert Samuel.

The Home Department has the control of the London police force, and also the oversight of the police forces in the counties and municipal boroughs; and, generally speaking, the Department is responsible for the internal peace of the country. Prisons, convict establishments, criminal lunatic asylums, executions, and all matters connected with the post-judicial execution of the criminal law, come within the purview of the Home Office. It is also responsible for the administration of the factory code, and the laws relating to mining.

THE WAR OFFICE.

Secretary of State for War—Rt. Hon. R. B. Haldane, K.C.

Under Secretary—Earl of Portsmouth.

Financial Secretary to the War Office—Mr. T. R. Buchanan.

The Secretary for War has control of the army at home and abroad, and is responsible for its efficiency to the Sovereign and to Parliament. He directs all movements of troops, and all appointments made by the Commander-in-Chief are subject to his approval.

THE ADMIRALTY.

First Lord of the Admiralty—Lord Tweedmouth.

Secretary to the Admiralty—Rt. Hon. Edmund Robertson, K.C.

The Admiralty, which has charge of the Royal Navy, is administered by Lords Commissioners. The head of the Department, who is always of the Cabinet, is known as the First Lord of the Admiralty. The other Lords Commissioners or Junior Lords are officers without seats in Parliament, and are respectively at the heads of the departments into which the Admiralty is divided. The foreign movements of ships are at the instance of the Cabinet, the Foreign Office, and the Colonial Office, and it is from these authorities that the Lords of the Admiralty receive their orders. In time of war the orders go from the Cabinet. At other times the movements of vessels are directed by the Foreign Office and the Colonial Office.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

President—Rt. Hon. Augustine Birrell.

Secretary—Mr. Thomas Lough.

The Education Department exercises supervision over the various departments of state-aided education, and distributes the grants for education annually made by Parliament. These grants date from 1833; and in 1839 the Committee of Council for Education was established. The Vice-President was always of the House of Commons, and he was practically the Minister of Education. On the 1st of April, 1900, the Committee of Council for Education came to an end, and the powers it had exercised since 1839, enormously increased, however, since 1870, were transferred to a new State Department known as the Board of Education. The new Board was created under an Act of Parliament passed in the ordinary session of 1899. It consists of a President, the Principal Secretaries of State (these are the Secretaries for Foreign Affairs, for Colonial Affairs, for the Home Department, for War, and for India), the First Commissioner of the Treasury, and the Chancellor of the Exchequer. With the creation of this new Board there was for the first time a direct and general connection between the Government and secondary schools in England. Heretofore the Committee of Council had been concerned chiefly with elementary education, except as regards the Science and Art Department. Now, however, inspectors representing the Board of Education may visit the secondary schools, and a connection is established between these schools and the municipal councils. With the new Board of Education there was also created a Consultative Committee, which was to keep a register of teachers, and advise the Board on any matters referred to it. Universities and other bodies concerned in education are represented on the Consultative Committee. At the formation of the Balfour Government in 1902, and the retirement of Sir J. Gorst, Vice-President, the Marquis of Londonderry became the first President of the Board and Sir W. R. Anson the first Secretary.

THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD.

President of the Local Government Board—Rt. Hon. John Burns.

Parliamentary Secretary to the Local Government Board—Mr. Walter Runciman.

This Department dates from the reform of the Poor Law in 1834. From 1834 to 1847 its chief was not of the Ministry nor in Parliament. Up to 1871 it was occupied exclusively with the administration of the Poor Law. In 1871 it took over from the Home Department numerous duties in connection with municipal government and public health, and its title was changed to the Local Government Board.

THE BOARD OF TRADE.

President of the Board of Trade—Rt. Hon. D. Lloyd-George.

Parliamentary Secretary to the Board of Trade—Mr. H. E. Kearley.

The Board of Trade is in charge of the administration of the laws relating to limited liability companies, to bankruptcy; and it also has the oversight of all matters connected with the mercantile marine, harbours, canals, railways, and street car lines and electric lighting. The

Labour Bureau is a department of the Board of Trade. Its work is confined to the collection and compilation of information of all kinds relating to labour. The Board of Trade also collects information relating to trade and commerce abroad.

THE POST OFFICE.

Postmaster-General—Rt. Hon. Sydney Buxton.

The Post Office in England controls the telegraphs, as well as the home and foreign mail departments. The telegraphs have been a Government undertaking since 1869. The Post Office savings banks, of which there are over 12,000, receive sums up to a maximum of £50 in one year, or £200 in all. They also do a life insurance, and an annuity business on lines intended to meet the needs and convenience of the working classes.

THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE.

President of the Board of Agriculture—Earl Carrington.

The principal duties of this Department are the administration of the laws for preventing and stamping out cattle disease. It supervises the landing of live cattle imported from abroad.

OFFICE OF PUBLIC WORKS AND BUILDINGS.

First Commissioner of Works—Rt. Hon. Lewis Harcourt.

This Department has the custody and supervision of all Royal Palaces and parks, and also of buildings such as the Houses of Parliament, the Palace at Westminster, the Law Courts, and the public offices at Whitehall.

DEPARTMENT OF THE LORD CHAMBERLAIN.

Lord Chamberlain—Viscount Althorp.

Comptroller of the Household—Sir Edward Strachey.

The Lord Chamberlain's Department has the general supervision of the Royal Household "above stairs," and also various duties towards the Sovereign and the Court. It is through the Lord Chamberlain that presentations at Court are arranged. In cities where there are royal palaces, he acts as the licensor of theatres. The Examiner of Plays is in the Department of the Lord Chamberlain. His sanction is necessary for the production of a play in any theatre in England at which a charge for admission is made.

IRISH AND SCOTCH DEPARTMENTS.

Chief Secretary for Ireland—Rt. Hon. John Morley.

Secretary for Scotland—Rt. Hon. John Sinclair.

These Departments for Ireland and Scotland respectively exercise functions very similar to those of the Home Department in England.

Officers of the House of Commons.

Rt. Hon. James William Lowther, elected Speaker in June, 1905 (salary £5,000), was unanimously re-elected on the opening of the new parliament. Mr. Alfred Emmott became Deputy Speaker and Chairman of Committees of Ways and Means (salary £2,500). Sir Courtenay Peregrine Ilbert remains Clerk of the House (salary £1,800); Henry David Erskine, Sergeant-at-Arms (salary £1,000); and the Venerable A. B. O. Wilberforce, Speaker's Chaplain, with a salary of £400.

MINISTERIAL PENSIONS.

Pensions are granted to ex-holders of Ministerial offices whose private fortunes are inadequate to their maintenance in their station in life. The number of these pensions, the three classes into which they are grouped according to offices held—£800, £1,500, £2,000 a year—and the conditions governing their award are determined by the Political Offices Pensions Act of 1869 (32 and 33 Victoria, c. 60)—an Act which was passed as an amendment to the Pensions Act of 1834. On the eve of the retirement of the Balfour Government—5th December, 1905—pensions of £2,000 were being paid to Lord Cross (since 1887), and to Lord George Hamilton (1892). These are first-class pensions. Second-class pensions of £1,500 a year were at that time being paid to Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, Mr. Henry Chaplin, Sir John Gorst, and Lord Balfour of Burleigh. As there can be only four pensioners in any of the three classes this class was full when the Balfour Administration was coming to an end; but Sir Michael Hicks-Beach was at this juncture made a peer. He became Lord St. Aldwyn and resigned his pension, which by warrant dated December 5th, was bestowed on Mr. Gerald Balfour, who in Mr. Arthur Balfour's Government had been President of the Local Government Board.

THE BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

The Balfour Government resigned on the 5th of December, 1905. Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, who had been leader of the Liberal Opposition in the House of Commons since February, 1899, formed a Liberal Administration, and the General Election took place in January, 1906. The British House of Commons, since the Franchise and Redistribution Acts of 1834-5, consists of 670 Members. Geographically, the seats held by these Members are distributed as follows:—

Qualifications for the Parliamentary franchise are various, but generally speaking the franchise is on a democratic basis; so much so, that it is possible for every man who is a householder, and who has been in occupation for a year previous to the enrolment of electors, to vote at a Parliamentary election. There is also a lodger franchise; but in this case the franchise is based upon the rental value of the rooms. It is also

governed by the conditions of the tenancy, and but comparatively few men qualify for the lodger franchise, which, unlike the householder franchise, must be claimed every year. A recent decision in the law courts, *Kent v. Tittal*, 1905, has brought into prominence the occupier franchise, which is granted to men renting rooms over which they have complete control. These men are not lodgers, and they hold the franchise on the

same basis as the householder. Tens of thousands of working men voters were added to the electoral lists in 1906 as a result of this decision.

The electoral rolls are compiled by the local overseers of the poor, as most of the franchises are based on the payment of the poor rate. The rolls are then gone over in open court by the revising barristers, who hold their sessions every year, as a new list of voters is compiled each year. In England the new register comes into effect on December 1st.

Members of the House of Commons receive neither salaries nor indemnities. There are no mileage allowances or railway privileges, and Members do not enjoy the privilege of franking their correspondence through the mails.

Parliamentary candidates pay all the costs of elections, including the returning officer's fees and expenses. Deposits to cover these outlays must be made to the returning officer before a candidate can go to the poll. In the counties, the High Sheriffs, or their deputies, act as returning officers. In the self-contained boroughs—that is, in the boroughs which return Members, and are not part of a county division—the Mayor acts as returning officer.

Elections are not held all on one day. A general election usually extends over a month, and, if an elector is qualified in several constituencies, he can vote in each. Only freeholder voters can exercise the franchise in this way, as residence is not a necessary qualification for a freehold vote.

At the general election in January, 1906, the questions at issue were Fiscal Reform (Mr. Chamberlain's proposal to return to Protection); Chinese Labour on the Rand, which arose on the Balfour-Milner ordinance of 1904; and Elementary Education, or rather that aspect of this subject which affected the relationship of the Established Church and the Roman Catholic Church to public elementary schools which are maintained entirely by local and Imperial taxation.

On August 11th, 1905—that is, on the last day of the last session of the Parliament elected in September and October, 1900—the political constitution of the House of Commons stood as follows:—

After the General Election of 1900, the Salisbury Administration had a majority over Liberals and Irish Nationalists of 134.

As the result of the General Election in January, 1906, the Campbell-Bannerman Government was continued in office, and began the Parliamentary session with a majority of 241 over the combined vote of the Conservatives, Liberal Unionists, and Irish Nationalist Members.

Mr. Speaker Lowther was of the Tory Party when he was elected to the Chair in 1905. As has now long been the usage at Westminster, he was re-elected at the opening of the new Parliament. Counting the Speaker as still of the Tory party, the political constitution of the House of Commons at the beginning of the session of 1906 was made up thus:—

* Up to the time these pages of the *Canadian Almanac* went to press only one by-election had gone against the Liberals; and when Parliament met on October 23rd, 1906, for the winter session, the strength of the Liberals was 371.

Not since the beginnings of modern Liberalism at the time of the American Revolution has the Liberal party been supported by so large a majority in the House of Commons.

The Labour Members are divided into three groups:— (1) Fourteen miners' representatives, (2) fourteen Liberal Labour Members, and (3) twenty-nine members of the Independent Labour party. Members of the first group (the miners' representatives) have been of the House of Commons since 1868, when the Right Honourable Thomas Burt and the late Mr. Alexander Macdonald (both of them miners' trade union officials) were returned.

The second group is composed of Liberals who are closely associated with the Labour movement; while the third group represents the Independent Labour Party, which was organized in 1901, and was represented in the last House of Commons by Mr. Keir Hardie, the leader of the movement, and three other members. The miners' members and the Liberal-Labour members sit on the Government Benches, answer to the Government whips, and act generally with the Government.

Mr. Keir Hardie and his colleagues sit with the Nationalist Members on the Opposition side of the House of Commons. This group has its own whips, and, while usually voting with the Government, its members hold themselves at arm's length from it, and keep aloof from Liberal organizations in and out of Parliament. This new group advocates old age pensions, adult suffrage, and the establishment of an eight-hours' day by legislative enactment, and, broadly speaking, it is representative of the Socialist movement in England in its more immediately practical forms.

THE HOUSE OF LORDS.

Only in so far as concerns Scotland is the House of Lords affected by a general election. After a dissolution of Parliament, the Scotch Lords meet at Holyrood Palace, and in accordance with the terms of the Act of Union elect sixteen peers to represent them in the House of Lords. At the election on the 30th of January, 1906, at which the Duke of Montrose (Lord Clerk) presided, the following Peers were chosen:—

All these Peers are Conservatives, and the only change was the substitution of Lord Borthwick for Lord Forbes, who was of the last Parliament, but declined re-election. The Irish Peers, who number twenty-eight, are elected for life.

At the time the Balfour Government went out of office in December, 1905, there were 612 Peers. Of these, 537 were hereditary Peers of the United Kingdom, 5 were life Peers (the law lords), 26 were Archbishops and Bishops, 16 were Scotch representative Peers, and 28 were Irish representative Peers. On the formation of the Campbell-Bannerman Government, Mr. R. T. Reid went up to the House of Lords as Lord Chancellor, with the title of Baron Loreburn. In January and February, 1906, there were other creations of Peers; and on the 28th of June, at the anniversary of the King's Birthday, six new Peers were created. In all since the accession to office in 1905 of the Campbell-Bannerman Government, 16 new Peers have been created, all of whom are Liberals. Their creation brings up the number of Liberal Peers to 90. The total voting strength of the House of Lords, after these additions had been made, was 615, as twelve of the hereditary Peers were minors, and there is one case of contested succession.

QUEBEC.—Sundays, New Year's Day, Epiphany, Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, Easter Monday, The Ascension, All Saint's Day, The Conception, Christmas Day, the anniversary of the birthday of the Sovereign (or day fixed by proclamation), 1st July (or 2nd July if 1st is a Sunday), any other day fixed by Royal proclamation or by proclamation of Governor-General as a day of general fast or thanksgiving, Labour Day.

NOVA SCOTIA.—Sundays, Good Friday, Dominion Day, Christmas Day, day appointed for celebration of the birthday of her late Majesty or any of the Royal successors, Labour Day, and any day appointed by proclamation of Governor-General or Lieutenant-Governor as a general holiday or for general fast or thanksgiving.

MANITOBA.—Sundays, New Year's Day, Good Friday, Christmas Day, Dominion Day, Labour Day, the day appointed for celebration of the birthday of her late

Majesty and her Royal successors, and any day appointed by proclamation for a general thanksgiving or general holiday, or as Arbour Day.

Customs and excise duties are levied on many articles of food and drink (see British Import Duties, page 260), although all these duties are imposed for revenue only. An outstanding feature in recent British Budgets is the falling off in revenue due to a declining consumption of alcoholic beverages. In 1905-6 revenue was collected on 11,800,000 gallons of wine as compared with 17,150,000 in 1899-1900; on 8,780,000 gallons of foreign and colonial spirits, as compared with 9,350,000 gallons in 1899-1900. on 32,490,000 gallons of British-made gin and whiskey as compared with 38,716,000 gallons in 1899-1900; and on 33,500,000 barrels of beer as compared with 36,500,000 barrels in 1899-1900. "These figures," said Mr. Asquith, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, in unfolding his Budget to the House of Commons on the 30th of April, 1906, "were made more striking by the fact that there

had been an increase in the population of the country during that period of between two and three millions." While hoping that the main cause of the decreased consumption of alcohol was temperance, Mr. Asquith pointed out that the spending power of the community had been decreased by the increased taxation and the expenditure due to the South African war.

