

COMING OF CHRIST

REV. JOHN TROY PREACHES ELOQUENT SERMON AS FAREWELL TO GLENDALE

At the evening service at the First Baptist church, Sunday, the Rev. John Troy preached an eloquent sermon on the subject of "The Revelation of Jesus Christ." There was a crowded congregation which listened with profound attention to the last sermon that Mr. Troy will ever preach as pastor of the First Baptist church. He said:

THE REVELATION OF JESUS CHRIST

The first three words of the first chapter of the last book of the Bible are translated, "The Revelation of Jesus Christ." Teachers of the Second Coming of Christ might better proclaim "The Revelation of Jesus Christ." The scriptural terminology is more comprehensive and descriptive.

The Greek word translated "revelation" (apokalupsis) means taking off the cover, disclosure, appearing. The name "Jesus" is the Greek form of Joshua, contraction of Jehoshua, meaning "Jehovah saved." "And she shall bring forth a son, and thou shalt call his name Jesus: for he shall save his people from their sins," Mt. 1:21.

Christ means anointed, Messiah. The revelation of Jesus Christ is the uncovering of Jehovah as Saviour and Messiah. The book of Revelation tells of the lifting of the cover of all things in the heavens, on the earth and under the earth, the disclosure of Jesus Christ, Saviour and Messiah, "the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ."

The great uncovering will be protracted and climactic. Yonder in Palestine, amid the historic surroundings in the valley of Jehoshaphat, above the road of earth's greatest battle will sound the voice of God and "every eye shall see him, and they also which pierced him and all the tribes of the land shall wail because of him." Armageddon means "crowded." Jehoshaphat means Jehovah judged. In the coming battle of Armageddon Jehovah will be revealed, a mighty climax in the affairs of the Gentile nations of Israel. It will be a crowding of the nations (Megiddo in the valley of Jehoshaphat (Judged of God).

"For, behold, in those days, and in that time, when I shall bring again the captivity of Judah and Jerusalem, I will also gather all nations, and I will bring them down into the valley of Jehoshaphat, and will plead with them there for my people and for my heritage Israel, whom they have scattered among the nations, and parted my land. But Judah shall dwell for ever, and Jerusalem from generation to generation. For I will cleanse their blood that I have not cleansed: for the Lord dwelleth in Zion."—Joel 3:1, 2, 20, 21.

At this present time Christ is veiled to the Jews (Israel). "But even unto this day, when Moses is read, the veil is upon their heart," II Cor. 3:13-14. "For I would not, brethren, that ye should be ignorant of this mystery, lest ye should be wise in your own conceits; that blindness in part is happened to Israel, until the fulness of the Gentiles be come in." Rom. 11:21.

In the revelation of Jesus Christ the veil upon the heart of Israel will be taken away. "Nevertheless when it shall turn to the Lord, the veil shall be taken away," II Cor. 3:16. Listen to Christ's farewell message to the lost sheep of the house of Israel: "O Jerusalem, Jerusalem, thou that killest the prophets and stonest them which are sent unto thee, how often would I have gathered thy children together, even as a hen gathereth her chickens under her wings, and ye would not! Behold, your house is left unto you desolate. For I say unto you, Ye shall not see me henceforth, till ye shall say, Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord," Mt. 23:37-39.

Zechariah speaks of that time when Jesus Christ shall be revealed to Israel and they shall say, "Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord."

"And it shall come to pass in that day, that I will seek to destroy all the nations that come against Jerusalem. And I will pour upon the house of David, and upon the inhabitants of Jerusalem, the spirit of grace and of supplications: and they shall look upon me whom they have pierced, and they shall mourn for him, as one mourneth for his only son, and shall be in bitterness for him, as one that is in bitterness for his firstborn," Zec. 12:9, 10.

Jesus Christ, crucified and raised from the dead, is also veiled to the Gentile nations of the earth. "Him God raised up the third day, and showed him openly; not to all the people, but unto witnesses chosen be-

A very strong fight is being made against him by the party of "personal liberty." The mayor has lost seven important wards where he was vigorously supporting his own candidates for aldermen.

PROVENCE WAS SUNK BY SUBMARINE

FRENCH ASCERTAIN THAT THEIR AUXILIARY VESSEL WAS TORPEDOED BY TEUTON UNDERSEA BOAT

PARIS, March 1.—It was definitely ascertained today, the minister of marine announces, that the auxiliary cruiser Provence was sunk by a German submarine. Many of the sailors and marines on board the auxiliary vessel at the time of the explosion and sinking plainly saw the undersea boat and marked the course of the torpedo, which was plainly visible.

