

Express or Freight "By Express or Freight" means that the purchaser pays the cost of transportation. To points beyond the third zone, it is cheaper to ship by express than by parcel post. On pound prices listed Postpaid in catalog, if wanted by express or freight, you may deduct 5 cents per pound.



Asparagus

Culture—Asparagus succeeds well in any good rich soil, but a light, warm soil which has been heavily manured for previous crops is best. To grow asparagus roots, soak the seeds in warm water for 24 hours; sow two inches deep in drills two feet apart. When the plants are well up, thin out one inch apart and give frequent and thorough cultivation keeping the plants clean from weeds. The roots can be transplanted, either at one or two years old, either in the fall or spring.

Columbia Mammoth White

The immense shoots are clear white, and in favorable weather remain so until three or four inches above the surface. The crown or bud of the young stalk is considerably smaller than the part just below it. All but a few of the seedlings will produce clear, white shoots and the green ones can be readily distinguished and rejected when setting the permanent bed. 



Under ordinary dry farming conditions they yield from 450 to 700 lbs. per acre. The beans are white, cook well, have a delicious flavor.

White Navy or Prolific Tree



Beets grow best in moderately rich, light loam. Sow the seed as soon as the ground becomes fit to work, in drills 18 inches apart, 1 inch deep.



Tuckers' Crimson Globe

The root is of medium size, generally about three inches in diameter, very handsome in shape, being a little deeper than round, with a remarkably smooth surface. It has a very small taproot. The very dark leaves are small and borne on slender stems, which occupy but a small portion of the root, but it is the exquisite tenderness of the flesh and the complete absence of any stringy or woody character that so thoroughly distinguish this beet. The interior color is very deep crimson, but is ringed or zoned in a most beautiful manner, making it very attractive in appearance. Pkt., 5c; oz., 10c; ¼ lb., 30c; lb., 90c.

Crosby's Improved Egyptian

In size it is medium or little below, yielding from ten to sixteen tons per acre, and containing from 16 to 18 per cent of sugar.


CULTURE—Cabbage requires deep rich, mellow soil, and good culture to obtain firm, solid heads. For early use, sow seeds of the early kinds, in hot beds or in a box in the house, the last of January or early in February; transplant into open ground in April. For second early cabbage, sow in April and transplant in May. One ounce of seed produces about 2500 plants.

SECTION HONEY BOXES.

A section honey box is a strip of wood with three V-shaped grooves cut at right angles across the section on one side. These grooves are cut at the proper distances apart, so when the strip is folded up it will form sides and ends of a box, of length desired. For instance, to make a section $4\frac{1}{4} \times 4\frac{1}{4}$, the grooves would be cut at such distances as to divide the strip into four equal parts. These strips are dovetailed on the end; hence, these boxes can be folded and the two ends being dovetailed together, it requires no nails or glue to hold them in place.


