MIDWINTER GROWTH OF LOCAL SCHOOLS IS INDICATED

Big Increase in Enrollment Is Shown by Reports Made on New Attendance

Five more pupils are in local grammar schools this week than last. Superintendent Richardson D. White stated this morning that the mid-winter graduation exercises made little difference to the enrollment as the number who left was compensated by the number who commenced school.

This morning figures showed that 3,245 children were enrolled. January 6, there were 3,240 pupils in attendance.

Attention was called by Mr. White to the fact that at the opening of the second semester last year the number was 2,585 showing an increase of 660 pupils during the year.

Here Are Figures
Intermediate school, which graduated 94 pupils, received that number and 26 more yesterday morning and now has a total enrollment of 355.

Cerritos, which graduated nine, has 468 in attendance, including 33 in the kindergarten.

Columbus has 399 pupils in the grades and 56 in the kindergarten, a total of 455.

Broadway is the next largest school with 27 in the kindergarten and 387 pupils on the rolls.

Pacific has 38 in the kindergarten and 333 in the grades or 371 altogether.

Central is educating 329 of which number 29 are in the kindergarten. Colorado has 26 in the kindergarten and 273 in the grades, a total of 299.

Doran accommodates 223 pupils, 19 in the kindergarten and 204 in the grades.

Acacia has 98 pupils and Magnolia 30.

Enter High School
One hundred and sixty-three new pupils were enrolled at Glendale Union High School yesterday. Of this number 143 were "scrubs," or beginning Freshmen. The mid-winter graduating class consisted of eleven so that the enrollment has been increased by 152 bringing the total in attendance to 1,339.

BRANCH OF AUTO CLUB HERE GROWS

Membership Increases Almost 100 Per Cent During 1921, Says M. B. Towman

During the month of January, 1922, just 186 new members were accepted by the Automobile Club of Southern California in Glendale, according to M. B. Towman, local secretary, in speaking of the popularity of the club. The membership in Glendale increased almost 100 per cent during the year 1921, bringing the membership for the city to more than 2000.

Of the new members secured this year about twenty are from foreign states. They have permanently located in Glendale since January 1, 1922. These members became well acquainted with the benefits derived by club members as they encountered mile and direction posts en route to the state.

Give Information
The courtesies of the club are felt over the entire country. Maps of the state highways are mailed upon request, road condition reports are mailed to the motorist; and in the city and home, representatives of the club attend to the details necessary in securing new license plates. Legal representation is given at police court hearings on traffic violations; and persons advised on the most proper procedure in civil cases where the automobile is involved. Other services have made the value of the organization felt to the average motorist.

Guy Wadsworth, superintendent of Presbyterian church extension, at a meeting which was held yesterday afternoon in Los Angeles. At that joint meeting two laymen were appointed to represent, with their superintendents, each denomination, and Glendale was honored by having a local man chosen.

ENIGMA GIRL, HURT BY AUTO, REVEALS WHY SHE LEFT HOME

Beatrice Marsh, Just 15, Wanders Away—and Now She's in Bed in Hospital

Tears and tricky smiles marked pretty little Beatrice Marsh's countenance at the Glendale Sanitarium and Hospital this morning as she told me of the trip she took away from her guardian's home yesterday—and it wound up on a cot in the hospital.

She was 15 years old last Saturday and decided that there were better places to live than that which she called home. Instead of going to grammar school, she left 1235 Temple street and wandered out along the San Fernando and Verdugo roads, according to her story.

It was a tiresome trip and about 6 o'clock last night a big car brushed her to the side of Verdugo road near Colorado boulevard. She was found fatigued and bruised by Edward B. Rust, a Los Angeles architect, who was returning to his home in Eagle Rock.

The girl was rushed to the sanitarium where repeated questionings failed to reveal any of her past. She was fed and placed in a comfortable bed and this morning the doctors, police and others gathered 'round to find out more about the enigma girl, who had given only the name of "Betty Marsh."

