MEMORANDUM

Subject: Treatment of Prisoners of War

- 1. Prior to commencing the Westward advance to Japan, all Naval personnel were directed to comply with the Geneva Convention of 27 July 1929.
- 2. In my capacity as Commander in Chief, Pacific Fleet and Pacific Ocean areas from immediately after the attack on Pearl Harbor until after the termination of hostilities, and since that time as Chief of Naval Operations, I can state categorically that to the best of my knowledge and belief, Japanese Prisoners of War were treated in conformity with the spirit and letter of the Geneva Convention of 1929.