INCENDIARIES BURN MONTREAL DEPOT

CANADIANS SUSPECT TEUTON EMISSARIES OF SETTING FIRE TO GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY OFFICES

MONTREAL, March 1.—Incendiaries set fire to and destroyed the Grand Trunk depot here this morning. Thousands of tons of freight and much baggage were destroyed. There were no casualties. Some peculiar combustible fluid or substance was undoubtedly employed in the work of destruction. The same crimson flames were noticed as were seen during the burning of the Canadian parliament house at Ottawa. The flames shot up 100 feet in the air. The loss is estimated at \$300,000.

GERMANS DEFEND SUBMARINE CAMPAIGN

TEUTONS SAY THEY NEVER AGREED NOT TO ATTACK ARMED MERCHANTMEN

BERLIN, March 1.—Baron Mumm Von Schwartzstein, of the foreign office, said this morning that Germany had never promised the United States to refrain from torpedoing armed merchantmen without warning. He said the promise referred only to unarmed liners.

BRITISH MERCHANTMAN SUNK BY MINE

EIGHTEEN-THOUSAND-TON VESSEL THORNABY LOST WITH ALL ITS CREW

LONDON, March 1.—Lloyd's dispatches this morning tell of the sinking of the 18,000-ton merchantman Thornaby somewhere in the channel. It is not believed that the vessel was sunk by a submarine, but that it was destroyed by hitting a mine. The explosion blew in three compartments and the vessel sank almost immediately. All of the crew went to the bottom with the ship. It is being noticed that the first few hours of the new submarine campaign inaugurated by Germany has not resulted in the sinking of any vessel.

LULL IN FIGHTING AT VERDUN

FRENCH BELIEVE GERMANS ARE PREPARING NEW ATTACK ON PEPPER HEIGHTS

LONDON, March 1.—It is believed that the Germans are preparing for another assault in the neighborhood of Verdun. The fighting around the fort has almost entirely ceased. Indications point to a fresh attack on Pepper Heights and also on the fortresses of De Tavannes and De Vaux. In the course of reconnaissances this morning three allies' aeroplanes were destroyed.

FELIX DIAZ DENOUNCES CARRANZA

ASPIRANT FOR MEXICAN PRESIDENCY SAYS ACTS OF GOVERNMENT WILL BE NULLIFIED

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, March 1.—Felix Diaz issued a manifest today at Vera Cruz stating that every act of the Carranza regime would be rendered void if the Diaz faction should succeed. Diaz is confident that he can induce the people to support him. He maintains that Carranza is unpopular and that the country is ready to overthrow him. He urges the Mexicans to organize a national army and put him at its head.

It is characteristic of a good team to learn from its opponents and to gain strength from its defeats. Such has been the case with the Glendale Athletics. With no gymnasium during the early part of the season; with a thorough unacquaintance with each other's style of play and with no coach nor trainer, the local boys have fought manfully through the season winning games here and there and only beaten by one or two points by the strongest teams in the League. What they might have done under other circumstances goes without saying.

SUBMARINE DISPUTE WITH GERMANY

President Wilson has all along in the dispute with Germany over the sinking of liners with American citizens on board maintained the right of Americans to sail the seas in safety regardless of what foreign countries may think on the matter.

Unless Germany should experience a change of heart and her ally Austria change with her the issue between Germany and the United States is certain to come to a point tomorrow.

The United States government has noted a change in the attitude of the Central powers during the past few days. The Central powers, understanding that the President of the United States has taken his stand on this matter of the right of Americans to travel on the seas in safety and that he believes that American rights, American honor and American self-respect are all at stake, still persist in their policy of sinking merchantmen.

Germany holds that she has a right to sink any belligerent merchantman on suspicion but adds, "No enemy merchantman is to be torpedoed without warning unless the presence of armament on board such vessel is proved."

It is thought rather singular that the memorandum says nothing regarding the manner in which the German submarine commanders under their new orders are to discover proof as to the presence of armament on board enemy merchantmen.

The right to be armed for self protection is one of the oldest rights of the sea. The United States has always maintained it as part of its marine creed and it is very apparent that notwithstanding Teuton threats and the determination of the German and Austrian leaders to try to force other countries to adopt new rules for sea-going vessels and to subject everything to the domination of the frail submarine, that this and other neutral countries will not submit to this attempt.

Whatever may be the result of the president's determination to stand by the policy he has enunciated he may be assured of the fact that the country will stand behind him.

COMING WAR DEVELOPMENTS

With the German attack on the forts at Verdun still undecided it is impossible to indicate what may be the outcome of the next few months in the field of war. If the French lines still hold and the Germans are compelled to admit that their assault is a failure there will come a vast change over the aspect of the war.

Up to this point the French line, though sorely battered by the most wild assault ever recorded in history, is still holding firm. It is estimated that the Germans have 750,000 men in line at Verdun and that the French have an equal number.

When one reads of these numbers of dead and thinks of the 100,000 wounded that are reported to be streaming back from the Teuton lines in an endless river, one is apt to pause and think of the proposed army of 145,000 men for the United States.