Still she was obdurate, but when she learned it was impossible to keep out of the newspapers—then and then only she gave the address of her guardians and stated that she was a native of Pennsylvania. Chief of Police A. O. Martin states there is no such address as she gave.

The officers are investigating and already promises of a good home are waiting the little maid whose tears intermingled with smiles have won the hearts of the nurses and others in the same ward.

Today's World News In Brief

FOUR ARE KILLED AND MANY INJURED IN HOTEL FIRE
RICHMOND, Va., Feb. 7.—Four men were killed and fifteen persons were injured, some seriously, in a fire which started in the Lexington hotel here early today and which was still burning at 9 o'clock. At least twenty persons are missing and it is feared that other bodies will be found in the ruins. Three of the dead have been identified. They are: M. J. Fox, Williamsport, Pa.; Hiram F. Austin, Fincastle, Va.; A. Johnson, Charlottesville, Va. At 9 o'clock firemen were still pouring water into the blazing wreckage in efforts to prevent the fire from spreading to adjoining buildings.

JUDGE LANDIS REFUSES TO TOLERATE FURTHER DELAY

CHICAGO, Feb. 7.—The repeatedly delayed hearing of the Pennsylvania railroad's injunction case against the United States railway labor board was set today for one week from Friday by Federal Judge Kenesaw M. Landis. Judge Landis refused to tolerate any further delay. "We can run from 10:30 in the forenoon to 10:30 at night," he declared to objections from company attorneys, "to gain Saturday if necessary." This case, in which the Pennsylvania seeks to restrain the board from declaring its order violated in regard to the election of employee representatives to negotiate working rules, was regarded by railroad men as one of the most important that has come before the court in a long time.

NEW POPE TO ASSIST IN RESTORATION OF EUROPE

ROME, Feb. 7.—Pope Pius XI will not only continue the policy of the late Pope Benedict XV for reconciliation between the vatican and the Italian state, but also will lend the powerful assistance of the papacy towards the reconstruction of war-torn Europe, it was learned today from an authoritative source. The selection of the former archbishop of Milan for the chair of St. Peter will be a popular one, attested by the flood of congratulatory messages pouring into the vatican from all parts of the world. The coronation will take place on Sunday, it being the tradition of the Roman church to conduct the coronation on the first holy day following the election. The ceremonies will take place in St. Peter's and the Sistine chapel.

TWO MORE AMERICAN CARDINALS MAY BE CREATED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—Creation of two new American cardinals is expected to be one of the first ecclesiastical acts of Pope Pius XI, the new Catholic pontiff. In hierarchical circles here, it was freely expressed that an early consistory of the sacred college would be called at Rome for the express purpose of naming at least ten candidates for the red hat. Ranks of the cardinals have become greatly thinned due to the failure of the late Pope Benedict to call a sacred consistory since nearly a year ago, and because of the deaths of several of the high prelates of the church, notably those of Cardinal Ferrari of Milan, Cardinal Santos of Seville, Cardinal Marini and Cardinal Gibbons of Baltimore. It is highly probable, it was said in Catholic quarters, that the new pontiff may call a sacred consistory following his coronation, due to the presence in Rome of the majority of the cardinals.

MAY START TESTIMONY IN OBENCHAIN CASE THURSDAY

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 7.—Eight women and four men, temporarily accepted as jurors, were in the box today at the trial of Mrs. Madalynne Obenchain, charged with the murder of J. Belton Kennedy, when Jud Rush, chief of defense counsel, and Deputy District Attorney Asa Keyes began matching wits in the exercising of peremptory challenges. The indications today were that the jury will be completed and the taking of testimony started by Thursday morning which would make three days consumed in selecting the jurors. In the trial of Arthur C. Burch, co-defendant in the case, four and a half days were taken to obtain a jury. Mrs. Obenchain, with "Steady Ralph" Obenchain, her divorced husband, close at her side, gave her opinion of each of the prospective jurors to her attorneys. She told them whether she desired the juror to remain in the box or be excused and her wishes were carefully considered.

