GERMANY ACCEPTS TREATY UNCONDITIONALLY

WORKERS THREW DOWN TOOLS WHEN STRIKE ORDER WENT FORTH

Five Thousand Men Affected Here by Strike Called in Sympathy With Winnipeg; Shipbuilding Industry Tied up by Walk-out This Forenoon

In response to the mandate issued by the Metal Trades Council five thousand members of unions affiliated with that organization 'downed tools" here at 10 o'clock this morning in sympathy with the Winnipeg strikers.

Promptly at the stroke of the hour the strike went into effect and industrial activity was temporarily brought to a halt.

The largest employment organization affected by the walk-out in Victoria is the Foundation Company of British Columbia, Ltd., which concern carries on its payroll 3,200 men of all crafts.

Two hundred and fifty men employed by Yarrows, Ltd., of Esquimalt, are affected, and 180 employees of the Cholberg Ship Company, which concern is building three 1,500-ton schooners for Norwegian in-terests, quit work at the call of the

unions.

The Harbor Marine Company makes the claim that practically all its employees, composed mostly of returned soldiers, remining the job. This rard, however, employee and 140 men, the yard for the building of two \$100, ton steel ships for the Dominion Government, being in course of construction.

The employees of the Foundation Company left work as scheduled and for some time the Esquimalt and Nanaimo railway bridge was jammed with a moving mass of humanity bound citywards.

"We have decided to shut the yards down tight," said Edward E. Jenkins, assistant Northwest manager of the Foundation Company, as we are not desirous of antagonizing anyone and it would be impossible to carry on operations with half shifts."

Beyond this the Foundation manager, who quietly watched the men stream out of the yards, had nothing to say.

The men on the whole appeared to lack enthusiasm and an atmosphere of depression seemed to prevail as they quietly sauntered along. Knois of men gathered about the shipyard entrance and discussed the different phases leading up to the strike.

The strikers in many ways made it clear that they held no grievance against the company and regret was openly expressed that it had been necessary to declare a walkout.

As the Foundation employees, many of them carrying tool boxes and tools along, wended their way across the bridge, the employees of the Colbege Company and the Harbor Marine Company merged with them from the opposite direction.

There was a total absence of noise and no demonstrations.

It was remarked on all sides that it was the quietest walkout that had ever been witnessed here.

Yarrows men quilt work shortly after the hour set for the strike. Some 250 men are affected at the Lang Cove plant, but the apprentices and some machinists and carpenter's failed to leave as ordered by the unions.

Notice to Employees.

The management of Yarrows, Ltd., had a notice posted at the gates which reads as follows: "This yard will remain open for all those who wish to continue working. Are you going to benefit yourself by remaining away from work?"

MOUNTED POLICE STATIONED IN WINNIPEG STREET AND ORDER PREVAILS IN CITY

Winnipeg, June 23.—Shortly before noon to-day the Royal Northwest Mounted Police stationed in Winnipeg, with motor machine units, paraded on Main Street, where they still are. Traffic, however, has not been suspended and no reason so far has been as signed for the reappearance of the troops. Everything appears quiet.

Winnipeg. June 23.-Mayor Charles F. Gray announced this morning that all meetings are forbidden as long as Riot Act is in

force. This will be until normal conditions prevail, it is announced. As to the arrest of men who planned the parade, Mayor Gray said this was in the hands of the legal authorities.

A report, wholly unconfirmed, was current this morning that several of the men prominent in planning Saturday sparade had disappeared.

June 23.—On Sunday afternoon the scene of Saturday's fatal riot was absolutely mormaliust as dull and empty a pleture as Main Street in Winnipeg presents on any Sunday in the year, except that it was even a little emptire because of the absence of street cars. Around the City Hall were the usual groups, neither more nor less. They discussed listlessly the events of Saturday.

