

likely to affect the Sale injuriously.





One of the First Books Printed in New York, extremely rare; a large and fine copy; Bradford's earlier publications having been only pamphlets or broadsides. It was probably issued in April or May, 1694. In the Almanac for 1694 it is said: "The Laws will be speedily printed," while "Truth Advanced" is announced as "now in the press." This copy is slightly worm-eaten, and a few of the leaves are torn.

Mr. Sabin (Dictionary, No. 57224) assigns this volume to Philadelphia, but the Almanac quoted above makes this improbable. If printed in America, it certainly was printed by William Bradford, in New York, and must take precedence over the "Laws" as the first book published in New York. The type of this volume is the same, or from the same matrices, as Bradford's, and the internal evidence that the volume came from Bradford's Press would be conclusive, were it not for the occurrence of a very few Hebrew letters—about a dozen, in all—which have never been found in any other volume printed by him.

KELMSCOTT PRESS PUBLICATIONS.

A COMPLETE SET OF THE PUBLICATIONS ISSUED BY WILLIAM MORRIS AT THE KELMSCOTT PRESS. 68 volumes; 42 of which are printed upon vellum, and including the Froissart Trial Sheet (2 pages).

The volumes, arranged in the order of publication, are as follows [sold separately]:

This set is complete and in perfect condition, and the remarkable bindings illustrate the finest examples of the binder's art, including examples after Clovis Ève, Belz-Niédrée, Grolier, Maioli, Le Gascon, Roger Payne, Dérôme, Lewis, and Padeloup; and also after the styles known as classical, modern, antique, monastic, Greek, Fanfare, Corinthian, French eighteenth-century, Celtic, and Italian. The work achieved by William Morris as a poet and artist is amply recorded in these publications. The Kelmscott Press issued books in which every letter was beautiful, and the resulting influence has been such that the almost lost art of beautiful printing has been revived. Perfection in book-making has seldom in modern times been so nearly reached as in the productions of the Kelmscott Press.

Bound in full crushed levant moroccos, by Zaelmsdorf, in his best style and finish, selected skins having been employed, of great variety of colors and shadings. The edges are all gilt on the rough, by a new process, and the books are the full size as issued from the press. In accordance with the wishes of Mr. Morris, none of these volumes have been pressed, he feeling that pressure deprived the paper of its crispness, and that the type and color were deadened.





"My dear Peacock:

I have lost some letters, & in all probability at least one from you, as I can account in no other manner for not having heard from you since your letter dated March 26th, especially as you must know my anxiety to be informed that the mistake which it announced to me has been rectified. We have changed our design of going to Florence immediately, & are now established for three months in a little country house, in a pretty verdent scene near Livorno.

I have a study here in a tower something like Icythrops'—where I am just beginning to recover the faculties of reading and writing. My health whenever in Libecchis blows, improves.—From my tower I see the sea with its islands, Gorgona, Africa, Elba, & Corsica, on one side, & the Appennens on the other. Milly surprised us the other day by first discovering a comet, on which we have been speculating. 'She may make a stir, like a great astronomer.'

The direct purpose of this letter however is to ask you about the box which I requested you to send to me at Naples. If it has been sent, let me entreat you (for really it is of the most serious consequences to us) to write to me by return of post, stating the

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name of the ship, the bill of lading, etc., so that I may get it without difficulty. If it has not been sent, do me the favour to send it instantly direct to Livorno. If you have not the time, you can ask Hogg. If you cannot get the things from Mr. Hunt (a possible case) send those you were to buy, & the things from Furnival alone. You can add what books you think fit. The last parcel I have received from you is that of last September.

All good wishes, & many hopes that you have already that success of which there will be no congratulations move disinterested than those you will receive from me.

P. B. Shelley.

Livorno, July 6, 1819.

I shall receive your answer if written by return of Post in 30 days.—A distance less formidable than Rome or Naples."

It was on June 6th, just one month before this letter was written, that Percy and Mary Shelley had lost by death, at Rome, from fever, their eldest born, William. Disconsolate, they went to the beautiful hills at Livorno, in Tuscany, to the Villa Valsovano overlooking the sea, as Shelley has written, "an airy country house, a short distance from Leghorn, standing at the end of a green lane, surrounded by a tiny estate, worked as a market garden," there trying "to forget grief and check spiritual despondency." Under the burden of this sorrow was commenced and finished "the sombre, magnificent, repellent, fascinating, and, in modern times, unsurpassed, drama of 'The Cenci,'" built upon the strange and tragic history of the evil Count Francesco Cenci.

This extremely valuable manuscript, of the first of the "Idylls" which was written, is doubtless the original draft of the "Enid" and "Nimuë" portions of the "Idylls of the King." Nimuë, afterwards changed by Tennyson to Vivien for the sake of euphony, was the name given in the old legends and chronicles to the "false" heroine. "Vivien" was the second Idyll in the edition of 1859, and by numerous additions and changes became, in the completed work, the sixth part, entitled "Merlin and Vivien." In 1857 Tennyson privately issued six trial-copies, with the title, "Enid and Nimuë: The True and the False," of which only one copy (131 pp.), that in the British Museum, is now in existence: wherein the reading corresponds nearly to this manuscript, but quite materially differs from the text of "Vivien" as it appeared in the first edition of the "Idvlls of the King," dated 1859, the changes in the text having probably been made in the printer's proofs. There is also included the manuscript of a portion of the Idyll entitled "Enid," which also differs from the final text. 