UNITED STATES MUST DECIDE ON GENOA CONFERENCE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—Adjournment of the armament conference brought the administration today squarely up against the task of making public a decision as to whether the United States will or will not participate in the Genoa economic conference next month. Every indication points to non-participation by the United States, although administration spokesmen were less vigorous today than heretofore in assigning reasons why this government should not take part in the meeting. The matter has been discussed at several cabinet meetings and will likely be given a thorough overhauling again at today's session. Sentiment in the cabinet itself and in the senate today is well nigh overwhelming against the government taking a full part in the Genoa meeting. Even those who hold such widely divergent views on international policies as Secretary of State Hughes and Secretary of the Interior A. B. Fall, one of the old senate "irreconcilables," find a common ground on which to stand with regard to the Genoa meeting. That ground is that the United States should stay out.

ARREST IN TAYLOR MURDER CASE MAY BE MADE TODAY

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 7.—The eyes of investigators seeking the solution of the murder of William Desmond Taylor, noted film director, today were turned toward Carlin, Nev., where the arrest of a man who is said to have been partially identified as Edward F. Sands, missing secretary-valet of the slain man, is momentarily expected. Police here, in dispatches to the Nevada town state that the former employee's arrest is sought on a "felony warrant charging murder." First intimation that the suspect had been located in Nevada was received late last night. A telegraphic warrant immediately was wired to the Carlin constable with a complete description of Sands. This was followed by another message to Sheriff Harris of Elko county, Nevada, stating that the Los Angeles police hold a felony warrant for murder for E. F. Sands. Reports were that a man who answered Sands' description had appeared in Carlin a few days after the film director had been murdered in his Alvarado street home. This man's actions are said to have aroused the suspicions of

BOND ISSUE FOR MUNICIPAL BUS LINE IS PROPOSED; STRAW BALLOT NOW BEING OFFERED TO CITIZENS

C. D. Gulick, Traffic Expert, Consults With City Officials; Outlines Plans By Which Passenger Facilities May Be Greatly Increased

S HALL Glendale vote \$125,000 (or less) bonds for a municipal bus line to increase passenger traffic facilities between this city and Los Angeles?

That is a straw ballot proposition placed squarely up to the citizens by the city council in an advertisement appearing in today's issue of The Glendale Evening News.

According to C. D. Gulick, consulting traffic expert, the amount will probably be much less than that and in the following article, prepared for the consideration of the council, he points out pertinent facts relative of motor bus operation.

By C. D. GULICK, Consulting Traffic Expert.
Pursuant and to the end and purposes for which this Honorable Body secured my services, I beg to submit the following report, which is as far as my investigation has allowed me to go and is not to be thought to be final, but rather to inform your Honorable Body as to the present status of my investigation:

First I shall take up a few of the general facts pertaining to the operation of motor buses in any city, compared with the operation of electric railway transportation and then by presenting you with the facts regarding the operation of buses successfully between the city of Glendale and the city of Los Angeles in competition with the present form of transportation to respectfully call your attention to the following:

Flexibility of motor buses in operation.
The relieving of congestion.
Safety.
Rapid transit and its effects.
Beautifying the city, using buses

instead of electric railroads.

Municipal owned buses both in United States and Europe.

Popular opinion and some of the causes.

Initial investment with or without water stock.

Interest on investment.

Cost of operation.

Profits.

Value of franchises given away in the past.

Finally, can the city of Glendale operate successfully motor buses to the benefit of the citizens of Glendale.

Points Out Advantages
The motor bus has the advantage of being able to alter its course not only on the particular street it may be traveling, but in the case of obstruction of any block, it can seek another street without delay or delaying others, thereby saving congestion. It further relieves congestion by securing its passengers at the curb, allowing other vehicles to pass it without pausing, which in

CEMETERY REPORT MADE TO COUNCIL

Chief of Police Tells About Investigation He Has Made; Order More Inquiry

Stuart M. Street appeared before the city council last night and inquired what was being done, if anything, regarding conditions at Forest Lawn cemetery.

