SUBMARINE DISPUTE WITH GERMANY

President Wilson has all along in the dispute with Germany over the sinking of liners with American citizens on board maintained the right of Americans to sail the seas in safety regardless of what foreign countries may think on the matter. Now the issue between Germany and the United States has narrowed down to a point where the kaiser intimates that German submarines will sink on sight armed merchantmen encountered on the high seas. The campaign begins after midnight tonight and as there are known to be no fewer than eight liners on the Atlantic ocean in the danger Liberal reward. Phone 748. 162t6 zone there is likely to be some news by tomorrow morning.

Unless Germany should experience a change of heart and her ally Austria change with her the issue between Germany and the United States is certain to come to a point tomorrow. President Wilson has already indicated that he is anxious to keep this country out of war; but, as he also indicated recently, there are times when even war must be faced if that which a nation must value beyond all else is attacked.

The United States government has noted a change in the atti- dale. Sunset 154. tude of the Central powers during the past few days. The Central powers, understanding that the President of the United States has taken his stand on this matter of the right of Americans to travel on the seas in safety and that he believes that American rights, American honor and American self-respect are all at stake, still persist in their policy of sinking merchantmen. They are now determined to defy the United States and to see what will be done. The United States holds that according to the law of nations no belligerent has any right to sink merchantmen armed or unarmed without first warning them and giving the crew and passengers a chance

Germany holds that she has a right to sink any belligerent merchantman on suspicion but adds, "No enemy merchantman is to be torpedoed without warning unless the presence of armament on board such vessel is proved." The Teutons' note is a defense of Sunset 1031; Home 2911, Glendale. the submarine decrees and a criticism of the practice of merchantmen carrying guns under modern conditions.

It is thought rather singular that the memorandum says nothing regarding the manner in which the German submarine commanders under their new orders are to discover proof as to the presence of armament on board enemy merchantmen. It is also very pertinently added that a submarine commander might easily construe that a vessel was armed because her captain and mates, passengers and crew, carried revolvers; or because there were some rifles on board, yet these weapons are carried on every vessel and even private Call Sunset 515-J. 1317 N. Brand. yachts seldom go to sea without armament of some kind.

The right to be armed for self protection is one of the oldest rights of the sea. The United States has always maintained it as part of its marine creed and it is very apparent that notwithstanding Teuton threats and the determination of the German and Austrian leaders to try to force other countries to adopt new rules for seagoing vessels and to subject everything to the domination of the frail submarine, that this and other neutral countries will not sub-

Whatever may be the result of the president's determination to stand by the policy he has enunciated he may be assured of the fireless cooker, "Ideal;" library table, fact that the country will stand behind him.

COMING WAR DEVELOPMENTS

With the German attack on the forts at Verdun still undecided it is impossible to indicate what may be the outcome of the next few months in the field of war. If the French lines still hold and the Germans are compelled to admit that their assault is a failure there will come a vast change over the aspect of the war. On the other hand, if the Germans should manage to break through the French lines not only will Paris be in danger but the way will be open for another determined attempt to break through to the sea at Calais. Then would come the long threatened attack on Britain by land forces.

Up to this point the French line, though sorely battered by the most wild assault ever recorded in history, is still holding firm. It is estimated that the Germans have 750,000 men in line at Verdun and that the French have an equal number. It is reported that 45,000 German dead lie in the Verdun woods and is is said 30,000 French dead lie in the in the shattered trenches and blasted fields.

When one reads of these numbers of dead and thinks of the 100,000 wounded that are reported to be streaming back from the Teuton lines in an endless river, one is apt to pause and think of the proposed army of 145,000 men for the United States. It is certain that in the new developments that are being made in war 145,000 men would be but a mouthful. The new tactics are to mass men in quarter column and throw them up against entrenchments where there bristle a thousand, yea a hundred thousand machine guns, on the supposition that some of the troops will get through.

Again the ammunition needed in a single battle, which may be counted on to last three weeks at least, is more than all the factories of the United States could manufacture in six months. "Drum fire" so called because it is incessant and resembles in sound the continuous roll of the drum uses up ammunition at a very great rate. Machine guns fire 400 shots a minute. The condition of modern warfare are so different from anything that has been known even in the past ten years that everything that has gone before is mere child's play.

United States statesmen are beginning to realize what has been told them a thousand times during the past five years-that this country is so far behind in army numbers and in munitions of
