SUBJECT: Army Civilian Grain Reserve Program

TO : Commanding General
I Corps
APO 301

1. Reference is made to paragraph 15 of Operational Directive 26/2, this headquarters, 21 May 1947, subject: "Food Distribution."
2. A Grain Reserve will be established during the 1948 rice year (1 November 1947 - 31 October 1948). The reserves will be established as follows:
 - a. It will be stored in Tokyo, Yokohama, Nagoya and Osaka.
 - b. It will consist of 100,000 metric tons of Japanese rice stored in substitution of imported food released for distribution.
 - c. It will be guarded by the Japanese Government and not transported or distributed without authorization by this headquarters.
3. Information concerning the location and quantities of rice to be stored will be forwarded to your headquarters when the Japanese Government is directed to execute this program.

ATTENTION: Military Government Section

1. Reference is made to Operational Directive 78/1, Headquarters Eighth Army, subject: "Import Procedure", dated 4 October 1946.

2. In compliance with paragraph 2 i of reference, the following report is submitted:

a. Approximately 3½ long tons (7,840lbs) of bulk wheat was damaged by fuel oil leaking into hatch No.4.

b. The extent of the damage to the wheat has made the wheat unfit for human consumption or animal forage.

c. The dollar estimate of damage sustained was figured to be \$261.33. The Nagasaki Wheat Importers Association computed this figure on the basis of two dollars (\$2.00) per one hundred (100) kilograms.

d. The Board of Trade (Boeki-Cho) representative of Sasebo has informed this headquarters that the damaged wheat will be used as fertilizer.

e. Enclosed herewith is a report submitted to the Nagasaki Military Government Team by the Master of SS. "Philip Kearney" which completed discharge of cargo on 5 October 1947 at Sasebo City, Nagasaki Ken, and also a report submitted by Board of Trade, Sasebo.

1. In compliance with Eighth Army, Operational Directive 83/1, dated 17 October 1946, subject as above, the following report is submitted:

a. The full supplementary ration was issued in Kagoshima.

b. Food issued to foreign nationals is of good quality.

c. Issuance of the supplementary rations was started 1 October 1946 and was made retroactive to August.

d. Kagoshima Prefecture received instructions making issuance of supplementary rations mandatory 19 September. Further instructions were received 7 October.

e. The rice dietary was not increased voluntarily but since February foreign nationals who asked for it could get it.

f. 311 Chinese, 3 British, 7 Hollanders including Indonesians and 1 Russian were reported receiving supplemental rations 31 October.

SUBJECT: Supplementary Rations for Foreign Nationals

**TO : Commanding General, Headquarters Eighth Army, APO 343
(THROUGH CHANNELS).**

In compliance with instructions contained in paragraph 2 a Operational Directive 83/1 Hq. Eighth Army dated 17 October 1946 the following information is submitted concerning the supply of supplementary rations to foreign nationals in Saga Prefecture.

a. Compliance with Operational Directive 83 Hq. Eighth Army dated 3 October 1946.

- (1) Interviews with foreign Nationals receiving the supplementary basic rice dietary indicate that food of sufficient quantity is available but that flour is of a poor quality. However foreign nationals receiving the supplementary basic non-rice dietary indicate that meat (canned or fresh) has not been received and that butter is not being received regularly.
- (2) Interview of local Japanese Official in charge of rationing indicate that there is a great shortage of meat and butter in SAGA prefecture and no substitutes for these items have yet been arranged. The Japanese Government increased voluntarily some of the items in the supplementary ration for foreign nationals in the basic rice dietaries and basic non-rice dietaries.
- (3) The supplementary ration agreed upon is as follows:

a - Basic rice dietaries.

- (4) Interview with foreign nationals receiving rations indicate that the Japanese officials in charge of rationing are not too efficient but courteous in their relations with the foreign nationals.

b. Compliance with Operational Directive 83/1 Hq. Eighth Army dated 17 October 1946.

- (1) Interviews with foreign nationals receiving supplementary basic non-rice dietary indicate that meat (canned or fresh) has not been received and that butter has not been received regularly. Other items listed in the supplementary basic rice dietary and non - rice dietary are rationed accordingly.
- (2) Inspections made of various supply points of food-stuff have shown that flour rationed are of poor quality but the other items being of suitable quality.
- (3) The date the issuance of the supplementary ration commenced from 23 September 1946. Supplementary rations for foreign nationals was retroactive as of 15 August 1946.
- (4) The date the local prefectural government received instruction making it mandatory that the supplementary ration be granted to foreign nationals was on 18 September 1946.