W. H. Reeves, city manager, thereupon read the following letter from A. O. Martin, chief of police: "William H. Reeves, "City Manager, "Glendale, Calif.

"Dear Sir: I interviewed Mr. Glory, superintendent of Forest Lawn Cemetery, and was informed regarding conditions as follows: They graded and made a driveway over the hill east of the old cemetery, part of the driveway in Los Angeles and part in Glendale, the property consisting of probably ten acres to the north and east of the old cemetery. In Glendale it was fenced in with wire netting, and on the inside of the fence a hedge was planted along the Glendale avenue side. About 500 feet on the inside of the hedge they have planted trees and graded the property.

"Mr. Glory stated that the property had been formerly used as a dumping ground. At one time the eastern part was used by the city as a dump. There are four signs, 14 feet by 18 feet, on the property, which read as follows: "Please Respect These Sacred Grounds. Violators and Trespassers Will Be Prosecuted to the Full Extent of the Law. Forest Lawn Cemetery."

"He stated that he does not know the intentions of the cemetery officials and referred me to John W. Kent, president, Los Angeles. Mr. Glory stated that they have improved the unsightly property, and when parties who have used it as a dump had been restrained they started agitation against the cemetery.

"Respectfully submitted, "A. O. MARTIN, "Chief of Police."

Mr. Street urged that more action be taken by the council or "you will awaken to find the city ordinance violated and the burial of dead occurring within the city limits."

C. R. Whistler's Sister Dies in Theatre Crash

C. R. Whistler at 465 Salem street lost a sister in the Knickerbocker theatre disaster at Washington, D. C. it is learned. She and her husband, O. S. Kanston, and two children, perished in the catastrophe which hit the capital so heavily. A 10-year-old son, miraculously escaped. Members of the family were buried Saturday in Chicago, according to word received by Mr. Whistler. Mr. Kanston was employed by the interstate commerce commission.

