LETTER FROM NEW YORK.

Nov. 29th, 1878.
The city has been unusually quiet for
a few weeks past. Newspapers seem to
find it difficult to gather something
new. No great bank-robberies, no sick-
ening restorations of rich dead men.
The great city has only one purpose,
money-making. Its great heart throbs,
and millions pass from one hand to
another. Its pulse-beats are steady and
regular. Amid so much bustle and
confusion, who minds if from a
drowned pier is pulled out one of
among the piers? who cares if, now and
then, a self-excited victim is found in
some tenement house? they are but one
out of many. What is one to a million
and a half?

From what to church, from a crowded
market to the busy, sanctum sanctorum
of the editor, all is activity, all is activity.
Yet something new must be had.
What will it be?
The impression made by a great bank-
robbery, though two millions are given
wings, lasts in the common mind no
longer than the remembrance of a cloud
snowed. But in the minds of those men
and women, poorly clad and poorly fed,
who gathered about the doors of the
Manhattan Savings Institution, the
money lost meant so much bread for
the winter; it meant so much hard
toil for less than nothing. Suppose the
janitor did know the combination; what
right had he the president of that bank
to put it into his hands? Well, the money
is gone, and people have begun to forget
this and are already waiting to hear
of the next robbery or defalcation.
What next?

let Lincoln rest calmly in his mausoleum

Girls in the family at home, too, should always learn dressmaking in a scientific and practical manner, not from a mother, but from a teacher.

It is the duty of every mother, to see that her daughters are well instructed in the art of needlework, not only as a domestic accomplishment, but as a necessary preparation for the life they will lead.

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OUR WASHINGTON LETTER.

In person Gen. Buchanan was of a tall and erect military carriage, an air of the strictest discipline in the service, but socially genial and courteous to a fault. He leaves a widow, but, I think, no children.

The event of the week has been the debate in the Senate over the bill for the appropriation of \$1,000,000 for the purchase of land in the State of Missouri having been submerged and destroyed by an earthquake.

Gen. Buchanan served with distinction through the Mexican war, and commanded a brigade of regulars during the war of rebellion, engaging at one time during the peninsula campaign, a confederate brigade under the command of his brother-in-law, Gen. Winler.

The buildings are a pride to the country, and the committee can challenge comparison with any public or private work for economy, despatch, solidity and capacity. The buildings are placed in the form of a square, with a courtyard in the centre. The buildings are supplied with every convenience, and this I shall speak further on.

Major Cutler continued as Deputy Governor until June 1880, when he resigned, on account of ill health arising from wounds and disease, contracted in the war. He gave the best of satisfactory service, and the soldiers were very sorry to have him go. Col. E. A. Ludwick of New York, was placed in charge, after Gen. Cutler's resignation, but he held office but a short time, when he was succeeded by Gen. W. S. Tilton of Boston, who has continued in command ever since. I may as well dismiss him here.

While the institution is under his personal direction in a large measure, he may rest assured that nothing will be left undone that will in any manner conduce to the benefit, instruction and pleasure of the inmates at the home. One building which I forgot to mention is the theatre, a two story brick building, hall, etc., which is used for amusements and entertainments for the pleasure of the inmates. Thus far have I briefly sketched things as they have been, now what is the condition of affairs to-day.

Strong drink is a very important factor in the discipline of the home. If liquor can be kept from the soldier he makes no trouble. So says Gen. Butler, and in that we can all agree. When a man is influenced by drink, and this is especially noticeable in these asylums, he becomes uncontrollable, insubordinate and vicious; hence the necessity of keeping him away from the temptations of the large cities. There are many well disposed people who sometimes are inclined to treat a wounded, one-armed or one-legged soldier, little reckoning the consequences of their hospitality. The discipline here is firm, but kind, for light offences there is a reprimand or deprivation of privileges; for graver offences, confinement; for incorrigibility, expulsion. In the latter case a trial by court-martial is allowed.

All soldiers and sailors discharged in the service of the United States, who are unable to provide for themselves, may be admitted to the privileges of the home, if they have been honorably discharged from the service; and any beneficiary obtaining means of self-support may be discharged at his own request, and he has conducted himself in a becoming manner during his term at the home, he will be given a handsomely engraved certificate of honorable discharge. This discharge entitles the holder to readmission to any asylum, if his means support full him. The soldiers receive pensions, varying, I am told, from \$8 to \$50 per month. If a soldier has a family or any other dependent, the Treasurer of the home forwards the amount, after deducting some portion for use suited to the man's condition. Thus the families are given a small sum each month, while the soldier saves until a day of absence is given him.

From the annual report of General Tilton, for 1877, the following interesting facts are gleaned. The whole number of soldiers and sailors cared for or aided by the branch during the year, was 1255; whole number cared for since its opening in 1860, 3021. 257 were admitted during the year, and 145 were discharged. The average number present during the year was 703. Only 18 of the above were members of the regular army, 12 of the navy, and 1205 were of the volunteer service. 1227 were disabled in the civil war, 7 in the war of 1812, and 1 in the Mexican war. Of the 1255 inmates during the year, only one colored man was cared for, and he seems quite lonely, and will probably soon go to the southern branch of the asylum, in Hampton, Va., where there are over 500 colored men. Massachusetts furnishes the largest number of men, 501; New York 263, and Maine 198. There are only 14 under 30, while 20 veterans have braved the winters of 20 summers and the snows of 70 winters.
