WEATHER BULLETIN.
Daily Report Furnished by the Victoria Meteorological Department.

Victoria, Nov. 20—3 a. m.—The recent storm has rapidly passed through the province and crossed the Rockies into the Northwest provinces and is now central in Saskatchewan, from whence a fringe of low pressure extends southward to Utah. On the coast the pressure has greatly increased, the high area being central in Western Washington; these conditions are causing fair, cold weather in this district.

A COOL MILLION
Has Been Spent By Grand Trunk Pacific Already.

In an interview in Montreal F. M. Morse, general manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific, speaking of the money already spent in the west by the company, said: "Yes, the Northwest pay roll of the Grand Trunk Pacific has already become quite formidable, and \$1,000,000 has already been spent by the company in surveys of the route, and the thorough manner in which every department is being carried on."

"Are you generally purchasing your right of way?" he was asked.
"Yes," he replied, "our right of way is always working ahead, and although we consider that we have had to pay pretty good prices, there seems to be no disposition to hold us up. In some cases the farmers' views clash with those of our engineers in matters of location, but all appear delighted to see our road going through their respective sections."

CITY TREASURER DECLINES.
G. F. Baldwin Will Not Accept Comptrolership of Vancouver—Poor Health the Cause.

G. F. Baldwin, city treasurer of Vancouver, formally declined the offer of the position of comptroller in a letter addressed Friday to the city clerk, which was laid before the finance committee. He has been considering the matter since Tuesday morning, and has been urged on all sides to accept. The principal reason for his declining was because of his health, which is at present not so good as it might be, nor has been for some time past. The new position would entail considerable work, particularly at the first, which he feels he might not be able to stand.

INVESTIGATIONS IN THE BALKANS

REPORT BY SECRETARY OF THE COMMITTEE

He Says Alleged Reform Work by the Civil Authorities Has Been Very Disappointing.

Constantinople, Nov. 18.—W. A. Moore, secretary of the Balkan committee, has just made a report on the conditions which he discovered during a journey which he recently undertook in the Balkans with Leonard Buxton and C. M. Lloyd. In this report Mr. Moore says:

"It would be difficult to exaggerate the misgovernment and anarchy in the Kosovo vilayet, the aspege allotted to the Austrians. The default of the Komitija leaders—the results of which we saw have already been reported in the newspapers. The day before we saw the bodies of the women and infants massacred by the troops the Turkish authorities at Palanka had assured us that everything was tranquil in their district, and every possible precaution was taken to prevent us from getting any information about Komitija, and finally to prevent us from visiting the church where the bodies lay."

"I subsequently had conversations with the Kaimakams of Palanka and Kumanova, the Vali of Uskub, and Hilmi Pasha as to the affair. They all excused the soldiers, but the reasons they gave did not agree. One Turkish officer said the people were killed with spent bullets. In Kumanova the day we arrived a Turk killed a three-days-old child; and every day produced a murder. Some months ago the members of a Serbian band who had surrendered and had been deprived of their weapons were massacred in Kumanova town in front of the Austrian officer's house. In the town of Uskub assassinations on the streets are not uncommon; and we heard of many cases of murders, violations and robberies committed by soldiers and others in the neighborhood and in the town. The Albanian portions of the Kosovo vilayet, the north and north-west, appear to be in a state of absolute lawlessness, and the authority of the Ottoman Empire is nearly growing less and less. As far as Prizren it retains some power, but in Djakovica and Ipek it has no name, and the Kaimakam of Liuna has for a year or more past resided at Prizren, not daring to take up his post."

The Sultan recently sent an emissary from Constantinople to negotiate with the Albanians and to hear their demands. He went in a very public manner, but his return was hasty and unimpressive. Existence in this district has become almost insupportable, and the Serbian population is being rapidly diminished by murder and flight.

THE TORPEDO BOAT DISASTER.
Bomber Exploded After Collision With German Cruiser.

Kell, Nov. 18.—The disaster to torpedo boat 183 occurred during manoeuvres here last night. A torpedo division was making an attack upon the small German vessel Undine, which had blinded lights. She suddenly used her searchlight, which confused the helmsman of the 183 and the torpedo boat got under the Undine's bows. The explosion of the torpedo was heard by the crew and the catastrophe explains the great number of victims. It is believed that all the missing members of the crew were killed or drowned. Several wounded officers were rescued.

FALSE CREEK IMPROVEMENT.

Competitive Plans to Be Called For—Prize Will Be Offered For Scheme Adopted.

"Competitive plans will probably be called for by the city council for the improvement of the false creek at the head of False creek, and a special prize offered for the best," says the Vancouver News-Advertiser. "At a joint meeting on Friday of the sites sub-committee and the finance committee, a motion to this effect was moved by His Worship the Mayor, and the recommendation will be made to the council at its next meeting. The plans are to include an estimate of the cost, and the council will fix the amount of the prize to be offered."

The meeting was rather an important one, the speaker being made by J. J. H. Ross, inspector-general of the public works department, that if the city stated its intention of definitely developing the head of False creek along some such lines as proposed, the Dominion government would be prepared to subsidize the channel from the mouth of the creek, by Westminister avenue. Mr. Ross also announced that when securing borings of False creek, he had done so on the flats, though these were practically dry property, and the results were very favorable to the carrying-out of some such scheme suggested.

"An alternative plan to the one first proposed was laid before the meeting by H. Webster, to whom the credit is due for the suggestion of the improvement of the False creek, and the latter H. H. Webster pointed out these plans, giving some statistical information in connection therewith. The first plan, that of having the wharves round the outer edge of the basin, would have 36 acres of wharf area; the latter only 46. The first would have 34 acres of streets and roadways, the latter 11; the regulation in the first would involve dredging approximately 4,200,000 yards, and the latter 6,000,000."