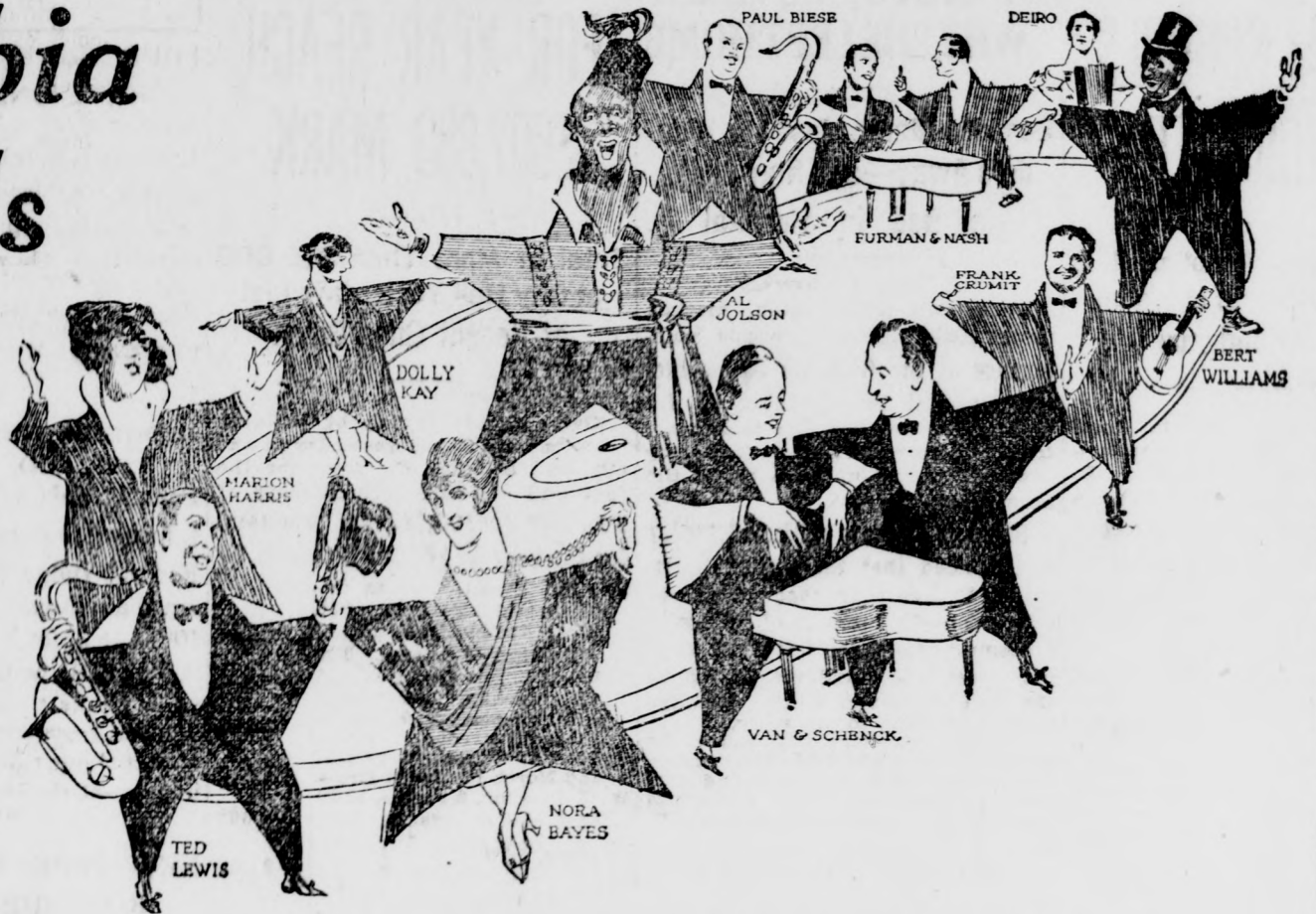

U. S. Banks to Help

Credit Through Europe

NEW YORK, Feb. 7.—American dollars will finance a chain of banks in eastern and central Europe to create credit facilities that will restore starving thousands to a self-supporting basis.

The first of these banks, which will be the central institution of a system resembling the federal reserve, will open shortly in Warsaw, Felix Warburg, head of the Kuhn, Loeb Company, international banking firm, announced today as chairman of the Jewish Joint Distribution committee.

The banks will be co-operative. The project is regarded as the first practical step undertaken to rehabilitate the most destitute sections of Europe and is expected to have far-reaching effect on the commercial stabilization of the countries involved.

Five million of the \$14,000,000 fund now being raised for the starving Jews of Europe by the American Jewish relief committee, will be used to finance the initial bank in Warsaw, Mr. Warburg announced.

Poland has been divided into seven zones and in these branches of the central co-operative bank will be established.

As rapidly as conditions permit, branches will be organized in Russia, the Ukraine and Rumania. The co-operative banks will make loans to workers, farmers and small merchants and will supply credit to co-operative groups of all kinds. A limit will be placed on the amount of interest that may be charged. In no case is it to be more than enough to cover administration expenses.

Among men of international prominence behind the movement besides Mr. Warburg are Henry Morgenthau, Oscar S. Straus, Nathan Straus, Jacob M. Loeb of Chicago; Julius Rosenberg of Chicago, and David A. Brown of Detroit; Jules Mastbaum of Philadelphia, and Mortimer Fleschhacker of San Francisco.

