My Dear Mr Garrison, I am sadden-
ed by what I see and hear. The action of White League men in the South, and the coldness in the North alarms me. I fear a Counter-Revolution. Men are beginning to hint at changing the condition of the Negro, and he is now made to feel the force of power and opinion. The tone of some of our papers is terrible. Our Anti-Slavery veterans must again speak out. They must again be heard. They must call the battle roll anew, and