At the end of the financial year 1905-6 the National Debt stood at £789,990,187 as compared with £796,730,490 at the end of 1904-5. Since 1860 the lowest point at which the National Debt has stood was at £635,640,965 at the end of the financial year 1898-99. In 1860 it stood at £827,728,168.

BIRTHS, MARRIAGES AND DEATHS IN ONTARIO IN 1904.

During the year 1904 there were registered 50,265 births (including still births), being male and female infants which represents a birth rate of 22.8 per 1,000 of the population, which is an increase of 0.7 per thousand over the preceding year and 1.1 per thousand over the registration of the year 1902. Although the birth rate is not as high as that of the Province of Quebec, yet must be considered satisfactory owing to the fact that a constant drain is taking place of young men of marriageable age to the western provinces of the Dominion, where ultimately they settle down and marry, thus materially reducing the numbers of that class of the population upon which an increase is dependent.

During the year 1904 there were registered 19,789 marriages, being 41 less than were recorded in the preceding year and equal to a rate of 8.9 per thousand of the estimated population, a rate which corresponds very closely to that of 1903 in which there had been a marked increase in marriages over the immediate preceding years.

The figures show that the rate of 1903 has been maintained. Of the total number of marriages, viz., 19,789,

there were registered in the cities 6,618 or 33.4 per cent. 2,545 or 12.8 per cent. in the towns and the remainder 53.6 per cent. in the rural districts.

The total number of deaths registered from all causes for the province was 31,290, divided as follows among the groups of municipalities:

The death rate for the province being 14.1 per thousand of the population, an increase of 0.7 per thousand over the rate for the year 1903.

The counties with a higher mortality rate than the average are, Carleton, Frontenac, Leeds and Grenville, Lincoln, Middlesex, Nipissing, Norfolk, Oxford, Perth, Peterboro', Prescott and Russell, Thunder Bay, Welland, Wentworth and York.

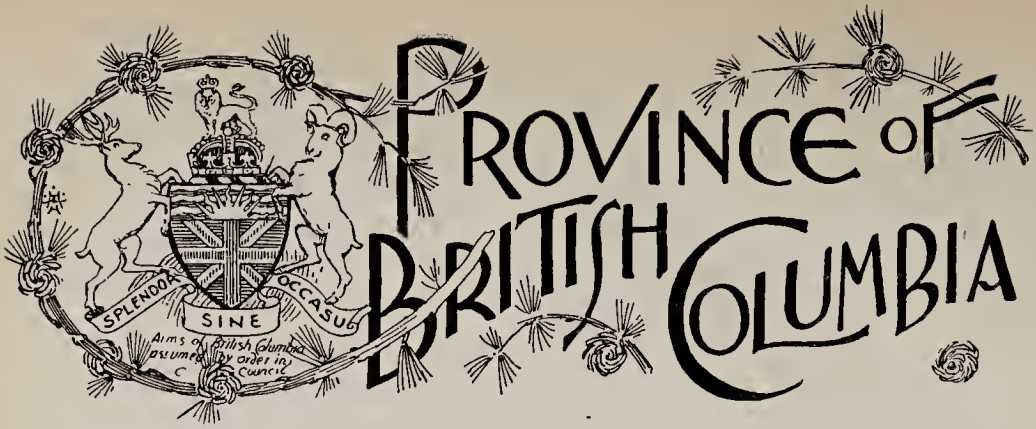

THE LAW OF INTESTATES ESTATES.

As to all persons who died before the first day of January, 1852, the rules of descent are substantially the same as in England at that date.

Real estate of persons who died intestate (*i.e.*, who have left no will) after that date and prior to the first day of July, 1886, descends first to lineal descendants and those claiming by or under them *per stirpes*, second to father, third to mother, and fourth to collateral relatives, subject to certain rules and regulations prescribed in the statute.

The surplus personal estate of intestates who died prior to the first day of July, 1886, is, after the expiration of one full year from the death of the intestate, to be distributed in the following manner: One-third shall go to the widow of the intestate, and the residue in equal proportions to his children, or if dead, to their lineal descendants; if there are no children or legal representatives subsisting, then where the net value of the real and personal estate does not exceed \$1,000, same belongs absolutely to the widow, and as to any excess over and above said amount after payments of debts, etc., the widow takes a moiety, and the other moiety goes to the next of kindred, in equal degree, and their representatives; if no widow, all to children; if neither widow nor children, all to next of kin, in equal degree, and their representatives. But no representation is admitted among collaterals further than children of intestate's brothers and sisters.

All real and personal property of persons dying on or after the 1st day of July, 1886, devolves upon and becomes vested in the legal personal representatives for the period of a year (which may be extended in a prescribed manner) subject to the payment of debts and to the effectual dispositions of deceased. The real and personal property of a married woman, in respect of which she has died intestate, shall be distributed as follows: One-third to her husband, if she leaves issue, and one-half if she leaves none, and subject thereto, shall go as if her husband had predeceased her. The realty and personalty comprised in a residuary devise or bequest is (unless the will otherwise directs) applicable ratably according to their respective value to the payment of the debts.

PATENTS IN CANADA.

The Patent Office is a Branch of the Department of Agriculture, and the Minister of Agriculture for the time being is the Commissioner of Patents.

Any person who has invented any new and useful art, machine, manufacture or composition of matter, or any new and useful improvement in any art, machine, manufacture or composition of matter, which was not known or used by any other person before his invention thereof, and which has not been in public use or sale with the consent or allowance of the inventor thereof for more than one year previously to his application for patent therefor in Canada, may, on a petition to that effect, presented to the Commissioner, and on compliance with the other requirements of the Act, obtain a patent granting to such person an exclusive property in such invention.

No patent shall issue for an invention which has an illicit object in view, or for any mere scientific principle or abstract theorem.

Any person who has invented any improvement on any patented invention, may obtain a patent for such improvement; but he shall not thereby obtain the right of vending or using the original invention, nor shall the patent for the original invention confer the right of vending or using the patented improvement.

The Patentee or his legal representatives must, within two years from the date of the patent or an authorized extension thereof, commence and continuously carry on in Canada the construction or manufacture of the invention patented in such manner that any person desiring to use it may obtain it, or cause it to be made for him at a reasonable price at some manufactory or establishment for making or constructing it in Canada. If after twelve months from the granting of the patent, or an authorized extension thereof, the Patentee or his legal representatives imports, or caused to be imported, into Canada the invention for which the patent is granted, such patent shall be void as to the interest of the person so importing.

The Commissioner, upon satisfactory cause being shown, may grant to the Patentee or his legal representatives an extension for a further term not exceeding one year beyond the twelve months during which he may import into Canada the invention; such application must be made within three months before the expiry of the said twelve months.

An Inventor obtaining a patent for his invention in a foreign country before obtaining a Canadian patent, may obtain the latter if same be applied for within one year from the date of the issue of the first foreign patent; and if within three months after the date of issue of a foreign patent the Inventor gives notice to the Commissioner of his intention to apply for a Canadian Patent for such invention, then no other person having commenced to manufacture the same device in Canada during such period of one year shall be entitled to continue the manufacture of the same after the Canadian patent has been obtained without the consent or allowance of the inventor.

Upon application for a patent, or within six months after issue of the patent, the Commissioner may order that, instead of the above provisions as to manufacture

in Canada within two years, such patent shall be subject to the following conditions:—Any person, while the patent continues in force, may apply to the Commissioner for a license to make, construct, use and sell the patented invention, and if the Commissioner is satisfied that the reasonable requirements of the public have not been satisfied by reason of the neglect or refusal of the Patentee or his legal representatives to make, construct, use or sell the invention, or to grant licenses for so doing to others on reasonable terms, he may make an order under his hand and the seal of the Patent Office requiring the owner of the patent to grant a license to the person applying therefor upon such terms as to royalties, etc., as the Commissioner deems just, and if the Commissioner makes such an order, and the owner of the Patent refuses or neglects to comply therewith within three Calendar months after a copy of it is addressed to him or to his duly authorized agent, the patent and all rights and privileges thereby granted shall cease and determine.

An application for a patent is made by a petition wherein the title or name of the invention is set forth, and in which the applicant declares that he is the inventor of the invention, as well as placing his domicile at some known and specified place in Canada, and such petition must be verified by affidavit or affirmation of the applicant that he believes he is the inventor of the said invention, and that the statements in the petition are true. Should the inventor be dead, such oath or affirmation may be made by his assignee or legal representative, and with the petition must be filed a specification (in duplicate) of the invention which shall correctly and fully describe the mode of operating same, the contrivances and things claimed as new, and for the use of which exclusive property and privilege is claimed, and shall bear the name of the place where, and date when, made, and shall be signed by the applicant and by two witnesses. In the case of a machine, the specification shall fully explain the principle and several modes in which it is intended to apply, and work out the same; and where the invention admits of illustration by means of drawings, the applicant shall also send in drawings in duplicate, showing clearly all parts of the invention. In all cases in which the invention admits of representation by model, the applicant, if required by the Commissioner, shall also furnish a model of convenient size; and when the invention is a composition of matter, the applicant shall also, on like request, furnish specimens of the ingredients and composition sufficient in quantity for the purpose of experiment.

In the case of conflicting applications for any patent, provision is made for submitting same to the arbitration of three skilled persons, two of whom shall be chosen by the applicants and the third by the Commissioner, and the decision or award in writing of such arbitrators, or of any two of them, shall be final.

A patent is granted for a term of eighteen years, but at the time of the application it is optional for the applicant to pay the fee for the term of six years, or twelve years only, as desired, and, unless further renewal payments are made, the patent expires on such dates respectively.

The patent may be assigned, but unless same duly registered in the Patent Office shall be null and void as against any subsequent assignee.

Every person who, without the consent in writing of the Patentee, makes, constructs, or puts into practice any invention for which a patent has been obtained, or who procures such invention from any person not authorized by the patentee, and who uses it, shall be liable to the patentee, or his legal representative, in damages.

Any action for infringement of the patent may be brought in any Court of record having jurisdiction to the amount of the damages claimed in the Province in which the infringement is alleged to have taken place. Proceedings may also be taken in the Exchequer Court, which has jurisdiction over the entire Dominion of Canada.

Every patentee shall stamp or engrave on each patented article sold or offered for sale by him the year of the date of the patent of such article, thus:—"Patented 1898," or as the case may be; or when, from the nature of the article, this cannot be done, then by affixing to it, or to every package where one or more of such articles is or are enclosed, a label marked with a like notice. For violation of this provision there is imposed a penalty not exceeding \$100.00, and, in default of payment thereof, imprisonment for a term not exceeding two months.

Falsely marking an article as patented with the intent of counterfeiting or imitating the stamp, mark, or device of the patent of another person, or of deceiving the public, or offering for sale as patented any article not patented in Canada, is a misdemeanour, and for which there is a fine not exceeding \$200.00, or imprisonment for a term not exceeding three months, or both.

Any intending applicant for a patent who has not yet perfected his invention, and is in fear of being despoiled of his idea, may file in the Patent Office a description of his invention so far, with or without plans, of his own will, and the Commissioner, on payment of the pre-

scribed fee, shall cause the said document, which shall be called a caveat, to be preserved in secrecy, and, if application is made by any other person for a patent interfering in any way therewith, the Commissioner shall forthwith give notice, by mail, of such application to the person filing such caveat, who shall, within three months thereafter, if he wishes to avail himself of the caveat, file his petition, and take the other steps necessary on an application for a patent. The application for the patent must be made within one year from filing of caveat, otherwise the Commissioner is relieved from the obligation of giving notice.

The Government of Canada may, at any time, use any patented invention by paying to the Patentee such sum as the Commissioner reports to be a reasonable compensation for the use thereof.

All specifications, drawings, models, disclaimers, judgments, and other papers, except caveats, shall be open to the inspection of the public at the Patent Office, under such regulations as are adopted in that behalf.

The following fees are payable:—Full fee on patent for 18 years, \$60.00; partial fee for 12 years, \$40.00; partial fee for 6 years, \$20.00; on filing caveat, \$5.00; on registering assignment patent, \$2.00; for copy of patent, with specification, \$4.00.

The disbursements for filing an application in Great Britain are \$25.00; France, \$20.00; Germany, \$5.00, and \$7.50 before issuing patent; Australia, \$20; Russia, \$75.00; British India, \$20.00. The German and French patents cover not only Germany and France but also their colonies. The Russian patent extends to all of the Russian possessions.

The disbursements for filing an application in the Australian States, namely, Queensland, Victoria, New South Wales, South Australia, Western Australia and Tasmania are \$5.00 on filing of the application, \$10.00 on allowance of same and \$25.00 for preparation of the sealing of patent; New Zealand, \$20.00; Mexico, \$75.00; Natal, \$50.00; Japan, \$75.00; Jamaica, \$150.00.

THE LAKE ST. JOHN TERRITORY.

This territory, extending northwards to the boundary of the Province of Quebec, and westward to the River St. Maurice, embraces the valley of the Batiscan and the field of lumbering operations on the Saguenay and St. Maurice, estimated at 60,000,000 feet, B.M., per annum, or one-fourth of Quebec's entire export of sawn lumber. Of this area of 44,000 square miles or 23,000,000 acres, comparatively little is known outside of the valley of Lake St. John, where colonization is making rapid progress, and there is a population of 49,765 souls.

The Soil, says a visitor, "Is almost universally composed of a rich grey clay, the land seems to be inexhaustible. At Pointeaux-Trembles I was shown a field of wheat, which had been producing that grain for the last fifteen years, without the application of any manure; and the grain was as fine as any to be found in this district.

"The climate of the Lake St. John region is said to be that of Montreal; there is no doubt of its being superior to that of Quebec. The snowfall is certainly less." Wheat and all grains ripen and produce abundantly, as may be seen from the following extracts taken from the census returns:

Potatoes, carrots and other vegetables yield abundantly and are of immense size. Wheat is of course the great test of the soil and climate. Let us then compare its production at Lake St. John with the best districts of the Province, viz: the Eastern Townships, and we find that the census returns show in 1881:—

Last year the railway transported 3,041,011 pounds of cheese. The value of cheese and butter manufactured in the district last year is estimated at \$700,000.

The official reports of the Meteorological Department at Toronto show the average temperature of Roberval to be 35.9 for the year, 12.2 for the winter and 59.7 in summer—as compared with 31.8, 1.4, and 57.1 respectively at Chicoutimi; 37.0, 8.7, and 60.3 at Quebec; 39.2, 10.4, and 62.5 at Montreal, and 31.2, 3.4, and 57.6 at Moose Factory. The average winter snow-fall is 43.5 inches at Roberval, 36.1 at Chicoutimi, 94 at Quebec, 94.1 at Montreal, and 33.6 at Moose Factory.