Officers rushed to interrogate the man who has been much sought by the police within the last two days. Following their questioning, however, it was announced that the New Yorker, scion of a wealthy eastern family, had presented a complete alibi regarding his actions the night the murder was committed. With his arrest expected momentarily, a man believed to be Edward F. Sands, missing valet, suspected of the murder of Taylor, is reported today to be practically barricaded in a room in a house near Carlin, Nev., according to advices from Sheriff Harris of Elko, Nev. Surrounded by deputy sheriffs under the personal direction of the Nevada sheriff, the suspect and a male companion remained in their rooms from an early hour yesterday afternoon, apparently seeking to escape recognition, it was believed. Sheriff Harris told the International News Service over the long distance telephone today that he would keep his men on guard and that he probably would arrest the murder suspect shortly. In a telegram sent to Constable Berning of Carlin, the Los Angeles police stated: "Arrest for murder Edward F. Sands, American, 26, 5 feet, 1 inches, 175 to 190 pounds, very stout build, round full face, light complexion, heavy brown hair, good dresser." The request of the police, it was said, is technically based upon a felony warrant charging two counts of grand larceny and issued here last August.

KING GEORGE LAUDS CONFERENCE AT WASHINGTON

LONDON, Feb. 7.—Lauding the Washington conference and expressing the hope that it may be possible at the Genoa conference to "establish peace on a fair basis throughout Europe and remedy unemployment at home," King George today delivered a speech from the throne opening the new session of parliament. The king urged an early settlement of the Irish situation, adding "that final establishing of the Irish free state as a partner in the British commonwealth of nations is anxiously awaited." The chief business of the house of commons in the present session is: Enactment of a bill bringing the Irish free state into official existence; ratification of the treaties drawn up at the Washington conference. "During the past three months the Washington conference has held continued sessions," said King George in his speech. "A treaty designed to maintain peace in the Pacific was signed. This treaty now awaits ratification. While this treaty replaces the Anglo-Japanese alliance, I am happy to feel that the long standing accord between the two countries (Great Britain and Japan) will remain under the arrangement that has been concluded. At the same time our relations with the United States enter a new and even closer phase of friendship. Also an agreement has been reached on the question of disarmament and a treaty has been signed providing a large measure of relief for the burden of armaments. In all respects great results have been attained and the success of the conference for which the whole world will owe a deep debt of gratitude to the initiative of the president of the United States will be of the happiest augury for future international relations. The problem for securing reparations from Germany in a manner most conformable with the general interests engage the continuous consideration of my ministers and our allies. The German government has submitted proposals which now are under consideration." The king expressed the hope that an early settlement would be reached on the near east question by the French, British and Italian ministers who are to discuss this in Paris.

COMMENT THAT'S ALL

Oddities in Day's News
U. S. Don't Give a Dime
When the Governor Agrees
Heaven Help Madalynne!

ODDITIES in the day's news really are worthy of more than the mere mention they obtain in the metropolitan newspapers. For instance, the story of a smuggler getting 18 months in the federal penitentiary because an immigration inspector saw a beam of light reflected from his eyerready when he flashed it into a knot hole of a piano box.

It was a Chinaman's eye and search revealed this celestial and a dozen others. That's worth a magazine story.

Then there's the girl who doesn't want any alimony. Can you imagine the divorcee who would refuse cash if there was a chance of getting it? That, too, ought to be worth a Sunday magazine feature.

Another good yarn comes from Washington, D. C., where Oscar Goldstein's \$1100 charge for collecting \$10,000 prohibition fines has been refused.

Seems that Oscar was city attorney at Chico and had the idea that by cleaning up the bootleggers he could enrich the city treasury. That was where he was wrong.

The government will spend a million dollars collecting a dime, but it doesn't give a dime for collecting a million. As a result the city attorney must pay \$900 detective fees out of his \$50 a month salary.

He would have made more representing the bootleggers when they were tried!

Indeed, it must be pleasing to City Attorney Bert Woodard of Glendale to see Governor William D. Stephens practically reiterating statements made in the local municipality's complaint against the Pacific Electric passenger fare increase.

Two paragraphs from the Governor's letter to the State Railroad Commission, relative to a review of the raise, read:

For example, it is urged by the rate payers, who number many thousands, that "it is not just to burden the lucrative lines with high rates in order to make up a 'fair return' upon lines barely paying operating costs and that gift property of a non-paying line should not be given its full present value when fixing rates for a profitably operated line." These and other contentions are being urged so seriously as to deserve further and fullest consideration.