There was no sign of the mailed fist, but though unseen, it still held in its grip the lawless element of the city. Not a uniformed soldier was in sight, nor even the special police, conspicuous among other civilians by their white armiet. Yet one could imagine that at a shrill whistle these empty streets would have been populated again by scarlet-tuniced horsemen, by marching golumns in kahiffrom whose fixed bayonets the sun would glint, and by the armored cars of the motor machine gun units and the lorries of the field ambulance.

BOLSHEVIK GRAFT SUNK BY BRITISH

One Battleship Reported Tor pedoed; Another Hoisted White Flag

London, June 23.—The Bolshevik battleship Andrei Pervoswanni is believed to have been sunk by a British torpedo near Kronstadt on Thursday, according to a Finnish naval dispatch quoted in a Helsingfors dispatch to The Daily Mail.

The telegram adds that the Bolshevik battleship Petropavlosk has hoisted the white flag.

The Russian battleship Andrei Pervoswanni was laid down in January, 1903 and completed in 1941. She was 460 feet in length, with a beam of 80 feet, her draught being 27 feet and her displacement 17,400 tons. Her speed when new was 18 knots and her armament consisted of four 12-inch guns, fourteen 8-inch guns and smaller weapons and three torpedo tubes.

The battlecruiser Petropaylovsk is one of the largest warcraft-built by the Russians, being 590 feet in length and displacing 23,300 tons. She was laid down in 1903, her designed apeed being 23 knots. Her armament consists of twelve 12-inch guns and smaller pieces and four torpedo tubes.

INCREASE IN TAX RATE THIS YEAR

The city tax rate this year will probably be 1.75 mills on the dollar greater than the rate of 1918, according to an announcement which has been made by Mayor Porter. Last year the net rate for those who took advantage of the one-sixth discount was 25 mills. Should the city decide to tax improvements this year the tax rate will be entirely altered. THE ALLIES' TREATY PROBABLY WEDNES

Allied Powers Were Informed To-day German Government Will Sign Pact Unconditionally; Teutons Still Talk of "Peace of Violence"

Paris, June 23.—The German Government at Weimar has formally communicated its willingness to sign the peace treaty terms unconditionally, it was announced by the French Foreign Office this afternoon

The day and hour for the formal signing of the treaty are uncertain. The signing possibly may take place Tuesday, but more likely Wednesday.

The Italian delegates at present in Paris have been authorized to sign the treaty on behalf of Italy. This announcement removed one

The German note of acceptance, it is said, is couched in such language that it maintains the German position that the peace conditions are "a peace of violence."

The character of this communication was not disclosed, however, until some time later in the morning, when announcement was made that the German reguest had been rejected.



The announcement that Germany will sign unconditionally the peace treaty determined by the Allied and Associated powers in Paris was foreshadowed by the resignation of the Scheidemann Government. It was not anticipated that Scheidemann would sign. He was too closely identified with the pan-Germans and the Junkers to agree to an instrument one of the terms of which required the German Government to deliver to the Albes for trial and punishment William Hohenzollern, and the other war promoters and perpetrators of crimes against humanity whose names will be submitted to Weimar within the next thirty days. But if always was reasonably clear that Germany, through some Government, would sign the treaty, and the apprehensions of the Paris press that she would not do so were not based upon a very sound conception of German nature. Germany could do nothing else than sign. She is helpless on land and sea. She is under a blockade the continuation of which would have terrible consequences for her,

She realizes that she is confronted on every side with superior force, and that is something which every German for forty years has been taught to recognize at once and to obey. The treaty that will be signed by Germany has not been altered in its main essentials from the original instrument made public a few weeks ago. What changes have been inserted in it were designed chiefly to facilitate the making of reparation by Germany for the damage she wrought in her mad attempt to win world domination by the sword. THE STRIKE MANIA.