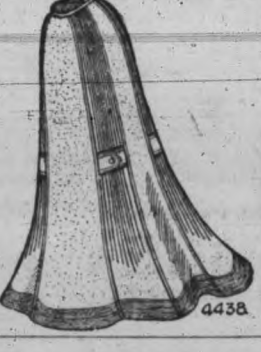

VIrAGO SOUND. To the Editor—The following account of the naming of Virago Sound, Queen Charlotte Islands, will probably be of interest to readers of your paper. I have therefore the pleasure to enclose it.

TO PROTECT VICTORIA.

Dominion Government Asked to Appoint Another Veterinary Inspector.

Victoria merchants and others owning horses are very nervous over the epidemic of glanders which has broken out in Vancouver, and fear that it will spread to this city. Every effort will be made to prevent an outbreak of the disease here, and the veterinary surgeons are on the guard so that vigorous steps may be taken at the very first symptom of danger.

Dr. Toimie, Dominion veterinary surgeon for the province, is busy on the Mainland, so it is necessary that some one be appointed to act here during his absence. Realizing this, Geo. Riley, M. P., has written to Dr. Rutherford, Dominion veterinary inspector at Ottawa, to appoint such an official. The action was accelerated by the fact that horses are being brought here from the Mainland, which is a grave source of danger. Mr. Riley's telegram is as follows: Dr. Rutherford, Ottawa:

Horses being brought here from Mainland, please greatly alarmed. Appoint Richards with power to inspect and quarantine during absence. Please act promptly. GEO. RILEY.

SPLENDID SPORT

Enjoyed by Hunters Who Spent Yesterday at Neighbouring Woods—Many Deer.

Last evening's E. & N. train was more than usually crowded with disciples of Nimrod. As it drew into the depot crowds of khaki clad hunters surged from the different cars and all appeared to be well loaded down with game. In fact as the season advances the experienced sportsmen seem to be meeting with much better success than previously. In conversation yesterday one of these stated that the weather conditions could not be more suitable than at present either for birds or deer. There was no reason why the veriest novice should not capture a goodly number of pheasants or grouse or even a deer providing he was in earnest and exercised ordinary common sense in the chase.

More deer were brought down from neighboring points yesterday than has been the case for several weeks. They came from the Summit, 17-Mile Post, Goldstream and other small way stations, very few of those having set out, rifle in hand, returning without something to show for the day's hunt.

It is very seldom that a sportsman armed with an ordinary rifle can boast of killing grouse in frequented resorts at this season of the year. Such a feat lies to the credit of a well known local Nimrod, however, and was accomplished yesterday afternoon. Raising a covey of willow he stood unconcernedly expecting to see them whirl by and vanish, but they apparently were unacquainted with the dangerousness of the hunter and perched upon a nearby tree in order to investigate from a point of vantage. This boldness cost two of the birds their lives, as the sportsman was no mean shot, cleaving their heads with deadly aim. The others managed to escape before a third bullet could find its way into their bodies.

Returning from up the line last evening the sportsmen discussed with more or less animation the proposed protection of game within the E. & N. land belt by the C. P. R.—it seemed to meet with unanimous approval, many expressing a hearty gratification that at last some effective means would be taken to prevent illegal shooting.

CATHOLIC BAZAAR.

Will Conclude With an Auction at Institute Hall This Evening.

The bazaar, which was in progress on Thursday, Friday and Saturday of last week at Institute hall, under the auspices of the ladies of the Roman Catholic cathedral, will conclude to-night with an auction sale of the remaining articles by Messrs. It is to be regretted that the bazaar has been an unqualified success, and the committee responsible deserve the highest praise, their preparations having been most thorough. A number of articles will be raffled off to-night and a large crowd is expected to attend in order to see the fortunate ones presented with their prizes.

GREAT SHOWING OF ORE.

Eleven New Claims Have Been Staked on the West Arm of Quatsino Sound.

News comes from Quatsino by the steamer Quon City, which arrived from the West Coast this morning, that the hemlock iron on the West Arm has been further prospected this year. Eleven additional claims have been staked adjacent to the twenty-two recently acquired by Seattle capitalists. The new claims have been gone over carefully, and where the surface vegetation and soil can be removed the bog iron is found underneath.

Two of the claims, the Iron Chink and Star, were discovered by accident. Albert Lund, a cruiser, who was camping on the beach, about one and a half miles below the first location of iron, saw a tree tinned up a little way from his camp. He went over and looked under it and there found the solid hemlock exposed. A number of "land falls" in the vicinity were then examined and the same thing was found. This exposure by the wind alone covered a number of acres, and means thousands of tons of valuable mineral. This great deposit of iron close to salt water indicates a great future for Quatsino. The total claims staked extend over an area of about 1,000 acres, and as soon as the capitalists get hold of them Quatsino will go ahead steadily. The June property is being developed by Messrs. Grant and Lippy. A amount of \$200 has been run to tap the showing above.

An Indian is alleged to have killed four elk at the end of the Southeast Arm. The constable will prosecute him under the Game Act. The Indian claims to have killed all the meat for the winter.

Both sides played a number of those who had participated in the junior contest, and in justice to the Terminal City team, it must be stated that while the locals had only two, the Vancouver fifteen included five of their juniors, namely, Murray, Yates, Scott, Harris and Gallop.

The first half was fast and exciting. There was no perceptible advantage either way, one side making a rush one minute and the other the next. In fact, the contest resolved itself into a series of futile attacks and counter attacks, until at last the spectators despaired of seeing a point scored.