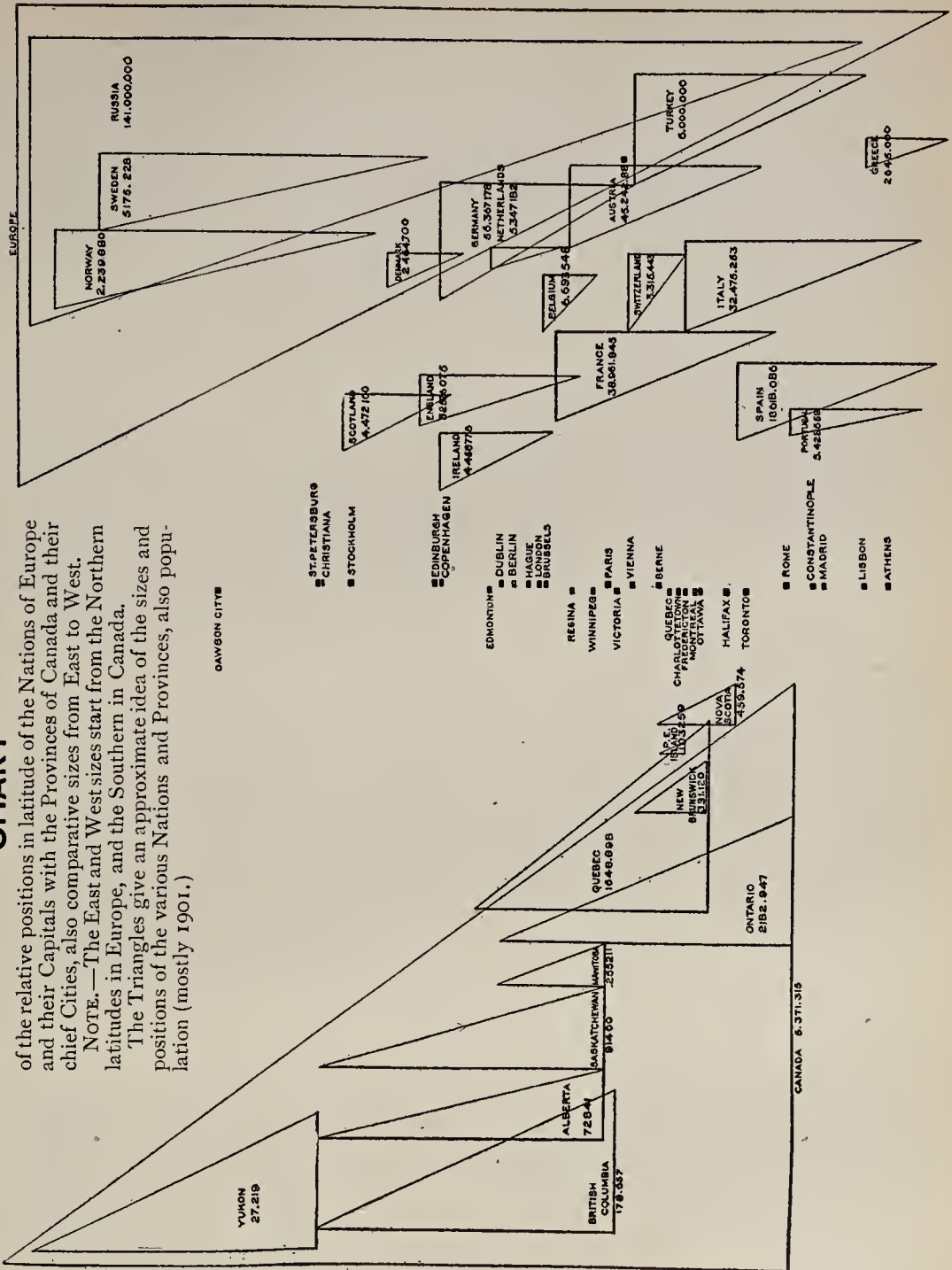
Careful surveys of the country intervening between Lake St. John and James Bay prove that the engineering difficulties to be surmounted in extending the railway from its present northern terminus at Roberval to the southern extremity of James Bay, which it is intended to do, are very much less than those encountered in building the Quebec and Lake St. John Railway. This link of railway between Lake St. John and James Bay will be an important section of the projected Trans-Canada road. The James Bay section of this road will not only bring to Lake St. John, Chicoutimi, and Quebec the products of the fisheries and mines of the James and Hudson Bay regions, but by its extension through the rich townships to the north-west of Roberval will give additional means of communication and add value to the fertile lands of Ashuapmouchouan, Demeules and Dufferin townships and the villages of St. Prime and St. Félixien, as well as all the neighboring townships.

It will be seen that Toronto, Halifax, Ottawa, Montreal, Fredericton, Charlottetown and Quebec, all lie South of Berne, Switzerland. That Winnipeg is slightly North of Paris, France, and South of London, and that Edmonton is on nearly the same latitude as Dublin, Ireland.

SOME FACTS ABOUT CANADA.

The earliest official records show that John and Sebastian Cabot, sailing under commission from King Henry VII of England, landed in 1497 on that part of the present Dominion of Canada known as Cape Breton in Nova Scotia.

Gaspar Cortereal discovered and named the Labrador coast in 1500.

Jacques Cartier, of St. Malo, France, acting under the authority and patronage of Francis I of France, discovered, in 1534, those portions of the Dominion of Canada now called New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, and Quebec, and on his return to France presented the King with the first official record there is of the existence of these regions.

Captain Cook in 1778 gave the first authentic record of the discovery of Vancouver Island and the Pacific Ocean coast of the present Dominion.

Frobisher, Hudson, Parry, Franklin, Richardson, Back, Mackenzie, Simpson, Vancouver and others, between 1576 and 1847 explored and named the north and north-west coasts of the Dominion.

Colonization was practically begun in 1605-8. In 1605 Baron de Poutrincourt established Port Royal (now Annapolis Royal, in Nova Scotia), the first actual settlement by Europeans. In 1608 Champlain founded Quebec.

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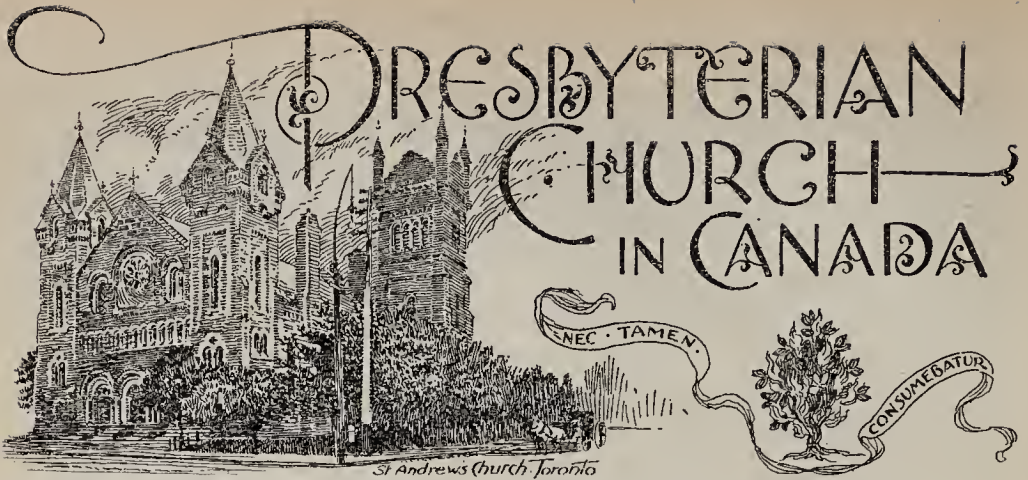

THE SUCCESSION DUTY ACT.

R.S.O. (1397), CHAP. 24 AND AMENDMENTS THERETO.

This Act applies to the Estates of all persons dying after 1st July, 1892.

The word "property" includes real and personal property of every description and every estate or interest therein capable of being devised or bequeathed by will or of passing on the death of the owner to his heirs or personal representatives.

The word "child" shall be deemed to include any lawful child of the deceased or any lineal descendant of such child or any person or persons adopted before the age of twelve years by the deceased as his child or children or any infant to whom the deceased for not less than ten years immediately prior to his death stood in the acknowledged relationship of a parent or any lineal descendant of such adopted child as aforesaid born in lawful wedlock.

The phrase "aggregate value" means the value of the property after the debts, encumbrances or other allowances (set out in the act) are deducted therefrom and shall include property situate outside of the Province as well as within.

"Dutiable value" means the value of the property after the debts, encumbrances or other allowances are deducted therefrom.

In determining the dutiable value of any property the value shall be taken as at the date of the death of the deceased, and allowance shall be made for reasonable funeral expenses and for his debts and encumbrances, but an allowance shall not be made (a) for debts incurred by the deceased or encumbrances created by a disposition made by the deceased unless such debts or encumbrances were incurred or created *bona fide* for full consideration in money or money's worth wholly for the deceased's own use and benefit and take effect out of his interest. (b) For any debt in respect whereof there is a right to reimbursement from any other estate or person. (c) More than once for the same debt or encumbrance charged upon different portions of the estate.

No duty shall be leviable:—

(1) On any estate the aggregate value of which does not exceed \$10,000. (2) On property devised or bequeathed for religious, charitable or educational purposes to be carried on by a corporation or persons domiciled within the Province of Ontario. (3) On property passing under a will intestacy or otherwise to or for the use of a father, mother, husband, wife, child, daughter-in-law or son-in-law of the deceased, where the aggregate value of the property as defined by this Act passing to the persons mentioned does not exceed \$50,000.

Save as aforesaid the following property shall be subject to a succession duty:—

(a) All property situate within this Province and any interest therein or income therefrom, whether the deceased person owning or entitled thereto was domiciled in Ontario at the time of his death or was domiciled elsewhere, and all moveable or personal property locally situate out of this Province and any interest therein where the owner was domiciled in this Province at the time of his death, whether such property passes by will or intestacy.

(b) All property situate as aforesaid or any interest therein or income therefrom, which shall be voluntarily transferred by deed, grant, bargain, sale or gift made in contemplation of the death of the grantor, bargainor, vendor or donor, or made or intended to take effect in possession or enjoyment after such death to any person in trust or otherwise or by reason whereof any person shall become beneficially entitled in possession or expectancy to any property or the income thereof.

(c) Any property taken as a *donatio mortis causa* made by any person dying, on or after the 7th April, 1896, or taken under a disposition made by any person so dying purporting to operate as an immediate gift, during life, whether by transfer, delivery, declaration of trust, or otherwise which shall not have been *bona fide* made twelve months before death of deceased.

(d) Any property which a person dying on or after the 7th day of April, 1896, having been absolutely entitled thereto has caused or may cause to be transferred to or vested in himself, and any other person jointly whether by disposition or otherwise so that the beneficial interest therein or in some part thereof passes or accrues by survivorship on his death to such other person, including also any purchase or investment effected by the person who was absolutely entitled to the property either by himself alone or in concert or by arrangement with any other person.

(e) Any property passing under any past or future settlement including any trust whether in writing or otherwise, and whether for valuable consideration or not made by any person dying on or after 7th April, 1896, by deed or other instrument not taking effect as a will whereby any interest in such property or the proceeds thereof for life or any other period is reserved to the settlor, or whereby the settlor may have reserved the right to exercise any power to restore to himself the absolute interest in such property.

(f) Any annuity or other interest purchased or provided by any person dying on or after 7th April, 1896, either by himself alone or in concert with any other person to the extent of the beneficial interest arising by survivorship or otherwise on the death of the deceased.

(g) Any interest in dower or by the courtesy in any land of the person so dying to which the wife or husband of the deceased becomes entitled on the decease of such person.

Where the aggregate value of the deceased's property exceeds \$50,000, and passes in manner aforesaid either in whole or in part to or for the benefit of the father, mother, husband, wife, child, son-in-law or daughter-in-law of the deceased, the same or so much thereof as so passes (as the case may be) shall be subject to a duty at the rate and on the scale as follows:—

(a) Where the said aggregate value exceeds \$50,000 and does not exceed \$75,000, 1 per cent.

(b) Exceeds \$75,000 and does not exceed \$100,000, 2 per cent.

(c) Exceeds \$100,000 and does not exceed \$150,000, 3 per cent.

(d) Exceeds \$150,000 and does not exceed \$200,000, 4 per cent.

(e) Exceeds \$200,000, 5 per cent.

Provided where the value of any dutiable property exceeds \$100,000 and the amount passing in manner aforesaid to any one person exceeds the amount hereinafter mentioned, a further duty shall be paid on the amount so passing in addition to the rates in the foregoing paragraph mentioned as follows:—

(a) Where the whole amount so passing to one person exceeds \$100,000 and does not exceed \$200,000, 1 per cent.

(b) Exceeds \$200,000 and does not exceed \$400,000, 1½ per cent.

(c) Exceeds \$400,000 and does not exceed \$600,000, 2 per cent.

(d) Exceeds \$600,000 and does not exceed \$800,000, 2½ per cent.

(e) Exceeds \$800,000, 3 per cent.

Where the aggregate value of the property of the deceased exceeds \$10,000, so much thereof as passes to or for the benefit of the grandfather or grandmother or any other lineal ancestor of the deceased, except the father and mother, or to any brother or sister of the deceased, or to any descendant of such brother or sister, or to a brother or sister of the father or mother of the deceased, or to any descendant of such last mentioned brother or sister shall be subject to a duty of \$5 for every \$100 of the value.

Provided that where the value of any dutiable property exceeds \$50,000, and the amount passing in manner aforesaid to any one person mentioned in the next preceding subsection, except the father and mother, exceeds the amount hereinafter mentioned, a further duty shall be paid on the amount so passing in addition to the duty in the next preceding subsection mentioned as follows:—

(a) Where the whole amount so passing to one person exceeds \$50,000 and does not exceed \$100,000, 1 per cent.

(b) Exceeds \$100,000 and does not exceed \$150,000, 1½ per cent.

(c) Exceeds \$150,000 and does not exceed \$200,000, 2 per cent.

(d) Exceeds \$200,000 and does not exceed \$250,000, 2½ per cent.

(e) Exceeds \$250,000 and does not exceed \$300,000, 3 per cent.

(f) Exceeds \$300,000 and does not exceed \$350,000, 3½ per cent.

(g) Exceeds \$350,000 and does not exceed \$400,000, 4 per cent.

(h) Exceeds \$400,000 and does not exceed \$450,000, 4½ per cent.

(i) Exceeds \$450,000, 5 per cent.

Where the aggregate value of the property of the deceased exceeds \$10,000, and any part thereof passes to or for the benefit of any person in any other degree of collateral consanguinity to the deceased than is above described, or to or for the benefit of any stranger in blood to the deceased, save as hereinbefore provided for the same, shall be subject to a duty of \$10 for every \$100 of the value.

Any portion of an estate where the deceased at time of death is domiciled in Ontario, and which is brought into Ontario by executors or administrators to administer shall be liable to duty, but if any succession duty or tax has been paid thereon elsewhere than in Ontario, and such duty or tax so collected is greater than the duty payable in this Province no duty shall be payable thereon; but if the duty so paid elsewhere is less than the Ontario duty then the difference must be paid.

Where any duty or tax shall have been paid by the estate upon any moveable or personal property locally situate outside of Ontario or any interest therein, an allowance shall be made for any outside duty paid thereon; the difference, if any, between the outside and Ontario duty shall be likewise paid. Provided the above allowances and differences are only made with

respect to any country, state or British Province or possession where a similar allowance is made for the duty or tax paid under this Act on property in Ontario passing on the death of any person domiciled in any such outside country.

Should an executor or administrator, in order to escape payment of Succession Duty, distribute any part of said estate without bringing the same into Ontario, such executor or administrator shall be liable, personally, to pay His Majesty the amount of duty as if such assets had been brought within Ontario, provided that this shall not apply to payments made to persons domiciled out of Ontario from assets situate without the Province.

No foreign executor or administrator shall assign or transfer any stocks or shares in Ontario standing in the name of a deceased person, or in trust for him, which are liable to pay Succession Duty until such duty is paid or security given therefore as provided, and any corporation allowing a transfer of any stocks or shares contrary to this provision shall be liable to pay the duty.