The strike called by the Metal Trades Council in this city cannot influence the situation in Winnipeg in the slightest. E. to mark the site of the residence form-erly occupied by Sir James Douglas in Elliott Street. A picturesque air was given to the impressive ceremony by the standards of the various L. O. D. E. Jones Evans, and the cadets of South Park School under Capt. PRICELESS WORKS OF ART LOST DURING WAR

Stray Art Treasures Is Now Suggested

The advertisement by Baron Vinck, owner of the Chateau of Hooghe, near Ypres, for the recovery, if possible, of objects of art that formerly adorned his mansion which have fallen into other hands during the war, raises a very interesting point for the art-lov-ing world, namely, the establishment of an international "pound" for lost art treasures, says a London dispatch. In the last four years valuable treasures have been scattered to the four winds. Great efforts have been made to get the bulk of the famous works of art out of the devastating line of Mars, but it has been only partially successful, and there are today, as a well known art collector pointed out recently, many thousands of pounds worth of precious artistic works buried beneath the battlefields of Europe.

Pictures, tapestry, carvings, manuscript and wrought precious metals have been stored in the vaults of chateaux, or walled up in hidden chambers—and in some cases the persons who set their seals upon the stores have died.

The Battle of 1918

It is most important that the event

As a matter of fact, many people do ot understand the sequence of events and are surprised that the war should have ended so suddenly. True to historical tradition, they were alto historical tradition, they were always expecting the decisive battle which named after a town or village, would immortalize the German defeat. They wanted an Austerlitz or Jena, a Solferino or Sedan. They do not realize that these battles, which bear such great names, were fought on a six, seven, or at the very most a twenty kilometer front. Only 100,000 or 200,000 men were engaged in the most important of these battles, which lasted one or two days at the longest.

Now our battle extended from the sea to the Mosselle, on a 400 kilometer front, and 6,000,000 men were employed in it. Little wonder, therefore, that it lasted seven and one-half months.

This, however, did not prevent it from being one single battle. The French, British, American, and Belgian armies fought incessantly under a common leader. They formed one huge army, which fought and won this unique and gigantic battle, treely obtaining the most brilliant victory in history.

The battle of 1918 began on March 21 and may be divided into three phases.

Until the middle of July—that is to say, during four months—the Germans took the offensive and obtained undeniable successes, which were, however, always checked and localized after a short time.

On July 18 the situation—was reversed. The great allied offensive began on the left bank of the Oise carried out by two French armies. The battle on the right bank was conducted by two other French armies and two British armies. In less than two months the Germans were everywhere compelled to retire to the lamous Hindenburg line, from which they had started four months before—At this moment the German attack may be said to have failed, their menhaving been driven back to their former positions at the point of the bayonet. The worst that even pessimists could say was that the battle was a draw.

But it was only the second phase;

But it was only the second phase; the third was about to begin.

At the Hindenburg Line.

It is well known that for three years the Hindenburg line, which the Germans called "Siegfried." had been the real line of demarkation between the latter and the Allies. The Germans regarded it as impregnable, and behind this bulwark, organized and reinforced daily, they had accumulated ammunition, constructed defences, and brought up a formidable amount of material. In fact, they had stripped Germany of all its war equipment in order to pile it up in France and Belgium in the sure protection of the Hindenburg line.

On September 26 the Allies attacked the Hindenburg line at different points—the American army and a French army and three British armies in the Saint Quentin-Cambrai zone.

After eight days of terrible fighting the Allies succeeded in breaking through the famous lines, shattering them at every point.

The German morale suddenly collapsed, and on October 4 Ladendorff, the Commander in Chief, askeed his Government to beg for an armistics.

It was too late, as the Allies were progressing fast. Along the whole front, from Escaul to the Meuse, their armies were engaged in widening the gaps, creating fresh ones and precipitating the German retreat. In Belgium a French army, a. British army, and the Belgian army were occupying positions in the line, thus extending the battlefield as fur as the sea, at a moment when the Germans were already lacking in peserves to defend the vital sectors which were most threatened.
