## DIRECTIONS FOR CULTURE.

Pot Culture-Plant the bulbs in rich garden mould, mixed with one-third sand. learing only the top of bulb exposed. Water freely, and place the pot in a dark, cool place (away from frost), for six or seven weeks, to allow a rigorous growth of roots. Then they should be placed in a light, warm room, care being taken not to place in the full rays of the sun for a day or two. Six or seren inch pots are the most useful sizes.

Glass Culture-For this purpose single hyacinths are preferable; they flower more freely, earlier, and produce finer colors. Place the bulb in the glass, allowing the water to be as close to the bulb as possible without touching; place in a dark, cont closet till the roots have made a growth of from fire to six inches deep, when they should be remored to a light. warm room. As the water eraporates, fill up as before, and change erery two weeks. A small piece of charcoal in the water is beneficial.

Open-Gromul Culture-For a good effect they should be grown in beds or clumps. Plant in October, six inches apart each way and five inches deep, using rich soil well manured. Care must be taken not to press the earth too firmly around the bulbs. so as to allow of free drainage. At the approach of freezing weather, cover to the depth of four or fise inches with straw or litter, removing same early in the spring.

## EARLY SINGLE TULIPS.



The form and beauty of the tulips have been improved, until now almost every shade of color is found in them, including the most delicate and gorgeous hues.

Being perfectly hardy, their ease of culture, combined with beauty of form and gorgeous coloring, renders them the mcst popular bulbs grown for spring bedding, as well as for winter flowering in the greenlouse and winter garden.
For planting in the open ground, October and November are the best months: the bulbs should be planted from 5 to 6 inches apart, and from 3 to 4 inches deep.
When grown in pots, they should be putted from 3 to 5 in a pot, the soil and treatment being the same as for hyacinths.

The figures indicating the average height are given before each variety to aid selection for beds.

## A Few Directions for Forming Mushroom Beds.


#### Abstract

Tie Mushroom is one of the most profitalue crops grown, especially in the vicinity of large cities. where the demand, at all seasons, is far in excess of the supply. The best time for making Nushroom beds is in August and September, as in the fall months the natural heat is sufficient to cause the spawn to germinate freely, and the beds made then ought to bear freely before and up to Christmas. Mushrooms can be grown in sheds, cellars, caves, under benches in greenhouses, and in regular Mushroom houses. In preparing the materials, collect sufficient fre:h horse droppings to form the desired size of bed, spreading them out in an airy shed to dry, and turning them frequently. When in a proper state as to dryness, which will soon be learned by Experience, make these into a bed from



nine inches to one fout thick. beating then firmly toyether. If the droppings hare been properly prepared. gentle fermentation will soon commence, and when the temperature of the bed is from $i 5$ to $80^{\circ}$, with no danger of it rising higher, put in the spawn. This is done by maling shallow holes about nine inches apart, inserting pieces of spawu abnut the size of a hen's egg, and covering with the dung. pressing this closely about the spawn. It is of the greatest importance that the temperature of the bed should not decline below $75^{\circ}$ nor rise abore $80^{\circ}$ for a month after spawning. Within a fortnight after putting in the spawn, cover the bed about two inches thick with good mellow moist soil. making this firm; and if und+r this a covering one or two inches thick of cow dung, in about the same state as to moisture as the soil, can be afforded, this will cause the bed to last longer, and also to produce a larger crop than if covered with soil only. The most suitable temperature for beds in bearing is $50^{\circ}$ to $55^{\circ}$, and as a high temperature causes the Mushrooms to come small, this should be avoided. Watering beds in bearing often causes the small mushrooms to damp off; therefore, water only when the bed ceases to be productive, and then use the water about the same temperature as the bed.
Be sure that the Mushroom Spawn you buy is good. Half of the failures can be traced to the use of cheap, worthless spawn.