An executor or administrator applying for letters probate or administration to the estate of a deceased person shall, before the issue of such letters to him, make and file with the Surrogate Registrar a full and correct statement under oath, giving (a) full itemized inventory of all the property of the deceased and the market value thereof. (b) The several persons to whom the same will pass under the will or intestacy and the degree of relationship in which they stand to the deceased; and such executor or administrator shall, before the issue of such letters probate, deliver to the Surrogate Registrar a bond, in a penal sum equal to ten per cent. of the sworn value of such property liable to Succession Duty, executed by himself and two sureties to be approved of by the Registrar conditioned for the due payment of any duty to which the property may be found liable.

Should the Treasurer of Ontario be not satisfied with the value so sworn to or with the correctness of the Inventory, he shall direct the Sheriff of the County or City to make a valuation and appraise the said property, and provision is made for an appeal from such appraisal to the Surrogate Judge of the County within thirty days after making and filing such assessment. The duties imposed by the Act unless otherwise provided for shall be due and payable at the death of the deceased or within eighteen months thereafter. Should they not then be paid interest at 5 per cent. per annum from death of deceased shall be charged and collected, and same shall be a lien upon the property in respect to which they are payable until fully paid. Provision is made however as regards postponement of the duty payable on any future or contingent estates, income or interest, with the consent of the Provincial Treasurer in writing, until such estate, income or interest comes into possession. The Treasurer of the Province, on being satisfied that the full amount of Succession Duty has been or will be paid in respect of an estate or in part thereof shall, if required, give to the person accounting for the duty a certificate which shall discharge from any further claim the property shown by the certificate to form the estate.

An administrator, executor or trustee having in charge or trust any estate, legacy or property subject to duty shall deduct same therefrom or collect the duty thereon from the person entitled to such property, and shall not deliver any property subject to duty to any person until he has collected the duty thereon.



LEGAL AND JUDICIARY.

Supreme Court of the Dominion.

The Supreme Court, as a high Court of Appeal constituted by Dominion Statute (see Revised Statutes of Canada, Chap. 135), is composed of a Chief Justice and five Puisne Judges, and has appellate, civil and criminal jurisdiction within and throughout the Dominion of Canada. The Judges reside at Ottawa, where the Supreme Court holds annually three Sessions—the first beginning on the third Tuesday in February, the second on the first Tuesday in May, and the third on the first Tuesday in October.

The Exchequer Court of the Dominion.

The Exchequer Court, also constituted under a Dominion Statute (see 50-51 Vict. Chap. 16), is presided over by one Judge and has original exclusive jurisdiction in all claims, suits or actions against the Crown. It has concurrent jurisdiction in relation to revenue cases and the enforcement of penalties, in cases in which it is sought at the instance of the Attorney-General of Canada to impeach or annul any patent of invention, or any patent case or other instrument respecting lands; cases against Crown officers for anything done or omitted to be done as such officer, and all actions or suits in which the Crown is plaintiff or petitioner.

Admiralty Division.

In pursuance of the powers given by "The Colonial Court of Admiralty Act, 1890," the Exchequer Court of Canada is declared a Colonial Court of Admiralty (See 54-55 Vic., Cap. 29.)

The Admiralty Court has all rights and remedies in all matters (including cases of contract and tort and proceedings *in rem* and *in personam*) arising out of or in connection with navigation, shipping, trade and commerce, which may be had or enforced in any Colonial Court of Admiralty, under "The Colonial Court of Admiralty Act, 1890," throughout Canada and the waters thereof, whether tidal or non-tidal, or naturally navigable or artificially made so.

Admiralty business may be transacted at the office of the Exchequer Court at Ottawa, or at the local registry offices.

There are Admiralty Districts presided over by Local Judges in Admiralty as follows:—

(a) The Province of Quebec constitutes the District of Quebec with Registry at the City of Quebec.

(b) The Province of Nova Scotia constitutes the District of Nova Scotia with Registry at the City of Halifax.

(c) The Province of New Brunswick constitutes the District of New Brunswick with Registry at the City of St. John.

(d) The Province of Prince Edward Island constitutes the District of Prince Edward Island with Registry at the City of Charlottetown.

(e) The Province of British Columbia constitutes the District of British Columbia with Registry at the City of Victoria.

(f) The Toronto Admiralty District has its Registry at the City of Toronto, the limits being from time to time fixed by the Governor-in-Council.

(g) The Yukon Admiralty District has its Registry at the City of Dawson, the limits being the Yukon Territory.

The Supreme Court of Judicature for Ontario.

COURT OF APPEAL FOR ONTARIO.—Constituted for the hearing of appeals from the High Court of Justice, and from the County Courts. From the judgment of this Court an appeal lies, at the option of litigants, either to the Supreme Court of the Dominion, or to His Majesty in Privy Council, in cases over £1,000, or where annual rent, fee, or future rights of any amount, are affected. The Judges of this Court may be placed on the rota for the trial of Election petitions, with the Justices of the High Court, who as *ex-officio* Judges of this Court, choose from their number a Judge or Judges to sit in Appeal in case of there being a vacancy in this Court, or if, from illness or some other cause, one of the Judges of the Court is unable to be present, or is under any legal disqualification to hear an appeal. Sittings are held at such times and for such periods as the Judges shall, from time to time, deem necessary or convenient for the speedy dispatch of business, the five regular sittings being the first Tuesday in March and September, and the second Tuesday in January, May and November, due notice of the time of holding of further sittings being given. If required, a second division of the Court, consisting of Judges of the High Court, can also sit for the disposal of business.

High Court of Justice for Ontario.

The jurisdiction of this Court extends to all manner of actions, causes and suits, criminal and civil, real, personal and mixed, within Ontario, and it may proceed in such, by such process and course as are provided by law, and as shall tend with justice and despatch to determine the same; and may hear and determine all issues of law, and also (with the inquest of twelve good and lawful men in the cases provided for) try all issues of fact, and give judgment, and award execution thereon, and also in matters which relate to the King's Revenue (including the condemnation of contraband or smuggled goods) as may be done by His Majesty's Superior Courts of Law in England, and also the like jurisdiction as the Court of Chancery in England, in cases of fraud, accident, trusts, executors, administrators,

co-partnerships, account, mortgages, awards, dower, infants, idiots, lunatics and their estates, waste, specific performance, discovery, and to prevent multiplicity of suits, and may decree the issue, repeal, or voidance of letters patent, and generally the like powers which the Court of Chancery in England possesses to administer justice in all cases in which there is no adequate remedy at law.

Divisional Court sittings are held on the first Monday of each month (except vacation) to dispose of such matters as may properly be brought before a Divisional Court.

LAW CIRCUITS.—Sittings for Hearing of Actions.—In the Counties of York, Wentworth, Carleton and Middlesex, there is held an additional such Court in every year, in the vacation between Michaelmas and Hilary Terms; and in the County of York there is held another such Court, between Easter Term and the first day of July. Whenever in any year the Judges may determine that it is not necessary to hold the latter such sittings may be dispensed with. The sittings for hearing of actions may, in the discretion of the Judges, be held separate and apart from the Courts of Oyer and Terminer, and General Gaol Delivery.

The Courts in each Circuit are presided over by the Chancellor or by a retired or present Justice of the High Court or of the Court of Appeal, or by a Judge of a County Court, or by some one of His Majesty's Counsel learned in the law, requested by the Chancellor or one of the Justices to act in that behalf.

WEEKLY SITTINGS.—A Judge sits at Osgoode Hall every week except vacation for the purpose of disposing of all business except trials which may be transacted by a single Judge. Chamber business on Tuesdays and Fridays. Court business on Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. Sittings will be held at Ottawa and London respectively at least one day in each week (except vacation) to dispose of certain matters which can be determined by a single Judge. The Judges have now power on petition to constitute monthly or semi-monthly sittings in lieu of weekly.

CHAMBERS.—Chambers are held each day for such business relating to actions as may be transacted by a single judge out of Court. The Master in Chambers is empowered to obtain the assistance of any Official Referee to sit with or for him.

LONG VACATION extends from the 1st of July to the 31st of August, both inclusive. There is also a vacation from the 24th December to 6th January, both inclusive.

COURTS FOR THE TRIAL OF CONTROVERTED ELECTIONS.—The nature of these courts is sufficiently indicated in their title. In respect to elections for the House of Commons of Canada, the Superior Courts by one of their Judges appointed in that behalf, are invested with special jurisdiction for the trial of contested elections, and appeals lie to the Supreme Court at Ottawa. In respect to elections for the Local Legislature of Ontario, the Judges of the Supreme Court of Judicature meet annually on or before the day next preceding the Christmas Vacation, and severally elect, by a majority of votes, a Judge from their respective Courts or Division to be placed on the rota for the trial of election petitions during the ensuing year. In the case of death or the illness of a Judge so chosen, the Court of which he is a member meet and elect another Judge. Trials involving corrupt practices are presided over by two Judges, otherwise a single Judge presides, and an appeal lies to the Court of Appeal of the Province.

COUNTY COURTS.—Presided over by a resident Judge in each county, assisted in some counties by a Deputy or Junior Judge. Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed \$200; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties or signature of the defendant, to \$600; and to all bail bonds and recognizances of bail given in the County Court, to any amount; in actions of contract to any amount if parties agree to try same in County Court, for recovery of or trespass to land where land does not exceed \$200 in value, partnership actions where capital was not over \$1,000, for legacies not exceeding \$200, where estate is \$1,000 or under, to enforce mortgages or liens, or for redemption, or for equitable relief where claim does not exceed \$200, to

establish claim on insolvent estate where claim does not exceed \$400; but not to cases involving the title to lands of greater value than \$200, validity of devises or bequests exceeding \$200, nor where estate exceeds \$1,000, or actions for libel, slander, crim. con., or seduction. An appeal lies to a Divisional Court.

COUNTY COURT SITTINGS AND COURT OF GENERAL SESSIONS.—The County Judge in each county holds a sitting of his Court and a Court of General Sessions in his county, for the trial of issues of fact, semi-annually on the second Tuesday in June and December, except in the County of York, in which county said Court is held four times, commencing on the first Tuesday in December and March, and the second Tuesday in May and September, the latter Courts for the trial of cases of felony and misdemeanor, but treason and capital felonies are exempted from their jurisdiction, and (except in the County of York) a sitting for the trial of issues without a jury shall be held in each county on the first Tuesday in April and October in each year. The Judge may also, in his discretion, hold additional sittings at such times as may be deemed expedient to expedite business, but only for the trial of issues of fact without a jury.

COUNTY JUDGE'S CRIMINAL COURT.—Persons committed to jail for trial, on charge of being guilty of any offence for which they may be tried at a Court of General Sessions may, with their own consent, and subject to the provisions of the Act in that behalf, be forthwith tried by the Judge of the County Court and General Sessions without a jury, and if convicted, be sentenced by said Judge; and the Judge sitting on any such trial for all the purposes thereof, is constituted a Court of Record, and the record in any such case shall be filed among the records of the Court of General Sessions last mentioned.

COUNTY COURT TERMS.—The several County Courts in Ontario hold four sittings in each year, commencing respectively on the second Monday in the month of January, and the first Monday in the months of April, July, and October, except the County of York, which commences on the first Monday in April, and the second Monday in January, June and October, and ending on the Saturday of the same week, unless extended by order of the Judge.

COURTS OF REVISION.—The County Judges hold annually Courts of final revision of the Assessment Rolls of each Municipality, being in the light of Courts of Appeal from the first Court of Revision held by the Municipality; and also Courts for the Revision of the Voters' Lists for Provincial Elections.

SURROGATE COURTS.—The jurisdiction of these Courts relates to all testamentary matters and causes, and to the granting and revoking of probate of wills, and letters of administration of the effects of deceased persons having estate or effect in Ontario, and all matters arising out of or connected with the grant or revocation of probate or administration, subject to an appeal to the Chancery Division. The County Judges are also Judges of the Surrogate Courts.

DIVISION COURTS are held for the summary disposal of cases by the presiding Judge, being the County Judge or his Deputy, or any Barrister appointed to hold the same; but a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain cases. Their jurisdiction extends to actions of debt or contract where the balance claimed is over \$100 and under \$200 and the original amount was ascertained by the signature of the defendant, and to \$100 in other cases of debt, subject in some cases to an appeal to the Court of Appeal; but the sum of the account to be gone into cannot exceed \$400; injuries or torts to personal chattels amounting to \$60; and personal actions to that amount, if not excepted from their jurisdiction; but not to actions for gambling debts, liquor drunk in a tavern, or notes of hand given therefor, ejectment, title to land, &c., or any toll, custom or franchise, will or settlement, malicious prosecution, libel, slander, crim. con., seduction or breach of promise, or actions against a J. P. for anything done by him in the execution of his office, if he objects to it. Each Judicial District is divided into Court Divisions, and Courts are held once in two months in each Division, or oftener at the discretion of the Judge. The Divisions are established by the Courts of General Sessions, and in certain cases by the Judges.

Synopsis of Fishery Laws.

Net fishing of any kind is prohibited in public waters, except under Leases or Licenses. The size of nets is regulated so as to prevent the killing of young fish. Nets cannot be set or seines used so as to bar channels or bays. A general weekly Close-time is provided in addition to special close seasons. The use of Explosive or Poisonous substances for catching or killing fish is illegal. The use of fire-arms for killing fish is prohibited. Mill-dams must be provided with efficient fish passes.

The above enactments and close seasons are supplemented in special cases, under authority of the *Dominion Fisheries Act* (Chap. 95 R. S.), by a total prohibition of fishing for stated periods. All communications relating to Fisheries should be addressed: Department of Marine and Fisheries, Ottawa.

Abstract of Ontario Game Laws.

No person not a resident and domiciled in Ontario, may hunt or kill any game animal or bird in Ontario without having procured a non-resident license.

Deer.—Open season November 1st to November 15th, both days inclusive.

Only two *Deer* may be taken in one season by one person.

Moose, Reindeer or Caribou.—No moose, reindeer or caribou shall be hunted, taken or killed in that part of Ontario lying to the south of the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway from the town of Mattawa to the Manitoba boundary, except from the 1st day of November to the 15th day of November, both days inclusive, in each year. Throughout all that part of the Province of Ontario lying north and west of the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway from Mattawa to the Manitoba boundary the open season for moose, reindeer or caribou shall be from October 16th to November 15th, both days inclusive.

Only one *Moose, Reindeer or Caribou* may be taken in one season by one person.

No cow *Moose*, or young *Moose, Reindeer or Caribou* under the age of one year can be killed.

No *Elk or Wapiti* shall be hunted, taken or killed at any time in Ontario.

No hounds or dogs accustomed to pursue *Deer* are allowed at large where *Deer* are found, during the close season for *Deer*.

Hounds or dogs running *Deer* during the close season may be killed on sight by any person, who shall not be liable to damage for so doing.

No person may transport or have in possession, except from November 1st to 15th, any wild *Deer, Moose, Reindeer or Caribou*, or head raw skin or other part thereof,

unless accompanied by affidavit that same was taken during the open season or legally taken in another province of the Dominion. *Deer, Moose, Reindeer or Caribou* may not be carried or transported unless a license shipping coupon is attached.

Ducks.—Open season September 1st to December 15th, both days inclusive.

Geese and Swans.—Open season September 15th to May 1st in the following year, both days inclusive.

Grouse.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive.

Hares.—Open season October 1st to December 31st.

Capercaillie.—Open season September 15 to December 15. May not be hunted, taken or killed before September 15, 1909.