Cont. Supplemental Ration for Foreign Nationals

- (5) Interview with the Food Control Section Official of the local government office concerning supplementary ration indicates that the Japanese Government increased voluntarily some of the items in the basic rice dietary and basic non - rice dietary.
- (6) Interview with a number of foreign nationals indicates that choice have been given between the basic rice dietary and non - rice dietary.
- (7) Number of foreign nationals, by nationality, receiving the supplementary ration according to records maintained by the prefectural government.

SUBJECT: Report on "Ration for United Nations' Nationals, Neutral Nationals and Stateless Persons."

THROUGH: Kyushu Military Government Region, Hq & Hq Detachment, APO 929

TO : Headquarters Eighth Army, APO 343

1. This headquarters has interviewed the Foreign Nationals residing in Nagasaki Prefecture and have also conducted an inspection by the Foodstuffs Officer of the Nagasaki Military Government Team of the place where the Foreign Nationals draw their rations and the following report is hereby submitted as per O.D. 83/1, Headquarters Eighth Army, subject: "Rations for United Nations' Nationals, Neutral Nationals and Stateless Persons", dated 17 October 1946.

a. Foreign Nationals, both Occidentals and Orientals are receiving their full share of the supplementary rations.

b. The food issued to Foreign Nationals is of suitable quality and is up to standard.

c. The date the issuance of the supplementary ration commenced here in Nagasaki Prefecture was 15 October 1946.

d. The date the local prefecture government received instructions making it mandatory that the supplementary ration be granted was 1st October 1946.

e. The rice dietary was not increased voluntarily by the Japanese.

f. The Foreign Nationals have been notified of a given choice between the basic rice dietary and non-rice dietary, and for the most part the occidentals have been taking non-rice dietary and the orientals taking rice dietary.

g. Following is the list of foreign nationals, by nationality receiving the supplementary food ration, as submitted by the Chief of Foodstuff Section, Nagasaki Prefectural Government.

1. The following report is submitted in compliance with par 2a
 CD No.83/1:

A. As reported by Ken Officials

- (1) The Oita-Ken Government reports that the full ration has been made available with the exception of butter. They further report that requests have been made for the additional butter requirements.
- (2) The food issued is of suitable quality except flour which is made from Japanese wheat.
- (3) Issue of supplementary ration was commenced 3 December 1945.
- (4) Instructions were received 3 December 1945 to make supplementary rations available. Local Authorities had not received SCAPIN 1207 as of 4 November 1946.
- (5) Rice dietary has not been increased voluntarily by the Japanese.
- (6) A choice is given as to the selection of basic rice or non rice dietary.
- (7) As of 8 October 1946 the following are receiving supplementary rations.

B. As indicated by interviews with 14 eligible recipients.

- (1) of the 14 Foreign Nationals interviewed, none have received the full supplementary ration.
- (2) all of the Foreign Nationals who received food report that the flour that they were able to procure was not of suitable quality.
- (3) The interviews showed a great variation in the date of the first issue of supplementary ration. The earliest being October 1945 and the latest being August 1946.
- (4) The rice dietary has not been increased.
- (5) Only two persons reported having the choice of a rice or non-rice dietary.

C. The Foreign Nationals interviewed complained of the inconvenience of not having a central purchasing point. The places for the purchase of food are in Beppu & Oita and each store handles only one of the foods. To purchase canned food the Foreign Nationals are required to go to Moji which does not have a supply at all times.

The Chinese Nationals report having received only a very small part of their supplementary ration and this comes irregularly. The Chinese Nationals received their supplementary ration from a Central distributing point, however, it is very irregular with two to three months between ration. They report they have no choice as to what they will receive.

2. It is desired that the following action be taken by each Corps Commander, the Commanding Officer, Tokyo-Kanagawa Military Government District, and the Commanding Officer, of the Chugoku and Shikoku Military Government Regions:

a. When informed by this headquarters of the exact supplementary ration agreed upon, require frequent inspections of Foreign Nationals' ration supply points of the Japanese Government to assure that food of sufficient quantity and quality is regularly available for purchase by foreign nationals.

b. Require from local Japanese officials in charge of rationing, advance warning when articles of food must be substituted and the necessity for the substitution in sufficient time to report such change in rationing to this headquarters.

c. Require, from local Japanese officials in charge of rationing, efficient and courteous treatment in their relations with the foreign nationals, and assure that no discrimination in distribution of food supplies to Foreign Nationals is exercised.

