



# SEE UNDER SEA BY NEW DEVICE

Italian Inventor Claims to Have Overcome Laws Of Refracted Light

ROME, Feb. 29 .- Submarine warfare of the future will be revolutionized by the discovery of a young Italian naval expert, who claims to have discovered a process which will overcome the law of refraction and enable people to see under water.

The discoverer of the process th, scientist and naval expert, of 'submarines would be able to deeven with their periscopes totally

submerged. Professor Guglielmotti's apparatus fitted to submarines would, it is claimed, project shafts of invisible light through the water which would illuminate any body coming in the direction and radius of their rays and would act within a radius of from sever to nine hundred feet and

at a depth of fifty feet. "The first idea of this discovery came to me in 1916, when submarine warfare was at height," said the professor in an interview.

"I realized how helpless submarines become once they are totally submerged, and it ocnaval and strategic power would be increased if only a means could be found to enable the crews to see under water.

"The law of refraction of light presented an almost insuperable difficulty to this possibility. I had to call in the aid of another element, and after long studies and patient research I devised a method by which a line of light could be made to pierce the water and at the same time be invisible to aircraft watching overhead.

# MAY REDUCE TAX

Filing of Separate Returns Will Cut Amount of Income Payment

Announcing that income tax-payers of Southern California must file 14,000 returns daily up to the close of the filing period in order to avoid delinquency and the consequent penalties, Collec-tor of Internal Revenue Rex B. Goodcell gave out two far-reaching rulings which enable married taxpayers to take full advantage of the provisions of the revenue act and materially reduce their taxes.
Collector Goodcell said that in

the case of married persons a joint return reporting the income of both may be filed, or separate re-turns may be filed showing the income of each, if a specific agreement exists to the effect that the earnings and income of each are to be separate property. does not apply to community prop-erty, however. If their combined net income is subject to the surtax, a married couple will pay a smaller tax by filing separate returns. For example, a husband's net income for 1923 was \$7,000 and the wife's \$3,000. If a joint return is filed the income is subject to a surtax of 1 per cent on the amount of net income between \$6,000 and \$10,000, or \$40. If separate returns are filed, the husband's surtax is 1 per cent on the amount of his net income between \$6,000 and \$7,000, or \$10. The wife, having a net income of

less than \$6,000, pays no surtax.

Exemption Ruling
In filing separate returns either husband or wife, but not both, may claim the personal exemption, or it may be divided between them n such amounts as they desire. While the exemptions for married persons are \$2,500 if their net income was \$5,000 or less, and \$2,000 if the net income was in excess of \$5,000, Collector Goodcell pointed out that there is inserted in the revenue act a qualifying clause in justice to those persons whose net income just exceeded \$5,000. The act provides that the reduction of the amount of the exemption shall not increase by more than the amount of net income in excess of \$5,000, the tax which would be payable had the exemption been \$2,500. For example, Mr. and Mrs. John Doe had a net income for 1923 of \$5,010. Without the benefit of the above provision their normal tax would be \$120.40 (\$5,010 less \$2,000 equaling \$3,010 at 4 cent). Their actual tax is \$110.40 (\$5,010 less \$2,500 equaling \$2,-510 at 4 per cent, or \$100.40, plus \$10, the amount by which the net income exceeds \$5,000). This provision has no application where the combined net income is \$5,020

#### Financial Prestige of London in Balance

(Continued from page 1) the allied powers had been de-feated the center of world finance ald have shifted to Berlin or Frankfort, and London would have been supplanted by Antwerp or Hamburg. In the eighties German industrialization began to make rapid progress, and for several years before the war German penetration, aided by the methods resembling those of the Hansiatic league and by our policy of free imports, had gone far toward control of some of our important industries. If dreams of military dominion had not cap-tured the German imagination our financial position would have been steadily undermined, and we should have awakened to find that the superior direction of most of our industries had passed into the hands of aliens.