Partridge.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive. May not be bought or sold before the 15th day of September, 1910.

Pheasants and Plover.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive. English or Mongolian Pheasants may not be killed before the 15th day of September, 1910.

Prairie Fowl.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive. May not be killed before the 15th day of September, 1910.

Quail.—Open season November 1st to November 30th, both days inclusive. May not be bought or sold before the 1st day of November, 1910.

Rail.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive.

Turkeys, Wild.—Open season November 1st to November 30th, both days inclusive. May not be killed before the 15th day of October, 1910.

Snipe and Woodcock.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive. May not be sold before the 15th day of September, 1910.

Insectivorous birds may not be caught, killed or sold, or had in possession without a permit, except Hawks, Crows, Black-birds and English Sparrows.

Squirrels (Black and Grey).—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive.

Beaver and Otter.—Open season November 1st to April 1st in following year, both days inclusive. May not be taken or killed before the 1st day of November, 1910.

Muskrats.—Open season January 1st to May 1st, both days inclusive. But no *Muskrat* may be shot during the month of April.

Collegiate Institutes and High Schools.

Each of the High Schools (which form the intermediate link between the Public Schools and the Universities) is managed by a Board of Trustees, appointed jointly by the County and Town Councils. In cities the Trustees may be appointed by the City Councils, or may be elected by general vote of qualified electors. Separate School Boards of Trustees have also the right to appoint trustees. The Principal of the High School or Collegiate Institute must be a graduate of a British or Colonial University, and certified as experienced in teaching. Assistants must also have received the prescribed training. Fees are charged in many cases, and local rates must be raised. Every High School should have a Principal and at least two assistant teachers. Each school receives a fixed amount of \$375, and also a certain sum on salaries of teachers, general equipment, suitability of school premises and attendance. High Schools which have complied with certain conditions as to equipment, special teachers, etc., may be made Collegiate Institutes, and receive additional grant. Pupils attending these schools are prepared for Matriculation to the Universities. There were 42 Collegiate Institutes and 98 High Schools in Ontario in 1905.

Public Schools.—Each Township is divided into School Sections of a suitable extent for one School; and in each of these Sections three Trustees are elected to manage its School affairs. In Cities, Towns and Villages, the Schools are managed by a Board of School Trustees elected from the Municipality.

Educational Museum.—Connected with the Education Department is a Museum, containing specimens of school apparatus, etc., a valuable collection of Italian, Dutch and Flemish Oil Paintings, and Statuary casts and busts. Here also is the largest collection of archaeological material in the Dominion, chiefly illustrative of Ontario, and of North America. David Boyle, Curator of Museum. The Museum is open to the public from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

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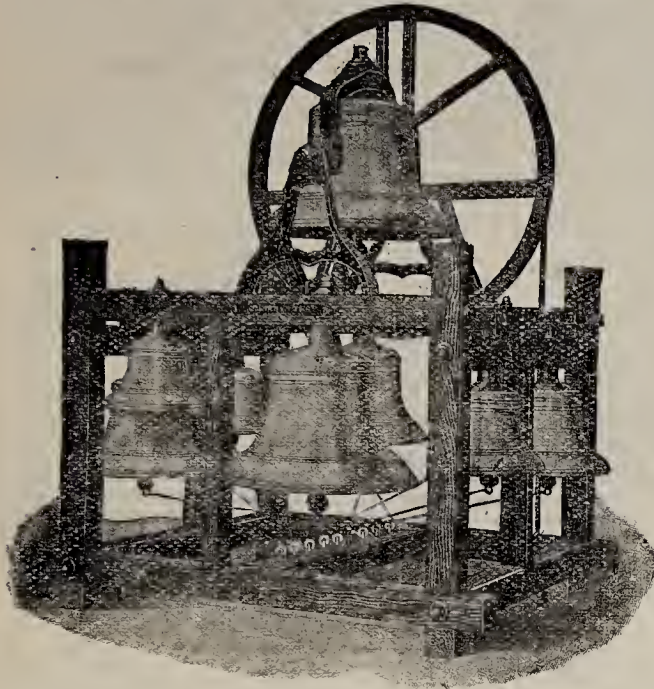
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CANADIAN TARIFF OF CUSTOMS

MEANING OF TERMS USED

1. That unless the context otherwise requires—
 - (a) The initials "M. ft." represent and have the meaning of the words "one thousand feet board measure;"
 - (b) The initials "n.o.p." represent and have the meaning of the words "not otherwise provided for;"
 - (c) The expression "gallon" means an Imperial gallon;
 - (d) The expression "ton" means two thousand pounds avoirdupois;
 - (e) The expression "proof," "proof spirit" or "proof spirits," when applied to wines or spirits of any kind, means spirits of a strength equal to that of pure ethyl alcohol compounded with distilled water in such proportions that the resultant mixture shall at a temperature of sixty-two degrees Fahrenheit have a specific gravity of 0.9187 as compared with that of distilled water at the same temperature;
 - (f) The expression "gauge," when applied to metal sheets or plates or to wire, means the thickness as determined by the Imperial Standard Gauge;
 - (g) The expression "in diameter," when applied to tubing, means the actual inside diameter;
 - (h) The expression "sheet," when applied to metals, means a sheet or plate not exceeding three-sixteenths of an inch in thickness;
 - (i) The expression "plate," when applied to metals means a plate or sheet more than three-sixteenths of an inch in thickness;
 - (j) The initials "p.c." in any one of the Tariff Columns in Schedule "A" to these Resolutions represent and have the meaning of the words "per centum, ad valorem";
 - (k) The word "free" in any one of the Tariff Columns in said Schedule "A" means that the goods opposite which the word appears, and to which the Tariff in said Column applies, may be imported and taken out of warehouse for consumption in Canada, without duty;
 - (l) The expression "iron" includes "steel";
 - (m) The expression "rolled iron" or "rolled steel" means iron or steel hot rolled only.

BRITISH PREFERENTIAL TARIFF

- (1) That the rates of Customs duties, if any, set forth in Column 1 "British Preferential Tariff" shall apply to goods the produce or manufacture of the following British countries when imported direct from any British country:
 - (a) The United Kingdom;
 - (b) The British Colony of Bermuda;
 - (c) The British Colonies commonly called the British West Indies, including the following:
 - The Bahamas;
 - Jamaica;
 - Turks and Caicos Islands;
 - The Leeward Islands (Antigua, St. Christopher-Nevis, Dominica, Montserrat, and the Virgin Islands);
 - The Windward Islands (Grenada, St. Vincent and St. Lucia);
 - Barbadoes;
 - Trinidad and Tobago;
 - (d) British Guiana;
 - (e) British India;
 - (f) Ceylon;
 - (g) Straits Settlements;
 - (h) New Zealand;
 - (i) Cape of Good Hope;
 - (j) Natal;
 - (k) Orange River;
 - (l) Transvaal;
 - (m) Southern Rhodesia;
 - (n) Any other British Colony or possession admitted to the benefit of the British Preferential Tariff in Canada, in the manner hereinafter provided;

INTERMEDIATE TARIFF

- (2) That the rates of Customs duties, if any, set forth in Column 2 "Intermediate Tariff" shall apply:

(a) To goods the produce or manufacture of any British or foreign country to which the benefits of such Intermediate Tariff shall have been extended in the manner hereinafter provided, when imported direct from such foreign country or from a British country.

GENERAL TARIFF

- (3) That the rates of Customs duties, if any, set forth in Column 3 "General Tariff" shall apply to all goods not entitled to admission under the Intermediate Tariff or under the British Preferential Tariff aforesaid.

PROOF OF ORIGIN

(4) That proof of origin, as prescribed by the Minister of Customs, shall be furnished with the bill of entry at the Custom House for goods admitted to entry under any of the Tariffs in Schedule A; and that the decision of the Minister of Customs shall be final as to the Tariff or Surtax applicable in any case to imported goods by reason of their origin:

Provided, that goods for which entry is claimed under the Intermediate Tariff shall be bona fide the produce or manufacture of a country which has been admitted to the benefits of such Intermediate Tariff;

Provided further that every manufactured article to be admitted under the British Preferential Tariff shall be bona fide the manufacture of a British country entitled to the benefits of such British Preferential Tariff, and that a substantial portion of the value of the manufactured article has been produced by labor in one or more of such countries.

DUMPING CLAUSE

5. That in the case of articles exported to Canada of a class or kind made in Canada, if the export or actual selling price to an importer in Canada be less than the fair market value of the same article when sold for home consumption in the usual and ordinary course in the country whence exported to Canada at the time of its exportation to Canada there shall, in addition to the duties otherwise established, be levied, collected and paid on such article, on its importation into Canada, a special duty (or dumping duty) equal to the difference between the said selling price of the article for export and the said fair market value thereof for home consumption;

Provided that the said special duty shall not exceed fifteen per cent. ad valorem in any case;

Provided also that the following goods shall be exempt from such special duty, viz.:

- (a) Goods whereon the duties otherwise established are equal to fifty per cent. ad valorem;
- (b) Goods of a class subject to excise duty in Canada;
- (c) Sugar refined in the United Kingdom.

Provided further that excise duties shall be disregarded in estimating the market value of goods for the purposes of special duty when the goods are entitled to entry under the British Preferential Tariff.

(2) That the expression "export price" or "selling price" in this section shall be held to mean and include the exporter's price for the goods, exclusive of all charges thereon after their shipment from the place whence exported directly to Canada.

(3) That if at any time it appears to the satisfaction of the Governor-in-Council, on a report from the Minister of Customs, that the payment of the special duty by this section provided for is being evaded by the shipment of goods on consignment without sale prior to such shipment, the Governor-in-Council may in any case or class of cases authorize such action as is deemed necessary to collect on such goods or any of them the same special duty as if the goods had been sold to an importer in Canada prior to their shipment to Canada.

(4) That if the full amount of any special duty of customs is not paid on goods imported, the customs entry thereof shall be amended and the deficiency paid upon the demand of the Collector of Customs.

(5) That the Minister of Customs may make such regulations as are deemed necessary for carrying out the provisions of this section and for the enforcement thereof.

(6) That such regulations may provide for the temporary exemption from special duty of any article or class of articles, when it is established to the satisfaction of the Minister of Customs that such articles are not made or sold in Canada in substantial quantities, and offered for sale to all purchasers on equal terms.

(7) That such regulations may also provide for the exemption from special duty of any article when the difference between the fair market value and the selling price thereof to the importer as aforesaid amounts only to a small percentage of its fair market value.

SURTAX

6. That articles which are the produce or manufacture of any foreign country which treats imports from Canada less favourably than those from other countries may be subject to a Surtax over and above the duties specified in the said Schedule "A," such Surtax in every case to be one-third of the duty specified in the General Tariff in the said Schedule "A."

(1) That any question arising as to any foreign country or goods coming under the operations of the provisions in regard to the Surtax shall be decided by the Minister of Customs, whose decision shall be final;

Provided that the Governor-in-Council may make regulations for carrying out the purposes of this Resolution in regard to such Surtax, and may, by Order-in-Council, from time to time suspend the Surtax from application to the goods of any country.

FISH FROM NEWFOUNDLAND

7. That notwithstanding anything in these Resolutions, fish and other products of the fisheries of Newfoundland may be imported into Canada free of Customs duty until otherwise determined by the Governor-in-Council, by Order published in the *Canada Gazette*.

8. That fish caught by fishermen in Canadian fishing vessels and the products thereof carried from the fisheries in such vessels, shall be admitted into Canada free of duty, under regulations by the Minister of Customs.

DRAWBACK

9. That on the materials set forth in Schedule "B" to these Resolutions, there may be paid out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, the several rates of drawback of Customs duties set opposite to each item respectively in such Schedule, when

used for consumption in Canada for the purpose specified in the Schedule, under regulations by the Governor-in-Council.

PROHIBITED GOODS

10. That the importation into Canada of any goods enumerated, described or referred to in Schedule "C" hereto is prohibited; and that any such goods imported shall thereby become forfeited to the Crown and shall be destroyed or otherwise dealt with as the Minister of Customs directs; and that any person importing any such prohibited goods, or causing or permitting them to be imported, shall for each offence incur a penalty not exceeding two hundred dollars.

COMBINE CLAUSE

11. That whenever from or as a result of proceedings in any Court of Justice, it appears to the satisfaction of the Governor-in-Council, that with regard to any article of commerce there exists any conspiracy, combination, agreement or arrangement of any kind among manufacturers of such articles or dealers therein to unduly promote the advantage of the manufacturers or dealers at the expense of the consumers, the Governor-in-Council may admit the article free of duty, or so reduce the duty thereon as to give to the public the benefit of reasonable competition in the article, if it appears to the Governor-in-Council that such disadvantage to the consumer is facilitated by the duties of Customs imposed on a like article.

(2) That whenever the Governor-in-Council deems it to be in the public interest to enquire into any conspiracy, combination, agreement or arrangement alleged to exist among manufacturers or dealers in any article of commerce to unduly promote the advantage of the manufacturers or dealers in such article at the expense of the consumers, the Governor-in-Council may commission or empower any judge of the Supreme Court, or Exchequer Court of Canada, or of any Superior Court in any Province of Canada, to enquire in a summary way into and report to the Governor-in-Council whether such conspiracy, combination, agreement or arrangement exists.

(3) That the judge may compel the attendance of witnesses and examine them under oath and require the production of books and papers, and shall have such other necessary powers as are conferred upon him by the Governor-in-Council for the purpose of such enquiry.

(4) That if the judge reports that such conspiracy, combination, agreement or arrangement exists in respect of such article, the Governor-in-Council may admit the article free of duty, or so reduce the duty thereon as to give to the public the benefit of reasonable competition in the article, if it appears to the Governor-in-Council that such disadvantage to the consumer is facilitated by the duties of Customs imposed on a like article.

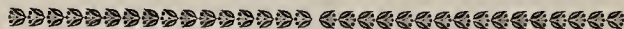

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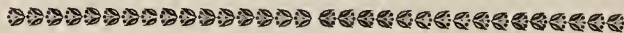

THE FRENCH TREATY.

(Circular from the Customs Department, dated 14th October, 1895.)

I beg to send herewith, for your information and guidance, text of a proclamation by the Governor in Council, dated the 10th day of October, 1895, declaring the provisions of the French Treaty Act in force on, from and after the 14th October, 1895.

You are hereby advised that the said Act provides as follows:—

“Wines, sparkling and non-sparkling, common soaps, savons de Marseille (Castile soaps) and nuts, almonds, prunes and plums of French origin entering Canada shall enjoy the following advantages:

1. Non-sparkling wines gauging 15 degrees by the centesimal alcoholometer or less, or according to the Canadian system of testing, containing 26 per cent. or less of alcohol, and all sparkling wines shall be exempted from the surtax or *ad valorem* duty of 30 per cent.

2. The present duty charged on common soaps, savons de Marseille (Castile soaps) shall be reduced by one-half.

3. The present duty charged on nuts, almonds, prunes and plums shall be reduced by one-third.

The following articles of Canadian origin imported direct from that country accompanied by certificates of origin shall receive the advantage of the minimum tariff on entering France, Algeria or the French colonies:—

- Canned meats.
- Condensed milk, pure.
- Fresh water fish, eels.
- Fish preserved in their natural form.
- Lobsters and crayfish preserved in their natural form.
- Apples and pears, fresh, dried or pressed.
- Fruits preserved, others.
- Building timber in rough or sawn.
- Wood pavement.
- Staves.
- Wood pulp (cellulose).
- Extract of chestnut and other tanning extracts.
- Common paper, machine-made.
- Prepared skins, others, whole.
- Boots and shoes.
- Furniture of common wood.
- Furniture other than chairs, of solid wood, common.
- Flooring in pine or soft wood.
- Wooden sea-going ships.