3. When violations of paragraphs 2a, b or c above, are observed, corrective action will be taken and report thereof made to this headquarters.

This headquarters shares the concern of the Miyazaki Military Government Team concerning the immediate availability of chlorine for water purification throughout Kyushu and Southwestern Honshu when the subject plant is required to cease operations under reparations program. While it is undoubtedly true that remaining Caustic Soda plants in Japan will eventually increase production to provide for needs mentioned in paragraph 5a of basic letter, it is feared that there may be a long period when highly essential needs will not be met, particularly the requirements of programs of water purification initiated by Occupation Forces to prevent epidemic disease.

1. Returned. On 11 October, this headquarters placed a 7th Indorsement on a previous application concerning removal of subject plant from reparations list, returning that application to the Miyazaki Military Government Team. The 4th Indorsement on that application comprised a strong rejection of the application by SCAP on the basis of the fact that reparations plants had been chosen only after careful study of the whole of the Japanese economy, and that the Asahi plant was found upon investigation to have been built for wartime use, and to be unessential to the peacetime economy. There are, in addition, two subsequent applications for removal of this plant from the reparations list, originated by your headquarters, now in the mails. Since these are likely now to be in process of return from SCAP with similar unfavorable indorsements, it is felt that the submission of further applications, at this time, is unwise. If the two applications now in the mails are returned with less unfavorable endorsements than the first, which is not thought likely, renewed effort might then be made by your headquarters. These two applications bear very strong favorable endorsements from this headquarters.

2. The application from the Mayor of Nobeoka confirms SCAP contention that the main development of the Asahi plants and the growth of Nobeoka city itself corresponded with the period of the Manchurian incident, though some of the plants were established a few years earlier.

3. The application from Mayor Futami is not signed.

4. There is no reason why these applications cannot be submitted through Japanese channels to the Central Government, and this would seem appropriate as they concern the effect of loss of the subject plant upon the civil economy and not upon the Occupation Forces.

5. The Kyushu Central Liaison Committee is certain that chlorine for water purification will be available from remaining plants to take care of all prefectures in Kyushu.

1. Reference is made to letter AG 430-BA, Headquarters I Corps, dated 13 July 46, Subject: Supplemental Ration for Foreign Nationals which contained as an inclosure 2nd Indorsement dated 21 June 46 from SCAP addressed to Eighth Army to a letter AG 430.2PM dated 20 May 1946.

2. This indorsement includes an explanation of the Japanese plan of distribution of food to foreign nationals which states that European and American born women married to Japanese nationals will receive supplemental rations being given to foreign nationals and that their children will also receive such supplementary rations.

3. However, Japanese officials in Kyushu now states that a new plan issued by the Central Government (21 Serial No. 1738, Dept of Agriculture & Forestry, dtd 14 Sep 1946) deprives European and American born women married to Japanese nationals and their children from receiving such supplementary ration.

4. Since basic SCAP Directives concerning food for foreign nationals state that the purpose is to provide for the psychological need for such food by foreign nationals, it is believed that American and European born persons should continue to receive foreign national rations.

5. It is requested that higher headquarters verify the fact that European and American born women married to Japanese nationals and their children are not entitled to receive any longer the supplementary rations given to foreign nationals.

1. Enclosed are itemized lists of Foodstuffs formerly belonging to the 2nd Marine Division then stationed in Sasebo and turned over to this Headquarters for distribution to the Sasebo V.D. clinic and other hospitals as per verbal orders of Col. Bing, Commanding Officer of the 34th Infantry Regiment, Sasebo.

2. So far only the perishable foods have been distributed to the V.D. clinic, Hospitals and citizens of Sasebo. The canned foodstuffs are now stored in 4 warehouses in Sasebo, under Japanese guards. This food to be placed under the category of American imported foods and to be distributed according to regulations and plans regarding imported American foodstuffs.

3. These lists are the same as those submitted by this Headquarters on 20 September 1946, except that these bear the signature of the Boeki-cho and on page 4 of ITEM I note the change of corned-beef, third item from the end of list. It is now corrected to "12x6#".

SUBJECT: Special Report on Unloading of Imported Foodstuffs
from US Ship HENNEPIN.

TO : Commanding Officer, Kyushu Military Government Region,
Hq & Hq Det.