Future Vague

No wise man would attempt to forecast our financial future; but the omens are dark. The necessary cost of the war and the reckless extravagance which accom-panied and followed it have gravely shaken our whole economic position. Our exports do not suffice for the needs of our overgrown population. Some of our industries are languishing. All suffer from a heavier burden of taxation than is borne by any other people. The pound sterling has given way to the dollar, which will remain the premier currency unless America is afflicted with internal troubles. The confidence which British finance won and held in foreign countries rests upon belief in our political stability and in our banking system. For many years nothing happened to shake that necessary confidence. The soundness of our banking system was tested in the war and not found wanting. It still commands general trust never having followed the Germans into political paths and in-to espionage. But our political stability is now directly menaced by a socialistic party in touch with foreign revolutionaries. A socialistic government may shortly be in power, and if a fraction of the economic program to which it is committed is ever translated into action the national credit will be destroyed, and the posi-REDDING, Cal., Feb. 29 .- tion of trust, as the world's finan-



# CHINESE BANDITS

Missionary Describes Brutal Oriental Treatment for Prisoners

SACRAMENTO, Feb. 29 .- Declaring that captured outlaws are being flayed to death, or behead-ed, by the military, and that the situation is daily becoming more critical for Americans in the territory as the bandits retaliate by extending their reign of terror, Rev. Robert Whitaker, a graduate of the Baptist Theological Seminary at Berkeley and now a missionary in China, has written his father, William C. Whitaker of this city, giving a graphic portrayal of the bloody war being waged by government troops against Chinese bandits who are terrorizing Shantung Province.

Rev. Whitaker states that the heads of ninety-two bandits are mounted on the west gate of Lintsing City, four of the gruesome trophies having been severed from the bodies of Mongo-

**Describes Conditions** Writing from Linsting, the California missionary describes conditions as follows:

'Some three weeks ago, Colonel Wang Tzu P'in was sent here from Tungchangfu with 800 soldiers to suppress the bandits. General Hu, who was here before had supposedly exterminated them, but as a matter of fact he had merely driven them across the border into the Province of The bandits waited a convenient occasion and then returned to our vicinity, but this time to be met by Colonel Wang with his 800 troops who drove them back to their old stronghold at Hu Chuang, just twenty-two miles north of this city. For several days fighting took place in this district between Lintsing and Hu Chuang, it being so near at times that the firing could be heard from our Compound.

Two Hundred Butchered "Finally the bandits were surrounded and two hundred of them simply butchered. Ninety-two were beheaded, and at the present time those ninety-two heads decorate the entrance of the west gate of Lintsing City. Among these heads are four of women bandits.

"As if this were not enough four days ago, a memorial service for the soldiers killed in the fighting was held, at which time three victims were tortured for over two hours, an crowd taking in the spectacle. From these living victims, their tormentors cut the ears, the nose and then slices of flesh from different parts of the body.

The missionary stated that the Americans in the Shantung district have been notified by the American consul that they travel at their own risk and advising that they stay within the city

#### Mystic Klan Formed to Absorb Ku Klux

ATLANTA, Ga., Feb. 29.—After formulating the nucleus of what is to be known as the "Knights of Mystic Klan," Ku Klux Klan "revolutionists" from thirteen states departed for their homes, leaving the matter of designing a ritualistic working basis in the hands of a board of seven

Temporary headquarters for the new organization will be Kansas City. The board of governors will rule the Mystic Klan until the calling of another congress some time within the next six months.

The goal of this organization, as expressed by E. Y. Clarke, former imperial wizard of the Klan, is to take over the Ku Klux Klan.

Some of the purposes of the new organization, as set forth in the skeleton constitution on which the national order is to be found-

Promotion of patriotism; maintenance of free education; right of trial by jury; restriction of immigration; founding of institutions for the cure of tuberculosis and cancer; establishing of a chain of banks for the help and relief of members of the association; building of homes, and unification of the white Protestant forces of the world.

#### Wounded Ducks Like 'Birds of a Feather'

SACRAMENTO, Feb. 29 .-Game wardens in San Joaquin county report thousands of ducks, crippled but escaped victims of hunters, are gathered together in the sloughs of Victoria island in the delta of the San Joaquin river.

"This is the first time I ever heard of such an aggregation," said George Neale, secretary to the State Fish and Game Commis-"It is quite possible that the wounded ducks, unable to keep pace with their able-bodied consorts, dropped behind and gradually have come together. A duck unable to travel rapidly because of a wound naturally would alight where it saw other ducks, and the situation is easily explained in

Reports also have been received at the office of the State Fish and Game Commission that a similar situation exists on an island in the Sacramento river.

# DEALERS PLAN TO

Will Urge Senators from California to Vote for Reduction

Members of the Glendale Mo-tor Car Dealers' Association will carry their fight for a reduction of the federal excise automobile tax to the United States senate, it was decided by the members of the board of directors at the meeting held yesterday at the Egyptian Village. The directors counted their victory half won when word was received yesterday that the House of Representatives had abolished the 3 per cent tax on small motor trucks and cut the present 5 per cent tax on automobile tires, re-pair parts and accessories to half. The action of the House, it was reported, meant a saving of \$23,000,000 to American mo-

A resolution passed by the directors yesterday asking a reduc-tion of the auto tax, will be sent to the California senators by the organization in addition to the individual appeals of the members, Miller B. Towman, secretary of the association, said.