It is understood that the advantage of any reduction of

duty granted to any other power on any of the articles enumerated above shall be extended fully to Canada.”

Your attention is also directed to the following provisions of “An Act respecting Commercial Treaties affecting Canada,” Chap. 3, 58—59 Vict., viz. :—

“1. So soon as *The French Treaty Act, 1894*, chapter two of the Statutes of 1894, is brought into force by proclamation of the Governor General, the advantages granted to France by the treaty with that power mentioned in the said Act, with respect to its commerce with Canada, shall extend to any and every other foreign power which by reason of the operation of such treaty is, under the provisions of a treaty with Great Britain, entitled, in whole or in part, to the same or to the like advantages with respect to its commerce with Canada, to the extent to which in manner aforesaid such other foreign power is entitled thereto; and such advantages shall continue to so extend to such other foreign power so long as the said Act remains in force, or until the right of such other foreign power to such advantages under its treaty with Great Britain is sooner determined.

3. The advantages so granted to France by the said treaty shall extend also to Great Britain and to the several British colonies and possessions with respect to their commerce with Canada, so long as France continues to be entitled to such advantages; and during the period for which France is so entitled to such advantages, all laws inconsistent with the enjoyment thereof by Great Britain and such British colonies and possessions shall be suspended to the extent to which they are so inconsistent.”

The Foreign Powers entitled to the same advantages under the provisions of the said Act, as are granted to France by the Treaty in question, with respect to its commerce with Canada, are :—Argentine Republic, Germany (Zollverein), Austria Hungary, Muscat, Belgium, Russia, Bolivia, Salvador, Chili, Sweden, Norway, Columbia, Spain, Costa Rica.

Satisfactory proof of the origin of the goods in question shall be furnished to the collector at the time of entry

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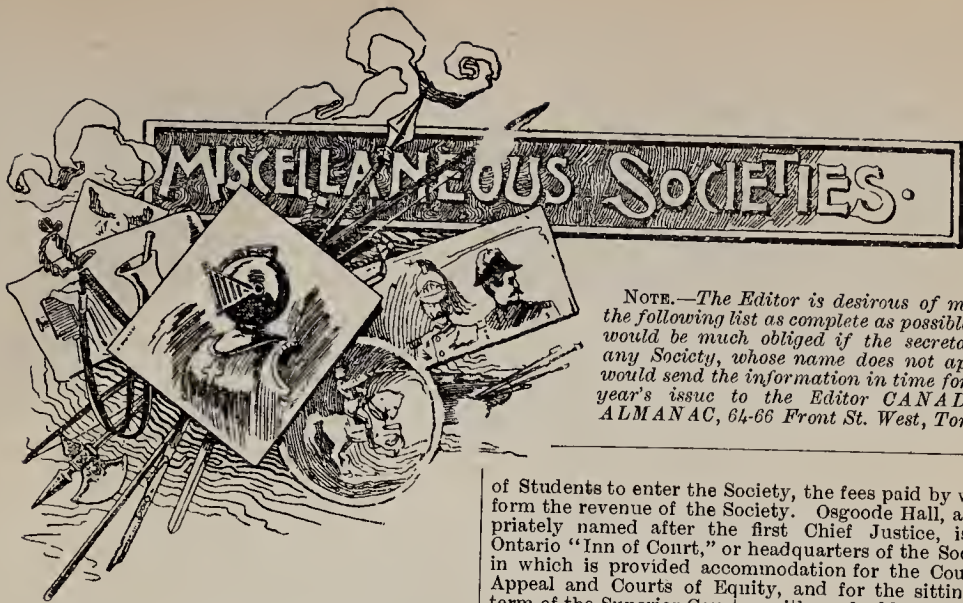

LIFE ASSURANCE.

Life assurance in Canada may be said to be entirely conducted by companies incorporated by the Dominion Parliament. Their operations are governed by the provisions of their Charter and those of the General Insurance Act of Canada.

During 1905, 40 active companies were engaged in business, of which 22 were Canadian, 6 British, and 12 United States. The new assurances effected for the year amounted to \$105,907,336, an increase of \$7,601,234 over those of 1904. The amount effected in each of the three classes of companies was as follows:

The aggregate assurance in force in Canada at the close of 1905 was \$630,334,240, or \$42,453,450 in excess of that existing at the close of 1904. The total was distributed thus:

That life assurance has developed and increased with the progress of the country, is abundantly evidenced by reviewing the figures contained in the following table, which sets forth the total assurance in force at the four periods, 1875, 1885, 1895 and 1905.

It will be observed that in the period of 30 years the total life assurance in force has increased 641%. The Canadian Companies have increased their totals in the same time 1,712%; the United States Companies 333%; and the British Companies 125%.

The premium income of the Companies has kept pace with the increased volume of business, and in 1905 amounted to \$22,080,717. The progress since 1875 has been uninterrupted, and is indicated below:

In the 30 years the amount paid by Canadians for life assurance has increased by 666%. The Canadian Companies' premium income in that time has increased 1,872% the United States Companies 327%; and the British Companies 141%.

The death rate in 1905 among the active companies was slightly below the average of previous years, being 10.33 per 1,000.

FOREIGN BUSINESS.

During recent years some of the Canadian Companies have extended their field of operation to places outside of Canada. This remark especially applies to the Canada Life, Confederation Life, Manufacturers Life, North American Life, and Sun Life.

SYSTEMS OF ASSURANCE.

On the following page will be found the premium rates of the principal companies for quinquennial ages, upon the ordinary systems of assurance, viz.: Whole Life; Whole Life with premiums limited to 10, 15, and 20 years; Endowment Assurance payable at the end of 10, 15 and 20 years, or at prior death with annual premiums limited to those periods. It will be observed that the premiums of the different companies vary very slightly. This is only to be expected in view of the fact that the same mortality table (the Institute of Actuaries Healthy Male Table) and the same rate of interest (3½%) are employed by practically all of the Canadian Companies.

BASIS OF RESERVE.

The Dominion Insurance Act stipulates that the valuation of policies of assurance issued prior to January 1st, 1900, shall be made on the Institute of Actuaries (Hm.) Table of Mortality, and a rate of interest not exceeding 4½%, and of policies issued after that date on the same Table of Mortality and 3½% interest. It further stipulates, in respect to policies issued prior to January 1st, 1900, that the rate of interest shall be modified to 4% in 1910, and 3½% in 1915. Several of the companies have already placed their reserves for all policies upon the stronger 4% Standard, while some have even gone so far as to anticipate the ultimate 3½% rate.

INVESTMENT POWERS.

Prior to 1899 the investment powers of Canadian Life Assurance Companies were determined by their respective Acts of Incorporation. At the 1899 Session of the Dominion Parliament the General Insurance Act was amended, enlarging and making general the investment powers of the companies. A detailed statement of the investments of these institutions will be found in the Yearly Report of the Superintendent of Insurance for the Dominion.

ANNUAL RETURNS.

The General Insurance Act requires each Company to make to Government a sworn return, embracing great detail, each year not later than the 1st day of March. These returns include statements of receipts, expenditures, assets, liabilities, policies issued and policies terminated. They are subsequently published in the report of the Superintendent of Insurance.

HISTORICAL DIARY FOR 1905-1906.

NOVEMBER, 1905.

2—Terrible riots in Odessa, Warsaw and many other parts of Russia. Many hundreds of people have been killed and wounded.

6—Death of Sir George Williams, founder of the Young Men's Christian Association, at the age of 84 years.

7—Count Witte has formed his first Ministry as follows: Count Witte, Prime Minister, without portfolio; Prince Urusoff, Minister of the Interior; M. J. Shipoff, Minister of Finance; Prince Eugene Troubetzkoi, Minister of Education; M. Shipoff, Minister of Agriculture.

Elections in the City of New York result in the election of Mr. McClellan, democrat, as mayor. W. T. Jerome re-elected district attorney.

9—Mutiny breaks out at Cronstadt, Russia. The sailors and soldiers turning their guns on the Cossacks.

The Prince and Princess of Wales arrive at Bombay, India.

First election in the new Province of Alberta. The Rutherford Government sustained by a large majority.

11—120 men of The Royal Canadian Regiment leave Toronto for Halifax to take up garrison duties.

14—A Plebiscite taken in Norway resulted in the choice of Prince Charles of Denmark to be King of Norway. A large majority of the votes being cast in his favor.

15—Owing to the serious situation caused by the general strike in Russia, foreigners are preparing to leave the country.

Rev. Isaac O. Stringer, of White Horse, elected Bishop of Selkirk by the House of Bishops.

16—J. P. Mabee, K.C., appointed Judge of the High Court of Ontario in succession to Judge Meredith.

17—The Emperor and Cabinet of Corea have agreed to transfer the control of foreign affairs to Japan.

Death of the Grand Duke Adolf, reigning sovereign of Luxemburg, at the age of 88 years.

The German Federal Council adopted the Navy Increase Bill, providing for largely increasing the German Navy. The entire additional cost to the year 1916 will be \$41,250,000.

Mr. Geo. C. Gibbons appointed to the position on the National Waterways Commission, formerly held by J. P. Mabee, K.C.

18 The Norwegian Storthing unanimously elected Prince Charles of Denmark King of Norway.

The Cabinet of Corea has agreed to adopt the proposition for a Japanese protectorate over Corea.

Prince Charles of Denmark accepts his election as King of Norway and adopts the name of Haakon VII.

19—Wreck of Steamer *Hilda* near St. Malo, on the north coast of France. More than 100 persons were drowned.

20—In London, England, a procession of 12,000 unemployed persons marched from the Victoria Embankment to Hyde Park where a mass meeting was held, the crowd being estimated at 80,000 persons.

21—Warships from Austria, Italy, France and Great Britain are ordered to Turkish waters to compel the Government to grant the Macedonian reforms.

22—The Government of Turkey has rejected the proposals of the Powers for the International control of the Finances of Macedonia.

By-elections for the Dominion House of Commons in four constituencies. North York carried by Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, West Lambton by Mr. F. F. Pardee, Wentworth by Mr. E. B. Smith, and Antigonish by Mr. Wm. Chisholm.

24—It is reported in London that Mr. Balfour, the Premier of Great Britain, is about to place his resignation in the hands of the King.

25—Official copies of the Russo-Japanese Treaty of Peace exchanged at Washington by Ambassador Rosen and Mr. Takahira.

The Canadian Northern Railway reaches Edmonton, Alta.

26—Death of Rev. R. H. Warden, D.D., General Agent of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, at the age of 65 years.

Serious revolt of sailors, soldiers, and workmen at Sebastopol, Russia.

The fleet of the Allied Powers arrives at the Island of Mytilene, to enforce the demands made by the Allied Powers on the Government of Turkey.

29—Richard A. McCurdy resigns the Presidency of the Mutual Life Insurance Co.

A desperate battle fought at Sebastopol between the mutinous sailors and the troops in the forts on the shore. The fleet of the mutineers, which numbered ten vessels, finally surrendered after a great loss of life on both sides.

DECEMBER, 1905.

1—Owing to the strike of the Telegraph operators in Russia communication between St. Petersburg, Moscow and Odessa is completely closed.

Lord Roberts has resigned from the Committee of Imperial Defence to organize the work of universal Military Training in Great Britain.

4—Opening of the 59th Congress of the United States. Mr. Cannon, Republican, elected speaker of the House.

The Right Honorable Arthur J. Balfour tendered the resignations of himself and the members of his Cabinet to King Edward, who accepted them. Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman accepted the task of forming a new Government.

6 Elections in New Zealand result in a victory for the Seddon Government.

7—Lieutenant-General Sakharoff, formerly Minister of War for Russia, assassinated by a woman at Saratoff

10—The new British Ministry, with Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman as Prime Minister, is officially announced. The Government includes John Morley, John Burns, Jas. Bryce, Sir Edward Grey, H. H. Asquith, and is looked upon generally as a strong administration.

11—Death of Edward Atkinson, the well-known social and political economist, at the age of 78 years.

13—First General Elections in the Province of Saskatchewan. The elections resulted in the return of 15 Liberals, 9 Conservatives, and 1 seat in doubt.

15—The Government of Turkey has formally surrendered to the demands of the Powers, and accepted the scheme providing for the financial control of Macedonia. The international fleet will be promptly withdrawn.

Mr. E. F. Hebden appointed General Manager of The Merchants Bank of Canada.

17—A general strike is declared in Russia. Insurrection is reported as spreading in the Provinces, and mutinies amongst the troops.

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18—The Chicago National Bank, The Home Savings Bank, and the Equitable Trust Co., all of Chicago, fail. The other banks of the City unite to secure payment of every depositor in full.

19—A general strike begins at Shanghai. Serious rioting has taken place.

21—The joint committee on Church Union consisting of representatives from the Presbyterian, Methodist, and Congregational bodies concluded its sessions in Toronto this evening. A full report of the deliberations will be presented to the public.

Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman in a speech made at Albert Hall, in London, announced that the Government would stop the importation of Chinese labor into South Africa. The announcement has caused a storm of indignation among the Conservatives and mine owners in Africa.

23—The report of the joint Committee on Church Union states substantially that there are no obstacles in the way of the union of the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational churches in Canada.

24—Desperate fighting in the streets of Moscow, Russia, between the revolutionaries and the loyal troops. The casualties are estimated at 5,000 persons killed and 14,000 wounded.

25—Death of Hon. Raymond Prefontaine, Minister of Marine and Fisheries for Canada, at Paris, France.

28—The Canadian Government accepts the offer of the British Government to convey the remains of the late Hon. Raymond Prefontaine from Cherbourg to Halifax, on the British warship *Dominion*.

JANUARY, 1906.

2—By the will of the late Chas. Yerkes it is provided that his residence, with its great collection of works of art, will be given to the public as an art gallery after his wife's death.

Beginning of the Printers' strike in New York City. One thousand printers have gone out on the demand for an eight-hour day.

3—Admiral Rojstvensky in a letter makes the statement that if Admiral Togo had not destroyed the Russian fleet, that the British fleet was lying in wait to finish the work. The statement has caused a sensation in diplomatic circles, and an explanation has been demanded by the British representative in Russia.

Mr. J. A. McCall resigned the Presidency of the New York Life Insurance Co., and Mr. Alexander E. Orr was appointed in his place at a salary of \$50,000 a year.

8—The British House of Commons dissolved by King Edward, and writs issued for a new Parliament, which has been summoned to meet on February 13th.

10—Death of W. R. Harper, LL.D., President of the University of Chicago, at the age of 49 years.

11—E. S. Banwell, the absconding teller of the Crown Bank, captured at Kingston, Jamaica.

Death of Mr. T. R. Merritt, President of the Imperial Bank, at the age of 82 years.

13—The Prince and Princess of Wales arrived at Rangoon, Burma, on their Indian tour.

14—The French Chargé d'Affaires, after he had gone on board a French mail steamer at La Guaira, Venezuela, was refused permission to land again. The rupture of diplomatic relations is complete, and a French naval demonstration is expected.

16—Death of Marshal Field, the Chicago millionaire merchant, at the age of 70 years.

The control of the garrison of Halifax, Nova Scotia, passed into the hands of the Canadian Government today.

