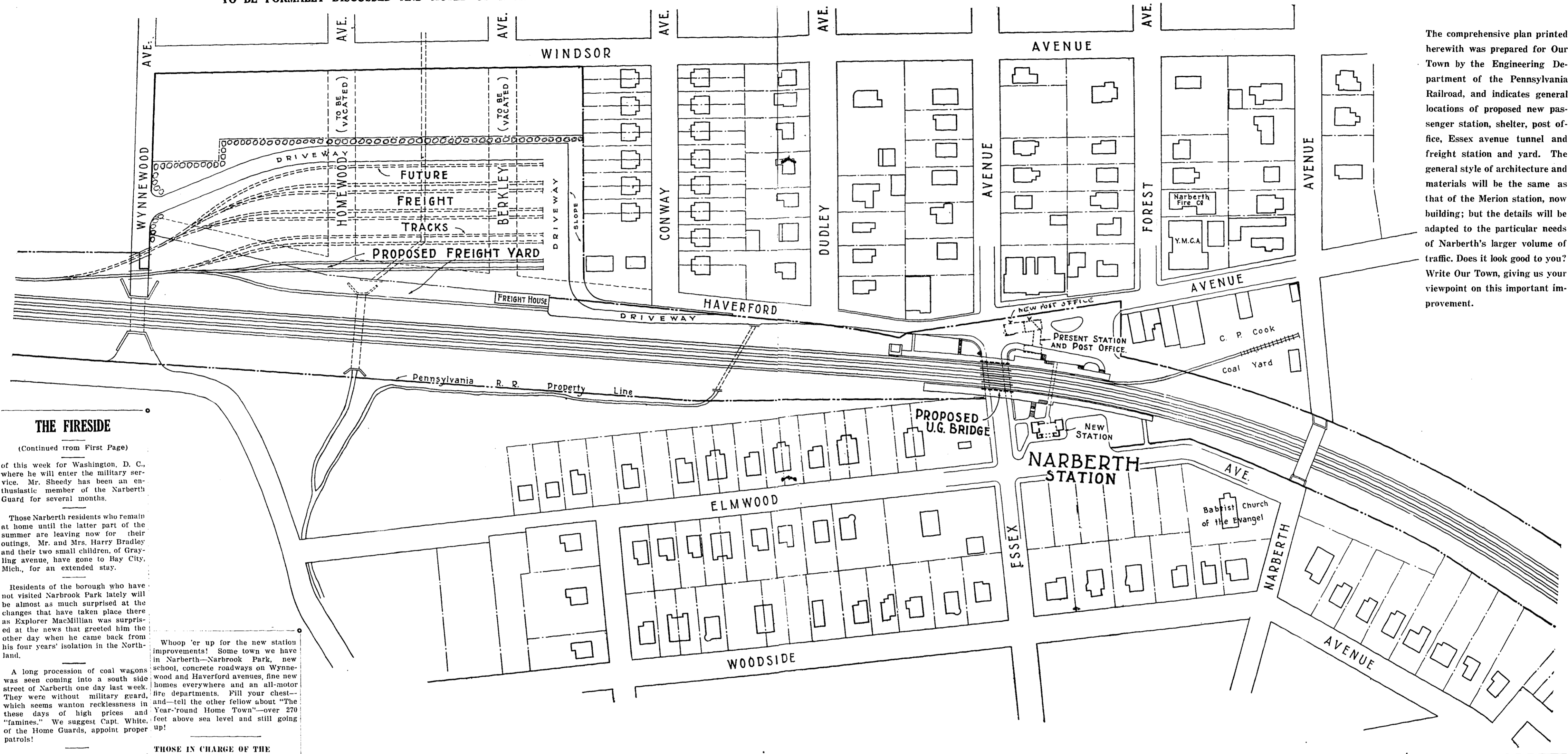


COMPREHENSIVE PLAN OF NARBERTH STATION IMPROVEMENTS

TO BE FORMALLY DISCUSSED AND ACTED UPON AT THE NEXT REGULAR MEETING OF THE NARBERTH COUNCIL, MONDAY EVENING, SEPTEMBER 10, IN THE COUNCIL CHAMBER IN ELM HALL



The comprehensive plan printed herewith was prepared for Our Town by the Engineering Department of the Pennsylvania Railroad, and indicates general locations of proposed new passenger station, shelter, post office, Essex avenue tunnel and freight station and yard. The general style of architecture and materials will be the same as that of the Merion station, now building; but the details will be adapted to the particular needs of Narberth's larger volume of traffic.