Will Mean More Sales
In the discussion which preceded the passing of the resolution, the directors agreed that the tax was a burden to automobile purchasers and had a tendency to retard sales. Increased business in all lines, it is believed, will follow the final passage of the tax reduction law.

Plans for starting a campaign to sell used cars now in the hands of dealers of Glendale, were discussed by the directors, follow-ing an address on used cars by Lyman P. Clark, chairman the used car committee of the association.

(Continued from page 1) sizzle. Why, he sputtered, should Columbus, a foreigner, get credit for doing something that really was done by an adventurous Bristolite? So he wrote to Premier Macdonald to ask him to settle the question by decreeing that Cabot and not Columbus should be honored in the pageant.

"In view of the fact that John Cabot, of Bristol, with a Bristol ship and crew," wrote the mayor, 'sailed from this port and reached North America in June, 1497, a year before Columbus touched the coast further south, if the discovery of America is attributed to Columbus it would be an historical inaccuracy which would cause great resentment in

this historic city.

"John Cabot, although a Venetian by birth, was long a resident of our city, and his son, Sebastian, who was born here, was a notable merchant adventurer of this port. The Matthew, in which he sailed, was British and so was every member of its crew. This is to be a British empire exhibition, and Columbus has no connection with our coun-He was a foreigner who sailed under a foreign flag, his enterprise being promoted by

#### Wasn't in 1492

Some bright American schoolboy, who recalls the couplet "In 1492 Columbus sailed the ocean blue," may pertly remark that the mayor of Bristol has his dates mixed. If Cabot did not approach the "stern and rock-bound shore" until 1497 it would seem that Christopher beat John to it by about five years. But Bristol's mayor contends that the histories have it wrong and that the date of Columbus's reputed discovery is as inaccurate as the entire Chris-

topherian episode.

Just to satisfy his own patriotic fervor, the mayor further points out in his letter to Macdonald that the first governor of Newfoundland was an ex-mayor of Bristol; that the first English man to set foot in Australia sailed from Bristol; that the first settlers on the shores of the Hudson river hailed from Bristol, and that the first steamship to cross the Atlantic was Bristol-built and Bristol-owned. Surely, he argues, Bristol has done enough for the empire to deserve the prime minister's consideration in this Columbus-Cabot controversy.

Premier Macdonald has been busy with such matters as recognition of Russia, reparations, war debts, unemployment, etc., and has not had time as yet to give the Bristol mayor's request the consideration such a weighty problem deserves. The prime minister, however, undoubtedly has a chance to make a lot of friends for the Labor government in Bristol by enshrining John Cabot on the pedestal Christopher Columbus has occupied through the centuries.



# CONSERVE WATER FOR IRRIGATION, PLEA TO PUBLIC

Power Plant Head Suggests Every Care Be Used to Meet Emergency

Returning from a meeting of Edison managers held in Los Ansaid that plans are now being made to curtail certain classes of service so that all the power available may be used for essential

"This is the driest season on record for fifty years," Mr. Rowan said, "and is by far the driest experienced since waterpower has been used for generating electricity. 

Corner Where Many Accidents Occur Will Be Made Safe for Travel

The kink in San Fernando boulevard at Scott road is to be eliminated, a movement having been inaugurated by the city trustees at their last meeting to accept the offer of Dominick Morro to deed a portion of his property here as a right-of-way, so that the boulevard may take a more gentle curve and come out several hundred feet beyond the corner, instead of following Scott road as at present.

As it is at this corner that a number of bad accidents have occurred, the move to straighten the

highway is greeted with enthusiasm by the entire 30,000 motorists who daily travel San Fernando boulevard

The only obstacle still remaining in the path of the proposed improvement is a financial one. It will cost \$10,000 to make the change, estimates City Engineer F. Curt Miller. This Mr. Morro refuses to bear, feeling that he has done all that is required of him in donating the right-of-way.

On the theory that the improvement is an important one should be partially financed by the state and the county, a committee has been appointed to lay the matter before the proper authorities. This committee comprises C. H. Kline, president, and Mrs. Walter Fisher, secretary of the city planning commission, and

public library shall be managed by a board designated as the Board of Library Trustees, consisting of five members, to be appointed by the mayor, president of the Board of Trustees or other executive head of the municipality. Said trustees shall severally hold office for three years, serving without compensation.