Opening of the Moroccan Conference at Algeciras. The Duke of Almodovar, Spanish Minister of Foreign Affairs, unanimously elected President of the Conference.

17—M. Fallières elected President of France in succession to M. Loubet. The final figures were M. Fallières 448 votes, M. Doumer 371 votes.

22—The Brazilian battleship *Aquidaban* sunk near Rio Janeiro as the result of an explosion, 198 men killed, including three Brazilian admirals, and 36 injured.

The battleship *Dominion* arrived at Halifax with the body of the Hon. Raymond Prefontaine, late Minister of Marine.

24—Mr. John Milne, of Hamilton, appointed to the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission, in succession to Mr. P. W. Ellis, of Toronto, who has resigned this position.

Death of Rev. J. R. Sheraton, Principal of Wycliffe College, at the age of 64 years.

25—Death of Judge T. A. Lazier, Senior Judge of the County of Hastings, at the age of 79 years.

Funeral of the late Hon. Raymond Prefontaine at Montreal.

Death of General Joseph Wheeler, the famous Confederate cavalry officer at the age of 69 years.

28—Closing of the Torry-Alexander mission in Toronto. It is estimated that over 4,000 persons have been converted during the services.

29—Christian IX, King of Denmark, died at Copenhagen at the age of 88 years.

30—President Castro of Venezuela is preparing for the invasion of his country by France, and has appealed to both Germany and England, but the latter country has declined to intervene.

Mr. D. R. Wilkie elected President of the Imperial Bank, in succession of the late Mr. T. R. Merritt.

Frederick VIII proclaimed King of Denmark in succession to Christian IX.

31—As the result of the General Elections in Great Britain the new House of Commons will contain 359 Liberals, 51 Labor Members, 83 Nationalists, 157 Unionists.

Reports from Japan state that a serious famine exists in the northern part of the Empire. Out of a population of nearly 3,000,000 about one-third are in distress.

FEBRUARY, 1906.

3—Dr. Beattie Nesbitt resigned as member of the Ontario Legislature for North Toronto, and is appointed Registrar for West Toronto in succession to Mr. Chas. Lindsey.

6—Mr. A. H. U. Colquhoun appointed Deputy Minister of Education for Ontario, in succession to the late John Millar.

7—The Society Islands visited by a very destructive cyclone. It is estimated that in the island of Tahiti damage was done to the extent of about \$1,600,000. Reports indicate that about 10,000 persons perished during the storm, and the total damage will be about five millions of dollars.

9—Death of Paul Lawrence Dunbar, the poet of the Negro race.

The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway announces that they have decided to call the Pacific terminus for the road "Prince Rupert." This name was suggested by Miss Eleanor H. McDonald, of Winnipeg.

10—The monster battleship *Dreadnought* launched at Portsmouth, England, by King Edward. This ship will be the largest and most powerful battleship in the world, and will cost when finished about \$7,500,000.

11—Death of E. B. Eddy of Hull, at the age of 79 years.

12—The Imperial Protestant Federation of Great Britain has presented a petition to King Edward asking him to withhold his consent to the proposed marriage of Princess Ena of Battenburg to King Alfonso of Spain.

Great Britain has demanded from China that compensation be granted the Missionaries for the destruction of their property at Changpu, and also for the punishment of those responsible for the disorders.

13—The new British House of Commons assembled to-day, and re-elected the Right Honourable James Wm. Lowther as speaker.

15—Fire at St. John, N.B., causing a loss of about \$175,000.

Opening of the Second Session of the Eleventh Legislature of Ontario.

16—The Merchants Bank of Prince Edward Island has sold out to the Canadian Bank of Commerce.

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17—Marriage of Miss Alice Lee Roosevelt and Mr. Nicholas Longworth celebrated at Washington.

18—Death of John A. McCall, former President of the New York Life Assurance Co., at the age of 57 years.

Funeral ceremonies of the late King Christian IX of Denmark.

The Prince and Princess of Wales arrived at Benares, India.

19—The British Parliament opened by King Edward. The speech from the Throne foreshadowed many important reforms.

The Hungarian Parliament was dissolved this morning with the aid of the militia and police.

20—Prince Arthur of Connaught visits the Emperor of Japan at Tokio and confers on him the British Order of the Garter.

21—The United States Senate passed the Pure Food Bill which has been under consideration for about fifteen years. The vote was 63 to 4.

22—The Dominion Government have bought \$25,000 worth of flour to send to Japan to aid the sufferers from famine.

Bye-election in North Toronto for the Ontario Legislature. The result was as follows: W. K. McNaught, 3,828 votes; Thos. Urquhart, 2,505 votes; Jas. Simpson, 240 votes.

23—Bye-Election for the Dominion House of Commons in Maisonneuve resulted in the election of Mr. Alphonse Verville, labor candidate, over Mr. L. O. Grothe, Liberal, by about 1,100 majority.

25—The Intercolonial Railway shops and plant at Moncton, N.B., destroyed by fire, entailing a loss of about \$1,000,000.

26—The Dominion Government have appointed a Commission consisting of Judge MacTavish, Ottawa, Mr. J. W. Langmuir, Toronto, and Mr. A. L. Kent, Montreal, to investigate the whole question of Life Insurance in Canada.

MARCH, 1906.

1—The Annual Report of the Temiskaming and Northern Railway shows gross earnings of \$253,720.55.

Sir Frederick Borden, Minister of Militia, announces that he will appoint a Commission to enquire as to the value of the permanent corps.

Opening of the Student Volunteer Convention at Nashville, Tenn., with an attendance of about 4,000 delegates, of whom 200 are Canadians.

Death of Mr. F. W. Fearman of Hamilton, aged 82 years.

2—The Russian Government has issued a Manifesto which is to be incorporated in the fundamental laws of the Empire, guaranteeing the Russian people a system of Constitutional Government.

The town of Meridian, Miss., partly destroyed by a cyclone. It is reported that about 25 persons lost their lives.

3—The Ontario Government will appoint Counsel to represent Ontario Policy-holders before the Life Insurance Commission.

4—Death of Mrs. Kate Westlake Yeigh, the well-known Canadian authoress.

5—The estimates for the Province of Ontario were presented to the Legislature by Hon. Mr. Matheson. The estimated expenditure for 1906 is \$5,625,543.15, an increase over the expenditure of last year of \$229,526.41. The amount will likely be largely increased by the Supplementary estimates, which will be brought down later in the Session.

The experiments in electric smelting of iron ore, which have been carried on at Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., under the direction of Dr. Heroult, are completed, and have been entirely satisfactory.

6—Hon. Wm. Templeman, Minister of Inland Revenue, elected in Victoria, B.C., by a majority of 696.

7—Mr. Robt. Jaffray of Toronto appointed as Senator in the place of the late Senator Fulford and Dr. Douglas. Dr. Deveber, Mr. Peter Talbot and Mr. Philip Roy appointed Senators representing the North-West Territories.

The French Cabinet, headed by Prime Minister Rouvier, resigned their offices, having been defeated in the Chamber of Deputies.

Princess Ena of Battenburg formally professed Catholicism at the Miramar Palace, San Sebastian, Spain, receiving the baptismal name of Victoria.

8—Opening of the eighth session of the 10th Parliament of Canada. The speech from the Throne read by Governor-General Earl Grey.

9—The Rev. T. R. O'Meara appointed Principal of Wycliffe College, Toronto.

Death of Right Rev. Cornelius O'Brien, Archbishop of Halifax, at the age of 63 years.

10—M. Sorrien chosen Prime Minister of France.

A great mine disaster at the coal mines at Courrieres, near Lens, France. Explosion of fire-damp in the coal mines caused the death of about 1,100 men.

12—Death of Miss Susan B. Anthony.

14—Death of Hon. A. G. Jones, Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia, at the age of 82 years.

15—Opening of the first Session of the Alberta Legislature at Edmonton. The Speech from the Throne read by Hon. G. H. V. Bulyea, Lieutenant-Governor. Mr. C. W. Fisher, Banff, elected speaker.

16—A terrible railway accident on the Denver and Rio Grande Railway near Pueblo, Col. About fifty lives lost in the wreck.

17—The British Admiralty has decided to take out a Policy of marine insurance for £10,000,000, to cover the risk incurred by the inclusion of merchant vessels in the naval manœuvres to be held between Gibraltar and the English Channel in June and July next.

Death of Herr Johann Most, the well-known anarchist.

19—The Prince and Princess of Wales sailed from Karachi, India, on the battleship *Renown*, on their way home from the Indian tour.

20—The Credit Mutual Bank in Moscow, Russia, robbed by a gang of masked men, who secured money to the extent of \$432,500.

In the Ontario Legislature Hon. Mr. Hanna introduced the new Liquor License Bill. The Bill provides for a large increase in the license fees, the licensing of bartenders, and for several restrictions in connection with the business.

The Hon. Mr. Matheson, Ontario Provincial Treasurer, made his budget speech, announcing that the total receipts for the year 1905 were \$6,016,176 and the expenditures \$5,396,016, showing a surplus of \$620,000. The estimated receipts for 1906 were \$5,921,287 and the expenditures \$5,858,000.

27—H.R.H. Prince Arthur of Connaught arrived at Victoria, B.C., on his journey homeward from Japan.

Mr. Duncan C. Fraser, Judge of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia, appointed Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia.

29—Opening of the first Legislature of the Province of Saskatchewan at Regina.

The Ministry of Natal resigned in a body as a protest against the interference of the British Secretary of State with a decision of the Executive Council of the Colony of Natal.

31—Earl Grey, Governor-General of Canada, entertained at a banquet given by the Pilgrims Club in New York, and delivered a very important speech.

APRIL, 1906.

1—Beginning of the great coal strike among the soft coal miners in the United States.

The revenue of the United Kingdom for the financial year ending March 31st, 1906, was £153,878,984, a net increase of £696,202.

2—John Alexander Dowie deposed from his leadership in Zion City, all the property hitherto standing in his name being transferred to Alexander Granger.

Death of Rev. Cunningham Geikie at the age of 82 years.

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The Dominion Government has decided to accept the transfer of the dockyard at Halifax from the Imperial Government and suitable provision will be made for taking care of the property.

3—The Report of the Municipal Power Commission made public. The report is signed by E. W. B. Snider, chairman; P. W. Ellis, Toronto; Hon. Adam Beck, London; W. F. Cockshutt, Brantford; and Prof. R. A. Fessenden, New York, and recommends that the municipalities unite to provide power from Niagara Falls.

Mr. Whitney announced that the Government had decided to mine the "Gillies" limit, near Cobalt, for the benefit of the public and also to lease the mineral deposits on the right of way of the Temiskaming Railway.

5—A small portion of the Colonial Field Force operating near Georgetown in Natal attacked and defeated by Zulus. Three of the Colonial Police were killed, several wounded.

6—The Report of the Commission on the University of Toronto presented to the Ontario Legislature. The report calls attention to the defects of the present system and recommends a number of radical changes.

7—The International Conference at Algeciras, Morocco, ended this morning. The Acts General was signed.

8—A terrible eruption of Mount Vesuvius has caused great damage in the vicinity of Naples. It is reported that the village of Boscatrecase has been totally destroyed and many lives lost.

The Russian elections to the new National Parliament have resulted in a victory for the Progressivist party.

10—Hon. Dr. Pyne introduced a new educational measure into the Ontario Legislative Assembly. The new legislation provides for the appointment of a superintendent of education, an advisory council of 17 members, and fixes minimum salaries for the rural school teachers.

The roof of the Mount Oliveto market in Naples collapses under the weight of ashes from the volcano, causing the death and injury of several hundreds of persons.

Death of Professor Nathaniel S. Shaler, the eminent geologist.

11—First Report of the hydro-electric power commission, consisting of Hon. Adam Beck, chairman, Geo. Pattinson and John Milne, presented to the Ontario Legislature. The report recommends the transmission of power from Niagara at cost for distribution among the municipalities, with centres at Hamilton, Toronto, Guelph, London and Windsor.

13—An explosion of powder on the U. S. battleship *Kearsarge* causes the death of seven sailors and the injury of several others.

18—Terrible disaster at San Francisco, Cal. An earthquake which occurred at about 5.15 in the morning destroyed the principal business part of the city and was followed by fire, which swept through the whole city and threatens to destroy everything in its path. The loss of life and property are enormous.

19—Professor Curie, the discoverer of radium, run over and killed by a wagon in Paris, France.

20—The Dominion Government voted \$100,000 for the relief of the people of San Francisco.

The great fire in San Francisco is reported to be under control. About three-fourths of the city has been destroyed. The loss of life and property is not yet known. It is reported that great damage has been done to the buildings of the Leland-Stanford University and also in many towns in the vicinity of San Francisco.

23—Major H. C. Tilden, a member of the Relief Committee, shot and killed at San Francisco by some members of the Citizens' Patrol.

26—The United States Government declines to accept the contribution of \$100,000 offered by the Canadian Government for the relief of the citizens of San Francisco.

The Legislature of Alberta finally decides on Edmonton as the provincial capital.

30—Mr. Asquith, Chancellor of the Exchequer, introduced into the British House of Commons the first budget of the new Liberal Administration. He stated that the revenue for last year showed a surplus over the expenditure of \$17,333,000.

King Edward and Queen Alexandra ascended Mount Vesuvius.

Hon. Henri Taschereau has retired from the Chief Justiceship of the Supreme Court of Canada.

MAY, 1906.

1—William Sherring, of Hamilton, won the great Marathon race at the Olympian games at Athens, Greece.

2—Count Witte has resigned his position as Prime Minister of Russia and M. Goremykin appointed in his place.

Death of Mr. T. C. Brough, General Manager of the Dominion Bank, in London, England, at the age of 51 years.

3—Death of Hon. Peter White, M.P., formerly Speaker of the House of Commons, at the age of 68 years.

7—The anthracite coal miners and operators have agreed to renew the award of the Strike Commission for another three years, and the men will return to work at once.

Hon. Mr. Beck introduced the new Power Bill into the Ontario Legislature. The Bill provides for a commission to fix the rates of light, heat and power companies in any part of the province.

10—The first Russian Parliament opened at St. Petersburg by Emperor Nicholas.

Mr. Whitney announced in the Ontario Legislature that President Loudon, of the University of Toronto, had decided to resign.

11—Hon. James Dunsmuir appointed Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia in succession to Sir Henri Joly de Lotbiniere.

12—The Sultan of Turkey yields to the British demands and will withdraw Turkish troops from Tabah.

19—Formal opening of the Simplon tunnel by the King of Italy and the President of the Swiss Republic.

21—Death of Gabriel Dumont, first lieutenant of Louis Reil, in his 75th year.

The Emperor of Russia refuses to receive in audience the President of the Duma. This action on the part of the Czar has created much popular excitement.

22—Hon. Mr. Fielding made his budget speech in the House of Commons. He stated that there would be a surplus for the year 1906 of \$12,500,000.

The Nova Scotia Legislature dissolved. A new election will be held on June 20th.

23—The Legislature of the Province of Saskatchewan decided upon Regina as the provincial capital by a vote of 21 to 2.

Death of Henrik Ibsen, the celebrated Norwegian poet and dramatist, at the age of 78 years.

25—Dr. John Seath appointed Superintendent of Education for Ontario.

29—An insurrection breaks out in Guatemala.

The report of the commission on the fallen tower at Ottawa, consisting of S. G. Curry and A. C. Hutchison, was presented to the House of Commons at Ottawa. The report censures the supervising architect and the Department of Public Works and also holds the contractor liable.