1. On 23 July 1946, representatives of this headquarters proceeded to MIKE Port to check on the progress of the unloading of imported foodstuffs from the US ship HENNEPIN and the warehousing of same.

2. The unloading of the ship has been going forward rapidly and approximately 50% of the cargo has been unloaded. There are 250 stevedores, 50 foremen and 22 policemen engaged in the discharging of the cargo. Cargo is being discharged simultaneously from both sides of the ship. On the pier side, it is being loaded to freight cars and hand cars, then hauled to warehouses. On the opposite side of the ship, the cargo is being discharged to barges and lightered to another pier where the cargo is transferred to freight cars, then hauled to warehouses near the pier.

3. For the most part, the cargo has been found to be in excellent condition, however, due to the shifting of the cargo in transit, approximately 250 cases of food have been damaged. Most of the damaged cases were cardboard cartons that fell apart due to cans being smashed and contents soaking the cardboard. Other damaged cases contained cereals that broke open due to excessive weight and rough handling. Every effort has been made to salvage all loose canned goods and cereals by placing them in sacks.

4. The warehousing of the imported foods is going ahead smoothly and more efficiently than had been anticipated due to the language difficulty. Only in one incident was it necessary to correct the warehousing procedure.

5. There are adequate police guards on the warehouses and there are two police guards in each hold of the ship during unloading operations. All workers are searched at the end of each days work, before they leave the warehouse area and to date there has not been one case of attempted theft reported. There are adequate "cargo counters", checking the food from the holds

of the ship to the freight cars and hand carts and from the latter to the warehouses.

6. Due to the bulk of the cargo, it has been found that there is not sufficient warehouse space remaining at MIIKE Port for the balance of the cargo. To conform to instructions contained in radio, Hqs I Corps, dated 19 July 1946, to store separately items of sugar, lard and relishes, instructions were issued to the BOEKI-CHO to ship by rail the aforementioned items to MOJI for storage in a warehouse under the control of the Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry. In addition, all evaporated milk and all of the tomatoe puree will also be shipped to MOJI. This warehouse has a capacity of 10,000 tons. It may be necessary at a later date to trans-ship all of the cargo to this warehouse, as the Japanese port officials at MIKI have information that there are more ships with imported food-stuffs due for arrival in the near future.

7. The Chief of the OMTA Police Department has arranged for adequate police guard on all food shipments by rail and his plan is attached hereto as inclosure number 1.

Plan of the OMUTA Police Chief for the safeguarding of Foodstuffs in Transit.

The railway transportation of foodstuffs which were imported in the MIIKE HARBOR must be guarded as follows:

1. Transportation of foodstuffs to MOJI by railroad must be guarded as follows:

a. The foodstuffs will be shipped by special train or trains as necessary.

b. This train or trains must be guarded by policemen on the way by order of the chief of the OMUTA Police Station.

c. Upon arrival at MOJI, the responsibility for guarding the foodstuffs will be transferred to the chief of the MOJI Police.

d. The chief of the OMUTA Police will report the change of responsibility in guarding the foodstuffs, to the Fukuoka Military Government Team, when effected, via the chief of the Fukuoka Ken Police.

e. The officials of the Provisions office and the Station Master at OMUTA must report the time of departure and ETA MOJI, of all special food trains, to the chief of Police OMUTA, who will relay the information to the chief of the Fukuoka Ken Police.

2. The transportation of foodstuffs imported on the SAM DAUNTLESS and being released for distribution to consumers, will be safeguarded as follows:

a. A special train must be composed when large quantities are being transported to the same destination. If quantity is not large enough to warrant a special train, all foodstuffs will be kept together on special cars and attached to regular trains.

b. The train must be guarded as mentioned in 1b and c of the above.

c. If the destination of each car is different, guarding must be managed as follows:

- (1) Arrangements will be made for police to guard the cars until train leaves OMUTA Station.
- (2) Officials of the railway company must assume responsibility for the cargo until its arrival at destination.
- (3) Upon arrival at destination, local police at destination will assume responsibility.

- (4) Should an accident or breakdown occur enroute, it is the responsibility of the railway officials to obtain adequate police guard from the nearest locality during the period of delay.
- (5) The chief of the OMTA Police, proper policemen and officials of the railway, must always maintain close liaison between each other, that proper safeguard is maintained over shipments of food, before shipment, during transit, delays, stops and upon arrival at destination.