Again the ammunition needed in a single battle, which may be courted on to last three weeks at least, is more than all the factories of the United States could manufacture in six months.

United States statesmen are beginning to realize what has been told them a thousand times during the past five years—that this country is so far behind in army numbers and in munitions of

war that the conditions constitute a serious danger. There is a movement on foot to build up a strong navy and behind that there ought to be a strong mobile force. Doubtless something will be done to create such a force.

In the event of Germany's being unable to break through the French lines at Verdun it is likely that the next few weeks will find a great British army launched at some point where vulnerability may be expected. Lord Derby's recruiting resulted in the creation of an army of 4,000,000 men. In addition to this the conscription measure will bring another 280,000 men. The volunteer system has been no failure in Britain because 93 per cent of the men raised are volunteers; but should the war last much longer it will probably be necessary to conscript more men.

These facts are interesting to the people of the United States as illustrating what they may expect should this country become involved in war.

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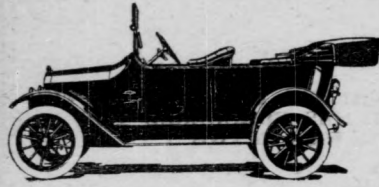

FIRST: That Canada Boulevard from the North line of Tract Number 250, Sheet Number 1, as per map recorded in Book 15, Pages 130 and 131, of Maps, Records of Los Angeles County, California, to the South line of Wabasso Way, including all intersections of streets and alleys (excepting therefrom such portions of said Canada Boulevard and intersections as are required by law to be kept in order or repair by any person or company having railroad tracks thereon), be graded and paved to the official line and grade with decomposed granite base and with an asphaltic oil, crushed rock and screenings wearing surface in accordance with Map Number 174, Profiles Numbers 371 and 408, and in further accordance with Special Specifications adopted for the improvement of Canada Boulevard in the City of Glendale by Resolution Number 745 of Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale.

SECOND: That a cement curb be constructed along the East and West lines of the roadway of Canada Boulevard from the North line of Tract Number 250, Sheet Number 1, as per map afore referred to, to the South line of Wabasso Way, including returns at all street and alley intersections. Said curbs to be constructed in accordance with Map Number 174, Profiles Numbers 371 and 408, and in further accordance with Specifications Number 12 for the construction of cement curbs in the City of Glendale, said curb to be of the class designated as Class "B" curb in said specifications.

sense of justice and alien love of peace." (We recommend the reading of this entire editorial).

The nations of the earth are fully committed to the policy of brute force. The scientific conclusion is easy to forecast. The application of the mechanics of war will surely, and that right soon, place the vitals of all mankind in the mailed fist of one man of blood and iron who will be served by a military bureaucracy forced to serve. Read Rev. 13.

Already the use of gases, air craft and submarines indicate the coming control of the peoples of the earth by a few military, diabolical monsters. We here parenthetically recommend two verses for the saints of God. Luke 12:4, 5; Rev. 13:10.

Man's conquest of nature will end in nature's conquest of man. Scientific thought is beginning to penetrate the brain of the average man and not without growing alarm of the possibilities of the universe of matter. "What will come next?" is the question ever upon the lips of the man in the street. Prussic acid, the deadliest of all poisons, in its pure form, which is a gas or ethereal liquid, is so incredibly poisonous that it is not necessary to put it to the mouth, or even to touch the lips to render its application fatal. Squirting a little of it on the skin of the body will produce instant death. He it was who, rather than suffer fame and power with oppression and hate, died upon a cross, a witness to the nations of the earth that right is more than might, that justice in the mind of God is the saving conception needed by man and that the foundation of eternal life is love divine. The feeble folk who judge all things by what their leaders say, people without private convictions of their own, the motly crew herded into organizations like so many cattle, object to the doctrine in question on the ground that their preacher never mentions the coming of Christ. More's the pity for the preacher. Paul preached the revelation of Jesus Christ. So did Augustine, Luther, Knox, Spurgeon, Moody, in fact, the epochs of the church have been created by pre-millennial preachers who ever proclaimed the coming of Jesus Christ as the only hope of mankind. Ask that preacher if he can name one successful evangelist who does not proclaim the coming of Christ. Men who preach the revelation of Jesus Christ win souls.

Dr. Arthur T. Pierson makes use of the following illustration: At the Milan Cathedral, three significant inscriptions surmount the respective doors. Over the right hand portal, a sculptured wreath of flowers, with the motto: "All that pleases is but for a moment." Over the left hand entrance a cross and crown of thorns, and under it, "All that troubles is but for a moment." But over the central door, a simple sentence, "Nothing is important save that which is eternal."

We leave you with the Word of God. We close our last sermon in the First Baptist Church of Glendale, California, with the last two verses of the last chapter of the last book of the Bible: "He which testifieth these things saith, Surely I come