30—The British battleship *Montagu* runs on the rocks at the entrance to the Bristol Channel. It is feared that the ship will be a total loss.

Death of Michael Davitt, the great Irish national leader, at the age of sixty years.

31—Marriage of King Alfonso XIII of Spain and Princess Victoria Eugenie of Battenburg.

An attempt was made to assassinate the King and Queen after the ceremony by means of a bomb thrown from a balcony. It is reported that twenty persons are killed and sixty wounded. The King and Queen escaped without injury.

JUNE, 1906.

1—Mr. James Leitch, K.C., of Cornwall, appointed chairman of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board at a salary of \$6,000 per annum.

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The amalgamation of the Merchants Bank of Prince Edward Island and the Canadian Bank of Commerce goes into effect to-day.

2—Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick, K.C., appointed Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. Hon. A. E. Aylesworth, K.C., appointed Minister of Justice and Hon. R. Lemieux, K.C., succeeds him as Postmaster-General.

3—Death of Dr. J. H. Widdifield, Sheriff of the County of York, age 61 years.

Manuel Morales, who was suspected of being the man who threw the bomb at the King and Queen of Spain, captured at the town of Torrejon de Ardoz. Morales shot the guard who arrested him and then killed himself.

4—President Roosevelt publishes the report of Messrs. Neill and Reynolds on the methods of the meat-packing industry in Chicago. The report shows dirty and unsanitary conditions to exist in many of the establishments and some of the details are too disgusting to print.

7—As the result of a vote in the County of Queens, the whole of the province of Prince Edward Island is brought under the prohibition law.

The Cunard turbine steamer *Lusitania*, the largest ocean liner in the world, launched to-day.

10—Death of Hon. Richard J. Seddon, Prime Minister of New Zealand, at the age of 61 years.

Fight between the rebels and the British forces under Colonel Barker in Natal, South Africa. The Rebel leader, Bambaata, was killed and many of his followers. This fight practically put an end to the rebellion.

11—Death of Sir Hector Langevin at the age of 78 years.

12—Death of Inspector John Murray, the well-known Canadian detective, in his 66th year.

13—The Presbyterian General Assembly votes to send the report of the Committee on Church Union to the various congregations by a large majority.

A great fire in Baltimore. Loss about \$1,000,000.

14—Terrible massacre of Jews at Bialistok, Russia.

19—The Ontario Government announce the names of the new Board of Governors for Toronto University. The Board consists of eighteen men appointed by the Government, and two, viz., the Chancellor, Sir William Meredith and the President, Dr. Loudon, who have *ex officio* seats on the Board.

20—Provincial elections in Nova Scotia. The Murray Government returned by a large majority.

22—Coronation of King Haakon and Queen Maud of Norway.

26—Death of Alexander Muir, author of the "Maple Leaf" at the age of 72 years.

29—In the Dominion House Mr. Fielding introduced a bill to abolish pensions to ex-cabinet Ministers.

The Ontario Government appoints the School Text-book Commission, consisting of Mr. T. W. Crothers, St. Thomas, and Mr. John A. Cooper, Toronto.

JULY, 1906.

1—Terrible Railway accident at Salisbury, England. Twenty-three persons killed besides a number injured. Among those killed were Mr. Walter Barwick, K.C., Rev. E. L. King and Mr. C. A. Pison, all of Toronto.

Death of Manuel Garcia, the well-known teacher of singing, at the age of 102 years.

Death of Sir Wilfrid Lawson, the famous Temperance advocate in the British House of Commons, at the age of 77 years.

11—The law granting pensions to ex-cabinet Ministers repealed by the Dominion Government.

The Congress of the Chambers of Commerce meeting at London, England, adopts the Canadian resolution in favor of preferential trade by a vote of 107 to 36.

12—The Supreme Court of France announces its decision annulling the condemnation of Dreyfus without a re-trial. The effect of this is a complete vindication of Dreyfus.

The Congress of the Chambers of Commerce of the Empire closes its meetings in London, England.

The resignation of President James Loudon, of the University of Toronto, accepted by the Government.

13—The French Chamber of Deputies reinstates Captain Dreyfus in the Army with rank of Major of Artillery by a vote of 473 to 42.

18—Death of Lady Curzon, wife of the former Viceroy of India. Lady Curzon was formerly Miss Mary Leiter, of Chicago.

20—Treaty of Peace between Guatemala, Salvador, and Honduras signed on board the U. S. cruiser *Marblehead*.

22—Emperor Nicholas of Russia dissolves the Douma, and appoints March 5th, 1907, for the meeting of a new Parliament. The City and Province of St. Petersburg declared to be in a state of extraordinary security.

Death of Russell Sage, the eminent financier, in his 87th year.

23—Opening of the Inter-Parliamentary Peace Conference at Westminster Palace. Lord Weardale elected president.

Opening of the Pan-American Congress at Rio de Janeiro.

30—The Education Bill passed its third reading in the British House of Commons by a majority of 192.

Death of J. L. Toole, the famous English comedian, at the age of 74 years.

31—In the British House of Commons, Winston Churchill brought down the Government measure granting a Constitution to the Transvaal.

Death of Mr. Justice Street, of the High Court of Justice of Ontario, at the age of 65 years.

AUGUST, 1906.

1—An outbreak of mutiny at the fortress of Sveaborg, Finland, near the City of Helsingfors.

3—The mutinies at Sveaborg and Cronstadt, Russia, have been suppressed, but other uprisings are reported from Reval and Pamyat Azova, also in the Artillery Camp at Warsaw. The Revolutionary propaganda is spreading throughout the whole of the Russian Empire.

Great fire in the International Exposition buildings at Milan, Italy.

5—Death of Justice Sedgwick, of the Supreme Court of Canada, at the age of 58 years.

Wreck of the emigrant steamer *Sirio*, sailing from Genoa to Buenos Ayres, off Cape Palos, Spain. It is believed that about 400 lives were lost.

10—Attempt to assassinate Grand Duke Nicholas of Russia by some members of the Imperial Guard, while at rifle practice at Krasnoye Selo.

13—Death of Mrs. Craigie, the well-known authoress at the age of 39 years. She wrote under the *nom de plume* of John Oliver Hobbes.

15—King Edward VII and Emperor William of Germany meet at Cronberg, Prussia.

16—Great earthquake at Valparaiso, Chile. The earthquake lasted five hours, and was followed by numerous fires. Many lives lost, and much property destroyed.

21—The town of Haileybury, Ontario, partially destroyed by fire.

Opening of the 74th annual meeting of the British Medical Association at Toronto.

22—Presentation at Quebec of a service of silver plate given by the citizens of Canada to the battleship *Dominion*.

The revolution in Cuba assumes a grave aspect.

Death of Rev. John Langtry, Archdeacon of York, at the age of 75 years.

24—President Roosevelt orders that the reformed method of spelling shall be used in all U. S. public documents.

25—The amount of the loss in the city of Valparaiso, Chili, caused by the recent earthquake and fire was \$200,000,000.

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Attempt to assassinate premier Stolypin of Russia with a bomb while holding a public reception at his country house. 32 persons were killed and 24 wounded. The premier himself escaped injury.

29—Opening of the first international Esperanto Congress at Geneva with about 500 delegates in attendance, representing 15 nations.

SEPTEMBER, 1906.

1—The British battleship *Dreadnought* commissioned to-day within 11 months of the laying down of her keel.

8—The boat race between crews representing Cambridge and Harvard Universities won by Cambridge by two boat lengths.

Terrible outrages and massacre of Jews in Siedlice, Russian Poland. It is reported that 100 persons have been killed and wounded and the town is in flames.

9—Defeat of the Cuban rebels by the Government forces near Las Ovas, Cuba.

12—Terrible train wreck on the C.P.R. near Sudbury. Eleven persons killed and seventeen injured.

13—A force of 155 U. S. soldiers landed at Havana, Cuba, from the U. S. Cruiser *Denver*.

Death of Prince Albrecht of Prussia, Regent of the Duchy of Brunswick, at the age of 69 years.

14—President Roosevelt says the war in Cuba must cease, and sends Mr. Taft, Secretary of War, and Mr. Bacon, Assistant Secretary of State, to Havana, to render such aid as is possible towards this end.

15—Death of General Dmitri Trepoff, Governor-General of St. Petersburg, at the age of 50 years.

16—The Cuban Government suspends military operations, with a view of making peace before the U. S. intervenes.

17—The Manitoba Government have announced that after January 1st, 1907, every Public School in Manitoba must fly the Union Jack during school hours.

The 35th annual convention of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association meets at Winnipeg.

18—Death of Dr. Thomas Harrison, formerly Chancellor of the University of New Brunswick.

A terrible typhoon struck Hong Kong, causing the loss of about 7,000 lives and damage to the extent of about \$20,000,000.

24—Mr. Justice Duff of Victoria, B.C., appointed as Judge of the Supreme Court of Canada.

25—Celebration of the 400th anniversary of Aberdeen University.

26—A great tornado at Mobile, Alabama, causes the death of at least 50 persons and does damage at Mobile to the extent of \$3,000,000, and at Pensacola, Fla., of \$5,000,000.

27—Wm. Randolph Hearst nominated at Buffalo as democratic candidate for Governor for New York State.

28—United States troops landed in Cuba to-day.

29—U. S. Secretary Taft assumes the provisional governorship of Cuba.

30—Balloon race for the Gordon Bennett Cup. 16 balloons started from Paris, France, and several of them landed in England. Lieut. Lahn, U. S., won 1st prize, covering about 400 miles.

OCTOBER, 1906.

6—The Vanderbilt Cup race for automobiles on Long Island won by Wagner with a French machine.

8—Serious riot at Buckingham, Que., between the striking workmen of the James McLaren Co. and a detachment of police.

A *modus vivendi* has been arranged between the Imperial Government and the United States as to the Newfoundland fisheries; the Newfoundland Government was strongly opposed to the settlement.

Meeting of the Conference of Premiers of the Dominion and various provinces at Ottawa.

9—Death of Archbishop Bond, Metropolitan of Montreal and Primate of all Canada, in his 92nd year.

12—The Ontario Bank absorbed by the Bank of

Montreal, the latter assuming all the liabilities of the Ontario Bank.

13—The Conference of Provincial Premiers and Ministers agree upon a series of joint resolutions with reference to subsidies from the Dominion Government and other questions. Mr. McBride representing British Columbia withdraws from the conference on the ground of unfair treatment to British Columbia.

Mr. W. R. Riddell, K.C., sworn in as Judge of the High Court of Ontario.

15—Death of Rev. Sam. P. Jones, the well-known evangelist, at the age of 59 years.

Marriage of Miss Bertha Krupp and Lieut. Gustav Von Bohlen at Essen, Prussia.

An Advisory Board appointed to assist in winding up the Ontario Bank. The board consists of Mr. W. E. Stavert, of the Bank of Montreal, Curator, Mr. Byron E. Walker, Mr. D. R. Wilkie, and Mr. Duncan Coulson.

16—Wilhelm Voigt, a shoemaker, masquerades as an officer of the 1st Foot Guards, arrests the Burgomaster and Treasurer of Kopenick, Germany, and robs the Treasury of 4,000 marks. Voigt was afterwards arrested at Berlin on the 26th October.

The French submarine boat, *Lutin*, sank near Bizerta. All the officers and men on board were lost.

18—The staff of the Russ. Manchurian Army disbanded. Thanksgiving Day in Canada.

A fire at the Industrial Exhibition grounds, Toronto, destroys grand stand, transportation building and cattle sheds, causing a loss of about \$130,000.

19—The Bank of England advances its discount rate to six per cent.

A terrible hurricane sweeps across Cuba causing the loss of many lives and damage of over \$2,000,000.

23—Accident on the Electric Car Line from Camden to Atlantic City. The train ran off a bridge and from fifty to sixty persons lost their lives.

NOVEMBER, 1906.

1—Opening of the Exhibition at Christchurch, New Zealand.

2—An important judgment given by the Privy Council decides that the Christian Brothers cannot teach in Ontario Public Schools without passing the Ontario Government examinations.

6—Congressional Elections in the United States.—In the State of New York Chas. E. Hughes, Republican, elected Governor of New York State over W. R. Hearst, Democrat, by a majority of over 40,000.

9—Sir Mortimer Durand, Ambassador from Great Britain to the United States, announces his intention of resigning next spring.

18—Death of the Hon. Senator Alexander Vidal at the age of 87 years.

A bomb exploded in St. Peter's Cathedral at Rome. No serious damage was done and no lives were lost.

19—Electric power from Niagara Falls delivered at Toronto for the first time.

First regular passenger train on the Canadian Northern Railway left Toronto for Parry Sound.

22—Death of Hon. Senator William Kerr of Cobourg, aged 77 years.

Opening of the Third Session of the Tenth Parliament of the Dominion of Canada.

Hon. C. S. Hyman, Minister of Public Works, resigns his seat in the Dominion House.

23—Street car riots in Hamilton. Owing to the serious nature of the disorder a contingent of one hundred and ten regular soldiers, under the command of Col. Ogilvie of the R.C.H.A., sent from Toronto to preserve order.

Canada has notified the United States Government that the Postal Convention, so far as it relates to second class matter, will be abrogated on May 7th, 1907.

The Steamer *J. H. Jones* lost in the Georgian Bay near Lion's Head, with a loss of life estimated from twenty-five to forty persons.

28—The Ontario Provincial Loan of \$3,000,000 has been entirely subscribed.

The Spanish Cabinet has resigned.

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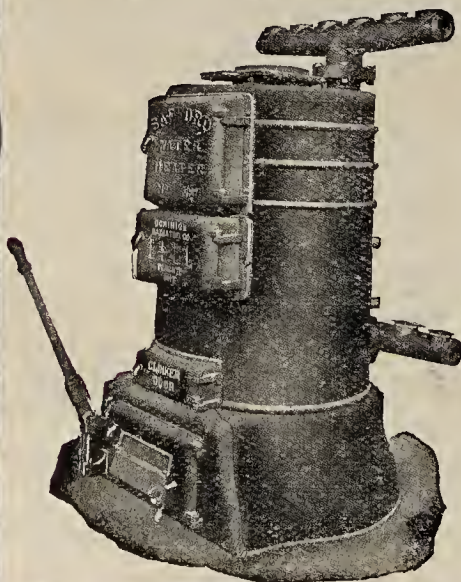
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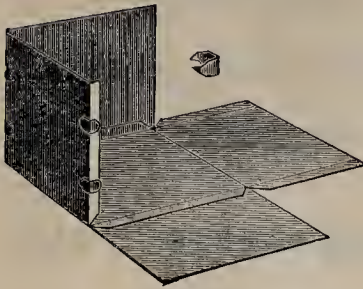
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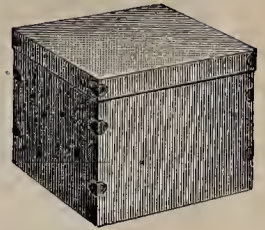
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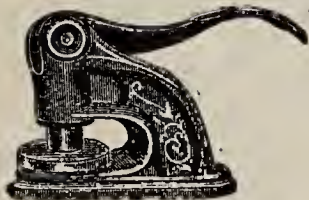
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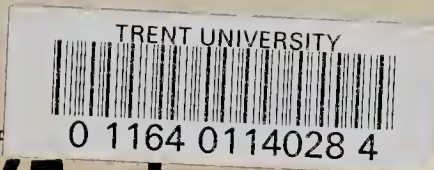
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