SUBJECT: Disposition of Foodstuffs Left by Marines at Sasebo

TO : Commanding General, I Corps, APC 301
Attn: Military Government Section

1. In compliance with telephonic request of Welfare Office, Military Government Section, your headquarters, made on 10 September, an investigation has been made of the disposition of foodstuffs left by the Marines at Sasebo.

2. The Military Government Detachment in the Sasebo area informs this headquarters that 9000 tons of foodstuffs were left by the Marines in Sasebo and disposition was arranged by representatives of SCAP and Eighth Army in conjunction with Col. Bing of 34th Infantry. A total of 8000 tons was turned over by the Eighth Army representative to the 24th Division and possibly additional tactical units. Eighth Army handled, and has the records of these transactions.

3. Of the 1000 tons turned over to Military Government, the entire amount was or is being disposed of in compliance with instructions from Col. Bing and the above mentioned SCAP and Eighth Army representatives. Food which was completely deteriorated was destroyed. About 160 tons of spoiling food was distributed to hospitals in the area as shown in the reports from Military Government unit at Sasebo forwarded as enclosures to this letter. The remainder of the food is now stored in four warehouses in Sasebo under Japanese guard and sale to the Japanese is being negotiated through the Boeki Cho, Military Government, Sasebo, and the Quartermaster, 24th Division, in compliance with current directives. This food is in danger of spoilage unless immediate distribution is carried out.



2. It is desired that the following action be taken by each Corps Commander, the Commanding Officer, Tokyo-Kanagawa Military Government District, and the Commanding Officer, of the Chugoku and Shikoku Military Government Regions:

a. When informed by this headquarters of the exact supplementary ration agreed upon, require frequent inspections of Foreign Nationals' ration supply points of the Japanese Government to assure that food of sufficient quantity and quality is regularly available for purchase by foreign nationals.

b. Require from local Japanese officials in charge of rationing, advance warning when articles of food must be substituted and the necessity for the substitution in sufficient time to report such change in rationing to this headquarters.

c. Require, from local Japanese officials in charge of rationing, efficient and courteous treatment in their relations with the foreign nationals, and assure that no discrimination in distribution of food supplies to Foreign Nationals is exercised.

3. When violations of paragraphs 2a, b or c above, are observed, corrective action will be taken and report thereof made to this headquarters.

TO : Commanding Officer, Kyushu Mil Govt Region, Hq & Hq Det, APO 929.

1. Reference is made to letter 37th Mil Govt Hq Hq Co., dated 19 June 1946, subject: "Storage and Distribution of Imported Foodstuffs".

2. Above subject letter forwarded a report to Commanding General, I Corps, on imported foodstuffs turned over to the Fukuoka Food Control Bureau by the 29th Military Government Hq & Hq Co. on 7 May 1946, and held in storage at 624 Nonaku-Machi, Kurume Shi, Fukuoka Ken, and said report was returned to this headquarters as being no longer required.

3. The items held in storage are as follows:

4. The undersigned officer inspected the above imported foodstuffs and found them to be in fair condition, however, it was noted that some of the tinned fish showed a tendency towards swelling in the hot weather. The imported rice was well packed in sacks and all appeared to be intact, but it was impossible to determine whether or not bugs were getting into the sacks.

5. In addition to the above foodstuffs, there were 15,357 pounds of rice, 2,859 pounds of beans and 38 cases of pilchards, all from the same source, that had to be distributed last May due to the advanced state of deterioration.

6. In view of the current food shortage in this prefecture and the length of time the foodstuffs listed above have been in storage, it is the recommendation of this office that all of the above imported foodstuffs be released to the Fukuoka Ken Government for distribution thru regular distribution channels.



It has come to the attention of this office that former U.S. Army canned Pilchards released to Japanese Government for immediate distribution because of danger of spoilage, are being sold at a price of ¥ 5.— per pound. This selling price is said to be authorized by the Agricultural Ministry of the Imperial Japanese Government.

2. This price is out of proportion to the tentative cost price, based on Quartermaster prices of the U.S. Army stocks released to the Japanese. For canned pilchards, Quartermaster prices are as follows:

The Japanese Government is responsible for establishing yen prices on imported commodities and these prices are usually comparable to prices charged for similar items in the Japanese market. There is no direct relationship between the exchange rate of 15 yen per one U.S. dollar used for paying occupation force personnel and the yen prices which will eventually be charged the Japanese Government for imported commodities.