And I suggest that, until it is known what is right and just, and until the service is made at least passably tolerable, the increases should be suspended or revoked, if lawfully it can be done. If revocation is legally barred then may I not suggest a corresponding monthly rebate to every subscriber until the service rendered warrants an increase.

It would seem as though a day of judgment is coming and the patient people will be rewarded by some slight semblance of justice on the part of their duly elected representatives.

Women will likely weigh the evidence in Madalynne Obenchain's murder trial.

Heaven help Madalynne! With eight of her sex sitting in the jury box it would not surprise newspaper people to see her go into spasms.

Surely, others in her shoes would, in view of recent decisions of woman juries.

AUTO BUS SYSTEM FOR THIS CITY IS DISCUSSED

Traffic Expert Gives Views to City Council in Inquiry Now Being Conducted

(Continued from Page 1)
The case of the street car, where the passengers are loading and unloading, causes all transportation to halt. Thus we have in result not only the relief from congestion, but another important and humane feature, safety.

By loading at the curb, the bus thereby does away with the necessity of the passengers going to the center of the street and further permits the removal of the present necessary safety zones now provided for the safety of those seeking the cars and thereby further relieves congestion and protects the lives of many.

When you consider the two above facts collectively, you have the result that is in turn two of the reasons that enable the motor bus to deliver from the center of the congested district to the suburbs and rural districts at a great deal less time than is possible for street cars.

In my opinion, based on what facts I have at hand and from experience, I believe that you can move the same amount of people with the same amount of seats from the congested district to any given point within the corporate limits of the city of Los Angeles or Glendale from one-third to one-half the time that would require by street cars with perfect safety and reasonable speed.

Idea "to Get There"
Quoting Grove A. Whalen, commissioner of streets and structures of the city of New York, who has charge of the municipally owned busses of the city of New York in an address delivered to the Highway Transport Commission, as follows:

"The idea in New York is to get there. The bus gets you there, while the trolley halts and tarries. Five to twelve minutes saved on a trip that formerly took from twelve to twenty-five minutes means something. Ten minutes saved in one day is equivalent to six and one-fourth days in three hundred working days. This is attractive to people and is the experience from practical operation of motor bus transportation in the city of New York."

Now we come to the beautifying of the city by elimination of the trolley wires, poles and rails. Who would dare contradict the statement that we would have a more beautiful city.

Initial investment and installation of motor busses is far different in cost than that necessary to install an electric railway and equip the same.

Tolls of Costs
Getting to the initial cost and needs of the City of Glendale, my estimate is based on the present fact known to many regarding the volume of business necessary to handle and from the first traffic count, which has come into my hands, it shows that there were about 900 people that rode on Pacific Electric cars last Saturday between Los Angeles and Glendale and 7000 on the following Monday and indicates that there will be an average daily travel between the City of Los Angeles and the City of Glendale of from five to nine thousand people.

The number of cars necessary to operate 6-minute service from 5 a. m. to 8 a. m., 12-minute service from 8:30 a. m. to 4 p. m., 6-minute service from 4 p. m. to 8 p. m., 12-minute service from 8 p. m. to 12:42 a. m., will be 12 29-passenger cars in regular service, 4 29-passenger cars in reserve for peak or rush hours; one extra car in the garage at all times, making a total of 17 cars.

Number of trips each way 133. Total number of trips 266. Number of hours cars will be in operation each day, 20. Number of average miles for each regular car, 177. Distance

necessary to travel en route, 8 miles. The attached estimate of cost will give you your cost per mile, there being 7,714 seats available. Taking one-half of the available seats for a margin of safety, you would be able to carry 3,857 passengers at a profit, as the accompanying estimate sheet will show, that will pay an annual dividend sufficient to earn 8.83 percent on an initial investment of \$88,000. This is without the earnings of the extra cars, which should pay a better profit per mile when in operation, owing to the fact that they would only move when needed and fully loaded.

These estimates as you will see were purposely made far in excess of what can be actually done. I have used these extreme figures in order that this council may know beyond a reasonable doubt for the benefit of themselves and the public whom they represent, that motor busses can be operated between the City of Los Angeles and the City of Glendale at a net profit to the city at a far lesser fare than is charged today by the Pacific Electric.

Quotes R. R. Commission Report
I further call your attention to the volume placed in your hands prepared at great expense of the people of California by the able engineers of the Railroad Commission of the State of California.

On page 13, the commission states that "it is only because the losses of this system have been carried by the more prosperous parent concern, the Southern Pacific company, that the present applicant has been able to escape receivership."

In their fourth finding, page 14, I quote them as follows:
"The controlling causes of the present financial condition of the Pacific Electric company, in the order of their importance, are stated as follows in Commission's Exhibit No. 1:

"First—Motor car competition, including private and public machines used in transporting both passengers and freight.

"Second—Abnormal conditions and costs, prior, during and subsequent to the war.

"Third—Growing burden of expenditures not related to the previously mentioned causes."

(Allow me to say here that it does not appear that the end of increasing rates has yet been reached and that the Pacific Electric may yet be allowed still higher rates.)

In the next paragraph on page 14, the commission further states that "we are satisfied that the motor car, private and public, is the most serious factor responsible for insufficient revenues." (I emphasize the private).

"Motor transportation as a competitor to steam and electric railroads has come to stay. The commission has repeatedly had occasion to state its attitude toward that transportation utility. The law is specific in recognizing this form of transportation as a carrier utility and there should be in our opinion opportunity for unobstructed development so that it may be demonstrated to what extent and under what circumstances. The motor common carrier is an advance over older forms of transportation and therefore is a superior instrument of public convenience and necessity and this conclusion would seem to be borne out by the other facts that the present applicant (the Pacific Electric) itself is now undertaking to supplement its electric service with motor service."

After carefully investigating all of the conditions brought to my attention and pertaining to the operation of motor busses between the City of Los Angeles and the City of Glendale, I respectfully recommend that the City of Glendale forthwith make every possible effort to install municipally-owned motor busses for the use of the people of Glendale, between the City of Los Angeles and the City of Glendale, and I so far have failed to find any legal or other causes that stand in your way that cannot be easily and readily overcome.

SYSTEM OF TRAILS NOW BEING BUILT THROUGH HILLS

Two Gangs of Men Are Busy on Fire Breaks; Notes of Glendale's Vicinity

Under the joint efforts of the county and the state a force of twenty or twenty-five men is at work building a system of trails and fire breaks in the Verdugo hills between Tujunga and Burbank. The men are working in two gangs, one from the east end and one from the west. Their camp is on the Hostetter ranch southeast of Phil Begue's and the east end of the fire breaks is near that point. The west end is in the Orange Cove district on the road to Roscoe.

Held Prisoner by Snow
Emil Swanson, proprietor of the Eagle Rock Lumber company, had a real experience last week in a southern California snow storm. He had gone to Lancaster, with four friends, to attend a Christian Endeavor rally. Over eighteen inches of snow fell in the streets of Lancaster, and more in the mountain passes and he could not return home for two days when he followed in the path of a large auto bus.

May Prospect for Oil
If an agreement is reached concerning certain details yet pending a lease may be signed between Phil Begue of Tujunga and L. L. Boas of parties whom the latter represents whereby a portion of the Begue ranch will be prospected for oil. The first well probably will be drilled in the edge of the hills a little southeast of the Begue residence. Mr. Boas hopes to find oil-bearing formation about 1800 feet down.

Publicity for Eagle Rock
H. E. Barnum, chairman of the publicity committee of the Eagle Rock Chamber of Commerce, proposed united action on several things that would help boost the city. Among these was more newspaper publicity and big electric signs at the east and west city limits on Colorado boulevard and at south city limits on Central avenue.
